Girl Scout Cabin Needs More Money To Complete Construction Of Building

Cabin Fund Is \$4,500 Short Of Necessary Funds To Finish Camping Site; Leaders And Officers Urge All Bellevillites To Contribute \$1 To Reach Goal

The prospect of having a cabin of their own is slowly becoming a reality to Belleville Girl Scouts as construction gets underway for the cabin in South Orange reservation. Completion is expected to be possible by May 21st and should include everything essential to a cabin. However as often happens, the Girl Scout organization who have worked so hard to raise the funds necessary for construction find they have a difficult decision and problem to face.

Because the Cabin Fund Drive was \$4,500 short of its goal, the architect doesn't want to be changed. Among other things three porches, a stall shower, lavatory and two hand basins, as well as a stairway to a small balcony were eliminated from the original plans.

Why should the Local Girl Scouts have to be content with a cabin that doesn't include porches? They add so much to camping enjoyment and provide safe space for beautiful sleeping when the weather is not eliminating the other items will overcrowd the auxiliary facilities when the cabin is filled to capacity.

These necessities that are left out because of lack of funds cannot be added later without doubling the expense. In addition these girls, thirsty for camping, shouldn't have to wait for something they may never get. Belleville Scouts have been without a cabin for 12 years. Many came and went during that interval. Let's not insist that our girls accept less than they deserve. If a contribution of at least a dollar were made by every Girl Scout and a adult registered in Belleville, former Scouts, parents of future Scouts, as well as by those citizens of our town who think that Bellevillites have this sum of \$4,500 would be easy to

As part of its program to relieve the current shortage of nurses, Clara Maass Memorial Hospital, in cooperation with the Essex County Medical Society, started an 8-week refresher course for graduate nurses on Tuesday of this week.

Orlando Caprio, M.D., F.A.C.R., Director, Radiology, St. Vincent's Hospital, on "X-rays—What They Can Reveal (How to prepare the patient for the use of

dyes and other medications; care of the patient following new treatments by X-rays)." April 1: Panel Discussion on Food and Nutrition—led by S. William Kalb, M.D., Nutritionist.

April 8: Mary A. Bobeck, R.N., Dir. of Nurses, St. Michael's, Newark, on "Newer Trends in Post-Operative Care of Patients." April 15: Albert G. Hulse, M.D., F.A.C.P., Pathologist, on "Psychosomatic Factors Involved in Chronic and Metabolic Diseases."

April 20: Mildred Gonyea, New Medical Procedures, led by Albin H. Orange, Exec. Director, Clara Maass Memorial Hospital. April 27: Mildred Gonyea, R.N., Dir. Visiting Nurse Association of the Oranges and Maplewood, on "Community Resources in Continued Care of the Patient."
