Belleville prepares to bloom

The "seeds have been sown" to begin the festivities for Belleville's 150th anniversary as last Saturday, Commissioner of Parks and Public Property Vincent Frantantoni and two dozen volunteers planted close to 4,000 tulip, narcissus, daffodil and hyacinth bulbs throughout the township.

Sites where plantings have been completed are Belleville Town Hall, Belleville Health Department, Wesley Methodist Church, the Recreation House, Union Avenue War Memorial, and St. Peter's Church. Among the selected sites still to be planted are the D.A.V. building, Belleville Middle School, Belleville Public Library, School 10, Franklin Avenue Firehouse, and Silver Lake Baptist Church. The next planting day is scheduled for this Saturday, November 19.

Frantantoni and Cornelis Vander Zwan, who solicited the bulbs from Dutch Gardens Inc. in Lisse, Holland while vacationing a

short time ago, picked up 10,000 bulbs last Wednesday at the firm's U.S. distribution center in Adelphi. Dutch Gardens, noted worldwide for their outstanding varieties of flower bulbs, donated the bulbs to assist in Belleville's 150th celebration.

Volunteers included Vander Zwan, Ed and Marilyn Torti, Michael Maino, Angelo Veneziano, Anthony Bruno, Victor Canning, Pamela Vander Zwan, and Gilde Raimondi. Also assisting were Carol Smith, a trustee of Wesley Church, Boy Scout Leader Jay Meglio and Boy Scout Anthony Frantantoni, his sister, Phyllis Ann, and Girl Scouts from Troops 950 and 952, including Kim Walsifer, Jennifer Cera, Marcella Walsh and her father Gerry Walsh.

Bulbs were planted at St. Peter's Church by Roy Chrobocinski and three students from his Confirmation class, Dennis Crupke, Melissa Miranda and Laura Nenninger.

Commissioner of Public Affairs Joseph Fornarotto joined

the group at the Union Avenue Veterans Memorial.

Mothers and students of School 9 sprung into planting action a day earlier than other volunteers, placing the bulbs around the school Friday. Senior citizens will be planting bulbs at the Senior's Recreation Building on Franklin Avenue and members of the organization of Parents and Education of School 7 will plant bulbs in their area. Several historic sites will have their own volunteers for planting, among those the Dutch Reformed Church, Rose Cottage, and Christ Church.

Special assistance was provided by Joseph Porcello, a horticulturist from Belleville, who volunteered his services to Frantantoni.

Much work remains and Frantantoni is seeking more volunteers to continue the planting, which must be completed before the first frost. Anyone interested may call the Parks and Public Property office at 450-3322 or Cornelis Vander Zwan at 759-9420.

Change of government committee has growing support as signatures rise

It started out as a rumor, gradually becoming a fact. Once it became fact, many believed it wouldn't have a leg to stand on. Now, however, it is coming close to achieving its goal; having a referendum on ballot for the registered voters in Belleville to decide the type of government they would like.

The change of government movement, which wants to eliminate the commission form of government and establish a council-manager system, started out at a tortoise's pace but as in the old children's story it appears to be coming on to win the race against the hare, or those who are opposed to the potential change.

At this point, approximately 2,700 Bellevillites have signed petitions for the change, including 900 on election day as eight people went out to the polling places to collect signatures. For the change to be placed on a ballot for vote 20 percent of the 16,799 registered voters, or about 3,360, must sign but the group will not be satisfied until they have 4,000 names.

"We want to compensate if people move or they may not be registered," explained Bruce Morg-

an, a change of government committee member. "We're going to have a couple challenged so we want to go in fully prepared. We want to be comfortable and the extra 700 will give us a cushion."

According to Mario Drozd, there is little doubt they will acquire the necessary signatures. He said if they had two people with petitions at every polling building they may have received their necessary allotment. He also stated they have had approximately a 90 percent success ratio when asking people to sign. "The people in town are ready and they want a change," offered Drozd. "We have to change with the times. The commission is an outdated form of government. We're not planning for the year 2000."

Commission is uncommon
Morgan pointed out the commission form is slowly disappearing from use, with only 36 of 567 municipalities in New Jersey use the five-member board. Morgan also said Belleville is the only community in the state to have a commission, change to a council-manager setup, and then return to the commission and stay with it.

Orange did change to a council-manager system, and changed but they changed to a mayor-council system.

Morgan and Drozd emphasized it has nothing to do with "sour grapes" of former candidates who lost in the past election to attempt to overthrow the present five commissioners. It is a change of the governmental structure, to what they believe is an improved format.

"Some people have said it is a negative campaign run by former politicians but it not that at all," said Morgan. "We have no past employees or politicians in our group. To the best of my knowledge we only have one past candidate with us."

"It is not a recall drive, so to speak," he continued. "We want to recall the form of government, not the commissioners. We really have no beef with the commissioners."

Talked about for some time
Drozd explained there had been talk of a change of government before the past commission election, in May of 1987. When the results were tallied, and three new commissioners had been voted in,

K-mart addition proposed

Apartment complex vote postponed for second time

A decision on a proposed housing development on Bridge Street was postponed for a second time by the Belleville Planning Board at its monthly meeting last week.

The board also heard preliminary hearings on an addition to K-Mart and approved an addition to Casitelli's Bakery.

A vote on the housing complex, at 23-25 Bridge Street, was delayed because of a confusion in revised plans; two members and the board's planner, Grace Harris, had the most recent blue prints, but the remaining members did not. The board decided it would delay a vote until all members have the revised plans.

Despite this, the board requested certain conditions be made to the proposal, specifically reducing the number of units from 21 to 18. Another request discussed was ultimately deemed inappropriate for the project.

Board member Alois Schmitt said the aesthetics would be improved if the complex was facing Bridge Street instead of the side as is proposed. "I don't know if 21 could be done that way but 18 can," he said.

After initially agreeing with

the request, the applicant's attorney, Frank Giantomasi, commented it was not feasible. "Because of the grade it will be virtually impossible to spin (the complex)," stated Giantomasi. He suggested leaving the building in the same position but shorten it by three units.

Edward Centanni, architect for the applicant, Jack Calandra, said there is a difference in elevation of seven to eight feet if the building was to be switched. He said the reduction of three units, or 24 feet, will be used as green space.

Kevin Kennedy, another board member, suggested moving the parking lot in front and having the complex moved back if the grade was more suitable. Board member Frank Simeone disagreed, feeling the lot in front will not be an improvement to the area while the present proposal is an improvement. Kennedy responded by saying he felt it wasn't enhancing the neighborhood.

Other conditions listed were adding a stop basin for drainage and improving the solid waste storage system.

An area resident, Joseph Jarm-

an, said the water run-off was going to be a major problem. He also said there are only approximately 21 families on all of Bridge Street and if the project is approved, 18 more will be added, almost doubling the number of residents. His final concern was the fact the complex is on a hill and will be 40 feet in height, which will "dominate the area."

Frances Hughes of 27 Bridge Street said there will be no water run-off. "It's sandy soil. I have a pool and I pump 6,000 gallons (of water) an hour and it just goes in the ground."

K-Mart addition

A decision on a one-story metal addition, encompassing 9,389 square feet, to K-Mart was postponed, pending police and fire reports on the possibility of closing off the Main Street driveway.

Edward Heibert suggested installing a fence on the Main Street side of the property to deter shoppers crossing Main Street to go to the shopping mall across the street. The conversation then included having a no left turn sign at the driveway and then the board suggested closing off the driveway completely.

K-Mart's Eastern Regional Construction Manager, Ben Pritchert, said he was not certain the parking area could support delivery trucks which presently use the Main Street driveway. He said the area for trucks has 3.5 inches of pavement, compared to only 2.5 for the remaining lot.

Simeone disagreed, saying he has seen trucks parked throughout the lot. Pritchert said they shouldn't be parked anywhere but in the designated area.

William McCloud, a represen-

Belleville POLICE BEAT

The owner of a liquor store was arrested and charged with eight counts of selling alcohol to underage minors November 10.

Walter Smith, 73, proprietor of Garden Liquor store on Garden Avenue was apprehended after the tactical narcotics team had set up surveillance on the ninth and tenth of November after the detective bureau received information of the sale to minors.

An 18 year-old Bellevilleite was arrested and charged with a controlled dangerous substance when the car she was driving was pulled over by police November 7.

The tactical narcotics team pulled over Paula Moreno on Mill Street and Terrace Place for vehicular violations. As they questioned her, a marijuana cigarette was noticed in the ashtray of the vehicle.

A house on Heckel Street was burglarized November 8. The suspect kicked in the rear door, ransacked the door and stole assorted jewelry.

A 1985 Cadillac Fleetwood was recovered by police in Newark November 7. The vehicle had been reported stolen a day earlier.

Newspaper reports of the Oct. 25 Belleville Board of Commissioners meeting at town hall told of the chambers being filled up to capacity and that some members of the public having been turned away ... that is an unpardonable situation and quite unnecessary. The so-called senior citizen building at Franklin Ave. and Mill Street is a Municipally owned building with all the required appointments to accommodate more than the number of citizens who would otherwise be turned away were the local high school not available on town meeting nights.

Woman fatally injured in K-mart mishap

Thirteen people were injured, one fatally, Tuesday afternoon when an car ran out of control and crashed into the K-Mart department store on Joralemon Street.

The car, a 1984 Cadillac El Dorado, driven by 72 year-old Louis Prospero of Bloomfield, smashed through the front doors of the store at approximately 2:30 p.m., finally coming to a halt approximately 75 feet in the store.

Prospero was taken to Belleville Police Headquarters, interviewed and released. According to the Police report Prospero had mechanical difficulties with his car. He was not immediately charged.

The woman killed was identified as Barbara Urbanovich, 37, of Nutley.

"He went in, then out, then back in," explained eyewitness Sherry Manzo. "He was burning rubber."

Another eyewitness who was in the store could not believe what he was seeing. "I didn't know what to think. I saw him coming. Two ladies had their backs turned and I shoved one because I saw what was going on," detailed Leonard Nandi. "It looked like something out of a 'Dirty Harry' movie."

"People were screaming and yelling," described Jacqueline

Elkerson. "The car hit my cart and knocked me into a clothes rack. I looked for my cart but I couldn't find it."

Elkerson was taken to Clara Maass Medical Center to have her shoulder examined. Most of the

injured were transported to Clara Maass while others were sent to University Hospital, Newark.

"The lady under the car was hurt real bad," said Elkerson. "The guy tried to get out of the car but he

was told to stay in."

Prospero and other eyewitnesses were quickly taken to police headquarters for questioning but many onlookers stayed for the removal of the car from the store, which finally occurred at 4:00 p.m.

Not at effective number

Once again a problem looms with the Belleville Planning Board and the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment and it has to do with things that are somewhat beyond their control. A lack of members, resulting in just enough members to conduct a meeting and in some cases not enough to meet a quorum, has made attending a meeting an adventure in itself.

For months now the two boards have not had the maximum allowable members, for a variety of reasons. But the overriding reason is because the commissioners have, in effect, dragged their feet in appointing new members. There were questions posed at the last Belleville Board of Commissioners meeting about the situation and it was detailed by Township Attorney Frank Cozzarelli that the mayor, in this case Michael Pizzi, has authority to make appointments to the Planning Board. Pizzi said he has now immediate plans to make any appointments without first seeking approval from his fellow commissioners but did say he felt an urgency to make the appointments because of the difficulty with the boards meeting quorums.

Added to this is the fact that in many applications the applicant has the right to withhold a vote if a full board is not present. This creates a backlog of applications, despite the fact only a summation and vote is required. Both boards are very thorough in their questions, which is very admirable and necessary considering the layout of Belleville, therefore, making for lengthy applications. To prevent an agenda from appearing like a five year-old's Christmas list, the commissioners should make the appointments as quickly as possible.

Another existing problem will hopefully be rectified by the Planning Board. At the past two meetings a vote on an application has been postponed because the full compliment of board members has not had finalized plans. It was explained there has been a mixup on some occasions with the delivery of plans, which at the present time goes through at least three people before reaching the board members. Members had discussed an alternative way of having the prints delivered to them so the delays do not continue. Hopefully, this has been done and the board can move along at a smooth, brisk rate.

Large shoes to fill

With the resignation of Board of Education Trustee Felix Linfante a void now exists in the board's ranks. Applicants are to write letters of request and explain the benefits they would bring to the board. An interview procedure will also be provided, and a decision will be reached by the remaining six board members.

Once that decision is made the new member will be thrown directly into the fire. Filling the shoes of Linfante will not be an easy fit, as he was a valuable, reliable member who had five years experience. As the old saying reads, you can't teach experience, and that may be the most important ingredient that will be missed.

But the new member will be joining what is probably the most important board in town. The board controls the future of Belleville, its children. Without a successful educational background, Belleville, or any town, is doomed to fail. The person must bring in experience in the educational field, as well as being persuasive; persuasive enough to convince the general public of this fact. For that matter the entire board must be persuasive towards the general public, creating an affirmative feeling regarding next year's budget.

And to top it all off, this new member must accomplish all these things in a relatively short period of time. An appointment may not be reached to the first of the year. Linfante's seat is due for election in April, 1989. That leaves the newest member of the Belleville Board of Education under four months to assist in these achievements or the threat of not being elected looms over him, or her. It is a tall order for anyone and it will be very interesting to see who is chosen for this seat.

• SHABBY treatment of Nutley's Andrew Jackson, Assistant Road Superintendent for the Department of Public Works by Commissioner Peter Scarpelli has led to filing of a charge of racial discrimination against the Township of Nutley. Jackson, a black, has been with the Department for thirty years, always enjoyed a good reputation for being a dedicated, competent employee, was

replaced by a Scarpelli relative. Jackson is the only Nutley employee denied the 6.5% annual increase awarded to all other town employees. Jackson says that Scarpelli is trying to force him to resign his job.

Scarpelli denied his actions were racially motivated and alleges that Jackson "wasn't performing up to the standard of which he was capable." Scarpelli further observes "If Jackson is unhappy, he should resign." Scarpelli must have been listening to President-elect George Bush's words when he told a nation that he "seeks a gentler and kinder nation." I guess we all have our ideas of what is more gentle and more kind. Jackson claims the new Road Department head that Scarpelli appointed can drive a truck but can't operate any of the equipment.

Jackson is the second Public Works employee who has gone public with complaints against Commissioner Scarpelli. Recently, veteran Code Enforcer Pat Intindola accused Scarpelli of wanting Intindola to work overtime without extra pay or no allowance for compensatory time. In the Intindola matter, perhaps, Scarpelli could induce Town Engineer Carl Anlas to do the overtime work since Anlas is the only other qualified town employee to perform a limited number of Intindola's duties. A third Public Works employee, George Tuzzolino, a former aide to Intindola, resigned over a salary dispute with Public Works Commissioner Peter Scarpelli. The only town department creating any degree of public controversy is Scarpelli's Public Works Department.

• ASSEMBLY Speaker Chuck Hardwick recently appointed Assemblywoman Marion Crecco of Bloomfield as a permanent member of the Assembly Financial Institutions Committee. The group is chaired by Assemblyman Jack Penn of Somerset County and deals primarily with legislation affecting banks in New Jersey. Hardwick should be commended for making the wise appointment.

• SENATOR Carmen Orechio has sponsored a bill in the Senate which passed 37-0 that provides for imprisonment up to five years and fines up to \$7,500 for an individual who interferes with the custody of children. Under the measure, an offense of custody interference would be committed if a person knowingly entices a child from a court-authorized residence. The measure would upgrade the penalty for a custody interference from an 18-month jail term to a maximum of 10 years and substantial fines.

• AT THE recent election, we endorsed four winners — thank goodness. George Bush is President-elect; Frank Lautenberg was re-elected to his United States Senate seat; Bob Roe was re-elected to the Congress by acclamation; and Sheriff Thomas D'Alessio won re-election, and in the process scored an overwhelming victory in his home town of Nutley. He set a county record by garnering 140,000 votes to his opponent's 60,000. In Nutley, D'Alessio received 7,402 votes as a Democrat, while Republican Presidential candidate Bush received 7,840 votes. D'Alessio ran against a formidable candidate, Newark Police Captain Charles Cefalu. D'Alessio deserved re-election. In fact, his battle against drugs merited election by acclamation.

Thanksgiving Day: More than "turkey and trimmings"

Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday in the United States commemorating the harvest of the Plymouth Colony in 1621. The event followed a winter of great hardship.

When it was first inaugurated, only a few eastern states participated. However, through the effort of Sarah Hale, a change was effected. She was fired with the determination of having the whole nation join together in setting apart a national day of giving thanks "unto Him from whom all blessings flow."

To this end, she resolutely engaged the press with an endless flow of letters and articles to the various newspapers and journals of her time. In addition, she pleaded long and earnestly with three Presidents: Fillmore, Pierce and Buchanan during the period of 1846 through 1856. A small measure of triumph was granted in the year of 1852, when her campaign succeeded in uniting 29 states in marking the last Thursday of November as "Thanksgiving Day."

Then came the dark days of the Civil War. Who would listen to a lone woman with her persistent plea for "just one day of peace amidst the blood and the strife?" One man did. Her entreaty won the ear of a great American; and in 1863 President Abraham Lincoln officially proclaimed the last Thursday of November as a day set apart for the national giving of thanks unto Almighty God. Lincoln lived to see only two such occasions, but Sarah Hale lived well on into her late 90's, content that her long-cherished hope had at last become a reality.

For the real meaning of the word, Thanksgiving, Christians look to one person, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Because of Him, Thanksgiving is more than a day with "turkey and trimmings." Because of Him, we cry out with praise and worship, "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift" (II Cor. 9:15).

Thanksgiving Day owes much to the love, grace and mercy of Him who gave Himself on Calvary. He gave up heaven for earth. He gave Himself unto the hands of sinful men that He might give out His unfathomable love to all. He gave Himself for us, that there might be forgiveness for sin. He gave, and gave, and gave, and finally on the Cross He cried out, "It is finished" (John 19:30).

On this day of remembrance, do you know Him personally? His has been the "giving." Through repentance and faith in Christ's work on the Cross, you may become God's child and thereby be able to offer true thanks...giving. He is waiting for your word of thanks by your heartfelt confession, "God be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:13). Real Thanksgiving is to experience His salvation throughout all the days whatever be their substance or fortune. It is the person transformed by grace divine — who can be truly thankful.

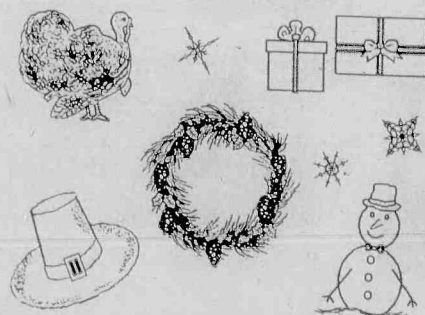

CLUB FOOT

There was once a time when a club foot was a lifelong handicap. Now, however, if club foot is detected at birth and treated, the child can expect to walk normally. The deformity will exhibit itself in a newborn infant as a turning inward and downward, or upward and outward, of the foot. Club foot is not to be confused with a normally-formed foot that persistently turns itself inward. Club foot is often an inherited defect that can be corrected with daily manipulation if it is present to a slight degree. Otherwise, manipulation must be augmented with either splints or casts to retain the foot in its proper position. In the severest cases, surgery is required to correct the deformity.

The key to success in the treatment of club foot is to catch the problem early. Podiatrists treat patients of all ages. 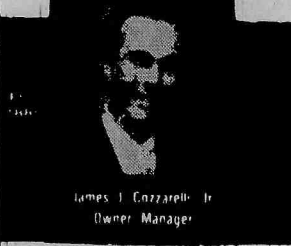

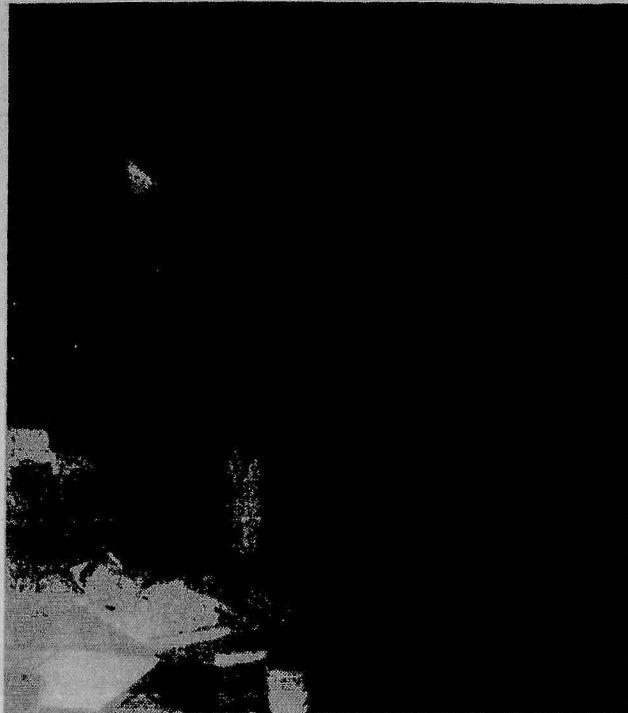

They survived the recall

25 Years Ago
November 14, 1963...Petitions calling for the recall of Mayor Robert M. Laterza, Deputy Mayor G. George Addonizio, and Councilman Vincent T. Strumolo were ruled insufficient by Town Clerk John R. Burnett. The victory for those three men, however was narrow and seemed temporary, as the For Recall Committee had ten days to resubmit a petition.

Volunteers from Clara Maass Memorial Hospital were busy preparing for the 20th annual Christmas Seal distribution for local residents. In the past, sheets of seals and literature were mailed to homes, but this year a new approach was tried. Small booklets, similar in size to books of regular postage stamps, were distributed, and they included the Christmas seals, air mail tags, history and facts about the hospital, and an order form to purchase more seals. The money from this program went towards purchasing new, more modern equipment for the hospital.

More than 10,000 area residents turned out to pay tribute to veterans and view the Veterans' Day Parade. An estimated 3,000 people

participated in the parade, marching down Washington Avenue. Grand Marshall James LaMotta extended special thanks to the Kiwanis Club, Lions Club, Colony Club, and American Legion for supplying the floats.

The BHS Bellboys beat the West Side Cowboys, 21-12, to improve their record to 5-2. The Cowboys scored on the opening drive, covering 66 yards with a blistering aerial attack. On Belleville's first possession, Joe Cervasio completed a 19 yard pass to Frank Raimo, as the bellboys took a 7-6 lead. West Side came as close as 14-12, but were no match for the powerful Bellboys. In the BHS sports news, the cross country team finished its season with 7-5 record, placing sixth among the 15 leading competitive schools in the area. The team's top runner, Richard Ziegler, had a very impressive season, shattering the school mark with a time of 11:32.

Two students attend drug-free conference

On Oct. 12, Belleville High School students Valerie Nesto and Danielle Pizzi attended Attorney General Cary Edwards' Student Press Conference on Drug-Free Schools. The senior girls were escorted by substitute teacher Nancy Nesto under the direction of Substance Abuse Coordinator, Deborah Meola, to the Hughes Justice Complex in Trenton.

The conference consisted of students and newspaper editors from schools throughout New Jersey, who were to report back to their schools with the information they received at the conference about the new drug laws.

Cary Edwards outlined New Jersey's new Drug-Free School Program, and explained how law enforcers throughout the state will enforce the state's tough new drug laws. To make schools drug-free, the Attorney General said that recently

police and school officials in New Jersey worked out a procedure and methods to aggressively and realistically enforce the state's new drug laws.

Special attention will be paid to school buildings and school property within the new drug-free school zones, which are areas that extend 1,000 feet in all directions from every elementary and secondary school in the state, he said. Within these zones, penalties for using or dealing illegal drugs are tougher than anywhere else in the state. For example, anyone convicted of selling or giving away drugs within a

drug-free school zone must go to jail.

"We want to help students learn how and why to say no to drugs," the Attorney General said. "Our goal is to create a generation of New Jerseyans who are free of drugs. To start working toward that goal, law enforcement is going to do everything in its power to rid our schools of all drug pushers and users."

One of the first steps toward drug-free schools is to teach young people about the laws and arm them with tools to fight against drugs. As an attempt to do this,

Governor Thomas H. Kean declared October a "Drug-Free School Month." Teachers in every school in New Jersey spoke to their students about the drug laws. Belleville High School teachers in all disciplines discussed substance abuse and the Student Government Organization supplied the entire staff and students with red ribbons to show support of drug-free school month.

Many schools have also hired substance awareness coordinators, who oversee student assistance programs. In Belleville High School, the coordinator is Deborah Meola.

The committee disbanded somewhat. Since that time, the group has re-formed because of the tax increases and overall performance of the commissioners.

"The feeling is we have nothing," he commented. "The big complaint is taxes are up while services are down. If we don't set a standard our children are going to have nothing."

"Who the hell wants to go there (commission meetings) and see them fighting amongst themselves. They should be fighting for the people," offered Joe Kovacs.

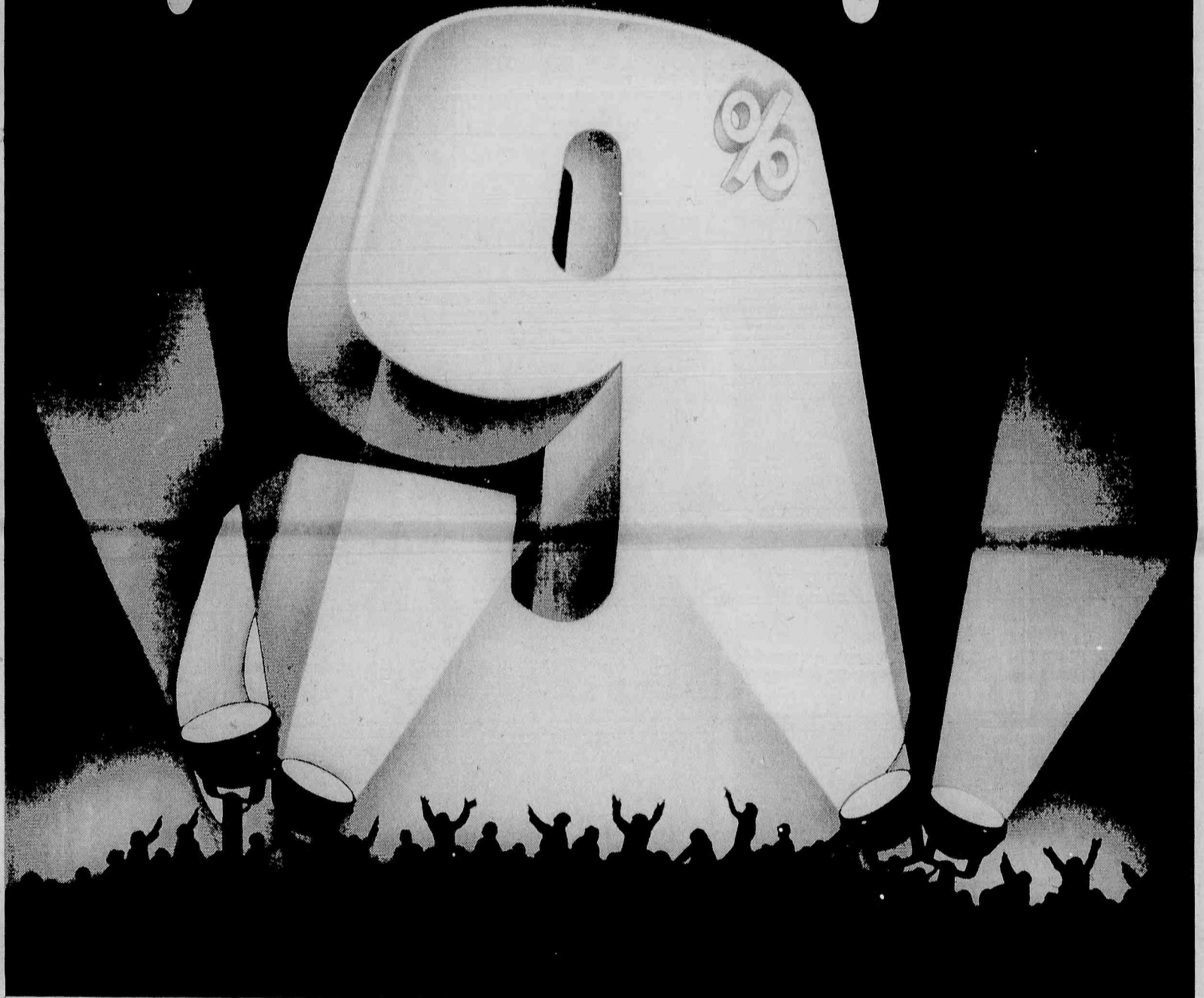
Because of those feelings, Drozd feels if the change reaches the voting stage there will be little problem in its passing, despite the fact over 8,000 votes, or twice the number of signatures, could be needed for approval.

"If they come out to vote like their signing its gonna be a landslide," predicted Drozd.

"Once the petition signing is accomplished people will come out of the woodwork," agreed Morgan. "What we're dealing with is a more efficient, more economical form (of government)."

HARD-TO-SWALLOW NEWS

It is not uncommon for a person to experience difficulty in swallowing a medication in capsule or tablet form. Anyone with this problem should talk to the pharmacist about it if it has escaped mention at the doctor's office. The pharmacist may be able to make a suggestion for changing the medicine to a more accessible form. Of course, a physician's permission must be sought if a prescription change is needed. There are some medications in tablet form which should not be crushed up to be mixed with water. To do so may affect their absorption rate, or may cause stomach irritation. On the other hand, if a tablet can be crushed up, the pharmacist may advise as to which liquid it should be mixed with.

It's part of the pharmacist's responsibility to place warnings and notices on the labels of medications. 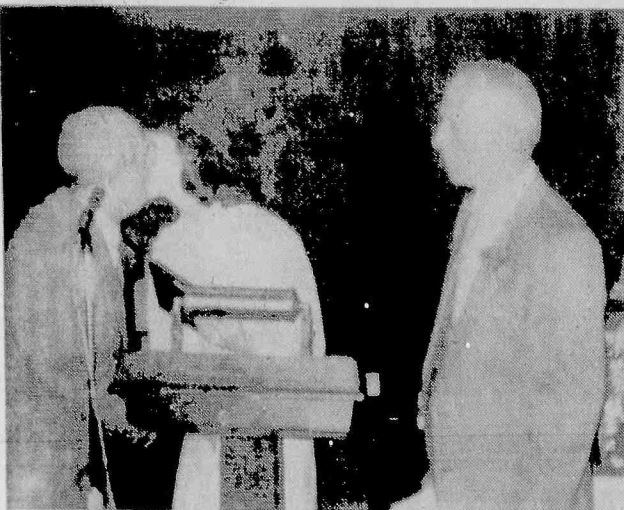

BUC SHOTS

Tomorrow evening, the Belleville Athletic Council will induct seven new athletes to the Belleville Hall of Fame. The dinner and ceremonies will be held at the Chandelier, commencing at 7:30 p.m.

This is always an exciting and moving evening. The families of the inductees certainly are excited about their son, daughter, brother, sister, husband or wife being inducted. The inductees themselves are usually quite moved by accepting the honor.

This year's inductees are Michael Tortorello, Craig Mack, Brian Woods, Ramiro Borja, James Corino, Angelo Santinelli and David Grant. The guest speaker will be a current Hall of Famer, Joe Cervasio.

Tortorello was an outstanding basketball player for Belleville High from 1945-47. He was the leading scorer for Belleville in the Essex County tournament and earned a spot in the first All Metropolitan All Star Game, which had players from New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Tortorello was named a starter in the game.

Tortorello was All State in 1947 and All Group IV in 1946-47. He and his wife Nancy have been married for 38 years. The couple has four children and two grandchildren. For the past 35 years, Tortorello has worked for in the construction business, where he currently is a vice president.

Mack played high school football at Belleville from 1980-82. He was named all area, all county and all state in his senior year, 1982. Mack was a standout linebacker at Belleville. He and another Hall of Famer, Phil Cerza, anchored an excellent defense in 1981. The Bucs were 7-2 that year and their only two losses were to undefeated, eventual state champs.

In 1982, Mack starred with Grant to lead Belleville to an 8-1 regular season and a berth in the state playoffs. Belleville lost a heartbreaker to Union, 12-7, in the '82 playoffs, but the year was certainly a tremendous success.

What many people might forget about Mack was his 1980 campaign. As a sophomore in '80, Mack was showing excellent progress. However, in early November, he went down with a very serious injury. He ruptured his spleen and was hospitalized for a number of weeks.

There was a good deal of concern about Mack's health. Before Belleville's game with Seton Hall Prep on November 8, 1980, the Bucs dedicated the contest to their ailing teammate. As most fans know, the Bucs came through with a resounding 34-8 triumph over Seton Hall. After the game, Frank Fazzini, who had scored three TD's in the game, mentioned the dedication to Craig on TV-3.

Mack came back with a good deal of hard work and dedication and will now take his place with the greats of Belleville athletics.

Woods, a 1982 graduate of BHS, was a superb soccer player. His coach, Tony De Aquino, spoke voluminously about his courage and heart on the soccer field throughout Woods' high school career.

Woods was captain of the team in 1980 and '81 and received a number of post season accolades during his varsity career. Among those accolades was All County, second team, all Group IV, Section II and second team, Group IV, all sections.

In college, Woods starred at Trenton State, earning Honorable Mention in his freshman year. In 1984, he was captain of the Trenton State team that advanced to the NCAA tournament. He played in the 1985 North-South All Star game and was voted the outstanding defensive player of the game.

Borja was an outstanding soccer player for Belleville in the late '70's who later advanced to the professional ranks.

He was named to a number of post season teams and was also the MVP of the North-South All Star game.

Borja played two seasons at Rutgers and was drafted by New England of the Professional American Soccer League. His career also includes seasons with Wichita, Memphis and Los Angeles of the AISA. He and Woods were teammates on the 1980 champion New Jersey Gunners team.

Jim Corino was a standout athlete for Belleville in the mid 1960's. He played basketball, football and baseball and was captain of the '65 varsity football team.

At Trenton State, he was named captain of the football team in 1969. He was an all conference quarterback and received the Claudius Hammond-Anthony D'Erico award. Corino also played golf his senior year at Trenton State.

Corino was an outstanding varsity basketball coach at Lyndhurst. He took over a program that had not seen a winner in two decades and turned it into a perennial state championship contender. He currently is the Principal at Lyndhurst High School.

Santinelli was co captain of the 1978 Belleville football team and was an outstanding wrestler. He was graduated in 1979.

The 1978 football team posted a 6-3 record, the finest at Belleville since the '69 squad that also finished 6-3. The '78 team was the catalyst for seven years of outstanding football teams at Belleville High. Their biggest win that season was a 31-0 victory over Nutley on the third week of the season. Belleville had not beaten Nutley in seven seasons and had not scored a touchdown against the Raiders in four years prior to that game.

Santinelli was a two way player for the Bucs in '78, playing center on offense and linebacker on defense.

Santinelli was also an excellent student. He was named recipient of the prestigious Brian Piccolo Award and received a number of other accolades in his senior year of high school.

On a light note, if you see Angelo, ask him about the '78 Belleville-Seton Hall Prep game. Also, if you're real nice to him, he might sing "My Way". Frank Sinatra, move over.

As for David Grant, what more can you say. He was an all state football player in high school, where he was graduated in 1983. David went on to a standout collegiate career at West Virginia University.

Today, Grant is a rookie defensive lineman with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL. I'll always remember him for the 1982 Belleville-Passaic classic, which Belleville won, 3-2.

It should be a very enjoyable evening at the Chandelier, as Belleville welcomes seven new inductees to its prestigious Hall of Fame.

Last tie in '77

Solid defense helps Bucs to 6-6 tie with Bloomfield

Paced by a strong defensive effort, the Belleville football team battled the Bengals of Bloomfield to a 6 all tie last Friday night at Foley Field.

With the result, Belleville's season record now stands at 2-5-1. It was the first tie for the Bucs, ever. The last time a Belleville football team was tied in a varsity contest was in 1977 when the team was known as the Bellboys. In that '77 game, also the eighth game of the year, Belleville and Kearny finished in a 14-14 deadlock.

The Bucs will conclude the '88 campaign on Thanksgiving morning when it faces an awesome squad from Nutley in an 11 a.m. kickoff from Municipal Stadium. There will be more on the famed Belleville-Nutley rivalry in next week's issue.

Head coach John Senesky was pleased with the result, even though it wasn't a victory.

"Our defense turned in a very good game," Senesky said. "We (the coaches) were impressed with Bloomfield. They have turned around their program and played a very tough game. They caught us by surprise early in the game by using (Jermain) Johnson at quarterback. He runs the option and it threw us off guard."

Johnson, a sophomore, has outstanding speed and appears to be the Bengal quarterback of the future. Despite the surprise in the Bengal game plan, Belleville's defense appeared ready for the challenge.

Led by Tom Wolfe, Jason Silletti, Michael Toro, John Cerza, Vito D'Alessio, Rui Andre, Paul Auriemma and Bruce Melson, the Belleville defense didn't allow Bloomfield to cross the Buccaneers 40 yard line in the first half.

The Belleville offense was also stymied for most of the first half, although quarterback Steve Tice did find wide receiver Ken Sainz for 35 yards on two receptions in the half. The half ended scoreless.

Early in the second half, Belleville began to move on offense. Mov-

ing from its 25 after receiving the second half kickoff, the Bucs moved quickly downfield. The big play in the drive was a 57 yard run by senior John Napolitano. His run moved the ball from the Belleville 34 to the Bengal 9, giving the Bucs a first and goal.

Tice just missed Melson in the end zone with a pass, but came back on the following play to hit Sainz for the first TD of the evening. Sainz made a nice grab of the throw, taking it away from the Bengal defender.

The point after conversion was wide and the Bucs led, 6-0.

Bloomfield had turned to its talented senior quarterback Lorenzo Sozio late in the first half. Sozio began to open the air waves for the Bengals, but the Belleville defense continued to deny the big play.

Bloomfield's only score of the evening also came in the third quarter, but it was the Bengal defense that did the job. Steve Jardim intercepted a Tice pass and ran untouched into the end zone for the tying score. On the point after attempt, Buccaneer Jason Silletti broke through the line and blocked the kick. This was a big play, because Bloomfield's kicker,

Mike Albanese, is one of the better booters in the conference.

The fourth quarter presented some anxious moments for both teams. Belleville could not mount a serious offensive drive in the final frame and had to rely on its defense to keep the tie in tact.

It wasn't easy. On two different times in the fourth quarter, Bloomfield had the ball inside the Belleville 25 yard line. The Bucs stopped the first drive when Wolfe stripped the ball from a Bengal receiver and Auriemma recovered the fumble on the Belleville 22.

Belleville got a break later in the quarter when Tice appeared to fumble on an attempted shovel pass. Bloomfield recovered deep in Belleville territory, but the officials ruled Tice's arm was in a throwing motion and called the play an incomplete pass.

On the second drive, in the last minute of the game, Bloomfield drove to the Belleville 15, where it had a third and five. The Bengals decided to attempt a field goal and Belleville called time out.

Sometime during the time out, the Bengals opted to run another play before trying the field goal. This was a costly measure, because Bloomfield was out of time outs and there was just :14 left in the game.

Sozio rolled out and completed his pass to Dan Gentles, but Gentles couldn't get out of bounds. As the clock rolled down to :00, the Bengals frantically attempted a field goal, which was blocked as the final gun sounded. Bloomfield was offside on the play, which would have negated the kick should it

have been good.

The tie moved Bloomfield's season record to 3-4-1. The Bengals will attempt to finish the season at .500 when they play Clifton at home on Thanksgiving morning.

As for Belleville, the focus is now on Nutley. The Raiders won again last Saturday and moved its season mark to 7-0-1. Nutley is slated to play Linden High School this Saturday in the first round of the Group III, Section II playoffs.

"I wish them luck in their playoff game," Senesky said. "They have just an outstanding team, maybe the best I've ever seen at Nutley. They just keep coming at you. We'll need an excellent effort in order to beat them."

NOTES: This will be the Raiders first playoff appearance since 1983. Nutley lost to Union in the first round of the Group IV, Section II playoffs that year. The Raiders only blemish thus far this season was a 14-14 tie with Montclair on opening day. The last time Belleville and Bloomfield finished in a tie was 1972, when the teams battled to a scoreless deadlock in a rainstorm at Foley Field.

No injuries to report, thankfully. Andre Graham continues to rebound from an ankle injury incurred during the victory against Don Bosco. Senesky praised the play of Michael Toro on the defensive line.

"He has been doing an excellent job, especially with Andre hurting." In the Group IV, Section II playoffs, Union and Montclair are back in, again. Joining them are Elizabeth and Morris Knolls.

Paramus Catholic ends BHS volleyball season

For the second straight season, the Belleville volleyball team was eliminated in the state tournament by Paramus Catholic. The Lady Paladins defeated the Bucs in three tense games and advanced to the state semi finals.

For Belleville, the season ends with a very impressive 19-5 record. Next week, we'll wrap up the '88 campaign for coach Grace Worley and Company.

The disappointment was quite evident in Worley's voice, but the coach gave praise to her team for an outstanding effort in the match. The final score was 15-12, 17-19 and 13-15.

"It was a long match," she said. "I think it lasted about two hours. Our kids played very hard, I'm very proud of their effort. It had to be one of the best matches we've played all year, even though we lost. We were in it all the way, and we had our chances. These kids have nothing to be ashamed of."

Belleville won the first set and had a number of chances to take the match in two sets. The second set went into overtime before P.C. won 19-17.

"We had the shots, we just couldn't get them at the key moments," Worley said. "We had a few concentration lapses, but once again, the effort was just excellent.

Both teams played tremendously."

The coach also gave additional credit to her three seniors. Simone Edwards, Laurie Dondarski and Kathy Eng were all exceptional in the match.

"Simone and Kathy were just tremendous at the net. Laurie was a marvelous setter all year long. Our younger kids got a good deal of varsity experience and they should be in good shape for next year.

Grant to enter Hall

David Grant, one of seven inductees into the Belleville Hall of Fame this weekend, has established himself as one of the premier football players in West Virginia University history and is now a member of the National Football League's Cincinnati Bengals.

Grant completed his standout career with the Mountaineers last season and was a fourth-round draft choice of the Central Division Bengals. Prior to that, he was named Second Team All-State and First Team All-County while playing at Belleville. He also played in the New Jersey North vs. South game.

The nose guard led all defensive linemen in tackles all four years

at West Virginia, earning Freshman All-America status from The Football News. He was All ECAC Division 1A in 1987, as well as winning the Mountaineer award, the highest award a West Virginia athlete can receive. This year he was honored by the Dapper Dan Club.

Grant ranks third on the Mountaineer all-time list with 26 tackles for losses. He finished his collegiate career with 271 total tackles, 168 solo. The 6-4, 277 pounder was a model of consistency in his college career, with yearly tackle totals of 72 in 1984, 63 in '85, 68 in '86, and 78 in '87.

REAL ESTATE FORUM

Q: My home is currently on the market. I'm not very happy with the results my real estate agency has produced. The listing has expired and the new agency I called wants me to reduce the price. I've already reduced it \$20,000 from the original listing price. Now the house next door sold for \$5,000 less than my house is currently listed at. My house is nicer inside plus we have a garage. Other than that the houses are identical. How can it be that my house is still overpriced?

A.: The problem is not that your house is overpriced. The problem is there are not enough buyers to go around for the enormous amount of houses on the market. Most sellers today are faced with a situation of waiting for a special buyer or pricing their house under market value. The buyers have many choices and they are shopping price.

Q: We are a newlywed couple and would prefer to buy a small condo rather than pay \$700 or \$800 per month rent. We don't have a large downpayment but we feel we could put 10% on a \$100,000 condo. Our problem then would be closing costs which I was told could be as much as \$5,000 on this priced home. We both have decent jobs and earn about \$45,000 per year total. Do you have a suggestion?

A.: Yes, several. Your decision is correct. Buy, don't rent. Especially in this market, prices are very negotiable and many sellers are highly motivated, more so in the condo market. Ask the owner to pay the points, or closing costs, even if you have to add them to the purchase price. The difference to you is a few dollars a month over 30 years. Another way is to buy the points down by offering to pay a slightly higher interest rate to the bank or mortgage company. One other alternative is to put 5% down. You would probably qualify for a 95% loan and there are several lending institutions offering these.

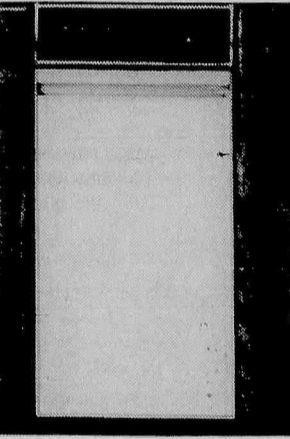

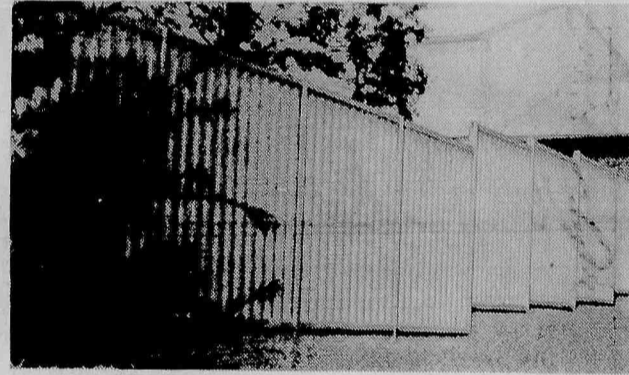

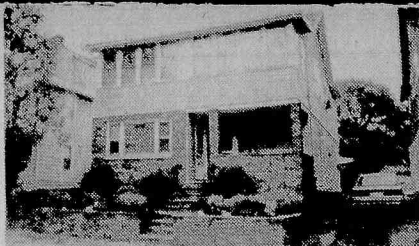

Cold draft near a window or door means you're losing expensive heat. Use weatherstripping or rolled cloth to seal the crack.

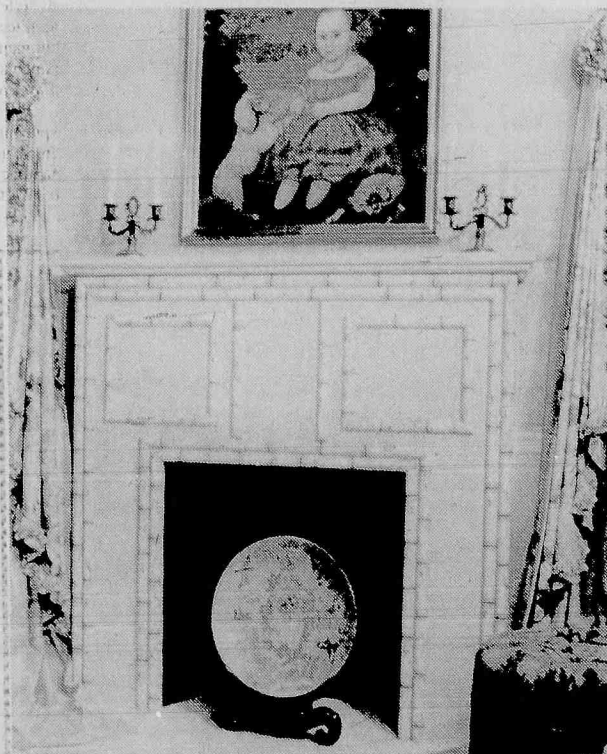

Brick and stone fireplaces require priming and painting with a specially-formulated paint for masonry. Masonry paint is alkaline and has high heat-resistant properties.

Wooden mantels should be primed and painted with interior latex paint. Priming may be eliminated if the surface has been previously painted. And as with all painting projects, begin by cleaning surface thoroughly.

Hardboard is wood converted to fibers that are permanently bonded together under heat and pressure into panel or lap form. These fibers use natural binders and are mixed with other additives to make hardboard tougher than natural wood.

Hardboard siding such as Colorlok, manufactured by Masonite Corporation, comes with a long lasting, factory applied finish in a variety of colors, and will not need repainting for many years. It has no knots or grain to check, split, or crack. Colorlok comes in lap or panel form; the 16-foot long laps are generally used in re-siding and are applied directly over the existing surface.

In addition to its virtually maintenance-free feature, prefinished hardboard siding offers other advantages to the homeowner.

A home becomes better insulated when hardboard siding is used. That means lower electric bills because a home sided with a hardboard remains cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter.

Hardboard also acts as a good insulator against noises because of its high density. In addition, it is not likely to be dented by hail, thrown baseballs, hammer blows or banging ladders. Nor are there any of the creaking and groaning noises associated with metal sidings.

And since hardboard is not a conductor of electricity, a homeowner will not need to be concerned with grounding or interference with television reception.

While hardboard is easy to install and does not require special tools, it is best to employ a professional contractor to re-side a home. Re-siding a home can be quite an undertaking when the area to be covered, length of panels to be handled and other construction work are considered.
