# Volunteers find satisfaction helping at Clara Maass

"Love, friendship and satisfaction are what I receive from volunteering. I enjoy giving something back, it's well spent," explained Marie Vandwerzwan, president of Clara Maass Auxiliary and hospital volunteer

Clara Maass Medical Center Volunteer Department is seeking men and women to volunteer their time with the reward of learning skills in the health care industry.

More than 40 assignments at the hospital are filled by volunteers. Among these tasks are patient feeding, errands and conversation.

"The patients accept the volunteers extremely well. Volunteers come here to give something back and to enrich a patient's stay. They effectively fill-in the doctors and nurses' care because of the staff's busy schedule," said Marlene French, director of the hospital's volunteer department for 10

French estimated the extensive volunteer network to have as many as 400 participants in areas as diverse as new-born picture taking to clerical support for hospital offices.

'Some volunteers stay with the program for 35 years or more. Some come seeking college credits, others seek a career change. There are even some who are unemployed who choose not to waste their time meaninglessly, so they volunteer," said

Volunteers work within, as well as outside the hospital anywhere from two to 40 hours a week. Ideal candidates should have previous experience in a health care setting, or have cared for a family member or other patient at their bedside. Applicants having no previous experience are also accepted.

"Our volunteers range in age from 14- to 90 years-old and must complete an application and go on an interview. Once accepted, participants receive orientation on policies of the hospital, go through an immunization check, receive further training on their specific duties, then receive a uniform," added French.

"The volunteers come from all over. The assignments they receive are evenly distributed between patient care and other duties. They are expected to commit to at least 60 to 100 hours of service in order to receive a recommendation," continued French. "Most volunteers serve their time coming in for two to four hours a few times a week, anywhere from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.'

Nutley resident Aida Caro has volunteered at the hospital for two and a half years. She has gotten so involved with her work that she now acts as the second vice president of Clara Maass Auxiliary.

"My aunt got me involved after her time of service. She got a lot out of it, so I looked into it. I'm glad I did," said Caro. Caro often spends time at the reception desk greeting visitors and answering telephone inquiries, as well as helping out in the volunteer office. One of her favorite jobs is delivering knitted baby hats to mothers for their new-borns to wear.

"I found myself with time on my hands and wanted to be part of something, this was it," said Caro.

'The job requires a feeling and dedication to other people which can be manifested in different ways," said volunteer Marie Vanderzwan. The Belleville resident is a self-admitted "jack of all trades," after serving 10 hours a week for seven years.

"Something was missing in my life, this fulfilled it," said Vanderzwan. "If you think you don't have a skill, you'll be surprised."

"When I receive an application, I ask the prospective volunteer 'Do you want to work with patients or do you want to work in another part of the hospital?' "said French. "People generally fall into one of the two areas."

"After spending time as a volunteer, two things become evident. First, the comfort level of volunteers of being in the hospital increases. Second, as statistics indicate, those that volunteer tend to live longer lives," explained French.

The volunteer program also welcomes organizations that have service projects as part of their activities.

The Knitters Program provides clothes fashioned by members for patients and infants in the hospital and nursing homes.

Friendly Visitors is a group that provides conversation, food shopping and telephone reassurance for eldery home-bound patients.

"We work closely with service groups from all over. This includes episodic volunteers on short-term bases. One organization I particularly admire is from Temple Ner Tamid in Bloomfield. Their Jewish volunteers give Christian workers in the hospital a chance for a break around Christmas, especially Christmas Eve. They

# Give credit where credit is due

Common courtesy has been making a return to Belleville politics, a welcome change from the Marina Perna years. Most of the credit goes to Mayor Jim Messina, who has been tops in his handling of public discussions.

But while Messina has tried to bring respect back to Belleville politics, there are others who have failed to

There's no surprise the rudeness originates from the Belleville Republican Organization of Joe Scaperrotta, Angie Paserchia, Tom Fuscaldo and that perennialdefendant Richard Yanuzzi.

This splinter group has adopted the tactics of constant campaigning, self-promotion and stealing credit from other people who actually achieve things

Case in point is the recent approval of bonds to fund the installation of amber safety lights near three Belleville

The Home and School Association at School 8 originated this idea and Phyllis Frantantoni wrote Police Chief Ray Kimble in January about the problem. She also lobbied the Board of Education and Township Council to get

Paserchia, during a recent council meeting, began to take credit for the safety lights, but was publicly silenced by Frantantoni, who correctly pointed out Paserchia had

Paserchia later wrote a letter to the county about the lights, and had it read during a public meeting as if to appear to have something to do with the safety improvements. In fact, Paserchia did not have one supportive comment to make about the lights until she jumped in to

Changes at the Board of Education to toughen residency requirements is the second example. This was the fruit after years of effort by several private citizens.

Frank Montagna was one of these citizens, and is a board trustee today because voters rewarded his efforts. True, Fuscaldo deserves credit as well.

Enter Scaperrotta. The residency committee he started for the council is nothing but pure grandstanding. The Board of Education did not know anything about Scaperrotta's committee and, if the councilman perhaps would take more of an interest in making sure code enforcement and building inspection is actually done, he would perform a real service.

The third example is the tennis courts. Scaperrotta's recent 2nd Ward newsletter would make you think he and Barbara Ciccalese did this all by themselves. Fuscaldo wrote an article that mentioned no others.

This is an insult to other trustees who were on the buildings and grounds committee. Misrepresenting himself again, Scaperrotta had zero, zilch, nada to do with getting the courts repaired. He merely attended a board meeting after all was said and done to take credit.

How about the hockey rink that Gerald Digori, Victor Canning and company resurrected. Where was Scaperrotta? Sitting on his brains waiting to take credit for their work. Oh yes, he also takes credit for the painting of Municipal Stadium and hiring a new crossing guard.

Scaperrotta, Fuscaldo and Paserchia should be ashamed of themselves for this theft of reputation.

We give these three credit for their real achievements. They have successfully enriched Paserchia with two taxpayer-funded positions. They have so far successfully protected Yanuzzi from the many merchants who have had to go to court to recover money.

Enough is enough. Let's give credit where credit is due.

# SEC should do more investigation

The Securities and Exchange Commission has taken the welcome step to investigate the loan made by the Essex County Improvement Authority to the now-defunct Upsala College two years ago.

East Orange Councilwoman Carolyn Meecham wrote the state attorney general requesting an investigation after the ECIA got into the business of Upsala College's finan-

The ECIA issued bonds to help support the private institution just a short time before the college went belly-

That left the ECIA with a claim to the property, and

East Orange taxpayers with a big bill to pay.

Casual observers knew the institution was failing, so why did the ECIA risk taxpayer money on this?

We hope the SEC does not stop with this one bond issue. Plenty more needs to be examined. Why, for example, was a former Florio aide found guilty of taking kickbacks from a bank in a bond scheme, and yet the bank that paid the kickback has yet to be brought to court?

With water commissions, sewerage commissions, improvement authorities and utility authorities able to issue bonds almost at will, the taxpayer has been taken to

Perhaps a probe on a wider scale would uncover more irregularities. We hope this would not be true, but then this is New Jersey

Defenders of government regulation always raise the image of the elderly widow who will be thrown out on the street if this or that curtailment of freedom is eliminated.

In 39 years, I have yet to see an old woman on the street next to a pile of her furniture.

Limiting rent increases to 6 percent guarantees an annual increase of that

Landlords do not know what the coming year will bring. Perhaps an oil embargo that drives up fuel costs or a change in the neighborhood that makes his property more desirable.

These possibilities cause landlords to overcompensate by raising rents by the maximum allowed.

Conversely, rent control makes for artificially low rents over time. A landlady in North Arlington recently Bel View

complained that she has tenants who pay \$250 under rent control. Her other tenants pay more to make up the difference

That is not fair to the elderly widow who has recently rented an apartment after selling her house

### Good bye to my only hero

To the Editor

The "editor" was mine! My father, Russell Roemmele, has left me. Although it took much courage today, I have just put down this week's paper. I am filled with pride, joy and aching pain and sadness. I am so grateful to you and the towns of Bloomfield, Glen Ridge, Nutley and Belleville for making me realize that this loss was not only mine. I have watched for more than 20 years so many who have been impacted by the wonderful man whom I was blessed to call "Daddy." The tribute in your newspaper and throughout the past week at both the visitation and funeral have bolstered our family with strength to go on and with gratitude to God for the finest years we could have known as daughters, on, wife, brothers, sisters and friends of Russell Roemmele.

On my father's birthday, Oct. 6, I gave him a plaque I made with two picture - both were taken on Memorial Day 1995, when Dad spoke to a group of veterans about the Korean War. The pictures were surrounding a copy of the poem by Dylan Thomas, "Do not go gentle into that good night." Later I was to find out that he hung it next to his desk in the office

On the day my Father died, Oct. 26, his column "Our Town" was focused around this poem which the poet Thomas wrote to his father when he was dying. My father wrote, "No, I shall not go gentle into that good night. I shall, as Dylan Thomas said of his father, 'rage, rage against the dying of the light.' Yes, with fierce tears, I shall rage on against the slings and arrows of outrageous am told to quiet down, to relax. This is the last advice I heed. On the contrary, I shall go up the hill with my squad to that moment, that only moment brave when the corpsman puts the dog tag between my frozen lips. . . Thus, let this then be my epitaph, if someone cares that much to enscribe it on the marker when my rage is silenced. .

I never could have known that the simple plaque of a birthday gift would truly indeed be my father's epitaph. He did, like he promised, fight his way up the hill until the end. On his way to meet his Lord and Savior, he did rage against all obstacles, trials and tribulation. Until that end, he believed in the struggle and fight to overcome wrongs and corruption. But also below his rough demeanor, so many were touched by his selflessness, warmth and sincere love and courage. I never, in my 32 years, watched him do anything with selfish intent. I have never met another like him.

The last time I sent a letter to the editor, it was October 1989 on Dad's birth. day. My letter wished him a good britiday as well as a testimonial of my love for him to the town of Bloomfeid. As I was going through his desk a few days ago, I found on ten foliast uniter a mendoliter, that letter. I know the words, the lyrics to a popular hallad, became one off his favorites. I would like to quote those words again, as a way of thanking all of you who held a special place in Dail's heart, which would mean just about everyone since the love he had for his community was so real and me, and as a way of saying good bye to my one and only hero off a liffetime.

### Lorenzo returns from overseas deployment

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Angel L. Lorenzo, son of Inocencio B. and Juanita B. Lorenzo of Sycamore Drive, Belleville, has returned to Norfolk, Va., after completing a six-month overseas deployment aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Kearsarge, which included duty in the Adriatic Sea near Bosnia.

Lorenzo is one of more than 2,400 sailors and marines aboard the largedeck amphibious ship who completed the 15,000 mile voyage. Lorenzo's ship was the lead ship of the threeship USS Kearsarge Amphibious Ready Group which included the amphibious transport dock USS Nashville, the dock landing ship USS Pensacola and the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit.

While in the Adriatric Sea, Lorenzo and fellow crew members helped rescue Air Force Capt. Scott O'Grady, who had been shot down over Bosnia. Marine helicopters from Lorenzo's ship flew 87 miles across the Adriatic Sea into Bosnia to rescue the downed pilot. The Marine rescue team was only on the ground in Bosnia a few minutes when they picked up O'Grady and returned him to USS Kearsage. No one was injured, but the school children.

helicopters did received several hits from ground fire during the return flight. Overall, aircraft on Lorenzo's ship conducted more than 10,000 landings and takeoffs during the deployment.

Lorenzo also participated in several multinational exercises with forces from Albania, Germany, Greece, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain, Turkey and the United Kingdom. Operating off the coast of Sardinia, Lorenzo and fellow sailors and Marines participated in one of the largest amphibious landings since World War II. Equipped with a Marine landing force, helicopters, Harrier attack aircraft, high-speed assault hovercraft, armored vehicles and landing craft, the Kearsarge ARG provided area commanders with a wide-range of capabilities, which included the abilito evacuate civilians, rescue downed pilots, conduct reconnaissance and serve as the leading force in an amphibious landing.

While spending more than 130 days at sea, Lorenzo had an opportunity to visit France, Italy, Malta and Spain. During the port visits, sailors and marines volunteered their free time to renovate homes for the elderly and orphanages and work with local

### Voss returns after six-month deployment

Navy Seaman John A. Voss, son of Allan F. and Arlene M. Voss of Dewitt Avenue, Belleville, has returned to Mayport, Fla., from a sixmonth overseas deployment aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Hue City, which included duty in the Persian Gulf near Iraq and in the Adriatic Sea near Bosnia

Voss is one of 400 sailors aboard the ship who completed the 30,000 mile voyage. Voss' ship was part of the 11-ship USS Theodore Roosevelt Battle Group, which included jet fighters, attack aircraft, airborne early warning and electronic warfare aircraft, helicopters and ships and submarines armed with Tomahawk cruise

While in the Red Sea, Voss and fellow sailors provided anti-air protection and air surveillance for the aircraft from USS Theodore Roosevelt, which were patrolling the no-fly zone over Southern Iraq. Voss and fellow sailors also discovered a 50-foot long Egyptian luxury sailboat that was adrift, and returned it to Egypt naval authorities

After weeks in the Northern Red Sea, Voss traveled to the Persian Gulf, where the ship not only served as one of the aircraft carrier's main anti-air assets, but also was host to a reception for 250 diplomats and foreign military leaders.

Traveling back through the Suez Canal into the Mediterranean Sea, Voss and fellow crew members received orders to proceed to the Adriatic Sea. Operating near Bosnia, USS Hue City supported the ongoing efforts of NATO and U.N. forces by keeping track of all aircraft flying over the former Yugoslavian republic and the Adriatic Sea. Using its sophisticated air tracking radar, Voss' ship ensured no unauthorized aircraft flew near the multinational force in the

While on a routine patrol in the Adriatic Sea, one of the helicopters from Voss' ship rescued the pilot of a jet fighter that had crashed into the

Voss' ship is equipped with the same type of Tomahawk cruise missiles that were launched at Bosnian

Serb military targets in support of United Nations efforts by the guided missile cruiser USS Normandy. Armed with anti-aircraft and anti-ship missiles, Voss' ship is a formidable warship and can travel nearly 700 miles a day.

Spending 141 of 182 days at sea, Voss also visited France, Greece, Israel, Italy, Malta and the United Arab Emirates. In Naples, Italy, Sailors from Voss's ship volunteered their free time to build a playground at an orphanage and renovated a home for the elderly. While on the island of Malta, Voss' ship gave tours to more than 1,200 local citizens.

Voss' involvement in the deployment is an example of how U.S men and woman are serving in the Navy and Marine Corps around the world from the Persian Gulf and western Pacific Ocean to the Mediterranean Sea in support of U.S. iterests. These highly trained naval forces provide a unique forward presence and crisis-



# Martini questions use of HUD funds for trip

are firmiling Caribbean vacations for many public bousing residents across the country and amounced that a Congressional hearing has been called to investigate the matter

"May office has received documents which seem to indicate the flagrant use of traxpager dollars to fund a questionable convention being held by the National Penants Organization," said Martini.

"On Aug. 20, 1995, NTO held their annual convention in San Juan, Poerto Rico. NITO billed the convention as "a vacation that will be unforgettable!" The organization has further promoted that event by offering 'Casinos for Dads,' Excitic Shopping, Beauty Salon for complete pampering for Moms,' and 'Appetizing, savory, delicious foods for the family meals,' " said Martini.

"Incredibly, in a June 17, 1995, letter, Ed Moses, HUD deputy assistant secretury for community relations involvement, stated that the 'NTO Convention is an allowable training activity... for reimbursement under public housing funds, including but not limited to operating subsidy, Comprehensive Grant Program, TOP, or other HUD funds," said Martini.

"This is exactly the type of waste, fraud and abuse that sickens the American people. I do not believe the average American believes that his or her tax dollars should be funding an 'unforgettable vacation' for public housing recipients,"

amed that this convention may represent another example of a tasqueyer-funded lobbying effort. NTO's invitation letter states, 'we must assure that this theme is understood by Congress. Housing and education programs must not be cut to provide more money for prisons. Only we can do so by virtue off our history of advocacy." The packet also included a lobbying fact sheet which states, "Congress is threatening to repeal the Brooke amendment!" So not only are the American people providing a free island vacation, but the taxpayers picking up the tab for a blatant lobbyist training seminar," said Martini.

"As a member of the Human Resources and Intergovernmental Relations Subcommittee of the Government Reform and Oversight Committee, I have just been trild by Chairman Christopher Shays, R-Conn., that the subcommittee will use its full investigatory powers to examine this disturbing matter. The subcommittee has agreed to hold bearing on this issue Nov. 9," said Martini.



# County forms anti-bias project

Essex becomes first county to tackle hate crimes, prejudice

When Sabarah Sabin ran for the Board of Education in the South Orange-Maplewood school district, a late night telephone call she received during her campaign made a lasting

The 4 a.m. caller berated Sabin's daughter, then 18-years-old, with racial epithets and told her he was going to set the house on fire. The call created bysteria and fear in Sabin's household, and for many years Sabin could not recount the night without becoming emotional

Now, however, Sabin has overcome that fear and is able to tell her story without tears. She has turned a negative experience which tortured her and her family and now uses the experience in her fight against prejudice and racial hatred.

Promoting awareness and understanding between different races and cultures has become a "passion" for the Maplewood resident and has seen her become executive director of the state's Martin Luther King Jr. Commission and director of the Ready Foundation.

Sabin is now directing her work at the county level, having been named director of the Community and Human Relations Project by County Executive James Treffinger. In the

new position, Sabin will be responsible for coordinating efforts by county departments involved with investigating and handling bias incidents, developing training programs related to anti-violence and conflict resolution and creating programs which prevent bias incidents.

"This is a passion that I have," Sabin said, which started when her family was victimized in the bias incident. "This has to be successful. We certainly have to get along and respect each other.

Treffinger said he created the project because of the county's diverse racial and cultural population, probably one of the most diverse in the entire state. "This will address squarely the problems of bigotry and bias which still exist in our county and the United States," he said. "Bias on any level should be fought.'

According to statistics from the State Attorney General's Office, Essex County experienced a slight increase in the number of bias incidents reported from 1993 to 1994. There were 69 reported bias incidents

two years ago and 71 last year. No statistics for 1995 are available.

The creation of the \$11,000 position for Sabin is a step away from Treffinger's usual line of downsizing county government. With this project, the county executive said, the county can do something good instead of just being a drain on taxpayers' money. "County government can serve as a useful tool to bring all our communities together and celebrate our diversi-

ty," Treffinger said.
While many municipalities have human relations commissions or bias prevention programs, Essex County will gain recognition as the first county to start such an initiative.

"The fact this is the first county level effort should make Essex County residents proud," said Jeffrey Maas, executive director of the Anti-Defamation League.

"Bias and prejudice does exist in this county as it does nationwide. If we don't initiate messages to fight it, we do ourselves harm," said Edward Verner of the Newark-North Jersey Black Churchmen

Dave Malik of the MetroWest Jewish Federation, Angelo Gonzales of La Casa de Don Pedro and Father David Bosman of Seton Hall University were also present during the Nov. support for the project and Sabin.

Malik said the best way to find a solution to a problem is to talk about it. A Maplewood resident, Malik remembered the bias incident with Sabin and said by bringing it out into the open and discussing it, the community understood the implications and learned from it.

Since 1991, Sabin has been director of the Ready Foundation in Newark. which ran a mentoring program for children. Sabin said she hopes to implement a similar program for the county to "let children know they have a friend and an advocate."

# McNally beats Cedola for county clerk post

Irvington councilman wins by 12,000

Democrat Patrick McNally defeated Republican Phyllis Cedola in Tuesday's General Election to become the new Essex County Clerk.

McNally called his election an important unifying factor for the Democratic Party and signals the Democrats "are back."

"The Essex County Democratic Party is back," he told a crowd of supporters Tuesday night at Cryan's Beef and Ale in South Orange. "Stick a fork in the Republicans because they are done."

The Irvington councilman was referring to the unrest within the party which began floating to the surface two years ago when Senator Richard Codey and East Orange Mayor Cardell Cooper ran an insurgent campaign against a slate supported by Tom D'Alessio, who at the time was county executive and chairman of the County Democratic Committee.

The controversy grew last year when Tom Giblin, current committee chairman, battled Cooper throughout the summer to decide the primary election for executive. Their battle deepened the cracks in the party's unity and was one of the factors which allowed Republican Jim Treffinger to be elected as the county executive.

Giblin sought to make ammends with the Codey-Cooper faction by dumping Pat Drake from the party line because she was a staunch supporter of Giblin during his court battle with Cooper. Drake was replaced on the ticket with McNally.

McNally, who will begin his fiveyear term in January and is expected to resign from his seat on the Irvington Council, thanked Giblin for going 'with some new blood" and having "the courage to pick me."

"This shows the Democratic Party is back," McNally said. "I'm the beneficiary of the hard work put in by the party. This win is really about the Democratic Party."

McNally defeated Cedola by about 12,000 votes, 43,339 to 31,609, thanks to a large Democratic backing in the urban municipalities. Interestingly, according to unofficial results, Drake received one vote which originated in Nutley.

Early on, as West Essex and Northern Essex towns — heavily Republican in nature - called in results, it appeared Cedola was ahead. But the tides turned when the urban towns, such as East Orange, Irvington and Newark called in their results. With a dense population that is predominantly Democratic, McNally rose to

Two significant towns for McNally was his hometown of Irvington, to 448, and East Orange, which he took by a 5,299 to 600 margin.

Cedola, in her fourth bid for a public office, said she was "disappointed" in the results and blamed the poor organization of urban Republican committees to get Republicans in

those districts out to the polls.

Cedola experienced a rollercoaster ride of emotions with her campaign. After the primary, in which Drake lost to McNally, the Republican Party attempted to replace Cedola on the ticket with Drake. Cedola reaffirmed her commitment to obtain office and Drake ended up campaigning for her.

Cedola, however, caught some tough luck one week before Election Day, falling ill with bronchitis and being relegated to her home to get rest and stay in bed.

McNally campaigned on making the Clerk's Office more accessible and cost efficient. He said the first thing he will do is "get the show on the road," meaning he wants to schedule meetings in each of the municipalities in Essex and set up a mobile office. This will hopefully make the office more accessible for people who cannot make the trip to the Hall of Records in Newark and generate revenue for the county in the fees the office charges for services.

"I am looking forward to going down to the Clerk's Office and doing a professional job. That's what this job requires and that's what I'm going to do," he said. McNally added his comments were not directed at the job Drake did and he did not have anything negative to say about Drake.

# ECIA bonding to cover sale of Hilltop reduced by 10 percent

The bond the county took out with the Essex County Improvement Authority to bridge the gap in the 1995 budget and provide interim funding to complete the sale of Hilltop has been reduced by \$5.6 million, bringing the total bond amount to \$45

The reduction was proposed after estimates of how much money was needed to prepare the 365-acre Hilltop tract in West Essex for sale came in at a lower cost than anticipated. Part of the reduction came about because the ECIA lowered the amount in fees it was charging the

The county is using the money from the bond to provide revenue for the 1995 budget before the Hilltop is sold. The county, which wants to turn the site into a reservation, is banking on receiving \$32.5 million in Green

Acres money to repay the ECIA bond. During a press conference Friday afternoon, County Executive James

Director Tom Banker announced the reduction in the bond. Before it becomes final, the freeholder board and the ECIA board of commissioners must approve it, a formality according to the trio. The freeholders are expected to discuss the bond tonight and the ECIA board is expected to

The total amount of the bond was reduced "due to changed circumstances which allowed the changes," Treffinger said, adding he has been encouraged by negotiations with state leaders concerning Green Acres

The executive explained when the original \$50 million bond was introduced, the idea for a state reservation was in the planning stages. Now that the idea has progressed and some aspects have become more concrete, it was discovered less funding was needed, he said.

Of the change, a \$5 million reduction was made in the principal which was allocated to pay for interest,

lion was taken from the predisposition fund, which will pay for any cleanup or improvements before the property is sold. Should the site be turned into a reservation, very little improvements would need to be done.

Another \$655,000 reduction came as the ECIA slashed the fees it was charging the county to sell the bonds. The original \$100,000 annual administration fee, to be paid annually for the next three years, was reduced to \$60,000 per year; a one-time development fee of \$325,000 was eliminated and financing fees were cut from \$150,000 to \$65,000.

Banker said the initial figures were based on a "worst case scenario," but since the state appears ready to purchase the property as a park, less work needs to be done.

DiVincenzo said he appreciated the cooperation between the county and the ECIA and was glad for "any savings we can make for the taxpayers."

'The circumstances regarding this transaction have changed substantially since we developed our first agreement and it was necessary that we reassess and make changes," the freeholder president said.

Banker projected the bonds would be put on the market to be sold by the second week of December. He also said the ECIA has solicited proposals from 26 planners to evaluate the land. No proposals have been returned yet.

A survey and appraisal of the property are also underway.

# Cerebral Palsey Center seeks alumni for golden anniversary

Though 1996 is still two months away, the Cerebral Palsey Center of Essex and West Hudson, located within the Clara Maass Hospital complex in Belleville, is already preparing for the new year which will mark the center's golden anniversary.

The center has planned a year-long roster of activities and events to commemorate its 50 years of service to the handicapped residents of Essex County and the West Hudson communities of Kearny, Harrison, North Arlington and East Newark. The celebration kicks off Tuesday with a gala dinner and ball which will replace the center's usual annual meeting.

### Part One

The theme of the golden year is "Reflecting on the Past and Planning for the Future," which appropriately represents the progressive and inno vative philosophy which created and propells the center as well as the considerable journey the center has travelled developing from a small group meeting in the basement of a hospital to a facility which serves hundreds of clients.

"Every activity the center traditionally does will highlight the anniversary," said Executive Director Phyllis Burgess, who has been with the center for more than 40 years. "We're doing everything we normally would, but it will all emphasize the 50 years."

The staff is collecting photographs and memorabilia with which it plans to transform the hallways of the center into a gallery depicting its half-

century history, and the children are creating calendars that will be given to visitors of the center. Old photos will also be used for a commemorative ad journal the center will publish and distribute to guests at the ball.

The center's staff is also searching for past clients, patients and their families, staff and board members, volunteers, donors and other people who were once associated with the center to form an alumni group and remind them of the services available to them.

"We're looking for anyone who was ever associated with the center. We want to start an alumni group, but there also might be some needs they have that we can help them with,' Burgess said. "People come in and out of the center as their needs change. Sometimes five or 10 years later the phone will ring."

Burgess said many of the center's past clients may not be aware of the programs and services available that could assist them in their current phase of life, services which were not available at the time the client was part of the center. The center now has an extensive adult recreation program that, in addition to planning a full schedule of local activities, sponsors a travel club which runs day trips to concerts and museums, overnight weekend excursions within a two and one-half hour car ride away, and full vacations of a week or more to locations such as the Canadian Rockies and St. Augustine, Fla.

Several years ago, the center pur-

chased a private home adjacent to its Belleville location and is renovating it for use as a "shared living" facility to train clients to live independently. Burgess said clients will stay in the home with a supervisory couple, and be given one year to develop the skills necessary for independent living. The center also operates a housing program in a nearby apartment complex where six clients live primarily on their own in apartments, with supervisory staff available in an office in the complex to provide necessary assistance

The center has just completed a new group home in Bloomfield where clients not yet able to live in supervised apartments can learn and enjoy a more restricted experience with independent living, and is building a second group home in Belleville.

Other recent developments at the center have been the formation of a performing arts group which presents shows several times a year. In one of the more exciting aspects of the program, clients are being taught to play the flute and other musical instruments by a volunteer retired music Despite the disabled's high level of accomplishment in many fields, the motor skills required to play a musical instrument present a particularly daunting challenge, and one with which the disabled have a

"It's just wonderful to see handicapped people playing musical instruments," Burgess said.

Continued from Page B1) withhold Newark's property tax payment to the county because he was unsatisfied with the way county roads and parks were being maintained. Sara Bost, mayor of Irvington and freeholder, was set to join Rice. This move, in effect, would have Bost suing herself.

The fact is, that although conflicts of interest arise, dual office holding is legal in New Jersey. It may not be ethically correct and not in the best interest of the people those politicians represent, but it is

It also has been a common practice of the county executive, even those who came before Treffinger, to appoint county employees to various boards. This point was raised by several freeholders when Weingarten's appointment to the ECIA board came up, and it was

represented that it had been a policy of the freeholders to allow this.

What's interesting is that Treffinger is using the very tactics he refused to support when he was a freeholder. Two years ago, when the Essex County Utilities Authority was created, former County Executive Tom D'Alessio appointed former County Administrator Don Biase and former County Counsel Stephen Edelstein as commissioners to that board. Treffinger cast the sole vote against those appointments citing conflict of interest.

After pulling Weingarten's appointment from the agenda, Treffinger said his top aide would become a special advisor, and a new director of management and budget would be hired. As yet, no personnel changes have occurred. It would have been a sure bet that

Weingarten would be subjected to the wrath of county employees. He was the main architect of the no tax increase budget the county is working under and it is he who implemented many of the initiatives, such as layoffs and privatization.

Everyone needs a target at whom to direct their anger. But instead of projecting anger, voters and taxpayers should pressure their elected leaders to change the laws. Serving a community in an elected position is honorable, but that has been tarnished as more and more politicians make their living off the public

Weingarten, and many other dual office holders I'm sure, are honorable and hard-working. But there would be less skepticism and strife in politics if politicians were allowed to hold only one job in the public



### Americans spend more than \$2 billion on sinus/flu medicines ca Bascom, American Lung Associa-

Just because nasal and sinus congestion has you blowing your nose during the fall and winter months doesn't mean you have to blow your budget treating it. According to Towne-Oller & Associates, a New York-based subsidiary of Information resources, Americans spend more than \$2 billion each year on over-thecounter cough, cold, allergy and sinus

But over-the-courter doesn't have to mean over budget. By thinking ahead about the cost of relief, Americans can make the best decision for their noses and their pocket books.

To calculate the cost for a day of relief, consumers need to evaluate the cost-per-day, not the price on the box, since manufacturers package products in varying quantities. When searching for relief, take a careful look at a range of over-the-counter products to compare the number of tablets in a dose and how many doses are recommended within a 24-hour period.

For example, a package of eight Tavist-D tablets, a relative newcomer to the over-the-counter market, may cost \$3.28, while a package of Sudafed containing 24 tablets may cost \$3.93. At first glance, Tavist-D appears to be more expensive because it contains fewer tablets. But a comparison of the dosing recommendations reveals that you have to take fewer Tavist-D tablets to get the same relief - two Tavist tablets in 24 hours compared to eight Sudafed tablets.

'When it comes to buying relief for nasal and sinus congestion, it's dosing you should focus on," said Dr. Rebection volunteer. "Consumers may have to take a few more minutes to determine the over-the-counter medication's dosage cost, but it's worth it because they can save noticeable
