## Residents charged in connection with ring

A Clifton mailman, a Fort Lee insurance executive and a food vendor at Yankee Stadium and Citi Field participated in a Mafia-run sports gambling ring that handled more than \$1 million in illegal wagers each week, authorities charged last week.

A total of 34 people have been charged for their roles in the ring, 28 of whom were swept up during a series of raids across North Jersey and Westchester County that began April 28, Bergen County Prosecutor John L. Molinelli said. Detectives executed 20 search warrants that netted \$1.2 million, he said.

Among the accused, Belleville resident Gerald Napolitano, 60, an employee of La Pasteria in Summit, is charged with racketeering, promoting gambling and conspiracy to promote gambling. Belleville residents Robert Caprio, 53, and Vincent Marchello, 43, are both charged with promoting gambling and conspiracy to promote gambling

The ring was divided into separate bookmaking and money laundering operations, one led by "Blue John DeFroscia of

family, and the other headed by an alleged family associate, Thomas Conforti of Fairfield, Molinelli said. Both men ran a large network of bookies and passed part of the profits to the Genovese crime family hierarchy, he said.

The ring employed a system of code names and passwords for gamblers to place wagers on sporting events by calling telephone numbers or visiting Web sites, he said. The "wire room" that provided the betting lines and accepted the wagers was located in Costa Rica in an effort to keep the ring beyond the reach of American authorities, Molinelli said.

Bookies in the North Jersey area collected losses and paid winnings to the bettors, Molinelli said.

Molinelli said that DeFroscia, At least four others turned 48, and Conforti, 44, used middle men to insulate themselves from their bookies, hoping to escape detection by law enforcement. Michael Cirelli, 49, of Nutley served as Conforti's right-hand New Rochelle, N.Y., and

Belleville's Gerald "Jay" Napoli-tano, Molinelli said.

Weber, Napolitano and other ranking members would discretely exchange cash with co-conspirators in parking lots, bookstores and diners or on the street, Molinelli said. Investigators watched as Napolitano met with one of his bookies, or "agents," Louis Orangeo, 41, of Newark, several times in Clifton parking lots, the prosecutor said.

Orangeo, a carrier with the U.S. Postal Service, would meet with Napolitano in his mail truck along his Clifton route, passing an envelope through a window as though it was a piece of mail, Molinelli

Weber, who works for Aramark, the food vending giant, exchanged cash with members of the ring at both Yankee Stadium and Citi Field while detectives watched, Molinelli said.

"In one transaction he would sell a hotdog and a beer, and in the next transaction, he would be either paying out money to somebody who won or receiving money from someone who lost," Molinelli said.

Almost half of the \$1.2 million was seized from Weber, Molinelli said.

"That is not hot dog money; that's gambling money," Molinelli said.

Molinelli said there were no instances of extortion or violence in these operations, but he said bet-

tors could be in danger if they end up owing money to the bookies.

The Genovese family historically has been the most powerful and entrenched Mafia syndicate in North Jersey.

The investigation, dubbed "Operation Strike Out," began in September 2008 and initially focused on money laundering, Molinelli said.

Conforti was among 10 people indicted in 2003 on charges they operated an Atlantic City-to-Las Vegas sports betting ring that funneled thousands of dollars a day into the coffers of organized crime. That ring was connected to a North Jersey faction of the New York City-based Lucchese crime family. Conforti was described as a "co-leader" of the ring, where illegal bets were accepted over a network of toll-free telephone numbers

Conforti's attorney, Vincent Scoca, said his client maintains his innocence but declined to comment further.

Robert Walsh, 44, of Fort Lee was also nabbed in this latest raid.

In 2000, Walsh was among three reputed mob associates arrested on charges of trying to g peddle "cheesy" counterfeit art in a carefully orchestrated mob plot. He later pleaded guilty to the charges.

Authorities said DeFroscia works at Clark Printing and Graphics on Market Street in Saddle Brook. However, an employee.~ there said that DeFroscia didn't 8 work there.

We have to get all the information and we will make a decision as to what we are going to do," said DeFroscia's attorney, Richard Verde.

Orangeo has worked as a mail carrier in Clifton for "several years," said Todd Piasecki, supervisor at the post office on Paulison Avenue. Piasecki said he was shocked to hear of Orangeo's arrest, adding that, as far as he knew, Orangeo was still employed as a mail carrier.

Molinelli said that no bettors were arrested, but he said he hoped the sweep would send a message.

"There are a lot of bettors out there that tomorrow are going to read the paper ... and are going to say, 'You know, maybe I better really stop this," he said. "That's something that we always strive for?

## Sudden changes at Board of Ed meeting

With one interim superintendent's contract not extended and two principals changing addresses, Monday's school board meeting was full of drama and, unfortunately, unnecessary humiliation. Still, in the midst of all that, the future of the 2009-10 school budget was still being decided, and tough decisions remain.

First, Interim Superintendent Melindo Persi did not have to be retained by the school board. The seven members were elected to make such decisions. The way in which he learned that his tenure would end June 30 and not be extended until Oct. 1 was simply wrong.

Clearly, from the statements of Board President Joseph Longo, the four votes against Persi were unexpected by anyone outside of the four board members themselves. Persi deserved the opportunity to gracefully resign. Instead, he was humiliated, and Longo said he felt the move was made against him as well.

Former school board president William Villano had spoken earlier in the evening as he was honored for 12

vears of service. His words were never more appropriate when he urged board members to use tolerance in all that they do. Clearly, tolerance was absent in the treatment of Persi.

That was the low point of a meeting where the middle school principal, Carmine Guinta, was involuntary transferred, despite a series of pleas during the last two meetings that he be allowed to stay and continue to keep the middle school improving, as it did dramatically under his leadership. Persi is correct to say that a majority of the board is allowed to approve the recommendations of the school administration on personnel, but a lot of administrators and teachers were moved against their will, which can't be good for the morale of teachers and staff. Time will tell whether these moves pay off in higher test scores and higher student achievement.

Finally, the cuts proposed by the council to the defeated school budget appear on the surface to offer the best solution, not affecting school programs or firing teachers. It's not that simple. The surplus recommended by state education officials would be cut in half, and health insurance, utility and summer school allocations would all be cut. Insurance and utilities have already been set at the lowest allowable levels, according to some officials, and not offering summer schools imposes a burden on students and their families already dealing with academic problems.

So when the final decisions come down from the school board, it may turn out to be a compromise, which may be both necessary and fair. No one wants to see teachers or programs go, but the school board majority may feel there is no choice. Otherwise, the board can appeal the reduction to the county and let someone else decide. Whatever happens, it all became necessary because only 8.9 percent of registered voters voiced their opinions about the budget and the two school board seats. That may be the saddest cut of all.

#### TO THE EDITOR:

As a 52-year resident of Essex County and a one time applicant for a civil service position, I have first hand knowledge of the process, job requirements and hierarchical nature of civil service and what it has, in some ways, devolved into. The Passaic Valley Sewage Commission is a glaring example of waste and some have turned it into a political action commission. With board members equally appointed from both major political parties they collectively decide/award contracts to private contractors, vendors and suppliers that in some cases do what they used to do. Past accusations show a need to have more public notice and exposure.

Well connected to both party power brokers they, the board, wield their influence with that authority. Years ago, they came to the taxpayers with a plan to modernize the facility at a cost of tens of millions to the public that they said would improve antiquated systems and reduce the

overall work force. Since that time, they have expanded the work force substantially and continue to while job requirements reduce in scope. They, as a board, create positions to employ yet more while telling the public they are well managed.

As civil service workers, they enjoy 17 paid personal/sick days a year, have to be present for a 35-hour week, can qualify for up to five weeks vacation and can retire at age 55 with full pensions and medical benefits. Each day, a long procession of trucks leave the plant to disband to places unseen for the length of the day. Belleville is one of those destinations

You may see these yellow trucks sitting by the side of the road, or in a parking lot, or

behind a shopping center or bowling ally loaded with men reading papers and talking but certainly not working, waiting for 2:30 when they will return to the plant and call it a day, and you are paying for it. Day after day, year in and year out, and the list grows longer each year. If you do not have seniority and remain at the plant you may be required to work but do not complain about conditions or co-worker attitudes or there can be retribution by way of work detail. And if you did want to be heard where would you go?

There was talk a year or two ago about converting property on Joralemon Street into a track- again nothing more than air. It is clear that these dedicated athletes and their coaches are pretty much on their own, and will get little or nothing from the school or town. The baseball team has a world class field which is great, and there is talk of sinking hundreds of thousands of dollars more into the swamp of a football field, yet the track doesn't even have a high jump pit or a proper set of hurdles. This is truly a travesty and an embarrassment. Our older daughter, Ariel Peldunas, set the high jump mark 10 years ago (when there was actually a high jump pit that mysteriously disappeared), and it appears as if it will stand forever.

These athletes continue to take great pride in their sport. The successes they enjoy are achieved in no way because of the school

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board, but in spite of the Board of Education and the Township Council. They owe these boards absolutely nothing, and when they complete their high school careers, they can walk away knowing that they have made it purely on their own. We, as track parents are extremely proud of

each and every one of them and their dedicated coaches. They are truly the best that Belleville High School has to offer.

## °SCHOOLS Villano reflects back on four-decade career

For Belleville native Dennis Villano, 42 years as a teacher and administrator mean he has been Spart of the district schools for 54 years. From a student through all his different posts in education, he ≩ said his dreams all came true dur-¥ing his four-decade career. Villano's climb from student to

lano said he wanted to name all the people who touched his life during that time, but feared he would leave someone out. Still, he named a lot of fellow educators and students during a lengthy, exclusive interview with the Belleville Times.

The memories are all vivid for Villano

"I still remember the first year, in room 3 at the junior high school," he said. "I was a skinny, 145-pound kid. I looked younger than most of

from Belleville, went away for four successes. years, and was right back here. It was truly like coming home again."

In 14 years at the middle school, he started the freshman wrestling program, which he said was "extremely successful, and taught science at what was then called the junior high.

Ninth grade was then moved to the high school, and Villano taught all sciences there. Sports were a big part of his time in education, coaching not just wrestling but then rowing at the high school for 10 years, where some of his chilcation over nearly six decades, the high school kids. was truly fulfilled, Villano said, during his years as School No. 5 principal, since he went home to the school which Villano had educated

him so well all those years earlier. Before that, there was 17 and a half years teaching at the high school, a year and a half as vice principal and finally atwo years assistant superintendent.

As you might expect, Villano has more than his share of fond memories and often funny stories. At the middle school, he had so many animals, especially reptiles that included some seriously frightening snakes, which Villano used to great effect on a colleague.

"George Zanfini was deathly afraid of snakes, and I used to scare him - He thought I was crazy," Vil-lano said, laughing. "I would come after him with a snake wrapped around my arm."

One of his happier memories from the junior high days was the social gatherings at his friend and mentor, Ethel Williamson's house on Ralph Street. "It was more of a family party than a staff gathering," Villano said.

Seventh grade science trips along the Third River were fascinating for both he and his students, Villano recalled.

To imagine the unique cast of characters in the lunch room at the junior high, Villano said, "It was like (the television show) 'Cheers."

Another moment that drew both fear and laughing hysterics was when fellow science teacher Bruce Kemlitz collected all of the specimens for dissection, like frogs, put them on his lunch tray and proceeded to place a napkin on his shirt and pick up a knife and fork.

During the relaxing and fun times, there were the student/fac-ulty softball games, were Ed Berlienski was always pticher and Ralph Kobberger, the shortstop, was "Belleville's Johnny Bench," just an outstanding hitter.

As he and many of his colleagues moved to the high school, the science department was nothing short of outstanding, very close

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like a family, with outstanding colleagues like Vinny Harris, Bill Bakka and Bruce Kemlitz. They made things both "a lot of fun, and really tight" over 17 and a half years, Villano said.

Then there was the unique challenge of manning the vice principal's slot at the high school.

"I really enjoyed it, but it is one of the hardest jobs I ever had, maybe the hardest in the district? Villano said. "You earned your pay, as short order cook and fireman putting out fires all day?

Next, being principal at School No. 5, "That was going home again. To me I was given the privilege of being responsible for the building where I was so well educated," he said.

He mentioned the people that taught him and gave so much, including Williamson again, along with Bill Chapman and Archie Gallombardo. Of Williamson, he said, "I will always remember my prepositions" because of her dedication, Villano said.

Rose Natoli, his sixth grade teacher, was "like a second mothto him, he said. "We er' are still friends today."

As for his time as principal, Villano said all principals likely believe their teachers are the best, but the quality at No. 5 is special. "It's like there's something in the concrete, and the experienced staff and new teachers all work together. They made my life easy."

He said his secretary, Donna Giuliano was a great person to work with, and the parents are outstanding, making all school functions standing room only. There is even a "Father's Pride" group unique to the district, where dads can be just as involved as moms.

His only sad moment from No. 5 was the passing of longtime custodian Walt Jeffers, whom he called "a big brother" who kept one of the nicest buildings anywhere.

Finally, there was assistant superintendent, which Villano said put him in a unique position to work with his former colleagues including principals, all of whom are dedicated to the children of Belleville. 

## CRIME Police continue to seek graffiti suspect

Police still need residents' help if they are to track down, stop and arrest the graffiti suspect who tags downtown business with the name "Mook."

Belleville Police Capt. Mark Minichini said there have been no new leads in the past week on the suspect.

Minichini previously confirmed the defacing of more than 10 walls, storefronts and other areas of the Washington Avenue downtown business district, which were all hit by the graffiti.

He said that during the Easter break for the Newark schools is when the suspect struck, the week of April 13 through April 17.

Property maintenance and building inspectors from the township's Construction Code Department have credited the businesses "tagged" by the perpetrator with quick and thorough removal of the graffiti, something they are asked to do with some frequency.

Minichini said this graffiti stands

"It's not the usual tag," he said. "It look like a really uncommon

tag in the world of graffiti?" Minichini said there is no link that he knows of to any gang affiliations with the tag, but rather a lone perpetrator who struck quick-

ly at many downtown locations. "It's not unique for this to hap-pen," he said. "We are following up on all leads."

Minichini said without the public's help, the person responsible may not be found.

"It's very difficult to track these people down," he said.

Employees at two of the convenience stores on Washington Avenue that were hit both asked not to be identified but said that the graffiti happens frequently and costs the businesses valuable dollars for cleanup. The graffiti must be removed in a timely fashion or the business owners can be fined.

Minichini asked anyone with information about the possible identity of the "Mook" graffiti criminal to call the department at 973-450-3587.
