EARLY DAYS OF THE BOCA RATON
FIRE AND POLICE DEPARTMENT

With the incorporation of the Town of Boca Raton and the coming of the Mizner Boom, the town fathers found it necessary to formally provide for police and fire protection for their citizens. The following documents and letters illustrate some of the problems faced by a small town trying to maintain these services on a very limited budget. The budget, of course, became even more limited with the failure of the Mizner Development Company. The material for this issue of the SPANISH RIVER PAPERS came from the collection of the Boca Raton Historical Society.

Ordinance #19, Passed September 23, 1925

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN COMMISSION OF THE TOWN OF BOCA RATON, FLORIDA, APPOINTING A TOWN MARSHALL FIXING HIS TERM OF OFFICE AND FIXING COMPENSATION TO BE PAID.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COMMISSION OF THE TOWN OF BOCA RATON, FLORIDA:

Section 1. That Chas. Raulerson is hereby appointed Town Marshall for the town of Boca Raton, Florida, to serve in such capacity at the pleasure of the Town Commission.

Section 2. That said Town Marshall be paid the sum of One Hundred seventy-five (\$175.00) Dollars per month for policing the town according to the duties and powers conferred on him by the charter and ordinances of the town and under the direction of the Mayor.

Ordinance #72, passed August 13, 1928

FINANCE BY THE TOWN COMMISSION OF THE TOWN OF BOCA RATON,
 A, PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF A FIRE DEPARTMENT AND
 NG ITS JURISDICTION AND PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTAINANCE AND
 ZATION OF SAME.

on 1. That a department to be known and designated as the
 department be and hereby is created in the Town of Boca Raton,
 a.

on 2. The Fire Department shall consist of a Chief of Fire,
 appointed by the Town Commission and as many subordinate
 rs, firemen and employees as the Chief may deem necessary and
 , not to exceed twelve men, which said subordinate firemen
 ployees shall be volunteers appointed by the Chief of Fire
 t to confirmation by the Town Commission.

on 3. The said Fire Department shall organize and promulgate
 y-laws, rules and regulations as they deem fit and proper,
 ting their operations, provided always that they shall have
 ore drills, per month, as ordered by the Commission, which
 rills must be attended by every member of the department and
 he failure to attend every drill as herein provided said
 or members so failing shall be subject to be suspended or
 rged by the Chief and approved by the Commission, and shall

forfeit to this city one (1) month's salary as a fine for non-
 attendance, providing always that said party or parties failing
 to attend any drill or drills may be relieved of such fine or
 fines by rendering to the Chief of Fire a plausible excuse for non-
 attendance and shall be reinstated within the discretion of the
 Chief, approved by the Commission.

Section 4. The Fire Department shall have control of and manage-
 ment of all fires within the limits of the Town of Boca Raton and
 its officers shall have the power to prevent interfering in any
 way with the department or with any of its employees of the depart-
 ment in the performance of their duties.....

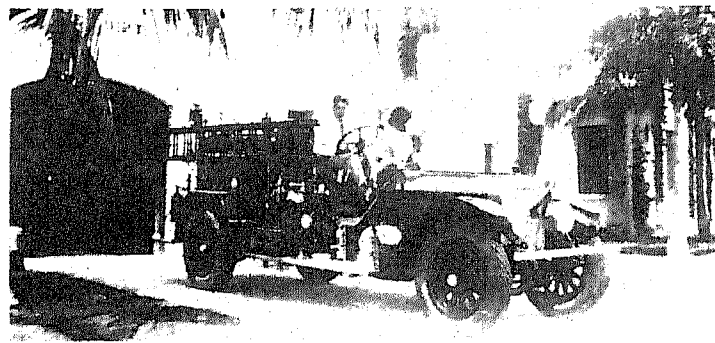
Section 16. The sum of \$700.00 is hereby appropriated to the fire
 department to cover necessary expenses of the said department.
 Said appropriation is to constitute a fund out of the general fund
 from which expenditures may be made within the department in the
 manner as provided in the charter of the Town of Boca Raton.

Section 17. In addition to the Chief of Fire, a driver shall be
 appointed by the Town Commission, whose duty it shall be to
 inspect the fire truck at least once a week and see that the
 engine is in A-1 running condition. Driver's compensation will be
 \$5.00 per month, in addition to pay for fires and drills.

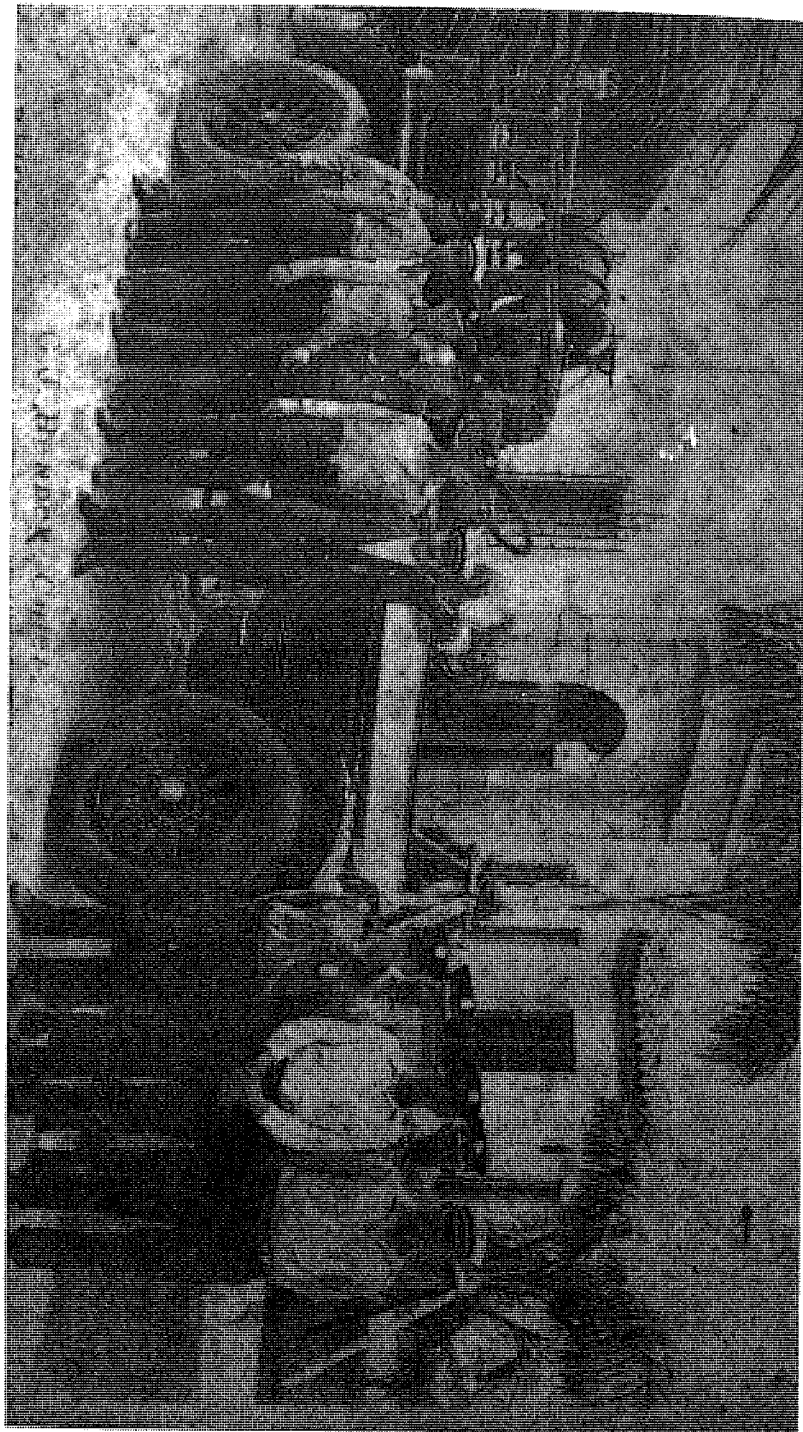
Section 18. The Chief of fire shall receive as compensation the
 sum of \$150.00 a year, payable monthly. Other employees shall be
 compensated according to the scale as follows:

- Assistant Chief \$8.00 per month.
- Firemen 4.00 per fire and
 \$2.00 each drill attended.

The Chief of Fire and Assistant shall be paid no other compensa-
 tion except in case of fire, then Chief and Assistant Chief shall be
 paid additional, on same scale as the firemen.....

We have received your check for \$1,000.00 and three (3) notes amounting to \$11,500.00 which we have credited to your account and for which we thank you.

Charles Kretschman to George Akins, Town Clerk, January 5, 1927

We are in receipt of your letter of the 28th requesting a 90 day extension on your note, (our No. 55-4) for \$2,833.34 which matured January 1, 1928 with accrued interest on that date of \$85.00, total, \$2,918.34.

We will grant the extension at this time with the understanding that we are to receive full payment of the renewal note on its maturity date April 1st.

At the same time, we wish to call your attention to your note for \$3,833.33 (our No. 55-2) which will mature on April 6, with accrued interest at 6% from April 6, 1926. Will you kindly advise us that the City is making provisions in its budget to take care of both of these notes at their maturity?

to Charles Kretschman

January 16, 1928 (sic)

We wish to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 11th inst., and an enclosing, herewith, our check, in the amount of Eighty Five (\$85.00) Dollars, which covers payment of interest due on our Note.

We would further advise that the Town has made provision in our budget to care for these notes, but, of course, as our main revenue is derived from taxes, it is a matter of how the taxes are levied, if we are able to meet our obligations. We are in need of funds, by April 6th, the date of maturity of these notes, to be taken care of by the Town, which will be due; if not the entire amount, at least a large portion of same.

We thank you for the extension of time which you have granted us.

Kretschman to City Treasurer

April 25, 1927

Your city note (Our #55-1) for \$3,833.34 dated Apr. 6, 1926, which matured with interest at 6% on Apr. 6, 1927, has been returned to us through our local bank unpaid.

Kindly advise us by return mail what provisions the city has made for the payment of this obligation.

to Charles Kutnkmer (sic)

May 5th, 1927

Your letter of the 25th Ult., acknowledged; in regards to the fact that the Town of Boca Raton owes your Company, wish to advise you that the Treasurer had not the funds on hand to take up this Note. It is thought possibly, that we might arrange, if agreeable with your Company, to give you Town of Boca Raton Improvement Indebtedness Notes, to be applied on this Note, also to take up the payment on the fire truck, which you also have Notes on.

If you have an Agent or Representative in this territory, we would be glad if you would request of him to call at the Town Hall, Boca Raton, and I will arrange, with the Commission, for a meeting to try and arrive at some agreement of payment, providing it is agreeable that you accept Bonds as payment.

Thank you for the courtesies you have made, in extending the time, and trusting that this letter will meet with your approval.

Les Kretschman to George Akins, May 27, 1927

We are holding note of the city of Boca Raton, Fla., for \$33,34 with interest on same amounting to \$230.#, total indebtedness as of April 6th being \$4,063.34.

In order to clean up this note and to put the matter on a negotiable basis, we make you the following offer: if you send us a settlement of \$2,063.34 we will accept renewal for the balance, amounting to \$2,000.#, and are sending you for this purpose, enclosed herewith, note dated April 6, 1927 for \$2,000.# carrying interest at 6% and running six months from date.

If you will have renewal note executed by the proper city officials and return to us with remittance of \$2,063.34, we will return to you the note for cancellation.

Further relative to Finances:-

We wrote you in this connection May 12th, as follows:-

Would thank you to send us a full statement concerning the bonds which you mention, so that we might be able to fully inform ourselves in connection therewith.

to P.O. Herbert, American-LaFrance, June 1st, 1927

Your letter of the 28th ult., received and in reply we forward following statement in connection with the General Improvement that we offered you to be applied against charges on the Fire Apparatus, purchased from your Company, by the Town of Boca Raton.

On May 1st, 1926, there was a General Improvement Bond Issue by the Town of Boca Raton, issued in the amount of \$500,000, \$1,000,000 in denominations. \$25,000. of this Issue appropriated to establish a Fire Department in the Town. Bonds are retired \$100,000. May 1st,

1936 and \$100,000. every five years until the full amount of Issue expires. These Bonds bear 6% interest, payable semi-annually May and November of each and every year and are guaranteed by the Town of Boca Raton.

Bonds are ready for delivery, being validated by the Circuit Court of Palm Beach County, also approved by Caldwell & Raymond, Bonding Attorneys of New York City.

Our charter provides that we must not sell any Bonds for less than 95% and accrued interest.

I believe this is sufficient to enlighten you, regarding the Bonds; if not, we would be glad to answer any questions which you may have in mind.

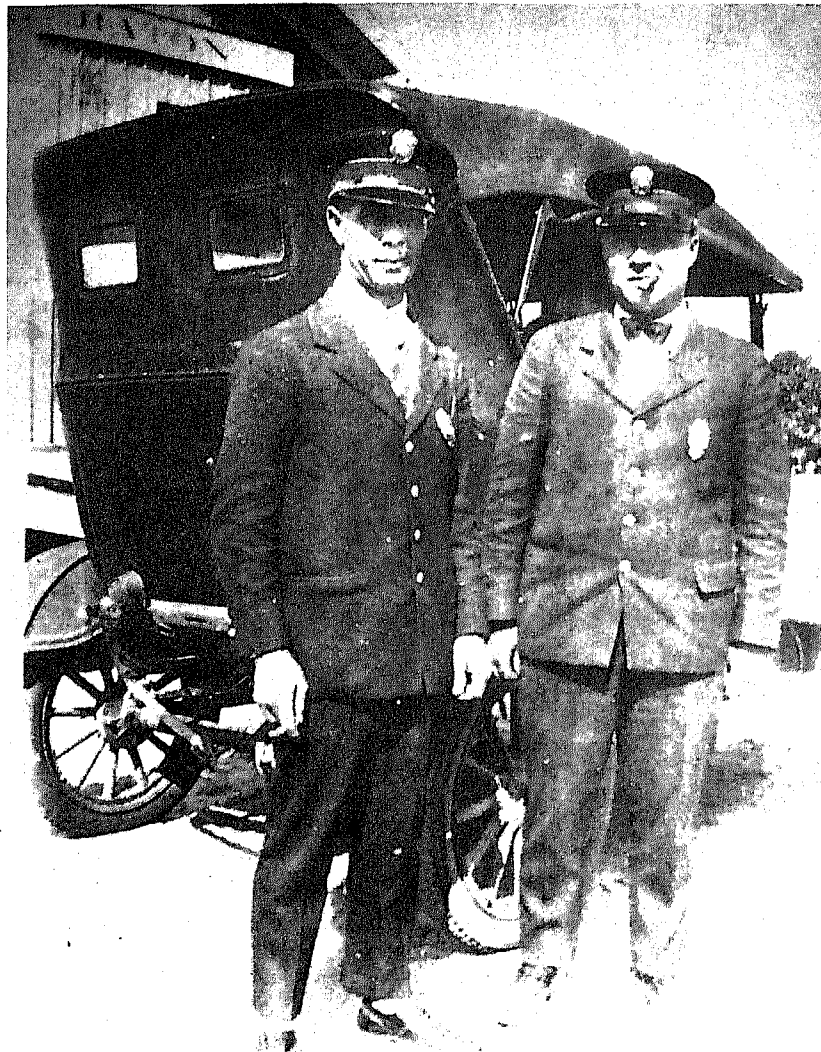

At a recent meeting it was decided by the Town Commission to the fire engine and all equipment in the future stored in the hall, at The Town Hall.

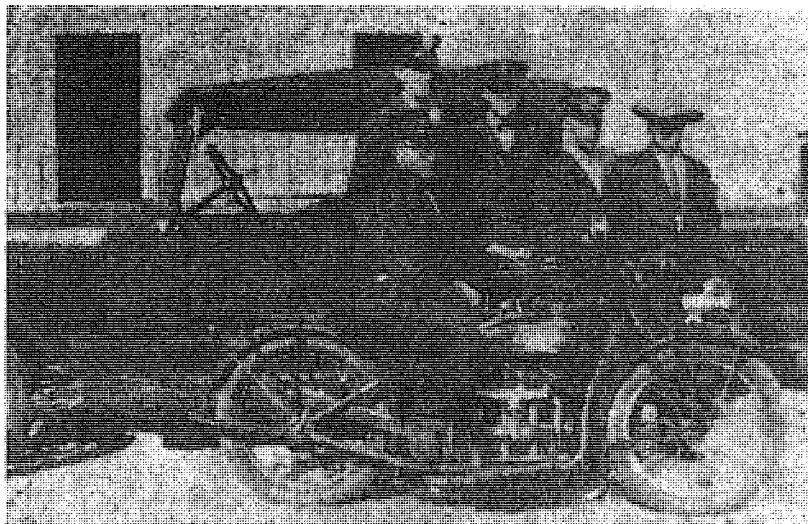

Mayor to Mr. I. L. Blackman, Chief of Police April 5, 1929

Dear Sir:
