Dennis Gokey Drowned In Middlesex Reservoir

The treacherous, forbidden, but unprotected waters of the Middlesex Water Co. reservoir claimed the life of Dennis Gokey, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Gokey, Saturday night.

Police report that the youth tried to swim across the 200 yard reservoir with three friends at about 7:30 p.m. Saturday when he suddenly grew tired and went under. It was further reported that William Fein, 14 of 126 Parkway Dr., swam to Gokey and grabbed him but that the youth slipped away and disappeared in about 20 feet of water.

According to police, Gokey, along with Fein, William Assell, 12, of 29 Yorktown Dr., and Patrick Canaghan, 12, of 191 Westfield Ave., had decided to swim across the reservoir.

Fein told police that he, Canaghan and Gokey had managed to swim about a quarter of the way across when they decided to turn back. Assell, ahead of the trio, swam on to the other side.

According to Fein, he and Canaghan were about six feet from Gokey when they heard him cry for help. Fein told police that when he swam to Gokey and grabbed him that Gokey slipped away and went under. Fein grabbed Gokey again, but the youth once again slipped away and disappeared. Both Fein and Canaghan then swam to shore and notified police.

Police Chief William Muth and Charles Grunder, public safety director with the aid of police, first aidmen and Fire Department personnel, dragged the lake for the boy's body. Scores of volunteers from neighboring communities along with scuba divers from Morris-town, Garwood, Jersey City and other communities worked through the night in their search for the boy.

Mayor William J. Maguire and members of the Township Council assisted in the dragging operations as did volunteers from neighboring first aid squads. State police scuba divers found the body about 25 feet off the foot of Bartell Pl. at 12:30 p.m. Sunday.

Funeral services for Dennis, a lifelong resident of Clark, and a communicant of St. John The Apostle



Church and an 8th grade student at Charles H. Brewer School, were held this morning from the Walter J. Johnson Funeral Home, followed by a High Mass of Requiem offered at St. John the Apostle Church. Interment followed in St. Gertrude Cemetery, Colonia.

The deceased is survived by his parents, Joseph and Helen Gokey, a sister, Patricia, a senior at Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary Gokey of Clark.

Clark Rallies Well To Power Failure

The massive electrical power failure of last Monday caused no major problems in Clark. Despite silent air conditioners, soaring temperatures, melting foods, and darkened stores, residents and businesses rallied well to the emergency.

The Police Department reported that the Fire Department was on the alert as soon as the power shutdown began at 10:20 a.m. Emergency electrical power was switched on at the Municipal Building, and radio transmission was not affected. Traffic at major intersections was handpatrolled during the rush hours.

Some plants and companies dependent on electricity for production or lights sent employees home when electricity was not immediately reinstated. The New Departure Hyatt Bearings Division of General Motors Corporation on Raritan Rd. lost a shift and a half because of the power failure. The first shift was sent home at 11:15 a.m. and the second shift did not report to work at all. About 2500 employees unexpectedly had this day off. The place was back in full operation on Tuesday morning.

Shop Rite Super Market on Central Ave. probably suffered the most by the power failure. Store Manager Marty Gilbert said that with the first loss of electricity, store personnel immediately took emergency procedures. Battery powered lights were turned on. Candles were lit throughout the store. Dry ice was packed into all the freezer units. Managers patrolled the aisles with flashlights, helping customers with their selections. Cashiers operated the cash registers with hand cranks.

Car Wash Question Still Unsettled

The controversial car wash question was discussed at the Board of Adjustment meeting last Monday, but no decision was reached. Alfred Prosperi is trying to obtain a variance from the Board to build a car wash on Central Ave. and Raritan Rd. The entrance to the car wash would be on School St., a residential block.

Residents of School Street came out full force to protest the car wash at the meeting. They were not represented by one of their objections to the business. They presented a petition with 84 signatures on it against the car wash.

William Fisher of Alden Realty countered with a petition in favor of the car wash. It had 40 signatures. He admitted that he had a financial interest in the business since he will be the real estate agent if the deal between Alfred Prosperi and the land owners goes through.

The real estate expert, who presented several charts, was Stanley Jay of Elizabeth.

At the conclusion of the testimony, the question was referred to the next executive meeting scheduled for July 6.

Council Rescinds One-Way Streets

The Municipal Council rescinded Monday night a two-week - old resolution establishing one - way streets in the Riverside area. It took action after residents presented a strongly - worded protest to Councilman-at-Large Bernard Yarusavage regarding the traffic flow.

The Council had originally made Sunset Drive, James Ave., Coldevin Road, Alice Lane, Peter Circle, and Alan Court one-way streets upon the recommendations of the Police Department and Second Ward Councilman Richard Burger. It has long been concerned with the traffic problems on the streets which have been due to the fact that the blocks are too long, the streets are too narrow, the area is heavily populated, street cleaning and snow removal is a problem, and emergency equipment has difficulty getting through.

Councilman Burger has been appointed to study the question and present his views to the Council. A possible solution may be parking ban on alternate sides.

Clark Church Cornerstone Laying Set

A service of cornerstone laying will be held on June 11, at 4 p.m. at the Zion Lutheran Church construction site at Raritan and Oak Ridge Roads, Clark. The community is cordially invited to attend.

The Rev. Joseph Kucharik, pastor, will speak on the theme, "Living Stones." Assisting the pastor in the ceremony will be Paul Miklas, chairman of the building committee, and Emil Mozolak, president of the congregation.

Ground was broken for the building last November, and completion is scheduled for the late Fall of this year. The church proper, of contemporary style with Gothic overtones, will seat 300. An administration unit will be located at the rear of the church with educational wings on both sides. A free-standing cross, rising 53 feet from the ground, will serve as the focal point for the complex of buildings. John F. Meyer, A. I. A., of Passaic is the architect. Leegwater, Riker & Wulster of Hackensack is the contractor.

During the period of construction, the Frank K. Hehny School is serving as a place of worship for the congregation, with temporary offices located at 165 Westfield Ave., Clark.

Victor J. Catano, President of the Municipal Council and Chairman of the Advisory Committee, stated that the financing of a Municipal Pool would be self-sustaining (by subscription); that it would be constructed by Bond issue; that it would have no effect on the Town's

finance system; and that it would not be reflected in the tax rate.

Residents who also would like to voice their opinions can pick up the questionnaire in the Township Clerk's office in the Municipal Building weekdays 9 to 4, or at the Police Station, after those hours.

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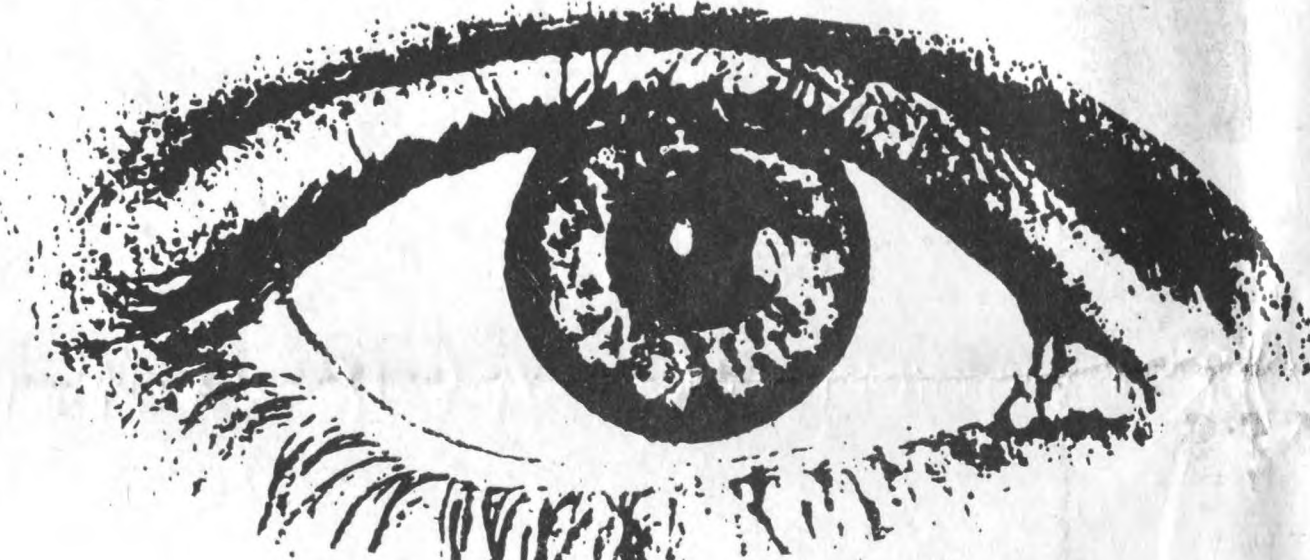

Miss McLaughlin Gets Citation For Research

Myrna McLaughlin, a member of the Rahway High School faculty has been cited by Michigan State University for "significant contribution to the improvement of vocational education" through her work as a research associate in an MSU pilot project in office education.

Myrna McLaughlin was awarded a "certificate of participation" by officials of MSU's College of Education and the university's Research and Development Program in Vocational - Technical Education, a large scale effort supported by a grant from the U.S. Office of Education and in cooperation with the New Jersey State Department of Education.

Rahway High School is one of 39 schools participating in the program's office education project. Its aim is to use the "block-time" approach to prepare persons for office occupations.

The program uses two and three consecutive class periods to provide instruction through a class simulating an office environment for high school seniors. It is an alternative to the traditional single-period approach to the teaching of office skills.

The "block-time" approach emphasizes three areas of instruction: normal

classroom instruction (typing and shorthand); laboratory experiences (use of office machines); and problem solving exercises (data processing, office organization and procedure, and human relations).

Leading the project are Dr. Peter G. Haines, professor of secondary education and curriculum, and John McBeth, occupational research specialist.

The Research and Development Program is Vocational - Technical Education at MSU is administered through the Department of Secondary Education and Curriculum with Dr. Haines as director.

Its work is centered in three broad areas: Program development through clinical school sites in Michigan and in Florida, Arizona, New Jersey and Washington; Vocational teacher education through clinical school systems, in which schools prepare personnel under the direction of experienced professionals; and Allied research and development activities, such as evaluation systems, workshops, conferences and seminars.

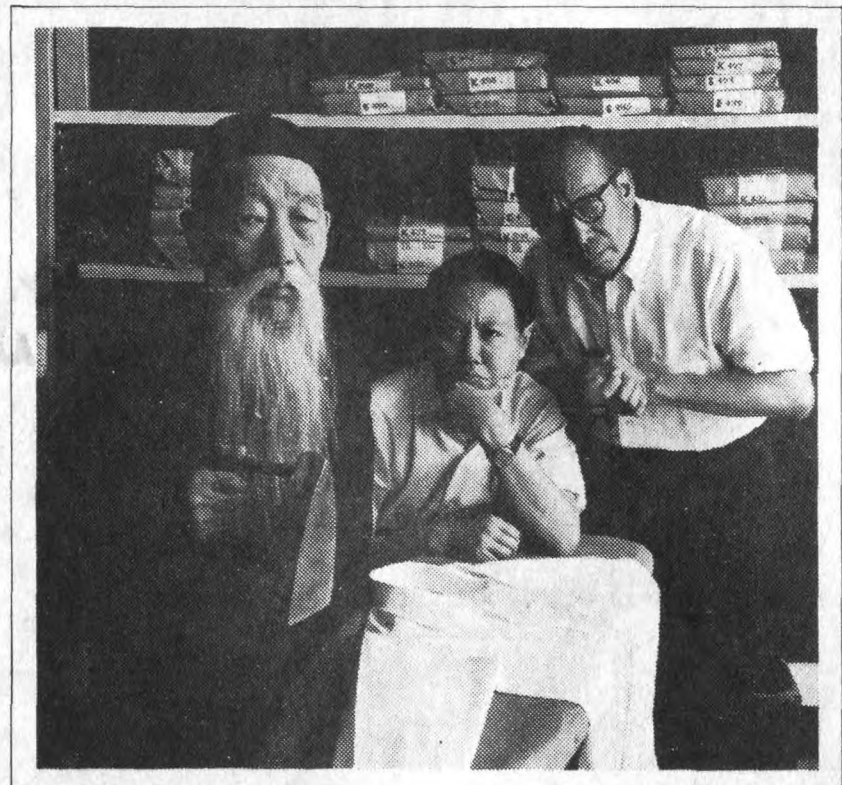

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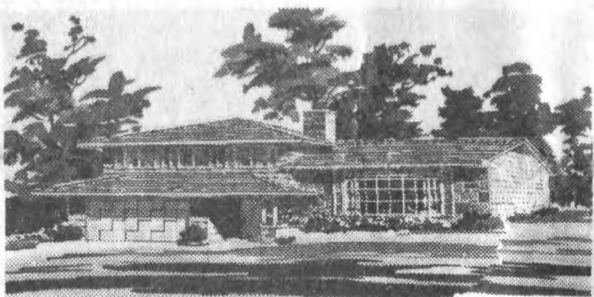

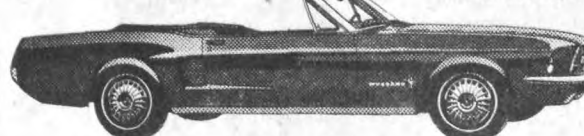
