Mayor William J. Maguire has set June 24, 1967, as "I AM AN AMERICAN DAY" in Clark.

"Let us wave the Flag high where everyone can see it and accompany the waving with words so strong no one can mistake their meaning," said Mayor Maguire.

"If being interested in the well-being of our country is considered 'waving the flag' then we need more standard bearers of the American way of life. We need more people and organizations to tell the story of America to our children and their children's children. It is only by instilling in the hearts and minds of every American a true sense of democracy that we can progress as a nation.

"All of Clark should commemorate June 24th and remember 191 years ago a small group of men laid their fortunes, their homes, their principles and their very lives on the line for our independence. It is this group of patriots that we pay homage to—their courage, their devotion to freedom, their willingness to sacrifice their lives to lead thirteen small individual colonies into battle with one of the world's great powers.

"This country has been engaged in a war since 1940—part of the time in a 'cold war' and the remainder of the time in a 'shooting war', including World War II, Korea and Viet Nam.

"This very day American boys are fighting and dying in a country several thousand miles from home. They hope they are protecting our American way of life. It is our duty to do everything possible to insure an early victory in Viet Nam and bring those boys home," Clark's chief executive emphasized.

"This is not a time for protests, but a time for harmony and stability.

"It is not a time to burn draft cards. It is a time to light a fire of unity within America that the rest of the world may see a truly unified front on this question of foreign policy," the Mayor said.

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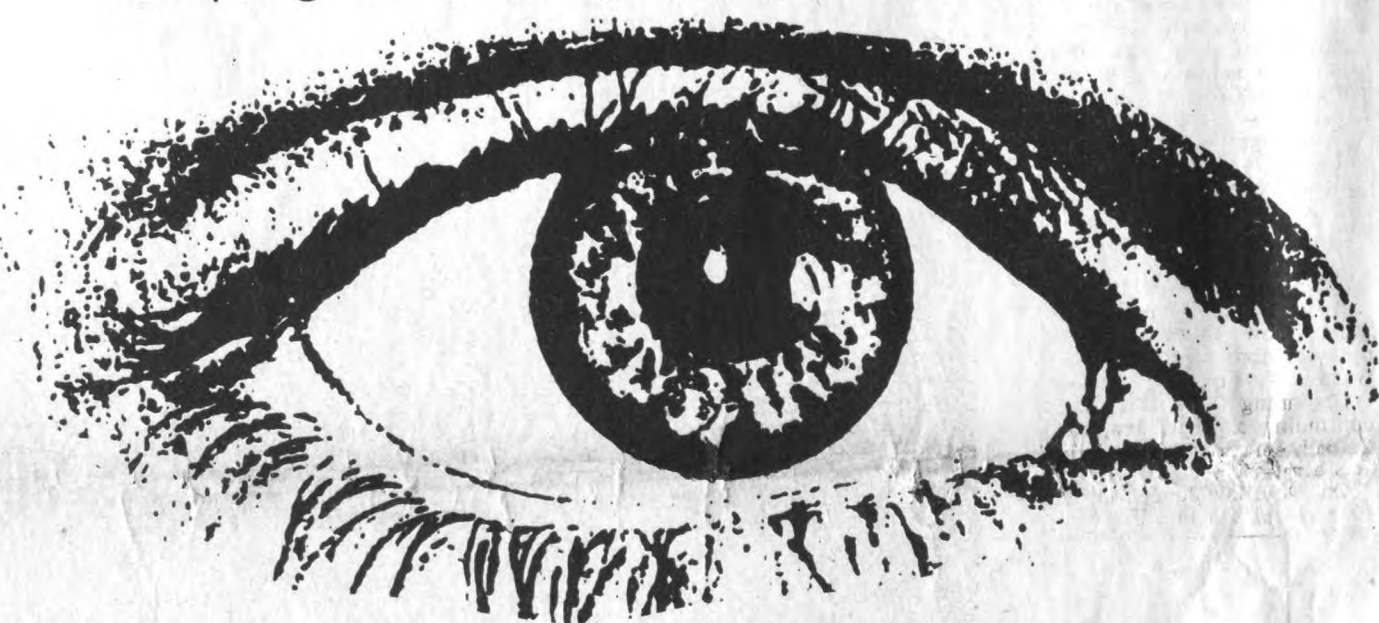
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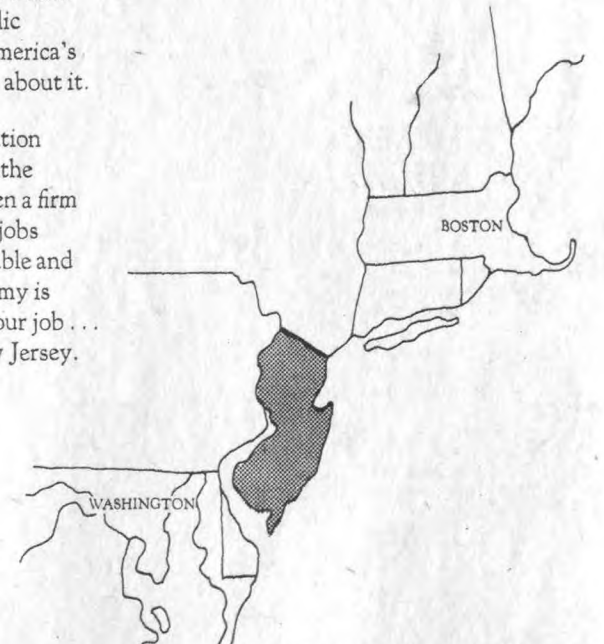

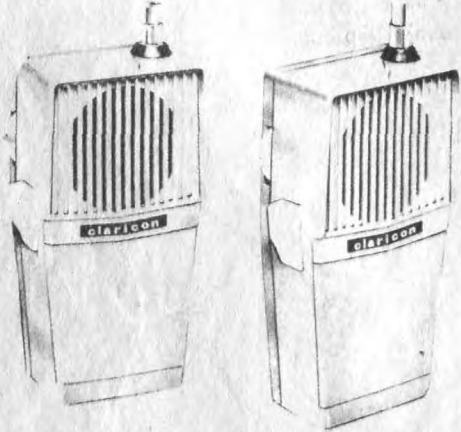
