Councilman Kaczmarek stated that "the beautification of certain areas of the fourth Ward will enhance the blocks of well-kept homes, beautiful lawns and residential atmosphere of the fourth Ward."

He felt that most of the property owners in the ward have taken pride in keeping their property clean and maintaining their homes attractively.

Harold K. Hatton of Clark, a local associate of the Garden State Agency of The Paul Revere Life Insurance Co., attended a three - day international sales conference June 19 - 21 at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

The major problems exist on vacant lots and in semi-public areas, he said.

As an example, Councilman Kaczmarek pointed out the Madison Hill Rd.-Westfield Avenue intersection now in the process of being widened and improved could be considered a "Gateway"

to the Fourth Ward and to Clark in general. A continuation of this improvement can only provide increased sales for the businesses located there, and in turn provide additional revenues to the Township. To complement this road improvement, Councilman Kaczmarek will encourage the landlords and

merchants in this vital area to organize in an effort to beautify their shopping area.

Councilman Kaczmarek said that his committee will survey the Fourth Ward to establish beautification goals and at the same time try to determine the program needed to achieve them.

A native of Jersey City, N. J., Mr. Manfredi holds a B. A. degree from Montclair State College. He assumed his present position in 1964.

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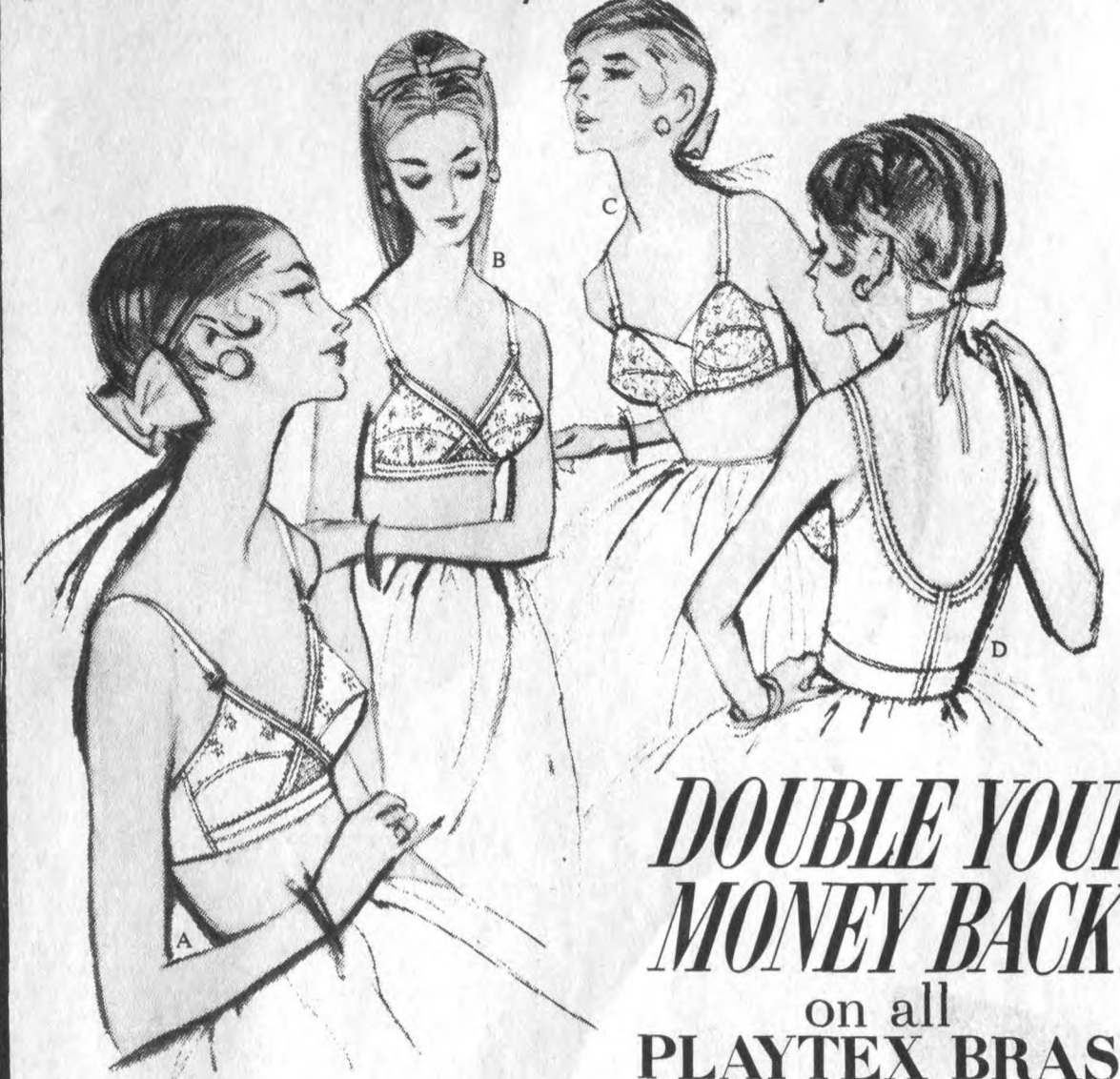
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
