Clark seemed to come through the past fear-filled weekend without too much trouble. "Not one" incident of trouble related to the riots in neighboring communities was reported in our town.

The Clark Police Department stood by all weekend, and is still on alert, to assist in bordering towns if needed, it was reported.

Although all bars, restaurants and business establishments were closed early Friday evening, no trouble was reported. Township bars and taverns were closed at 8 p.m. on Friday and Saturday nights and at midnight on Sunday -- but all was quiet. Many residents saw state troopers and national guardsmen travelling through Clark on Friday and Saturday and called the paper to see if any trouble was expected to break out, but Clark escaped the damages suffered in neighboring towns.

Monday's the night the township council meets -- at 8 p. m. in the Council Chambers in city hall. On hand to be voted on are "personnel policies" ordinance amendments to provide overtime pay for township policemen and the "bartenders" ordinance which requires that all persons who "tend bar" within the township be fingerprinted.

Be cautious with bats because they may carry rabies. Your life may be in danger.

The Clark Bureau of Health reports that the number of rabid bats in New Jersey has been increasing steadily -- and four bats with rabies have already been reported in New Jersey this year. So take care. Sometimes, family pets are bitten by a bat, children sometimes try to touch the bat, or an injured bat may be found in the house or street. If you do have to go near a bat -- take precautions. Use tongs or other instruments to get the bat into a jar or can -- seal it securely -- and notify your Clark Health Department at 381 - 6292.

## Oleg Jardetzky New Department Head At Merck

Oleg Jardetzky, M.D., Ph.D. of Skillman, N. J., formerly an assistant professor of pharmacology at Harvard Medical School and a Senior Fellow of the United States Public Health Service, has been named director of the newly - created Department of Biophysics and Pharmacology at Merck, Sharp and Dohme Research Laboratories in Rahway.

Dr. Jardetzky also is a consultant in pharmacology at Massachusetts General Hospital and consultant to the Council on Drugs of the American Medical Association; an advisory editor of the Journal of Theoretical Biology, and a member of the editorial boards of two other professional journals; Molecular Pharmacology and Cell Biology Communications. He is listed as author or co - author of 57 scientific papers and abstracts.

He is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Chemical Society, Biophysical Society, American Society for Phar-

macology and Experimental Therapeutics and Groupement Ampere, and a Fellow of the New York Academy of Science and the American College of Clinical Pharmacology and Chemotherapy. He is listed in American Men of Science and Leaders of American Science.

Dr. Jardetzky received his B. A. in Chemistry and Biology from Macalester College, St. Paul, Minnesota in 1950 and his M. D. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Minnesota in 1954 and 1956. He lives with his wife, the former Norma Wade, at the Alexander Hamilton House on Blawenburg Road in Skillman.

The Department of Biophysics and Pharmacology, which he will direct, was created "in recognition of the increasing insight into the biological properties of biodynamic substances in terms of physical chemical interactions," according to Dr. Lewis H. Sarett, vice president for basic research in the Research Laboratories division. Its function will be to develop deeper understanding of these interactions and thus to facilitate discovery of new therapeutic agents.

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## Playground Attendance Up In Clark

## Clark Public Library Circulation Is Up 31%

A 30.9% increase in circulation over the corresponding six month period of 1966 was reported this week by Edward A. Temkin, Director of the Clark Public Library.

During the period January through June, the library loaned 38,223 books, 468 magazines and 137 pamphlets, making the total circulation 38,828.

The records show that the adults increased their use of the library at a greater rate than the children with adult borrowing reaching the 20,573 figure and the children's borrowing accounting for 18,255 of the total. There has been a 13.4% increase in book collections during the period.

Since the first of January 2181 books were added. This brings the total book holdings to 18,359 volumes including 11,229 for adults and 7,130 for children.

## Social Security Benefits Changed

"Disability payments under social security are no longer limited to persons with 'permanent disabilities,'" Ralph W. Jones social security district manager reminded Union - Somerset County residents this week.

Monthly benefits can now be paid, Jones explained, if the insured worker is under a disability which has lasted, or can be expected to last, for 12 calendar months or longer.

For payment to be made, the worker's disability must be severe enough to prevent him from doing not just his regular work, but any substantial gainful work. A person's training, age, and work experience is considered in determining disability.

Jones added that generally a person must have 5 years of work under social security in the 10 years before his disability to qualify for benefits.

One event started in June which will make news in the months to come is the Summer Reading Program for children in grades 1 - 6.

To date, 185 enthusiastic children have signed up. Each one is eager to read five books to get his name on a card on the table top bulletin board; ten books for a bookmark; 15 books for a Certificate of Achievement; 20 books for a prize. The child reads his first ten books in areas of his own choosing. The second ten books are selected in consultation with the children's librarian.

The library was able to offer this Summer Reading program because of the appointment of Mrs. Margaret Shipley to the library staff. She has taken charge of the program and is developing it around the reading needs of children, it is reported by Mr. Temkin.

"Whether or not you are found eligible to receive disability insurance benefits," Jones said, "you may be offered help in improving your condition and in preparing for, and finding work." He explained that when a person files an application for social security disability benefits, the State Vocational Rehabilitation Agency is provided with the details of the case.

Jones urged disabled persons not now receiving disability benefits to get in touch with their local social security office if they have any questions or wish to file a claim.

Charles Cesa-retti, now vicar of Saint Andrew's will head the combined congregation. Services in the present Grace Church will be discontinued at the end of August and the church

property will be offered for sale.

For Grace Church, this is the second move in the 97-year history of the congregation. Memorials and movable property will be taken to the new location. Dr. Wood emphasized that the cooperation of the people in accepting the move will be essential to the financial success of the combined congregation. For Saint Andrew's, the merger will represent the first major reorganization since the mid 1950's, when that church changed its status from a parochial mission of Grace Church to a diocesan mission under the direction of the Rt. Rev. Alfred L. Banyard, bishop of the diocese.

The combined church may contain as many as one-fourth members from Rahway and Clark. Many of its elected officers, known as wardens and vestrymen, live in areas served by the News-Record and the Clark Patriot.

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## Heart Assn. Train Rescue Squadmen, Police, Firemen

The Union County Heart Association is conducting a training program in the techniques of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for ambulance and rescue squad members, police and firemen.

According to Dr. Harold Wasserman of Westfield, president of the Union County Heart Association, the association instituted the course in response to ever-increasing requests from these groups for such training.

The first class began June 20 at Overlook Hospital, Summer, for 35 members of the Summit First Aid Squad. Dr. Warren D. Nestler, director of medical education at Overlook, said the Westfield Rescue Squad and the Summit Police Department have expressed a strong interest in the course.

Four physicians under the direction of Dr. H. A. Leonard of Florham Park are giving the training. The Heart Association has donated teaching aides, manuals, films, slides and a life-size mannequin named "Resuscit-Ann."

The course is conducted in a series of three two-hour sessions. The first class consists of a lecture at the hospital. The next two classes are held at the first aid squad's headquarters with ten men assigned to each physician. Finally, each student receives a written and practical examination after which he is certified as qualified to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

The Union County Heart Association and the hospital are cooperating as part of a nationwide program to provide adequate on-the-spot treatment by paramedical personnel in the heart victim's race against the clock. The Ad Hoc Committee on Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation of the Division of Medical Science, National Academy of Sciences - National Research Council, has established standards for courses like the one being offered at Overlook.

"We follow the principles in support of the Heart Association," declared Dr. Nestler. "The vital consideration is that the patient who develops a cardiac arrest be treated at the scene. What we are actually doing is working from the hospital back to the home."

Dr. Wasserman noted that the funds raised during the Union County Heart Association's annual drive has enabled the association to help finance the program.

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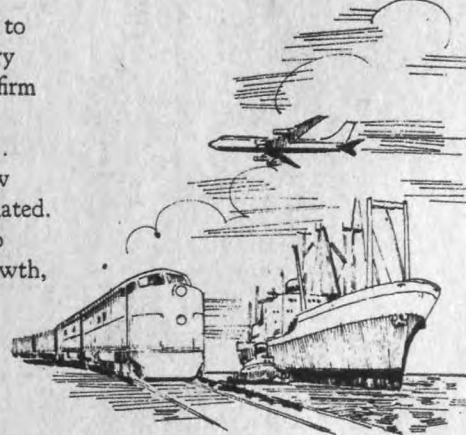

## Anderson Publishes Teacher's Manual For Use With Text On Human Behavior

Robert J. Anderson, 43A, Parkway Village, Cranford, a member of The Arthur L. Johnson school faculty has recently published a Teacher's Manual for use with Human Behavior, Shorter Edition, by Bernard Berelson and Gary Steiner (Harcourt, Brace, and World, Inc., N. Y., 1967). 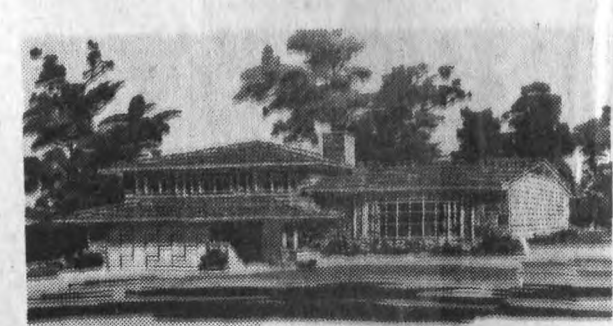

Ermo J. Truppa, former Rahway sports star and now at Monmouth College was in town on Sunday.

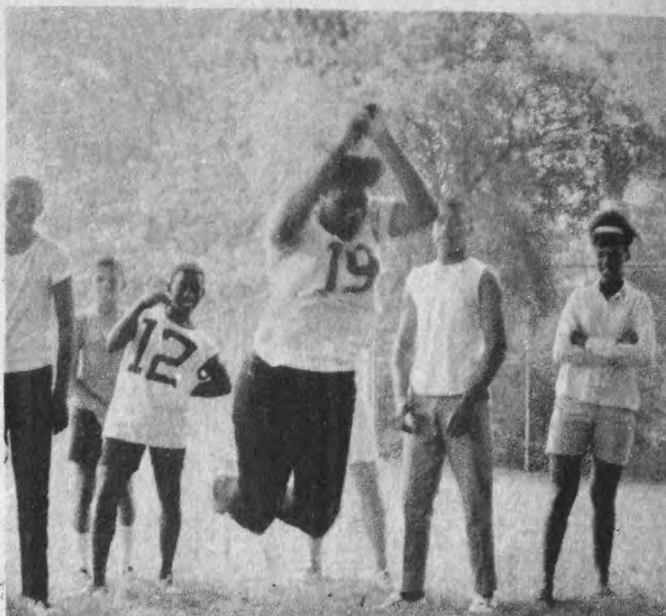
## Slow League Race Tight In Clark's

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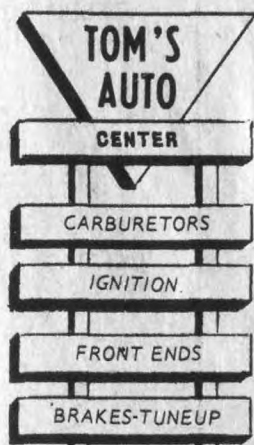
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
