## The Quill

Christmas is coming -- so we're setting an early deadline for news during Christmas week.

The offices of the "Rahway News-Record" "Clark Patriot" will close for Christmas on Thursday, Dec. 21 at 5 p.m. and for New Year's on Thursday, Dec. 28 at 5 p.m.

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It's Christmas -- so note the time and place change for the Clark Council meeting.

With the regularly scheduled meeting falling on Christmas Day, the Township Council will meet a week earlier this month.

The Council will convene at 8:30 p.m. (that's a half hour later than usual) on Monday, Dec. 18.

To be considered for final passage at that time is the township ethics code for public officials and employees. The ordinance covers all township elected or appointed officials and all employees and prohibits any public or private business transactions which affect their positions. It also prohibits any political activity or campaigning during business hours -- and calls a halt to any "gifts, gratuity, loans or service" from those who have an interest in township business.

It sounds like a good measure and should receive swift passage.

"Tis the season to be jolly . . ." -- the season for brightly decorated department stores -- the season for Christmas shopping -- and for pick-pockets.

At this time of year -- when so many people receive Christmas Club checks and holiday bonuses -- there's cash in many pockets and purses. Do be careful, though. This is the best time of year for pick-pockets -- and the stores and streets are filled with them right now. Crowds of shoppers make good victims -- many area residents have already reported thefts of cash from their wallets and pocketbooks.

So don't carry any more cash than you need to -- and be on the lookout for pick-pockets. There's one in every crowd.

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The current school busing bill has cost the people of Clark \$9,143, the Board of Education reports. The inconsistencies and overlapping of the burdensome bill should be corrected. Let's hope the Legislature "gets it" when sessions begin again after the New Year.

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Do you feel capable of planning for Clark's educational system? Do you have ideas about how our schools can best be operated? Are you willing to put in some good hard work on the school board?

Well, here's your chance!

Three, three-year posts on the Clark Board of Education will be filled by the voters in February.

Petitions for the posts must be filled by the end of this month. For more information -- and to get an insight into what the jobs are about -- why not give the Board Secretary, Ron Smith, a call at 381-6777.

## Residents Refuse Referendum

### Mrs. Purdy To Seek

#### Board of Education Post

Two of the three incumbents for Clark Board of Education posts have announced that they will not seek another term, but the third incumbent, Mrs. Thelma Purdy, has decided to run for the post again.

With the deadline for submitting petitions drawing near, residents interested in serving as Board members should contact the Board Secretary, Ron Smith, at 381-6777 for information. The three posts are each for terms of three years, each is elected in February, and each is an unsalaried position.

In an announcement to the "Clark Patriot" today, Mrs. Thelma Purdy of 27 Grand St., Clark, said that she would seek another term on the board.

Mrs. Purdy, the mother of three school-age children, is completing her first term.

She said that she is interested in the "total planning" of educational facilities for the township. With a teenage daughter in high school and two sons in grade school, she has an opportunity to observe Clark schools firsthand. Although Arthur L. Johnson is a regional high school and not under Clark's jurisdiction, the township educational system is still geared to fit in with the four-year high school program.

Mrs. Edith Leibowitz, of 25 Gibson Blvd., Clark, another incumbent, said that she will not seek another term. Mrs. Leibowitz is completing her second term and said that "I think six years is enough to give in serving on the board. New ideas are always good." Mrs. Leibowitz stressed the fact that Tuesday's defeat of the board referendum in no way influenced her decision. "It's just that six years is long enough to serve," she said. Manuel Dios, the third incumbent whose term is expiring, announced last week that he will not run for the board again.

By more than two-to-one the residents of Clark refused to accept a board of Education referendum on Tuesday which would have provided a new school on Mildred Terrace, an addition to the Frank K. Hehly School and other measures.

The measure was defeated in every district of every ward -- and in one district the vote against the proposal was almost 4 to 1. (That was the second district of the second ward where 198 residents voted against acceptance and 54 voted in favor.)

Board members were "notably shocked" at the strong voter surge against the proposal, which had been turned down by voters before and was re-submitted after changes were made. The total votes cast were 2,376 with 1,607 voting against and 769 voting in favor.

Mrs. Thelma Purdy, board member, said that she was "frankly amazed" that only 769 residents had voted in favor of the proposal. She said that the opposition to the referendum prior to the vote did not seem as strong as the turnout indicated. "People certainly have the right to vote 'no' on these measures," Mrs. Purdy said, "but they shouldn't vote a proposal like this down just to express dissatisfaction or because they have questions. Most people just didn't even ask about some of the questions I hear not."

The total ward by ward vote was:

FIRST WARD - First District - 161 in favor and 215 against; Second District - 168 approving and 208 disapproving; Third District - 116 for and 150 against.

SECOND WARD - First District - 28 in favor and 88 against; Second District - 51 yes and 198 no.

THIRD WARD - First District - 38 for and 143 against; Second District - 49 in favor and 187 opposing.

FOURTH WARD - First District - 60 yes and 200 no; Second District - 95 in favor and 217 against.





## GERMANY SAYS "FRÖHLICHE WEIHNACHTEN"



From Germany, where some of our own Christmas customs originated, comes the greeting, *Fröhliche Weihnachten* (Merry Christmas), and an invitation to Americans to visit Germany this holiday season.

Martin Luther, the 16th century German theologian, is believed to have been the first to decorate a Christmas tree, and today the Christmas tree is still as popular in Germany as it is in the U.S.

The custom of hanging Christmas stockings is also believed to have started in Germany. According to Lufthansa German Airlines, German children receive candy and cookies if they've been good, but Santa leaves only an empty potato sack for bad ones.

The Advent wreath—a large evergreen wreath hung on Advent Sunday—is another custom observed in many German homes. On the first Advent Sunday, a large red candle is fastened to the wreath and lighted. On each of the following Sundays, another red candle is placed on the wreath. The fifth candle is put at the center of the wreath on Christmas Eve.

On Christmas Eve everyone goes to church for a service of worship and song. After church, Mother sits down at the piano and plays *O Tannenbaum*; this is the signal for all to join hands and enter the parlor for singing around the tree.

Soon St. Nikolaus—Santa Claus—arrives dressed in a red coat and wearing a long white beard. He's usually the families' father or a friend who queries each child and traditionally distributes the gifts, after the children recite a poem or sing a short song.

But no matter how busy the Christmas season, Germans always find time to extend their famous hospitality to visitors from far and near. Many Americans, who travel to Germany swiftly and comfortably via Lufthansa, find that Christmas is an ideal time to combine pleasure and economy by taking advantage of off-season rates to enjoy the festivities there. And it's an excellent jumping off place for seeing other European countries, as well.

## Make Jolly Snowman Centerpiece

Parties are a hit during the Christmas season, especially with the youngsters who want to share in the excitement of the holiday festivities. So if you're looking for unusual party decorations and centerpieces, or ideas for the holidays, you'll find popcorn inexpensive and easy-to-work with.

The kids will have fun eating it, too.

For a Jolly Snowman centerpiece — created in the test kitchens of The West Bend Company — mix one cup white sugar, one cup white corn syrup, one-fourth cup water

and one-fourth teaspoon salt. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Boil gently until a small amount reaches the "hard-ball" stage (250°) in cold water. Use a candy thermometer if available.

Remove from heat and mix in three tablespoons butter and one teaspoon vanilla. Pour slowly over four quarts of unsalted popped corn. Shape while warm into three balls, 3 4 and 6 inches in diameter, to form the head, body and base. Fashion two arms about four inches long, two inches in diameter. Press entire figure into shape using a portion of the syrup mixture. Use raisins or gumdrops for eyes, nose, mouth and buttons. A marshmallow on a cookie makes a humorous-looking hat.

For added dash, put the snowman on "skis" made of licorice strips, with candy cane poles and a scarf made of ribbon.



## TAKE IT EASY FOR SAFE WINTER DRIVING

Take it easy, when you are driving on an ice-glazed or snow-covered road, the American Insurance Association cautions. Take it easy on the power, easy on the steering and most important, easy on the temper.

When starting your vehicle, the Association says, begin very slowly to secure maximum wheel traction.

In applying your brakes, do so by gentle taps on the pedal, once or twice a second. This will slow your vehicle without breaking the traction between the wheels and the slippery road, and help avoid skidding. Remember, it takes 200 feet more to stop at 20 m.p.h. on snow or ice, the Association notes.

Traction is a prime factor in steering too. So, turn the steering wheel slowly, and go slowly enough into the turn so you do not need to act suddenly.

When you get stuck in snow or ice, don't just sit there spinning your wheels and racing your temper. Every spin digs you deeper. You can save your temper by carrying some sand and a shovel in your car to help move your vehicle when it gets stuck.

## SERVICE STATIONS

ADOPT CODE AS  
'GOOD NEIGHBORS'

Adoption of a "Code of Good Neighbor Practices" for service stations was announced recently by the New Jersey Petroleum Council.

Designed to preserve and improve the standards of retail outlets in New Jersey, the code pledges that participating stations will: offer quality products, competent service and attractive facilities; maintain high standards of neatness and cleanliness for premises, facilities and personnel; and conduct business in a quiet and orderly manner.

The code also provides that operators will: help maintain the excellent safety record of service stations; avoid the accumulation of litter, used merchandise, and other unsightly items in and around the premises; and limit signs, banners, pennants and similar displays to those required to identify stations and call attention to unusual values or special promotional campaigns.

Noting that nine out of every 10 service stations are operated by independent businessmen, the Petroleum Council points out that it recognizes, as service station operators themselves do, that "stations have a responsibility both to the motoring public and to the community at large."
