It's Christmas -- so note the time and place change for the Clark Council meeting

With the regularly scheduled meeting falling on Christmas Day, the Township Council will meet a week earlier

The Council will convene at 8:30 p.m. (that's a half hour later than usual) on Monday, Dec. 18.

To be considered for final passage at that time is the township ethics code for public officials and employees The ordinance covers all township elected or appointed officials and all employees and prohibits any public or private business transactions which affect their positions It also prohibits any political activity or campaigning during business hours -- and calls a halt to any "gifts, gratuity, loans or service' from those who have an interest in township business.

It sounds like a good measure and should receive

Well, here's your chance!


Three, three-year posts on the Clark Board of Education will be filled by the voters in February.

the residents of Clark refused to accept a board of Education referendum on Tuesday which would have provided a new school on Mildred Terrace, an addi-tion to the Frank K. Hehnly School and other measures.

The measure was defeated in every district of every ward -- and in one district the vote against the proposal was almost 4 to 1. (That was the second district of the second ware where 198 residents voted against acceptance and 54

voted in favor.) Board members were "notably shocked" at the strong voter surge against the proposal, which had been turned down by voters before and was re-submitted after changes were made. The total votes cast were 2,376 with 1,607 voting against and 769 voting in

favor. Mrs. Thelma Purdy, board member, said that she was "frankly amazed" that only 769 residents had voted in favor of the proposal. She said that the opposition to the referendum prio to the vote did not seem as strong as the turnout indicated. "People certainly have the right to vote 'no' on these measures,' Mrs. Purdy said, 'but they shouldn't vote a proposal like this down just to express dissatisfaction or because they have questions. Most people just didn't even ask about some of the questions I hear not." The total ward by ward

168 approving and 209 dis-approving; Third District -116 for and 150 against. SECOND WARD - First District - 28 in favor and 88 against; Second District - 51 yes and 198 no.
