FLAG DAY

FRIDAY, JUNE 14, 1968

Is it possible to wave the flag too much? Provided, of course, that you wave it with integrity? Is it possible to study Lincoln or Shakespeare too much? Is it possible to read the Bible too much?

The great, the good, the true, are inexhaustible for inspiration, example and strength. I believe that we are not waving our flag enough, not nearly enough.

It seems to me that we are developing a tendency to be timid or even apologetic about waving the stars and stripes. Walk up and down the streets on July 4th and count the flags. It is our nation's birthday, a sacred day in world history, the most important day of America. Why isn't the flag flying on every rooftop and from every home and building? This complacent attitude is strong evidence of cancerous patriotic decay. The flag is a symbol of our national unity. It is the spirit of our undying devotion to our country. It stands for the best that is in us . . . for loyalty, character, and faith in democracy.

Isn't our flag a synonym of the United States of America? Does it not represent man's greatest, noblest, most sublime dream? Is it not the zenith of achievement, the goal to which generations have aspired? Ladies and gentlemen, I believe it is time for us . . . for the mad, rushing Twentieth Century American . . . to stop for a moment and think. Let us arrest our near reverential admiration of material success and return to the spiritual and ethical values. Let us imbue and rekindle in ourselves and our children the so-called old-fashioned way of patriotism, a burning devotion to the principles and ideals upon which our country was founded.

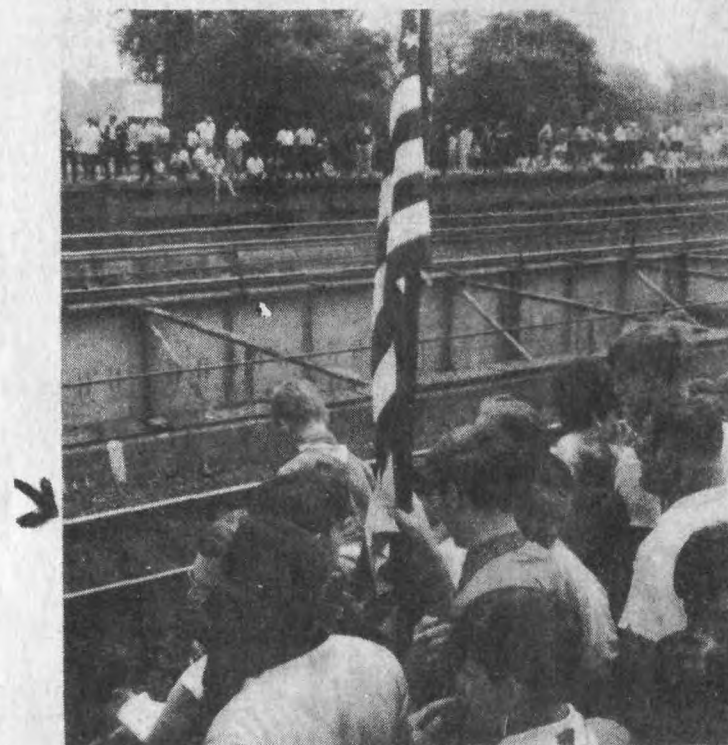
Should not every home own and proudly display the colors on holidays and other such occasions? Isn't the flag Patrick Henry, Jefferson, Franklin, Washington, Nathan Hale, Gettysburg and Valley Forge, Paul Revere, Jackson and other great men and women who have given us our heritage. When you look at the flag can't you see the Alamo, Corregidor, Pearl Harbor, The Monitor, The Merrimac, Wake Island, and Korea? Lest we forget, isn't the flag Flanders Field, Bataan, Iwo Jima, Normandy, Babe Ruth and Davy Crockett? The great events of our past and present are wrapped up in our flag. It is a symbol of this blessed nation, a giant in industry, education and commerce. Millions of fertile square miles, wheatlands, coal mines, steel plants. Our great republic, the chosen infant destined to be man's last and remaining hope for suffering humanity, a shining beacon of light, noble and glorious, the haven for the oppressed and persecuted and truly God's gift to mankind.

That is what the flag means to me. Can we wave it too much? I don't think so.

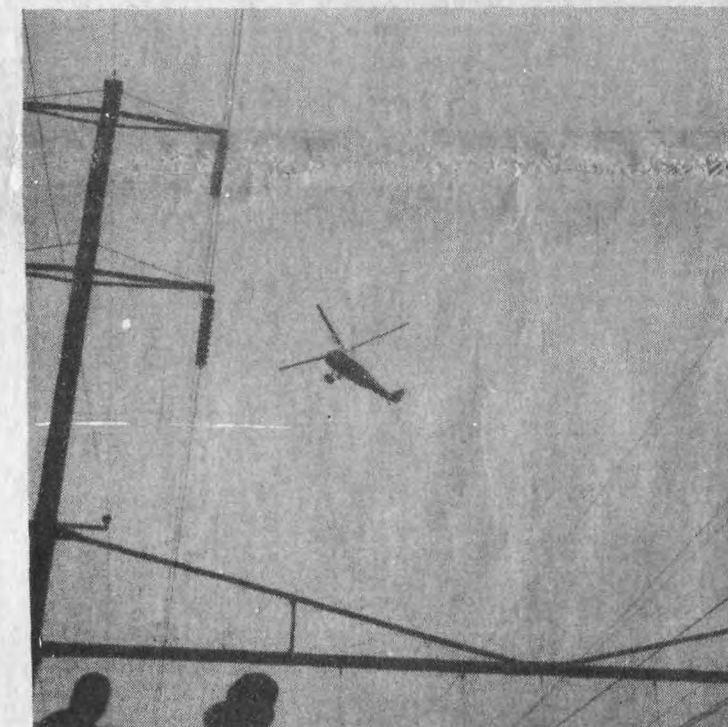

Over 2,000 Bid Farewell To RFK At Rahway Station

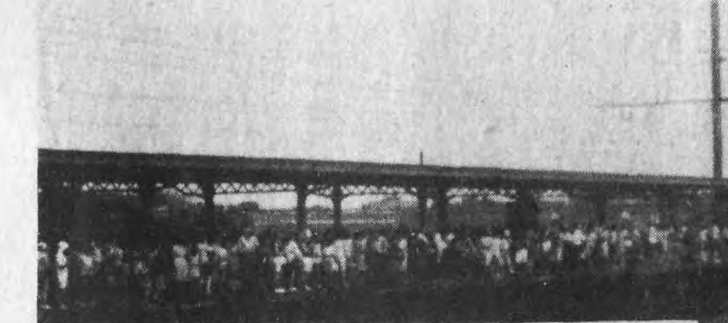
AROUND NOON on Saturday, June 8, 1968, area residents began to gather at the Rahway Pennsylvania RR station where the funeral train of the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy, of New York, would pass. About 12:45 p.m., the crowd was sparse.



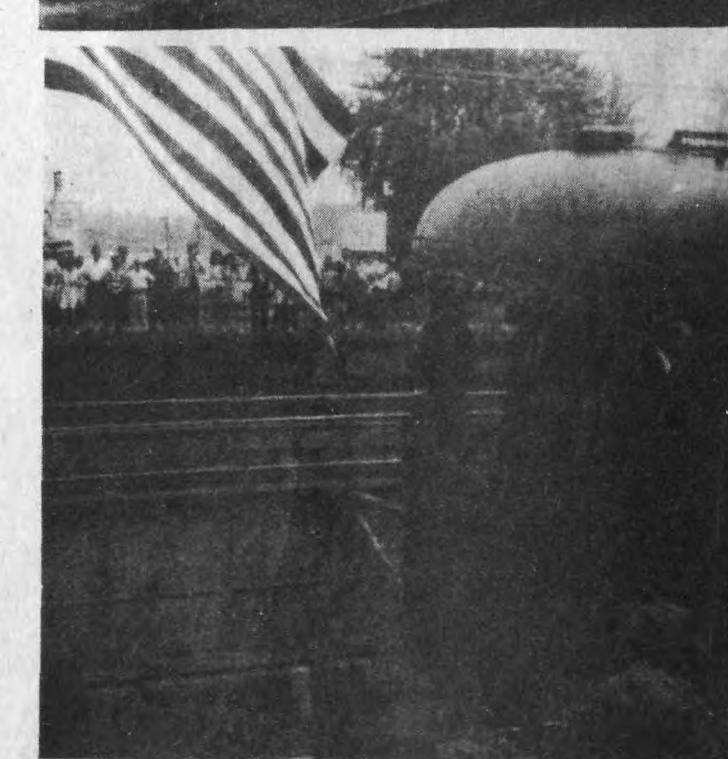
INFANTS, YOUNG CHILDREN AND SENIOR CITIZENS were among the thousands who crowded the platform on both sides to see the train. Local Boy Scouts presented the colors in respect to the assassinated presidential hopeful. The train will pass on the track indicated by arrow on the southbound side of the station.



EIGHT AIRCRAFT, like this Army helicopter, circled the station for about 15 minutes before the train arrived. A "dummy train" of two cars was sent through to check the tracks.



AND MANY MORE PEOPLE ARRIVED so that more than a half hour prior to the arrival of the funeral train, well over 2,000 people from the Rahway, Clark, Colonia area had gathered on both sides of the tracks.

Summer Recreation Plans Include Twirling, Weight-Lifting

The Clark Summer Recreation Playgrounds will open their 12th year of operation on July 8, and conclude on Aug. 23. This program, which is sponsored by the Clark Board of Education, will run for seven weeks. The seven playgrounds in operation will be located at the Charles H. Brewer School, Frank K. Hehny School, Abraham Clark School, Valley Road School, Mildred Terrace school, and the Riverside and Memorial Field play sites. Activities which will be included in this year's program include: arts and crafts games and contests, golf instruction, tennis instruction, swimming instruction, inter-playground and intramural playground basketball, softball, and volleyball for boys and girls, and archery instruction.

New programs which will

be included this year are twirling instruction for the girls and weight-lifting instruction for the boys. Field trips will be taken each week to such places as Turtle Back Zoo, Boy Scout Museum, Watchung Museum, Jockey Hollow, and Johnson and Warinanco Parks. The hours of playground operation will be from 10-5 daily. In addition, the playground hours at the Abraham Clark School will be from 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The Frank K. Hehny playground will be open from 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. A special recreation program for trainables will be held at the Frank K. Hehny playground from 9:30 a.m. to 12 p.m. daily. This program will run for six weeks and start on July 11 - Aug. 21.

Mercer Named Regional Coach

The new head football coach at Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School is Harold (Toad) Mercer, 38, who has ten years experience as head coach at Barnesville and Cardington High Schools, Ohio, and was named the 1966 Eastern Ohio Coach of the Year.

He replaces Coach Seymour (Red) Kalin, who has accepted a coaching position at the University of Connecticut. Kalin has been at Johnson since 1961. He has been head football coach for five years with an over-all record of 27-17-1.

Mercer was recently named head coach of the Ohio squad for the 1968 Ohio Valley all-star football game played June 1, at Wheeling Stadium. He was selected for the all-star post by the Eastern Ohio Coaches' Association of Booster Clubs, which joins the Booster groups from the West Virginia panhandle in sponsoring the game.

Mercer has been coach at Barnesville for the last five years, and his record there now stands at 28 and 22. His over-all coaching mark is 64-29-1. In 1966, he was honored as Eastern Ohio Coach of the Year after his team won the double-A title in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference with a record of nine victories in ten starts. His Shamrocks suffered only one defeat in '66, and last fall posted their first perfect season -- and the third for Mercer. Many of his players have been granted football scholarships in the past three years.

Before Barnesville, Mercer coached five years at Cardington, in North-central Ohio. There his teams won 36, lost seven and tied one,

and were unbeaten in two seasons, 1959 and 1960. In his last three years at Cardington his clubs won Mid-Ohio League titles. They were the Mid-Ohio Conference Champions in 1959, '60 and '61. Also in 1959 Mercer had three Class-A All-Ohio players, a Class-A Back, and two Big-Ten Regulars.

Mercer attended Moundsville High School, where he won letters in football, basketball, baseball, and track. He played in the West Virginia North-South Football game and took third place in the Pole Vault in the State Track Meet. After graduating from Moundsville in 1947, he was a star end at West Liberty State College in the halycon post-war era of that college. There he was a four-year letterman in both football and baseball and held the record for most passes caught in a season -- 45. Mercer graduated with a A.B. in 1953, in Physical Education and Biology. He received his M.A. in Health and Physical Education in 1964 from Ohio State University.

His first teaching assignment was at his alma mater, Moundsville High School, 1953-54, as biology teacher and assistant coach; then came two years at Olentangy High near Columbus. His first head coaching job was that assumed at Cardington, in 1959.

In addition to football Mercer has also captured honors in baseball. His Cardington High team was Class AA Columbus District Runner-up, 1959.

Mercer and his wife, Mary Alice, a Moundsville girl, have two daughters and three sons ranging from 17 to 10 years of age.

RAHWAY GRIEVES RITES PLANNED BY FAMILY

The family of Army PFC Gregory H. Stalevicz are awaiting word of the arrival of their son's body before funeral arrangements can be completed. PFC Stalevicz was killed in action June 1 and a spokesman for the Walter J. Johnson Funeral Home, 803 Raritan Rd., Clark, where services will be conducted, said today that the body is expected to arrive the end of this week.

Pfc. Gregory H. Stalevicz, 19, of 1122 Harold Ave., was killed in Vietnam when he stepped on a mine while on combat patrol. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Stalevicz, were informed of their son's death

**AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING
GENERAL LICENSE FEES FOR THE
TOWNSHIP DEPARTMENTS OF THE
TOWNSHIP OF CLARK SETTING
FOURTH THE TOWNSHIP LICENSE
OFFICER RESPONSIBLE FOR THE
COLLECTION OF SAID FEES AND
PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE
VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of
the Township of Clark in the County
of Union, New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. This ordinance shall be
known as the "General Ordinance Es-
tablishing License Fees of the Township
of Clark."

SECTION 2. It is not intended by this
ordinance to repeal, abrogate, annul or
in any way impair or interfere with
existing provisions of other laws or or-
dinances, except those specifically re-
pealed by this ordinance. Where con-
flict arises a fee different from ex-
isting provisions of law on ordinances,
or establishes a new fee, the provisions
of this ordinance shall apply.

SECTION 3. Every person required to
obtain a license under the provisions
of any ordinance or law of the Town-
ship shall submit an application for
such license to the proper Township
License Officer as listed in Section 5 of
this ordinance. The form of this ap-
plication shall conform with the appli-
cation and ordinances of the Township
of Clark. The application shall be ac-
companied by the full amount chargeable
for such license. License fees shall be in
the amounts established under Section 4
of this ordinance. No refunds will be
made once an application is made regard-
less of action taken.

SECTION 4. The proper Township
License Officer as listed in Section 5 of
this ordinance shall collect all license
fees, shall issue licenses in the name
of the Township or refer to Council for
issuance in accordance with the govern-
ing ordinance and shall promulgate and
enforce all reasonable rules and regu-
lations necessary for the operation and
enforcement of this ordinance and other
applicable laws and ordinances of the
Township.

SECTION 6. If any portion of this

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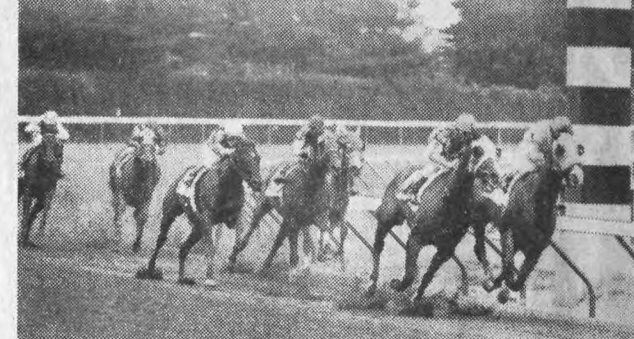
