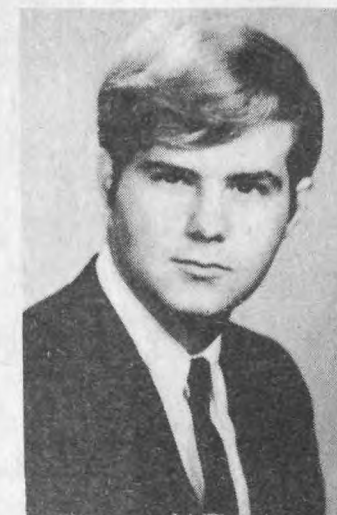

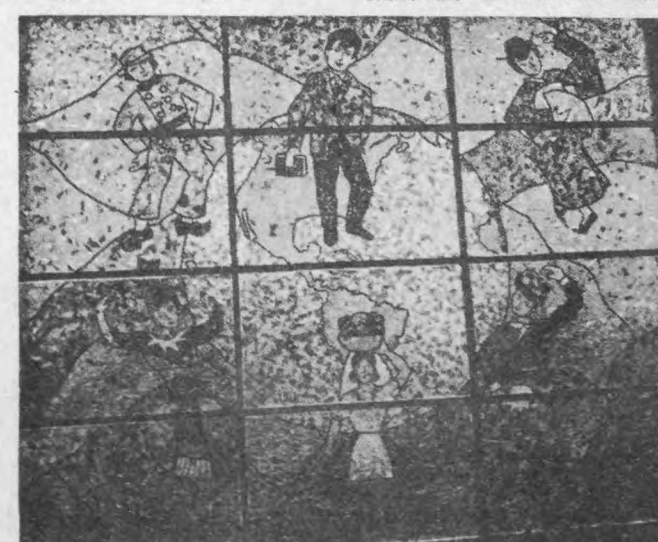

Pleasure, Treasure For Library Buffs

This summer, the Clark Public Library will again have a Summer Reading Program for boys and girls in public, private and parochial elementary schools, according to Edward Temkin, director.

All boys and girls who have just completed first grade and who have not yet entered seventh grade are eligible to join.

Registration will begin on Monday, June 23. Applications will be taken at the library between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

On registration, a child will receive a paper key, a membership card, and a reading record folder. He will write his name on the key and place it on the blue ocean that supports the pirate's treasure chest. He

will use the folder to list all books he has read. When he has read his first three books, he will receive a large orange pin which says "I'm for Books." The pin will make him a full-fledged member.

Because of the success of last summer's reading program built around the theme of pirate's treasure chest, the library will have the same program this year. The treasure-chest program permits all children who sign up to participate and win prizes.

Here is how the program works: a child who reads six books will be given an opportunity to open up the chest. But first he must try his luck on a carnival wheel. Whatever number comes up

will be the number of the key he has to use to open up the padlock.

If he is successful and opens up the pirate's chest, he can pick out a piece of the pirate's treasure and keep it for his prize. Then, for each three books read after the first six, he will have other chances to try for the treasure.

"Reading for Pleasure -- Key to the Treasure" is the theme of the Summer Reading Program.

So, remember, the line forms on the right in the Children's Library. Clear your throat and tune your fiddle. They'll be looking for you.

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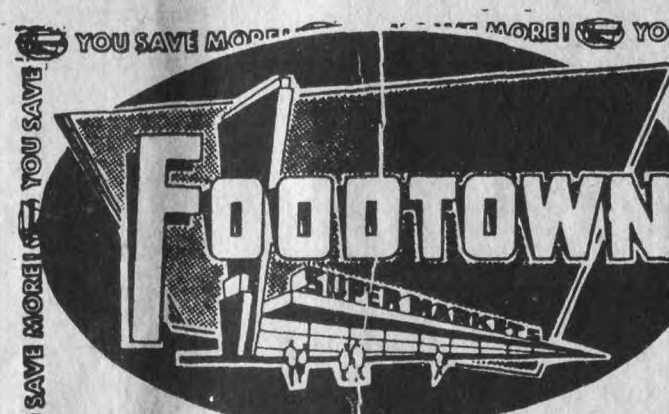

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Apologists and Principals

Unfortunately when a blunder is uncovered it is always the principals involved in the error that become its apologists. This axiom certainly holds true in the parade dispute, since nearly all of the letters we have received lamenting the paper's comments on the absence of the Rahway High School band come from members of the band, parents of band members, or former band associates of one sort or another.

Many of these individuals, although not all, would rather have us quiet, because two failures in scheduling on the part of school and band officials within 11 years does not speak well of them.

We've had more comments in favor of the paper's stand, and we are happy to report that many of them come from people who are either directly associated with the veterans' groups active in the Memorial Day parade or interested non-principals. Also, many of these pro-stand letters were drafted to express the sentiments of groups which makes them more meaningful than individual correspondence. It can be noted also that one band family so far has written four letters to the paper.

Some people have told us we must identify all writers. We say to them that national practice is just the opposite, that good practice does not demand it, and that their opinions in regard to journalistic method are presumptuous, since they are not founded on experience or knowledge in the field. One letter went so far as to say The New York Times was "dead wrong" on its policy, that of all newspapers, often not to identify editorial writers. We stand behind what is said, and the band, we are sure, will be prone to march next year.

Letters to the Editor

To the Editor:

Man what a rhabd! Everybody in town seems to be up in arms about the High School band missing the parade on Memorial Day. I would say it was poor prior planning on the part of the board of education, but would one more band have made the parade a huge success? I doubt it.

I would say, the parade was still a success because of the fact that we had one, especially when many towns around us have given up on the traditional Memorial Day parade.

Instead of making a huge fuss about one band, I would ask: where were all the other great organizations of Rahway? Where were the Elks, Moose, Eagles, Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, Italian American Club and many more civic and political organizations as well as professional groups.

Even if these great clubs could not muster marching

groups, they certainly could have entered a patriotic float. Also where was Rahway's industry? They could have entered some floats. Where was the large contingents of marchers from our own police and fire departments? Where was everybody?

Perhaps the citizens of Rahway should ask why there are so few students willing to participate in an instrumental music program. Perhaps the answer may be the lack of interest on the part of the same citizens who were not at the Memorial Day Parade.

EDITOR'S NOTE: In response to your question, the paper would not have devoted so much space to the Memorial Day Parade after it had occurred if the public and the band would have carried out their responsibility to honor the nation's war dead. The Fourth of July is a flag-waving, firecracker affair, good in its own way. Veteran's Day honors the fallen of World War I, but only Memorial Day serves as a time of national reflection on those who gave their lives to maintain American freedoms. If the parade had been attended and staffed in a respectable way, there would be little need for us to comment, except to say that all was done right. Since it wasn't our comments joined by those of the city's veterans' groups, have served to outline a discouraging situation and turn all eyes to its improvement next year.

Gallagher Blasts Prejudice

Congressman Cornelius E. Gallagher has signed a special letter to President Richard M. Nixon protesting the policy of the government of northern Ireland in denying civil rights to Roman Catholics within that nation.

The letter expressed "grave concern" over the policy of the northern Ireland government which "is designed to discriminate against the Catholic minority in the area of jobs, housing, and equal voting rights."

Gallagher was joined by many members of the Congress in the message to the President, which stated that "we are mindful that neither intolerance nor prejudice is unique to any geography or people. They exist wherever reason gives way to passion. But we are especially disturbed that intolerance and discrimination are encouraged by and rooted in the laws of northern Ireland. Any society purporting to be democratic must ensure equal protection and equal rights under the law."

In signing the letter, Gallagher observed that "when ever injustice or tyranny exists in any nation, free men everywhere are required by conscience to speak. No man can truly feel secure unless all men can truly call themselves free. While we cannot and should not dictate the policies of other governments, we can indeed bring the compulsion of moral pressure to bear on those governments which deny even the most fundamental human rights to its citizens."

A recent respect for the opinions of mankind would require that northern Ireland reform its unfortunate practices.

The Gallagher letter to the President requests Nixon to express, through our state department, to the prime ministers of northern Ireland and Great Britain the signers' grave concern over the situation in northern Ireland.

The Gallagher letter concluded: "As we strive to strengthen the common bond that unites all members of our own society, we urge the people and government of northern Ireland to do the same. It is only in such a climate of shared humanity that concern for historic differences can give way to concern for the real and pressing problems of today."

The front page attack on the band was too much like small town journalism for Rahway, a city with the problems of a city. I'd like to suggest several more important issues which might draw our paper's attention:

Does the board of education realize the necessity of continuing the important school reorganization plan which gives all of our children equal education experience?

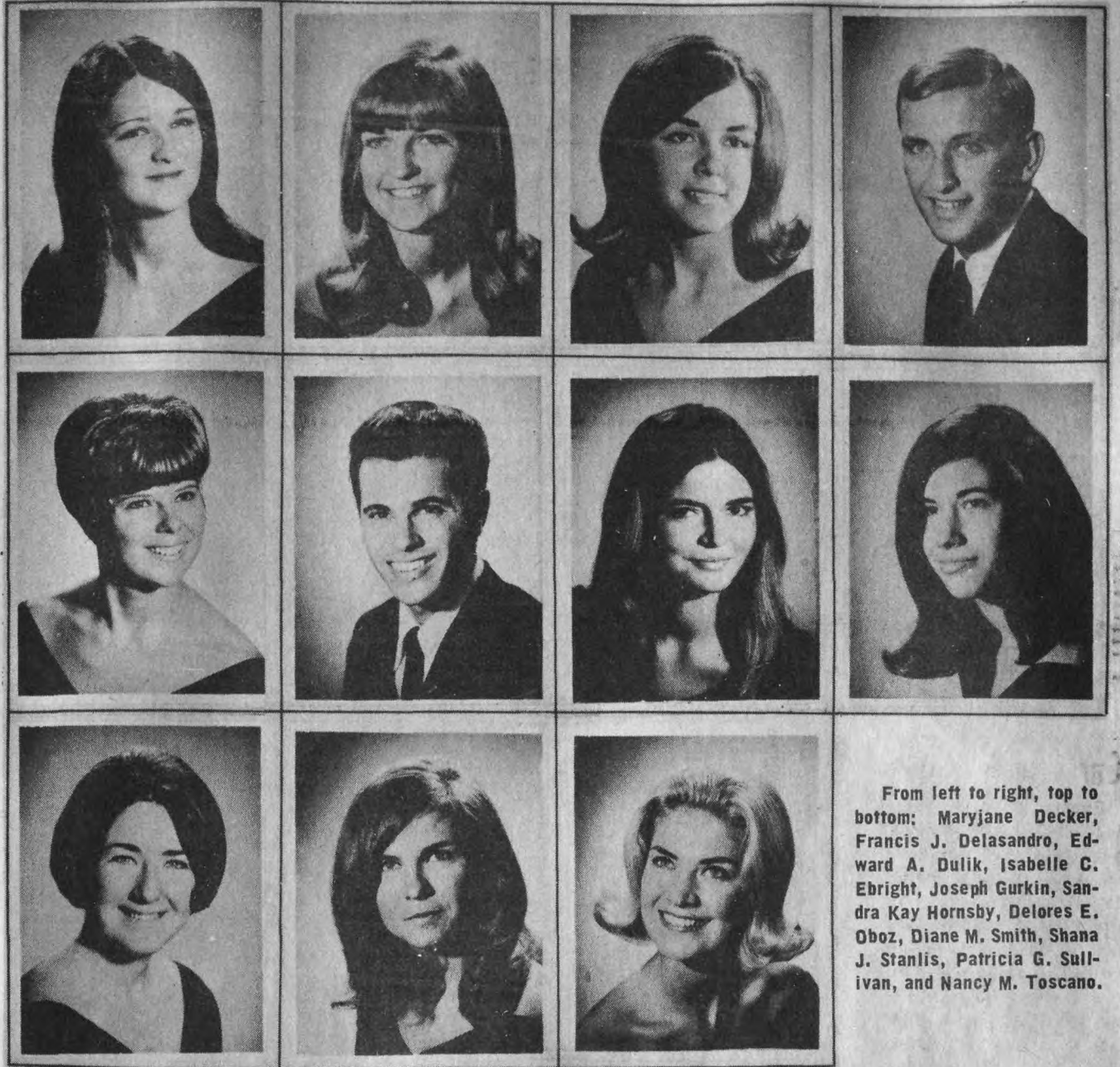

Realtors Ask Prime Interest Rate Probe

Realtors and salesmen in New Jersey were advised today by their state association president to "communicate at once with their Congressmen voicing strong concern over the recent increase in the prime interest rate."

In his letter to the more than 3,000 Realtor members of the New Jersey Association of Realtor Boards, president Frank J. Citta called upon all segments of the real estate industry to urge their representatives in Washington to support Congressional investigation into the advisability of the move which increased the prime rate to 8 1/2%.

According to Citta, the request for the investigation is a move to dramatize the plight of the real estate buying and selling public and the worsening condition of the

housing industry as a result of the new record rate.

"This request for a Congressional probe," Citta continued, "is part of a comprehensive program the Realtors plan to institute to call attention to an obvious clash - with the country-wide demand for increased housing to meet the needs of our growing population on the one hand - and this latest contradictory and stifling economic policy on the other."

The Realtors have already appealed directly to President Nixon for his assistance, asking that the lowly state of the housing industry be given high priority on the list of domestic problems requiring immediate attention.

Citta declared economists and theorists had better understand the facts of life where housing is concerned.

Rev. Emil J. Mihalik, former pastor of St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Rahway, was installed as the bishop of the 25-state Diocese of Parma for Ruthenians of the Byzantine Rite. Several Rahwayans traveled to Ohio where Rev. Mihalik was invested with the title and rights of his office. Rev. Mihalik is the first cleric to serve as bishop of the 25-state diocese.

In his message to the congregation present, the bishop said:

"There are some who see no relevance for our rite in this country. Since we are all Americans, they feel there should be no multiplication of rites and liturgical forms of worship."

"Others refer to our status as a minority group within the church and regard our importance as minimal."

But I hasten to add that the Christian faith itself is in the minority since it embraces less than out of every three persons in the world.

"Yet a viable and vibrant Byzantine Rite in the Catholic Church can form the basis for the possible union of Christians because it is a living witness to the principle of unity in diversity."

Bishop Mihalik noted an increased role for the laity in

post-Vatican II's Roman Rite and asserted, "The constant dialogue between priest and faithful in our rite during public worship is living proof of the 'priesthood of the laity'."

"The Eastern stress on worship and the first commandment balances the activist and sociological tendency of modern times which emphasizes the second commandment."

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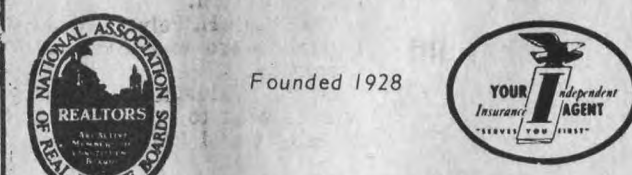

AN ORDINANCE ABOLISHING THE DIVISION OF BUILDING INSPECTIONS AND THE POSITION OF BUILDING INSPECTOR, ESTABLISHING A DIVISION OF PLANNING AND BUILDINGS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE, CREATING THE POSITION OF SUPERVISOR OF PLANNING AND BUILDINGS AND AMENDING ARTICLE 10 OF CHAPTER 2 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF RAHWAY.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RAHWAY:

1. The position of Building Inspector is hereby abolished.

2. Section 2-24 of the Revised Ordinances of Rahway is hereby repealed.

3. Section 2-50 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Rahway is hereby amended to read as follows:

2-50 Organization of department; divisions
The department of health and welfare shall consist of the following divisions:

(a) Division of health
(b) Division of welfare
(c) Division of planning and buildings

4. A new section 2-53A is hereby added to the Revised Ordinances of Rahway under Article 10 as follows:

2-53A Functions of division of Planning and Buildings:
head; compensation of head

(a) There shall be within the Department of Health and Welfare a Division of Planning and Buildings, the head of which shall be the Supervisor of Planning and Buildings, who shall be appointed by the Director of said department subject to civil service laws and rules. The Planning and Buildings is hereby created, and prior to his appointment he shall be licensed by the State of New Jersey.

(b) The functions and duties of the Division of Planning and Buildings shall be as follows: to advise and assist the Mayor or the Director of Health and Welfare in regard to the planning and public improvement aspects of all matters relating to the development of the city; to study the operation and effect of land use controls and report thereon to the Director of Health and Welfare; to advise the Director of Health and Welfare on planning board matters and matters pertaining to housing rehabilitation and urban renewal; to make inspections of existing structures and new construction to assure compliance with city ordinances and regulations concerning buildings and construction; to enforce the city's zoning ordinance, building code, and Housing Code; to perform such other duties heretofore required to be performed by the Building Inspector; and to perform related duties as required by the Director of Health and Welfare.

(c) The Supervisor of Planning and Buildings for all of his duties shall receive an annual salary of \$10,500.00 payable in the same manner as other salaried city employees are paid which compensation may be increased by the municipal council. He shall also be entitled to additional reasonable compensation for any services that he may be required to perform as consultant to said Board.

(d) Wherever in the Revised Ordinances or elsewhere there is reference to "Building Inspector" same shall hereafter be taken to mean Supervisor of Planning and Buildings.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF PAVEMENT NAD CURBS IN MONTGOMERY STREET FROM ST. GEORGES AVENUE TO A POINT 450 FEET SOUTHERLY, AND SUCH OTHER WORK AND PURPOSES INCIDENTAL THERETO THAT MAY BE REQUIRED, TO BE DONE AS A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT, PROVIDING FOR THE FINANCING THEREOF IN THE SUM OF \$13,333.00.

Voynik Advisory Council Gets Redevelopment Tour

Third Ward Councilman mixed commercial and residential land uses, outmembers of his advisory council, a group named by the freshmen councilman to assist and guide legislative decisions affecting Third Ward residents, to the redevelopment agency on Fulton St. this week for an examination of the programs designed to revitalize residential, commercial and industrial areas of the city.

Agency director Raymond Handerman told the group that the nature of urban redevelopment is to "bring about community progress not otherwise attainable through private, local or state programs."

Handerman outlined the various stages of the program which began in the late 1950's. He pointed out that it was necessary for the community to assess its needs, its assets and liabilities in order to prepare a program which, with federal assistance, could lead the community to progress and prosperity.

"It hasn't been easy," said Handerman. "Each step requires careful planning and an assortment of approvals before execution."

The director said that following the decision to embark on the program and the exhaustive planning required, it was necessary to acquire the properties to be included in the redevelopment plan.

"We then had to relocate the residents and businesses from the area to new locations," Handerman then showed slides of blighted areas, including dilapidated houses, flood conditions,

in the lower Main St. area. However, the potential one year "ratable to the city on the proposed new apartments approximate \$88,000."

Handerman said that the relocations were followed by a clearance and demolition program which included cooperation with the Army Corps of Engineers to provide flood control for the

entire redevelopment area. He explained the financing limitations which led to the controversial wall south of the Hazelwood Ave. bridge. He emphasized that through the efforts of the current administration, a recently passed ordinance initiates financing of a federal assistance program to correct the South Branch flooding pro-

gram. Handerman's comprehensive presentation included a description of the planned apartments, the industrial redevelopment program and projects contemplated for the future.

Voynik opened the meeting with a discussion of pending legislation and activities currently underway on behalf of 3rd Ward residents.

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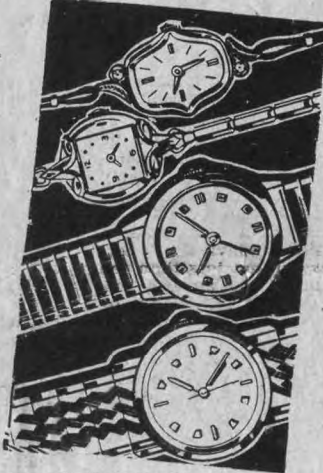
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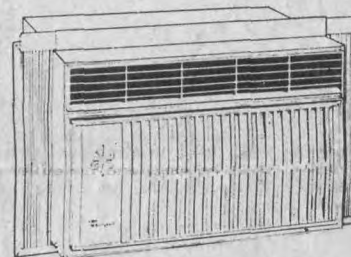
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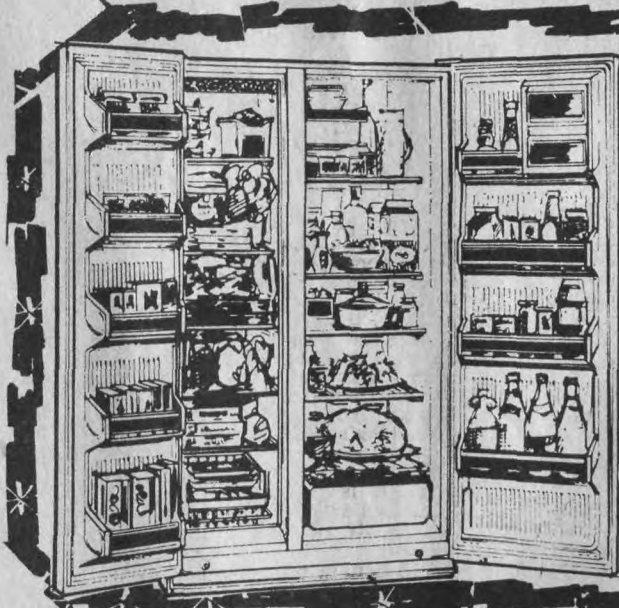

Board Members Voice Nays To Pupil Splitting

Several local school boards in the Union County Regional High School District have urged the Regional Board of Education to come up with a building program that would allow all students from one town to attend the same high school.

Representatives of the local boards met last Thursday evening in Springfield with the regional board to discuss the recommendations made by Dr. Henry Rissetto in his proposed school expansion program.

Opposing any plan that would split students between two high schools was Dr. Levin B. Hanigan, superintendent of schools in Mountainside. Mountainside ninth graders attend Jonathan Dayton Regional in Springfield, with the rest going to Governor Livingston Regional in Berkeley Heights.

Also opposing any split was Manuel S. Dios, a member of the regional board from Clark. Under Dr. Rissetto's plan, Clark students

would be divided between Arthur L. Johnson Regional in Clark, and David Brearley Regional in Kenilworth. Several other local school board members also voiced their opposition.

In response to Dr. Fred B. Hagedorn of Berkeley Heights, regional board member and chairman of the meeting, the local boards, except for Berkeley Heights, generally agreed that Dr. Rissetto's project enrollment figures were accurate.

Quentin Groves of the Berkeley Heights board, said its figures show enrollment reaching a peak in 1974, with a projected enrollment of 1,385, as against Dr. Rissetto's projection of 1,478 for the same year.

Dr. Hagedorn said a supplementary study of enrollment projections for Berkeley Heights was being made by Dr. Rissetto and the results are expected this week.

The regional board said the disparity does not change the fact that an expansion program is needed to relieve overcrowding in the district over the next five years.

Dr. Warren M. Davis, regional superintendent of schools, noted that classes

are being held in theatrical dressing rooms at the Governor Livingston school, and that chemistry labs at the school can only accommodate 14 of the 19 chemistry classes that are scheduled daily.

He also said that the language lab at the Berkeley Heights schools was being used as a classroom.

"People just don't know how overcrowded the schools are," August Caprio, a member of the local board in Springfield said.

Avery W. Ward, regional board president, said the board will continue to study the Rissetto report and come up with a suitable building program. He emphasized that the board has not as yet accepted or rejected all or any portion of the recommendations.

"We have asked the residents of the district for their opinions, and we have you here to seek your opinion," he told the local board members.

Now, as seniors await graduation day and underclassmen wile away the days before vacation, we are able to look back at the year and say that it has been a fruitful one for RHS. The four-year high school has successfully withstood the test of its first year and now awaits the coming fall.

"I'd like to see the budget passed, and I know that the student council will do everything possible to see that it does pass."

"We need more assemblies which interest and entertain students; assemblies which would be solely for student enjoyment."

"There's been too much 'passing the buck' in past years, and I intend to see that it stops." (Have you heard that phrase before?)

"We will not want only a 'yes or no' answer from the administration, but also a 'why'." These were the words spoken by Ron Miller, student council president-elect, while holding a meeting to discuss plans and hopes for next year's student council. Ron, together with Scott Russell, vice president-elect, and Diane Aquino, treasurer-elect, will preside over the Rahway High School Student Council beginning next fall. The thoughts at the beginning of this article come from them, as they earnestly discussed what they thought to be the most important events facing the council next year.

In Ron's eyes, the budget, electric scoreboard drive, and student-administration relations are the pressing topics. Although the student council represents no voters, its members can do much to convince the community of the importance in passing the school budget, if the project is approached in the right manner. John Thorn, school board president, has proposed that the council meet with the board before each school board meeting next year. This would bring about a more harmonious relationship between the two elected bodies and promote a better understanding of each other's point of view, than has been characteristic.

"The scoreboard drive, begun by the Up With People Concert, must be continued to raise the necessary \$1,800 for the scoreboard. This is a project which cannot be allowed to fall by the wayside," stated vice president elect Scott Russell. "The student council will work with the service clubs to insure that 1969-1970 will see the installation of the board."

Scott and Diane were both in agreement on the question of student assemblies. They felt there must be more assemblies and that they should be interesting and entertaining, not just drawn-out award and holiday assemblies, though these too are important. Diane favors more performances by outside groups, while Scott would like to see each club sponsor an assembly during the year.

Finally, Ron spoke on student-administration relations. "In general, the attitude of the administration has been one of helpfulness and guidance. They have been tempted, however, to give too many pat, yes-or-no answers, without backing them up with reasons. Students have as much right an anyone else to know the reasons behind various rules and policies, and I intend to see that we are not left in the dark." Ron does not wish to imply that the student council will be a trouble-making organization, only that it will not be just a figurehead group which holds parliamentary meetings and passes nice little resolutions.

It would be the acceptable thing at this point to say that next year looks to be a terrific, wham-bang year, with a great student council. This may, or may not, be the case. Only time will tell, but one thing is for sure, THE TOMAHAWK will be watching the council every step of the way in the coming year.

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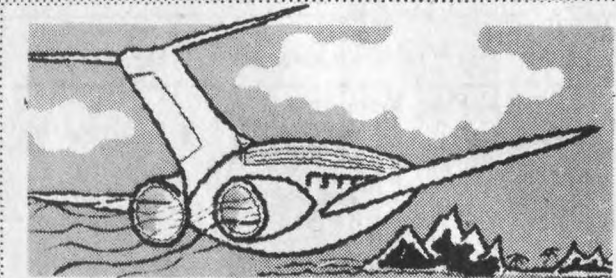


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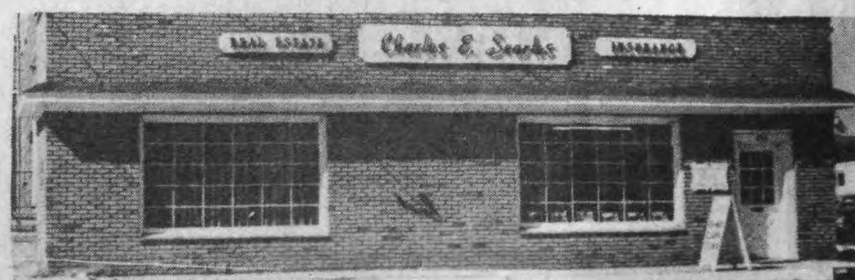
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
