## Township Board of Education Sounds Alert on Costly Bills Now Before State Legislature

Two important state educational bills will soon be studied and voted on by the state legislature which concern financial aid to public and non-public schools as reported in a booklet soon to be mailed to all residents by the Board of Education of Clark.

Senate Bill 575, known as the Bateman Bill, will cost, if approved, \$185 million over a period of five years. Pressures are mounting to increase this figure to more than \$400 million or to decrease the years from five to three, but for the same cost figure.

"The most significant factor in the bill," said Michael Truss, chairman of the legislative committee, "is the use of a new formula in computing financial aid to education. Pupil weighting plus ability of community to meet certain state criteria in education will be used.

Criteria established by the commissioner of education and the State Department of Education are not available to boards of education, but they will determine the kind of district each school will

assume due to their educational offerings and other services to pupils. "Unfortunately, some school districts will not be able to qualify for comprehensive districts due to the very nature of their district or inability to meet the criteria," said Truss. "It is for this reason the school district should be given the information and the state should permit boards of education to make suggestions and question the validity of certain criteria. More and more, the state is running the schools," Truss observed.

A second bill, Assembly No. 1078, known as the Vander Plaats Bill, concerns aid to non-public schools in the State of New Jersey. The State Board of Education opposes this bill, as does the State Board of Education Association. The Clark Board of Education is also opposed to the bill and feels public money should be spent for public schools. The bill would give more money per pupil to non-public schools than the Bateman Bill would give to the public school pupils.

Nothing in the bill would set standards for teachers—anyone could teach and receive from 20% to 60% of their salaries from state funds. Taxpayers would have to pay for books and salaries of private schools that restrict enrollment to certain qualified students. All children could not apply to these schools for enrollment.

"Any organization, regardless of affiliation or its beliefs in the democratic process, could set up a school and draw state aid after meeting minimum standards for facilities," said Truss. The Clark board discovered that the bill is almost identical to the ones found in Pennsylvania and Connecticut, minus the safeguards.

The cost of this bill is \$9.9 million for one year beginning July 1, 1971. Gov. Cahill has asked for the approval of this bill.

To pay for the large expenditure of state aid to education, Assembly Bill No. 948 has been introduced, which means that about 10% of all income earned by any resident living in New Jersey will be subjected by taxation.

## Gypsum and Hyatt Accused Of Air Pollution; Memorial to Korean, Viet Dead Proposed

The two heavy industries in the township came under fire for being polluters.

U.S. Gypsum Co. and New Departure-Hyatt Bearing Division of General Motors were named at Monday night's council meeting in a resolution which accused them of "constantly emitting heavy smoke and soot into the air." The resolution protested the air pollution and requested the companies to immediately install equipment which would purify the emissions.

Council President Richard C. Burger said he has been the recipient of many calls protesting soot. Most frequently, he reported, women noticed the fallout from the companies' emissions when it dirtied their laundry. He also cited observable dirt on newly washed cars and on the surface of swimming pools as frequent complaints.

Third Ward Councilman Bernard G. Yarusavage said his investigations show that both firms had been fined as polluters.

One councilman said that U.S. Gypsum was converting from the use of coal to oil fuel, although First Ward Councilman Edward P. Getchis did not know whether this would be helpful, if the proper type of fuel oil was not employed.

It was requested that a copy of the resolution be forwarded to the Central New Jersey Air Pollution Control Agency as well as to both companies as suggested in the resolution.

Five citizens were commended for community service, including Mrs. Mary Kiel, "Secretary of the Year" of the Union County Chapter of the National Secretaries Association International, C. Wyllys Cass, chairman of the Shade Tree Commission, and James Smith, former vice president of the board of adjustment. All are pictured in this issue of the Clark Patriot receiving laminated plaques of resolutions for service or achievement.

The two other individuals selected for honor were Patrolman Andrew Chabak who served 25 years on the police force and Mrs. Muriel Cassidy for service on the juvenile conference committee. Both were lauded in resolutions.

The council requested the Union County Board of Freeholders to assume the cost for the acquisition of rights-of-way for county roads and traffic signals, which, it stated in a resolution, was contrary to the practice of most of the counties in the state.

Getchis said having the county bear the cost of the acquisitions of rights-of-way would cut down the delay often experienced in county improvement projects, since all work done by a municipality must be reviewed by the county engineering staff anyway. He also noted that the county is in a better position and more adequately staffed than a municipality to secure state and federal aid on improvement projects.

Three new members were accepted on the Clark Volunteer Fire Department: Robert James Edwards of 285 Westfield Ave., Theodore Louis Tanke of 11 Nassau St., and Dennis J. Esposito of 239 Lexington Blvd. In a series of resolutions council:

—authorized the mayor to enter into contract with Edwards & Kelcy Inc. to update and revise the master plan over five years.

—rejected an excessive bid to rehaul the police department. The mayor regretted the delay in this project and noted council had acted when he first requested action the cost would be much reduced. He said immediate relief measures would have cost \$7,000 before but were now in the \$20,000 range. Yarusavage pointed out the bid did not encompass the intent of the project: to protect the desk officer. In 1967, Patrolman Michael Kuch was shot at by a youth while he was

seated in the police department. Since that time police have been calling for a security setup in their offices.

—two lots were authorized to be acquired for \$22,500 to get egress and ingress to the 4.8 acre Bartell Place tract which council acquired several years ago.

—a legal bill of \$7,255.95 was ordered paid to the firm of Hawkins, Delafield and Wood for services rendered concerning the \$1,376,000 bond sale.

—a bid was rejected for the construction of a field house at the Riverside play area. Burger noted the price of one building in the instant bid was more than the cost of two the last time the project was advertised for bid.

—the Clark Jaycees were granted the right to use the seal of the Township of Clark.

—stripping was authorized in front of commercial establishments near the new traffic light at the corner of Westfield and Brant Avenues.

A letter from Al Hyman represented affected parties in the 1st Ward flood plain of the Pumpkin Patch Brook thanked council and township personnel for progress in the dredging program.

A police raise of \$800 across-the-board was approved on second reading which is retroactive to Jan. 1, 1970. The issue is not settled, however, since PBA No. 125 is seeking a \$1,200 increase and is said to have obtained 3,000 signatures to request council to place the matter on the Nov. 3 ballot as a public question.

Township Clerk Edward R. Padusniak and Township Attorney John P. Higgins were feuding again. Padusniak said of 40 ordinances acted on in 1969 and 1970, he had prepared 28 of them. Of 250 or so resolutions the clerk said he had prepared about 200 of them. He also cited contractual work he said he performed. Higgins asked the clerk to define the word "prepared" and to make a full listing of what measures he was referring to.

Higgins and Padusniak have been at odds for some time. The most recent incident began when Higgins said in July the clerk was not cooperating with him. Padusniak had refused in the early summer to give a letter addressed to another councilman to Higgins who maintains it was public information.

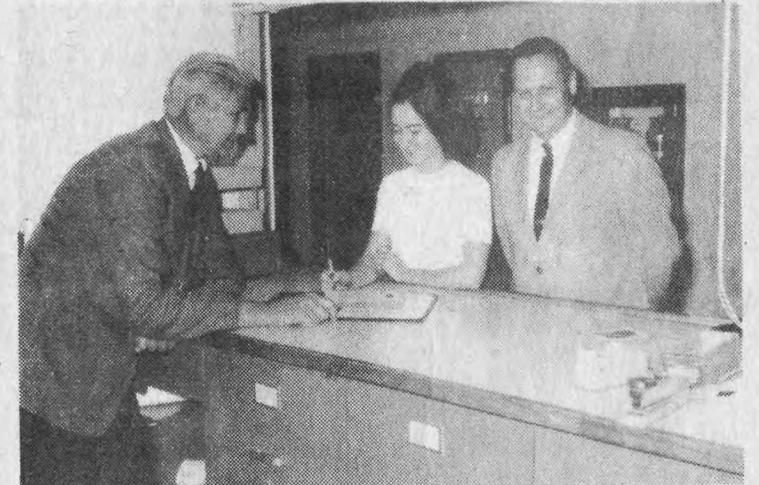
Fourth Ward Councilman Robert Roman presented a petition endorsing a memorial at Grand Street and Broadway to commemorate those who died in the Korean and Vietnam conflicts. The clubs listed in support of the idea were PBA No. 125, the Clark Volunteer Fire Department, American Legion, Knights of Columbus, Rotary and Veterans of Foreign Wars. The monument is being offered, said Roman, that "time will not dim the glory of their deeds." The proposal drew support from C. Wyllys Cass, chairman of the Shade Tree Commission. The idea was aided by Lt. Robert Barkus who was present at the meeting.

John F. Allaire, Jr., director of the Department of Public Works and Engineering, said a plan he has for annual dredging of the Pumpkin Patch Brook would save the township \$500,000 on long-term flood control measures.

A study by township engineer Joseph Sozio to place a traffic light at the corner of Lake Avenue and Oak Ridge Road was authorized by council.

Councilman-at-Large A. Charles Walano thanked all those who expressed sympathy at the passing of his wife, especially the police and members of the Clark Volunteer Emergency Squad.

## Cristiani Denounces Filth, Favoritism And Inept Planning

When asked why he is running for council in Clark's Fourth Ward, GOP candidate Carmine Cristiani put it this way: "Never in the 17 years that I have been a resident of Clark and of the Fourth Ward have I seen so much to be alarmed about. I have seen, in the last two years, a meteoric rise in the cost of running the township, while at the same time I see a steep decline in the basic services. I have seen my mayor hire, for brazenly political reasons at public expense, a male secretary who could not type, and a few months later I saw him whimper about the shortage of stenographic help at town hall when chided for failure to communicate important information to others in government.

"I see filth and debris piling up in publicly and privately owned lots all over town, as well as at some commercial establishments, but I see no one enforcing the sanitary code. I have seen clean-up week scheduling by political calendar, with weeks of delay as punishment for those whose wards happen to be represented by minority Republican councilmen. I have seen inept snow removal by amateurs related to those in office, paving of streets by who lives where, and free curbs for some in an election year.

"I see complete disregard for the master plan, and a thinly disguised purge of those who would defend it. I see an end to the pursuit of choice rateables and the substitution of low-yield, quick-lunch establishments which carnivalize major arteries, and a clustering of bank buildings which will maximize traffic hazards in an area already fraught with danger.

"I have seen appointment of outsiders to important township posts obviously by opposite-party, county- or organization fiat, and an acting mayor who doesn't live in Clark.

"I see all these things, but apparently my opponent sees nothing. He is content to blissfully stand in the shadow of the man who has, in the last two years, presided as mayor over all the retrogression I see. I believe the Fourth Ward deserves better representation than this on the date at town hall. We need tax relief through ratable development, we need professionalism in the services provided by the public works department, we need a cleaner town, we want the services for which we pay so dearly."

Cristiani, a senior project engineer for Schering Corporation in Jersey City for 22 years, came to Clark from Jersey City in 1953. He has lived at 5 Ivy Street since then with his wife, Gloria, two boys, Thomas and Michael, both 18 1/2, and a girl, Patricia, 14. Thomas studies business administration and marketing at St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia, and Michael is seeking a bachelor of community planning degree at the University of Cincinnati.

Cristiani recalls the first time he voted in a primary election in Jersey City after returning from Luzon, Philippines, where he had served as a soldier during World War II. When he asked for a Republican ballot at the polling place there was quite a stir! There was snickering, expression of disbelief, eyes opened wide in amazement, and a long delay until the Republican board worker finally came up with the blue pad and a great big proud smile on her face. There was another Republican in the neighborhood!

Cristiani is a graduate of Lincoln High School in Jersey City and holds a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering. He enlisted voluntarily into the Army of the United States in 1943, and after serving 34 months, was honorably discharged. He was thrice elected commander of Catholic War Veterans Post 1357 in Jersey City and in Clark has served as Republican Committeeman, Fourth Ward, First District, 1965 through 1969; president of the Clark Republican Club 1967 and 1968; member of the Mayor's Citizens Advisory Committee to the planning board, 1964 and 1965. He is currently serving as a commissioner on the Union County Mosquito Extermination Commission.

Cristiani is opposing Robert Roman, an incumbent Democrat.

## Council Tells Wilson to Move Into Clark or Face Sanctions

A majority of the Clark council served notice on Business Administrator John J. Wilson that he must move into Clark before Jan. 1, 1971 or face "such sanctions as the law will allow." Presumably that means termination.

The 6-1 vote to require Wilson to become a Clarkite was taken after an amendment was offered that would have given council's approval to his being an out-of-town resident.

Presently, the Faulkner Act allows business administrators to live outside the municipality in which they work, if they receive councilmanic approval in the form of a resolution.

The amendment which would have sanctioned Wilson's living at his 517 Dorian Place address in Westfield was defeated 4-3, with councilmen Edward P. Get-

chis (1st Ward) and Bernard G. Yarusavage (3rd Ward), both Republicans, and Robert Roman (4th Ward), an ally of the mayor, voting aye. In the final 6-1 tally, Getchis and Yarusavage voted with the majority.

Wilson, an appointee of Mayor Thomas A. Kaczmarek, has been on the outs with council Democrats since the beginning of the year, when they first called for his being a resident of the township. In 1964, he was also fired as secretary of the Ruppell's Hospital, Berkeley Heights but got his job after winning a Superior Court suit.

The mayor came to Wilson's defense at the meeting, saying he could get to Clark in five minutes and was more available than the township clerk, Edward R. Padusniak, who has an unlisted number.

The former state assemblyman was also supported by Getchis who saw the move by council Democrats as a

method to dump the business administrator, which was not raised when he was appointed. The mayor felt the law was being construed too strictly, and with the shortage of professional municipal help, the tendency was to allow individuals to live out-of-town. The mayor cited the position of business administrator for the Town of Westfield which is held by a resident of Clark.

Council also moved to make Wilson file monthly and quarterly reports to the mayor and council as required by the Faulkner Act. No comment was made on the resolution, or as to whether Wilson has or has not been filing reports.

Councilman-at-Large John Pisansky, an attorney, explained that while he was not familiar with the intent behind the requirement for business administrators to live in the municipalities they serve, he offered two possible reasons: (1) the employee would be nearer the township in the light of an emergency (2) his interests are keener and his actions more prudent if he realizes the quality of his work affects the tax rate to which his property is subjected.

## YANK IN COPENHAGEN

Richard A. Weinstein of 223 Lexington Blvd., Clark, a junior at Whittier College, will attend the Whittier College in Copenhagen this fall.

The Whittier College in Copenhagen program is an integral part of the work at Whittier College. It was inaugurated in 1959 to give students from Whittier and other institutions a semester's study in a foreign country to enlarge their perspective of the world in which they live.

Weinstein will live with Danish families and attend courses by Danish professors. The Danish International Student Committee (D.I.S.) organizes the travel, living, and study and makes arrangements for Danish lecturers and professors. All courses are taught in English and are centered in social sciences and humanities.

A special pre-study tour and a mid-term trip, as well as local field trips, are part of the semester's program. The three-week pre-study tour includes trips to London, Oxford, Stratford, Amsterdam and Paris. The mid-term trip in November includes a visit to East and West Berlin.

Weinstein and his group will leave New York, Tuesday, Sept. 15.

## 1st Ward

### Voiceless:

### J. Bodnar

"There is only one major issue involved in the 1st Ward," says John Bodnar, Democrat council candidate, citing "the record of incumbent councilman Edward P. Getchis, or to be more correct, the lack of record. In the last eight years, the incumbent has done nothing to correct progressively deteriorating situations in the flood area, he has done nothing to correct the garbage situation, he has allowed taxes which the homeowners pay to rise to near prohibitive levels with only a plaintive cry for 'more rateables.' He has watched Clark deprived of its fair return from state and county taxes without even uttering a word. In fact, he has done nothing significant in any case."

Bodnar said "The incumbent did nothing, but he could have examined our tax structure and found industry does not pay its fair share, and the golf course does not pay taxes equivalent to its value. He could have noticed that a good part of our industrial-commercial complex is not paying taxes, but are paying rent. He could have introduced legislation for a business tax based on receipts or profits rather than the value of the land; he could have introduced legislation to establish industrial evalu-

ations on a two- or three-year basis.

"There has been no pressure from the incumbent," Bodnar claimed "to pave Madison Hill Road, no voice against duplication of services at the expense of the taxpayers. Most important there has been no original thought or motivation. In fact, during the last eight years, the 1st Ward has only been represented physically. It's about time for true representation and voice of which the incumbent has proven himself incapable."

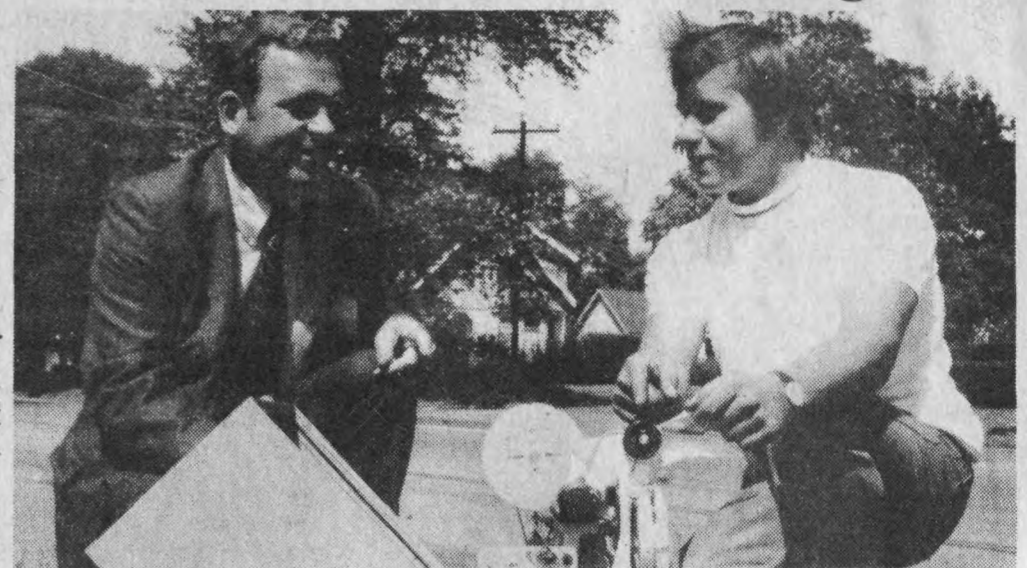

The firm has been retained by the City to prepare a citywide traffic study, so federal funds may be obtained under the "Traffic Operations Program Increasing the Capacity for Safety" (TOPICS) which will pay for 50% of all recommended improvements.

### Voynik: Dems Flubbed Bramhall During 1965

Pointing to a release issued by local Democratic council candidates charging that the assessment for the re-paving of Bramhall Road has been "mismanaged" by the present council, 3rd Ward Councilman Richard J. Voynik, in whose Ward Bramhall Road lies, noted this week that "when this fiasco took place in 1965, seven of the nine members now on council were still nearly two and, in some cases, four years away from taking office."

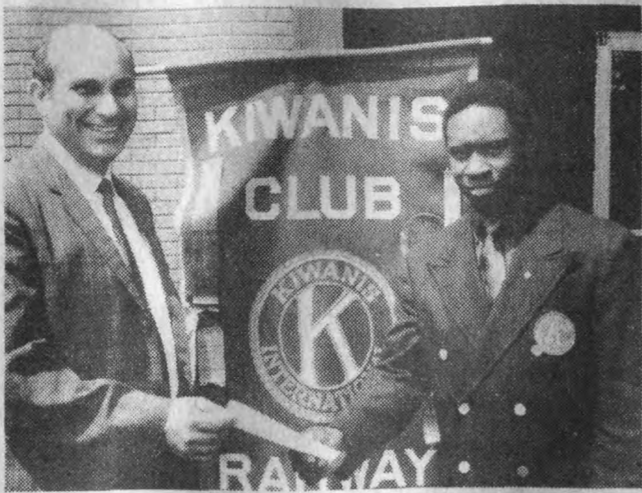
Voynik, who succeeded Democrat James Kinneally, Jr. in January of 1969, has been involved in efforts to bring relief to Bramhall Road residents who were told, prior to the road improvement, that they could look for an assessment of roughly \$8 per front foot and wound up with a bill for \$22.43.

"When I inherited this problem" Voynik explained, "it was an incredible ball of yarn. No responsible public official is going to step into office and blithely hand out road improvement bills for \$14 more than the original front foot estimate. I began digging into contracts and probing the minutes of meetings in an effort to come up with answers, and more important, to come up with a way to relieve the burden looming before these residents."

"So far," Voynik went on, "it's taken almost two years, and I think we're finally on our way to a solution. Council members on both sides of the aisle have been extremely cooperative, particularly the at-large members. Now, at this late date, we don't need any anxious candidates emerging from the shadows to smear the issue with campaign glop. Particularly, we don't need a member (Editor's Note: Charles Crowell) of the 1965 council who had a chance to show his stuff at the time, returning to the scene blaming this council for the blunder of five years ago. I think the least the fellows from Union who were hired to run the campaign for the Democratic candidates can do, is to let the boys in on the fact that the administration at the time is now a shadowy memory."

Voynik concluded, "I believe in continuity of government from one administration to another, but continuity of blame for havoc created in years gone by is a little hard to take."

### Bramhall Bomb Is Democratic Bungle, Giacobbe Claims

Councilman-at-Large Ray A. Giacobbe said this week that reference by Democrat candidates for council to what he called the "big bungle of 1965" spotlights failure by those in power at the time to take advantage of potential state aid relief for Rahway taxpayers.

"You would think that Bramhall Road would be the last thing the Democrats would want to talk about at election time," Councilman Giacobbe declared. "However, I'm delighted that they've brought the matter to the public because their accusation serves to point up the fumbling and bumbling by a council, of which one member was Charles Crowell, who now seeks to pass the blame to us."

Giacobbe went on to say, "Almost as surprising as what happened in 1965, is what didn't happen. A lackluster administration and council missed out on what might have been as much as \$200,000 worth of state aid relief for Bramhall Road residents."

Giacobbe went on to explain that this year, Rahway will receive \$50,000 in extraordinary state aid for the paving of Hamilton Street.

"We will get the same amount next year to finish the job," he explained. "Bramhall Road, because it is the boundary line between Rahway and Woodbridge, qualifies for aid from the state from applications by both cities. If there had been a two-year grant of \$100,000 each to both cities, \$100,000 worth of relief would have been available, even after the incredible bungling of the job. The Democratic administration on hand at the time failed to get a nickel. Now, fantastic as it may seem, they return to blame the mess they created on this council."

Giacobbe pointed to a number of state grants which have lessened the local burden and led to an over-all improvement in the condition of Rahway streets. "We've received \$10,000 for the paving of East Lincoln Avenue which has made possible the new Industrial Park now under construction across Route No. 1. We have obtained \$25,000 for the paving of Barnet Street and will get the same amount again next year. East Inman Avenue was paved with 90% of the cost being picked up by the state. And, with the county picking up the bill, Grand Street and Scott Avenue have just been paved. Occasionally, it takes hard work and imagination to find the money and to return it to the pockets of our taxpayers," Giacobbe declared. "However, there are no secrets about it. The state wasn't hiding anything from the 1965 administration. The Democrats just didn't do the job we are doing now."

"It begins to look as though public officials will have to spend the next two months correcting the accidental and intentional campaign mistakes generated by the out-of-town campaign planners hired by the local Democrat candidates," Giacobbe observed.

### Immediate Hearing On Appeal Denied

A request for an immediate hearing and determination of an appeal before the State Commissioner of Education, Carl Marburger, lodged by the Concerned Citizens for a Constructive Community (CCCC) was denied by the Assistant Commissioner of Education, Lawrence Anderson, a reliable source informed The News-Record.

A hearing date of Oct. 15 was said to have been set. Leo Kahn, attorney for the board, was unavailable for comment.

### Major Encroachments In River Are Detailed

To clarify just what constitutes a major river encroachment, Howard E. Baker, president of the Rahway Citizens for Flood Control, Inc., explained this week that his group is working for the removal of excessive mass fill in the Rahway River and its tributaries.

"When we speak of major encroachments, we do not mean the decorative stone walls on other protective measures to prevent erosion of soil and more river blockage. These constructions that are right on the natural river line are not major encroachments; in fact, the owners of these properties have actually performed a service by trying to hold this river line," said Baker, who pointed out that encroachment lines are specified by the state Division of Water Policy and Supply in Trenton.

"What we're after are the persons found guilty of constructing huge concrete walls way out into the river bed and then filling in behind these walls to create land that doesn't rightfully belong to them. When you're out 20 feet or more into the river channel, you're contributing to flooding. There are state laws against such encroachment, and now we have a couple of city ordinances, too, if city officials will care to enforce these laws."

Baker said that approximately two-thirds of Robinson's Branch, between Church and Irving Sts., has major encroachments that have reduced the stream width to about 20 feet where the state claims there should be 60 feet in width. The RCFC said this river blockage is inexcusable and occurred "under the very eyes" of local officials.

"We have a \$1,000,000 federal fund waiting for us, if we remove these major encroachments. There is no excuse for delay, and we are exerting every possible means to reach this goal. No comprehensive flood control improvements can be undertaken while these river encroachments exist. Also, there must be local legislation and supervision to prevent such river blockage in the future."

## Youth Tells Martin To Keep Politics Out of Old Post Office

Speaking on behalf of some 50 young people who have been cleaning, painting and polishing Rahway's old Post Office building on Esterbrook Ave., having received permission from Mayor John Marsh to use the structure as a youth center, George Coughlin, 18, of 431 Bramhall Rd., Rahway, had harsh words for Democratic Mayoral Candidate Daniel L. Martin this week.

Last week, Martin issued a release charging that Marsh intended to expel the boys from the building. Coughlin has responded by announcing that he and his friends "have no interest in politics" and that the group is "pretty sore" at what Coughlin referred to as Martin's "boloney."

"He's made it pretty clear what he's trying to do," said young Coughlin. "He's trying to play games, discredit Mr. Marsh and make us the fall guys. After what he said, he's going to look pretty bad if we're not kicked out of the building. How else is he going to be able to show he was right? So," Coughlin concluded, "guess what he's going to be trying to do."

Marsh explained that he had been approached at his home one evening in late July by a group of six or seven teenage boys who told him that they were "sick and tired of being chased from street corners, parking lots, playgrounds and other places," and they were seeking some acceptable location to meet. He gave the boys permission to use the Esterbrook Avenue building, and at the same time, embarked on a plan to provide supervision, planned activities and possible financing through state offices for what eventually might develop into a permanent youth center for Rahway's teenagers.

Martin's claim that Marsh would eject the teenagers was based on the premise that Marsh has held discussions with the board of education concerning the possibility of converting the building into a vocational center. Marsh has answered that he is investigating the possibility of housing both programs under the same roof, since the times required for each do not overlap.

"Clearly," said Marsh, "the best interest of the taxpayers means maximum utilization of the building. If we are successful in establishing a vocational training activity under board of education supervision, the time

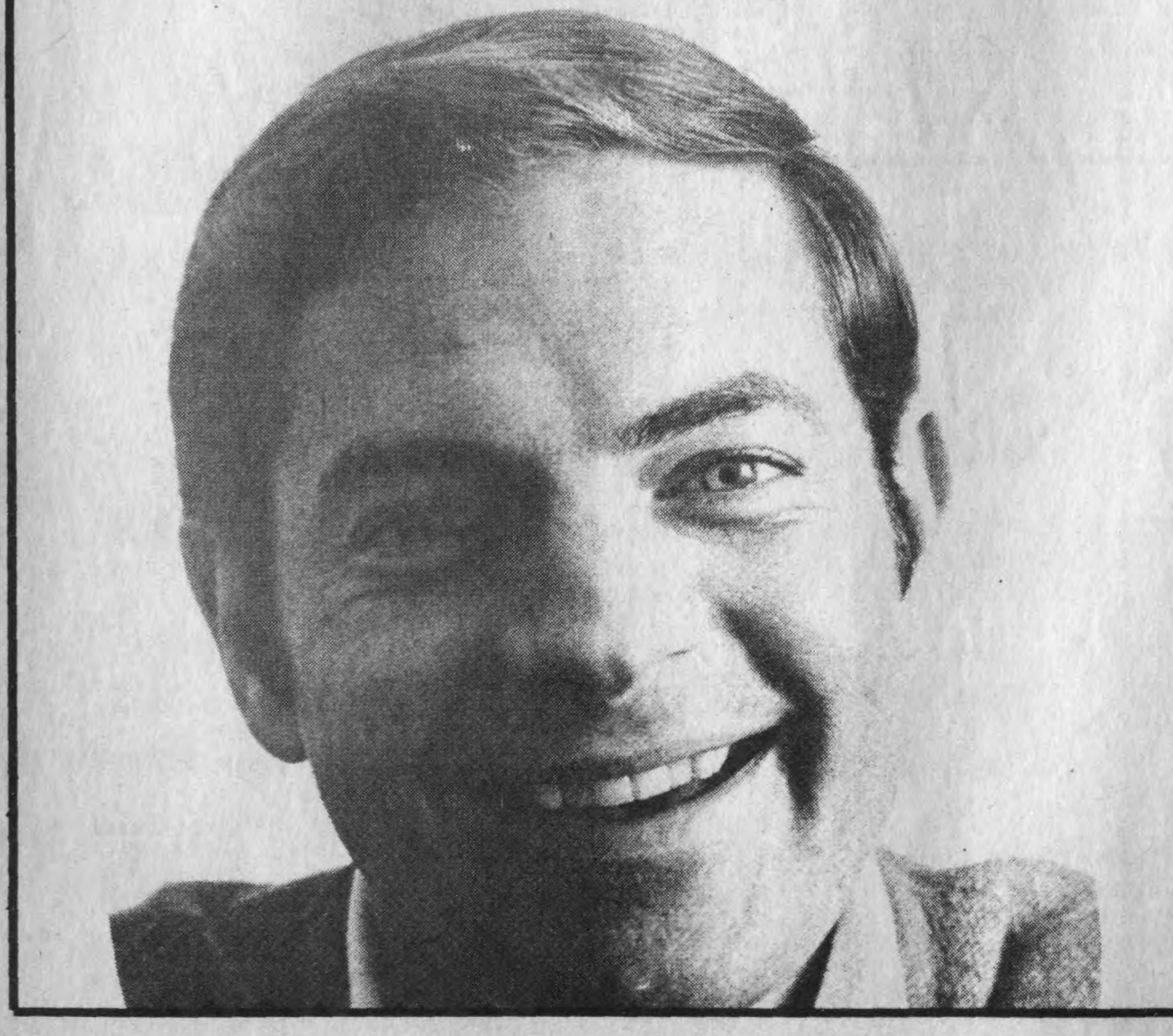

# Marsh Running Scared, Mayor Marsh Reviews the Progress of Recreation During His Administration

## Not on Issues: O'Donnell

ard Gritschke have done by such a splendid job of planning and administering. That program is one we've worked hard on, and it is the result of much trial and error, and most effective in the state for a town of our size."

Marsh said that his involvement with recreational interests in the city have not been limited to those activities which appear on the city budget.

"I've made it my business to be active in all parts of the city, making sure that no stone is left unturned in our effort to give our kids what they need and deserve. Short-

ly after I took office in 1967," Marsh said, "I helped the JFK Center build itself from nothing into one of the community's most important assets. Soon we will dedicate a new JFK building on the same site built entirely through citizen effort and corporate support. Programs operated from there include summer day camp and day trip activities, government training, draft information, help for the handicapped, and athletic training and a score of programs directed at youth development."

"There's no flurry in Rahway," said Marsh. 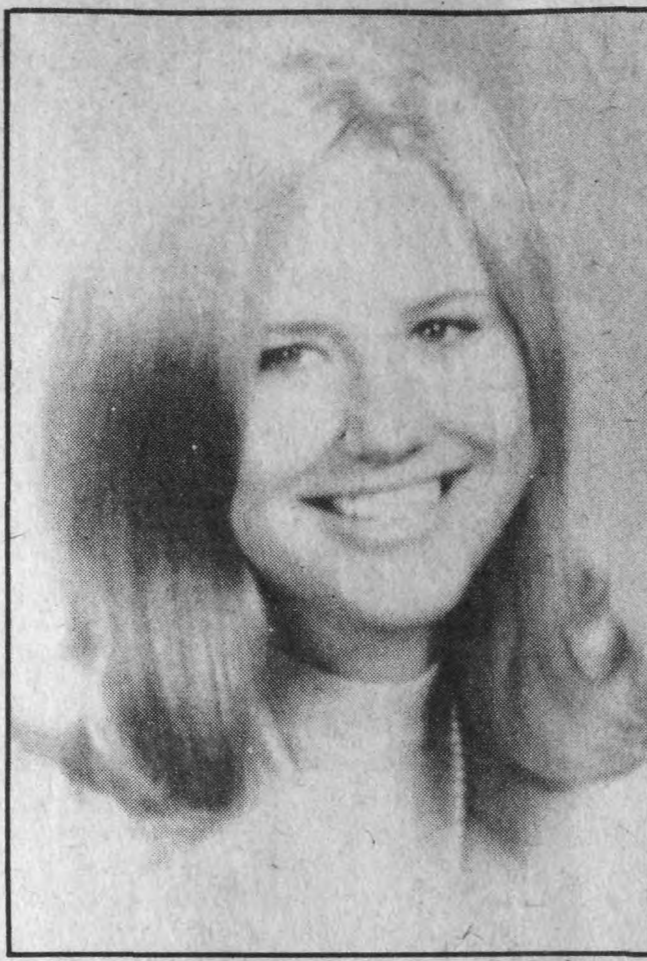

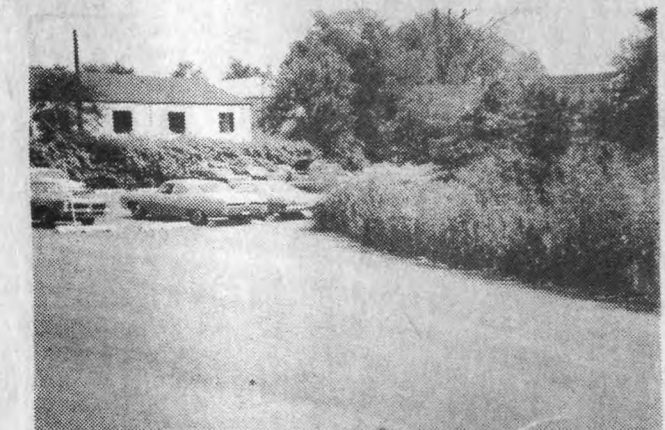

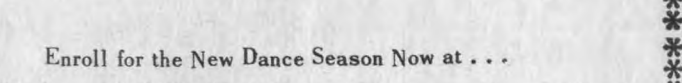

## Yancheff at QB; 68 Knights Drill

Coach John Bateman of Rutgers University is working 68 players twice a day as the Scarlet Knights prepare for their opening game with Lafayette at home on Saturday, Sept. 19.

Early-morning workouts begin at 7:30 in an effort to beat the heat. Afternoon workouts start at 4 p.m. for specialists - mostly kickers - and at 4:30 for others.

Bateman, starting his 11th season on the Banks of the Old Raritan, has 22 lettermen in camp. The positions which will require the most analysis will be split end and linebacking. Steve Ferrughelli, the 6-2, 228-pound fullback from Belleville, is expected to lead the running attack. He picked up 545 yards last year despite missing two games with an ankle injury.

The Rutgers quarterback will be Mike Yancheff, a 6-3, 210-pound senior. His back-

up man probably will be a sophomore, Leo Gasienica of Garfield.

Larry Robertson, a junior, is expected to assume the heavy running burden at tailback, where Bruce VanNess started last season.

Bob Naso, defensive coordinator, expects to keep careful watch on Bob Coppola of Cedar Grove and Andy Malekoff of Maplewood, who were the leading candidates in spring practice for the inside linebacking assignment.

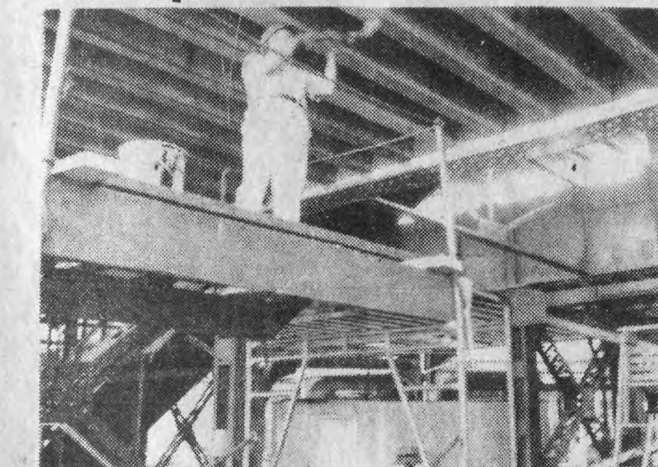

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**  
Amend Article VIII, Section 1, paragraph 4, to read as follows:  
4. The Legislature may, from time to time, enact laws granting an annual deduction from the amount of any tax bill for taxes on the real property of any citizen and resident of this State of the age of 65 or more years residing in a dwelling house owned by him which is a constituent part of such real property but no such deduction shall be in excess of \$160.00 and such deduction shall be restricted to owners having an income exclusive of social security benefits not in excess of \$5,000 per year. Any such deduction when so granted by law shall be granted so that it will not in addition to any other deduction or exemption to which the said citizen and resident may be entitled. The State shall annually reimburse each taxing district in an amount equal to 1/2 of the tax loss to the district resulting from the allowance of tax deductions pursuant to this paragraph.  
2. When this proposed amendment to the Constitution is finally agreed to, pursuant to Article IX, paragraph 1 of the Constitution, it shall be submitted to the people at the next general election occurring more than 3 months after such final agreement and shall be published at least once in at least one newspaper of each county designated by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly and the Secretary of State, not less than 3 months prior to said general election.  
3. This proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the people at said election in the following manner and form:  
There shall be printed on each official ballot to be used at such general election, the following:  
1. In every municipality in which voting machines are not used, a legend which shall immediately precede the question, as follows:  
If you favor the proposition below make a cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "Yes." If you are opposed thereto make cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "No."  
2. In every municipality the following question:

**SENIOR CITIZEN TAX DEDUCTION INCREASE AND STATE TO SHARE COST**  
Yes. Shall the amendment of Article VIII, Section 1, paragraph 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey granting an annual deduction not to exceed \$160.00 from the tax bill for taxes on real property as residents of the age of 65 or more years instead of the aggregate assessed valuation of such real property, and providing for 1/2 of such deduction to be reimbursed to municipalities by the State of New Jersey, be approved?

(a) Every citizen of the United States, of the age of 19 years, who shall have been a resident of this State 6 months and of the county in which he claims his vote 40 days next before the election, shall be entitled to vote for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elective by the people, and upon all questions which may be submitted to a vote of the people; and  
(b) Every citizen of the United States, of the age of 19 years, who shall have been a resident of the State and of the county in which he claims his vote 40 days, next before the election and who shall not be eligible to vote elsewhere, shall be entitled to qualify and to vote for electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, only, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide;  
(c) Any person registered as a voter in any election district of this State who has removed or shall remove to another State or to another county within this State and is not able there to qualify to vote by reason of an insufficient period of residence in such State or county, shall, as a citizen of the United States, have the right to vote for electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, only, by Presidential Elector Absentee Ballot, in the county from which he has removed, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide.  
2. When this proposed amendment to the Constitution is finally agreed to pursuant to Article IX, paragraph 1 of the Constitution, it shall be submitted to the people at the next general election occurring more than 3 months after such final agreement and shall be published at least once in at least one newspaper of each county designated by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly and the Secretary of State, not less than 3 months prior to said general election.  
3. This proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the people at said election in the following manner and form:  
There shall be printed on each official ballot to be used at such general election, the following:  
1. In every municipality in which voting machines are not used, a legend which shall immediately precede the question, as follows:  
If you favor the proposition printed below make a cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "Yes." If you are opposed thereto make cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "No."  
2. In every municipality the following question:

Yes. Shall Article II, paragraph 3 of the Constitution be amended so as to change the age qualifications of a voter from 21 to 19 years?

Be it Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):  
1. The following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Jersey is hereby agreed to:  
**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**  
Amend Article II, paragraph 3, to read as follows:  
3. (a) Every citizen of the United States, of the age of 19 years, who shall have been a resident of this State 6 months and of the county in which he claims his vote 40 days next before the election, shall be entitled to vote for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elective by the people, and upon all questions which may be submitted to a vote of the people; and  
(b) Every citizen of the United States, of the age of 19 years, who shall have been a resident of the State and of the county in which he claims his vote 40 days, next before the election and who shall not be eligible to vote elsewhere, shall be entitled to qualify and to vote for electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, only, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide;  
(c) Any person registered as a voter in any election district of this State who has removed or shall remove to another State or to another county within this State and is not able there to qualify to vote by reason of an insufficient period of residence in such State or county, shall, as a citizen of the United States, have the right to vote for electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, only, by Presidential Elector Absentee Ballot, in the county from which he has removed, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide.  
2. When this proposed amendment to the Constitution is finally agreed to pursuant to Article IX, paragraph 1 of the Constitution, it shall be submitted to the people at the next general election occurring more than 3 months after such final agreement and shall be published at least once in at least one newspaper of each county designated by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly and the Secretary of State, not less than 3 months prior to said general election.  
3. This proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the people at said election in the following manner and form:  
There shall be printed on each official ballot to be used at such general election, the following:  
1. In every municipality in which voting machines are not used, a legend which shall immediately precede the question, as follows:  
If you favor the proposition printed below make a cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "Yes." If you are opposed thereto make cross (X), plus (+) or check (✓) in the square opposite the word "No."  
2. In every municipality the following question:

Yes. Shall Article II, paragraph 3 of the Constitution be amended so as to change the age qualifications of a voter from 21 to 19 years?
