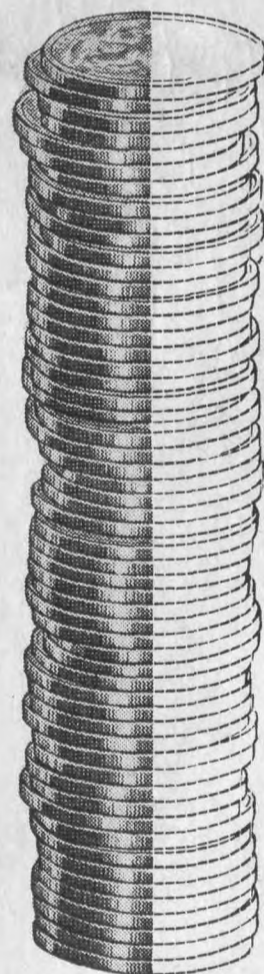

# Banks Distribute Tickets for Lottery

New Jersey banks will serve as distribution and redemption centers for state lottery tickets, it was announced today by Ralph F. Barch, executive director of the State Lottery Commission.

Under arrangements with the commission, the banks will distribute the lottery tickets to licensed agents for sale to the public and also will pay the prizes to those holding winning ticket numbers.

Among the first banks to cooperate with the commission, Barch said, are the New Jersey National Bank and the Trenton Trust Company, both of Trenton, and the First National State Bank of New Jersey, Fidelity Union Trust Company and the National Newark and Essex Bank, all of Newark.

Barch said a total of 50 to 60 banks in key locations throughout the state, together with from 250 to 300 branches, will participate in the program.

It is expected that when the weekly state lottery is in full operation that tickets will be sold through 3,000 licensed agents with anticipated sales of a million tickets weekly.

Here is how the bank-lottery arrangement will operate: Agents will be assigned to a particular bank or bank branch in their area where they will pick up their tickets. A week later the agent will account for all sold tickets at the bank and return unsold tickets. At the same time he will pick up tickets for the following week's lottery.

A "yes" vote on the question would amend the state constitution to increase the present \$80 exemption to \$160 from property taxes for qualified senior citizens.

"Senior citizens who live on fixed incomes suffer unfairly from inflation and rising property taxes. These factors are forcing many to lose their homes. Therefore, we consider it imperative to foster a 'yes' vote," declared James Fulcomer of 384 Raleigh Rd., Rahway, the organization's chairman.

## Let States Set Obscenity Standards

Many parents and other adults are up in arms over the continual stream of pornography which emanates from their television sets as well as from publishing companies, movie screens, and theaters. Too often young people are assigned in school novels or poetry which their parents consider indecent, but which their teachers call "representative of modern literature."

Recent Broadway hits such as "Hair" and "Calcutta" carry indecency to the nth degree and find it profitable. The problem of the movies is closer to home. Young people like to patronize the movies, but how can parents acquiesce when something like "I Am Curious (Yellow)" is showing at the neighborhood theatre?

Smur is big business ... more than a billion dollars annually, and growing at an alarming rate. The most modern techniques are used to produce and distribute tons of unspeakably perverted films and printed matter aimed mainly at the teenage market.

Yes, it is big business, and getting bigger because (1) It is extremely profitable to produce a dollar paperback at a cost of 15¢-20¢, and (2) Recent Supreme Court decisions have been so permissive that the smut producers feel they are no longer under restraint.

A Gallup Poll shows that 76 per cent of the American people want tougher laws on obscenity. Various volunteer groups have taken up the cudgels on behalf of the American public, including Morality in Media, 1256 Lexington Ave., New York City; MOTOREDE (Move To Restore Decency), Belmont, Mass.; Citizens for Decent Literature, of which Raymond P. Gauer of Los Angeles, Calif., is National Director; and Youth for Decency Crusade, 4723 Richmond Ave., Houston, Texas. All these groups would appreciate help in terms of money and workers.

Any society that goes in for pornography and perversion on a large scale is on the way out. That is the judgement of history. J. Edgar Hoover, FBI Director, says: "It is impossible to estimate the amount of harm to impressionable teenagers and to assess the volume of sex crimes attributable to pornography, but its influence is extensive."

The most workable solution to the obscenity problem is believed to be Senate Bill 1077 introduced by the late Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, which would remove from the Supreme Court jurisdiction in findings of fact in obscenity cases and restore this jurisdiction to the individual state courts. Removal of appellate jurisdiction from the Supreme Court is authorized by Article III, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution, which states that appellate jurisdiction belongs to the Supreme Court in all areas except as limited by Congress.

Congressman John Ashbrook has introduced the same bill in the House of Representatives as H.R. 7201. If and when these bills are passed, the decision on what is obscene will rest with the juries of the individual states. Each community will have the right to prohibit what, in its community judgment, is considered obscene. Thus, if the citizens of California are willing to allow hard core pornography on their newsstands, they will have it. But if Texas or New Jersey or Illinois wishes to maintain a higher level of morality, it will be allowed to do so. At present, all fifty states are forced to accept the morality of the least fastidious state.

Moreover, with the state courts directly and finally responsible in decisions on pornography, the citizens can exert pressure within the state to outlaw smut. As Senator Dirksen wrote in the Reader's Digest of November, 1969, "The United States is overwhelmed with smut. Like some medieval plague, the mounting flow of obscene books, films and magazines surrounds us, threatening our national health." He cited a "multi-million - dollar printing factory in Phoenix, Ariz., which keeps its presses rolling 24 hours a day, five days a week, turning out 35,000 lewd books each day."

The way to make sure that S. 1077 and H. R. 7201 are enacted into law is for every concerned citizen and organization to write his Congressman and his two Senators expressing outrage at the filth now engulfing the land and urging their active support of these two measures. If you do not know the names of your Congressman and Senators, call this newspaper. If you will not bother even to write three postcards, you may blame yourself for the obscenity crisis.

Now that we have reconciled ourselves to the new Rahway tax rate of \$10.56, a 58-point increase over the 1969 rate, it is timely to analyze the new rate to see just how much more than \$10.56 per \$100 of assessed valuation we are actually paying by the way of hidden taxes.

The present administration transferred \$325,000 from surplus in the water department account to the general municipal account in the 1970 budget. This represents 54 tax points. Therefore, this item alone actually increases the 1970 tax rate from \$10.56 to \$11.10. Instead of leaving the \$325,000 in the water account where it was generated by sale of water and using it for improvement of the water plant, the administration passed an ordinance authorizing the borrowing of over \$2,000,000 for the water plant improvement.

In less than four years the present administration passed ordinances authorizing the borrowing of more than \$4,000,000. This represents more than 708 tax points that will have to be picked up by the taxpayers in the future. There is hardly a thing, large or small, that the administration has purchased for cash. All of this money that is borrowed must be paid back with interest.

In addition to all of this deficit spending, the admin-

istration has substantially increased our water rates. This is another form of taxation. They have increased the fees on all permits, including plumbing, electrical permits, etc. The administration has even invoked a fee for the erection of a fence around our homes.

Add all of these hidden taxes to our present tax bill and you can readily see that the tax rate of \$10.56, which the administration boasts about as being a low rate, is a fictitious rate and the tax rate is in fact well over \$13.

It is quite ironical to note that although the administration is spending at this increased rate, the services rendered to the public have decreased.

Many streets in the city have not been swept for weeks at a time. To add to the irony of it all, the administration in a last-minute bid to perpetuate itself in office, with use of the taxpayers' money, is now operating two street sweeping machines on Saturdays, at time and one half pay for the operators. This is a willful waste of the taxpayers' money.

If you did a bit of sweating to scrape the money together to pay your present tax bill, you will really work up a high fever when you have to pay subsequent tax bills that will include the repayment of all of the money, plus interest, that the present administration has borrowed.

If this type of administration is to continue, the taxpayers of Rahway will be forced into a position of insolvency.

This article may assist the voters of Rahway to determine their course on election day, Nov. 3, 1970.

## Orchard Street Brook Flood Control Work Proceeds And Advances in Basin and Other Projects Are Sought

Following last week's helicopter inspection of potential flood hazards along the Rahway River and its tributaries, Mayor John C. Marsh and Council President William M. Weaver announced the stepping up of local flood control efforts and the increasing of pressure at state and federal levels in order to hasten implementation of the basin plan the two have urged.

Marsh revealed that he has written to the State Water Policy Commission advising them that within a few weeks the Army Corps of Engineers will have concluded their study of topography and will have submitted their report. Marsh has urged the commission to come to Rahway to examine the study and to join him in mapping out a course of action to expedite removal of encroachments certified in the report.

Weaver said, in the meantime, schedules have been accelerated on programs currently underway to alleviate conditions within the city. "Phase 1 of the Orchard Street Brook widening will be completed this week," said the council president, referring to the program to increase the width of the brook to 25 feet from Jacques Avenue to the culvert which runs underneath the railroad and under New Brunswick Avenue to the river.

"We will begin on phase 2 of this project immediately," said Weaver. "That includes the widening of the brook on the other side of Jacques Avenue on into the 3rd Ward. We plan shortly to talk to the people on Lentz Court in the Madison Avenue area to discuss the possibility of easements in order to widen the brook in that area," Weaver declared.

Mayor Marsh pointed out that he has met on several occasions with the Army Corps of Engineers and with Woodbridge officials to consider the possibility of establishing a water retention basin on the Woodbridge side of Bramhall Road, inasmuch as much of the problem in the area is caused by the fact that millions of gallons of water is dumped into the brook by Woodbridge as a result of one of their own flood control efforts.

"Prospects are promising," said Marsh. "We have several retention basins in mind which we think will be validated by the corps' study. Our helicopter inspection seemed to bear out our contention that both Jackson's and Bloodgood's ponds can be used as retention basins. We took motion pictures of both areas which we feel will be helpful in obtaining the federal grants we are seeking for the purpose," the Mayor explained.

Weaver noted that "the films also seem to indicate many pieces of land jutting into the river. However," said Weaver, "it is impossible to determine which represent actual encroachments until the corps' survey is complete."

Weaver pointed out further at the next meeting of the municipal council action will be taken to eliminate flooding conditions in both the Linden Avenue and lower Alden Drive areas of the 2nd Ward by piping to the river.

"We intend to tackle every phase of this job as vigorously as possible," said Mayor Marsh. "Another part of the program that is going on right now is the clean up program which we intend to be a continuing effort. We're cleaning out under the bridges and underpasses and as soon as our Orchard Street Brook program is complete we will be clearing out silt from various sections of the river and widening the channels wherever it is practical for us to do so. Weaver said that he believes that an announcement will be forthcoming within a matter of days on the south branch project, which will have a dramatic effect upon flooding conditions in the city.

"Flood control is almost always a serious, expensive and frustrating problem," Councilman Weaver declared. Usually, the work that really needs to be done to cure a particular problem costs a great deal of money and benefits a very small number of people.

That doesn't mean you can abandon the problem," he noted. "It simply means that you have to try a little harder and be a little more knowledgeable about how to handle it."

Weaver said that "quick cures and bombast won't do the job. It will always be true in every community with a river that someone will have thrown a shopping cart into it. There will always be a storm sewer somewhere that needs to be cleaned and we do, indeed, need to be attentive and vigilant about these problems. However, let's never lose sight of the fact that in Rahway we are at the bottom of a river basin. Upstream, towns that used to be fields with names are developing rapidly and that means no more natural soaking up of moisture and it means new drainage for the very same old river. To the town at the bottom, it means new flood problems. That's the real monster. What's more, "that's the dragon I'm out to slay," Weaver concluded.

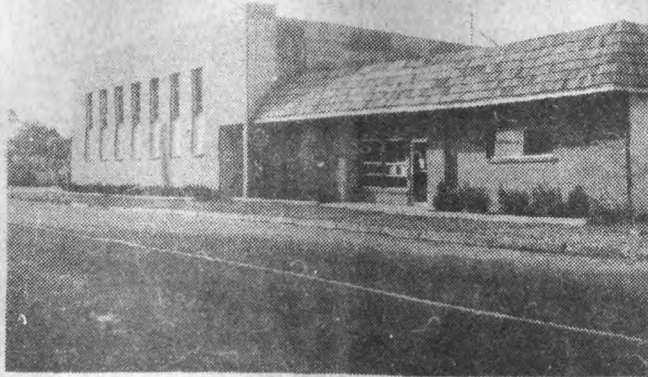
### Donald Mershon Receives Ph.D.

It looks as if the Indians will return home with their fifth in a row, 21-14. In last week's college selections we hit 5 of 7 to increase our season record to 17 - 9.

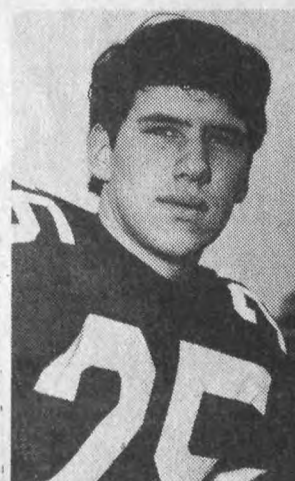

# GOP Backing of 'Cheaper' Piping Is Called 'Attempt to Win Votes'

"The city council has sold Rahway short, and I'm deeply concerned about the motives of men who lower our city's standards." That was Francis "Bud" Senkowsky's comment after the city council meeting last week.

Senkowsky, a Democratic councilman - at - large candidate, was referring to the passing of an ordinance to adopt the plumbing code of the State of New Jersey. All seven Republicans on council voted for the measure.

"When Council legislates to lower our standards for political reasons then it's time to change that council," Senkowsky said. "The dispute which arose in council chambers at the passing of this ordinance should have demonstrated to the council that further consideration was needed." The dispute centered on the fact that Rahway's plumbing code permits only cast-iron sewer pipe, while the state code permits card-board reinforced pipe and asbestos pipe.

Senkowsky said, "a look at the facts shows that the passing of this ordinance was a purely political thing." He contended that "everyone knows that the piping permitted by the state code is cheaper and inferior. In addition, you don't have to pay plumbers to install the inferior pipe."

"Now why would council pass such an ordinance? Obviously to try to push through a deal on redevelopment, make it cheaper for the contractor, get something going by election day, and hopefully win a few votes for those seeking re-election. This is cheap, shady, questionable political maneuvering of the worst sort. It is selling Rahway short in a desperate attempt to win votes."

# Marsh Has Eyes on State Senate, Not on Rahway, Beaugard Says

"Bull." That's the one-word answer given by Wilson D. Beaugard, Democratic candidate for councilman - at - large, when he was asked "what do you think of your opponents' statements regarding redevelopment?"

Beaugard said that the Republicans had "at least count made over 136 promises that high - rise apartments would go up on Main Street. That's what people call bull," he said.

"Everybody knows that redevelopment is a real problem all over the county, but that doesn't give anybody the right to promise false progress. However, that is the attitude of this administration; to throw the bull as far and as wide as possible hoping that it will land on the voting levers over their names."

"We've been talking about real issues," Beaugard asserted. "Why Rahway had riots, and what we're going to do about them. Why taxes go up; how money's being wasted, and what we can do about it. How we can improve city services and put an end to their ghost town on Main Street. But most of all, we've been talking about their willingness to promise anybody anything in order to win votes. That is the disgusting policy of men who care about themselves first and Rahway second."

"Just look at the mayor," Beaugard said. "Up front, he talks about Rahway and behind the scenes he talks about running for the state senate next year. His heart isn't in Rahway any more than his courage was in Rahway when we needed sound, aggressive programs for our youth."

"He has proven beyond a shadow of a doubt that he cares about himself, his publicity, and his own political fortunes much more than

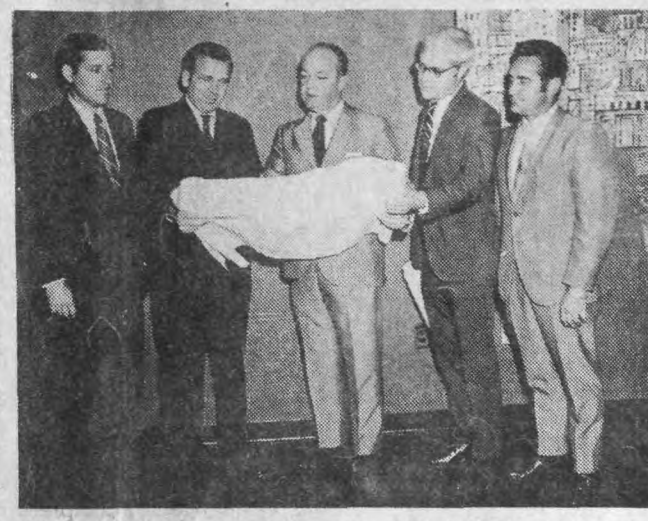
### Cahill Endorses Marsh and GOP Councilmen

Rahway Mayor John C. Marsh and his running mates for re-election in the fast approaching Nov. 3 election, Councilmen - at - Large George J. Vansco, Ray A. Giacobbe, and William M. ### Parrillo Lauds Dem Candidates

Thomas Parrillo, Democratic township chairman, gave his enthusiastic backing to the Democratic councilmanic slate at a meeting of the executive board of the Union County Democratic Committee last week at the Dragon Restaurant in Roselle.

### Marsh and His Runningmates Are Viewed as Anti-Labor by Crowell

Charles E. Crowell, Democratic councilman-at-large candidate, charges this week that his opponents are "blind to the issues in Rahway."

"Week after week," Crowell said, "the Republicans talk about their big business brand of government. They point to walls and buildings, helicopters and statistics as proofs of their accomplishments, but they never cite the real issues in Rahway like tension that has ripped our town apart, like the emptiness and gloom of our downtown. oms in the public works building. They have effectively eliminated plumbers from doing sewer pipe work in Rahway by passing an ordinance to allow non-plumbers to install cheaper piping. They have proven that they are also anti-management by rejecting the talent we have in Rahway, by wasting money, and by cutting the throats of downtown businessmen with a ridiculous tax structure.

"But most of all they have proven that they are anti-people by showing an absolute and total lack of courage in facing Rahway's social problems. When it comes to money, publicity and trying to win votes their eyes are wide open. But when it comes to people and their social and financial needs, their needs for peace, order, and progress, and their needs for security and ability to advance, the city administration has proven itself to be as blind as a bat and as gutless as a field mouse."

"What Rahway really needs is government, by, of, and for the citizens. That's why we've tailored our programs to include and involve the citizens. Just go down the list of our programs, and you'll see that 'people power' is what this election is all about."

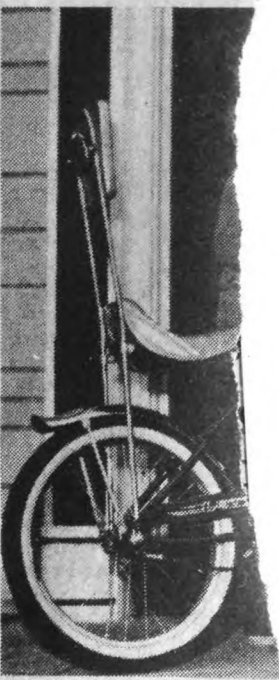

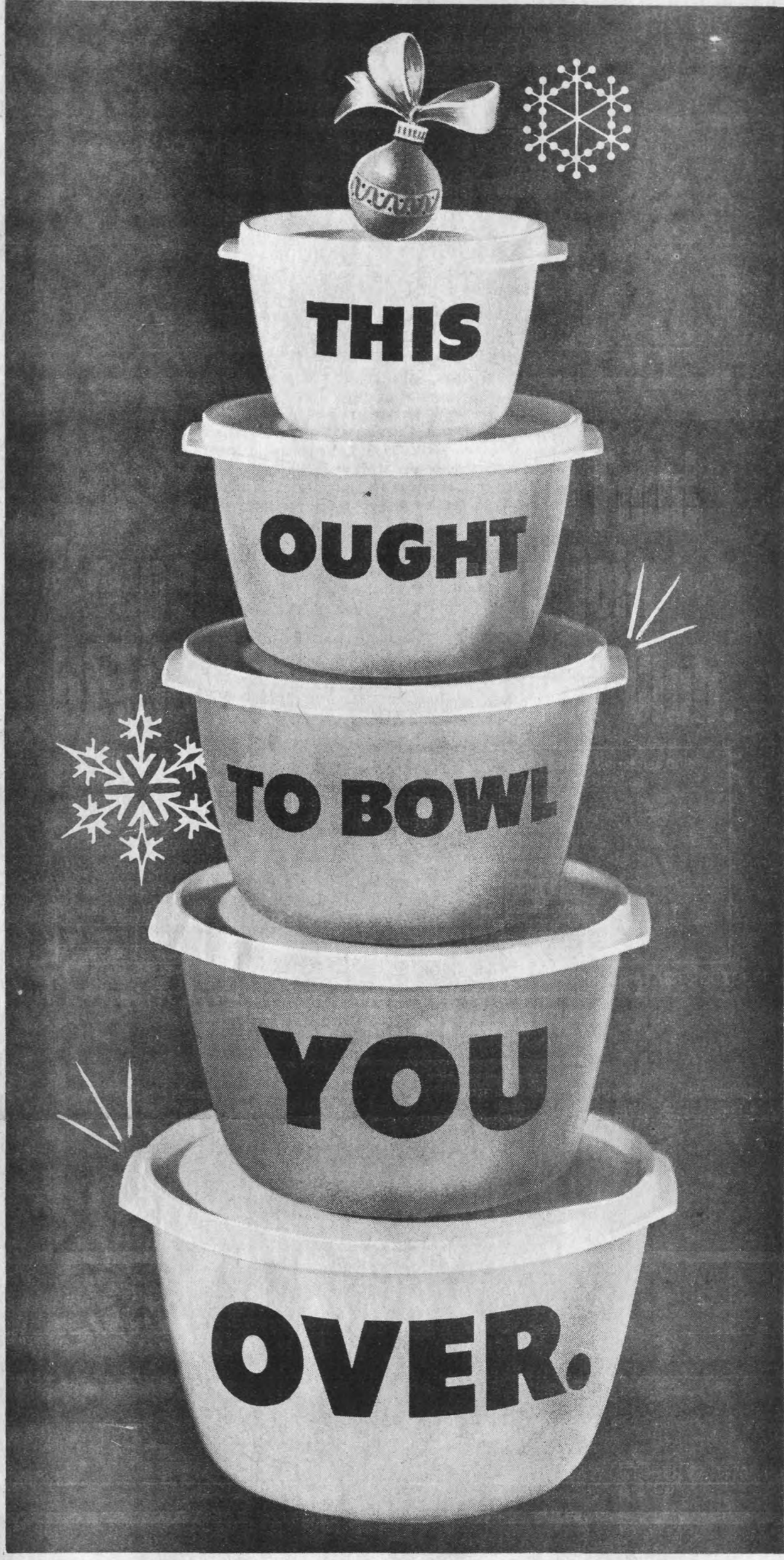

### RCFC Fears Fill Vow Has Gone Down Drain

Although Mayor John C. Marsh announced at the last RCFC meeting that the Rahway council would consider the passage of an RCFC - proposed fill ordinance at the October session, the flood - preventive legislation was absent from the agenda, members of the Rahway Citizens for Flood Control, Inc., noted.

This activist group requested earlier this year the need to control obstructive filling of river and streams, suggesting legislation by the city regarding a permit for any pick-up or delivery of any kind of fill and establishing a minimum - to - maximum fine for such transgressions. It is possible that persons allowing such filling or dumping on their own property may also be held responsible.

Stephanie Cedervall, RCFC secretary, reported sending a letter to city business manager, Sidney Stone, dated last June 23, requesting the appointment of a committee on ordinances to improve waterways as an arm of the city administration to study the matter and exercise municipal authority as granted and recommended by state law. With the letter, a copy of amended laws of 1938, Title 58, Chapter 229, Section 40: 50-1 R. S. of the Revised Statutes was enclosed. These state laws not only give local municipalities the right, but also recommend action to improve waterways.

Howard E. Baker, RCFC chairman, said that Marsh has repeatedly chided the group for getting their own legal advisor, George F. Bartell, and offered assistance of city lawyers. "Why is it so difficult for the city legal staff to formulate workable flood - control ordinances? It is the city, itself,

that should be represented by an attorney at upcoming Trenton hearings on our encroachment complaints.

"The flood - control we ask is for the fit of the entire city, a group. The city should pass laws so that officials do legally." For when Sisto Bros. cleared a block - sized land off Robinson's on St. Georges Ave. last summer, there should have been an ordinance giving the city the right to stop filling in a flood basin without delay. As it is, they responded to our complaint by issuing a stop - order in a couple of hours."

Other RCFC spokesmen expressed surprise on council inaction on fill ordinance "especially after the recent helicopter survey and mayor's comments about dumping in the river and streams. Martin Chomsky, Rahway health director, who participated, never issued any statement on health hazards of flooding or inadequate sewer drainage, as far as we know. Our group asked for advice on safety and health related to flooding, but no response."

All candidates are invited by the RCFC to speak on the flood problem when the group meets on Monday night, Nov. 2, Election Day, at St. Mark's Church Hall, 8 p.m.

"Our group is non-partisan. We will prod for action, as approved by state and federal authorities, whether Mayor John C. Marsh is re-elected or Daniel L. Martin takes over. We've started flood - control machinery, and would like to see the next administration keep it moving."

## Water Rate Increase Permits Rehaul of 1871 Plant And Still Preserves Lowest Rate in N.J., Marsh Says

"When I first became Mayor of the City of Rahway, I faced a decision which I knew would, in one way or another, alter the future of this community," said Mayor John Marsh in a statement issued this week.

"Our city had a water plant which was built in 1871 and on which not one major improvement had been made since the day it was completed."

ed. Like so many problems in our city which had evolved out of the unwillingness of timid public officials to address themselves to controversial subjects, our water plant had simply been ignored.

"Our water rates," continued the Mayor, "were so low as to prohibit any meaningful improvement in our plant or other facilities. A survey had been made on the subject which indicated that either Rahway undertake a major modernization of its water plant facilities or get out of the water business. That was the decision we had to make," the mayor declared.

"Among the things we had to consider with regard to this decision," said Marsh, "was the fact that we were buying an inordinantly high amount of water from Elizabethtown Water Company at extremely high rates. Our plan for the city, as we saw it in 1967 and as it has come true in 1970, called for an increase in industrial rates of \$10 million. Our 10-year projection also included the redevelopment program, a \$25 million housing project. This means that we were looking down the throat of a water volume requirement that would quadruple in 10 years. We could either respond to this problem by going out of the water business at a time when rates for outside water were extremely high and promising to go higher, or we could raise our rates -- for the first time in 13 years -- to a point which would permit us to finance the cost of modernizing our plant, thus to stay in the water business and thus to provide our taxpayers with another means of relieving his tax burden."

Tuy Hoa AB, Republic of Vietnam (7AF) -- D-Day began with a 3:45 a.m. wake-up for the 12 pilots who were to launch their F-100 Super Sabres at dawn to begin an 8,000-mile trans-Pacific flight to the United States.

Standdown of the wing's aircraft had meant no lessening of work for airmen and officers supporting the mission. Each aircraft had to be in first-rate condition in every respect for the long, tedious flight home.

Maintenance personnel had worked around the clock, performing phase inspections, calibrating jet engines, running oil consumption tests and ground checking air refueling systems. Quality control shakedown of all systems were made. Also required was some modification of electronic equipment and of fuel drop tanks.

# United States Day Observance Asked

Charging that "the anti-American activities of the radical left receive far too much publicity and attention in our nation today," Chester Kniazuk, chairman of the Union County T.R.A.I.N. Committee, said this week that the group has asked the mayors of Union County to celebrate tomorrow as United States Day.

Kniazuk pointed out that "today in our nation almost daily the American flag, symbol of our freedom and independence under God, is spat upon, torn, burned and otherwise desecrated." He called upon all citizens to support United States Day by flying their flags next Friday.

A petition to President Nixon, asking him to use his high office to see that all aid from this country to our Communist enemies is promptly halted. Petition booths will be established in front of many businesses over the weekend. Copies of the petition are available from the committee, Mr. Kniazuk stated.

The petition, which is published in the form of an open letter to the President, declares that the Soviet Union and its allies, which supply more than 80 per cent of the war materials to North Vietnam, are still receiving millions of dollars in aid and trade from the United States every month.

"Without this support," Kniazuk claimed, "the Communists could not possibly export revolution to Vietnam. We are simply asking President Nixon to abide by his campaign promise not to aid the suppliers of North Vietnam. It doesn't make sense to tax the American people on one hand, to pay for goods shipped to the Communists, and have to fight them on the other."

Recognizing the need for greater health care and research facilities to aid the fight against multiple sclerosis, Daniel F. Lundy called for the federal government to release funds from the recently - appropriated Hill - Burton Construction Bill to aid the Allen Welkind Memorial Hospital for Multiple Sclerosis and Associated Neurological Conditions in northern New Jersey. Lundy, Democratic congressional candidate in the 12th District, made his remarks after a meeting with Harry Bleiberg, vice president of the local chapter of the multiple sclerosis association.

## Nixon's Trip Is Viewed As Aiding Gross's Run

President Nixon's visit to New Jersey last Saturday in behalf of Nelson Gross represented the President's most recent contribution in a campaign-long effort to elect the Republican candidate to the U.S. Senate.

The President came into New Jersey as part of a four-state sweep into key election campaign areas. After landing at Newark Airport, he went to Bergen County and Central New Jersey for rallies to boost Gross' candidacy. Mr. Nixon's talks stressed the importance of voting next month to elect a Republican senator.

Both polls indicated Williams was the preference of 36 per cent of the voters, while Gross had closed to within four points. Independent candidates received three per cent, with 29 per cent undecided.

"I am convinced that the majority of New Jersey voters are satisfied with President Nixon's leadership," Gross declared, "and that they will send me to Washington to give the type of support to the President's programs that they voted for in 1968."

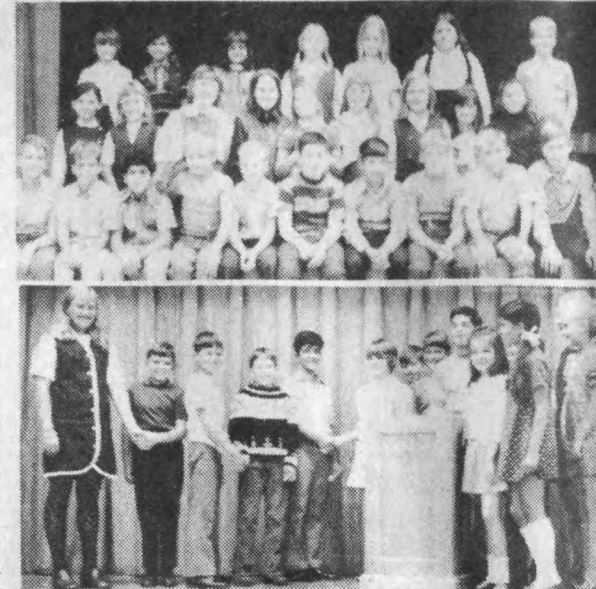
