Swintek, Bakum to Seek 3-Year Board Terms At Election on Feb. 8

John Swintek, president of the Clark Board of Education, and Walter A. Bakum, member of the board for 18 years, announced this week that they will be candidates for reelection to three-year terms at the annual school election on Tuesday, Feb. 8.

Robert H. Salvesen, another member whose term will expire in February, said earlier this month that he will seek reelection to the board. Mr. Salvesen, a resident of 30 Runnymede Road, is completing his third three-year term.

Mr. Bakum, who resides at 579 Valley Road, filed

his petition of nomination with Ronald Smith, board secretary and business administrator, on Tuesday night. Mr. Bakum said that he is running for a seventh term because he would like to give what assistance he could in the selection of a superintendent of schools to succeed the late Dr. Carl H. Kumpf. The selection of a superintendent is important, Mr. Bakum declared, noting that Dr. Kumpf did "an outstanding job."

Mr. Swintek, who resides at 37 Post Road, is serving his sixth year as president of the board. He has been a member for 13 years.

Th voters are to select four members at the annual election. Three are to be elected to three-year terms and one to a one-year unexpired term.

The candidate elected for the unexpired term will fill a vacancy on the board caused by the resignation on Nov. 30 of Harold A. Syvertsen of 104 Sunrise Drive. Mr. Syvertsen, who would have completed five years as a board member in February, resigned because his duties at the Humble Oil and Refining Company in Linden, where he is employed, will make it impossible for him to attend a sufficient number of board meetings.

The polls will be open between 1 and 9 p.m. on Feb. 8. In addition to electing four members, the voters will cast their ballots for or against the proposed 1972-73 school budget during the annual election.

The board at its meeting on Tuesday night in its offices on Schindler Road appointed election workers. The board set \$14 as the amount to be paid each worker at the polls.

Council Raises Karl Kummer's Salary to \$3,180

The salary of Plumbing Inspector Karl Kummer was increased by \$3,000 to \$3,180 a year by a resolution adopted by the Clark Municipal Council at its special meeting last week in the Municipal Building. The vote was unanimous.

Council President A. Charles Walano explained that the salary increase is the result of negotiations conducted by the township with Union Council No. 8, Civil Service Association, and that the plumbing inspector is entitled to the larger salary.

The Council voted to retain Morris Barnett, attorney for the Board of Education, to assist Director of Law John P. Higgins in the preparation of the necessary legal documents for the Dec. 20 meeting of Council and the organization meeting on Jan. 1. Mr. Barnett will receive up to \$300 for the work. The fee will be paid from the extraordinary legal services account.

The vote was 6-1 with Councilman Bernard Yarusavage opposed. Councilman Yarusavage stated that he believes the action is in conflict with the administrative code even though he feels Mr. Higgins needs the assistance.

Council President Walano said that Mr. Higgins has been involved in court appearances as the result of legal actions involving the municipality that he would not be able to complete the necessary work for the two meetings.

Philip Foster Appointed As Acting Superintendent

Philip Foster, principal of Carl H. Kumpf School, Clark, has been appointed acting superintendent of the Clark elementary schools by the Board of Education. It was announced at Tuesday night's board meeting in the offices on Schindler Road.

Mr. Foster was named at a special meeting to replace John E. Conlin, principal of Frank K. Hehly School, who was selected to be acting superintendent at the Sept. 21 meeting. Dr. Carl H. Kumpf, superintendent for nine years, died on Sept. 14. He had announced that he would retire at the end of the 1971-72 school year, June 30.

Appointment of Mr. Foster came after Mr. Conlin became ill. Mr. Conlin has returned to his duties as principal of Hehly School.

Three teachers were appointed at Tuesday's meeting. Fred Muraview, who taught in the Clark system until going into the armed forces as a chaplain, was appointed to teach the fourth grade in Hehly School at an annual salary of \$13,370 from Jan. 1 to June 30. Mr. Muraview was a minister before turning to teaching. While in the armed forces for four years, he served in Vietnam, Germany and the United States.

Frank Tedeschi was engaged to be a vocal and instrumental music teacher in Valley Road School at an annual salary of \$8,470. The appointment, effective Jan. 1, will end June 30.

The board named Miss Mary Ann Car to be a teacher at an annual salary of \$8,080 from Feb. 1 through June 30. One substitute teacher was named, Mrs. Holly Shalit was selected to be a vocal and instrumental music substitute teacher at an annual salary of \$8,080. Mrs. Shalit started work on Dec. 6.

Nancy Semonick, who holds a bachelor of arts degree from Newark State College, and Deborah Hanzel, who has a bachelor of arts degree from Wayneburg College, were added to the substitute teacher list for 1971-72.

The board approved a roller skating program for the Christmas vacation period. Skating was scheduled for Charles H. Brewer School as follows:

Monday -- 1 to 3:30 p.m., grades three and four and beginners; 2:30 to 4 p.m., grades five and six.

Wednesday -- 1 to 2:30 p.m., grade seven; 2:30 to 4 p.m., grades eight through 12.

Teachers named supervisors for the two afternoons were Walter Cymansky, head teacher, who will receive \$17.50 per afternoon, and Jeanne Bucholz, supervisor, who will be paid \$15.50 per afternoon.

The resignation of Mrs. Veronica Rumzisz as cafeteria aide, effective Nov. 18, was received.

Mrs. Ruth Bennett was added to the clerk substitute list for 1971-72.

An increase in the price of the Class A lunch from 30 cents to 35 cents per meal was approved. The change will be effective Jan. 3. Ronald Smith, secretary and business administrator, noted that the Class A lunch is served according to federal government guidelines. It was explained that the increase is the first in six years and that the lunch program is being operated at a deficit. Clark is receiving less surplus food and higher wages are being paid to cafeteria workers, it was pointed out.

Payment of Increases To PW Workers Okayed

Council unanimously authorized the payment of increased salaries for members of the Public Works Department at its Monday night meeting in the municipal building.

Members of the Public Works Department are members of the Teamsters Union.

Conclusion of negotiations with the Teamsters was announced by Council President A. Charles Walano who heads council's negotiating committee.

The positions, names and salaries of the personnel, all of whom are residents of the township, are: Public works superintendent, Thomas Smith, \$11,130; assistant public works superintendent, Joseph Wanko, \$9,434; senior public works repairman--Henry Adamski, Oswald Dordoni, John Gudor, John Knodler (temporary), Vincent Mannell, all \$7,950, and John Bernasky, \$7,926, and William Tevlin, \$7,710.

Also, public works repairmen, Jonathan Crabeels, \$7,526; Robert Makransky, \$7,021; Edward Brower, \$6,729, and minimum salary, \$5,200.

After five years of continuous service, employees of the department are entitled to longevity pay at 2% of their 1969 salary.

Condemnation Suit for Pool Completed, Owners Might Not Appeal, Council Head States

The swimming pool question is alive and well, reported Council President A. Charles Walano at the Monday night meeting of the township council held in the council chambers of the municipal meeting.

The council head said that condemnations proceedings for approximately eight acres owned by Oak Ridge, Inc. were completed. He said further that an appeal by the owners had not been made as of the Monday night session.

The price of the property, however, was raised from \$200,000 to \$240,000, he noted.

Second Ward Councilman Richard C. Burger said that the swimming pool ordinance should be amended as quickly as possible to include the new price set by the courts. He suggested action at the Jan. 10 meeting.

The council president also informed the sparse audience that the wage and price monitoring committee established by council was investigating citizen complaints about violations of the President's wage and price guidelines. He said the committee's chairman, Thomas Winters, a former council president, and John Cutt, a library trustee, were in contact with Internal Revenue Service officials.

Bartel Place is being cleaned up, reported Fourth Ward Councilman Robert Roman. He said the Recreation Commission with the aid of volunteers have removed some underbrush and trees. One local contractor, he said, helped the volunteers by removing large trees. Later in the meeting, Solomon Sern of 11 Sandlewood Drive said he hoped the volunteers were insured, and the township would not be held liable in the event of trouble.

He noted that council had disapproved of volunteer aid from the Concerned Citizens of Canterbury Gardens this year because they did not fall under the protection of township liability insurance.

Councilmen unanimously awarded contract for the refurbishing of part of the municipal building for a youth center and modification of the police department headquarters for \$9,946 to N&A Builders, Inc., 510 Jersey Ave., Elizabeth.

Third Ward Councilman Bernard G. Yarusavage said he had "mixed emotions on the youth center" because combining a youth center with public safety facilities could be incompatible. He also expressed concern that the size would not be adequate.

Mr. Yarusavage said the project has been on the boards since 1967.

Councilman Burger differed with Mr. Yarusavage saying that council has been "trying for years to get something for the youth of our town." He urged immediate action.

Council President Walano said the youth center would be used by the Mayor's Committee on Drug Abuse, and Councilman Roman pointed out the new center could also be used in overflow situations occurred at the youth center on Brant Avenue, Mr. Roman

Window Service At P.O. Ends Noon Tomorrow

Last minute word was received at Rahway Post Office from Washington that window service will be ended at noon on Christmas Eve. This order will affect the Clark and Colonia branches as well, according to Assistant Postmaster B. Arthur Coogan. The post offices will reopen Monday morning.

added that rugging and painting of the Brant Avenue building were completed.

In other actions, the council amended the sum used to dredge Pumpkin Patch Brook this summer from \$3,000 to \$2,447.50, which shall be raised by taxes in the 1972 budget.

The low bid for two snow plows was awarded to Lynn Equipment Co. Inc. of Three Bridges for \$2,970. Councilman Roman pointed out that the present contract runs to Jan. 1. The plows are in addition to those already owned by the township, the council president said.

The bowling license of Clark Bowling Lanes, Inc., 140 Central Avenue, was renewed for 1972 for a fee of \$255.

Council authorized township engineer Joseph S. Sozio to make a feasibility study for the installation of curbing and pavement on Wendell Place and to furnish council with a cost estimate. The cost of the study was limited to \$2,500.

First Ward Councilman John Bodnar said the study was requested by area residents.

A transfer in the 1971 bud-

get of \$12,000 from resurfacing of various streets to road construction or reconstruction with state aid was authorized.

Three performance bonds were replaced by maintenance bonds by council Monday night: Charles Schenck's performance bond of \$6,500 was cancelled, and a maintenance bond of \$1,000 for one year was stipulated; Starlite Manor-W. L. Cap. Inc.'s performance bond of \$9,200 was released, and a maintenance bond of \$1,380 to run for one and a half years was required; a performance bond for premises on Elm Street of \$1,071 was ordered released, pending the posting of a maintenance bond for \$1,606.

Taxes were ordered removed from the rolls on four pieces of property deeded to the township. The total amount of the removal was \$284.59 (the parcels and amounts): Block 150, Lot 6, \$3.98; Block 81, Lot 49A, \$10.62; Block 141, Lot 17, \$121.03; Block 150, Lot 6, \$148.96.

The first parcel's taxes dated from 1970, and the other three are taxes due this year.

Board to Consider Subdivision Plans For 11 Building Lots

Two applications for subdivisions will be considered by the Clark Planning Board at public hearings scheduled for Tuesday at 8:15 p.m. in the Council room of the Municipal Council.

Two applicants are seeking to divide their properties into a total of 11 building lots.

Jomar Homes Inc., Clark, is seeking a major subdivision on property on Gloria Street. The firm is asking that six building lots be created from Lots 18 to 26 inclusive in Block 96 and Lots 1 to 9 inclusive of Block 97.

William E. Holland of Clark is asking for a major subdivision that would divide premises at State Street and Rahway Avenue into five building lots. The premises are known as Lots 1, 3 and 42 in Block 40, 41 and 200.

The Planning Board has been holding public hearings on recommendations for revision of the master plan, the zone plan and the zoning ordinance of the township, and on proposed amendments to the master plan.

The board last week made public its recommendations for zoning along Raritan Road in the Madison Hill Road section and for the proposed commercial office zone where high-rise office buildings would be permitted.

Recommendations of the board will be sent to the Municipal Council for its approval.

The Council last week introduced an ordinance to extend the moratorium on construction of buildings in commercial zones by 150 days. The moratorium was scheduled to end on Jan. 12. A public hearing on the ordinance is scheduled for Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Council room.

Councilmen Add One Club Liquor License

Councilmen approved an added club liquor license in an ordinance on second reading unanimously at the Monday night meeting of the municipal council.

The Gran Centurions, an Italian fraternal group, is constructing a clubhouse on Madison Hill Road, and council increased the number of club licenses in the expectation that the organization might wish to apply for one.

Councilmen also passed on second reading an ordinance setting minimum and maximum wages for civil service employees.

Three recommendations by the board of adjustment for council approval of variances were referred to the director of law John P. Higgins. They are: Dr. Gary Weis's request to erect a residence/office at 530 Oak Ridge Road; a use variance to be granted to Humble Oil and Refining Co. for erection of a gasoline service station at Raritan Road and Central Avenue, and Robert T. Makransky's variance to permit the erection of a one-family dwelling in a commercial zone on Washington Street.

A discussion of admission procedures was offered by a member of the Rutgers admission staff for the counselors accompanying the students.

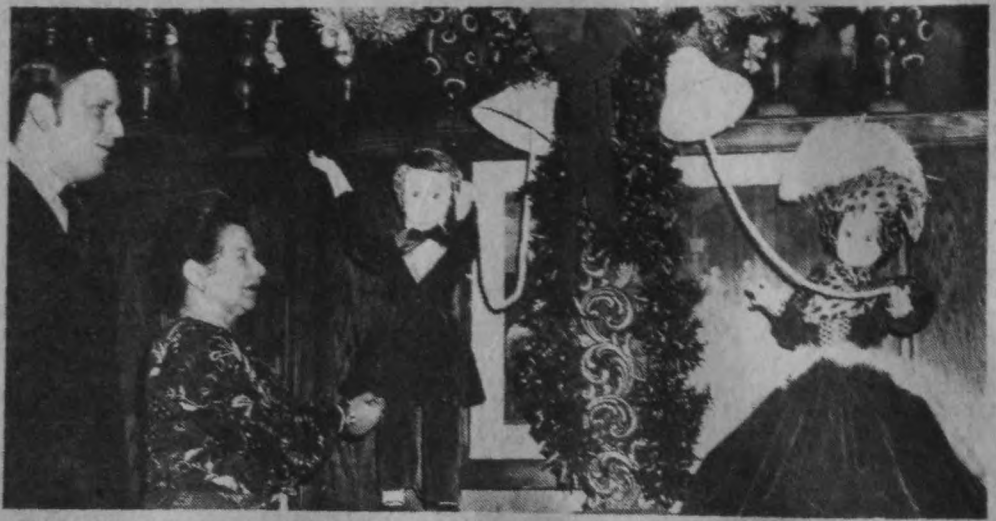

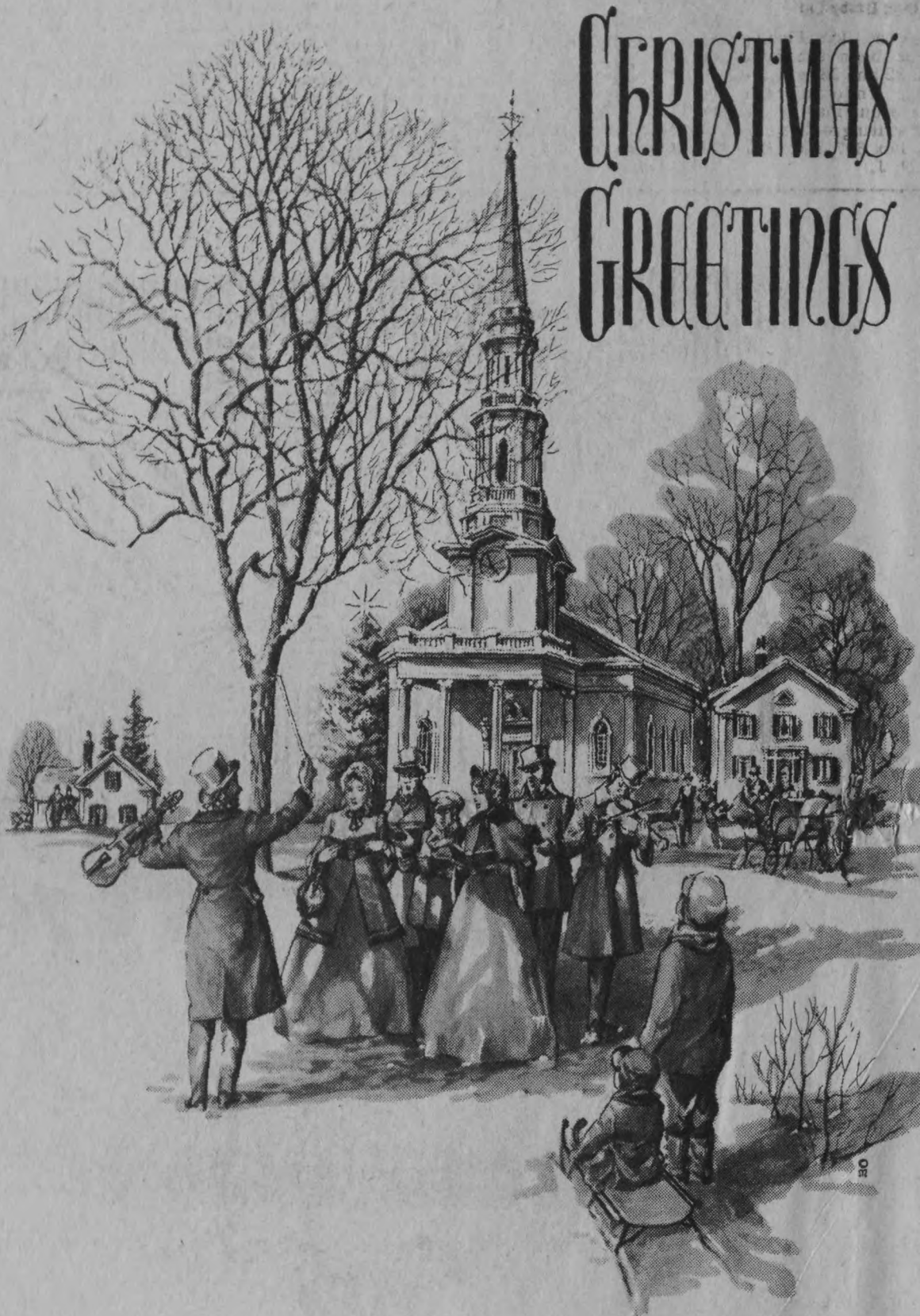

A History of Holiday Cards

Most of us are in the habit of sending Christmas or holiday greeting cards. How the practice started is unknown to all but a handful, but it is so ingrained in the holiday list of things to do that few would believe the practice is only about 100 years old. Joseph Cundall, a London artist, claims to have issued the first greeting card in 1846. It was printed in lithography, colored by hand and was rather small.

The custom did not gain a general foothold until 1862, when calling cards with the message, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year," started to appear. The cards were the size of a card de visite, the present business card size.

By the 1880's, robbins, holly branches, and embossed figures and landscapes began to be added by a London printing firm. From there, every imaginable type of card has arisen.

Actually, it would not be too hard to guess that the practice to grow markedly needed postal systems, most of which made their emergence in the 19th century.

A Hippie Who Is No More

According to an article in the Nov. 15 issue of "Midnight," John Lennon, ex-Beatle, turned hippie only to earn money.

Characterizing his teenage and other-aged hippie fans as "a batch of dirty, disgusting savages," John Lennon said further that, "It was only the money that kept me going. You have to be some kind of a nut to enjoy fame for its own sake."

"I never had anything in common with Paul, George and Ringo," Lennon says now. "They were just a means to an end, a means for me to get filthy rich. Actually, they bored me to death with their far-out philosophy and immature behavior. I'm convinced that if we didn't hit it big, they would have all become bums or hard-core dope addicts."

"We had to cater to the whims of those radical hippies and stupid kids to such an extent that we just about became their slaves. There was never a moment of real privacy, never a day we could really call our own. We were followed, hounded and pestered by those people until each day became another torment..."

That interview is a scathing indictment of the international freak culture form one of its most venerated idols. The world has its jolts!

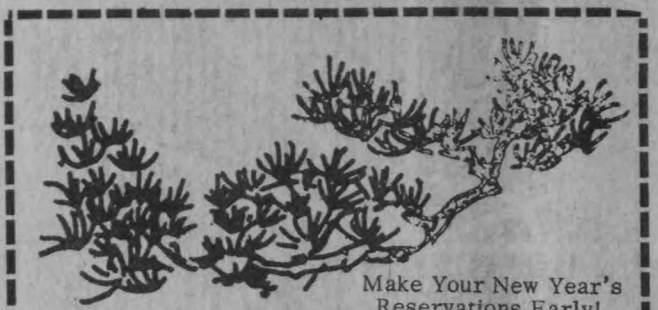
Letters to the Editor Asks Mayor to Stop Landfill Work On Robinson's Branch of River

Bill Martin Drives New Power Boat
To Brilliant Victory in Cup Series

Driving brilliantly in the last and roughest of three 100-mile ocean races, an American, Billy Martin of Clark, made powerboat racing history on Dec. 12 and marked the return to power of the famed Magnum ocean racing hulls when he defeated the world and European champions to win the first America's Cup series run off Miami Beach, Fla., Dec. 8-12.

The 31-year-old Clark furniture executive's new 33-Magnum, Hustler IV, trailed the world champion, Vincenzo Balestrieri of Rome, Italy, the first day of the series, Dec. 8. The Roman drove a 32-foot Cigarette hull, Black Tornado. The second day saw another Italian, Ronny Bonelli of Milan, in Nicopao, a 33-foot

aluminum catamaran win with Martin, the underdog, was second in both races.

The first two days were blessed with smooth waters while the third day saw turbulent six-foot seas raise havoc with the select fleet made up of the various offshore champions from the United States, England, Germany, France, Italy and the Bahamas.

Martin's amazing victory against the favored Europeans signalled the resurgence of the firm whose hulls have won three world and seven U.S. national offshore racing championships in past years before dropping

out of competition.

Martin who has been the United States single engine champion twice but has never won a race before used a pair of stock 496-cubic inch Mercruiser engines in his boat.

Balestrieri was second overall while Bahamian Juan Fernandez was third in another Magnum, Six Pac, which used six 140 horsepower Mercury outboards.

subsidized insurance." The Congresswoman explained that owners of one- to four-family residences and small businesses may buy flood insurance through their local insurance agent at a low rate under the emergency flood insurance program. Clark recently qualified for this program when it agreed to adopt land use and control measures that will minimize flood damage to future construction.

Rep. Dwyer, a sponsor of the legislation which established the flood insurance program, noted that the maximum coverage of \$17,500 on a single dwelling and \$5,000 on its contents, and \$30,000 on a small business and \$5,000 on its contents. Local insurance agents may obtain policies and further information from the National Flood Insurance Association servicing office, Centennial Insurance Company, 97 Main St., Chatham.

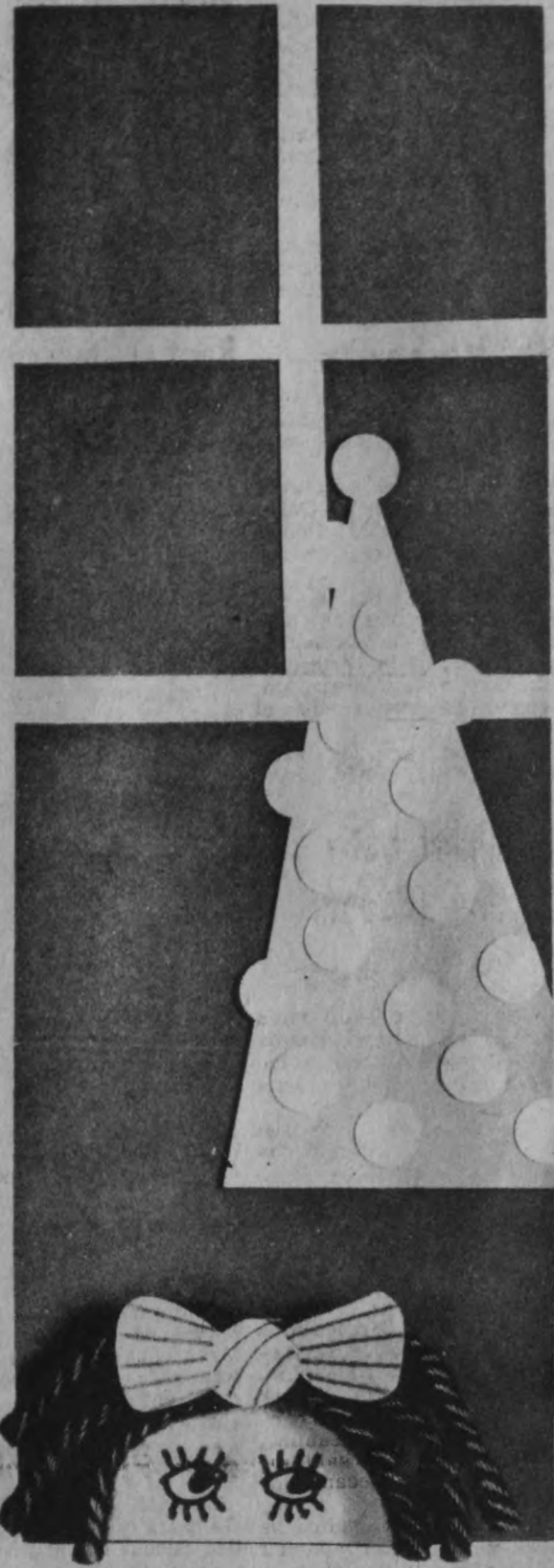

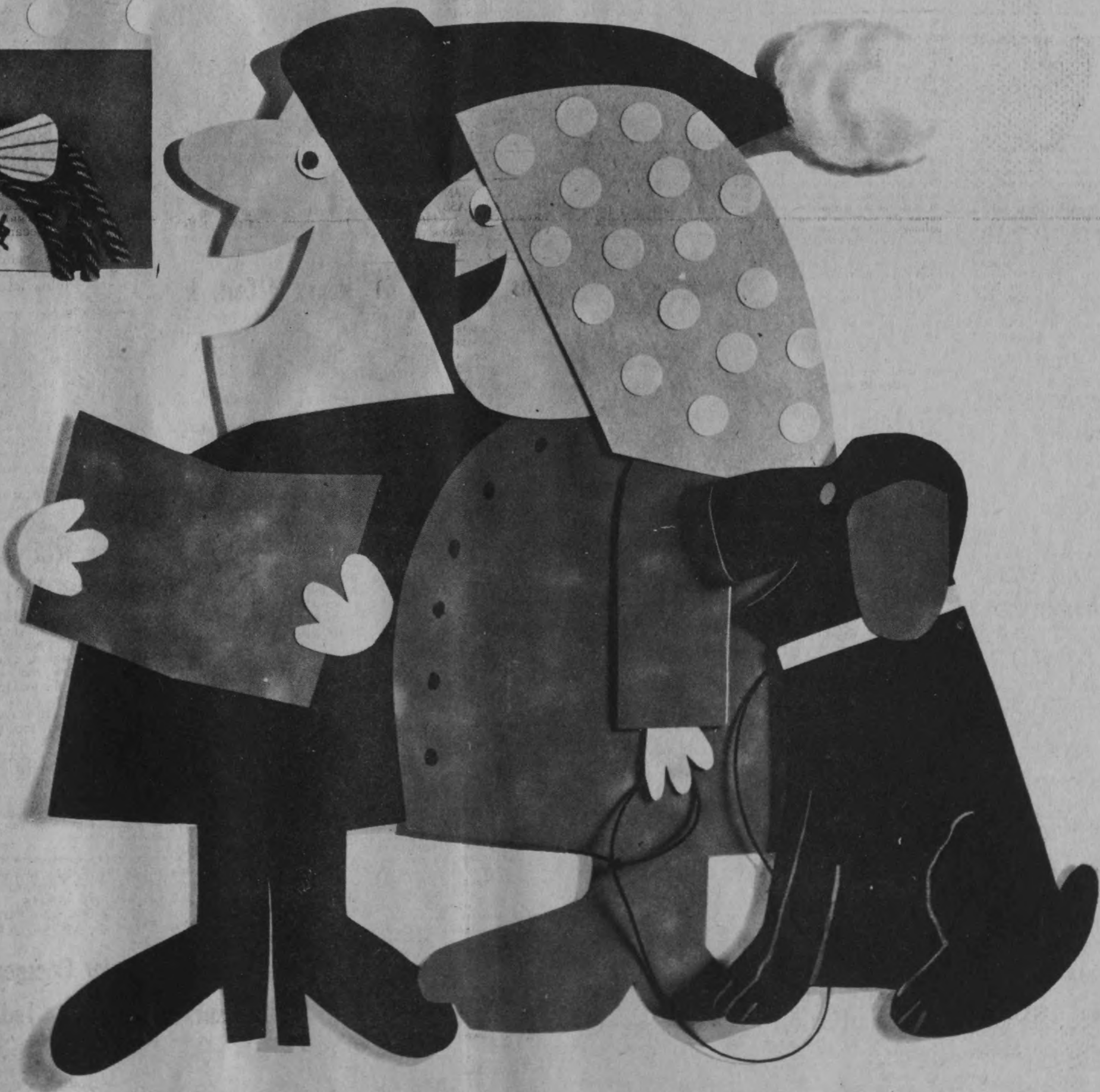

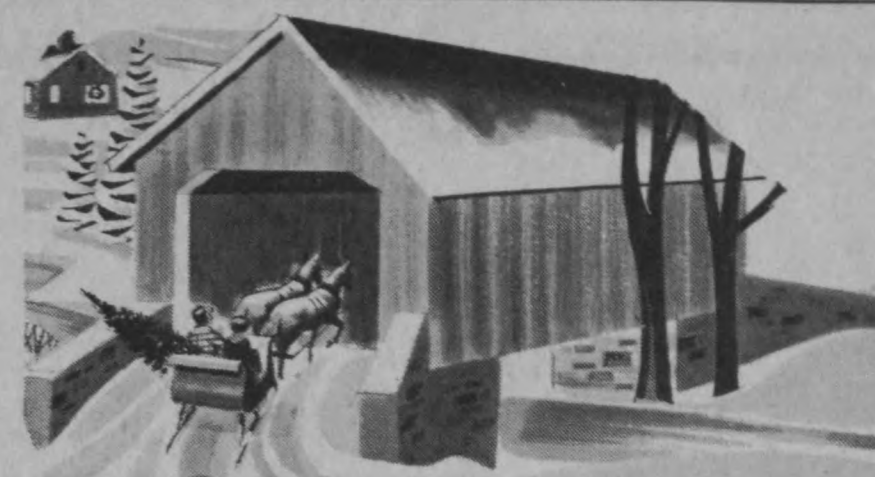
Colonial Building Bought For Historic Property
