

Union Democrats file complaint with ELEC

UNION — Union Township Democratic Committee has filed a complaint with the state Election Law Election Committee, alleging Republican candidates for the municipal elections, Charles Donnelly and Paul Versoza, failed to disclose contributions to their primary campaign.

"Certain documents were required to be filed and were not," said township attorney Daniel Antonelli, who is representing the Democratic Committee.

The complaint notes Donnelly and Versoza were well-acquainted with election procedure, having followed it properly during their unsuccessful run for the Union Charter Study Commission in 2008.

"They knew the rules and...chose to ignore them," said Sen. Joseph Cryan, who serves as chair of the Union Democrat Committee.

Donnelly and Versoza, were successfully written into the municipal race after initially being disqualified for election law violations involving their petitions. The matter was brought before township Clerk Eileen Birch by a third contender for two 3-year council terms, Carol Segal. In

Benefactor beware: Charity ploy active

LINDEN — Linden residents should beware of solicitors seeking donations for the "Linden Police Vest Fund," according to police, who say the fund is a hoax.

One solicitor called a city resident, and later, traveled to their home requesting a donation between \$1,000 and \$3,000 for the illegitimate fund, city police said June 5.

The 45-year-old victim, a Riverbend Drive resident, reportedly received three phone calls from a fund representative, who eventually convinced them to donate \$250. When a 19-year-old man arrived to pick up the money, the victim threatened to call police, causing the teen to flee in a black Ford Taurus.

Local law enforcement officials urged residents and businesses to

Cranford Committee settles on 5 % tax hike

CRANFORD — The Township's municipal budget was introduced on June 9, after a challenging four-month-long process ending with a proposal to increase taxes 5 percent.

Total municipal appropriations rose from \$29.6 million to \$31.2 for this year's budget.

The tax levy is \$21 million, which means a \$110 increase for the average taxpayer, according to finance officer Thomas Grady. That increase is based on the average assessed household value of \$181,000.

Officials had feared the municipal tax increase would be much greater — initially estimated at 11.9 percent in February.

At the June 9 meeting, Mayor David Robinson said working on the budget was tough this year because of a variety of factors, but he credited the council with doing a good job of keeping the tax increase down.

The biggest increases in the budget came from an approximate \$553,000 increase in payments — a total of about \$1.57 million — to

the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority for capital improvements to their facilities, said Grady.

A \$300,000 increase in health benefits for municipal employees also contributed to the hike.

The increase in salary and wages was below that figure, thanks to no raises for most employees.

Provisional ballots counted, solidify Menza's win

HILLSIDE — When the last eight provisional ballots were counted June 10, mayoral candidate Joseph Menza had retained his slim lead over opponent Jerome Jewell, with 1,710 votes to 1,702.

Menza said he is confident this count will stand.

"The results are final," Menza said. "I'm not worried about anything at this point."

County Board of Elections

Administrator Dennis Kobitz reported 11 provisional ballots were counted, two of which were rejected because the voters were not registered, while a third was rejected because the mayoral portion was not filled out properly. Five of the remaining eight ballots were cast for Menza, the remaining three for Jewell.

Jewell's slate won council seats by a margin too wide to be affected by the provisional ballots.

The candidates have ten days

from the date of certification, June 10, to file for a recount.

At the June 10 Township Council meeting, Jewell gave no indication he would file for a recount. He thanked everyone who supported him and participated in the election. "I love the town, and I will continue to support Hillside as a resident and a volunteer," he said.

Menza will take office July 1, replacing current Mayor Karen McCoy Oliver, who chose not to run.

Menza said he is already busy with preparations. "[I'm] putting together a transition team and meeting with the current mayor and former Mayor [Barbara] Rowan," Menza said. "I'm trying to look at the entire township as a whole and break it down to what we should be doing first."

Menza said he is disappointed his slate could not join him in his victory, but noted it will not stop him from fulfilling his duties. "I look forward to working with any-


body who has the good of Hillside at heart," he said.

Council President John Kulish said he hopes the new mayor will serve the township and work with the council better than McCoy Oliver has. "Hopefully things will start to click in the days ahead," he said.

Youths suspected in two armed robberies

LINDEN — Police continue to investigate a pair of armed robberies at local gas stations. They believe teenagers may be responsible.

Within one hour on June 5, two Linden gas stations were robbed of a combined \$850, several packs of Newport cigarettes and several Dutch Master cigars, said Linden police Lt. James Sarnicki.

Although witnesses told police suspects flashed a shotgun during one incident and a silver handgun during another stick-up, no one was harmed during the robberies.

Authorities investigations are ongoing, but indicated the two incidents could be linked.

"We are waiting for witness statements and some surveillance video, but from the looks of it, it could be the same suspect," said investigating Detective Dan Sadowski.

Police said initial reports from witnesses and surveillance footage from the scene have led them to believe suspects are juveniles. "Their ages are still undetermined, but they could be anywhere from 17 to 20," Sadowski said.

A BP gas station on East St. Georges Avenue was the first hit, at approximately 9:45 p.m. Two suspects, one carrying a shotgun and

the other the handgun, forced their way into the attendant's booth and snatched \$250, a few packs of Newport cigarettes and several cigars, Sarnicki said.

A 38-year-old male employee, the only witness in that case, was unharmed.

Less than an hour later, at approximately 10:36 p.m., the Exxon Station on West St. Georges Avenue was robbed by one shotgun-toting suspect. He pulled the gun from his pants and turned it on the 27- and 35-year-old employees in the station office, the victims said. He took \$600 and two packs of Newport cigarettes before running from the scene.

The BP gas station suspects were described as males in their 20s, dressed in black-hooded sweatshirts, with one donning sunglasses and the other a purple rag covering his neck and face. They were last seen driving away from the scene in a silver vehicle.

The other suspect was described as a thin man, age 17, 5-foot 7-inches tall, wearing a black-hooded sweatshirt and sunglasses.

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

Garden planners to residents: Dig in

RAHWAY — Cheyenne Busch's love for gardening has grown much bigger than the apartment building she lives in. She was in search of more space for her plants when she came up with the idea for a public space to dig in.

Six weeks ago, Busch's passion spilled over, onto a bare swath on Central Avenue, across from Berzinec Park. Within the next two weeks, the city-owned property will be developed into the site of Rahway's first community garden.

Busch's problem started small. "My balcony was too shady to grow things there," she said. Busch took her concerns to the top. "I petitioned the mayor for a community garden."

Last winter, Busch, along with Elaine McCahey, director of the YMCA of Eastern Union County Rahway Branch; Jim Nichnadowicz, a Rahway 4-H agent; members of Activate Rahway, a YMCA-affiliated group that promotes healthy lifestyles, and Bob Markey, a certified instructor for the Square Foot Gardening Foundation, gathered at the YMCA to discuss the feasibility of creating the garden.

After meeting with city Mayor James Kennedy, and considering various pieces of city-owned property, the group chose the Central Avenue site.

"As food prices rise, and food safety concerns grow, more people are looking to community gardens as sources of food and a way to conserve natural resources," Kennedy said in a recent statement.

Kennedy beckoned city gardeners to visit the space. "We have the available land that will hopefully attract an abundance of enthusiastic gardeners," he said, hopefully.

The community garden will be maintained by Rahway residents. In exchange for a \$50 annual donation and a pledge to tend the garden for at least one hour per month, participants will have unlimited access to their plots. The city will provide all necessary tools, water and fencing.

Kennedy said the start-up cost to the municipali-

ty is minimal and will be included in this year's budget. Busch roughly estimated the start-up costs between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

Markey, an experienced gardener, said the community space will consist of thirty-two 8-foot by 4-foot mini-gardens, with raised flower beds. The prime location will require 20 percent less water to be used and time and effort than the average garden. All scraps from the garden will be reused for compost.

Organizers said public interest is high; six plots will be used in the first year of the program and 30 residents are already on the waiting list for next season.

Markey also stressed the importance of one of the garden's greatest benefits: the availability of fresh, organic, in-season produce for Rahway residents. "You can't get any fresher than from your own garden," he said.

The health benefits of community gardens reach beyond simply being able to consume fresh produce. The resulting reduction in carbon emissions from trucks that transport food will lead to cleaner air, Markey said.

Gardening also requires spending time outside, which is often neglected when people are required to work in an office or choose to stay indoors during their leisure time, organizers said.

"This is an opportunity to reconnect with nature... just come in and hang out in the garden," Markey said, noting too many people, particularly the young, suffer from "Nature Deficiency Disorder." He believes children who spend time gardening will be more active and eat healthier diets. Markey recently produced a DVD on the local gardening effort, and sent it to the White House. He hopes first lady Michelle Obama, who worked with elementary school students to create a vegetable garden on the White House lawn, will one day visit the community garden in Rahway.

Benefit raises \$20K for devastated family

ROSELLE PARK — Mark and Liz Benner called on the community to support a local family, and the community answered.

The Comedy Show Benefit held from 7 to 10 p.m. May 22 raised \$20,000 for the Anthony Casselli Memorial Fund. The fund was created by Mark and Liz to assist their devastated friends in paying approximately \$80,000 owed to Jersey Shore University Medical Center in Neptune, following the death of their 17-year-old son in March. The show drew more than 400 people to the Kenilworth VFW Hall before the night was through.

"We had a great turnout," Mark said. "People were coming by my house all week, and we had people giving baskets until 5:30 p.m. that night."

The gift baskets alone raised more than \$5,000 in donations, Mark said.

"My goal in the beginning was \$15,000, and we reached our goal and then some," Mark explained.

The Roselle Park High School senior was tragically killed March 14 in a car accident in Toms River. Six other borough teenagers were

also injured when their 2005 Mazda, driven by 17-year-old Alex Aravena, veered off the road, struck a utility pole and overturned, according to police.

Other passengers in the car, Melissa Pereira, Samantha Ardino, Kelly Angus and Alisha Dipiazza, all 14 and Tom Pardist, 18 were all treated at Community Medical Center in Toms River for various injuries.

Mark said he and his wife are thankful for the support the community showed.

"We... appreciate what everyone did — from the people in town and out of town, and all the businesses that pitched in. I can't express enough how much the support means to us," he said.

The Comedy Show Benefit was not the only event planned in support of The Casselli Family.

High school students held a "Battle of the Bands" June 12 at the school, with proceeds going toward the Casselli Fund.

"Two union and all non-union employees are not getting salary increases...just police and fire will because they are in mid-contract," Grady explained.

The Township Council had considered laying off municipal employees, including two from law enforcement, in order to defray some costs. The proposal was met with jeers. After intense backlash from fire and police, the council decided instead to issue eight days of mandatory furloughs to all employees. The furlough plan will

save approximately \$54,000 for the year, Grady said.

Public safety employees had argued layoffs in their departments could compromise public safety.

"I felt the retention of those two positions was critical to the law enforcement effort...in Cranford," Police Chief Eric Mason said earlier this month.

A public hearing on the budget will be held at 8 p.m. July 21 in the Municipal Building.

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

DNA evidence breaks home invasion case; one arrested

ROSELLE PARK — More than one year after two men robbed a 90-year-old woman and brutally beat her 58-year-old son, DNA tests and dogged police work have resulted in an arrest in the case.

Andre Ellis, 29, of Atlanta, Ga., was charged in the February 2008 home invasion and assault in which two men broke into a home on the 300 block of Bender Avenue, according to Roselle Park police Sgt. Manuel Jimenez.


The break-in occurred Feb. 19, at approximately 10 p.m., when Ellis and a still-at-large suspect allegedly banged on the front door of the home and pushed their way past the 90-year-old owner, Jimenez said.

The two masked men, one of whom wore an "old man-type" Halloween mask, found the second victim in a bedroom.

One suspect forced both residents onto the floor in the kitchen and held them at gunpoint, while the other ransacked the second floor for valuables, police said.

The male victim was kicked in the ribs several times and pepper-sprayed when he attempted to flee the house. He feared he was going to be "executed," the victim told police.

The two burglars fled the house, but not before dropping the Hal-

loween mask, a loaded handgun and their gloves. Roselle Park detectives used the items to obtain DNA evidence that linked Ellis to the robbery.

Borough Detective Dominick Frino, along with the U.S. Marshall Service and Union County Sheriff's Office, trailed Ellis to East Orange, Newark, Atlanta and other cities, before he was finally arrested in late May by U.S. Marshalls in Newark on unrelated warrants. "The delay in the arrest was the result of leg work," Jimenez said.

Last week, Ellis was charged with

armed robbery, weapons possession, aggravated assault and criminal trespassing. He was being held at Middlesex County Jail on unrelated charges. His bail was set at \$250,000.

Roselle Park Police Chief Paul Morrisson said the arrest was a credit to increased technology in law enforcement. He pointed to a the DNA lab opened by the Union County Prosecutor's Office in Westfield last year as an indicator of the increased resources now available to detectives.

"Had it not been for DNA, this case probably would have gone unsolved," Morrisson said. "Bad guys should know local police departments do utilize this technology."

Ellis previously spent six months in jail, between 2001 and 2002, after being charged with narcotics distribution and weapons possession in Essex County, according to court records.

Police continue to search for the second suspect, described as a man, between 6-foot and 6-foot-2-inches tall, weighing approximately 250 pounds, and possibly in his 30s.

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

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Cancer survivors rally at 'Relay,' recount journeys

CLARK — Friends, family and neighbors of Relay for Life participants gathered at Arthur L. Johnson High School and lined the track as it filled with 50 people of all ages, races and genders who had battled cancer.

During the first lap, led by bagpipers, some walked fast, others slower with canes, and a handful were pushed in wheelchairs. All wore purple shirts that read: "Survivor."

By the end of Clark's 13-hour Relay for Life, which kicked off just after 6:30 p.m. June 12, 58 teams of walkers raised \$170,000 for the American Cancer Society, according to the event's Web site.

"Kiss Away Cancer," one team that included at least three individuals who suffered from varying forms of the disease raised \$19,116. The team's captain, Robin Brown, of Cranford said she remembered the moment she was told she had breast cancer seven years ago. "At first, my mind went blank," said Robin. Luckily, her cancer was caught early. "Two weeks later, the doctors operated, and I am now cancer free. I was really fortunate."


Besides raising money for the American Cancer Society, Robin said she participates to encourage women to get checked for breast cancer. "Early detection is the key," she said.

Cranford residents Ruthanne Brown, who handled the publicity for the Clark's relay, and her mother, Claire recounted their experiences with the disease. "My mother...was diagnosed with breast cancer 14 years ago," said Ruthanne.

Claire said the moment she was diagnosed was chilling. "The doctor was just a surgeon who came in and said, 'Oh you have cancer.' That was the end of it. I became very emotional."

In an essay written about her mother, Ruthanne said:

"[She] underwent surgery. Not only did she face a mastectomy, which is tough for any woman to

endure, but she was given the devastating news that she had 17 affected lymph nodes — the auxiliary node, which is part of the lymphatic system, connects with other organs, and gives cancer cells a vehicle to spread rapidly throughout the body."

Ruthanne explained her mother was enrolled into a cancer study at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York City, where she was placed in one of two groups; both received different chemical cocktails that could have very different results.

In one group, the drugs basically killed the immune system to kill the cancer. "People actually died from the chemotherapy in the group my mother wasn't in. However, the drugs in the group she was in treated her well,"

Ruthanne said. "Because of [mom's] bravery in wanting to partake in this study and venture into the medical unknown, she is alive today."

This year, Claire received the "Eternal Flame" award, which is given by members of the Relay for Life to survivors. "I believe...her [contribution] to change the face of cancer treatment has earned her the right to be remembered as 'Eternal,'" said Ruthanne.

Claire remained philosophical. "Even if I didn't make it, it's okay, because what would have been learned from that study would have helped cancer patients in the future," she said, bravely.

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
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

Happy Father's Day

Sunday is Father's Day, the annual holiday when children honor their fathers with a card, breakfast in bed and perhaps a new tie or belt. It seems fitting that Sunday this year is also the first day of summer, as many of the activities that coincide with Father's Day, such as going fishing or to the park for a picnic or barbecue, also coincide with the beginning of summer.

Father's Day is believed to have first been observed on July 5, 1908, at a church in Fairmont, W.V., although Sonora Smart Dodd of Washington is generally credited with originating the holiday. After hearing a Mother's Day sermon at a church in Spokane, Dodd was inspired and arranged a tribute to her father on June 19, 1910.

Although this holiday took a while to catch on, interest grew and President Lyndon Johnson issued a proclamation making it an official holiday in 1966, to be observed annually on the third Sunday in June. Father's Day was officially recognized in 1972, during the presidency of Richard Nixon.

Today, merchandisers often tie the holiday in with special sales directed toward men, although this category has expanded to include sales for almost anything for almost everybody. For children who are finishing the school year, this is the last holiday they can celebrate before summer recess begins, and this adds to its special significance.

For fathers, this is a chance to be appreciated by their families, particularly their children. In the same way as do mothers, fathers often perform thankless tasks with no recognition. They get those errant balls and frisbees off the roof. Fathers help their sons tie their first tie or shave for the first time. They chaperone the first dates, take movies at proms and graduations, coach the sports team and help with studying for exams.

As the significance of genders has decreased, fathers increasingly find themselves cooking and cleaning. Along with mothers, they share the responsibilities, joys, sorrows, hardships and triumphs that go hand-in-hand with family life.

Measuring the benefits of the effort

Harry Wyatt was honest — he was stalling for time. Last Friday the 4 p.m. public information meeting on proposed Roselle Streetscape improvement plans for Chestnut Street from 1st to 3rd avenues was already 15 minutes late. Wyatt was waiting for the arrival of Mayor Garrett Smith.

Wyatt is an engaging fellow. He joked easily with the consulting firm, anxious to discuss their plan as set forth on the three easels in the Borough Council chambers, as well as the others in the audience. The business members are on a first name basis with Wyatt and there is positive dialogue. That isn't always the case in other towns between the downtown representatives and the business community.

In a flier prepared by a public relations firm, Smith says of the improvements, "We want to make the commercial strip its own special brand, so that everyone in the area knows that Chestnut Street in Roselle is an exciting destination."

Wyatt's title is Urban Enterprise Zone coordinator for the borough. It's consultant, CMX, described the \$500,000 plus coming from the NJ Department of Transportation as well as \$153,000 in so-called "soft costs to complete the project." The improvements which have become somewhat standard fare in towns include, new curbs, street scapes, lights and of course, planters.

This day, the third time for a hearing, as required by the DOT, brought few questions. Wyatt had done his job in selling the project. It was clear the ground work had been completed and there were no surprises. A quick count found there were as many paid consultants in the audience as business

people. Smith pressed, as mayor's do, as to the schedule for completion and how the group was doing on the next round of funding. Both the completion date — an estimated three months after approvals are granted — and likelihood for additional findings were decidedly positive. Consultants do tend to accent optimism.

The Roselle UEZ joins the others of Plainfield, Elizabeth and Hillside in the county. The merchants who participate charge only 3.5 percent, not the usual 7 percent sales tax. If you're buying a washing machine or a wide screen television that savings can be a pretty big discount. Equally important the 3.5 percent sales tax that is collected gets plowed back into cleanups, patrol and other improvements in the district. Out of town shoppers take advantage of the savings.

Recently, there have been legislative efforts to bring an end to the program — which critics say should be a stimulus — not an ever-giving grant.

It does raise the question of equity. Neighboring municipalities end up funding their own improvements. In Rahway, the private investment in the downtown is coupled with a significant first Thursday of the month promotion to get people comfortable with shopping in the downtown business district.

Cranford continues to utilize the special improvement district,

where a geographically defined group of commercial properties have owners who pay a dedicated fund for use solely for the district. One of Cranford's downtown business owners has filed tax appeals asserting rental income which determines property value have dropped. But that's a focus for another day.

In Cranford, efforts to increase the assessment charged to downtown owners for improvements and promotion was recently blocked by the Township Committee. The original creator of the Cranford SID, Don Smartt, was quoted on Sunday, "If towns don't have the SID they don't have the ability to do anything." Smartt currently manages SIDs in Fair Lawn and Bergenfield.

The question that pops up like an aging paver is: should there be a level playing ground for all towns, and what, exactly, is the tangible benefit of public investment in the central business district. Equally important, hard pressed merchants who by most accounts don't see the economic "up turns" as described by Vice President Joseph Biden on Meet the Press last Sunday, continue to struggle.

A fair reading is that, but for the UEZ zones and the investment in the central business area, other towns would have met their demise. Still, the effectiveness of downtown programs even during a down-turned economy should be asked. After the promotions and the pavers are done, the final word should be the downtown merchants and whether the efforts have really brought shoppers into the area.



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

(Continued from Page 1) spite of the clerk's ruling against the pair, they beat Segal by more than 50 write-in votes.

Union Township Republican Committee Chairman Ralph Gaglione denied the allegations against the two candidates, saying all the paperwork associated with the election has been filed properly. Gaglione said the township's Democratic machine has more than enough money to devote thousands of

dollars to slandering their opponents. "The allegations aren't going to stop," Gaglione said.

Cryan said he feels the complaint will reflect poorly on the candidates. "Running against guys who refuse to fill out basic candidate information tells you what kind of candidates they'll end up being," Cryan said.

Cryan said it was Segal who was most hurt by Donnelly and Versoza's actions.

"They, in essence, cheated him out of the nomination."

Ken Schreihofner, authorized by Segal to speak on his behalf, said the outcome of the primary elections has taken a toll on him. Schreihofner said Segal is "totally disgusted and totally hurt" that he followed filing regulations and was beaten by people who failed to follow the same rules.

Segal feels he should have been permitted to plead his case as a potential candidate

before the local Republican Committee, something he was not afforded an opportunity to do, according to Schreihofner.

Gaglione said Donnelly and Versoza will appeal to the voters as viable candidates despite attempts to slander them.

"People will listen to the whisper because they're unhappy with the way things are in town," Gaglione said.

Linden police urge community to avoid charity scams

(Continued from Page 1) contact the police department if they receive calls they believe are related to the scam. They also reminded residents the department does not make solicitations via telephone; all requests are sent out by mail once a year.

"I've been informed some

organizations do enter into contracts with telemarketers to solicit over the phone, but residents or businesses need to be suspicious," said Linden police Lt. James Sarnicki. "You just don't know who you are speaking to."

Investigators indicated no specific demographic is being targeted

by the false charity. While a similar crime was reported only once in Linden in the past year, Sarnicki said he has spoken with several residents and businesses who have either received suspicious calls or had been duped and did not file a police report.

Scammers will use a variety of

names, including New York or New Jersey Police Funds, or Widow's Fund, to lure victims, Sarnicki said, noting a local businessman admitted giving a donation to the illegitimate "New York Law Enforcement Charity" several months ago. Two men in suits picked up the donation, but did not

show identification. This incident was never reported to police.

If you choose to donate to a charity, police said the best defense against scams is asking questions. "Get an address or number to call. If it's a legitimate organization, they should have that information," Sarnicki said.

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
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
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

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
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
Laurie Lord Maier received the 2009 Union County Teachers Recognition Award at the March 21 Mountainside Board of Education meeting.

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State confirms 14 swine flu cases in UC

With the H1N1 virus — also known as swine flu — striking residents in Union County, local schools are encountering confirmed, possible and fraudulent claims of the mysterious new strain of influenza.

In Cranford, a case of swine flu in a Brookside Place student was confirmed by the state Monday, with two probable cases still being tested by the New Jersey Department of Health.

Cranford Health Official Warren Hehl

said he is not aware of any other suspected cases.

The township's schools have remained open. District Superintendent Gayle Carrick said Brookside Place School has been thoroughly cleaned and disinfected, and that parents, staff and faculty are well-informed regarding the prevention and detection of swine flu. All of the district's schools remain open and there was no information regarding confirmed or suspected swine flu cases on the district or township Web sites.

"We will continue to keep the public

informed," Carrick said.

In Summit, Jefferson Elementary School and the Primary Center for kindergarten and pre-school students were closed from June 10-12 based on a recommendation by the state Health Department after the emergence of flu-like symptoms in the district and significant absences earlier that week.

According to a letter from Superintendent of Schools Nathan Parker, posted on the district's Web site, the schools would be disinfected and the situation carefully monitored.

"We are in daily contact with the Health

Department regarding this virus," Parker's letter said. "The purpose of closing is to reduce the transmission of any viruses."

Both Summit schools were open on Monday but Parker could not be reached for further comment. Assistant Superintendent Julie Glazer, Health Officer Megan Avallone, Public Health Nurse Carolyn Giaccio, and Jefferson School Principal Ron Polos also could not be reached for comment.

In Linden, reports of a case of swine flu at Soehl Middle School on June 12 were, the

Archers to take aim in UC park

Watching the platoon of volunteers set one fence post after another, Mike Tully could not believe how quickly his dream of a first class archery range was finally becoming a reality.

For the past three years, the Union resident searched for sites where area archers could practice their sport. So when the Union County Board of Freeholders decided to close Oak Ridge Golf Course in Clark and convert it to a park, Tully saw a golden opportunity.

His perseverance paid off. With members of the Cranford Rod & Gun Club supplying the manpower and the county providing materials and logistical support — and a design that received an endorsement from the county — a brand new Olympic-style archery range is taking shape at Oak Ridge and is expected to open to the public in early July.

The archery range is utilizing an area where golf pros would hold their lessons.


While the isolated section was buffered from the rest of the golf course by a wooded area, the volunteers put in nearly 800 feet of split-rail fencing and warning signs so that people will not wander onto the range. They also set an 8-foot stockade fence along one side to give neighboring property owners more privacy.

"It's a dream come true for us," said Tully, an expert archer.

The site for the new archery range worked out perfectly, said Al Faella, who oversees the county parks department.

"The dedication and effort by all these volunteers was just incredible," said Faella, who visited the site one recent Saturday to check on the progress.

"The Cranford club is not the

biggest of organizations and for their members to give so much of their time for a facility that will be used by archers from across the state, really says a lot about them. We really owe them a debt of thanks," Faella said.

Area archers used to be able to practice in a section of Lenape Park in Cranford, where the county's trap and skeet range was located. But when environmental concerns closed the range, that ended the archers' recreation as well. Youngsters in Union County's 4H archery program have had to practice in an attic above Westfield Police headquarters, Tully said.

For a sport that attracts an estimated 4,000 enthusiasts in New Jersey alone, the new range is expected to foster additional interest in the sport, Tully said, noting that a number of Union County residents have made the U.S. Olympic Archery team.

Working mostly on weekends, the members of the Cranford Rod & Gun Club put in more than 500 man-hours to make the archery

range, said club member Ray Szpond, who coordinated the club's work. Also volunteering their time to build the archery range were members of United Bow Hunters of New Jersey, Traditional Archers of New Jersey, Union County 4H Club and area Boy Scouts. Instrumental in guiding the effort were Elizabeth residents Louis Sarmiento Sr. and Louis Sarmiento Jr., professional fence installers and members of United Bow Hunters.

The search for a new home had gone on for years, Szpond said. So when county officials signed off on the plan for Oak Ridge, there was a "sense of urgency" to get the project done quickly, he said.

"The county said they would supply the materials, but they couldn't cut loose 20 people to do this," Szpond said.

But the 30 or so active members of the club were more than willing.

"Before, we would have to travel to Hunterdon County to a state facility," Szpond said.

Bicyclists from Union County are looking forward to participating in the 30th Pan-Mass Challenge, a bike marathon with the goal of raising money for cancer research.

Local residents will join about 5,000 bikers from 36 states and eight countries for the two-day journey beginning Aug. 1.

Participants in the race hope to exceed last year's intake of \$35 million.

All donations and fundraising benefits associated with the event are forwarded to the Dana Farber Cancer Institute in Boston, a facility devoted both to research and patient care.

Suzanne Fountain, director of the institute's fundraising arm, known as the Jimmy Fund, said the challenge has become a major source of important funding, raising more than \$35 million last year.

"The PMC is our largest fundraiser by far," Fountain said. "Over the years it's helped fund many research initiatives and patient care."

Fountain praised the people who take part in the marathon, which includes patients, physicians and staff of the institute.

"It's a wide range of people who take part in it," Fountain said. "We're very lucky to have them on our side and in our corner."

The route takes the bikers a total of 190 miles across Massachusetts from Sturbridge to Provincetown. Participants can ride as individuals or form teams to ride in honor of a specific person. Summit resident

Lucas, a director of development and public education at St. Joseph's School for the Blind in Jersey City was acknowledged, along with Christopher Modzynski, senior executive vice president and chief operating officer of the New Jersey Devils and William Staats, senior vice president and private client adviser for U.S. Trust. Proceeds from the Many Are One Gala support scholarships for children of alumni that attend the University.

The Alumni Humanitarian Award is one of the most prestigious alumni awards given by the University. It's presented to an alumnus who embodies Seton Hall's mission of servant leadership by making a significant positive impact on his or her community. Since the inception of the award in 1986, only 23 individuals have been bestowed this honor.

Lucas lost his vision during a sandlot baseball game when he was struck between the eyes by a line drive. In spite of losing his sight, Lucas became one of the first blind students in the county to earn a four-year degree and the first blind student at Seton Hall.

While at college, he showed determination and self-confidence by not only earning a degree, but also by getting involved in WSOU and The Setonian.

same day, revealed in a letter posted on the district's Web site to be false. In the letter, Superintendent Rocco Tomazic said the city's Board of Health stated there is no laboratory confirmation of Swine Flu for the student in Soehl Middle School. According to Tomazic's letter, the matter seems to involve a fraudulent doctor's certificate and is now being investigated by the local police.

"We apologize for the disruption this incident has caused in our district; however, be assured that the district will continue to place the highest priority on keeping you informed and your children safe," Tomazic said.

Tomazic said he could not comment further due to an active criminal investigation into the matter.

"We continue to clean the schools, and anyone with fevers is being sent home. There are infections going around the schools, but none of it has been confirmed as swine," Tomazic said.

He reported an absentee rate among students that is slightly higher than normal, but not excessive.

The New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services has identified 14 confirmed cases of swine influenza in Union County, however it does not track cases by municipality.

According to the department's Web site, school closure is not advised for a suspected or confirmed case of H1N1 and, in general, is not advised unless there is a magnitude of faculty or student absenteeism that interferes with the school's ability to function.

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
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Novel explores blend of home, work life in D.A.'s war on crime

A one-of-a-kind book, such as "Hard Time & Nursery Rhymes," has been a long time coming for a hungry public to devour and appreciate. And its necessity to inform, reform, entertain and involve the public ceaselessly, plus opening the author's life to her family, is basically the reason it has been written and published.

It's obvious that its author, Claudia Trupp of South Orange, a brilliant and caring New York criminal defense attorney, specializing in appellate litigation, does not consider herself a heroine, but one needs only to read this astonishing book to contradict her consideration and compel her to admit that she is a "super heroine."

Its title, alone, "Hard Time & Nursery Rhymes," and its subtitle, "A Mother's Tales of Law and Disorder," explains the complexities of the life of a woman, who must balance her difficult and distracting work as an appellate defense lawyer with attending to a family of four — a helpful husband, who participates in the care and compassion of "parenting" three very young daughters. And still remain sane!

Trupp's difficult trials and tribulations are uncovered with decency, honesty and sincerity in a book about a hard-core world of criminality, the criminal justice system, its variety of judges and counselors,

and the vital necessities of family; sympathetic lawyer-husband, Charlie, and three little girls, who compete for favors and demand righteous equality.

Trupp has even managed to insert some humor in the hectic life abounding her pages. And if a fervent addict of television's realistic episodes of "Law and Order" can learn from those shows, he or she can apply that knowledge to additional lessons learned from Claudia Trupp's text. The only difference is that the author's episodes are completely and insidiously true.

Trupp has taken her inquisitive readers on a rip-roaring journey in which, for example, a day in her life will begin with giving her husband a kiss and bidding him to "have a nice day," greeting her babysitter, serving breakfast to Jessica, 9, Lila, 6, and Maya, 3, all of whom would rather be elsewhere. She then exits for the long, impossible drive to her office or to a correctional home to visit, for example, a convicted rapist, whom she

will represent, and frantically returning home by train to be on time to prepare dinner. And to spend some valuable time with her family.

Trupp brings her readers into a world far more complicated than any "crime show." Her life with convicted murderers, judges, counselors — and the families of those she represents — applying assistance, sympathy and, oftentimes, the kind of advice she offers her own daughters, takes one's breath away.

And, no matter how hard she works, how ill she may feel, she is always there for everyone; simply because it is Trupp's nature to be that way. And it becomes heart-breaking when, after all is said and done, she may easily lose a challenging case.

One follows her trail with tribulation, hope, exhilaration, empathy and sadness.

And one can learn a lesson or two in the world of appellate counselors, judges, police and a myriad of criminals. One also can learn what it is like to spend so much time in the workplace without neglecting a family that craves a woman in the home.

Trupp, unquestionably, will not adhere to the title, "super heroine," but in her dedication, she states, "For Charlie, who always knew that I didn't wear hats. And for our



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
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

Atlantic Health proposed helipad at Overlook

SUMMIT — The city's zoning board is preparing to examine an application for a variance for height regulations involving a proposal by Atlantic Health to build a heli-copter pad on the roof of Overlook Hospital.

Medical Director of Neuroscience at Overlook John Halperin said the primary purposes of adding a helistop at the facility will be to reduce transport time as well as the need for ground ambulance services. Most flights are expected to transport patients with serious neuroscience needs related to strokes and cranial bleeding. Halperin said that in treating strokes, time is of the essence, noting a motto, "time is brain."

"With each hour lost, the amount of brain matter damaged increases and the outcome is worse," Halperin said.

Summit Mayor Jordan Glatt said he has heard from residents concerned about the expected noise levels associated with heli-copter takeoffs and landings at late hours.

"Residents are concerned. It's change. Any time you have something like that in a neighborhood it will cause concern," Glatt said.

Glatt said he understands that noise from the pad may disrupt neighbors, but described this as "the lesser of two evils."

"We'd rather it landed in a controlled, safe environment than a field where at any given time, all sorts of stuff could be going

on," Glatt said of the proposed project.

At present, helicopters bearing patients bound for the hospital are forced to use such improvised landing sites as Memorial Field or the parking lot of the municipal pool, where local police and fire personnel must work to safely clear the area.

Fact sheets released by the hospital detail plans to utilize an EC-135P2 Eurocopter, a design known to emit a lower level of noise than other such vehicles.

Many hospitals in the region rely on Overlook Hospital's expertise in treating stroke cases, with patients regularly transferred to Overlook from facilities such as Bayonne Medical Center, the Bayshore Community Hospital in Holmdel, the Chilton

Memorial Hospital in Pompton Plains and the Hackensack University Medical Center in Hackensack.

"We have a network of between 15 and 20 hospital that routinely transfer their more complex stroke cases to take care of," Halperin said.

The facility handled a total of 800 stroke cases in 2008 and expects to see an average of about 100 flights annually should the heli-copter pad be approved and built, Halperin said.

"Overlook has evolved into being a major referral center for major vascular disease and strokes," Halperin explained. "We've been developing a lot of resources and capabilities to help patients who are suffering stroke."

Hotline 'soothes souls,' offers support to callers

The caller was distraught: She hates Sunday nights — thinking about returning to work the next day in a job that is filled with uncertainty. She works for a prominent media

company that has been suffering horrible financial setbacks. She worries if her job, or the company itself, will survive. She is fearful for her career at a time when she has a

huge mortgage to pay, an aging mother to care for and health issues of her own. As people across our state and nation reel from the current economic crisis, calls to the

Westfield-based Contact We Care hotline are up more than 20 percent from the same time last year, according to David Owens, executive director.

The recession's job losses, housing and stock market crises and other uncertainties have led to a significant increase in calls about financial stress, unemployment, and loss of job or home.

Since 1975, Contact has been soothing souls and saving lives through its volunteer-staffed caring and crisis hotline. Currently 120 men and women volunteer to staff the hotline, which is the primary responder in New Jersey to the National Suicide Prevention Life-line's numbers 1-800-SUICIDE and 1-800-273-TALK. CONTACT also answers a local hotline number: 908-233-2880.

"So many more of our callers are distraught over financial, employment or housing issues and desperately need our support," said Owens. "For so many people it's difficult to talk to those closest to them about personal problems, fearing criticism or rejection. With issues of unemployment or financial stress, there is often additional shame. Talking to complete strangers, trained to listen, can be extremely helpful."

Another caller we'll refer to as "M" called Contact We Care several times over the winter. He had prided himself on being a savvy investor, but now, half of the value of his holdings had disappeared, taking his own estimation of his self-worth with it. Devastated, he was thinking of suicide. After several weeks of occasional calls, M decided he should seek professional counseling.

In recent years the number of suicide calls handled by Contact has doubled with now more than 4 percent of the calls classified as suicide.

While the American Association of Suicidology says there is no clear association between a recession and suicide rates, they say there is a direct relationship between unemployment and suicide.





Banner season for H.S. softball squads

The 2009 softball season was a banner year for many Union County squads. Union went 27-5, winning the second-most games in school history and the most since a 28-2 finish in 1995. The Farmers won their record 11th Union County Tournament championship and first since 2000 and then went on to capture North 2, Group 4 for the first time since 1995.

Union then reached the Group 4 state championship game for the third time and first time since the only time the Farmers won it in 1989.

Cranford went 20-4 and captured a second consecutive undefeated Mountain Valley Conference-Mountain Division crown. Johnson's Smorol fans 6 in perfect All Star effort

Leads MVC baseball to first series win

ELIZABETH — You can argue that Rob Smorol was the best baseball player in Union County this year. His batting statistics back that up.

You can also argue that the Johnson senior left hander was the best pitcher — no disrespect to Westfield senior right hander Chris Jenkins and Scotch Plains junior righty Gary Binkiewicz.

When Smorol was healthy enough to pitch, not many caught up with his fastball or reached base.

Johnson head coach Dave Kennedy shut him down twice during the season because of a sore left arm. Smorol will attend Rutgers on a baseball scholarship and Kennedy, who played minor league baseball, was not taking any chances.

Smorol felt fine enough to pitch at the end of the season and Kennedy gave him the opportunity. He kept on getting batters out and winning games.

Kennedy also gave Smorol the ball to start the second annual Mountain Valley Conference vs. Watchung Conference Seniors All Star Baseball Game at Williams Field that took place June 10.

In a perfect three-inning stint, he sent Watchung Conference batters back to the dugout shaking their heads. Nine came up and nine went down, six striking out.

Smorol earned the mound victory in an eventual 7-4 MVC triumph that evened the series at 1-1. The Watchung Conference team won last year's game 5-4.

"You've got the best seniors in the county here, so this was a lot of fun," Smorol said.

When you're pitching and not allowing any baserunners and striking out numerous batters, there's a lot to smile about.

Smorol went 4-0 on the mound with a 1.13 earned-run average this year. He struck out 53 in 31 innings.

Had he been healthy enough to pitch the entire season, who knows what his numbers would have been like? Johnson finished with a winning record of 16-7. That mark might have been better as well.

This is how he described his senior campaign:

"It was a roller coaster, I guess," Smorol said. "I still got to hit, but I was really disappointed that I couldn't pitch this year.

"There was nothing I could do about it. I actually think the injury made me stronger, with more flexibility now in my arm."

Smorol described the injury this way, "it was an impingement in my shoulder. Basically, that came from lack of flexibility in my shoulder. There was some fluid in my arm, so I had to just shut it down for two or three weeks."

Smorol began the year strong on the mound and was then limited to just batting and playing the outfield. He then came back — on a limited pitch count — to beat Bloomfield 3-1 at Roselle Park April 19, throwing about 75 pitches in an economical six-inning start.

Then Kennedy had to shut him down again because of soreness that was there once more.

Smorol came back on the mound again to pitch against Roselle Catholic and Governor Livingston, beating RC 1-0 on the road May 21 and GL 8-1 at home on May 27.

"Against Roselle Catholic I felt very good and the GL game I didn't have much arm strength, but my arm felt fine and I didn't have any arm problems," Smorol said. "I didn't have as much strength, but my arm felt good."

He was strong and unhittable against the Watchung Conference All Stars.

"Today, my arm felt good," Smorol said. "I would say I'm at 100 percent right now."

Smorol is now playing for the Toms River-based New Jersey Terminators before his career at Rutgers will begin in September.

"The Terminators goes all the way until the fall and we have seven Division 1 pitchers on the team and 12 Division 1 players," Smorol said. "After that, Rutgers starts right as soon as school starts."

Smorol's fastball was looking pretty sharp Wednesday, with a pop you could hear loud and clear coming from Brearley catcher Roger Marques' glove.

"Last year I hit 87, but I haven't been clocked at all this year," Smorol said. "I would have to say 88 maybe, somewhere around there."

"We had four pitchers and Tom Mannix pitched on Sunday (June 7)," said Kennedy, who along with RC head coach Joe Kropa served as the MVC coaches.

Mannix, who will next play in the North-South All Star Football Game at Kean University in Union June 29 before heading to Holy Cross on a football scholarship, went the distance for Brearley in the June 7 Group 1 final vs. Park Ridge at Toms River East.

While Mannix was playing shortstop for the MVC squad, the North football team was practicing at Elizabeth's football field across the way. Mannix will now be joining those practices.

After Smorol pitched his three perfect innings, Brearley righty James Stafford pitched the fourth and fifth, allowing three runs.

Cranford right hander Adam Fanelli allowed no runs in the sixth and seventh and fellow Cranford righty James Knight just one run in his two innings of work, the eighth and ninth innings.

The MVC team scored two runs in the bottom of the second for a 2-0 lead and never trailed. Those runs were given up by WC starter AJ Ortiz of Linden, a lefty who will continue at Keystone College in La Plume, Pa.

Plainfield right hander Joshue Reyes pitched a scoreless third inning for the WC team, while Linden lefty Richard Weber gave up three runs in the fourth.

Union righty Ryan Pascullo, who will play at Rutgers-Newark, allowed one run in his two-inning stint that covered the fifth and sixth innings.

Dashon Jones, a righty from Newark East Side, gave up one run in the seventh, while Elizabeth right hander Yilson Herrera pitched scoreless eighth and ninth innings.

Although the MVC team was ahead 7-4 after Knight got the third out in the top of the ninth, the coaches allowed the teams to play the bottom of the ninth.

Herrera pitched a 1-2-3 inning and the game was over.

Tom Baylock of Scotch Plains, Bob Brewster of Westfield, Pat Migliore of Linden and Scott Gleichenhous of Plainfield were the WC coaches.

Smorol was the most dominating player on the field and would have been the most likely MVP candidate had one been chosen.

At the plate this year, he batted .547 with 24 runs and 40 RBI on the season.

In Wednesday's game, the righty batter got up once in the later innings when he wasn't pitching. He flied out to right in his only at-bat.

"On that side of it you've got to think that over time - if we can keep this going - this can be a real nice thing."

Elizabeth head coach Ray Korn was responsible for putting the game together the first two years to give kids undecided on where they would be going to college exposure to college scouts and coaches.

Like last year, there were local college scouts in attendance.

"Without Ray, it's going to be difficult, because he did so much to keep this going," Kennedy said.

"I think if the Union County coaches get together and commit to something and have something where you put out a product, people would want to watch it."

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Union's Axelrod earns soccer honor Posts stellar collegiate career at Whitman

Brett Axelrod of Union, the first Whitman College soccer player to earn a Northwest Conference Player-of-the-Year award, is the 2009 recipient of the R.V. Borleske Trophy, which is presented annually to the top male athlete at Whitman.

Axelrod was a four-year varsity goalie at Union High School for head coach Jim Jeskey and is a 2005 UHS graduate.

The trophy, awarded by a vote of the Whitman coaching staff, recognizes athletic ability and accomplishments, leadership and sportsmanship qualities and contributions to the campus as a whole.

Axelrod led the NWC last fall in shutouts 10, goals against average 0.39, save percentage .902 and minutes played 1855:57. He also ranked among the NCAA Division 3 national leaders, finishing third in save percentage and fifth in goals against average.

A senior team captain, Axelrod posted seven of his 10 shutouts in 13 conference games. He allowed just five goals against NWC opponents.

"Picking Brett as Defensive Player of the Year was a no-brainer," Whitman coach Mike Washington said. "His physical and technical skills are excellent and he's been a great leader on top of that."

"His expectations of himself and his team have always been very high."

The NWC began honoring Players of the Year for both offense and defense in 1994.

Axelrod, a four-year starter for the Missionaries, is the first Whitman player to win the award in either category. A year ago as a junior, he was voted to the All-NWC Second Team.

Axelrod was named NWC Defensive Player of the Week three times during his senior season. He earned his first weekly award after posting back-to-back shutouts in two games that ended in scoreless, double-overtime ties.

By season's end, Axelrod had four scoreless, 20T shutouts to his credit.

With Axelrod and defenders Kevin Sigley, Mike McKenzie, Joe Johnson and Cooper Crosby surrendering far fewer goals than any other team in the conference, Whitman stayed in the race for the NWC title until the final week of the season. Despite losing just two games, the Missionaries lost the conference crown by two points.

Whitworth, which also had two conference losses, escaped with the title by winning one more game than Whitman, which finished its season with one more tie.

Axelrod, who served on Whitman's Student Athlete Advisory Committee as a senior, is liked and respected by everyone in the athletic program, notes senior women's administrator and SAAC advisor Michelle Ferez.

"Brett is a tremendous leader and competitor," Ferez says. "He is all about working hard and being successful. Brett has a great sense of humor, but he is very straight forward and honest, and he isn't afraid to tell it like it is. People like and respect him for all of those reasons."

"I've really enjoyed getting to know Brett the past four years. There are a lot of people who like Brett, both as a person and as a very talented soccer player."

A sociology major, Axelrod worked as a campus photographer throughout his four years at Whitman. He took photographs for both the Communications and Athletics departments, in addition to serving as a photographer and photo editor for the Pioneer, Whitman's student newspaper.

Axelrod's other Whitman activities ranged from work with the Admissions office to his role as a student staff manager at Baker Ferguson Fitness Center.

Axelrod also found the time to volunteer as a coach with teams at the local high school and youth soccer association.

After graduating last month, Axelrod planned to return home to Virginia for training sessions and try-outs with two professional soccer clubs. At some point he plans to pursue a master of fine arts degree in photography.

Axelrod is the son of Joe and Judy Axelrod of Keswick, Va. and is presently a Keswick resident.

The Borleske Trophy honors Raymond V. Borleske, who achieved legendary status as an athlete and later as a coach at Whitman during the first half of the 20th century.

He starred on Whitman's football and baseball teams, and he was the first football player from the Northwest to be recognized by Walter Camp's Spaulding Football Guide.

After graduating from Whitman and earning a law degree, Borleske returned to campus in 1915 to begin a coaching career that continued until 1947.

NOTES: Union went 15-6-2 during Axelrod's senior season of 2004. The Farmers finished second in the county, second in the American Division of the Watchung Conference and reached the North 2, Group 4 semifinals.

Axelrod made 12 saves in the Union County Tournament championship game that Union lost to Scotch Plains 1-0 at Williams Field in Elizabeth.

Axelrod's eighth shutout that year was a 1-0 victory over 17th-seeded Summit in the UCT semifinals at Williams Field.

The Hilltoppers stunned defending champion and top-seeded Linden 1-0 on the road in the first round and then won again in the quarterfinals to reach the final four.

Axelrod and Mike Kuzan combined for their first shutout of the season two days later - making a total of six saves - in a 5-0 conference home win over Plainfield.

As the top seed, Union was defeated at home by fourth-seeded Bridgewater-Raritan 2-1 in the N2, G4 semis.

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH THE SALARIES, WAGES OR COMPENSATIONS OF AND FOR THE EMPLOYEES OF THE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY OF THE CITY OF SUMMIT, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY. (CWA - LOCAL 1031)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY OF THE CITY OF SUMMIT, As follows:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE Salaries, wages, longevity and other compensation as set forth in Schedules A, B, and C, which are attached hereto and made a part hereof, are hereby fixed for the employees for the Free Public Library, City of Summit at the respective rates and sums shown therein effective as of January 1, 2009.

SECTION 2. PAYMENT All salaries, wages, longevity and other compensation for full-time employees shall be paid in bi-weekly installments within the ranges and according to the conditions herein set forth.

Other part-time employees shall be paid in bi-weekly installments within the specified ranges.

SECTION 3. SALARIES Salaries for the various positions of employment in the Free Public Library shall be at or within the range of the minimum and maximum amounts as delineated on Schedules A, B & C, attached hereto and made a part hereof.

All individuals hired by the Library Board will be hired at the minimum step level in the position classification. Under exceptional circumstances, approval may be given to consider credit for experience outside of the City of Summit in the same position or type of work as his/her employment with the City of Summit. In such instances, upon approval of the Board, and individual may be hired on a step level above the minimum.

SECTION 4. LONGEVITY Employees represented by contract with the Library Board of Trustees shall comply with the provisions contained in those agreements.

SECTION 5. HOLIDAY PAY Employees represented by contract will be granted twelve (12) paid holidays in accordance with provision contained in those agreements.

SECTION 6. OVERTIME - Fair Labor Standards Act: Notwithstanding any other provisions of this ordinance, overtime compensation shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act as they apply to units of local government. If any provisions of this ordinance are administratively found to be in conflict with provisions of FLSA, the Director shall ensure that the requirements of federal law and regulations, when issued, are met.

SECTION 7. SALARY INCREMENTS Any employee whose performance review shows acceptable performance shall receive an increment in accordance with the step level of the position classification until the maximum for the position is reached.

Unless prohibited under the terms of a union agreement, the Director may withhold all or part of a salary increase from an employee for reasons of poor performance. This will be limited to situations in which the employee has received prior written notice of performance problems and has failed to correct the problem. This action may be taken only with the approval of the Library Board of Trustees.

Monthly anniversary dates for step increases and longevity shall be as follows: 1. All anniversary dates will be January 1 and July 1. 2. Any employee hired after January 1 or July 1 will be moved forward for the increases.



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



Linden Promenade wins planning award

The Raymond Wood Bauer Promenade, a project financed and developed by the Union County Improvement Authority and the City of Linden, has won the New Jersey Planning Officials Achievement in Planning award, Improvement Authority Executive Director Charlotte DeFilippo announced recently.

The mixed-use development contains a 350-seat amphitheater, stone chess tables, bench seating, plaza entry, surrounding flower beds, and a two-story, 5,000-square-foot commercial building.

A kiosk area and bathroom facility is also located in the promenade, which was designed by Victor E. Vinegra of Harbor Consultants in Cranford. The entire development is in the footprint of the former Linden Theater at 400 North Wood Ave. at Knopf Street, across from City Hall. The promenade was named after Raymond Wood Bauer, a deceased banker and philanthropist. The promenade and amphitheater was financed/funded in part through the Union County Improvement Authority, the city of Linden, and the state of New Jersey Green Acres program. The county of Union also contributed an additional \$250,000 in funding from the Open Space Trust Fund's "Greener the Streets" program.

The Bauer promenade was managed by the Union County Improvement Authority, utilizing the professional team of Harbor Consultants of Cranford, and the Silcon Group of Elizabeth.

"Part of the Union County Improvement Authority's mission is to provide financing to develop important public projects that improve the quality of life for our residents," DeFilippo said.

Governor's Race Filled with Drama and Melodrama for New Jersey Businesses

As Election Day '09 draws near over the next several months, New Jersey will be treated to almost daily visits by a "Who's Who" of American politicians and public officials – from Bill and Hilary Clinton to John McCain and Rudy Giuliani. The state's business community will be seated center orchestra watching the procession.

Much is at stake for both major parties in the Garden State as incumbent Gov.

Jon Corzine, a Democrat, faces off against Republican challenger Chris Christie in a race that has national implications.

For Republicans, the gubernatorial contest is a litmus test, an opportunity to challenge the thrust of the Obama administration's brush stroke 10 months after the inauguration. For Democrats, who experienced landside Congressional victories last fall, the election is a referendum and

opportunity to reaffirm their policies.

Virginia has the only other gubernatorial race this fall, so all eyes are turned east. Yet it is only the local audience whose votes count.

In New Jersey Republicans see Corzine as vulnerable. In the weeks leading up to the June 2 primaries, a Quinnipiac College poll showed incumbent Corzine trailing Christie in a likely November contest. Among all registered voters, Corzine trailed Christie 45-38 percent, with independent voters backing Christie 52-25 percent, according to the May 20 poll.

In addition, just two weeks prior to the primaries the poll also noted Corzine's approval rating with voters had slipped to 38 percent.

Both numbers are likely to change as loyal Democrats, who outnumber registered Republicans in New Jersey by more than three-to-one, galvanize around their party's candidate, according to Clay Richards, assistant director of the polling institute.

"Once the primary is over, Corzine will put on his million-dollar golden gloves and start to fight," Richards said.

As predicted, Christie defeated former Bogota Mayor Steve Lonegan in the Republican primary. Lonegan is a staunch conservative who championed a 2.9 percent flat tax; Christie, a hard-nosed former prosecutor who sent more than 100 crooked politicians to jail, is considered a moderate.

As both candidates officially launched their campaigns last month, New Jersey unemployment was at a 15-year high, 8.4 percent as of April 30, although less than the national rate of 9.4 percent in May, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

According to preliminary estimates from the New Jersey Department of Labor and Workforce Development's monthly survey of employers, nonfarm wage and salary employment in the Garden State decreased by 14,400 jobs in April, to a total of 3,945,600. All the loss occurred in the private

Now is a great time to plan a vacation. All you need is some money.

They key word here is some – versus a lot. Deals are out there, from Skyland campgrounds to Caribbean cruises with Jersey beaches in between.

In his famous song about longing for vacation, Jimmy Buffet says, "I've got to fly to St. Somewhere." When asked where Margaritaville is located, Buffet answers, "Anywhere you want it to be."

Like Margaritaville, bargains are anywhere

you want them to be this year: on airfare; at hotels and tourist attractions; even at the gas pump, where prices are high versus a few months ago but still a bargain when compared with last summer's \$4 levels.

Yet despite bargain-basement prices on travel, fewer people are planning vacations this year, according to an Associated Press survey taken in May. Only 42 percent of Americans are planning a vacation this summer. That is 7 percent less than the 49 percent who said they planned to take a summer trip in a similar poll in 2005.

Never Better

Last November, in the aftermath of the stock market crash, I overheard two businessmen bemoaning the recession. They were wondering what the government would do to help stimulate the economy.

I wanted to shake them, to ask them, "What are you doing to boost your business? What new products and services will you offer to *earn the right* to more business? What new techniques will you try to lower your cost, boost your productivity?"

I imagined their reply: "Yeah, but what is the government going to do? After all, demand is off. We need the government to stimulate demand."

Why not create your own demand?

I'm sure the conversation I overheard is not representative of our business culture. But I started speculating: what if it was representative?

Then I would have to conclude how far we have fallen – in our national ethos – from the early 1900s, when optimism was the national byword. When writers like Napoleon Hill and W. Clement Stone could teach us:

- How to Think and Grow Rich
- The value of a Positive Mental Attitude

We learned that, "What the mind of man can conceive and believe, he can achieve."

It was the age of optimism, of "can do."

This was the time when Bruce Barton wrote, "When you're through changing, you're through."

What happened to America since the 1920s? What could cause today's businesspeople to hesitate, to wait and ask, "What will the government do?"

A young, burgeoning, industrializing nation matured. We lived through the Great Depression. We fought the Second World War. We encountered cutthroat overseas competition, which cost millions of jobs. Later we fought the Viet Nam War. Certainly these are grounds for pessimism (despite paradigm-shifting technological advances – including the transistor, the computer and bioengineering.)

In this mindset, I was reminded of a saying identified with a retired salesperson: "Never Better."

In the 1950s, America lived through two recessions of 10-month durations – one spanning 1953-1954, the other 1957-1958. During these recessions, the salesperson was disappointed to hear other salespeople – working for his company and working for competition – bemoan the terrible market conditions of that day. To make an optimistic counterpoint, to offer a positive view of life, when asked how things were, he responded, "never better."

This is sound advice for us to embrace in this current recession.

Although a recession is disruptive and widespread, there is something that can be even worse, that businesspeople face constantly – the declining market scenario. A recession is just a special case of the declining market scenario, which merits discussion.

In a mature economy, with mature technologies, it is inevitable that many of our products, services and even industries are facing decline. (Consider the recent switch from CDs to IPODs, after CDs had replaced records.)

There are markets that decline 20-40 percent per year – think of print advertising as a result of the Internet.

It is the job of leadership to prolong the life cycle of declining businesses, to use the extra life cycle to fund new businesses being developed.

Salespeople have a pivotal role to extend the life cycle of declining businesses. They need to take a "do or die" approach – a "can do" attitude plus nonstop creativity. Best efforts are a recipe for disaster. Neither business owner nor sales people have a chance of success if they are waiting for the government to do something.

They need to embrace life with a "never better" attitude.

I have some knowledge of declining businesses – I have been hired by management in about a dozen declining businesses, to help arrest the decline.

I have been very fortunate to be inspired by that retired salesperson who always said, "never better." This attitude helps me inspire sales teams in very difficult markets.

Yes, I have been fortunate. Since I was a boy my father – that retired salesperson – always taught me that things were "never better."

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

That could be good news for local tourist attractions such as restaurants, bed and breakfasts, museums and the like, and particularly good news for the Jersey Shore. The poll also found that 20 percent of those planning a trip this summer will stay closer to home due to economic worries.

The Jersey Shore is less than one gas tank away for more than 91 million people, according to Jennifer Stringfellow, tourism manager for the New Jersey Department of Tourism, making it an ideal destination for many budget-minded families.

The Department of Tourism is hoping to lure vacationers from nearby New York City to the Shore region, having opened a "pop-up" Jersey Shore Store on Broadway near Union Square in Manhattan for the summer. The store includes pictures of "iconic" Shore attractions, such as the boardwalk, and will be staffed with travel experts who can help families plan the perfect Shore vacation.

Many hotels and tourist attractions also have put together special packages for the summer and Stringfellow believes the new Aces train to Atlantic City will be an added draw for city dwellers looking for a weekend away.

"We want to remind New Yorkers of the great vacation opportunity they have right next door," she said.

Towns along the Shore are gearing up to woo stay-at-home vacationers with a wide variety of festivals, free events and special packages.

"There's a whole litany of activities planned throughout the summer and into September," said Maria Maruca of the Ocean County Chamber of Commerce. Popular vacation spots in Ocean County include Seaside Heights, Point Pleasant and Long Beach Island.

The cruise market has remained stronger than other vacation options, but there are still bargains to be had in this area, as well, Feola added.

"The deals for Alaska and Hawaii are unheard of right now, as much as 50 percent less," he said.

If vacationing by air, travelers should be prepared for crowds at the airport and on the plane, Feola warned. About 207 million passengers are expected to fly this summer, an increase of about 2 million, or roughly 1 percent, over last year. But this small increase in the number of passengers will be offset by a 4 percent decrease in flights.

That may make sticking close to home seem even better, and Stringfellow said the Tourism department is cautiously optimistic about prospects for the summer.

"We have noticed that reservations are being made at the last minute, not as far in advance as in past years," she said. However, rental properties and hotels are starting to fill up and second homeowners are returning. The campgrounds are full and the weekend traffic reports show an increase in traffic near the Shore – all promising signs for a good summer tourist season.

In the end, the Jersey Shore may turn out to be the most popular place to spend summer vacation this year – St. Somewhere and Margaritaville all in one.

sector (-15,600), as public sector employment rose by 1,200, entirely due to hiring by the federal government for the 2010 census.

The numbers add up to an election that carries unusually high stakes for both New Jersey residents and businesses. And because business drives employment, the business community of New Jersey is watching closely.

Open for Business – or Not

For years, New Jersey has been ranked as one of the least business-friendly states in the nation, according to a number of ongoing national polls.

"For far too long our state has had an anti-business mentality, so it's no surprise that New Jersey is known as the least business-friendly state in the nation," Christie said. "I will immediately get to work fixing this."

"In addition to reducing corporate business tax rates to make New Jersey more competitive with our neighbors, I will consolidate the state's fragmented economic development activities into the New Jersey Partnership for Action, which will act as a one-stop shop for new businesses to make opening in or relocating to New Jersey easier and more convenient.

"With this public-private partnership we will not only be able to walk new companies through regulatory processes and assist with tax incentives but we will give our private sector a voice in the Governor's office. I will make this agency one of the Lieutenant Governor's principle responsibilities to ensure that this is an effective infrastructure for private sector growth."

Corzine has worked tirelessly during his first administration to improve the state's business climate and to overcome those negative perceptions, according to Sean Darcy, Corzine campaign spokesman. He will continue to do so during a second term, Darcy added.

"Gov. Corzine created the first-in-the-nation Economic Assistance and Recovery Plan,"

Darcy said. "One of the components of this plan was to help attract and retain businesses to the state. One of the facets of the plan was the creation of Invest NJ, which provides \$3,000 for each new job created and \$70 million in grants to offset sales tax on capital investment. It also made significant long-term legal, tax and accounting adjustments sought by the business community, resulting in more than \$125 million in savings for New Jersey businesses.

"And the Main Street Business Assistance program provides \$50 million in financing for small and mid-sized businesses."

Darcy said Corzine will continue to press for similar business-friendly initiatives.

"This first-in-the-nation Economic Assistance and Recovery Plan has put us in position to take advantage as soon as the national economy rebounds," he said.

Transportation

Transportation is a major component of commerce worldwide and is an important issue for New Jersey businesses, as well.

"(Corzine) has invested in our public infrastructure by expediting public works projects for schools, roads and bridges to create over 10,000 jobs," Darcy said. "He also championed the construction of the mass transit tunnel. It will create 6,000 jobs every year over the life of the project and generate 44,000 new jobs upon completion."


On June 8 Corzine was among a group of elected officials who helped launch the \$8.7 billion mass transit tunnel in North Bergen, the largest mass transit project in the country, which will be partially funded by federal stimulus dollars.

The new tunnel beneath the Hudson River – known as ARC, for Access to the Region's Core – will link New Jersey with New York and eventually will double capacity on the nation's busiest rail corridor, running from Washington to Boston, officials said.

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"This is going to promote mobility, reduce commuter congestion, staunch carbon emissions, enhance regional competitiveness and lay a foundation for an extraordinary expansion of mass transit in the most densely populated state in the nation, New Jersey," Corzine previously said.

Other transportation improvements of the last four years cited by Darcy include:

- More than 9,000 jobs created through programs and capital investment by the Department of Transportation, NJ TRANSIT and other agencies;
- Planned investment of \$3.6 billion – \$2.2 billion for highways and bridges and \$1.4 billion for mass transit systems;
- Leveraging of the federal stimulus plan to replace and repair structurally deficient bridges, reconstruct and resurface highways, improve drainage and make important safety improvements on the state highway system;
- Opening of the state-of-the-art Statewide Traffic Management Center, which improves the management of and response to accidents, adverse weather, special events and congestion.

Christie believes that New Jersey's transportation network is broken and needs fixing.

"We have the worst roads in America, and this impacts our state in a myriad of ways," he said. "It adversely affects our safety, our quality of life, and those trying to do business in New Jersey. Our roadways are too crowded, poorly run, poorly maintained and far too expensive – and don't forget Gov. Corzine's proposal to raise tolls 50 percent every four years.

"The first step to fixing our roadways will be to restore solid, responsible management to the department. I will increase accountability and efficiency to make sure our tax dollars are being spent on expansion, modernization and infrastructure repair, not wasted on bloated bureaucrat salaries. I will end the use of project labor agreements, which drive up the cost of public construction projects and fail to deliver a public benefit at a time when the economy is shedding jobs and taxpayers are struggling to make ends meet. I will also save taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars and expedite key projects by utilizing innovative procurement methodologies like Design/Build/Operate/Maintain (DBOM)."

Taxes

Christie also is critical of New Jersey's business tax structure and myriad of regulations.

"The taxation and overbearing regulation of the private sector is breaking our economy," he said. "I am committed to fostering growth in our private sector to create jobs for New Jersey by slashing our state's burdensome taxes, eliminating the double taxation on s-corporations and cutting the corporate business tax rate to make New Jersey competitive with neighboring states. We can no longer allow these outrageous taxes and regulation to impede our private sector growth."

Darcy counters that Corzine has made progress in retooling the state's corporate and business taxes, and will continue to do so.

"Under the Governor's first-in-the-nation Economic Assistance and Recovery Plan, launched in October 2008, the Governor made several important changes to the Corporation Business Tax," Darcy said.

These included elimination of the "throw-out rule;" elimination of the "regular place of business" requirement; and extending the Net Operating Loss Carryforward from seven to 20, according to the spokesman.

"These changes have been sought by the business community in New Jersey for several years and are expected to result in more than \$125 million in savings for New Jersey businesses," Darcy said.

Environment

Corzine and Christie have similar approaches to environmental issues.

"While I am committed to protecting the environment, there also needs to be a commitment to cultivating our private sector growth," Christie said. "One of the first things I will do is overhaul New Jersey's excessive regulation by restoring balance and fairness with the creation of a permanent Red Tape Review Group. This group will review all current regulations and any new regulations to ensure their necessity. With this overbearing regulation comes additional fees and fines that cause even more hardship for our small businesses."

Corzine has tried to strike a balance between good business and wise stewardship of the environment, according to Darcy. The Governor established the Permit Efficiency Task Force to conduct a comprehensive analysis of DEP permitting and implemented numerous recommendations, including a new electronic permitting service, Darcy said.

He also signed the Permit Extension Act of 2008, which extends permit duration at a period of economic upheaval. As financing has been difficult to obtain, the permit extension allows development to resume immediately as the economy begins to recover – without requiring a return to the DEP to renew the permitting process.

Corzine also championed the Site Remediation Reform legislation and recently signed the landmark bill that will enable the private and public sector to remediate 20,000 sites throughout the state, allowing for increased environmentally responsible development, according to Darcy.

Labor

Darcy also cited a 2008 Princeton University study that shows "a brain gain of well-educated and talented residents entering (New Jersey's) labor pool."

Among eight northeastern states, growth in New Jersey's civilian labor force is projected to rise 8 percent through 2030, according to the study. In contrast, New York, Connecticut and Pennsylvania are forecast to experience negative growth of 5 percent, 2 percent and 7 percent, respectively.

"The number of half-millionaires has risen 70 percent in four years," Darcy said. "That translates into 18,000 new New Jersey residents who contribute to state income tax revenues."

Christie sees the tide flowing in an opposite direction. He said he is alarmed by an exodus of workers from New Jersey.

"New Jersey's workforce is dwindling every day because of the anti-business climate fostered by Governor Corzine," Christie said. "New Jersey businesses are fleeing the state due to higher taxes and unneeded regulation and they are taking their jobs with them."

"With the unemployment rate the highest it has been in 16 years, New Jersey faces a lack of good-paying jobs for hard-working New Jerseyans. We must stop the employment outflow by enticing good companies back. I am committed to bringing these jobs back by creating a better business climate, reducing taxes, cutting fines and fees, and breaking down the abundance of regulation that has plagued our state for too long. Once we implement these plans that I have put forth, we will once again be competitive with our neighbors."

Rote Versus Thinking is a Bad Choice

I just returned from a national forum on educational reform conducted by the Institute for a Competitive Workforce and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The forum focused on workforce preparedness: are our kids coming out of school prepared to go to work in jobs where they are most needed and what reforms are needed in our schools to get them there?

The conference was fascinating. It brought together some of the leading reform advocates from think tanks and foundations around the country. Interestingly, both sides of the political aisle seemed in harmony about the need to continue systemic reform and every indication is that the Obama administration is going to be inclined to a continuation and a refinement of the policies underway.

Not surprisingly No Child Left Behind was a major topic of discussion. Here the focus was primarily on urban school districts where the legislation seems to have a dramatic and positive effect. There was also a good deal of discussion on how some states try to subvert the process by making tests too easy, thus giving the impression that they are doing a good job teaching.

There is a new initiative to create national standards called the Common Core State Standards Initiative. I'm proud to say that New Jersey is one of the 46 states that have signed on to this proposal. Only Alaska, Missouri, South Carolina and Texas are lagging in coming on board.

However, I am very troubled by the determination of these new standards.

Over and over we read that the United States is falling behind in math and science. But are math and science the best measures of how well a society is doing? I think not. Though I did my graduate work in advanced applied mathematics, I know a lot of people who are very successful even though they can barely add.

We are told there are not enough people being trained to work in labs. We read that in our universities a disproportionately large percentage of the math and science students come from foreign countries. We are warned they are stealing our jobs at home, taking our technology abroad and soon we're going to be a backwater nation.

To me this smacks of xenophobia. It is natural that foreign students gravitate to the sciences as language skill is less important in those pursuits. Also, a very large proportion of these students end up staying in the U.S. and fill the lab tech jobs we keep hearing about. Immigrants have always filled jobs in the U.S.; this has made us the country we are. As for taking technology home, the wealthier the country, the more valuable trading partner it is.

Many times during the forum the success of Singapore was highlighted. Singapore consistently scores at the highest end of the spectrum in math and science. Singapore is also the cleanest, greenest, most modern city in the world.

However, Singapore is a city, and not an especially big one. But it has the revenue of a county. In other words, the equivalent of all federal, state and local taxes together, with property taxes and sales taxes included, all go into its budget. Singapore has a lot of money to spend. I moved to New Jersey from Singapore, and I can attest to this first hand.

Yet Singaporeans are not sought-after managers. Their workers are incredibly skilled and able to do to perfection that which they have been taught to do. Whether working on an assembly line, in a lab running experiments or making accounting journal entries, they are super. Don't put a problem before them that they have never seen, however, because you will be disappointed with the results.

This brings me to my big fear. The U.S. education system has been structured to teach people how to think. Unlike most of the world, we have not traditionally been taught by rote to simply memorize facts to regurgitate them on a test.

However, as we move toward national standards, this could become a very real possibility. We may get real good at turning out lab techs, but not musicians and writers and entrepreneurs.

Bad Medicine for an Ailing State Budget

New Jersey state leaders are now rummaging through couch cushions searching for spare change in a desperate attempt to close the \$2 billion deficit in the state's 2010 budget. The Corzine administration has proposed a number of radical steps to balance the budget by July 1, as required by the state's constitution, including spending cuts, an increase in income taxes on higher earners and other revenue-producing measures.

However, one crumb discovered in the couch cushions by state Treasurer David Rousseau will prove very unhealthy to the state if ingested, his proposal to increase premium taxes paid by health insurance carriers.

Health insurance carriers operating in New Jersey currently pay a 2 percent tax on premiums paid for both general and HMO coverage. The proposal calls for raising those taxes by .25 percent and 1 percent, respectively. Collectively, the increases would generate an additional \$116 million in revenue for the state in fiscal 2010, according to the *Asbury Park Press*.

Under such dire budgetary circumstances, \$116 million sounds like not such bad medicine to help stop the state's hemorrhaging. In reality, the tax increases are more akin to widening an already festering wound – the rising cost of providing healthcare coverage that each year weakens businesses and drives more employers to reduce or eliminate health benefits for workers and their families.

According to the 2008 Health Benefits Survey conducted by the New Jersey Business and Industry Association, employer health insurance costs rose by 9.4 percent in New Jersey in 2007. (Results for 2008 have not yet been released.)

Smaller companies are feeling the pinch even more intensely than larger businesses. Insurance costs for companies with 2-50 employees rose 9.8 percent; companies with 2-19 employees continuing to provide coverage to workers has dropped to 75 percent, down from 92 percent just four years ago; and many of the smaller companies continuing to provide health benefits reported scaling back hiring plans and/or pay increases to be able to afford coverage.

The proposed premium tax increases will translate into even more bad news for the state's employers, and ultimately their employees and families.

The insurance carriers are precluded from passing along the premium taxes – and tax increases – to their customers and are thereby forced to absorb those expenses, eroding their earnings. There are only about one dozen carriers serving New Jersey and a further erosion of profits might be the final blow that flat lines the continued presence of some of those carriers in the state.

For example, AmeriHealth, a New Jersey-based health insurer solely focused on meeting the needs of New Jersey-based businesses, would have to cut back on programs that help to contain costs for employers – such as innovative wellness initiatives. It could also threaten their continued viability as an insurer in New Jersey.

Were AmeriHealth and other carriers to cease doing business in New Jersey, the ultimate sufferers will be the state's residents, employers and healthcare providers. Whenever competition is reduced in any arena – any time there are fewer options for buyers – prices tend to increase and services tend to decline.

In addition, just as the overall burden of providing health coverage to employees falls disproportionately heaviest on smaller employers, so will a reduction in coverage and carrier options, with the employees of these smaller companies ultimately taking the hit in one way or another.

There is no dispute that New Jersey's leaders must take drastic steps to close the budget gap and balance the budget. There is no denying that every proposal made by the state's leaders for cutting spending and/or generating revenue is met by a chorus of naysayers who claim their interest or sector of the community is too vital to the state's economy, culture or quality of life to absorb such punishment.

Yet no sector of New Jersey is immune from the rising costs of health insurance that each year claim a larger share of employee paychecks, business budgets and state funding. Any steps that threaten to exacerbate the health insurance crisis instead of easing it are heading in the wrong direction.

The proposal to increase health insurance premium taxes is the wrong prescription for the state's budget ailments. The Governor and Legislature should spit this pill out.

Increasingly Sophisticated Gangs Call for Increasingly Tougher Laws

Despite the recent investigative advances of law enforcement to fetter gang activity, a new generation of gang members has emerged and clearly demonstrated that they still possess the will and the means to carry out any number of crimes.

Many years ago gangs were a problem almost exclusive to inner cities. In 2009 and the "Internet age" the problem has become ubiquitous. No longer do gangs and their members reside in the inner cities; no longer are they of uniform demographic background. Gangs have evolved, often into organizations so sophisticated that they more closely model small cohesive business entities. While crime in some categories has seen a relative decrease, crimes involving gangs and guns have steadily increased.

The U.S. Department of Justice estimates that about one in every 100 persons between the ages of 12 and 19 belongs to a criminal street gang. This becomes even more sobering when you consider that the number of juveniles arrested for robbery has increased by 22 percent and the number of juveniles arrested for weapon-related offenses has increased by 16 percent, according to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Report, 2007 New Jersey State Police Gang Survey.

The report also states that the majority of violent crime in New Jersey is almost exclusive to 20 municipalities. Paterson, unfortunately, is one of these municipalities; it comprises roughly half the population of my district. Within these 20 communities 78 percent of all murders, 55 percent of all weapons-related offenses and 81 percent of all gang-related homicides are committed.

It is evident that a gang presence exists; and by all indications, it has exacerbated over the past decade. As chairman of the Law & Public Safety Committee, I have made it my priority to take initiative and design a progression of proactive legislation to address criminal street gangs in New Jersey.

In an effort to stymie gangs at their root, the Senate Law & Public Safety and Veterans' Affairs Committee moved legislation – signed into law by the Governor last session – that makes it a crime of the second degree to solicit or recruit a minor to join or actively participate in a criminal street gang.

To combat gang gun violence, I have been relentless in supporting legislation through my committee that makes it a crime to unlawfully sell or transfer handgun ammunition to another person, unless the person is a licensed manufacturer, wholesaler, dealer or owner, thereby targeting gang members who have illegal possession of firearms while protecting our law abiding citizens. Additionally, I sponsored a bill – now law – that makes it a second-degree crime to transport firearms into the state for purposes of unlawful sale or transfer.

The committee has also fought to upgrade the penalties for illegal gun possession; vigorously sponsoring legislation to take guns out of gang members' hands, now making it a crime of the second degree for illegal possession of handguns.

We had previously enacted a measure that sought to stymie illegal handgun possession last session, along with another piece of legislation that established the offense of gang criminality, seeking to comprehensively address the broad scope of gang activity throughout our state.

I believe that more restrictive sentencing guidelines for the possession of these destructive weapons represent a constructive policy toward eliminating gang activity.

One of the most salient pieces of legislation passed last session was the aforementioned "gang criminality" bill. I sponsored this legislation to address gang involvement directly, making it a crime to commit, attempt to commit, or conspire to commit any number of gang-related offenses regardless of principal or accessory involvement.

The committee also moved legislation that will require boards of education to offer instruction in gang violence prevention, including how to spot signs of gang activity and student involvement in gangs. We also have a law in place from a measure I sponsored that will require the court to conduct an inquiry concerning the source of bail funds when a defendant is charged with certain serious crimes, so that we can further penetrate into gang activity in our communities.

In order to truly make our streets safe we must continue to set forth initiatives that can unequivocally address gang-related crime.

The Business of Engaging Politics

New Jersey businesses operate in what is arguably one of the toughest political and legal environments in the United States. New Jersey is widely considered one of the most highly regulated and, unfortunately, business-unfriendly states in the nation.

Over the years, government entities at the state, county and local levels have enacted a myriad of laws and regulations in an attempt to control business and protect the residents from any negative consequences of business activity. At the same time, the same government entities have come to realize that a real partnership between government and business is required to provide the best outcomes for state residents.

"Home Rule," the preference for a strong local government, has a long tradition in New Jersey. While most believe that it is the federal government that has the most influence on business, one might argue that the local government is at least as powerful.

For example, New Jersey has the highly developed Municipal Land Use Law that gives local governments wide powers over business activities in their respective municipalities. Zoning is one area where politics plays a major role in determining the value of real estate. Most business owners are unaware that a small group of individuals that lobby a governing body can often have longstanding zoning laws overturned in a few months.

For example, landlords with buildings located on major highways planned for "big-box" stores can have their projects wiped out when a zoning ordinance is enacted that limits the square footage of stores. In fact, the "Time of Decision" rule in New Jersey allows governing bodies to enact legislation "on the fly" to react to projects that are filed with the Planning Board or Board of Adjustment. This means that new laws can quickly be created to stop potential business activity in its tracks, well after investors have expended capital, time and effort for projects that have no hope of coming to fruition due to the actions of local politicians.

While the aforementioned example is just the tip of the regulation iceberg, the real question for New Jersey business leaders is how to deal with the powerful state political system and be able to not only survive, but actually thrive. The best recommendation is to practice proactive engagement. Businesses must not only engage elected officials, but also the hundreds of appointed members of state, county and local boards that have power over their businesses.

It is also important to remember that businesses cannot vote. As such, the options for engagement are limited. Business people would be well advised to get to know their local, county and state officials by attending political dinners and other events. Getting involved with political campaigns can also be a great way to get to know those in the political arena.

Many business people choose to become even more active by seeking appointments to boards. Politicians, like business people, tend to work with people that they know. Political contributions to the campaign funds of politicians should also be thought of in the same way one thinks of buying tickets to a sporting event. There is really no difference between supporting your favorite sports team and supporting your favorite politicians in their quest for re-election.

Education is another way to engage elected officials and board members. Invitations for officials to visit businesses, such as during grand openings or for tours, are great ways to break the ice and help these officials to understand what the issues are from the business perspective. Too often the true intentions and nature of business issues are not communicated to these powerful players in the political process.


Engagement is the key to bridging the gap between the political and business worlds. In New Jersey, the two are inextricably intertwined, so proactive engagement is the key to making New Jersey politics work for New Jersey businesses.

The Annual Survey of the 10 Hardest Jobs To Fill Finds Gaps in the U.S. Workforce?

Engineers, nurses and skilled/manual trades are among the nation's most challenging positions to fill, according to survey findings recently released by Manpower Inc., an international employment services company.

"In the four years we have performed this research, the same positions appear on the list again and again," said Jonas Prising, executive vice president of Manpower. "Despite the current economic instability and high unemployment, there are still skills that the U.S. workforce seems to lack."

Each of the 10 job categories on the 2009 list has appeared on the Hardest Jobs to Fill list in the past. Technicians, machinist/machine operators and sales representatives have been present all four years; engineers, drivers and laborers have appeared three out of four years; and nurses, teachers, skilled/manual trades and IT staff have been present in two of the four years Manpower has performed the survey.

Even with unemployment at or near record levels in many communities, Manpower's research highlights the problem many employers are having finding individuals with the right combination of job-specific skills, experience, training and soft skills.

"While talk has slowed in the U.S. about the pending talent shortage, it is becoming clearer that there is a talent disconnect," said Melanie Holmes, vice president, world of work solutions for Manpower North America. "Our workforce needs to be more open to retraining and up-skilling for jobs that are in demand. And our government, business leaders and educational facilities need to take action together to ensure students are being enticed to enter these fields."

The U.S. findings are part of a Manpower global study that surveyed more than 39,000 employers across 33 countries and territories in January 2009. Positions in skilled trades, sales, technical work and engineering remain the most difficult for employers to fill globally. Manpower surveyed more than 2,000 U.S. employers in the fourth annual survey to determine which positions employers are having difficulty filling this year.






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
