Weiner Lesniak law firm ousted from RVSA

For years Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority paid their general legal counsel, Weiner Lesniak LLP, millions for their services. But that all changed this year when one board member led a campaign for an alternative option.

After spending two years representing Springfield on the Rahway Valley Sewerage Board, Stephen Eisenberg not only saw a lot he did not like, but was willing to step forward to elicit change. He willingly admitted last week that something had to be done to change the amount of money going out to RVSA's general counsel, of which Democratic Sen. Raymond Lesniak is a partner.

"I led the campaign to get rid of Weiner Lesniak as general council," he said in an interview last week, explaining he had his "suspicions" about the manner in which the firm was conducting business for RVSA for quite awhile.

"In the two years I was on there, Weiner Lesniak's billing was \$1.5 to \$2 million, which I thought was excessive considering what they had to show for it," the Springfield resident explained.

"I think it's pretty clear that they were padding the bills," Eisenberg added.

RVSA is an independent authority that provides sewerage rights through assessments to 10 member municipalities in Union County and one in Middlesex County. The assessment each town pays, though, is determined by the amount of "flow rights" each town uses.

For example, last year Springfield's assessment went up from the year before to \$2.7 million, while Rahway went down to \$2.7 million from \$3 million. Clark paid a hefty See RVSA, Page 14

Hillside mayor has the power

HILLSIDE — Mayor Joe Menza won a major court battle last week, one that should let council members know who has the final word when it comes to layoffs, hiring and firing.

The Superior Court of New Jersey Appellate Division made two important findings, including that the mayor can initiate layoffs without the council's approval, something that became the subject of controversy in 2010.

In fact, it was the Firemans Mutual Benevolent Association, local 35 and 235, that initiated the legal action that eventually led to the appeals court decision handed down last week in favor of the mayor.

The appeals court also ruled that subordinate officers and employees can be removed by See MENZA'S, Page 12

Linden faces 'perfect storm ... of financial disaster' in budget prep

LINDEN — The city is facing another budget storm, one that will require furloughs and layoffs in order to meet the state mandated 2-percent cap.

The problem, according to Personnel and Finance Chairman Peter Brown, is that since 2005 the city has dipped annually into a \$45 million surplus in order to

reduce the amount raised by taxes. While that reduced the budget and the increase taxpayers would have to pay, it only warded off the inevitable, the councilman said.

With just \$5.3 million left in surplus coming into this year, the governing body needs to put \$5 million of that amount towards the 2013 budget, but they are still \$5.2 million over the state-mandated 2-

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

percent cap. And now Linden is attempting to figure out how to meet their obligations and stay under the tax cap.

"This is a perfect storm, if you will, of financial disaster," Brown said last week in an interview, adding that he warned the governing body that they could not continue to drain surplus funds without repercussions in the future.

"That day has come," Brown said, explaining that unless there are furloughs, layoffs and cuts in services, the city will not be able to meet the budget requirements set by the state.

The "very preliminary" 2013 budget numbers show that with all the expenses Linden must factor in right now, the bottom line number comes to \$58,185,988.28. The 2-percent state-mandated cap requires the city to cut \$5.2 million more from the budget in order to bring that number down to \$52,903,542.

"That means we have two options; cut expenses and services or find additional revenue," the 3rd Ward councilman said.

Brown said that from his perspective the dilemma the city is in goes back to the council not planning ahead three to five years as municipalities should.

"The way things look now, we will be \$2 million short by May and \$13 million by June, so something has to give," the councilman said.

Brown said that two years ago he talked to Mayor Rich Gerbounka about shared services but "that went no where."

Gerbounka, however, disagreed.

"Two years ago Peter was not heading up the Personnel and Finance Committee, so he had no right to take it upon himself to set up meetings with other towns," the mayor said, adding that now that Brown is the head of that committee, he can set up

meetings with other towns, but he has not done so. Gerbounka also noted that while it is easy to say the city should be sharing services with other municipalities, that is easier said than done.

"Sharing any service has to be beneficial to Linden," the mayor explained, but did note that he has been discussing with Roselle Mayor Jamel Holley the possibility of sharing staff and court services.

Gerbounka explained that with Linden having the second highest volume of court cases in Union County, Elizabeth being the first, sharing this service with Roselle could ease that burden and be financially beneficial to the city.

However, this would not even begin to chip away at the \$5.2 million the city needs to cut from the 2013 budget. Both Ger-

bounka and Brown agree that the city will have to take some drastic steps in order to reduce the budget by this amount. With a 40 percent increase in fire department personnel salaries because of contractual obligations, Brown said there is little that can be done other than furlough all employees one day a week and layoff others. But even that will not do the job of bridging the \$5.2 million budget gap, he said.

"We are in a perfect storm. Our revenue is down by \$3 million and the assessed value of property has gone down," Brown said, explaining, for instance, that there were more than 600 tax appeals this year by property owners who want tax reductions. "We also lost \$8 million in our tax base," he said.

Gerbounka, while very concerned about

the budget, actually has little say when it comes to what council does in this particular instance.

Because Linden is a Faulkner Act municipality, one that opted for a strong council and a mayor that cannot have a say in budget issues, Gerbounka's hands are tied.

"As the mayor I don't propose, vote or even have the power to veto the budget," said Gerbounka, explaining that "our form of government is antiquated."

However, the mayor was concerned about furloughs, layoffs and cutting services to residents. Since Gerbounka became mayor in 2007, he has reduced staff by 86 full-time and 15 part-time workers. But while he did not want to comment on how furloughs and layoffs will be instituted this year, he did say services such as free trash pickup is being cut down.

"We pay the tipping fee which amounts to \$480,000 a year to dump all that trash and we just can't afford that anymore," the mayor said. Gerbounka did see a light at the end of the dismal budget occurring in Feb. 2014, when Spectra Energy will begin paying the city \$2.5 million a year for a gas pipe that will run for a mile through Linden. But that is still a year away and budget woes are still looming for 2013.

Part of the problem, the mayor said, is that unionized worker contracts were set up to provide no salary increase the first two years, but in year three and four the city has to hand out 3.9 percent raises. That alone, said the mayor, was a huge hit this year on the budget.

Budget struggles are not new for Linden. Last year the city struggled to come up with a budget that passed muster with the state, eventually passing the municipal spending plan in August when threatened with daily fines by the state.

Republicans aim for District 20 assembly seats with fresh face

Two Union Republicans have thrown their hats in the ring for New Jersey State Assembly seats this year, challenging two incumbent Democrats who carry significant political weight in Union County.

Earlier this month the Union County Republicans held a convention in Garwood where, for the first time in years, the committee voted for a full GOP slate in Legislative District 20, challenging incumbents Joe Cryan and Annette Quijano.

District 20 includes Elizabeth, Roselle, Hillside and

The two Republican candidates, Chris Hackett and Charles Donnelly, face two strong Democratic assembly incumbents

Cryan especially proved his mettle when he ran in 2011 and was the strong point on the incumbent Democratic ticket, driving more votes out of Union to balance an unexpected strong opposition in Elizabeth. However, when he opposed the South Jersey leadership he was stripped of his assembly majority leader position.

Although there was talk of Cryan dropping out of the assembly race this year and running for the Union County

sheriff position, that failed to materialize.

Cryan's alliance with Democratic State Sen. Ray Lesniak has been shaky since 2011 when the senior senator did not provide the support his running mate needed to help restore him to a position of power in the lower house Democratic caucus.

Meanwhile, sources indicated that in early February Cryan sat down with Elizabeth Mayor Chris Bollwage and Lesniak to discuss the possibility of bringing fresh blood to the District 20 assembly race. Specifically there was mention of Tony Monterio, an Elizabeth resident and and cohort of the embattled Elizabeth Board of Education.

But because Monterio was a sworn enemy of Bollwage, any alliance with Cryan was taboo.

Meanwhile, on the other side of the political fence, the rejuvenated Republican party celebrated the announcement of their two candidates for assembly, attended by Gov. Chris Christie who gave a brief speech before leaving.

Chris Hackett, 23, who ran unsuccessfully last year for a Union Committee seat, was introduced by District 20 State Senate candidate John Donoso, as a "rising star."

Half-Irish and half-Hispanic, Hackett has been touted as a candidate who can bridge the gap between the large and growing Hispanic community in the district and the Republican party, which for years has sought the support of socially conservative Hispanic voters.

"Hispanics share many of the same values of the Republican party," said Hackett, "including fiscal responsibility, belief in the strength of the family and the notion that hard work and a strong community are the seeds of the American dream."

Donnelly also ran unsuccessfully for a Union governing body seat in 2009 and 2010. In 2010, though, the year Christie was was on the ticket, he came within a few hundred votes of beating the Democratic incumbents.

That was the closest a Republican came to winning a seat on the township governing body since the early 90s.

Donnelly, like his running mate, wants to see responsible spending and to work alongside the governor to push for lower taxes statewide.

"Spending issues are issues statewide, and nepotism is an issue locally," Donnelly said, adding that "people are sick of seeing people get jobs and positions because they know someone rather than because they deserve it."

Donnelly also pointed out that spending, taxes and nepotism all go hand-in-hand in New Jersey and voters need representatives who want to do what is best for their constituents, not just themselves and their inner circle. ES

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ACLU amends data given to LocalSource

Information released by the American Civil Liberties Union in February made police departments in Union County appear to not be on the ball about police officer complaints from the public. But revised information showed the news is not all that bad for most towns.

Although initially the ACLU did not realize that survey information obtained by volunteers had been interpreted wrong by a staff member and then relayed to *Local-Source*, last week this was corrected.

Apparently the ACLU mistake involved interpretation of how the five questions were posed by volunteers and how that information was relayed by the communications spokesperson.

The questions included whether a complaint could be filed by telephone, anonymously or by a third party and if a juvenile could file a complaint without a parent present. The fifth question involved undocumented residents being able to file a complaint without fear immigration authorities would be contacted.

Revised information, which was sent to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow by the ACLU, detailed how each question was answered by police departments in the towns called.

 Union County Police, who were not included in the first ACLU release, was incorrect on third party calls but correct on all other questions.

 Clark was incorrect on all questions but immigration.

Cranford answered two questions correctly, including whether a complaint could
be filed over the phone or anonymously,
but then directed the call to a supervisor
who was not in at the time. The volunteer
then called back but the call was coded as
"bad access" by the ACLU.

 Elizabeth was correct on all questions except whether a complaint could be filed anonymously.

 Hillside actually answered all questions correct, as opposed to the first release which said they got the last two questions wrong. • Kean University police, who were not included in the first release, were incorrect on all questions except the last one on immigration.

• Linden, who registered a complaint with the ACLU about the results "was incorrect on 3rd party, correct on telephone, asked caller to call back in 15 minutes, other questions not asked."

Acting Police Chief James Schulhafer registered his objections via letter to the ACLU, noting that the department was very well informed about the law but the caller caught this particular officer while he was alone and juggling many calls. The police chief thought the information released by the ACLU was "misleading."

 Mountainside answered all the questions correctly. The caller said the police officer was "awesome and very knowledgeable."

• Kenilworth was incorrect on the telephone and anonymous questions but correct on the remainder.

• Rahway was incorrect on telephone and immigration questions, indicating "it had no bearing on the investigation, but he wasn't positive."

 Roselle answered all questions correctly.

 Roselle Park was incorrect on the third party question but answered all other correctly, saying "Even if drunk or stoned we will take your complaint."

• Springfield transferred the call, but because no one responded it was coded as "bad access."

• Summit told the caller to call back, so the contact was coded as "bad access."


• New Providence was correct on all questions except immigration, where the officer did not think they would be called but was not certain.

 Westfield answered all questions correctly.

 Winfield told the caller to call back, and it was coded as "bad access" by the ACLU.

According to Alex Shalom, policy counsel and author of the report "The Crisis Continues Inside Police Internal Affairs," all complaints about police officer misconduct should be accepted from all persons who wish to file a complaint regardless the hour of the day or week.

"At no time should a complainant be told to return at a later date to file his report," Shalom said.

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Elizabeth man sentenced for seven bank robberies

A Union County man was recently sentenced to 105 months in prison for robbing seven branch locations of TD Bank throughout New Jersey from September 2011 to December 2011, U.S. Attorney Paul J. Fishman announced.

Julio Ferrer, 29, of Elizabeth, previously pleaded guilty before U.S. District Judge Joel A. Pisano in Trenton federal court to information charging him with seven counts of bank robbery. He was sentenced by Pisano in Trenton federal court.

According to documents filed in this case and statements made in court, Ferrer admitted robbing TD Bank branches in Westfield, Roselle, Rahway, Metuchen, Edison, Union and


In every robbery, Ferrer passed handwritten demand notes

to bank tellers, officials said in a release. He admitted using a fake gun in the robbery of the TD Bank in Edison. Ferrer was on supervised release from a prior federal bank robbery conviction when he began his robbery spree.


In addition to a prison term, Pisano sentenced Ferrer to three years of supervised release and \$33,840 in restitution. U.S. Attorney Fishman credited special agents of the FBI, under the direction of Acting Special Agent in Charge David Velazquez in Newark, and the police departments of Westfield, Roselle, Rahway, Metuchen, Edison, Union and Princeton, with the investigation that resulted in the sentencing.

The government is represented by Assistant U.S. Attorney Jane H. Yoon of the U.S. Attorney's Office in Newark.

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




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Marching orders


At the end of the performance, the school was presented with a poster with an anti-bullying oath, to be signed by all students and displayed in the school.

Girl Scouts provide vital service to girls

Girl Scouts across the country are currently celebrating Girl Scout Week, which honors the organization's founding 101 years ago by Juliette Gordon Low. In 1911,

Low, a native of Savannah, Ga., was traveling in England when she met Sir Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides. After returning home less than a year later, Low placed a historic call to her friend, saying, "I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all of America, and

all the world, and we're going to start it tonight!"

Low gathered 18 girls on March 12, 1912, to become the first troop of American Girl Guides. The organization was renamed "Girl Scouts" the following year. Low's purpose in creating the Girl Scouts was to have a social club for young girls in which they could hone their domestic skills and prepare themselves for entering the world as professionals capable of impacting their surroundings.

Starting with those original 18 girls in Savannah, Ga., in 1912, Girls Scouts has grown to more than 3.2 million members in more than 92 countries. And from offering only one all-inclusive age group, the organization now provides six different levels for girls ages 5 through adulthood: Daisy, Brownie, Junior, Cadette, Senior and Ambassador.

When Girl Scouts was founded, it was revolutionary. Rather than keeping girls cooped up inside, this organization said girls could do just what boys did. The girls were given the opportunity and encouraged to go camping, play sports and acquire important life skills for entering the work force as equals to their male counterparts.

Most merit badges that the Scouts earn are inspirational for growing girls. The Inventor badge for Brownies urges young girls to prove their innovation; the description of the badge reads: "Do you ever wonder what it takes to come up with a new kind of phone or a new way to power a light bulb? Would you like an invention that would help you tie your shoes faster or one to make elevators

record your singing while you ride?" This is a noble concept, pushing young girls to test themselves in new ways. There is also the Inside Government badge for Juniors, which stresses the importance of being an active citizen; an Entrepreneur badge for Cadettes; and First Aid badges for multiple levels.

In celebration of its centennial, the Girl Scouts added a few new badges, including the Science of Happiness badge for Cadettes and the Science of Style badge for Seniors. These new badges are problematic. Rather than a Science of Style badge, perhaps the badge should have been called something else, such as "Fashion Design," and not be grouped with the true science badges, such as those for Chemistry or Physics. And being happy is not a science, either, unless girls earn this badge by creating a new anti-depression medication. These are small problems, but please, get your nomenclature right. After all, you're the Girl Scouts!

The organization provides a public service to young girls everywhere, teaching them to be confident, caring individuals with the skills needed to go far in life. Girl Scouts must continue to follow this course, and not bow to social pressures. The Girl Scout Law is as relevant today as it was 100 years ago: "I will do my best to be honest and fair, friendly and helpful, considerate and caring, courageous and strong, and responsible for what I say and do, and to respect myself and others, respect authority, use resources wisely, make the world a better place, and be a sister to every Girl Scout."

We extend wishes for a happy anniversary to the Girl Scouts. May they continue to remain in step with the coming generations.

Due deference defeats the heliport

After a year of controversy including 18 public hearings and signs on the local roadways urging residents to "stop the heliport," opponents of the proposed rooftop site at Overlook Hospital got their day in court, and won.

The heavy-duty legal forces in the battle, a proposed location in Summit and the philosophical tug of war between better care for stroke victims and negative impact on the locals brought about some drama.

A 38-page opinion by the County's Assignment Judge Karen Cassidy pointed to the complexity of the issues and maybe an expectation that whoever was the losing side would proceed to appeal.

On Valentine's day, Cassidy's opinion was issued. She summarized the hospital's case: "Implementation of the helipad would decrease the time needed to transport stroke patients by permitting transfer of patients directly from the forwarding institution to the helipad with immediate access to elevators exclusively serving the patients."

The 800 or so affected residents saw things differently and were persistent opponents at the public hearings conducted. The Summit Zoning Board ultimately

sided with residents voting 6-1 to deny the application. The opposition contended the hospital was wrong and the helipad was not to be seen as "customarily" to incidents of the hospital's operation.

Cassidy, in siding with the Zoning Board, said "the impact of a proposed accessory use upon the surrounding area is thus recognized as an appropriate factor in determining whether the use is so necessary or common to be expected that it cannot be supposed that the ordinance was intended to prevent."

The judge also went to some length on the subject of whether or not there was a "substantial detriment to the public good." Cassidy applied the standard of granting deference to the process and decision of the local zoning board. The standard she cites is that the local decision shall be sustained as long as it is not "arbitrary, capricious or unreasonable."

The due deference should be remembered by the citizenry in every community when after the pomp and circumstances in which their town government in January appoints citizens to the Planning and Zoning Boards. These appointments can matter a great deal.

Cassidy's deference included referencing "there are approximately seventy residences within a quarter mile of the proposed typical flight path of an incoming helicopter. The Board found that these residents would suffer the effect of increased noise and lighting and from the introduction of an aesthetically unpleasing situation."

From the impact of added noise levels, lack of adequate emergency landing sites and downward property values, Cassidy wrote she had sufficient reason to give the necessary deference to the Zoning Board decision.

In a published statement, Alan Lieber, president of Overlook, said "We continue to believe a helipad is a vital component of Overlook's ability to serve as a center of excellence for neurosciences as well as our ability to serve the people of Summit and the surrounding areas."

It may be the next step is for the State Appellate Court to consider just how much deference should be applied.

No record could be found for the firearm used in the fourth incident.

I'm slowly recovering from Frank Capece's recent column titled "Giving them what they want," published in the Feb. 21 edition of LocalSource.

Capece quoted a blogger, writing "There are no incidents of the rare, legally-owned, fully automatic firearms being used in

A recent study completed on "Mass Shootings, Assault Rifles and High-Capacity Magazines" discovered both seem to be very popular, used in thirteen of the 56 incidents of mass shootings studied, or 23

In Newtown, Conn., at Sandy Hook Elementary School, the shooter used a .223 assault rifle and killed 26 and wounded two. One victim was shot eleven times. There were 20 little children and six teachers killed there. He had enough ammunition to kill every child in the school. This is made possible with the type of killing device and the magazines used. You don't have to aim; you spray your victims.

In Albuquerque, N.M., the shooter killed his parents and three siblings. He used a legally purchased AR-15 assault

In Aurora, Colo., the shooter used a legally owned AR-15 assault rifle with a 100-drum magazine to kill twelve and wound fifty-eight. He had purchased 6,000 rounds of ammunition.

In Geneva County, Ala., using an AR-15, the shooter killed ten people and then committed suicide.

In Oak Creek, Wis., the shooter killed six people at a Sikh temple and injured three others, including a responding officer before killing himself. He bought three 19round magazines when he bought his gun. He had been investigated for ties to supremacist groups.

Our citizens are not the only victims. In East Oakland, Calif., the shooter used a semi-automatic handgun and a SKS assault rifle to kill four police officers and wound-

The ability to have such fire power in weapons designed to kill and destroy should certainly be limited.

The gun is bad enough, but to have armor piercing ammunition, puts citizens and police at a higher risk.

We have a chance to pass reasonable gun laws. We then must make certain they are enforced.

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

Menza's authority recognized by appeals court's decision

department heads with the approval of the mayor only. This takes away any power the council thought they had when it comes to blocking layoffs or removal of certain employees by the mayor.

The decision threw out lower court decisions which ruled the mayor could not hire and fire without the approval of council members. In other words, the higher court ruling determined that because the township is a Faulkner Act municipality, the mayor is the "appointing authority," for employees and the council cannot override his decisions.

This was a major coup for Menza who has had to wage war against the governing body in order to get anything accomplished.

Last week when he was reached by telephone, Menza admitted he was relieved about the higher court ruling, but said there was no doubt in his mind he was right from the beginning.

"I knew the law and they didn't," Menza said, adding "now I don't need four votes to do the job I'm supposed to do for the taxpayers."

Menza is not one to back down, especially when he believes he is right. This outspoken mayor readily admitted last week that when elected in 2009 he was well aware the road ahead would not be an easy one because of the Democratic stronghold on the council. The stronghold, he said, leads back to Union County Democratic Party Chairwoman Charlotte DeFlippo. But that has not stopped this headstrong mayor from standing up for taxpayers, even if that meant waging one legal battle after anoth-

er in order to prove he was in the right.

Such was the case in 2010 when Menza faced a budget deficit that would have raised taxes beyond what he felt residents and other property owners should have to bear. So, in June 2010 he decided to lay off 50 employees, including 28 police, fire and public works personnel, along with 22 clerical employees. That move raised the ire of all concerned, including council members, who sided with employees.

Menza, though, remained firm, contending the township could not afford these employees. Although he asked the unions to make concessions so the majority of layoffs might not be necessary, they refused. This, he said, left him with with little choice but to initiate the layoff plan.

This enraged both the employees whose jobs were at stake and council members. But, again, Menza refused to back down or withdraw the layoff plan.

Civil service approved the mayor's plan a month later and all hell broke loose. The firemen's union filed an objection with civil service and threatened that they would go to court if necessary to stop the layoffs.

Meanwhile, the mayor, council and union began negotiating to come to a meeting of the minds and Menza agreed to temporarily withdraw his layoff plan. However, that did not last long.

When negotiations failed to resolve the issue, Menza resubmitted his layoff plan to civil service in July 2010 and received approval to layoff employees as of Oct. 15, 2010.

Just days before the layoff, though, the township council and union filed separate

(Continued from previous page) complaints in superior court, challenging the authority of Menza to lay off any employee without the approval of council. That legal action stalled the layoffs, but not the mayor's determination to do what was right for taxpayers.

While the two superior court decisions were pending, the mayor, council and unions sat down at the negotiating table in an effort to resolve the matter. The result of these meetings was a financial plan that would only require seven employees laid off, as opposed to the 50 Menza proposed initially. But the court battle was far from

In March 2011 a Superior Court decision concluded the mayor was not authorized to submit a layoff plan to civil service without approval of the township council. This was a blow to Menza, but he refused to back down and filed an appeal.

While complicated, the appeals court explained the Faulkner Act allows municipalities to select from four structures of local government to meet the needs of its citizens. These four alternatives, however, allocate power and authority differently among elected and appointed officials.

"The mayor-council plan establishes a strong executive, concentrating the most authority of the four alternatives in the office of mayor," the appeals court pointed out, adding it is the mayor who has "substantial power" under the mayor-council plan because he is elected by popular vote for the office.

The Faulkner Act, they went on to explain, clearly states it is the mayor who has the right to exercise this "executive power of the municipality," and therefore the authority to supervise, direct and control all departments.

The mayor also has the power to supervise the development, installation and maintenance of the municipal budget, something Menza has fought for since he was elected to the office of mayor.

More importantly, the mayor is charged with determining the "hiring, firing, salary, wages and other compensation of municipal administrative employees." The council's role, on the other hand, is limited when it comes to municipal employees, according to the appeals court.

In fact, when it comes to removing an employee, the mayor has all the power and he can act without input from department heads or anyone else.

Actually, according to the appeals court ruling, the only authority the council has is when it comes to the mayor firing a department head. The council can block the move by a two-thirds decision. But the council has no similar authority over administrative employees.

The appeals court also found the lower courts were not right when they decided the Faulkner Act permitted council to modify the law by ordinance so the mayor was forced to share these duties with council, which they tried to do, Menza said.

In other words, according to the appeals court, "the actions of the Hillside township council in this case intruded upon Mayor Menza's statutory authority."

The mayor does not need council's approval to initiate a layoff plan, either. So how does that bode for employees this year? According to Menza, they do not have much to worry about. This year, that is, but next year could bring an entirely different set of circumstances.

As for the budget, the mayor was pleased about one thing.

"We will be under the 2-percent cap," he said, but did not mince words when it comes to how he envisions what is needed to make Hillside run even smoother.

"The truth is we need a business administrator," Menza said, explaining that he fully intends to free up some money by eliminating a position that is not needed.

We have a director of economic development that previously was the UEZ director and frankly he answers to no one. The business community is up in arms and something has to be done," the mayor said, noting that Yves Aubourg, who is also council president in Roselle, "needs to go."

"We are in dire need of a business administrator more than a director of economic development, who I have no idea what he does or has accomplished," the mayor said, mentioning this position pays \$106,000 a year.

When Gov. Chris Christie shut down the UEZ's two years ago, the council gave him a new title of director of economic development, but with the appeals court decision, I can change things so we spend that money wiser," Menza said, asking "does it make any sense to keep a guy who you don't even know what he is doing or accomplished?"

The mayor said he has to give Aubourg 90 days notice, as required by civil service, but he had no qualms about getting that ball rolling.

The mayor also was pleased about the retirement of former police chief Robert Quinlan.

"He was making \$210,000, or \$230,000 with benefits, and the new police chief is making \$165,000," Menza

"You have to find revenue somewhere or cut expenses," the mayor added, saying it is his job to watch out for taxpayer dollars and he fully intends to do his job.

\$2.7 million last year, while Cranford paid \$2 million, up from \$1.7 million in 2011.

Garwood paid the lowest amount at \$438,521, while Woodbridge paid \$6.1 million.

The former board member said for the first four months he was on the RVSA board he maintained a low profile while observing what went on. Soon, though, he began to question Weiner Lesniak's billing.

"I couldn't really tell what was going on but their billing was excessive and their reports did little to substantiate what they were billing," the former board member said.

The problem, Eisenberg said, was a lack of clarity in Weiner Lesniak's billing and reports.

"I saw that their monthly reports were just a paragraph long, always the same, except for a sentence or two that was changed and that concerned me," he said, adding that this made him realize "Weiner Lesniak was keeping the billing faucet going."

According to checks paid by RVSA to Weiner Lesniak, monthly bills submitted by the general council ran anywhere from as low as \$13,290.60 to as high as \$95,510.86, with the average about \$24,946.71 to \$39,657 between 2008 and 2012. the firm also submitted separate legal bills for "building and equipment," that averaged \$12,532.71 monthly, but it is unclear what legal advice they provided.

Eisenberg also mentioned that whenev-

er he brought up to the board that something was not right with the Weiner Lesniak billing or that he needed more information, no one ever got back to him.

"I thought that was strange in and of itself," said the former board member.

Eisenberg eventually found allies in representatives from Cranford, Kenilworth, Roselle Park, Garwood and Mountainside who felt as he did about the RVSA general council. Together they decided a change was needed one way or another, so they started interviewing for a new general council firm — even though some of the board members opposed the move — and hoped that they would have enough votes to bring in new council.

As the end of the year neared, Eisenberg said the feeling that he probably would not be back on the board in 2013 grew stronger because of his push to remove Weiner Lesniak. However, that did not deter his efforts.

It all came down to the Dec. 20, 2012 board meeting when Mountainside representative Rene Dierkes introduced a resolution to have Greenbaum, Rowe, Smith & Davis serve as general council for a total estimated annual contract of \$473,750, considerably less than what Weiner Lesniak was charging annually.

The measure did manage to pass in a close 6-to-5 vote, but not before Allen Chin, the Westfield RVSA representative told the board "this is not the right time to change general counsel."

According to RVSA board minutes from the Dec. 20, 2012 meeting, Chin said the authority would have two invoices a month from legal firms and in his opinion, this was a waste of money.

Chin was referring to the fact that RVSA had to continue to retain Weiner Lesniak for legal services involving two lawsuits because they were already handling these legal issues. However, new legal council Greenbaum, Rowe, Smith & Davis would now oversee Weiner Lesniak and the way they handled reports and expenditures.

Six representatives, including Springfield, Cranford, Garwood, Kenilworth, Mountainside and Roselle Park voted in favor of hiring new legal council, opposed to the five remaining member towns of Clark, Rahway, Scotch Plains, Westfield and Woodbridge, who opposed the move.

Eisenberg viewed the victory as a last hurrah because, as he suspected, he was not reappointed as a Springfield representative to RVSA for 2013.

Eisenberg says the bills from Weiner Lesniak were 'suspicious' and too high.

Although disappointed, Eisenberg said he was not surprised that he did not get local support for the reappointment. In fact, he said, Springfield Democrat political powerhouse Bruce Bergen, who just won a Freeholder Board seat in November, told him the reason he was not reappointed was because he was "not politically reliable."

"Clearly this was a political decision," said the Springfield resident who was initially appointed by former Republican mayor Ziad Shehady. However, when it comes to politics and the RVSA, Eisenberg prefers not being on either side of the fence.

The former board member has little doubt, though, that Lesniak had everything to do with his not being reappointed, especially since he was the force behind other board members voting against Lesniak's law firm as general council.

Sill, during his two-years as an RVSA board member, Eisenberg said he managed to learn more about how the sewerage authority operated and to bring about change that hopefully will bring more accountability and save tax dollars for the 11 member towns. Whether it does or not remains to be seen, he said.

Eisenberg was not reluctant to speak on the record about his experience as an RVSA board member because he said the member towns whose taxpayers fund the sewerage authority had "every right" to know the manner in which the board operated. However, he had nothing but praise for the RVSA staff, who, he said, worked very hard.

"I think very highly of the RVSA management team, including Jim Meehan, the executive director," said Eisenberg, adding that Meehan "does a great job professionally."

In May of 2010 *LocalSource* investigated and broke the story that a confidential preliminary review requested by RVSA reported that the \$30 million cogeneration plant that was still not operational was "worthless except for salvage." A public accounting and litigation firm that provides damage analysis found that the firms involved with designing the facility had minimal experience with cogeneration plants and the result was a series of "assumptions and omissions."

Although the facility was supposed to save member towns \$1 million a year, the annual cost savings was found to be "zero or negative."

The firm investigating the cogeneration plant also found there were "substantial, actual and potential conflicts of interest," present between and among the 15 various companies involved with the project.

Now there are multiple lawsuits going on, a few of which will go on to mediation, rather than court. Calls made to Brian Hak of Weiner Lesniak were not returned by press time.



"Sisters of the Cloth: Honoring Our Tradition," is an exhibition of quilting works by six women. It is currently on display in the Tomasulo Gallery in the MacKay Library on Union County College's Cranford campus. The exhibition can be seen through to March 28.

The following women have their work displayed in the exhibit: Francine Koon, Josaine Royster, Wannetta Phillips, Ruby L. Simmons, Ellaree Pray, and Rae Ballou Wong.

The women explain in their artist statement that as "Sisters of the Cloth," they belong to different guilds and organizations, but are united in their desire to create beautiful quilts from different fabric combinations using inexpensive sources. They have each illustrated designs, elucidated mathematical equations, and deliberated over color choices.

The tradition of quilting has always been a form of transmuting fabric from disparate threads and weaving them into a story.

The quilts are donated to causes that they believe in, given to charities supported by the artists; and yet in some cases, the quilts hang on walls as decoration or simply drape on beds for comfort.

Francine Koon explains that her family roots came from women who were seam-stresses that worked in the garment industry. As a child she learned to sew and made her own clothes. She went on to graduate from Fashion Industries High School in New York. She now understands why they

learned the things they did as children. One never knows when they will use such skills: math – fractions and measurements; and geometry for shapes. Quilting is an additional extension of using her sewing skills.

Wannetta Phillips began quilting in 2005 after being inspired by the work of a dear friend who was a professional quilter. Her friend Dottie, who was terminally ill, influenced her to learn how to quilt. She gave Wannetta all the tools needed to master the craft, such as a sewing machine and fabric. She also insisted that Wannetta join a quilting guild.

Dottie died on September 30, 2005. Wannetta is now a member of several quilting and sewing guilds where the members meet to share techniques in quilting and sewing.

Her quilts are used by relatives and friends throughout the country and overseas. They are also displayed and sold at quilt shows and auctioned for charity in New York. She loves to quilt and tries to share her quilting knowledge with family and friends everywhere.

Poison Prevention Week March 17 - 23, 2013 CHILDREN ACT FAST - SO DO POIS

Below are some safety rules to follow to help avoid an accident with prescription or over-the-counter medications.

- ➤ Don't rely on packaging to protect your children. Child-resistant packaging does not mean childproof packaging.
- > Teach children not to drink or eat anything without permission from a trusted adult.
- > Follow label directions and read all warnings before giving medicines to children.
- > Never prepare or give medication to a child in the dark as you may give the wrong dosage or even the wrong medication.
- ➤ Call medicines by their correct names.
- Never tell a child that a medicine tastes like candy.
- > Keep a record of how many pills are left in each prescription container.



- > Do not take medicine in front of young children because children tend to copy
- > Safely dispose of unused, unneeded or expired prescription drugs by mixing them with coffee grounds or kitty litter to make them less appealing to children.
- > Never leave vitamin bottles, aspirin bottles or other medications on kitchen tables, countertops, bedside tables or other easy-to-reach places.
- > Store all medications in a locked cabinet, far from a child's sight and reach. Even items that seem harmless, such as mouthwash, can be extremely dangerous if ingested in large quantities by children.
- ➤ Make sure purses and bags yours and guests' that could contain poisonous items such as medications, are kept out of reach of children.

Post near, or program every phone, in your home with the nationwide poison control center phone number, 1-800-222-1222.

You can reach a poison control center 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Call poison control if you think a child has been poisoned and if they are awake and alert. Call 911 if you have a poison emergency and your child has collapsed or is not breathing.

Hearty Winter Salad with Butternut Squash and Pistachios

Sometimes salads don't seem so appealing in the cold weather, but this cozy, warm and hearty salad may just make you change your menu this week. Try to roast a lot of vegetables at once if you can so you can make a variety of salads and other dishes all week with them.

Ingredients

Serves two

1/2 cup roasted butternut squash 1/2 cup roasted beets.

Method

Halve a squash, take the pits out, roast on a parchment-paper-lined baking sheet in the middle rack of your oven for 30 to 40 minutes at 400 degrees or until squash is fork tender. If top is getting too brown, cover with aluminum foil. Dice up when cooled and use for soups, salads and any other dish throughout the week.

For the beets, take one medium-sized beet, peel it, dice it and roast it with the squash until tender, keep checking

with a fork, but about the same amount of time as squash.

Salad ingredients

3 cups washed and dried arugula, or pre-washed from supermarket

1 to 2 Tbs. shelled pistachios drizzle olive oil

drizzle balsamic vinegar

salt to taste pepper to taste

Method

Place prepared greens in a bowl. Add squash and beets and gently combine. Drizzle with oil and vinegar and toss

Add salt and pepper to taste and top with pistachios. Enjoy!

At that meeting, potential trail stewards will be introduced to the Adopt-A-Trail Program and may obtain a trail assignment. From 10:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., immediately following the meeting for new participants, the general meeting for all current and new trail stewards will be conducted. Both meetings will be held at Trail-side Nature and Science Center located at 452 New Providence Road in Mountain-side. Light refreshments will be provided.

Adopt-A-Trail participants are required to adopt their trail for a period of at least two years. Stewards are expected to remove litter, do minor pruning, remove invasive vegetation, clear drainage pipes and remark trails as needed. All participants must attend an orientation meeting and a "general" meeting each year. They also need to complete and submit quarterly report forms. Those who are not able to make a two-year commitment are encouraged to attend one of the monthly trail work days, usually held on the first Saturday of the month from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon, except in January and February. The next Saturday Trail Work date is set for April 6. No experience is necessary to help. By adopting a trail or participating in Saturday work dates, residents can realize a sense of accomplishment, work outdoors, meet new people and learn a new skill.

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



Respect the rules, but embrace exceptions

Paging through an English garden magazine recently, I saw a column devoted to the snowdrop chapter of the unwritten garden rule book. Traditional wisdom holds that snowdrops should only be divided and transplanted "in the green" just as the blooms fade in early spring. Many snowdrop growers have followed that rule since the beginning of time - or at least the beginning of cultivated snowdrops - and it is very successful. It makes sense too. Snowdrops are spring ephemerals, meaning that all traces of them disappear within four to six weeks of the time they finish blooming. When snowdrops are "in the green," they are visible, which makes it a lot easier to lift the clumps of tiny bulbs and separate them.

The author of the column argued that rules don't have to be hard and fast. In fact, snowdrops can be lifted and divided any time, except when the ground is frozen. If you can find the clump and dig around it without injuring the bulbs; you can divide it. This is helpful, especially if you, like many of us, generally have too much to do in the garden, not to mention outside its boundaries. The key is common sense. If you think you will want to divide your snowdrops after their annual vanishing act, mark their location with small stakes or take a picture of the spot, including enough nearby identifiers so you can find it accu-

rately. By taking that quick step, you have given yourself the freedom to divide with impunity and your snowdrops will be none the worse for it.

The snowdrop column made me think about other garden rules and the wisdom of breaking them on occasion. I came up with several.

· Zone hardiness: The United States Department of Agriculture publishes the "Plant Hardiness Zone Map," a helpful guide that shows the average annual minimum temperature for all regions of the United States. The lower the zone number, the colder the area. Plant breeders and vendors use the zone numbers to provide guidelines to wholesale growers and retail customers. It is a great tool. However, every region and every garden has microclimates. If you happen to have a protected spot or spots where the snow melts first and weeds appear in spring before they pop up in other parts of the garden, you might be able to support a plant that is not technically hardy in your zone. For example, if you live in USDA Zone 6, your sunny protected spot might be able to support something listed as only being hardy to Zone 7. Don't be intimidated by numbers. Try that plant — provided it doesn't cost a million dollars — mulch it well and give it supplemental water during dry spells. Protect it during the first winter. You will probably be surprised at its hardiness.

• Pruning: There are so many unwritten, set-in-cement, shrub-pruning rules that many people are afraid to prune at all. This is why you see rhododendrons the size of wooly mammoths, octopus-like forsythia and hollies threatening to subsume entire houses

If bushes flower, refrain from pruning them until the flowers fade. Prune by one-third under normal conditions, one-half if things are slightly out of hand and two-thirds if the shrub is already eating pets, small children and large garden tools. Sharp tools work better than dull ones. You can prune any time the urge strikes you, except before flowering shrubs flower. You can prune at that time as well, you will just miss a year of blossoms. Try to give the shrub a pleasing shape, but if you make mistakes, remember that even radical pruning will not kill a healthy shrub.

• Midsummer: Garden pundits always tell you to avoid doing most things — planting, transplanting, pruning — in midsummer because the high heat and absence of moisture will stress the plants. The pundits are right, but if midsummer is the only

time available to do those chores, carry on. You will simply have to give lots of water to new plants and transplants and mulch them thoroughly. If a new plant is showing signs of stress from Sahara-like sunshine, arrange some shade for it. Pruning is hard for human beings in summer, but plants, if carefully tended, will take it in stride. Drip irrigation helps almost all plants, including transplants and the newly pruned, get through the heat. Soaker hoses are inexpensive, hook up to your garden hose and can be put on timers so that your plants will be cool and comfortable while you are toiling away in the occupational salt mines.

When I first set up house on my own, I was convinced that God would strike me dead if I didn't dust the baseboards once a week. Clearly that was not true, because I am still alive. Having broken a good many domestic and gardening rules in my time, I can say with authority that you will not be struck by lightening if you transplant your snowdrops in August.

Respect the rules, but don't be afraid to embrace the exceptions.

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

Linden, after leading by three points with less than 30 seconds to go in the fourth quarter, fell to defending champion Atlantic City 60-54 in overtime in Sunday's Group 4 state championship game at the Rutgers Athletic Center in Piscataway.

Linden had a five-game winning streak snapped and finished a fine

FRANKLIN LAKES - Carrying the torch as the last Union County team still standing, Cranford was very much alive at intermission, ahead by five points after closing the first half on a double-digit run.

Where the game turned was the third quarter.

Jefferson quickly scored the first seven points of the second half to take its third lead and following a Cranford 3-pointer, took the lead for good on an inside basket.

Sparked by a dominating, game-high, 24-point performance from junior guard Imani Brown and an emerging inside game from senior center Kristen Swerzinski - she scored 12 of her 15 points in the second half - the Falcons gradually built back up a lead they were not going to let go of again.

Limiting North 2 champion Cranford to single digit scoring in both the third and fourth quarters, North 1 champion Jefferson went on to post a decisive 50-40 triumph in last Wednesday night's Group 3 semifinal

Jefferson, which improved to 23-7, was to next face South Jersey champion Ocean City in Sunday's Group 3 state championship game at Toms River North. Ocean City defeated Central Jersey champion Freehold Borough 35-26 in last Wednesday night's other Group 3 semifinal, which was contested at Williamstown.

Cranford concluded a fourth consecutive 20-win season at 20-9. Only Roselle Catholic which has produced at least 20 wins the last five seasons, has a longer streak of 20-win campaigns among Union County teams.

Jefferson looked good with a 22-14 advantage before Cranford closed the second quarter on a 13-0 run to take a 27-22 halftime lead. Unlike the GL game when Cranford made its first four shots, the Cougars this time missed their first four, but were able to come back and take two first-half leads.

Cranford shot only 4-of-15 from the floor in the first quarter and was only 2-of-7 in the second before netting the period's final five field goals and single free

"Our team needs to get it and go and that's what we were able to do at the end of the first half," Cranford head coach Jackie Dyer said.

"We were tired, playing all of these games," Jefferson head coach Jim O'Connor said. "I was happy that we were only down by five at the half.

"We needed to relax and regroup."

Brown, who led her team with 12 points through the first two quarters which is what she averaged before the states, tied the game for the second time at 27-27 on a layup following a conventional 3-point play produced by Swerzinski.

"That was huge," O'Connor said. "That got us going, gave us the momentum and really made us forget about how tired we were."

After Cranford senior Jess McCoy - who paced all scorers with 15 first-half points - picked up two quick fouls for her second and third, Brown followed with another layup to put Jefferson back on top at 29-27.

Cranford senior Jenna Goeller then connected on her second and final 3-pointer to give the Cougars their last lead of 30-29.

Swerzinski, now playing a bit more aggressively inside, grabbed an offense rebound and put the ball in to give Jefferson the lead for good at 31-30 with five minutes to go in the third.

That basket began a 6-0 run, which included a steal and layup by Brown and then Brown grabbing an offensive rebound and scoring again.

Meanwhile, Cranford's offense, which produced 17 points in the second quarter, completely stalled, with the Cougars missing nine of their first 10 third-quarter field goal attempts.

During the Falcon run, McCoy picked up her fourth foul and had to go to the bench. McCov finished with a team-high 17 points, but did not have a field goal in the second half.

"We weren't really attacking the basket," Dyer said. "We got a little out of rhythm. We slowed down after getting stops on defense.

"We were just a little off and missed some shots after boxing out. Jefferson is a very good team and I don't think they get the credit they deserve."

McGovern first and Goeller second fouled out in the fourth quarter.

"Good players want to be around the ball," O'Connor said. "That's what happened with the Cranford girls who were in foul trouble."

After trailing by as much as five points in the third quarter, Cranford twice - on back-to-back possessions had a chance to tie the game in the fourth quarter, down 37-34.

Goeller missed a 3-pointer that would have tied the game with 6:16 to go and then after two Jefferson misses, McCoy was off with a 3-pointer of her own that would have knotted the score again with 5:41 left.

Cranford pulled to within 46-40 on a basket by junior Carly Maucione with 41.5 seconds remaining.

After Brown made one of two free throws for a 47-40 lead, McCoy missed a shot and then Cranford had to foul with 25 seconds left.

At that point there just wasn't enough time for Cranford to pull it off.

"All season long we fought back and never gave

Cranford seniors McCoy, McGovern and Goeller were part of a program that also went 21-8 and won N2, G3 as freshmen and then finished 22-6 as sophomores and 24-5 as juniors.

Cranford's record the past four seasons is an impressive 87-28 (.757).

"They reached three state sectional finals in four years and won two of them, that doesn't happen often (in the Cranford program)," Dyer said.


