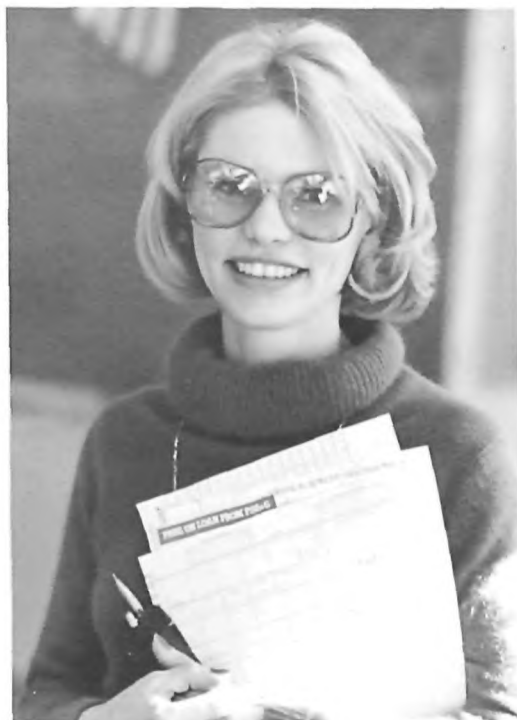

In junior year, students are given an idea of how to take the dreaded Scholastic Aptitude Test (S.A.T.) by going over practice tests in class.

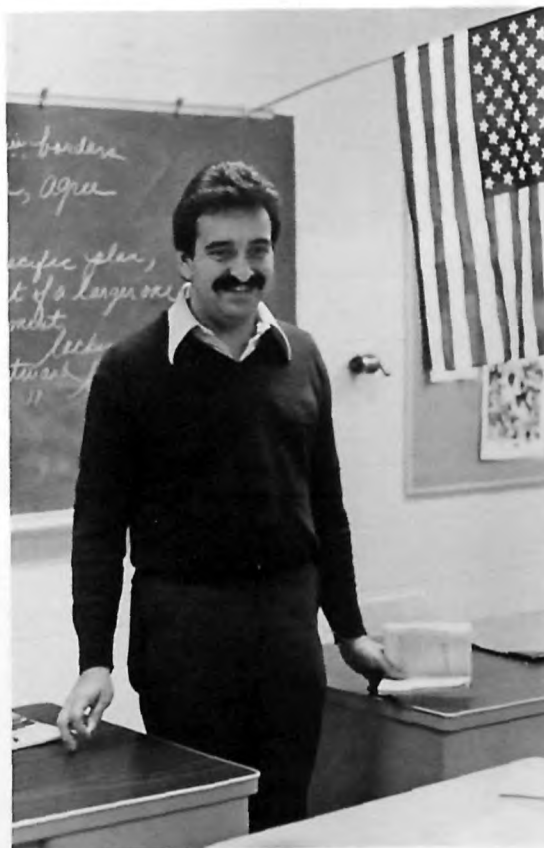

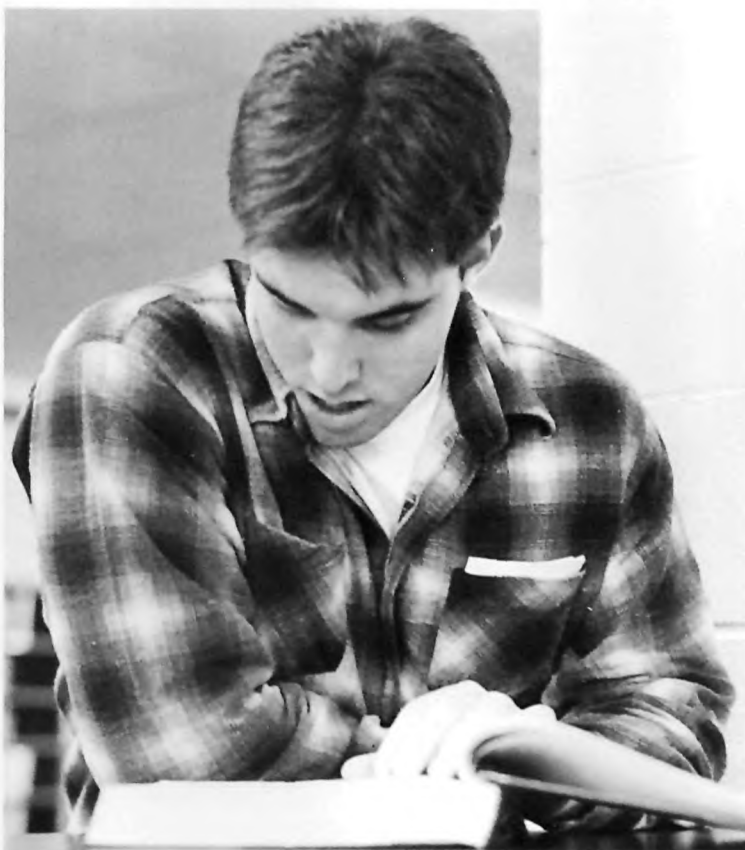
MORE THAN JUST READING

Every morning, afternoon, and evening a group of students gets on a bus to attend school-but not C.H.S. They are going to Union County Vocational-Technical School on shared time with C.H.S. to better develop their skills in a specific field that they have chosen as a potential future job.



U C V - T S



Beauty Culture—This class is designed to cover all basic requirements as outlined by the State Board of Beauty Culture of New Jersey. Some of these are: shampooing, iron curling, hair cutting, pedicuring, permanent waves, facials, and preparation for State Board exams. If the student passes the State Board exam, she can then become a competent, licensed cosmetologist.





Heating, ventilating, and air-conditioning—This class instructs the student to install and repair oil, gas, electric heating and ventilating equipment, commercial refrigeration equipment, and air-conditioning equipment. This course also primarily deals with all safety measures and precautions. A skilled person in this field is an air-conditioning mechanic, a heating-ventilating mechanic, or a refrigeration mechanic.

Machine shop—This course trains you to gain knowledge of the basic principles required in the machine trade area. Students are taught how to operate surface grinders, milling machines, and drill presses. The student may also become a machinist, tool and die maker, mold maker, pattern maker, machine builder, or a jewelry toolmaker if they graduate with the required trade skills.

Maintenance Mechanics—This class is offered to the student so that he may develop the basic manipulative skills for maintenance of buildings and equipment. Repairing and servicing electrical and mechanical piping and woodwork are among the skills that are taught. This program deals generally with many trades in one: carpentry, plumbing, machine maintenance, welding, and basic maintenance.

Electronics—Electronics prepares the student to install and repair apparatus and wiring associated with the distribution and use of electrical power: AC generators, principal construction, installation, alternating current, and shop work conforming to the National Electric Code.

EARLY BUS RIDES, SUNSET SESSIONS, AND VACATIONS THAT DON'T MATCH

Commercial art—This class prepares one in basic advertising and graphic design skills. In Commercial art, the student learns: drafting, typography, layout/paste-up, and interior design. A professionally accepted portfolio within the two-year period can lead to any number of advertising, design, or illustration positions in the field.



Graphic arts—The career opportunities in this field are unlimited. Graphic arts prepares one to enter the printing industry with marketable skills in such areas as: camera work, stripping, computerized type-setting, layout, and designated plate making. A trained graduate in this field can become a printing press operator, a photographer, or a binary mechanic.



Baking—In baking class, the student has the chance to learn the many techniques of preparing breads and desserts. Included in this are: mixing, finishing, and decorating breads, and learning to prepare donuts, pies, muffins, eclairs, and more.

Welding—The welding program at U.C.V.-T.S. is designed to produce welders that can consistently weld various joint configurations in all positions in conformance with standard government codes. This is accomplished through theory and practice in the areas of oxy-fuel welding, cutting and brazing, and metal insert gas welding.

ACQUIRING VOCATIONAL SKILLS



Diesel mechanics—A diesel mechanic's duties vary depending on the type of equipment to that is to be repaired or serviced. Truck and bus mechanics must be able to maintain chassis suspensions, steering systems, transmissions, and safety and lighting mechanisms. However, construction equipment mechanics perform repairs to engines, electrical systems, transmissions, and other types of equipment. This program offers a student exposure and basic training in all phases of the trade.



Auto mechanics—The automotive technology and mechanics profession is continuously expanding; the demand for the qualified auto mechanic is far reaching. In this class, the student is trained in tune-ups, automotive electrical systems, and servicing of automatic transmissions. Upon graduation, students who are qualified enough to be placed in the industry are paid according to the ability of the individual.

Appliance repair—Here students are taught the operations, installations, and maintenance and repair of all major home appliances. Included in this class are various field trips, on-the-road experience with cooperating companies, and "live work" repair of homeowners' appliances in shop. Of course, there are many types of appliances which are included in the learning of this field.

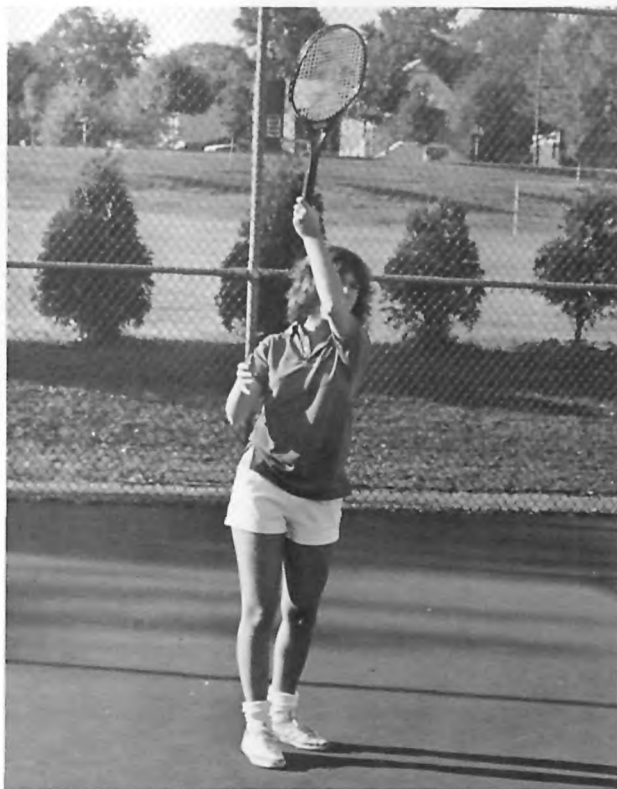

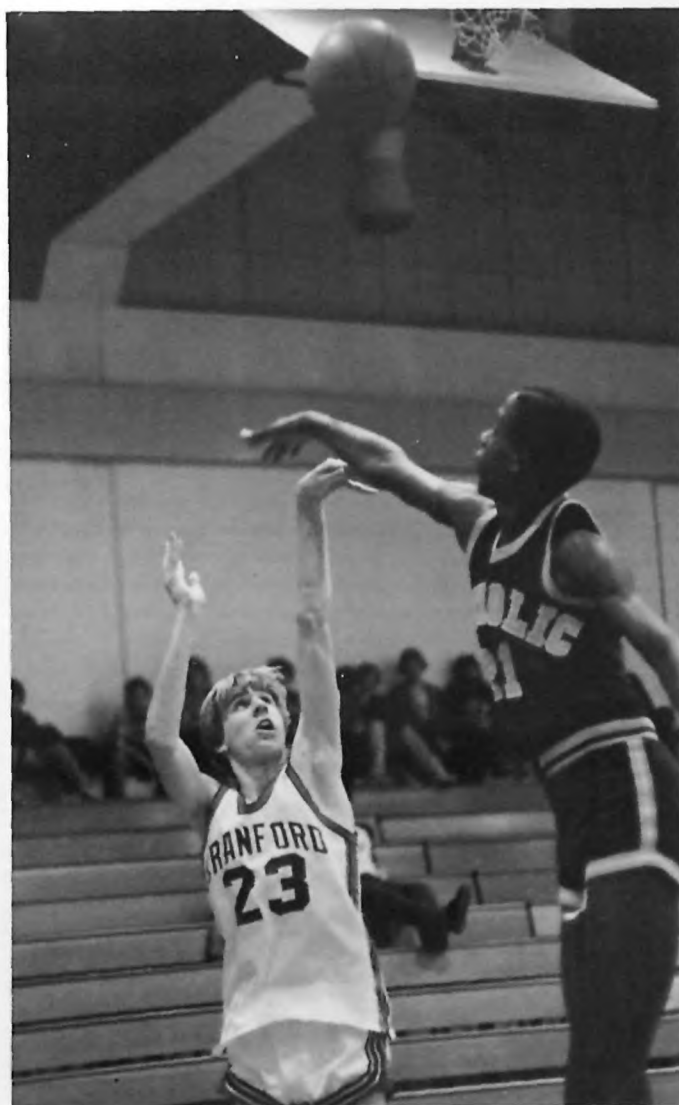

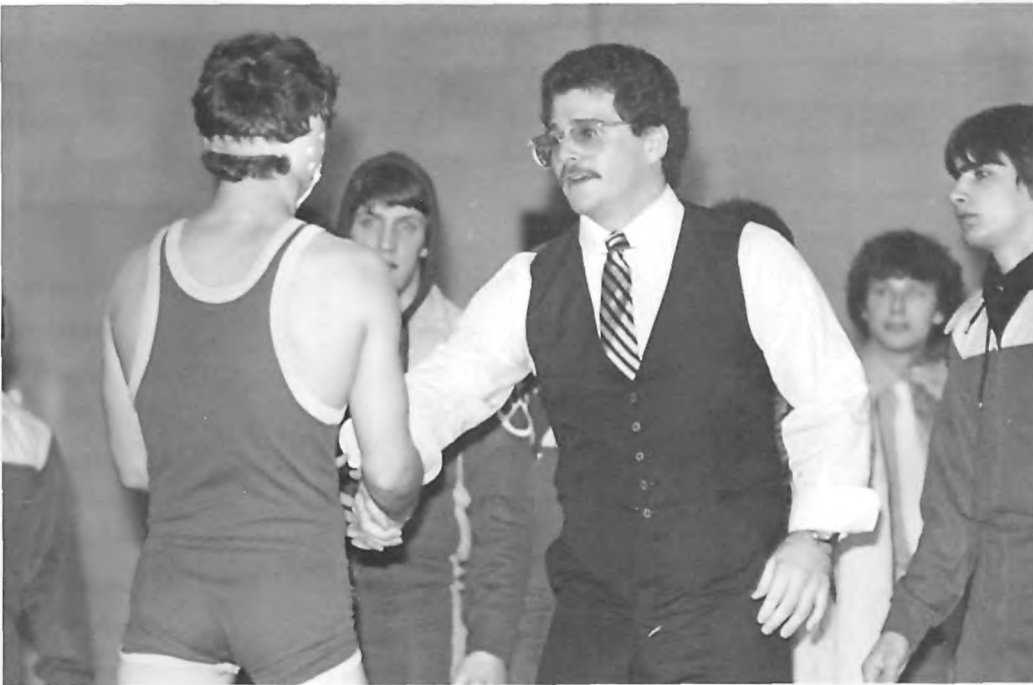

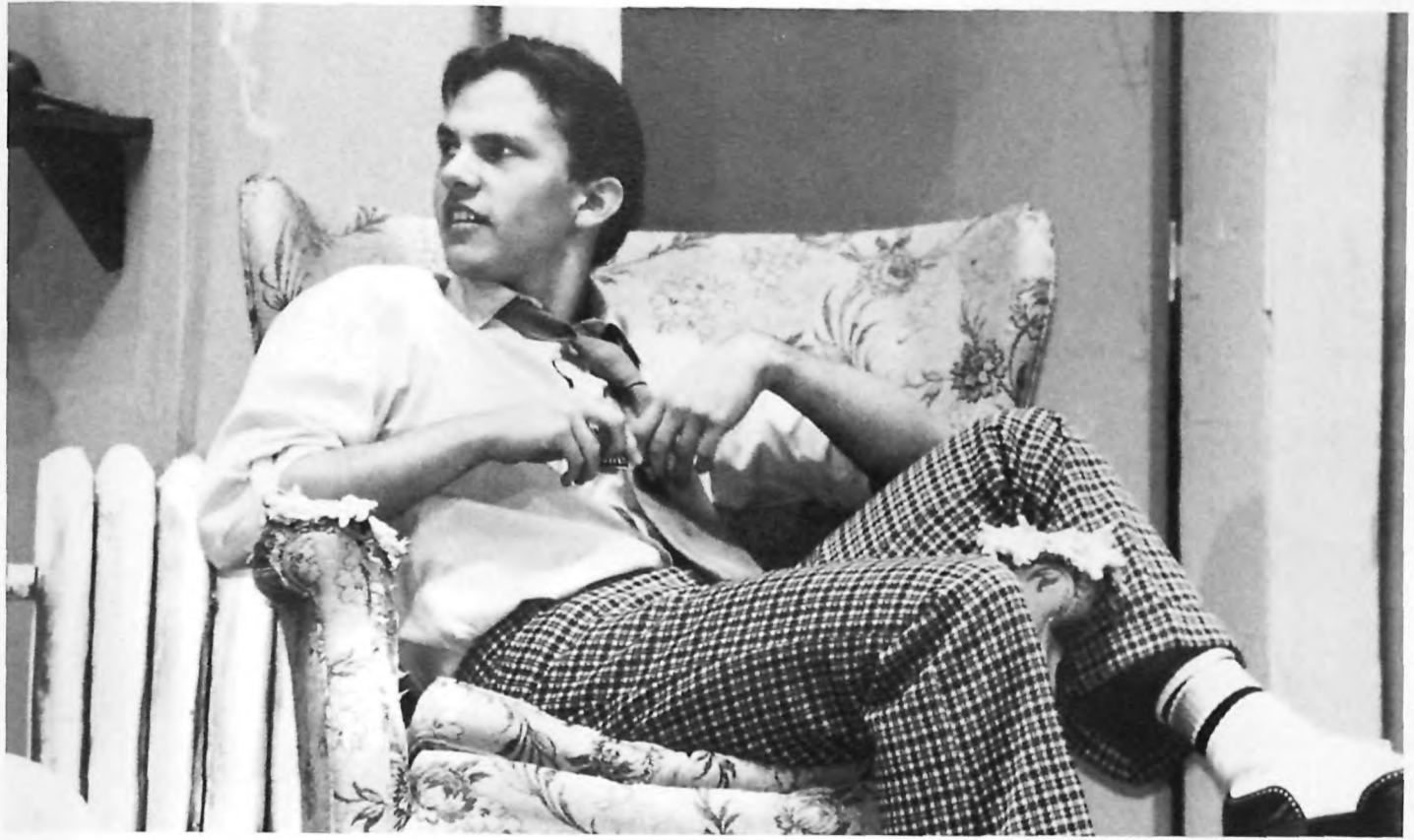
