
INDUSTRIAL ARTS














ENTERING THE WORLD OF WORK

TRACK TEAM SETS WINNING PACE






Ron Brown led all rushers this season, with 104 carries for 476 yards, four touchdowns and 2




"Pin Down" Finest Season Ever




GIRLS BASKETBALL STRUGGLES THROUGH A TOUGH SEASON



Because the team is young, only two juniors and the remainder freshmen and sophomores, he has high hopes for next years' team.







So move over Michael Jackson, 'cause here comes our Jazz Band.





The National Art Honor Society is an organization of upperclassmen who have demonstrated a talent in art. Its main purpose is to serve the community in some artistic fashion.








Hamming It Up


