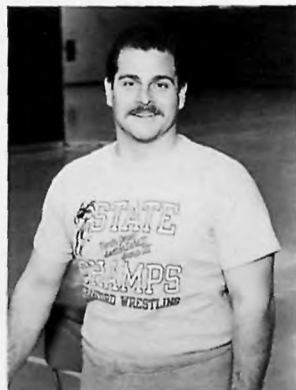

HANDS AND HEARTS ACROSS THE SEAS



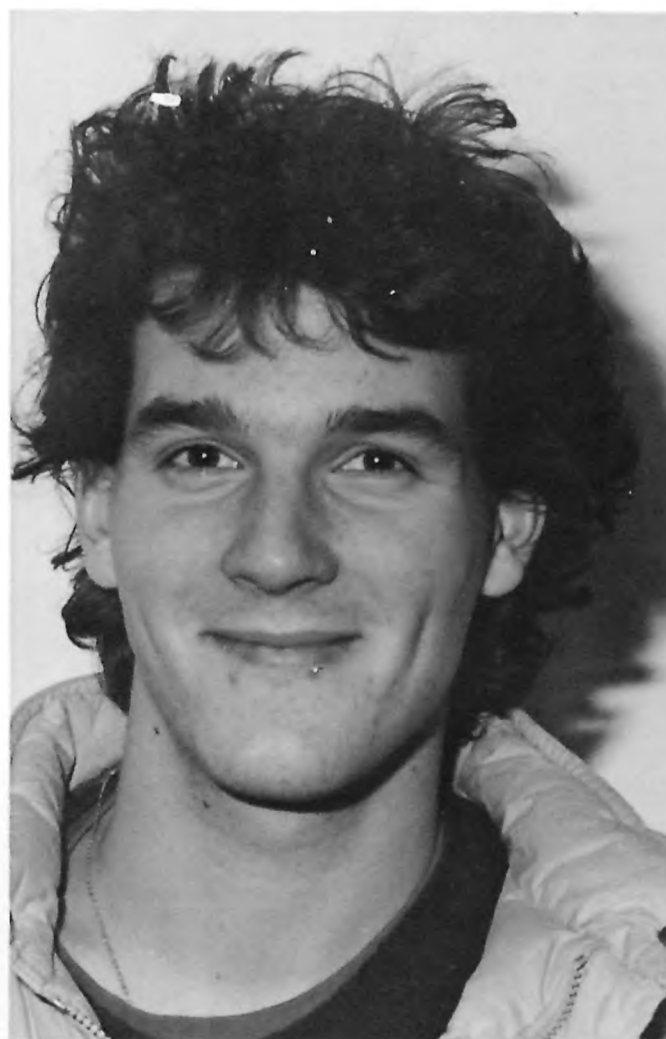

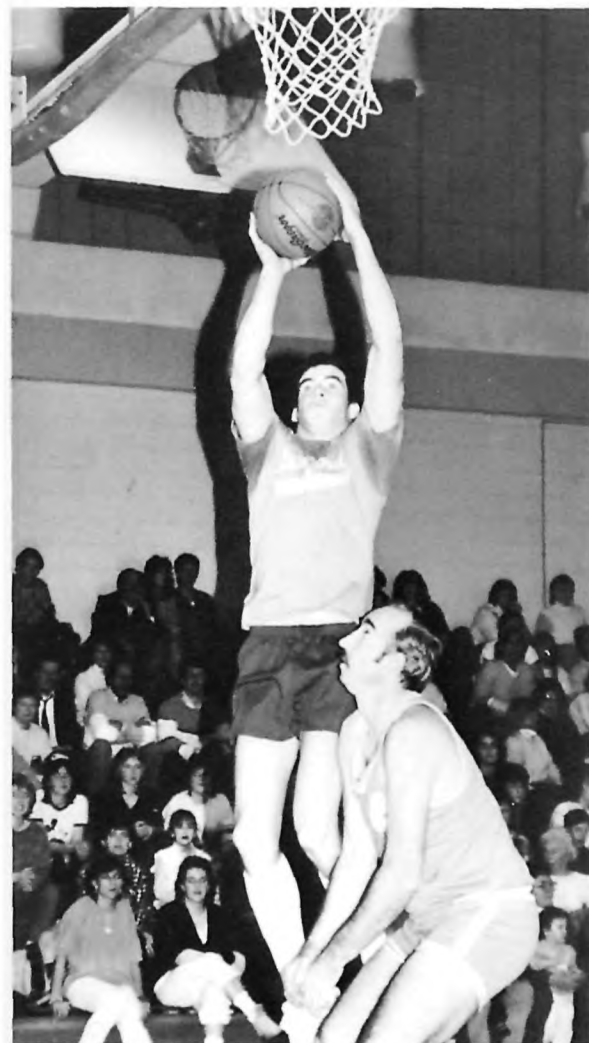

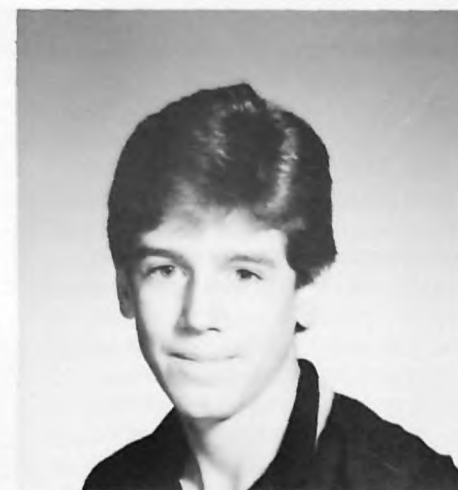


CRANFORD UNITES FOR ONE OF ITS OWN

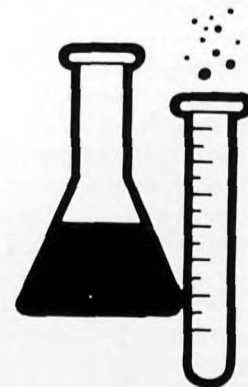


"WHAT IS THE SPEED OF LIGHT?"

The Stage Crew is a unique club in that there are no regular meetings or activities such as field trips. The entire focus of the members is on the creation of sets for the school play and musical each year. Because the designing, building, and painting of each piece of scenery is a very imposing task the members begin to work two months preceding each production. These are very dedicated students who come after school almost weeks on end and even sacrifice their Saturdays. The rewards are the satisfaction of knowing that the world in which actors perform is the result of many students' efforts, and that some of the applause is certainly for the behind-the-scenes workers.



That one moment of almost unbearable tension in which the briefest instant seems like an eternity, the moment before the curtain is drawn back and the drama begins to unfold onstage, is the most exciting moment in theatre. For six grueling weeks the cast, crew and directors worked long into the night—some days putting in over six hours of work—preparing for this year's production. It would be impossible for anyone outside the world of the theatre to grasp just how much effort goes into creating a quality production. The actors suffered through 14 hour days, crammed homework into those few moments when they were not onstage, quit jobs and got used to treating sleep as a luxury.

Is it all worth it? Do the rewards justify the sacrifices? Can the two days of the show's run make up for the dozens of tedious rehearsal hours? Overwhelmingly, the response is an enthusiastic, "Yes!". Being up on that stage, even if just for two performances, is one of the greatest thrills imaginable. One can go beyond the boundaries of everyday life and create a living, vibrant character out of their own imagination.

It is this ability to create a form out of the darkest void, coupled with the recognition and appreciation of friends and family, that make the theatre, and all the demands it places upon an actor, worthwhile.

These Cubs have proven they have what it takes to become real Cougars.

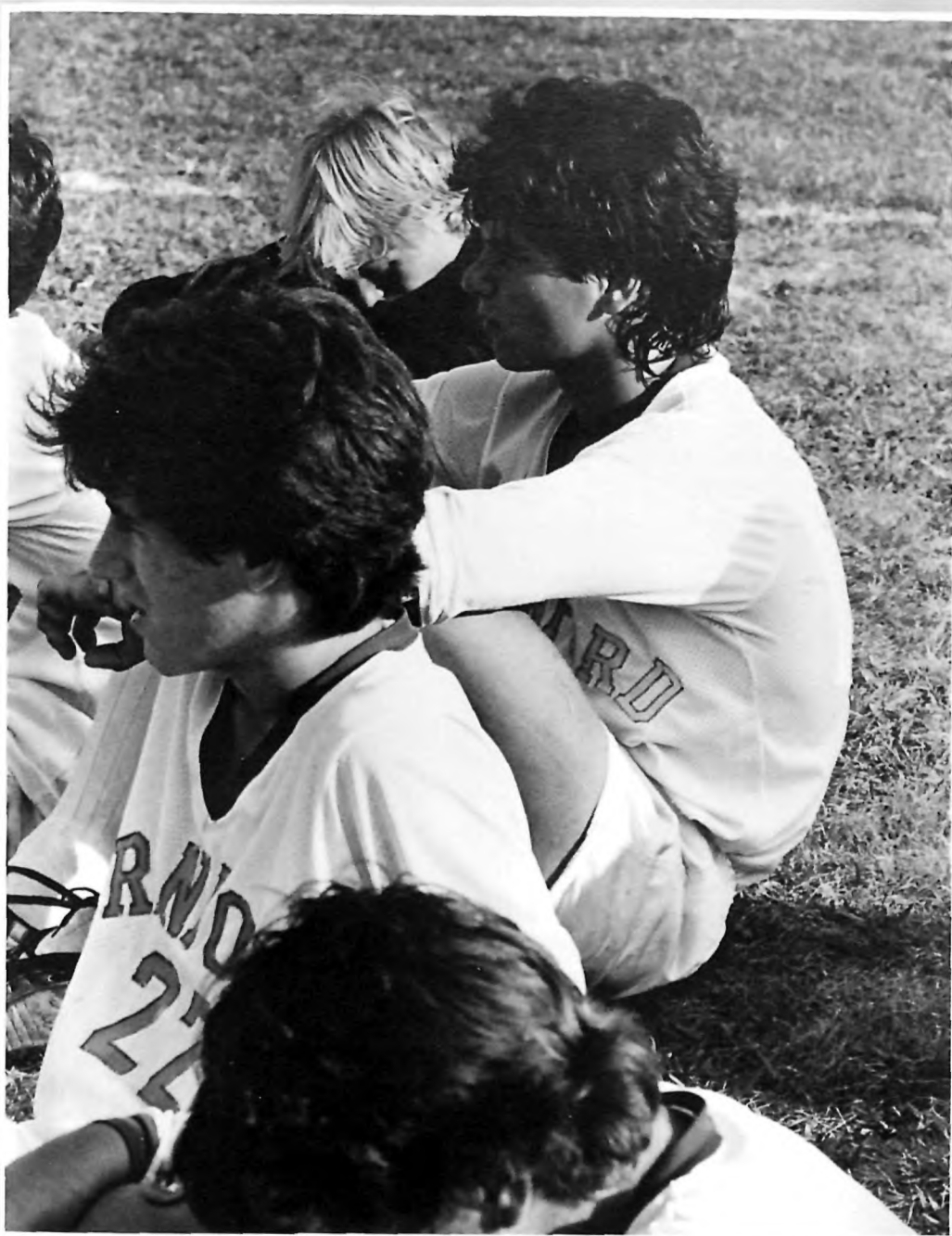

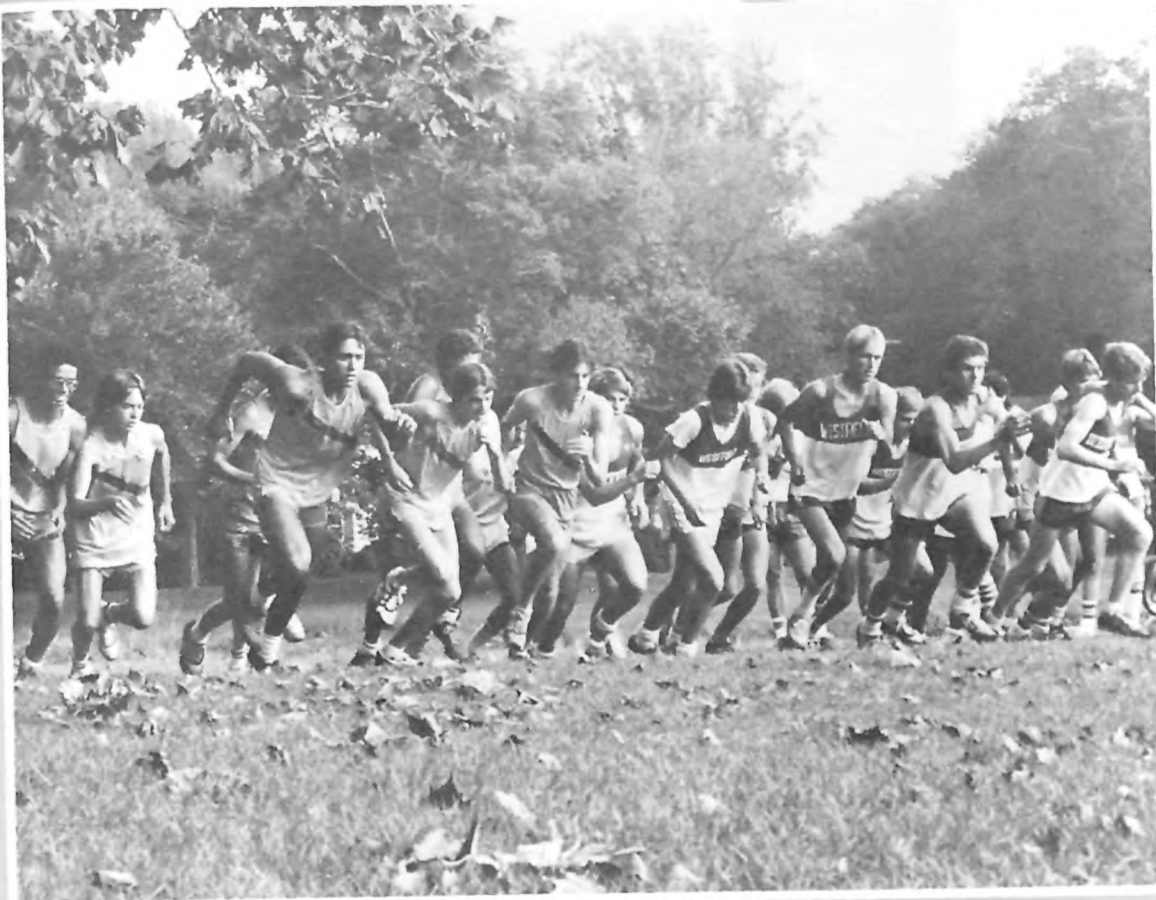

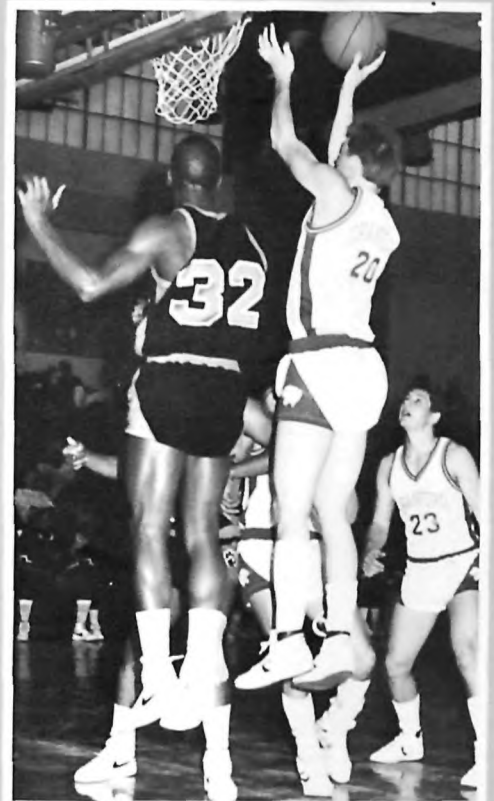

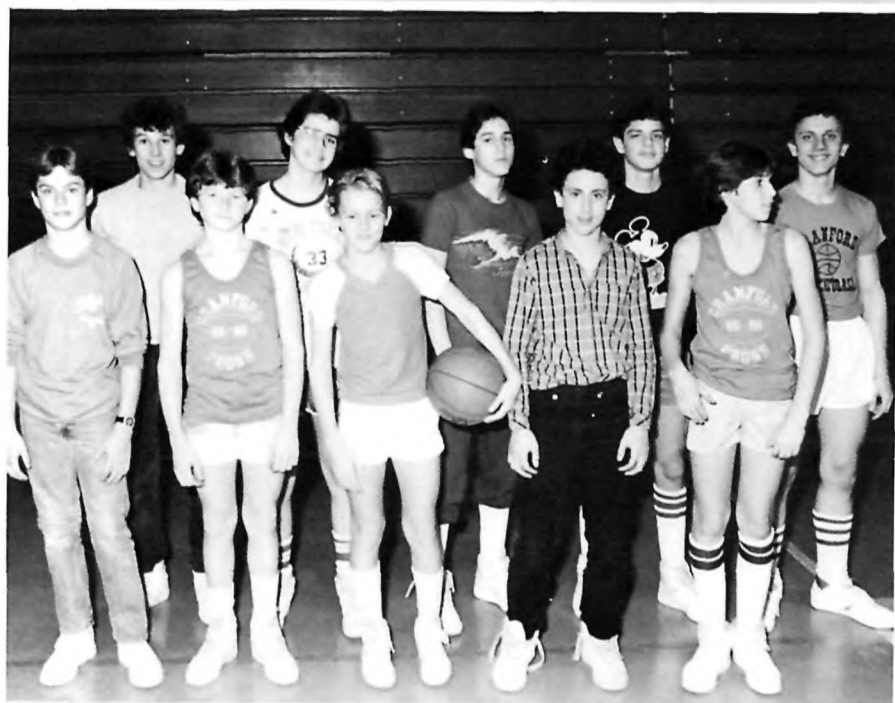

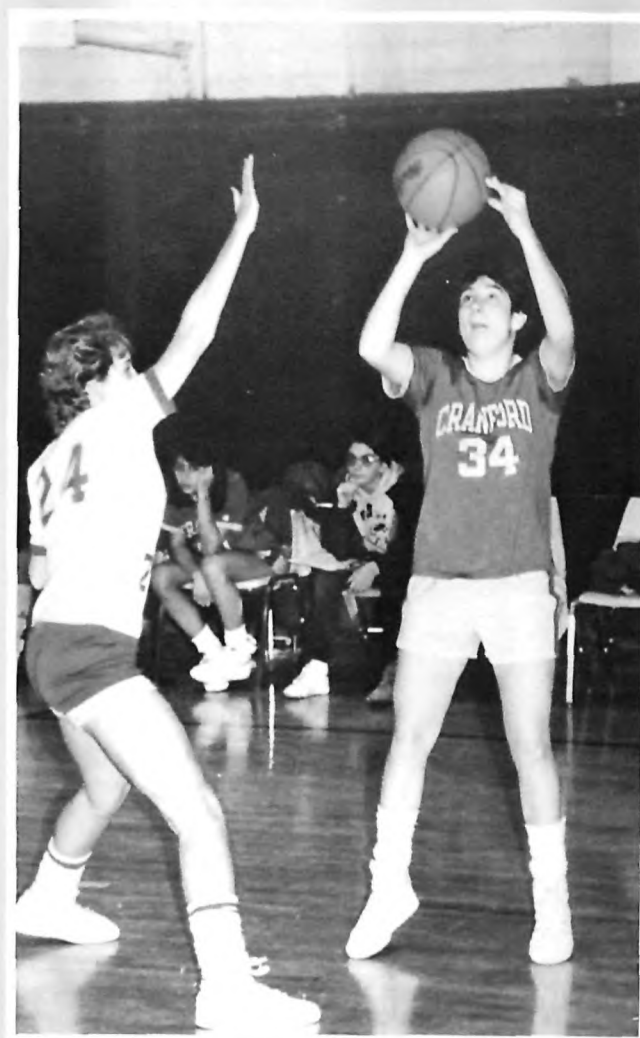

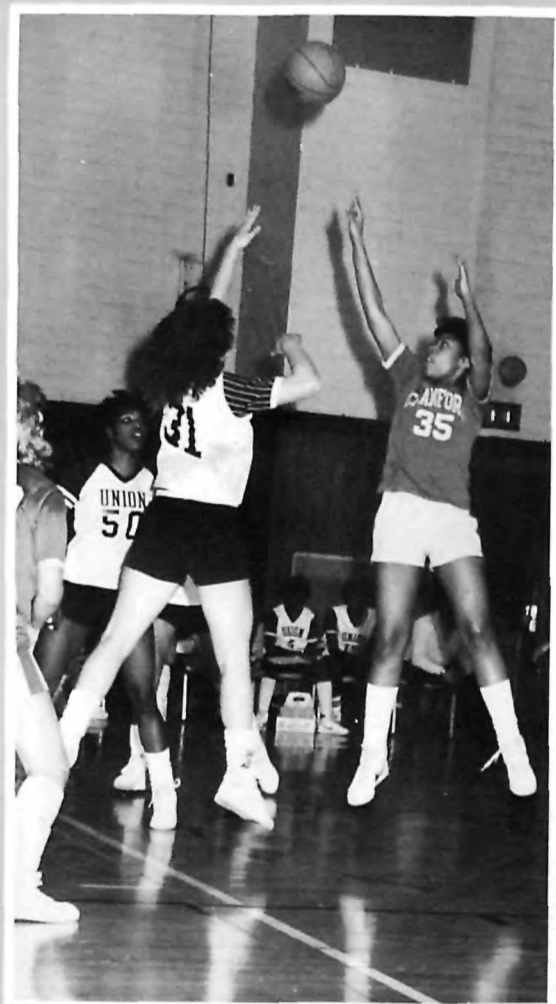

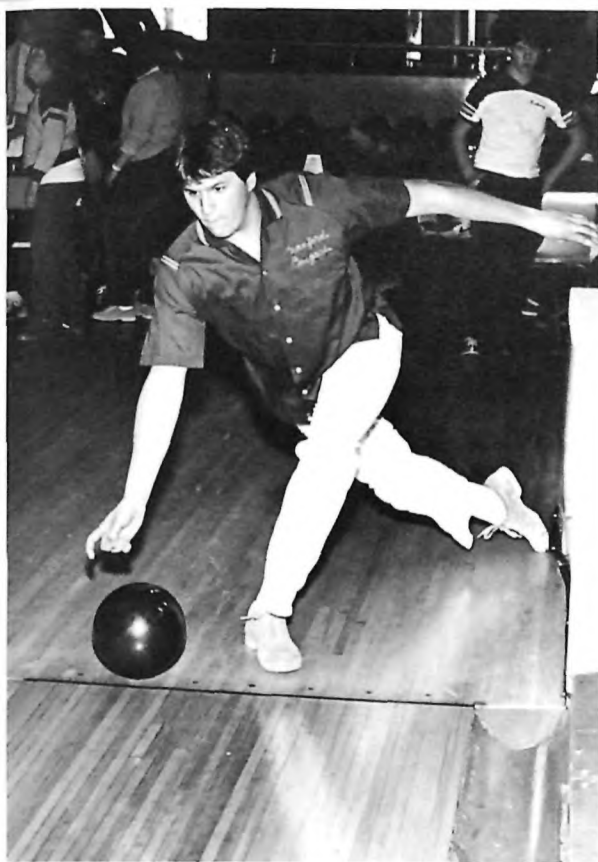

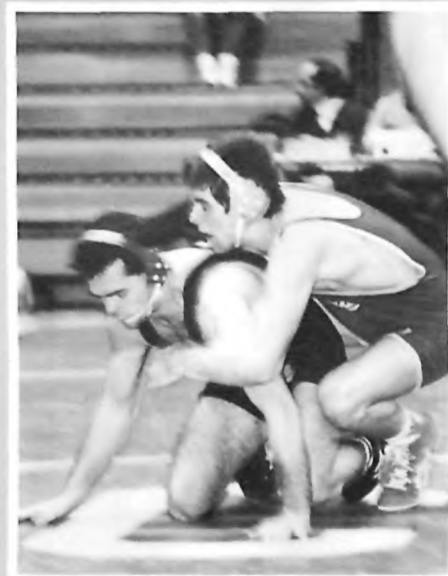
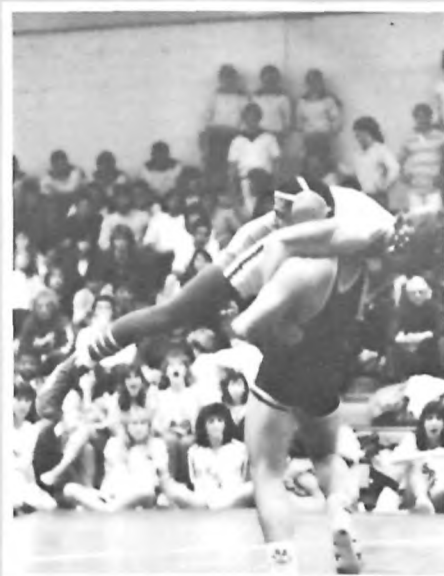
They call it the most grueling of all high school sports, running from the end of November into March, and requiring self discipline in making weight, enduring practices, and working in the off season.

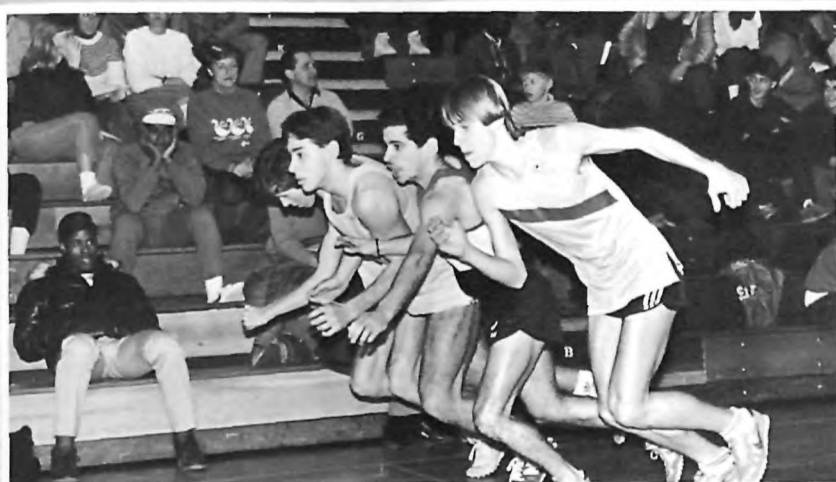

1985-1986 SPORTS YEAR IN REVIEW



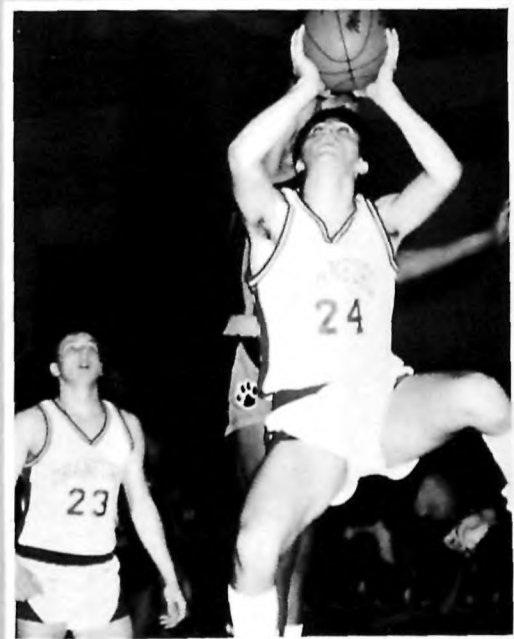
The 1985-1986 Cranford High Sports year was a Once in a Lifetime Experience. The accomplishments and rewards of this year shall be remembered in years yet to come.

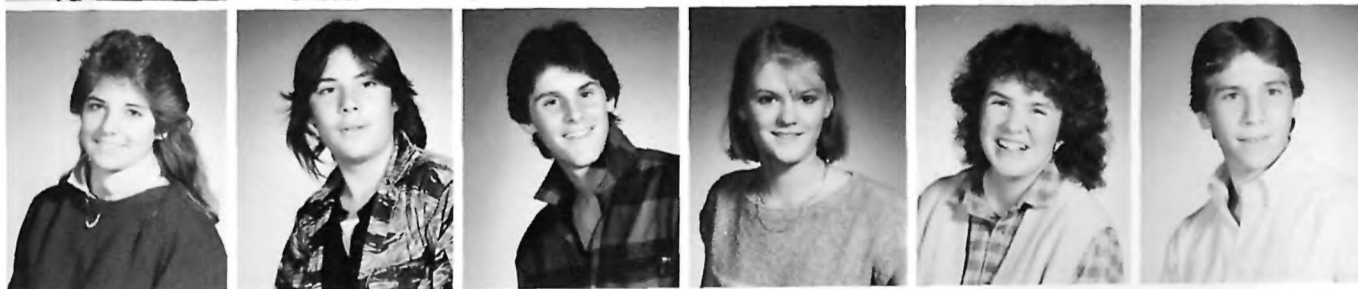

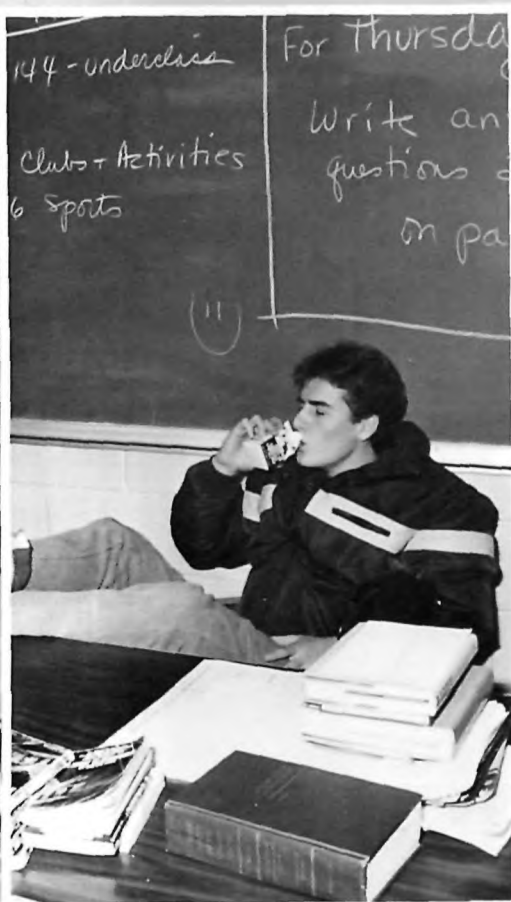

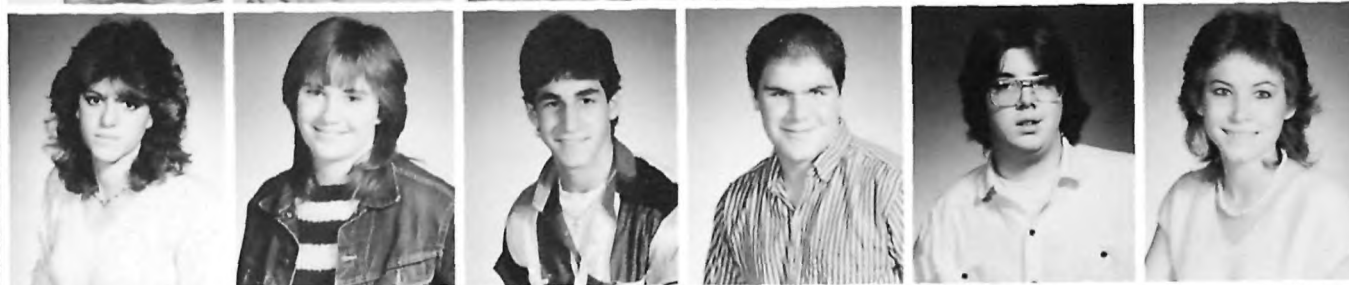

the entire face of a "Birdie" may be concealed.

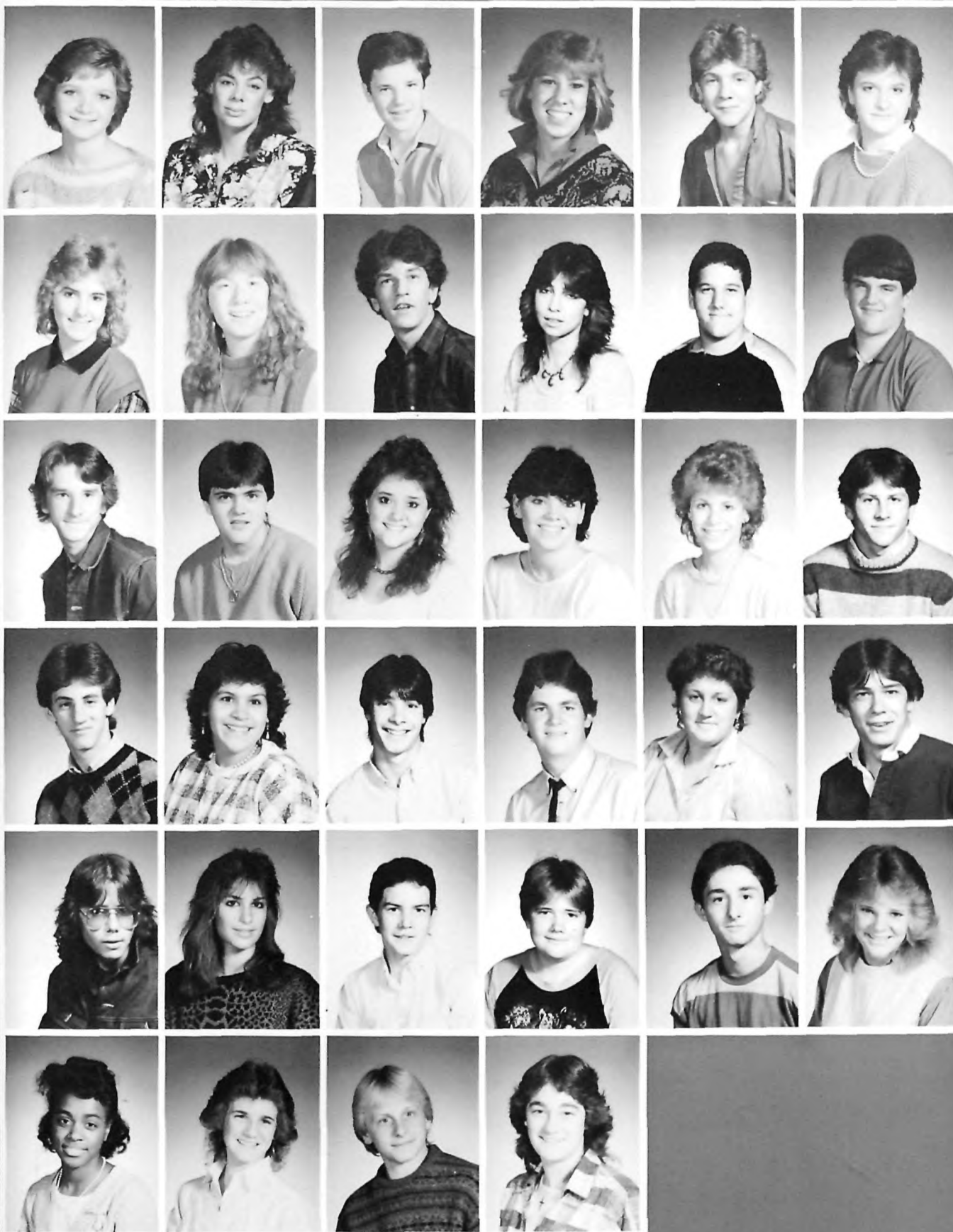
Crew cuts and Mohawks were again in fashion, as many C.H.S. athletes chose this as a means of self expression.

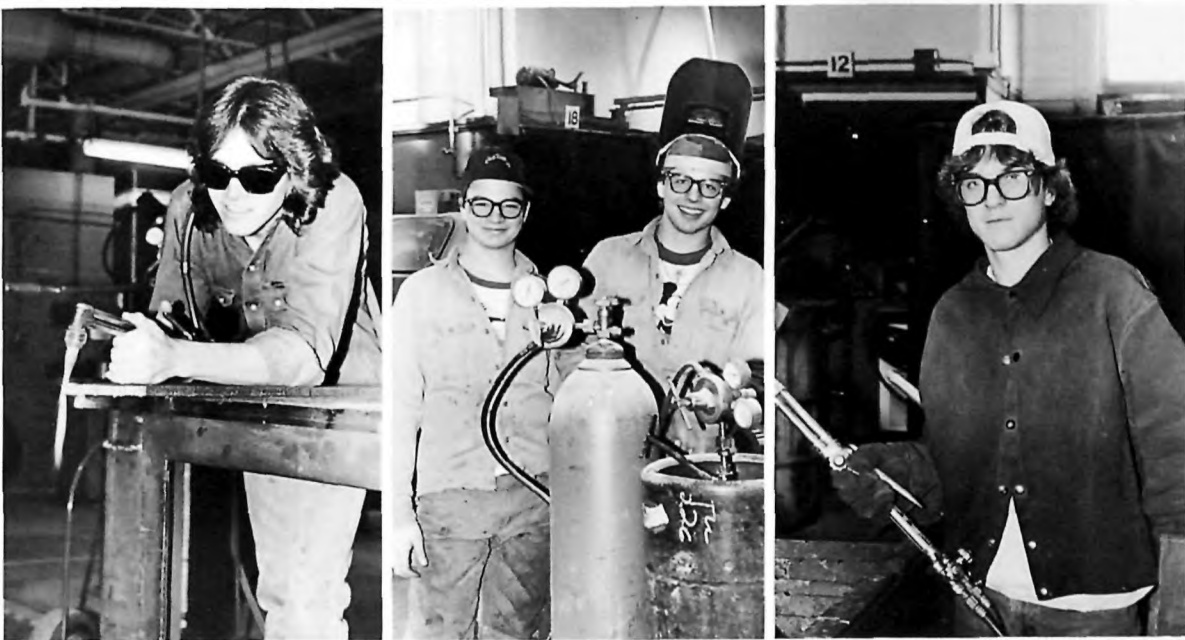
