





What does winning mean to you? Every person has his or her individual definition of the word. Vince Lombardi, legendary coach of the Green Bay Packers, once said:



If you or anyone you know suffers from this disease, seek help immediately. Therapy may be cheaper.









However, that's not all they do. Their other most important responsibility is getting seniors prepared for college. They have to help with applications, write recommendations and lastly make absolutely sure that all applications are in the mail before deadlines. That's a very big responsibility considering each counselor deals with at least thirty seniors and quite frequently double that amount. All in all without Guidance we'd be lost.

Mr. Pierri was hired for three main purposes. He provides for educational activities concerning the negative effects and abuse of drugs and alcohol, individual and small group counseling for students and their families, and for an Employee Assistance Program including family and marriage counseling.

Of the thirty applicants for the job, nine were interviewed by a committee consisting of Mr. Seyfarth; Mr. Blasucci; Mrs. DeStefano; David Roach, the community health officer; Edward Murphy, the township administrator; and Detective Sergeant Mason from the police department. The committee was looking for a person with both teenage and adult counseling experience, and educational background in counseling, and by collective opinion, effective in counseling and teaching.

Mr. Pierri's Bachelors and Masters degrees in Community Mental Health Services, his Educational Specialist degree (Ed.S) that he obtained from Seton Hall University in marriage and family counseling and his direction of two facilities for counseling and therapy gave him the qualifications the committee was seeking.

For anyone in need of advice regarding drug or alcohol use, family problems, or just to talk about one's feelings or self image, Mr. Pierri can be found on the main floor in the language area. A form to make an appointment can be found in the guidance office and slipped under his door. All meetings with Mr. Pierri will be kept absolutely CONFIDENTIAL!

On a more personal note, Mr. Pierri has been married for five years and has two pretty girls and a crazy dog who "eats bicycles." As a professional musician he played bass guitar in a rock band. His survival instinct he adds, come from his upbringing in a strong, traditional, Italian family.

ford High School because it is used daily by most students for research, reports, and reading.


According to Mrs. Boyno, our library has 22,000 books and an average of fifty books are checked out each day. A great number of sources are available to the students.























Field hockey . . . Sport of champions

Soccer . . . A Winning Tradition



TENNIS: EFFORTS FALL SHORT













The uniforms may change, but the mental as well as physical toughness will always be the same.




Coaching: The Hardest Job In The World!

We all know it is very hard for the athletes to endure a season of growth like this, but many forget the same feelings affect the coach. He has to deal with more than forty kids who all expect to win.



The Boys' Indoor Track Program has been part of the Cranford Athletic program since the first years of this high school.

In the early years the program was under the direction of Coach Seth Weekely.

Back then no track existed and the team held its practices in the halls and competed in the Elizabeth Armory. Weekely produced a winning season every year. Cranford has won 17 class mile relays, 15 were earned by Coach Weekely and his teams.

But in 1961, the Armory was closed, and therefore there was no team for two years. In 1963 the team returned but did not compete in a regular dual meet season. Instead they traveled to run in bigger meets such as the Counties and States.

Charles Messina became the new Coach until 1968 when again there was no team due to lack of competitions.

In 1970 the team was reintroduced as a club. This meant that the team did not compete interscholastically but ran against other clubs all around the state.

In the winter season of '74, Coach Ray White involved the team in running the dual meets again. The girls became involved in winter track in 1980.

When the track was built, it was named the Seth Weekely Track in honor of his excellent coaching which began the winning tradition. The winter track team has yet to experience a losing season.

Unlike the boys, the Girls' Track Team did not begin at Cranford High until the winter season of 1980.

They made an opening in the sport with an impressive record of 7-0. Since 1980, the girls have had only one losing season, but this did not discourage them at all. In no time, that losing season was behind them and again they have continued this winning tradition.




Although this year the Winter Track was a young one, the season was very successful. The boys' team fininshed with a record of 6-2.

Swimming . . . Pooling Our Talents












With the completion of the municipal pool complex, Cranford was ready to support competitive swimming activities. Scheduling eighth period off to travel to the pool for swim practice became standard procedure for the members of the team.

Hard work and long hours spent in pursuit of individual excellence have developed a string of winning teams and a great many individual records have been shattered.

Mine Berg took a second place for Cranford in the state sectionals and qualified for individual state competition in the 100 yard butterfly.








Lucy Allen



Since it opening in January of 1938, the present Cranford High School building has gone through many changes, due mainly to the population of the town and the existence and nonexistence of other elementary schools.

The freshman class has not always been the youngest class in the high school. From the late 30's to the late 50's, CHS was a 6 year high school, with 7th and 8th graders sharing the halls with freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors. In the 1962-1963 school year, CHS had a unique schedule. Although it was a four year high school, the juniors and seniors attended school in the morning and the freshmen and sophomores attended their classes in the afternoon. In this double session program, the morning classes began at 7:15 and ended at 12:30. The afternoon classes began at 1:00 and ended at 6:15.

In 1963, the junior high schools opened on Orange and Hillside avenues. The freshmen and sophomores went to these schools, making CHS a two year high school. In 1973, the sophomores returned to the high school. At this time, the average size of the school was 1,500 students—500 per class. In 1986-1987, the high school has a total of just over 1,000 students. Finally, in 1980, the high school became the four year high school which exists today.

As everything does, the town and high school changed with the times to adjust to the lack or excess of students. It also has expanded its facilities for the students. These expansions have made Cranford High School one of the better schools in the county. Our Golden Celebration of 50 years in this building is truly worthy of recognition.


A Teenage Wasteland


