## Cooperation Between Races Is School Program Theme

ENGLEWOOD — "Operation Understanding," a program of the City school system to promote respect and cooperation among people of different races and beliefs, is now in the planning stage.

Mason M. Moton, director of Extended School Services, is in charge of the new program. He and 30 members of the staffs of the different schools are meeting to discuss problems of human relations. They are using local and New York City resources to help plan a program having meaning for people of different ages and backgrounds.

Next fall these teachers will use what they have learned in the human relations program involving staff members in all the schools. After the teachers have had this experience, similar programs will be planned for boys and girls in both the elementary and secondary schools.

The final phase of the operation will be the development of similar

programs through the P. T. A. s and other community groups. "Our hope is that this program will be a means of providing better education for all boys and girls and of making a better Englewood," Moton said. "Understanding, acceptance and respect among all races is necessary if we are to have the good relationships needed in schools and towns."

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mark Shedd said that the primary purpose of the program is to promote a feeling of human dignity without regard to race, religion, nationality or any other qualification.

## Clean-Up Campaign Progresses

ENGLEWOOD — "The 3-C Award will become a standard of achievement for 1965", stated Sam Goldstein, chairman of the Englewood Clean-Up Committee at its second meeting in City Hall.

What is the meaning of the 3-C Award? Sam Goldstein says: "It stands for Community Clean - Up Campaign, Cleanest City Contest, but more specifically in 1965 it will stand for community civic consciousness.

"Every merchant, gas-homeowner, industrial firm, school, church and organization is invited to join hands in fulfilling the goals of the 3-C Campaign which are primarily an awakening of personal responsibility for, and a growing sense of pride in, the appearance of the community.

"A baby elephant seems large until you see its father", continued Mr. Goldstein. "An ugly, cluttered property, an unsightly gas station, a litter-filled lot, unpainted fences, carelessly packed rubbish at the curb which blows into the streets, are all small scars on the image of Englewood, but a series of such offenses can do irrevocable harm to the

economic stability of a community."

The Clean Up Committee announced that 3-C Awards are being prepared for various categories of achievement - outstanding maintenance, improved street of the month, industrial landscaping, cleanest school grounds, improved home of the month, garden

beautiful. Panels of judges will be set up. The first awards will be made May 1, the first day of Clean-Up Month, and will continue through the balance of the year.

The next meeting of the Clean-Up Committee will be held in City Hall March 31, at 8 p.m. All community organizations are invited to send a representative.

ENGLEWOOD — Morrell Birtwhistle, life-long resident of this City and a member of the firm of Birtwhistle and Livingstone, died at his home on Sunday, March 21.

The former Councilman and Police Commissioner served as a lieutenant in the U.S. Army in France during World War.

Private funeral services were held Tuesday, March 23, at the Birtwhistle residence, 370 Highview rd. with the Rev. Harry Chase, associate pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiating. Interment was under direction of the William J. Myers Funeral Home.

Mr. Birtwhistle was educated in the Englewood schools and at Stevens Pre-

paratory Institute, Hoboken.

His business career started in 1913 when he joined the real estate and insurance firm of Birtwhistle and Livingstone which had been founded by his father, Hezekiah Birtwhistle, in 1892.

Long prominent in real estate activities in Bergen County Mr. Birtwhistle had served on many commissions for the condemnation of properties for municipal, state and county authorities.

## Republicans Tap Volk Candidate For Mayor

ENGLEWOOD — Former Mayor Austin N. Volk was nominated by the Republican Club as its November candidate for mayor at a Club meeting Tuesday. Present Councilman Savage C. Frieze was named to run for councilman-at-large, Peter Mead Abel for first ward councilman, and Louis Pugach for the second ward council seat. William D. Ticknor Jr., acting mayor and councilman-at-large, apparently is not seeking

reelection. Neither is First Ward Councilman O. Carlisle McCandless.

Democrats now in the Council are the fourth ward's Vincente K. Tibbs, who was reelected last November by an overwhelming margin, and Charles Jorgensen of the third ward who also won last fall.

**CRUCIAL ELECTION**

The coming election has to be classified as the most crucial for Republicans since the city received its charter. The balance of power on the Common Council now stands at two Democrats and three Republicans - with the Democrats secure in their seats until 1967.

**Retaining Image Hard, Englewood Police Are Told**

ENGLEWOOD — A six-week course in police and community relations, sponsored by the Englewood Police Department, had its first session in City Hall last week. Changes in police methods and procedure to keep abreast of the times were discussed by speakers.

Howard J. Devaney, executive director of the New Jersey Region, National Conference of Christians and Jews and Dr. Harold A. Lett, consultant for the organization, said that a program for enforcing the law and still retaining a good public image was difficult, but not impossible.

**MINORITY**

Dr. Lett pointed out that policemen form a minority group in the community, that they are highly visible because of their uniforms and, because of the power they possess, are regarded with fear by many. Police must realize that their work can be much more effective when they have the complete cooperation, support and confidence of the general public, he emphasized.

Mr. Devaney, a retired police officer, said: "The quality of a police department and its degree of professionalism can be measured in direct ratio to the ability of police personnel to comprehend the importance of good community relations.

"Human nature, being what it is, makes many people resent the very authority which they, collectively, have placed in the hands of the police to maintain law and order and insure the peace and proper conduct of the life of a community.

I will say, though, that I long for the day when all the conscientious people of good will in our community are looked upon, not as obnoxious pressure groups, but as trusted and welcome allies in our government's sincere effort to look to the interests of all our people."

The Rev. Bernard Lickteig of St. Cecilia's Church, Temple Emanu-El Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg and First Presbyterian Church Minister Edward Brubaker all accepted invitations to participate in the Memorial Day rites.

The Rev. Mr. Derner has served here since 1956 and long has been a foe of de-facto segregation. He recently attended the ministerial Selma, Ala. protest meeting held in Washington, D. C.

## Veterans' Spokesmen Criticize Pastor For Refusing Memorial Day Rites Part

ENGLEWOOD — Representatives of several city veterans groups have criticized the Rev. George C. Derner's refusal to participate in the Memorial Day program May 31.

The St. John's Lutheran Church pastor declined an invitation to participate last week, saying he deprecates the "minor role" the clergy are forced to play by the present administration in municipal affairs.

Alex Filebaum, commander of the Jewish War Veterans Post, said the clergyman "completely misconstrued and misjudged" the principle of the Memorial Day program.

He said Memorial Day is a time to honor those who have sacrificed their lives in defense of the country, and it does not, and should not, be shadowed by political overtones.

Filebarm suggested that Rev. Mr. Derner attend the meeting of the participating clergymen and veterans groups with the mayor on April 12 and express his objections there.

A spokesman for the Catholic War Veterans said he thought it was a minister's place to "forgive and forget" and to "turn the other cheek". He also said that the day is to revere the war dead and should be disassociated with any entanglement with municipal affairs.

The commanders of the American Legion Post and the VFW Post would not comment on the clergyman's refusal, saying they would await the sentiment of their members.

The Rev. David Gillespie, president of the Ministerial Association, likewise would not comment. He said the association would discuss the matter at a consultation committee meeting.

The Rev. Derner would not comment further on the matter, stating his feelings were amply covered in his letter of refusal to City Clerk Joseph T. Carney.

The letter follows: "I must apologize to you and to Acting Mayor Ticknor for my delay in answering your letter inviting me to pronounce the benediction at the Memorial Day service. The delay was caused by the difficult job of soul searching I had to do in order to give my answer.

"The difficulty is that my conscience cannot accept the niggardly role of the clergy that is imposed upon us by our city fathers. I am convinced that our God-given role in the community we serve is not to be limited to merely sprinkling sanctimonious dust with invocations and benedictions at public gatherings and otherwise placing a halo around the status quo.

"These symbols of trust in God and allegiance to His will do not ring true when the city fathers' actual estimate of the clergy is that we are "a bunch of radicals," "a pressure group," and "a pack of rats." If we are radical in our approach (and all too timidly so in view of the gross evils around us), so we remember our Lord Jesus Christ who was nailed to a cross for His revolutionary ideas. If we are exerting pressure, so we must when we see God's will of

Mr. Abel, recently named to the mayor's commission to formulate plans for ward reapportionment, is a three-year resident of Englewood.

Mr. Pugach, a resident of Englewood since 1936, is a graduate of Dwight Morrow High School. He is charter member of the Englewood B'nai B'rith chapter, and currently is a Republican County Committeeman.

He has been active in the Little League and has served as American League president, and has headed the March of Dimes campaign. He was a recipient of the Bronze Star during World War II when he served in the Air Force.

**Englewood Students Get On-Job Training Under Cooperative Work Program**

ENGLEWOOD — Members of the cooperative work study program advisory committee were guests of Dwight Morrow High School at a luncheon. Sam Cooper, president, Cooperative Work Study Association, Mayor William Ticknor, and Rex Little, city business administrator, spoke.

How the Englewood schools can serve local industry was discussed by

Mason M. Moton, director of extended school services.

George Ross coordinator of the program, made a progress report and discussed need for training stations for 22 boys and four girls who have indicated their wish to enroll in next year's program.

Sixteen students, 15 of whom are employed, are participants in the present work-study program. Enrollers have academic classes and a related class in the morning and work in a local industry in the afternoon.

Between September and March, cumulative gross wages of the enrollers totaled \$5,362. Average hourly rate is \$1.43.

Companies providing work-stations this year are Cartwright Industries, Call Co. of America, Daniels Printing Co; Hoke Corp., Nate Thomas Auto Body, Paramount, Puteska, Railway Accessories, Inc. and Tempio Auto Servicer.

Enrollers are employed as multi-machine operators, a printer's devil, a machine shop lab assistant, shipping and machine controller, production expediter, photo-offset printer and advertising layout man, auto body repairman, film processor, auto serviceman, and mechanic. Three are working in electronics. One is getting machine shop practice.

**LWV To Tour State Institutions**

Several hundred members of the League of Women Voters of New Jersey are planning to take a close-up look at eleven different state institutions on April 1 and April 10. Through nine tours arranged in cooperation with the State Department of Institutions and Agencies, League members will be able to gain first-hand knowledge of the facilities and problems at New Jersey's hospitals for the mentally ill, schools and colonies for the mentally retarded, prisons and reformatories.

Miss Mary Louise Nuelson of Englewood, League State President, stated, "We are taking these tours in order to be as informed as possible about New Jersey's needs in this critical area". She explained that League members hope to see many of the operational needs they have studied over the last several years. Last year, they visited state reservoir sites in connection with their interest in state water resources.

State institutions to be visited are North Jersey Training School at Totowa,

State Hospitals at Greystone Park, Trenton, Marlboro and Ancora, Woodbridge State School, Vineland State School, State Colony at New Lisbon, State Prison Farm at Rahway, State Reformatory at Bordentown and State Home for Boys at Jamesburg.

ENGLEWOOD - At a meeting of the Dwight Morrow P.T.A. recently, Dr. Mark R. Shedd, Superintendent of Schools, said that there is a need for excellent educational facilities for increased individual instruction, tutorial conferences, small seminar groups. ## Would You Cut The Rope?

This is the fourth in a series of lenten messages prepared by member of the Englewood ministry. This week's guest editorialist is the Reverend Tore N. Fryhle, Chaplain at Englewood Hospital.

a treacherous mountain without a guide or without prior practice? Yet, we often neglect to flex our spiritual or moral muscles, or to be tied to the One who knows the path, the ins-and-outs of life. The chilly ridges of materialism, the abysses of moral decay and unethical conduct, the flirting with shadyness and shoddiness have unknowingly caused many a serious-minded 'climber' to get dizzy and to falter and fall.

Now, then, is the season when we are reminded that Someone tied Himself to us with bonds of love so strong that our weaknesses, our inexperience, insecurity and fumbling ways began tugging on Him, dragging Him down into the dangers of a sinful world. Did He cut the rope? Like a brave and honorable guide could only do - hold on - thus the Lord let Himself be dragged down into the depths of our deprivation, encountering its pains and blows. Finally came the day when He could say: "It is finished" - the task of holding fast, in faithful, forgiving love, giving His own life that the fellow at the other end of the rope might be rescued.

At Lent we are prompted to recall the "hound of Heaven" who haunts us to harken, and the rope of Heaven that holds us. Let not us cut the rope but take a tighter grip on God's redeeming love in Christ our Lord.

A teacher was telling his class about a novice climbing a mountain with an expert mountaineer as guide. A strong rope tied the sportsmen together. At one stretch they were edging along an icy ridge overlooking a sheer precipice. Here the guide cautiously cut steps for himself and for the partner to follow in. Suddenly the beginner slipped, fell and began dragging the guide with him. The situation was critical.

The teacher paused in his story, looked out over the class and asked quietly one question: "If you were the guide, would you have cut the rope?" The class pondered and the answers were varied.

To us, who are crossing the crevices and risky ridges of the twentieth century, this is a fitting story. The Lenten season should sober us down to consider our futile ways and mortal dangers. Life is a daily challenge to us - and thus it should be - and we are apt to be foolhardy, particularly so with our spiritual life. Would you attempt the climb of

## Police and the Public

The Englewood Police Department was told last Thursday that the change in today's society must be reflected with a corresponding change in the attitude of police to that society.

The advice came at the first session of a six-week course on police and community relations at City Hall.

But what the police weren't told is that the society should also change its attitude toward all law enforcers, especially in this City.

The bad publicity our department received in the past has done nothing to bolster its public image.

It seems that when an officer stops someone, no matter what the alleged violation may be, cries of "police brutality" and "discrimination" arise.

The public relations course for the Police Department is a commendable idea. Policemen are not subjected to such teachings when they are put through

their paces before becoming full-fledged law enforcers.

But perhaps a similar clinic should be conducted for the entire City.

The people would then learn that

1) Every person a policeman stops could be a potential criminal. This can be borne out by the murder of two Lodi policemen two years ago who were investigating a routine disturbance in a cocktail lounge;

2) The policeman's job is not only to arrest a criminal, but to try and prevent a criminal act from taking place.

3) A policeman plays a vital role in keeping the City free from any disturbances, whether they be lightly, or maliciously intended.

Police public relations courses now appear to be in vogue, and they are not intended to suggest that a particular department is "foul", but point out those areas where the law enforcer and the community—at-large should be familiarized.

## Burglary- A Vacation Time Business

According to a gentleman on television, this is the time to travel south for that mid-winter vacation. And if his cajoling has any effect, many people in our area will be making reservations very shortly.

While the reservations are being made, plans of a different kind are also being made and by a different kind of person. This person will stay here for the winter because it is more profitable—especially when his "clients" are away. He is the burglar.

Police departments all over would certainly appreciate the family that takes precautions before checking out for a few warm weeks of sunshine.

They advise a ten point program for safety.

- 1.) Cancel all daily deliveries.
- 2.) Leave one or two lamps lighted and connected to an automatic timer.
- 3.) Discontinue your newspaper. (We don't mind for the

short time you're away.

4.) Notify both the police department and a neighbor how long you will be away and notify them upon your return.

5.) Leave the shades or drapes in a normal position. Closed shades and drapes are an invitation for investigation by a burglar.

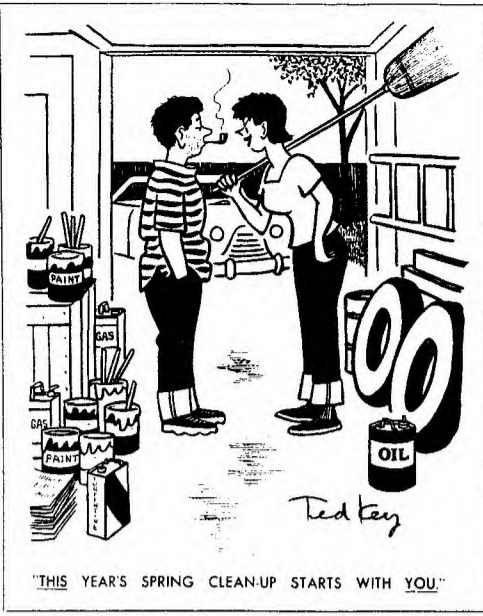
6.) Close and lock all doors and windows - including the garage.

7.) Arrange with either the Post Office or your neighbor to have your mail taken care of while you are away.

8.) Rent a safety deposit box for all jewelry and other small valuables including papers.

These simple rules are easy to follow, but the number of burglaries increased 15 per cent last year while vacations increased only 12 per cent.

Take the time before you go away and you will come home secure in the knowledge that your house has been kept safe.

## Front Porch For Courting? May Have To Be Put In Back

New York City is such a conglomerate entity that there is practically a zone for every name in the phone book. In Englewood, there are only 12. Only 12? Alfred Aulicino, City Engineer, who is responsible for enforcing the building code and zoning ordinance, finds a flood of ticklish work leaking into his office from them.

"Recently some one wanted to add a dormer to a two-family house which stands in a one-family zone," he says. "The question here is: 'Is this an extension of a non-conforming use?'"

If he cannot take care of a building permit, he sends the case to the Board of Adjustment.

The greatest number of requests for variances come from people who want to build garden apartments. There isn't too much vacant land left in Englewood, so a variance is needed for permits.

"I try to get the message across to people," he says, "to present a plan we can accept. For example, by law we can't accept a builder's plan. It must be done by an architect."

Property owners can draw up their own plans for small renovations, but some times they violate a zoning law which they don't understand. If some one wants to build a porch onto his house, and the porch intrudes upon a legal side-yard, the distance required by law between houses, he will have to get a variance.

"Zoning laws are the first line of defense against deterioration, and the creation of blighted areas," Aulicino stated. "However, they are useless unless intelligently interpreted and enforced. So I must be very careful, because a law looks clear and concise to the people who draw it up, but to me it needs to be fitted to the situation, so I must try to have hindsight - to know the goal of the people who originally wrote the law - and I must interpret it with common sense."

He feels very delighted that Englewood, unlike most towns, retains full time services of a planning and zoning consultant, not simply consultants for a Master Plan, or the like. Aulicino can turn to them for help in formulating solutions, or for reinforcing his own opinions. On the job for about a year now, he finds himself using them more and more, usually for an interpretation of a zoning ordinance.

As building inspector, he finds an increasing amount of trouble with the types of lumber used for framing. Too often it is either substandard or improperly stamped. Aulicino's assistant has to inspect it all and call in his boss for anything that looks suspicious. Aulicino doesn't know whose fault the lumber problem is, speculates on builders, lumber suppliers, or possibly just the cost of lumber, the law of supply and demand. He advises

people to make sure lumber is properly stamped according to grade and type before buying. Lower grades usually aren't stamped.

Delighted with the varying questions and tasks that make his job challenging and stimulating, Aulicino is looking forward to the revised National Building code due to be put out this year by the American Insurance Association.

He notes the wonderful cooperation he has had with the Department of Health and the Fire Department and looks forward to the scheduled move of his office into the building with the Department of Health, which will help coordinate the inspecting task even more.

Right now there are three or four substandard houses that he is hoping to demolish. Usually his office tries to get owners to fix a place. If that is not possible, then eviction of tenants would be necessary. However, no evictions have taken place since he has been in office.

A municipal engineer in Cedar Grove N.J., before coming here, he lives there with his wife, Elsie, and three children, Robert, Steven, and Barbara.

**Old Armenian Family Recipe is Ideal Lenten Dish**

As one of the very active members of the Armenian Church of Bergen County and president of the Women's Guild of that Church, Mrs. Serge Ganan of New Milford was particularly pleased to give one of her special Armenian dishes as "The Recipe of the Week".

This is one of the original recipes of that country brought here by her mother, who was known as an excellent cook and at the age of 71 could prepare an extensive dinner for 40 people in about two hours.

Mrs. Ganan prepares the recipe as she gave it for the Lenten season, but it can be used in five different ways, using chopped lamb or beef in the mixture, but with less onions and less rice. It can also be wrapped in grape leaves as well as the cabbage leaves, making it an international dish.

Mrs. Ganan is also president of the P. T. A. of New Milford High School, membership chairman of the Woman's Club of New Milford, and during the Tercentenary celebration, was active on the Queen Contest in the town and also on the County level. She has lived in New Milford for 15 years. She is the mother of twin boys now in college. Her hobbies included tennis and horseback riding in her younger years, and is now a real lover of bridge which she plays avidly.

Empty-out and wash the green peppers; cut up the tomatoes and hold to one side. Mix all the remaining ingredients together. Put 1/2 teaspoonful of the mixture in each eggplant. Cut a cabbage leaf, roll the meat.

Arrange the stuffed eggplants on the bottom of a large pot, setting them with a layer of the green pepper, and then the cabbage leaf. Add 1/2 cup of water, 1/2 cup of tomato sauce, 1/2 cup of olive oil, 1/2 cup of salt, and 1/2 cup of pepper. Bring to a boil, and simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Drain the eggplants, and place them on a plate with a layer of cabbage leaf, and a layer of tomato sauce. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. The mixture may be used as a substitute for meat in any recipe.

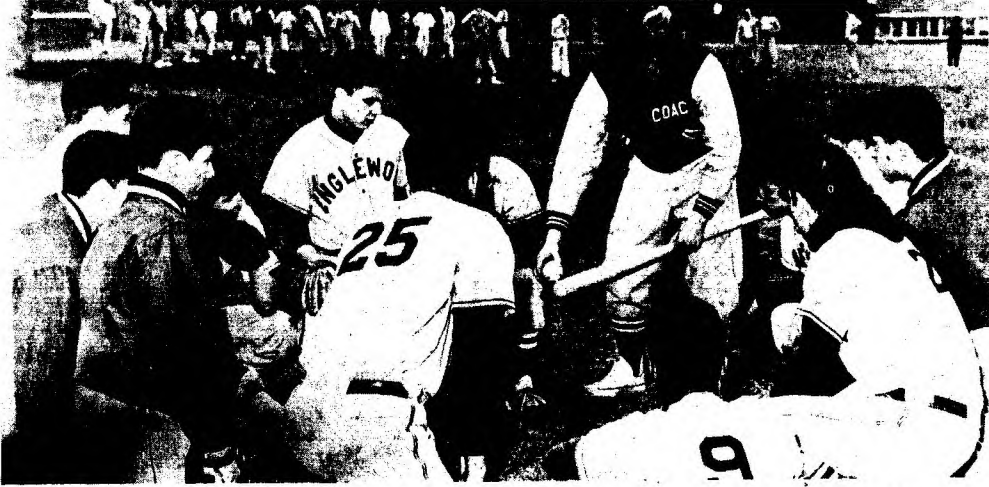

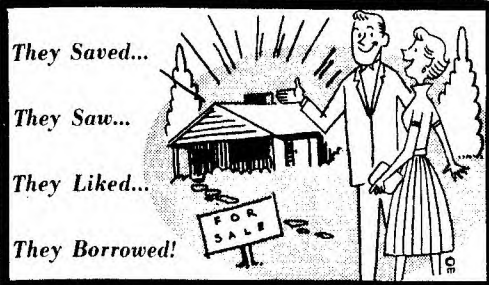

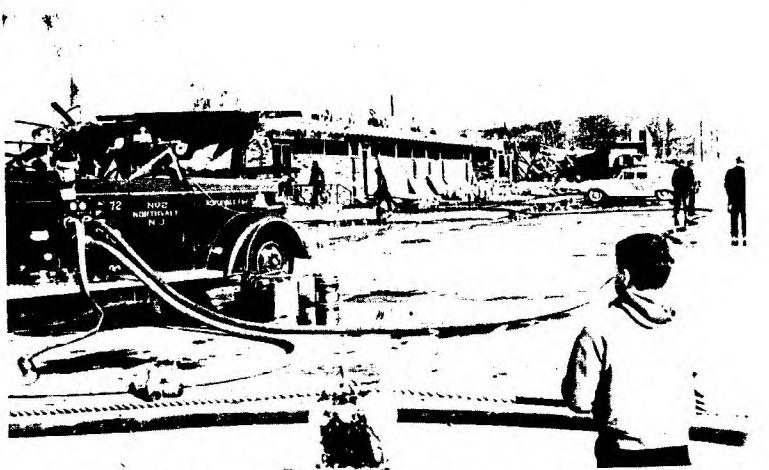

**Another 'Parents Night' Set By Englewood Girls**

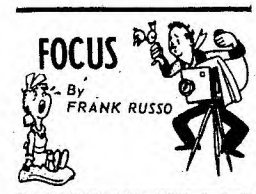
ENGLEWOOD - The Englewood Girls Athletic Club, having elected its first slate of officers, recently accelerated its program toward raising funds for athletic uniforms.

Cameras are basically all alike but there are important differences. To understand how they differ, it is necessary to understand how they function and why they all have certain features in common.

Light is essential in photography. Its action on film produces the picture image. The camera's role is to protect the light sensitive film from unwanted light, and allowing a controlled amount of light to reach it when a picture is desired.

All cameras are a light-tight box, with an opening for light to enter (aperture), a lens, a shutter and a viewer. The greatest differences are in the shutters and lenses. They operate much like the human eye. The lens collects the light from picture subject and forms the image on the sensitive film. The shutter is like the eyelid, remaining closed until opened to permit the lens to "see". In a simple box camera, the aperture remains fixed. The simplicity of the lens does not permit the subject to be less than six feet away.

Adjustable lenses, shutters and aperture openings are desirable in that they broaden the range of picture-taking. They can be set for varying light conditions and subject matters. Some shutters vary from one second to 1/1000 of a second.
