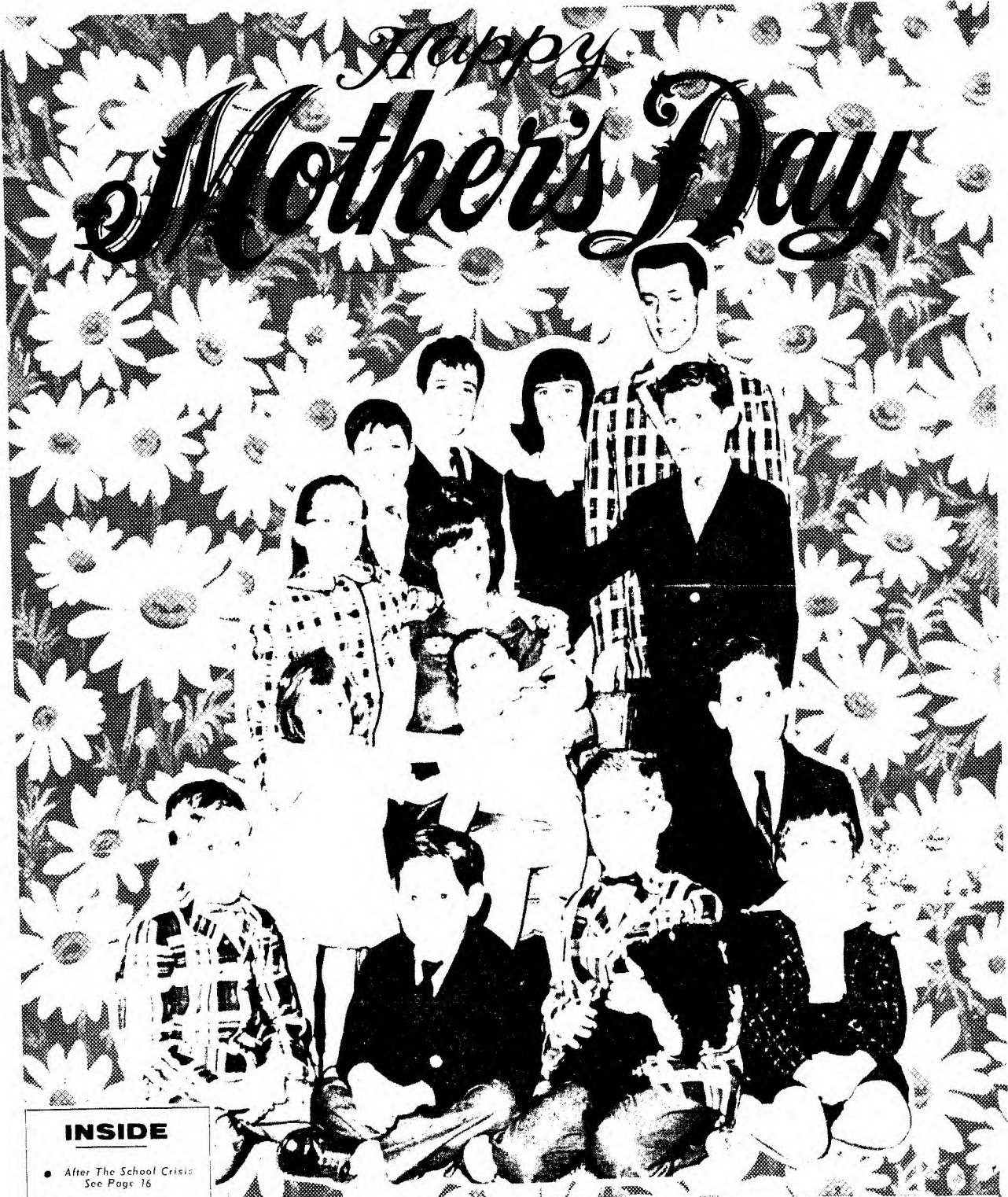

### Multi-Level Parking Lot?

# Detailed Study Would Be Prerequisite For Additional Parking, Says Little

ENGLEWOOD — If the city is at all to help finance a three level garage in the downtown shopping area an extensive study of the entire situation would first have to be undertaken according to City Administrator Rex Little.

Plans for a multi-level garage to ease what has been described as a, "totally inadequate," parking situation, were revealed in last week's Press Journal by Pat Craig of Craig's Dry Goods, a member of the Guild of Englewood Merchants.

Mr. Craig stated that the garage would cost about \$500,000 and that if the city built and operated it the merchants would be willing to be taxed, "proportionate to the benefits they received."

He further stated that if the city didn't

build a garage, the merchants planned to form a corporation, sell shares and build and run the garage themselves.

Administrator Little, commenting on the announced garage, said that he had not been approached by the Guild to discuss the matter, and the problem would not be brought before City Council unless formally proposed by the merchants. He stated that if the business owners wish to build a garage themselves there is nothing stopping them from doing so, but if the city were to help finance such a program, a study would have to be made to find out how funds could best be obtained.

Mr. Little also stated that the city's planning board did have a long range program which included parking facilities,

and that the city had planned to build a lot for cars on the site of the Englewood Lumberyard. Unfortunately the price of the land was too expensive.

This week, John Gorman, head of the Guild, stated that he felt the whole situation was very much up in the air, and to clarify matters he had appointed a special three man committee to study the problem and report back by May 6 on the exact cost and feasibility of financing a garage.

Mr. Gorman went on to say that no appointment would be made with the City Administrator until all information pertaining to the parking problem had been obtained. He commented however that, "Five years from now the City of Englewood would be in a sorry state if nothing is done."

## Afternoon College Courses At Tenafly Public Library

Joseph Bram, Professor of Sociology, will discuss the ground between anthropology and psychology when he deals with why people in different countries act and think as they do. Special attention will be given to the impact of Swedish, Russian, Japanese and Mexican cultures on human emotions, character and behavior. The class will start on Thursday, May 6, 10-11:45 a.m.

Professor Ralph Bates will explore the meanings

for today of "Greek Themes in Modern Plays" as he deals with the "Antigone of Sophocles and Anouilh; "Electra" by Euripides and Giraudous; "The Libation Bearers" by Aeschylus and "The Flies" by Sartre; Euripides' "Medea" and Durrensmatt's "The Visit;" and "Philoctetes" by Sophocles and Durrensmatt's "The Physicists." For each session a pair of plays will be discussed and participants should read or should have seen the plays. The first session will be on Thursday afternoon, May 6, 1-2:45 p.m.

"Crisis in the United Nations: the Role of the New Nations" will meet on Monday afternoons.

All classes are open to the public. Information is available from Mrs. Ethel Kahn 100 Prospect Terrace, Tenafly. Registration can be completed at the Library at the first session.

# Englewood Students Play Arbor Day 'Tag'

ENGLEWOOD —Representative from all schools in the City, public, private and parochial, joined members of the Shade Tree Advisory Committee and the City Shade Tree Department on Wednesday, April 28, in a Tree Tagging Ceremony, in conjunction with Arbor Week observation.

Principals and students of the schools gathered in front of City Hall and heard Mrs. Albert R. Lamb, Jr., Chairman of the Shade Tree Advisory Committee, describe the significance of the "exhibit trees" in the business district of the City.

The Planting Program of curbside trees in the business section, which has won national recognition in the American City publication, was started in 1957 and has been expanded under the continued planning program of Carl C. Guerrina, Director of Public Works. The curbside trees have won the interest

and recognition of the New Jersey Shade Tree Federation and the Bergen County Shade Tree Commission who are scheduling a tour of Englewood on June 19 with representatives of other municipalities.

Eight or more different varieties of trees, includ-

ing Columnar Norway Maples, Willow Oaks, Augustine Ascending Elms, Sycamores, and Ginkgo trees were identified and tagged by the students. The specially devised tags used are an experiment conducted for the New York Botanical Gardens and the

manufacturing firm who are testing the best method of tagging trees that will hold up under weather variations and not injure the trees.

Mrs. Lamb explained to the students the necessity for careful and discriminating placement of curb-

side trees in a business district, because growth must be controlled and various allowances made for weather conditions.

Arbor Day School Programs were conducted throughout the City during this past week, coordinated by Raymond A. Heim, School Representative on the Arbor Day Committee. Arbor Day ceremonies were held Saturday morning at Depot Park. A demonstration of new Shade Tree Dept. equipment was sponsored by the City Shade Tree Dept. under the supervision of the Director of Public Works.

At 1st Conference  
Of N.A.A.C.P.**

ENGLEWOOD — In a panel discussion of the Bergen County Branch of the N.A.A.C.P., the association's state president, Augustus B. Harrison, said that de facto school segregation in Englewood had awakened the county and state to take steps to correct inequities and provide the best possible education for all children.

The first educational conference of the branch's association took place at Galilee Methodist Church last week.

Dr. John S. Damm, director of education at Grace Lutheran Church, Teaneck, said that a coordinated effort should be made by parents, teachers, and clergymen to assist students with their studies and impress upon them the importance of taking advantage of school.

Mrs. Ruth Ann Sheer, guidance counselor in Hackensack schools, said that growing children should have guidance counselors to whom they can bring problems with confidence and trust rather than stew in their own juice.

Mrs. Jeanette Wilson, president of Bergen County N.A.A.C.P., spoke of contributions of Negroes and people of color to the U.S.

They made their comments as part of a discussion on the role of parents, teachers, and clergymen in solving the problems of youths.

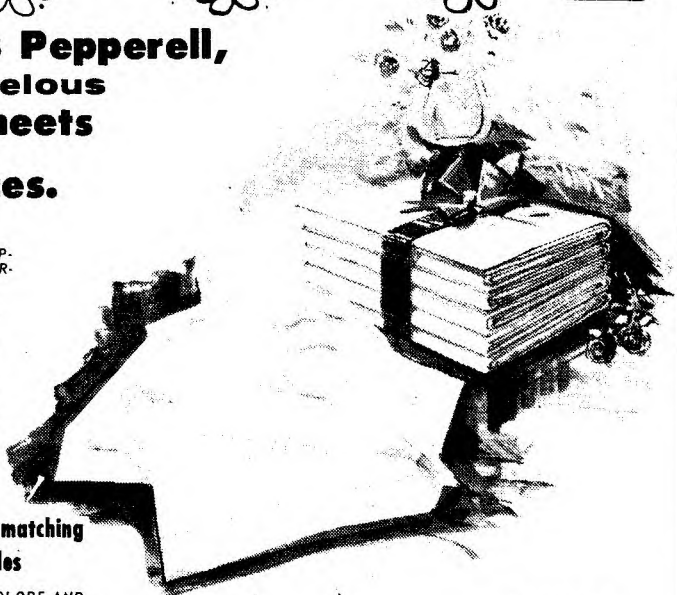

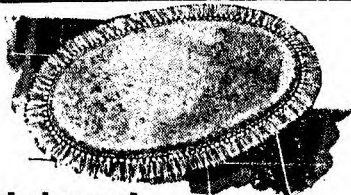

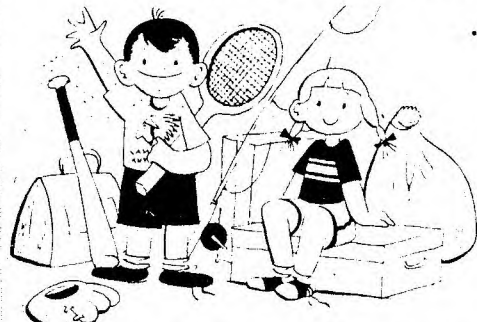
## School Aid Bill Goes To Forum

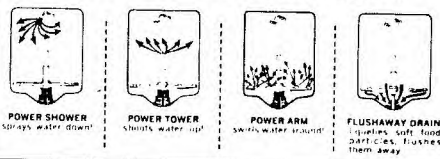

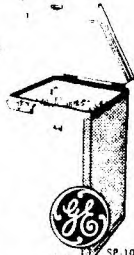

# 'Team Teaching Opening Doors,' Says Principal Theodore Davis

ENGLEWOOD — Teachers working in teams open doors to better educational experience for boys and girls in the opinion of Principal Theodore Davis of the Englewood Junior High School.

Mr. Davis bases his opinion on his observation of team teaching in the seventh grade of the junior high school. "We now have

a better, more modern seventh grade curriculum based on a deep concern for each child."

This concern was evident in the planning of the introduction of team teaching. Teachers must know their boys and girls; they must plan their classes in order to avoid waste

of time in September.

The 275 pupils who were to enter the junior high school were carefully tested at Engle School. Their scores were recorded and made available to their future teachers.

Their counselor, Mrs. Louise Fowler, moved to

the junior high school with them. There she has helped the pupils to meet new problems and the teachers to understand their students.

During the summer of 1964, Miss Laura De Benedetto of the Englewood Junior High School was leader of a summer workshop which planned a new curriculum in the social studies. The curriculum was designed to help pupils develop understanding of others through knowledge of themselves.

Davis carefully worked out his master schedule. Time for planning was essential. Each team of four teachers was given 90 minutes three times weekly to decide together what they would teach.

All decisions, according to Mr. Davis, are team decisions. Each teacher, however, has the freedom to use the methods and add the enrichment he wishes.

Language arts in the seventh grade consists of spelling, developmental reading, and oral expression. The seventh period was set aside for this study.

Seventy-five boys and girls had high scores on standard reading tests. They study a foreign language during this period. A strong developmental reading program was planned for the other 200.

Four teachers teach mathematics during the same period. This arrangement makes possible grouping according to levels. Each pupil can, therefore, receive the help he needs.

Two science classes composed of pupils on the same team meet during the same period. If the teachers wish, they can combine the classes to see a movie or hear a lecture. Afterwards they can discuss what they have learned with their teachers.

While there have been shattering achievements, Mr. Davis feels that the new organization has proved its worth. What success it has had has been in large measure due to the advice of Dr. Robert Anderson of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, who has served as consultant.

"I cannot praise Dr. Anderson enough," said Davis. "With his help, we shall be able next year to offer even better education to our boys and girls."

## Enforce Speed Limit

TEANECK — A new 35-mile-an-hour speed limit on DeGraw avenue will be strictly enforced, Township Manager Werner Schmid announced at the Council meeting.

The new limit was established by the County and approved by the State. Speed limit signs have been posted along DeGraw avenue from Teaneck road to Elm avenue, Schmid reported.

### CHECK INSURANCE ON MOTOR BOATS

"I recently purchased an outboard motor boat. Should I make special arrangements for insuring it?" a reader questions.

Yes, there are several important coverages you should investigate. These include physical damage, boating liability and medical payments insurance.

Physical damage pays for direct physical damage to the insured boat and outboard motor and generally covers the boat trailer and portable boat accessories. It also provides insurance against fire, explosion, collision with other boats, theft, sinking, or loss overboard of motor. It is comparable to automobile collision insurance. Under some policies deductibles — which would reduce premiums — are available.

Boating liability covers bodily injury and property damage liability arising out of ownership, use and maintenance of the boat and outboard motor. This compares to auto liability insurance. The amount of liability coverage would depend upon the policy you purchase.

Medical payments insurance covers medical expenses for each person, other than the insured and his family, who is injured or becomes ill as the result of an accident while in, or upon boarding, or leaving the boat. The insurance also pays all reasonable expenses for necessary medical, surgical and dental services rendered within one year of an accident.

Your outboard motor insurance can be purchased separately or added to your homeowners policy. For smaller craft the liability coverage provided under the homeowners policy or comprehensive personal liability coverage will cover you while operating the boat. However, if you purchase a boat you should confer with your independent insurance agent to be certain you are properly insured.

# EDITORIAL

## YES: It's a Good Program

The Englewood Youth Employment Service officially opened its doors on Saturday. It also opened the doors to a new era for City teenagers - one in which youths can spend their spare time working, and not wondering what to do with their idle hours.

The Employment Service is especially meritable from three points of view:

First from the viewpoint of those that made the program possible - those who donated time and energy free of charge - to make the Service workable. It is these behind-the-scenes individuals who can bathe in the self-satisfaction which only results from a job well done.

Secondly, the employers who have agreed to take on summer and part-time help must be offered accolades. Without their help there would be no program at all.

But in the final analysis, it is the youth of Englewood who will reap the most benefit from the Service and its sponsors. And they and they alone will make it workable. They must show that such a program is of benefit to the employer, not only to themselves.

An employment service for youth should be a growing entity. It must be fostered from its good beginning to an even better continuance. And despite the time and efforts of the sponsors and employers, it is the young people who are directly responsible for continuing success.

So we suggest that every teenager in the program do the best he can at whatever job comes his way.

## Need To Park

Englewood needs more parking space. If this city is to increase its potential as a shopping area, it must provide space for shoppers to park.

Over the years, city fathers have called attention to parking areas, which are rarely filled to capacity, because they are a few blocks away from the stores in the center of town. Unfortunately, some shoppers don't like to walk. Others still don't know there is space nearby.

All of them must be informed of facilities and urged to use them.

And still more space must be provided. For some time, Englewood merchants, especially GEM merchants, have been calling for facilities for shoppers.

Many people have started shopping on Route 4 and in other areas. Only better facilities will lure them back to Englewood.

Pat Craig, a Gem merchant, in last week's PRESS JOURNAL urged the city to construct a three-level, \$500,000 garage capable of handling a huge load of cars. He indicated that if the city could not finance the improvement then the merchants would consider creating funds themselves.

Any large additional parking facility will have to be built in tiers to be close enough to Englewood's shopping district. So Craig's plan has considerable merit.

If a site could be found for the garage, however, the cost of building on it would be prohibitive for the City.

A plan by merchants for private or corporate financing of the needed garage should be seriously considered.

## Budget Committee Meets Agencies

ENGLEWOOD - The Community Chest Budget Committee will meet with the nine member agencies of the Community Chest.

Committee members will review programs and services of the agencies—Englewood Hospital, Memorial House, Family Counseling Service, Englewood Urban League, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Homemaker Service, Englewood Blood Association, and the U.S.O.

Following conferences with the member agencies on objectives, the committee will recommend a budget, which will be used as the campaign goal, for 1966.

Clean-up day was hailed as a rousing success. It was reported that with the enthusiastic help of such organizations as the Women's Political Union, the Board of Trade, the Campfire Girls, and Boy Scouts, over seventy-six loads of refuse were carted away from long unsightly areas of the city.

Readers of the Englewood Press were informed that a local burglar was back in action after what the paper described as, "... a two week respite." The article went on to say that the night-time visitor, "... had been upsetting the nocturnal equilibrium of the residents of the borough for a month."

Bargain sales listed the price of shoes at \$1.97 and fancy screen doors were 98¢. Men's Madras shirts were listed at 57¢, and women's "La Victoire" corsets cost \$1.00.

The society section noted that Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hill had spent the winter at their apartments on Fifth Ave., N.Y.C., but had returned to their home in Englewood for the summer.

Trying to win the support of local prohibitionists, an advertisement for Peterbureau beer announced that, "Good Beer Promotes Temperance."

An early sign of urbanization was the notice that the Borough Council of Leonia had ordered summonses issued to all people who failed to obtain licenses for their dogs.

The Englewood theatre advertised the showing of Mary Pickford in, "Rags," and the playing of the fourth episode of the, "Iron Claw." The theatre announced four acts of, "Refined Vaudeville."

Finally, this week fifty years ago marked an all-out city effort called the, "Better Baby Campaign" to teach mothers hygienic care for children. Their slogan was, "Better Babies - Better Mothers - Better Cities."

## DE FACTO SEGREGATION ENDED

# Aftermath of City School Crisis; Complaints Are Down to 'Nothing'

ENGLEWOOD — October 28, 1963, is an important date in the history of this city's public schools.

On that day Principal Leroy McCloud and 12 teachers watched 300 sixth grade boys and girls troop into the old Englewood Junior High School. Rooms had been painted, new equipment installed to provide for a central school which all sixth grade pupils in the city would attend.

A guidance counselor had been appointed; a teacher had been released full time to prepare audio-visual materials and help with their use. For the first time in Englewood a team teaching type of organization would be used. The service of Dr. Robert Anderson of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, a nationally known authority on team teaching had been secured.

The school, according to Dr. Mark R. Shedd, superintendent of schools, would serve as an example in providing quality education for all children.

### De Facto

Doubtless, both the principal and the teachers asked themselves questions. Would the school, renamed the Engle School, help to end the criticism of de facto segregation in the Englewood schools. Would team teaching provide a better education for boys and girls.

Today there are no questions about the worth of the

## SCHOOL WILL IMPROVE, SAYS NOTED EDUCATOR

ENGLEWOOD — Dr. Robert Anderson of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, says that the team teaching type of organization has been more effective in the Engle School in 1964-1965 than it was in 1963-1964.

Though there are problems still to be ironed out, Dr. Anderson feels that the school will continue to improve.

Dr. Anderson, who is nationally known as an authority on team teaching, has served as a consultant to the Englewood public schools since 1963. He will continue to act in that capacity during 1965-1966.

He added that Engle School offers several advantages to the students. A full-time librarian provides needed assistance to both pupils and teachers.

A reading consultant helps the teachers in grouping according to levels and in finding materials they need. The consultant also works with some pupils who have serious reading difficulties.

Engle School is especially fortunate in having

a full-time guidance counselor who understands the problems of the twelve-year old.

"The classroom teacher can handle many of the children's problems," said Dr. Anderson. "Some children have more serious problems that take more counseling time than the teacher has."

Dr. Anderson suggested that before school closes in June, each teacher should be given a list of the pupils she will have next year. The teacher can then learn what she needs to know about each child before she meets him in the classroom. This knowledge will help her to meet each child's needs from the first day of school. "A teacher needs to get to know the kids."

The proposed two-team organization will streamline a number of planning tasks, in Dr. Anderson's opinion. Teachers will meet weekly to plan their work for a month in advance. The particular talents of each teacher can be more effectively used.

experiment in the minds of the principal and teachers. Complaints of de facto segregation have dwindled almost into nothingness. The teachers say that team teaching should have happened to them long ago.

"But my teachers are not satisfied; they want to improve the present organization," said Mr. McCloud proudly. "After talking over the problem with Dr. Shedd and Dr. Anderson, they have proposed that we have two teams of 150 pupils and six teachers instead of three teams of 100 pupils with four teachers."

Mr. McCloud added that each team will have a per-

manent leader and an assistant. At present the chairmanship works on a rotating basis. One leader will have a mathematics and science background; the other, a background in social studies and mathematics.

### Sub Teams

Four sub-teams, each with a special interest—science, mathematics, social studies, or language arts, will plan skeleton units with the assistance of the newly appointed coordinators in these areas.

The sub-teams will present the results of their work to the Engle School Team, composed of all the staff. After suggestions

have been considered, skeleton units will be given each teacher, who will enrich and improve it as the needs of his class require.

"Our curriculum will continue to be based on the needs of the twelve-year old," Mr. McCloud declared.

Mr. McCloud feels that the proposed organization offers two major advantages. First, as levels grouping in mathematics and reading will be continued, having six teachers on a team will make it possible to lessen the spread at each level.

Second, having six teachers on a team will

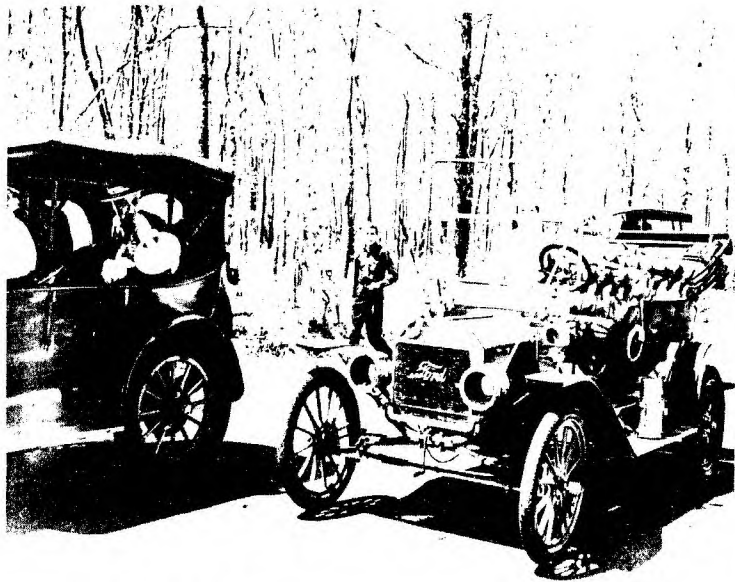
lighten the work load of each teacher. Mr. McCloud said that he has found that when teachers work in teams, they use the textbook as a guide and inspiration for further study. To prepare to offer enriched learning experiences requires time and with more teachers, each will have less work.

Dr. Shedd said that he too is pleased with the results of the first two years. "What makes me happiest is the face that the teachers want to improve. Healthy dissatisfaction that leads to better teaching is good for a school system."

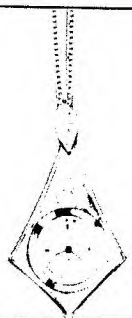

Again this year, there is increased world-wide demand for cultured pearls, unfortunately early reports indicate a scarce harvest in Japan which is our major source of supply. The Australian production of larger cultured pearls is still "spotty" so these are both scarce and expensive in this country. One prominent New York jewelry firm recently offered for sale a five strand necklace of very large Burmese pearls. The price for these was \$150,000 - which certainly indicates the high value placed on good quality cultured pearls today.

Besides the basic pearl strand, every woman should from time to time add to her wardrobe. A matched set of pearl jewelry is sure to be one of the most basic accessories in any woman's jewel case. Two of the most exciting items in terms of design could be the pearl ring and suit pin or brooch.

In rings, the interesting textured baroque or mabe pearls

are especially lovely. The Mabe pearls are formed by inserting a half-bead against the shell of the oyster. When this is coated with a pearly substance called nacre, the pearl is removed, the "shell" then cemented over a round bead of the proper size, and it is ready for mounting. One word of caution—these pearls, or rather the bead portion, may crack if struck on a hard object. Certain care should be used in wearing them, and usually the mounting design is planned to offer the greatest protection to the pearl.



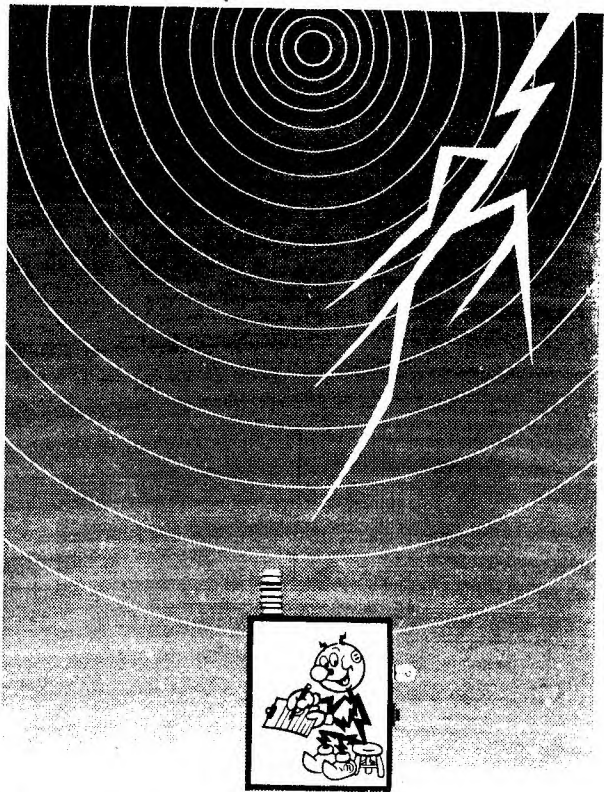

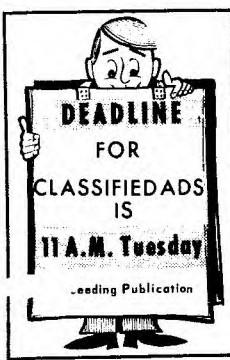

## Hospital Fund Short Of Goal

### Campaign Nears \$300,000 Mark

ENGLEWOOD — Englewood Hospital's "Finish-the-Job" fund campaign is approaching the \$300,000 mark, according to Dudley C. Allen and Harold Mallesardi, co-general chairmen.

"We are hoping that by May 15 the pledges will be considerably higher than that because our building fund is still more than a million short of its goal," they explain.

"We feel it is important to explain that the hospital is not receiving \$500,000 from the will of the late Daniel E. Pomroy as was erroneously reported. The sum will be about \$100,000. We call attention to this fact because some donors have been under the impression that we are receiving the half-million."

Mr. Allen, former Mayor of Leonia and Mr. Mallesardi, former president of Citizens National Bank, report that numerous commerce and industry contributions are being made

including recent gifts from New Jersey Bell Telephone Co, Public Service Corp., Citizens National Bank, Peoples Trust Co, Englewood Savings & Loan, Lipton Tea, Volkswagen of America, Prentice-Hall Inc., Union Ink Co., National Community Bank, Lowe Paper Co., Pfister Chemical Co., and others.

The hospital is in need of additional volunteers. Mrs. Thomas Liebermann, chairman of the volunteer committee, stated that although 541 volunteers gave 4,918 hours of service last month, more workers are required as new areas come into use in the expanded hospital. The Hospitality Shop especially will need many new volunteers.

"The present growth of the hospital has meant that more and more volunteers are needed to help maintain the wonderful care patients receive at Englewood Hospital," Mrs. Liebermann pointed out.

## County Gives Two Hospitals Charity Funds

Quarterly payments of the County's aid to charitable hospitals, including Englewood Hospital and Holy Name Hospital, Teaneck, have been authorized by the Board of Freeholders. This was announced today by Freeholder Bernice Alexander,

chairman of the public health committee.

The payments for the local hospitals are Englewood Hospital, \$20,000, and Holy Name Hospital, \$7,500.

Under the program of aid to voluntary hospitals, the County each year ap-

propriates a sum sufficient to help meet a substantial part of the operating expenses of these voluntary hospitals. The amount each receives is based on the deficit in incurs through free or reduced rates for Bergen County residents unable to pay full rates.

# Assessor Will Apply Common Ratio To New Reassessed Property Value

*(This is the last in a series of articles on property revaluation. Revaluation programs are currently being conducted in Englewood and Tenafly.)*

Long before the next snow flies, the revaluation program for the City of Englewood will have been completed. An appraisal value will have been established for every building and every piece of land. The more than 10,000 property record cards with a photograph of each site, the several narrative industrial reports, the land value maps, the revised tax maps and numerous tabulation sheets all will have been turned over to the office of the city assessor.

The immediate task of the assessor and his staff will be to apply a common ratio to all of the appraisal values.

The next task, and one which will never end, will be the maintaining of the revaluation program.

### NO MAGIC

There is no special magic in revaluation. Its corrective action won't last forever. Property values change, at varying rates and in different sections of the city. New buildings will go up. Old structures will be demolished. Streets and highways and their influences will fluctuate. New zoning will be enacted. Keeping track of the physical changes in a large city like Englewood each year is a major undertaking. A constant stream of permits for new buildings, alterations, demolitions, new streets and for other improvements pours into the assessor's

office and they must be recorded and checked.

Improvement assessments must be computed for each property affected, depending on the benefits received from new sidewalks, new curbing, new paving and new sewer lines. The benefits lost when property is taken for a public project must also be determined.

Normally, there is a steady visitation from taxpayers with questions about their assessments. Generally, their view is that their assessment is too high compared with their neighbors or some similar house down the street. Most of the time this typical protest is unjustified but each one has to be carefully checked to satisfy the taxpayer and this takes much time.

For a while such complaints will be almost nonexistent following the revaluation hearings but as property is bought and sold the new owners may raise fresh questions that must be answered.

In an average year many parcels of land change hands. Each deed transfer has to be checked for exact location of the property by lot and block number which is seldom given on the transfer. Then both parties to the transaction must be contacted to make certain it was a normal sale, and the new information entered on the property record card.

This analysis of each sale must be done also for purposes of the State Tax Division's annual sales ratio study. Any

sale of any property in the state is compared with the assessment against that property to arrive at a ratio of the assessment to the sales price. This is done on a municipal basis and averaged into a sales ratio for each community.

It is this ratio that is used to compute state school aid to a community and, more importantly, to compute the share of county taxes each community will pay.

Therefore, these lists of sales must be combed carefully to eliminate sales involving special conditions that do not reflect willing buyer-willing seller transactions. Unless this is done on all sales in a community, those taxpayers may wind up paying more county taxes and getting less state school aid than they should.

While all these transactings go forward, preparations must be made for defense of taxpayer appeals to the County Tax Board, to the State Board of Tax Appeals and to the courts. This involves a great deal of property value analysis in order to adequately present the town's case.

Perhaps the most thoughtful study in the assessor's office is given to uncovering trends in property values and evaluating them. If such trends were uniform the problem would be relatively simple but they never are.

They can start in a specific area because of some appreciating influence like a new school or because of some depreciating factor like zoning for business in a residential sector.
