## Foes Set For Fall Election

ENGLEWOOD — Giving nominal support to their party leaders, 15 per cent of this City's eligible voters turned out on Tuesday for the Primary election.

### County Fight

A major number of the Republican voters stepped into the booths to help decide County and State contests for there were no local political fights.

The only died-in-the-wool scrap was for the Democratic County Committeeman in the First Ward where Walter Ganz edged John Donnelly 71-24.

Republican leaders here said they were pleased with the G.O.P. turnout as Mayorality candidate Austin Volk led his party with a total of 1313 votes.

Leading the Democratic candidates was Councilman-at-large nominee Robert I. Miller. He garnered 569 X's.

First Ward Republican Council candidate Peter Abel polled 375 votes in his district. His Democratic counterpart E. Cott Johnson received 105 tallies.

In the second Ward, Democrat Shirley Passow received 146 votes while Republican Carmen Hintz received 365.

GOP Councilman-at-Large candidate Savage C. Frieze received 1,293 votes while Democrat Mayorality hopeful John Woods received 569.

### 3 Choices

Come November there will be three candidates for Mayor. Messrs. Volk and Woods and Republican turned Independent Edward Hasse.

Mr. Hasse's name did not appear on the ballot although he did receive Mayorality backing in the form of three Republican votes and two Democratic votes.

## Englewood Republicans Back Jones; Defeat Deamer Ticket By 4-1 Edge

ENGLEWOOD — Giving Walter Henry Jones-supported candidates a sound four-to-one backing, Republican voters of this city rejected attempts of State Senator Pierce H. Deamer, Jr. to gain control of the Bergen County GOP Organization. (See election box on page three.)

This city's GOP followed the county sweep in lending strong support to the Jones ticket. Voters also backed Senator Wayne Dumont, Jr. who edged out Senator Charles W. Sandman, Jr. for the right to carry the Republican gubernatorial banner in November.

Top vote-getter on the Deamerticket was Senator Deamer himself who polled 343 of the votes cast. Assemblyman Peter Moraites, candidate for state senator, led the Jonesmen here with 1,160

tallies as voters rejected a move to unseat former Senator Jones as chairman of the Bergen County Republican Committee.

### Long Brewing

The fight between Senator Deamer and Chairman Jones to be top man in the Bergen County Republican Organization, one of the most powerful GOP groups in the state, began to simmer when former Assemblyman Deamer first was elected to the State Senate in 1961. Mr. Deamer had succeeded Mr. Jones as state senator. The latter had not been a candidate to succeed himself that year when he was a primary candidate for governor, a contest he lost to the late James P. Mitchell, Secretary of Labor in the Eisenhower Administration.

From that point on, there was a quiet undercurrent,

seldom expressed in public, that "Jones is through." As the fight grew hotter news of the unpleasantness began to receive the attention of the press. One large county daily printed a cartoon in which the two rivals were depicted pulling out each other's hair.

### Moraites

Mr. Jones then selected Assemblyman Peter Moraites as the candidate in this year's primary to oppose Senator Deamer.

Probably the biggest personal affront to Chairman Jones by Senator Deamer occurred last September at the annual GOP garden party at Mr. Jones' home in Norwood. For years these events have been regarded as the outstanding County Republican social event of the season.

At the exact date and hour of last year's Jones

garden party Senator Deamer, who resides in Bergenfield, called a meeting of his Bergenfield campaign committee in that Borough. According to a veteran Republican spokesman, the only reason Senator Deamer had for calling the meeting at the time of the annual Jones party was to give the county chairman a political "slap in the face."

With few exceptions, no other Republican of prominence from that Borough was observed at the garden party.

Another Republican observer said: "Walter never will forgive Pierce for this. Just wait and see."

# Police, Chamber Issue Warning To Check Salesmen Credentials

ENGLEWOOD. - Police Captain John J. Madden and Robert E. Beck, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, have issued a warning to local homeowners against certain types of door-to-door salesmen.

Captain Madden said that out-of-town salesmen are required to have a police permit, a Veterans' Administration license or a veterans permit to enable them to sell their wares at the door.

The warning was a result of recent complaints made to the Chamber concerning unsatisfactory transactions with door-to-door sales people.

Captain Madden said that residents should ask the salesman for proper identification if an obvious attempt is being made to demonstrate and then sell a

product. He said that a city ordinance prohibits such sales if the seller does not hold the proper credentials. If the sales persons do not have a permit, police should be called. Conviction carries a fine and/or imprisonment.

Explaining the procedures for obtaining such a permit, Capt. Madden said:

"First the applicant must fill out a form, be photographed and fingerprinted. He is screened by the detective bureau and is checked with the city clerk's office and the FBI. If everything is satisfactory a permit, good for one year, is issued on payment of the statutory fee. Each permit contains a picture of the applicant and must be shown upon request.

"Those holding Veterans Administration licenses,

who want to sell in Englewood, must additionally obtain a daily license from the Police Department".

Mr. Beck joined with Capt. Madden in urging all residents, approached either by telephone or in person, to make sure the salesperson has an Englewood police permit.

## Arnold Silver Reaches Goal: To Be An M.D.

ENGLEWOOD - Arnold Silver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Silver, 253 East Palisade ave., will become a doctor of medicine when he takes the Hippocratic Oath during the June commencement exercises at the University of Louisville, Ky. He then will begin a career as a physician which World War II postponed by 18 years.

Although he always had the ambition and desire to become a physician, family and economic circumstances prevented Mr. Silver from commencing his medical education until he had reached the age of 40.

At the end of World War II Mr. Silver had a responsible position as a textile chemist. Also he had a family to support. He was a plant superintendent and owned a business in Suffern, N. Y., before he enrolled in the University of Louisville medical school in 1961.

Mr. Silver's persistence, which resulted in his medical school matriculation after a lapse of years, also won for him honors at the university. He was awarded two of the medical school's highest honors and a third award offered only to ten medical students in the United States and Canada.

At the university he won a memorial prize for a thesis based on original research in pathology and the award for making more correct diagnoses than any other junior or senior student.

The national award of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists was for the same research project which brought him the U. of L. award.

Mr. Silver, his wife and three children, including a son, Robert, who enters college this fall, live at 2201 Speed ave., Louisville. Mr. Silver will intern at Louisville General Hospital.

## Englewood Cliffs Republicans Go Heavy For Walter Jones Slate

ENGLEWOOD CLIFFS — The Republican slate, sponsored by Republican County Chairman Walter Henry Jones, administered a three-to-one defeat to the so-called anti-Jones ticket, put together by State Senator Pierce H. Deamer, Jr., in Tuesday's primary. High man in the election was Mayor Thomas E. Stagnitti, candidate for the assembly on the Jones ticket and president of the Englewood National Bank & Trust Co., who received 437 votes of approval from his fellow-townsmen as a nominee in the General Election for the lower

house of the State Legislature. Second and third highest vote-getters in the borough were Assembly Speaker Marion West Higgins and Assemblyman Peter Moraites, both candidates for the State Senate on the Jones ticket, who garnered 349 and 338 votes respectively.

Senator Deamer, a candidate to succeed himself on his own ticket, was given 114 votes.

All of the Jones candidates for state senate, assembly, freeholders and state committee members were victorious.

State Senator Wayne Dumont, Jr. received 296 votes for the Republican nomination for governor, against 132 votes given to State Senator Charles W. Sandman, Jr.

On the Democratic side Governor Richard J. Hughes was given 88 votes as a candidate to succeed

himself in the General Election. His opponent, William J. Clark, running as a "Labor Vanguard Democrat" was accorded one lone vote.

The Primary Election was an apathetic affair in the borough. Less than one-quarter of the municipality's 2,707 registered voters cast their ballots. The total primary vote was 533 Republicans and 94 Democrats.

On the municipal level the following were the vote totals:

Republican — For mayor, George Moreng, 410; for borough council, James Greco, 412, and Bernard Shapiro, 385; for tax collector, Mrs. Marjorie Roskamp, 420.

Democratic — For mayor, Dominic Rosselli, 79; for borough council, Daniel Siegel, 71, and Edwin Carter Corriston, 78. No Democratic candidate for tax collector.

## Election Sidelights

Two local figures ran for County and State positions here. Mrs. Mary Louise Rhea was defeated for Republican State Committee Woman by Mrs. Elanore Nissley of Ridgewood. She was outpolled 1112 to 252 in this City alone. Arnold E. Brown, an Englewood attorney, won the nod for a place on the Democratic General Assembly ballot in November.

Not only did Independent Ed Hasse poll three votes for the Republican nomination for Mayor, but two for the Democratic nod as well.

There are 14,304 registered voters here, only 2,215 cast ballots. Absentee ballots were not counted as of press time.

## Library Shows Kennedy Exhibit

ENGLEWOOD — In honor of the late President John F. Kennedy's birthday, the Englewood Library is showing, in its exhibit case, a schoolbook belonging to the late President. The book is a copy of *Cyrano de Bergerac*, so familiar to many high school French

students, and bears the name of the President's older brother "Joe Kennedy" as well as the names of several other owners.

John F. Kennedy added his own name in his boyhood handwriting.

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# Champ Athletes Get Awards From School

At a special assembly last week the Englewood School for Boys honored 168 athletes who have represented the school in interscholastic contests during the current school year in 1 or more sports. Marshall Umpleby, headmaster, presided and

spoke briefly upon the subject of "Winning and Learning." He introduced Carlos L. Henriquez, Jr., director of athletics, who in turn presented the head and assistant coaches of the various sports. The headmaster announced the winners of

athletic trophies to be awarded at Class Nigh exercises on June 8. Winner of the Ward Trophy is Anthony G. Pisani '65, a three-sport participant. The Intermediate Trophy for all-around athletics and scholarship will go to Richard C. Fooshee '68. The Masters Trophy, formerly a Lower School award, is won by Henry L. Bertram '69. The Arthur E. Foote Memorial Cup for Exemplary Conduct on the Field, one of the highest honors in the school, will be engraved with two names for the first time in 19 years. The dual winners are Alexander B. Bierce and Felix E. Demartini, Jr.

JV participants who won letters were 93. In seven sports the Juniors won 23 games out of 34 and were undefeated in soccer, wrestling and track. Varsity boys in one or more sports numbered 75. In nine interscholastic

sports, including the rifle team, they won 53 out of 81 contests. Only the rifle team with a record of 4-0-1 was undefeated. Wrestling had the next best average, winning 8 of 9 contests and fielding two State champions, Joseph Pecoraro for the second time, and Dean Lynch, who was also judged the most outstanding wrestler in the private school Class B tournament.

uable player: football, A. Pisani; soccer, Jack Keating; basketball, Dan Rubin; wrestling, Dean Lynch; track, Greg Carrino; tennis, Bill De Saussure; and baseball, Eddie Arslanian.

Mr. Umpleby congratulated Mr. Henriquez, coach of wrestling and track, and his fellow coaches: Richard Sakala, football; Elmer Ripley, basketball; Karel Lender, soccer and tennis; Richard Overton, baseball; and George Werrenrath, rifle.

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# Englewood Cliffs Has A Problem; 'No Place To Play,' Say Residents

There's no place to play in Englewood Cliffs.

So says Gershen Konikow who reported to the Mayor and Council last week that Englewood Cliffs lagged far behind Tenafly in providing recreational facilities for kids. The Cliffs tennis courts were in a state of disrepair, he pointed out.

Mr. Konikow, president and spokesman for the Englewood Cliffs Homeowners Organization, said that his group had compared Englewood Cliffs facilities with those in Tenafly and found that the Cliffs was doing little or nothing to provide play areas for children.

### Echo Vote

ECHO members voted unanimously to have Mr. Konikow ask the Mayor and Council to take positive steps in the Cliffs. Mr. Konikow read from a prepared statement.

"We strongly urge the Mayor and Council to take immediate constructive and positive steps in developing both the recreation program and the facilities of our town as quickly and as extensively as possible."

...to seek outside professional help in developing a meaningful recreation program from organizations such as the following, which, we understand, is available for the asking at no cost:

The National Recreation Association, 8 West Eighth Street, New York, New York.

The Bureau of Conservation and Economic Development, Trenton, New Jersey.

...to fully cooperate with the Board of Education in the further development of our educational facilities, so that these facilities may be fully utilized for the Recreation needs of Englewood Cliffs in addition to the needs of four schools.

...to hire a full-time professional director of recreation who will develop a proper recreation program and give such a program the direction and leadership so necessary to its success.

### Assist Council

We pledge to the Mayor and Council that we, as citizens of Englewood Cliffs and members of ECHO, will do every thing we can to assist the Mayor, Council and our professional director of recreation in developing the kind of recreation program that our town so badly need. . ."

Councilman Daniel Sie-

gel said that the program has expanded this year - "slowly, but we are trying" - he said. He added that the Council was concentrating on other programs first.

ECHO, which has about 200 members, turned out about fifteen representatives to the meeting to talk about recreation. A canteen room for teenagers instead of a library was proposed, along with renovation of tennis courts, and installation of a public swimming pool.

An ordinance was passed approving the purchase out of capital funds for a 1959

street sweeper. Mayor Thomas Stagnitti said that the city looked clean. One woman resident who has frequently voiced concern over sanitary conditions in the town disagreed with the Mayor.

"Just two weeks ago," she said, "the sweeper went through, but he didn't put the broom down. He said, 'Look, Mrs. Tarris,'

He showed it to me. He just came to show it to me," she said.

Leon Keyserling, nationally prominent economist who served as chairman of President Truman's Council of Economic Advisors.

The luncheon will be held Thursday, June 10, at 12:30 p.m. at The Steak Pit, Route 4, Paramus. Former Con-

gressman Frank C. Osmers will be luncheon chairman.

Jules Bressler, area's Israel Bond Chairman for Bank Purchases, announced that Dr. Keyserling will talk informally and answer questions on the outlook for the American economy, and on economic developments in the State of Israel as they relate to Americans.

Key Jewish communal leaders from Teaneck, Englewood, Tenafly and Englewood Cliffs also have been invited to meet and hear Dr. Keyserling.

Dr. Keyserling was chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors to the President of the United States for three years, from 1950 until his resignation in January 1953. He previously had served as vice chairman of the council from 1946 to 1950.


## DMHS Class of 1950 Sets June 26 Reunion

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# 'Library Progress Being Made,' Acting Mayor Informs Trustees

ENGLEWOOD — Expressing his satisfaction with the progress being made in expansion plans for the Public Library, Acting Mayor O. Carlyle McCandless met with the Library Board of Trustees for the first time since assuming his new position last week.

**Intensive Work**  
 "For those who continue to ask what is being done about expanding and improving our library facilities," said Mr. McCandless, "I would like to state simply that intensive work is being carried out and very real progress is being made. The Library Board has every intention of achieving the goal set by the late Mayor Ticknor on January 1 of this year — to provide for the City improved and expanded library facilities by the end of 1966.

"I cannot go into greater detail at this time," he continued, "Most people know that it is the hope and belief of this Board that we have in the Franklin School an ideal site and building for an outstanding library. The Board has been actively pursuing this

idea with its architectural, engineering and library consultant."

He said, "They are giving the most careful consideration to the feasibility of the use of the Franklin School building both from the structural point of view and from the point of view of library organization. Very real progress is being made and when plans are more definitive specific announcements will be made and contracts will be let to carry out the necessary work," he added.

**Spare Time**  
 "To those who are impatient and who feel that things move too slowly I would like to point out that members of the Library Board, and the members of the governing body must work on matters of this type in what is erroneously referred to as their spare

time," the acting Mayor said.

"I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to these men, and to the men on other boards and commissions, who are giving so unselfishly of their time and ability in service to all of us. Their contribution to the life of our City is a great one and I thank them for it," he ended.

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Maybe a silver executive shoehorn, or a memo holder, or a stop light jigger (green for one shot, yellow for two, and red for three) are more in keeping with what the men would like this year.

## A Disturbing Voice

The political semi-finals are over and the final against the real competition is set for November.

In Englewood, the Republican regulars will have their hands full of Democrats and Ed Hasse. A tough combination, but one which must be defeated.

In endorsing the Republican ticket, this city should be grateful that a man of proven talents, Austin Volk, has decided to throw his hat into the ring. He is heading the GOP ticket as candidate for mayor and his running mates are incumbent Councilman Savage C. Frieze along with Carmen Hintz and Peter Abel.

But in this strange pending election, not only does the GOP have to defeat the Democrats, but Mr. Volk must also pile up enough votes to counteract those he may lose to the Hasse supporters. A Republican victory is truly threatened by Mr. Hasse.

Ed Hasse is a good citizen, one who has many friends. He is, of course, practicing democracy in action by running for mayor. The disturbing elements are his timing and the form of his candidacy.

As a registered Republican he could have created a primary election in which party support would have swung to him or to Mr. Volk, resulting in a solid, party-backed candidate.

But in exercising his right to run independently, he has placed an extra and unwarranted strain on the local Republican party at a time it needs such a situation like a political hole in the head.

The outcome of this election to Englewood voters, no matter the party affiliation, can be the most important in years.

It should be quite obvious to one and all that history of the recent past in city hall cannot continue. We cannot have anymore contested tie-breaking votes and we cannot afford to have a city council bogged down in political arguments from either party.

The real problems in Englewood - urban renewal, parking and traffic flow - improvements for local businesses, etc., - must be discussed and solved in an air of cooperation, not in a vacuum of party linesmanship. The taxpayers deserve the best and are entitled to it.

In the coming election, we feel that the party with the most experience in government, headed by a man with a proven record, must get the voters' support. And this party must have enough votes to operate the city government effectively. The opposition should be critical, observant and a watchdog, but it should not hamper just because it is another party.

Lets act like residents of the same town, argue if we must, but not behave like two countries at war.

## Good Show

If experience is the best teacher, the students at Dwight Morrow High School most certainly will be the best taught students of politics in the history of the school.

Last week, the industrious pupils held a mock political convention to elect Student Organization officers. They modeled their program after actual party conventions - complete with keynote speaker and seconding addresses.

After the political ballyhoo, voting was done in bona-fide county voting booths. As a tribute to the unique performance, the heaviest Student Organization vote in the history of the school was realized.

In 1945 and 1946 he went into the Air Force. His MOS was 055, a non-clerk typist. He was a Supply Sergeant, attached to the 24th infantry regiment in the South Pacific. As part of an occupation troop, Reid

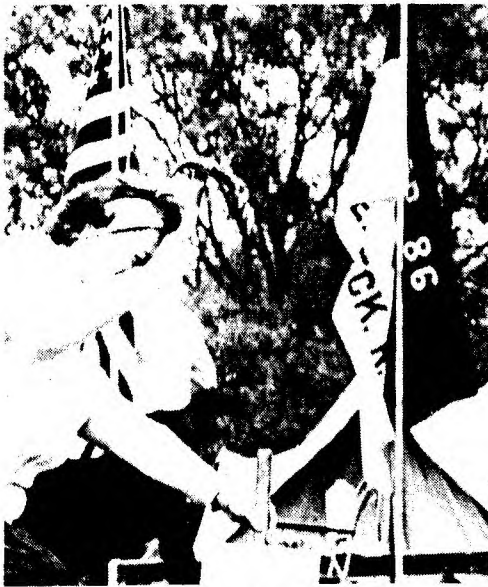
went to Okinawa, Saipan, and Manila.

And last but not least, don't allow anyone with nose, throat or ear infections, or even a slight cold, into the water. For people whose friends

own pools, the Sylvan consultant has some simple rules of etiquette.

Don't every "just drop in." Wait till you're invited and when you are, don't overstay your welcome. And don't ever send your children alone, unless you are specifically invited to do so.

Bring your own towels and a six-pack of soda. Change at home, if possible, unless a cabana is available. Stay out of the house, except to use the bathroom, and then only when you have dried yourself off.

Don't smoke near the pool area so that cigarette butts don't wind up in the pool.

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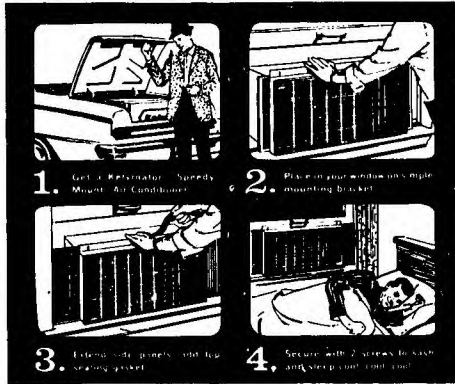

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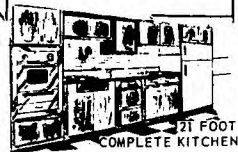

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# Facilities Expand, So Hospital Seeking Additional Volunteers

ENGLEWOOD - There's a call out for additional volunteers at Englewood Hospital.

"The present growth of the Hospital has meant that more and more Volunteers are needed to help maintain the wonderful care patients receive at Englewood Hospital," Mrs. Liebermann points out.

She said the recruitment of juniors looks encouraging. About 100 of them, from schools up and down the Northern Valley - public, private, parochial - sent them to an orientation program here on May 8. They learned a great deal - their obligation to the Hospital, the type of duties that can be performed. It looks as though the supply of those invaluable juniors is assured.

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## Conn. College Club Makes \$600 Gift

At their annual dinner meeting Thursday evening, May 27, the Connecticut College Club of Bergen County voted to send an unrestricted gift of \$600 to the College Scholarship Fund. The members, gathered at the home of Mrs. Harry Howard, 150 Werimus Lane, Hillsdale, heard Miss Warrine Eastburn, assistant to the president and dean of administration of the college, guest speaker, describe "Connecticut College To-day."

Listing among distinctive marks of progress on campus, Miss Eastburn mentioned next year's addition of Chinese to the language curriculum, thereby making the college

one of the few U. S. women's institutions to offer the course to undergraduates. The plan represents part of the increased emphasis on East Asian studies at Connecticut.

Of the 1440 students now enrolled, 197 seniors represent the largest class ever to graduate from the college, and 32 are men graduate students in the "College for Men" program.

Connecticut is unique, Miss Eastburn said, in its policy of giving undergraduates the benefit of many full professors, instead of waiting until the junior and senior years. There is an increasing number of accelerating students, she

added, who graduate in three years, and the Honors Program includes girls who are already doing a high level of adult research in areas such as skin grafts, and communication between animals.

The college summer program, the speaker reported, will make full use of the school facilities. The School of the Dance will open its 18th year on July 6, with Jose Limon, Martha Graham and Lucius Hoving again among its faculty of 30. A new three-year program in the humanities is planned for 40 Connecticut high school girls from disadvantaged environments, financed by a Rockefeller grant.

## Mayors Are Urging Water Conservation

Once again this year we are faced with a serious water shortage problem. The watershed areas and reservoirs servicing our part of the country have been seriously depleted as a result of the sustained drought.

In an effort to urge water conservation, Mayors of many municipalities have urged that the following steps be taken:

1. Use water sparingly.
2. Repair leaky faucets, pipes and joints.
3. Do not use water for lawn sprinkling or car washing.
4. Do not flush toilets to dispose of cigarette butts, ashes, etc.
5. Do not wash dishes under an open faucet; use a pan or sink stopper.
6. Do not use washing machine to launder a few garments; wait for a full load.
7. Do not use dishwasher to do a few dishes, wash by hand or wait for a full load.
8. Do not leave faucets or showers open when not in use.
9. For shaving, use sink stopper rather than let water run.
10. Keep a bottle of water in the refrigerator instead of letting water run.
11. Do not fill swimming pools from public water supplies.
12. Restaurants and eating places should not serve water unless specifically requested.

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# A Rose By Any Other Name Isn't To Hobbyists Mr., Mrs. Lissemore

Mr. and Mrs. Jack D. Lissemore of Tenafly are rose bugs. They love them. They grow them. And they study them.

Roses began as a hobby for the Lissemores, but are now a sweet way of looking at life.

They have participated and been officers in the American Rose Society and the American Rose Foundation. They have written articles on roses and cheerfully responded to many calls for talks on roses.

## ROSARIAN

Mr. Lissemore is the consulting Rosarian for the Society. He says that, like a medical specialist, his consultations are on serious problems of rose growing and breeding, and he only wishes that he might be called upon more often to witness the great achievements of rose growers.

In addition to cultivating a rose garden in their own backyard, the Lissemores have also cultivated a huge library - over 300 volumes - on roses - some professionally bound with rose-printed fabric.

The "Rose Room" of their home contains files, books, numerous trophies, and a fine collection of American Rose Society Annuals from 1910 to the present. An entire wall is adorned with prints by Pierre Joseph Redote, a botanical artist who was inspired by the roses in the garden of the Empress Josephine. She spurred on rose cultivators by collecting species from all over the world. Seeds and plants from foreign ports were brought to her gardens by merchant captains. Mrs.

Mrs. Lissemore was chairman of the Garden Department of the Woman's Club of Tenafly in 1957 and was elected a trustee of the American Rose Foundation.

## SECRECY

She and her husband feel that rose breeding is still not practiced as a science. Each hybridist seems to surround his work in an aura of secrecy, rather than sharing the wealth of information with fellow hybridists.

Their most cherished desire is that the program pursued by the Foundation be supported adequately enough to provide extensive research fellowships on rose culture; to uncover methods of controlling insects on roses - perhaps by applying to the soil a chemical which would remain active for months; to find nutritional elements for rose plants so slowly released that one feeding a year would be sufficient; and to know how to preserve choicest blooms in perfect condition through a long ride to a distant show.

## SHOW SUNDAY

At this time they are expending all their energies on preparations for the Fifth Annual Rose Show of

the Garden State Rose Club which will be held this Sunday at the Garden State Plaza Auditorium in Paramus. As charter members of the Society, which is an affiliate of the American Rose Society and the National Rose Society of Great Britain, they work diligently on this exhibition. They are the donors of a perpetual trophy and they usually

bring home many new awards for their own entries.

The Lissemores open their garden to the public each year and bring to mind the Greek and early Roman concept of philanthropy which consisted of kindly acts "toward people" rather than any connection with poverty. One of its earliest expressions is in Homer's lines:

And greatly was he loved, for courteously  
He welcomed to his house beside the way  
All comers.

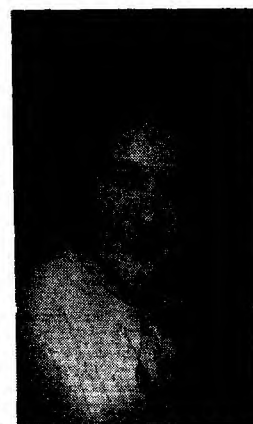
