A Year Ago Today

One year ago this week, East Millstone was still in an uproar regarding its Board of Commissioner dispute. The recently-elected board was disqualified by the incumbent commissioners on the grounds that its members were not property holders as required. At the second meeting for qualifying and installing commissioners, held in the schoolhouse, neither side would compromise and shouts were banded back and forth across the room.

After the regular meeting had been adjourned since no agreement could be reached, the disqualified board held a meeting of its own with strong citizen backing and, with Richard Reilly as chairman, decided to take the issue to court.

Commissioner Harry T. Hough, would found himself directly in the middle of the squabble, being a member of both the elected board and the incumbent board which refused to surrender the town records until a properly qualified board was installed, resigned his position in an open letter to the RECORD in which he termed his position "untenable."

In Griggstown, Fire Chief Edward Tornquist announced the installation of a push-button alarm system in his home. He said that the new system would save precious minutes in sounding an alarm, especially a night one, since he would not have to travel blocks to his store to set it off, but could instead merely push a button.

Police Chief Edwin Voorhees, in his monthly police report, warned that the motor vehicle laws are made for all and said that the sooner drivers realized this, the better. The month was a quiet one although nine arrests were made, eight for motor vehicle violations.

Water was supplied to the Veterans Cooperative project when the Township Committee signed a contract with the city of New Brunswick whereby the city would supply water at the rate of \$180 per million gallons for a period of five years.

The committee also decided to approve the application of the World of Mirth Shows to appear at the East Franklin Township showgrounds May 12 to 17, but rejected a similar application from the Ringling Bros. Circus for the same dates. The committee explained its action on the grounds that the fire companies, the Community and East Franklin Volunteer companies, would receive benefit from the World of Mirth presentation, but that in the case of the circus, the committee could not approve its application since it was committed to the residents of the West New Brunswick area not to permit more than one show a year to "protect peace and quiet."

Joseph Staudt was named township recreation director for the summer and said that he would designate certain playgrounds and school grounds for the construction of baseball diamonds.

In Franklin Park, a Juvenile Grange was organized and officers were installed at the regular meeting of the Somerset Grange No. 7. Milton McCarty was named Master of the new organization in a colorful and impressive ceremony.

Garbage District Plan Authorized

Jealousy Called Murder Motive

Authorities investigating the murder of Andrew May, Manville resident who was found dead in his car last Saturday following a brawl with two negroes in front of the Black Diamond Bar on Franklin Blvd., believe jealousy to have been the motive for the crime, it was announced earlier this week.

Clifford Turner and Ivory Turner, 21 year-old cousins and both residents of this township, are being held on murder charges without bail in Somerville and Mary Winkey of Fomderne, May's negro companion on the night of the crime, is being held on \$10,000 bail as a material witness.

One of the Turners is said to be a former boy friend of the Winkey woman and police authorities believe that jealousy promoted the fight which resulted in May's death.

Anderson Fowler of Wilson Ave., a friend of Miss Winkey to whom she took May for treatment following the fracas, was released Tuesday on his own cognizance after also being detained as a material witness. Still another witness is being sought by police for information regarding the murder.

May's death, according to County Physician Edgar Flint, was caused by a cerebral hemorrhage. The victim also suffered a fractured rib and other injuries.

Heading the investigation are Cpl. Hugo Stockburger and Trooper John Genz of the New Brunswick State Police barracks who are working with detectives from the county prosecutor's office in Somerville.

Motor To South For Graduation

The ceremonies included a dedication service Friday night for the 45 graduates, class night Saturday, in which Miss McDermott sang "My Prayer," and the commencement yesterday morning. The group also visited the Endless Caverns, near New Market.

The Franklin Township Committee adopted a resolution calling for the establishment of a garbage collection district which will serve approximately 850 homes in the eastern end of the township at a meeting in Township Hall, Middlebush, last night.

The newly-created district will include the area from the New Brunswick city boundary line on Somerset St. to Voorhees Station, across Hamilton St., along Girard Ave., across Easton Ave. to the canal, and southerly along the canal to Somerset St.

The committee could not reach an agreement as to whether the contract for the service should be given to a private contractor or be given to the township road department. It was decided to receive bids on the work and award the contract at the next committee meeting.

Immediately after adoption of the ordinance, Vendel J. Horvath asked whether property holders throughout the entire township would be taxed for the garbage service or whether the assessment would go only to those property holders who reside in the collection area. He was told that only property holders within the district would be assessed.

Horvath also remarked on the poor condition of Willow Ave. Township road department chairman Joseph Staudt replied that the road will be repaired shortly.

Raymond C. Wilson, township engineer, informed the committee that there is a possibility of obtaining road maintenance funds from the county under the Herrick Road Act. The committee immediately moved to seek \$800 from the county for the maintenance of Hoagland Rd., if the funds are available.

Wilson also reported that he expects to have plans for the improvement of Cedar Grove Rd. completed and available at the time of the next meeting. State aid has been received for the work.

Russell E. Watson, Jr., committee chairman, said that private telephone lines will probably be installed soon to serve business telephones in Middlebush and said he believed that a private wire will be installed in the township hall.

He suggested a resolution asking the telephone company to apply the 100 per cent municipal discount allowed to a telephone in the township hall and the resolution was adopted. Previously, the discount was allowed on the telephone in the township poor farm before the farm was sold.

The committee was forced to adopt an emergency resolution providing for an appropriation of \$2,000 for relief since expected state aid on the emergency relief program has not arrived. Watson explained that no state aid has been received for the latter part of 1947 or for this year and said that there were 16 township persons receiving relief aid under the program.

Tax Collector and committee treasurer Alice J. Hageman reported that \$29,702.25, including \$19,054.48 in 1948 taxes, was collected during April and reported a balance on hand of \$122,825.28.

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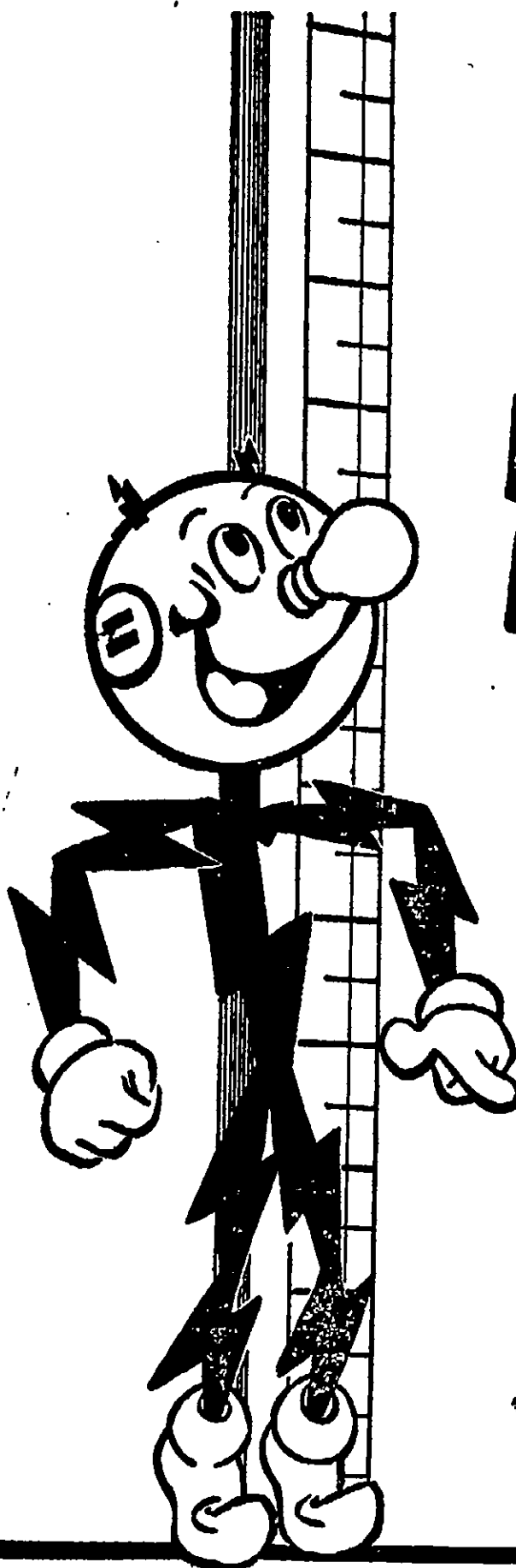
