

11 Land Parcels Sold by Township

Eleven parcels of township-owned property were sold last week by the Franklin Township Committee at a meeting in the township hall, Middlebush. A total of \$3,050 was realized from the sales.

After the land sale, Ralph O. Thompson of Middlebush, member of the Board of Education, asked the committee what its plans were for a summer recreation program. Committeeman Joseph A. Staudt, who has been a leader in the recreation program which resulted in the formation of a Youth Guidance Council last year, said that Franklin Township is one of the few municipalities in the whole state which provides funds for an organized youth council.

Staudt informed Thompson that the council has purchased equipment for baseball and other games, but explained that the program cannot be hurried; instead, it must be allowed to progress slowly until it catches on with the public. Plans have been formulated for the eventual establishment of playgrounds and softball diamonds throughout the township, but the council has not yet been able to set up an effective plan for summer recreation involving girls, he said.

Staudt added that, while considerable advancement has been made, the program is essentially a project for the P.T.A.'s and not the youth council. He indicated that their cooperation will be asked in the near future.

Committee chairman Russell E. Watson Jr. said that a lack of interest in the program has recently been shown by parents. He disclosed that the first recreation meeting was attended by 50 or more persons, but that the response to later meetings has been considerably less. At the time of the first meeting, he said, those parents present were asked to submit suggestions and return to later meetings, but, since then, no suggestions have been received and attendance at the meetings has been practically nil.

After the discussion, the committee appointed Henderson Briggs as an employee of the road department.

Dog Lover Hits Parked Car, Tree

Frank DeAngelis Jr. of 31 New York Ave., New Brunswick, is today wondering whether the humanitarian rule, "Be Kind to Animals," is really what it's cracked up to be. His faith was shattered abruptly last Sunday afternoon when he swerved his car to avoid hitting a large collie dog which darted in front of him and succeeded only in hitting a parked car and then wrapping himself around a pole.

The reformed dog lover was taken to St. Peter's Hospital by a passing motorist and was discharged later after having been treated for a cut below the right knee, requiring three stitches, and a cut below the right eye.

The accident occurred on Easton Ave. near Charnor Lodge, at 2 p. m. when, according to township policeman Joseph Lupo, a collie dog suddenly darted in front of DeAngelis' car and he swerved sharply to avoid hitting him. He did not succeed, but instead, hit a parked car and then crossed to the left side of the road, coming to a stop against a pole. The dog was killed and the pole split in half.

The parker car, owned by William J. Charnay of Plainfield and driven by William Glomer of Plainfield, was damaged on the left rear fender, tire, and bumper. It was unoccupied at the time of the accident.

The front end of DeAngelis' car was demolished. No complaints were lodged.

Committee Unable To Help Veterans

Courts Lenient With P. A. Youth

Twenty-one-year-old Edward Laskowsky of Perth Amboy, picked up by police in January after stealing a taxi from George Chery of Rahway, was given another chance Tuesday when the Somerset County Court of Quarter Sessions gave him a suspended sentence. The theft occurred here Jan. 12.

After pleading guilty to six indictments, including two charges of larceny of a motor vehicle, carrying concealed weapons, grand larceny, robbery, and kidnaping, Laskowsky, who will celebrate his 21st birthday Saturday, received a suspended Bordentown Reformatory sentence and probation for five years to run concurrently with the probation period now being served in another county.

Prosecutor T. Girard Wharton disclosed that the youth was one of three men indicted for the above offenses and said that he was given another chance because investigation here and reports from Annandale were favorable, and indicated that the boy had been incorrectly influenced by the older men with prison records he was allowed to run free with.

The two others who were indicted with Laskowsky are John Yagher, alias John Yeagher of New Brunswick and John Hergedus of Perth Amboy. Both are now serving prison sentences for convictions in other counties.

The other offenses, other than the taxi theft here, occurred in South Bound Brook Jan. 17. The defendant was charged with stealing a watch, pencil, and money from William Effinger, a taxi driver, after stealing his cab and kidnaping him, while carrying concealed weapons.

Arraigned by Assistant Prosecutor Leon Gerofsky, the youth was represented by Henry M. Spritzer of Perth Amboy.

Fighting desperately to forestall eviction and perhaps regain some part of their original investment, 18 veteran-stockholders in the bankrupt Veterans Building Cooperative, which is now in receivership, last night asked the Franklin Township Committee for aid in their fight, but were informed by the committee that "we are absolutely licked, there is nothing that . . . we can do."

Explaining that township ordinances and statutes limit the committee's duties, Russell E. Watson, Jr., committee chairman, told the veterans that the Township Committee has spent "unbold hours" going over the project in the last two weeks, but has been informed by its legal counsel that the township statutes allowed no legal action because the matter is, unfortunately, "one between debtor and creditor." He added that the committee cannot loan money to the veterans, cannot buy the land in question, and cannot exercise control over the courts.

Following his explanation of the difficulties involved, Watson advised the veterans to appeal directly to Washington and seek an investigation of the project by Federal agencies. The committee then drafted telegrams to be sent to Senators Albert W. Hawkes and H. Alexander Smith and Congressman Charles A. Eaton asking for their help in launching an investigation.

Telegrams Ask Aid

The telegrams read as follows: "Thirty-two married Veterans renting homes from their corporation, Veterans Building Cooperative, Franklin Township, Somerset County, N. J., face serious difficulties of foreclosure of their holdings and loss of housing facilities. They have appealed to us to urge our Washington representatives to enable Federal Housing Authority investigation as to use of \$254,000 mortgage held by Bowery Savings Bank of New York and \$210,000 mortgage held by Mortgage Corporation of New Jersey. Foreclosure sale held Tuesday, May 25, subject to court confirmation June 8. Time is of the essence. Please advise of any help you may be able to give."

Jacob D. Deutsche, a resident in the project, acted as spokesman for the group and told the committee that the veterans are "desperate".

"The homes in the project are dog shacks", he said, "and have a chicken office in front. There used to be a sign in front, Badolato Construction, and the last sign was a notice of an auction in Trenton, but even that has been knocked down."

"There is water in the cellars when the sun shines and when it rains, the water comes in through the roofs, walls and doors," he continued.

Vets Want To Continue

He added that the houses with three bed-rooms were costing their occupants \$61.50 per month in rent, this after each had already invested a total of \$1,085 in the project. He said that the veterans, while they were definitely not satisfied with their homes, nevertheless wished to continue

Mrs. Robert Smith has been named chairman of the affair. The proceeds will be placed in the motion picture equipment fund of the Sunday School.

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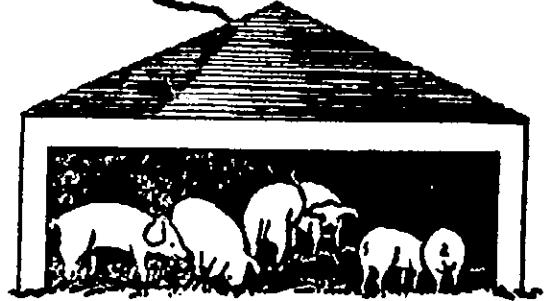

"even with all the trouble we have had in those miserable shacks."

However, Deutsche explained, the veterans can not afford to pay the high price now being asked for the homes and, besides, they are without funds to seek legal advice or to investigate the possibility of fraud in the case. He then asked whether the township could help, saying that he understood it had an attorney and a building inspector.

After Watson had replied that the township's duties were legally limited, John Waselne, another of the stockholders, asked the committee chairman whether or not the township building inspector had inspected the buildings in question.

Watson answered in the affirmative, but said that the building inspector had reported no violation of the building code. Asked why, Watson explained that the inspector, according to the township zoning law, issues a building permit after plans and specifications of the proposed buildings have been properly filed.

Zoning Law Weak

"The only thing the inspector can do is to determine that the houses are built and placed on lots according to the plans and specifications," Watson said. As to limiting the construction and type of design, Watson said that the zoning ordinance is "absolutely lacking".

Deutsche told the committee that the veterans intend to fight the sale in Trenton, June 8, and will return to the committee after that date.

Earlier in the week, over twenty of the occupants of the project's 32 completed homes traveled to Trenton to protest against the proposed auction of their homes and to ask questions pertaining to the complicated financial affairs of the project, but were informed by Daniel G. Kasen of Newark, who was named receiver for the project last December, that the hearing was solely for the purpose of accepting bids for the projects and that any objections to the sale must be given before Vice Chancellor Wilfred H. Jayne in the Court of Chancery June 8.

Kasen silenced several queries put forward by the veterans but listened to a plea by James A. McKenna, former Veterans Administration representative in the New Brunswick area, who represented a small group of the veteran-stockholders. McKenna told the court that his clients are seeking certain information regarding the cooperative's management and the manner in which the \$150,000 invested by the original 200 stockholders was spent.

Ask Fraud Possibility

"We are wondering whether there is any cause for complaint against the management of the cooperative," he said. "We want to know whether we got a square deal, whether the promoters of the project merely used bad judgment, or whether the bad judgment was accompanied by squandering of the cooperative's financial assets".

"The whole matter should be brought out into the open", he added. "These boys needed a home badly and now it appears that they have been taken. Perhaps something should be done about it."

Kasen replied that the books of the project and the minutes of the various director's meetings are now in his possession and can be examined by any interested party or parties, but said that the general affairs of the project could not be discussed at that time since the only purpose of the hearing was to accept bids which will be accepted or rejected June 8. He added that he, personally has been conducting an investigation and that his findings will be presented to the veterans through the court.

One Bid Submitted

Only one bid for the whole property was submitted at the hearing, that one by Joseph Schur, Linden plumbing and heating contractor, who bid \$23,000 for the property and partially completed homes and \$900 for each of the completed dwellings; a total bid of approximately \$51,000. Schur, one of the creditors in the deal, deposited a certified check for \$7,500 to cover his bid.

Schur, through his attorney, Irving V. Schwartz of Linden, informed the veterans that, if his bid is accepted June 8, the veter-

ans will be allowed to purchase their homes under the same conditions laid down by the receiver at present. Under this set-up, the veterans would have to pay off the existing F. H. A. mortgage on their home and an additional amount above, making a total obligation of between \$8,000 and \$9,000, if they wished to purchase the homes in which they are now living and which were described by Deutsche as "dog shacks".

Only one veteran, Dean Keisey of 18 Whitties Ave., one of the original directors of the project, submitted a bid for his home, in accordance with the receiver's instructions, and accompanied his bid with a certified check for \$250.

In the event that Schur's bid is accepted, Schwartz said that the purchase price asked for the dwellings will assure landscaping, grading, and other finish work to be done.

The veterans complained loudly that they had not been given sufficient time to act by Kasen. His notice of the auction and possible eviction was not received until last Wednesday and it demanded that all bids be submitted to his office by Friday, only two days later. Many said that they now did not wish to purchase the homes under any conditions because of the shape they were in from lying unprotected during the winter, but wanted to insure their occupancy until they can find other homes. They wish to remain under the present rent conditions without being asked to contribute any more money, since most have already been deprived of the bulk of their savings.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the means of financing the collection of garbage and the making of a contract, therefor, and making the necessary appropriations for such purposes.

WHEREAS the township of Franklin has heretofore laid out and established garbage collection district No. 1, whereas no appropriation has been made therefor.

Be it ordained by the township committee, of the township of Franklin, in the county of Somerset:

1. That the township committee be authorized to enter into a suitable contract for the collection and disposal of garbage in said garbage collection district No. 1.

2. The sum of \$6,000 is hereby appropriated for such purpose.

3. In order to meet said appropriation and to temporarily finance the collection of said garbage, temporary notes of the township of Franklin shall be issued, pursuant to an act of the legislature of the state of New Jersey. Said note shall be issued in the principal amount of not exceeding \$6,000, and shall mature in not more than two years after the purpose for which they are issued has been carried out, and shall bear interest not exceeding six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually. Said notes shall recite that they are issued for the purpose of temporary financing of the contract for the collection of garbage in said garbage district No. 1. The other matters in respect to the issue of said notes shall be determined by subsequent resolutions.

4. The notes issued hereunder shall be signed by the chairman of the township committee and the township treasurer and the seal of the township shall be affixed thereto, attested by the township clerk.

5. There shall be raised within the limits of such garbage collection district money to provide for the payment of the cost of removing and disposing of the garbage from such district. The sum to be raised shall be levied and collected at the same time and in the same manner as other township taxes. The collector shall pay the same to the township treasurer, to be used and applied only to the purpose for which it is raised.

6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance or any part of it hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage as provided by law.

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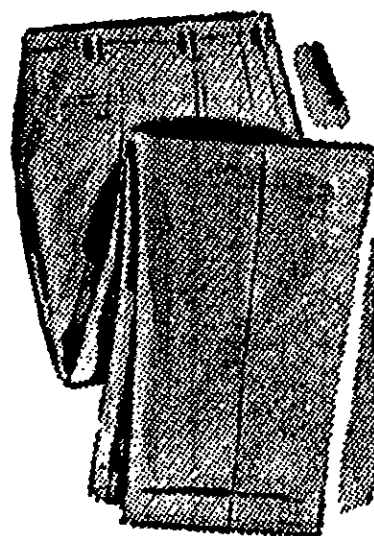
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
