One thing that saddened us was a little occurrence in our home town, East Millstone . . . In most towns, Memorial Day is a solemn occasion . . . It's the day when we remember and honor those who died for us on the battlefield . . . Therefore, most towns conducted services . . . but not East Millstone.

As the day dawned over East Millstone, anyone who cared to look found that the town honor roll, inscribed with the names of those who fought . . . And those who died . . . was surrounded by a clump of knee-deep weeds . . . Situated in the most traveled sector of the village, the honor roll site could only be described as a mess . . . And so, while others conducted services and held parades as a symbol of their remembrance, East Millstoners calmly passed their weed-covered honor roll site.

Why? Well, we don't know . . . There's really not much that can be said . . . The owners of the site, people who claim to have a great "interest" in the town, certainly did nothing to clean up the site although they employ many men for whom it would have been a half-hour job . . . The Board of Commissioners likewise did nothing, although the job was most naturally theirs.

True, the grass at the spot is now cut down . . . But this did not happen until after Memorial Day had passed . . . And then, it had to be done by the local Boy Scout Troop . . . We certainly feel ashamed about the affair . . . The Board of Commissioners should not be so neglectful again . . . They should either tear down the honor roll and forget about it altogether or, for God's sake, keep it cleaned up! . . . We know of one Gold Star family that was very shocked and angered . . . And so were we.

We see that the Hamilton Street veterans are still fighting to save their homes . . . But it looks from here like a losing fight . . . There seems to be no hope whatsoever of the boys ever regaining any of their investment . . . There is not much that can be done for them unless the federal government steps in and it is improbable that that will happen . . . The vets apparently made a big mistake and that's all that there is to it.

But if you can't correct mistakes, you can at least learn from them . . . The vets have certainly learned to be more careful with their investments . . . And Franklin Township likewise has learned, or certainly should have learned, that its building code is "absolutely lacking" as Township Committee chairman Russell E. Watson, Jr. so aptly said last week.

The houses on the cooperative are surely nothing to brag about. A spokesman for the veterans has called them "dog shacks", a term that describes them well . . . But they would not have been erected in many other communities because the building codes these clearly stipulate how, and out of what, houses may be constructed . . . Our's does not.

The advantages of a strict building code are too obvious to mention . . . It should be sufficient to say that, if you were building a home, you certainly wouldn't want someone to come along and construct a house like one of those in the cooperative right next to yours . . . Therefore, we suggest—and we're not original in this because it has been suggested by many others—that the township promptly frame another building code . . . Another fiasco such as the veterans affair should not be repeated, even on a smaller scale.

Outlook Still Dark For Hamilton Vets

After a lengthy two and one-half hour meeting last evening, during which a partial audit was presented and a former project official attempted to "pass the buck," the veteran-stockholders in the Veterans Building Cooperative Inc. were no better off than before—they were told that they had absolutely no chance of ever reclaiming any of their \$150,000 investment.

Convening at the Veterans Center, Carroll Place, New Brunswick, where they were called by Daniel G. Kasen, receiver for the ill-fated project appointed last December by Vice Chancellor Wilfred H. Jayne, the veterans unleashed all of their pent-up fury in the form of recriminations and charges hurled at Kasen and Jack Gushin, former \$125 per week manager of the project's board of directors.

At the close of the meeting, spokesmen for the vets announced that the group will still go to Trenton next Tuesday to try and stop the proposed sale of the property before the Vice-Chancellor as they had planned last week.

One Bid Made

At a public auction last Tuesday, Joseph Schur, Linden plumbing contractor, bid approximately \$51,000 for the property. His bid will either be approved or denied June 8. Although Schur has announced that he will permit the present occupants of the project's 32 completed homes to buy their dwellings, the veterans last night seemingly doubted his word and expressed a fear that they will be evicted immediately if the sale is approved.

When some of the stockholders queried Kosen on the possibility of regaining some part of their investment, he told them that such a thing would be almost impossible. To explain his view, he submitted a report of the audit made thus far.

Read by a member of the Newark auditing firm of Pogash and Co., the audit showed the total cost of the housing project to have been \$777,283.83 when the coop-

erative was placed into receivership in December. Included in this figure are the cost of 32 completed houses, 29 partially completed homes, the 54 acre tract upon which the project is situated, the various sewers and roads, and the many sub-contracts. Also included is a total of \$159,508.89 for "overhead or administrative expense."

\$152,000 Invested

The total invested by the project's 200 stockholders was \$152,000 at \$10 a share.

Two mortgages are held on the cooperative, one by the Bowery Savings Bank of New York and protected by the F.H.A., and the other by the Mortgage Corp. of New Jersey, a Newark firm. The former, on the 32 completed dwellings, is for \$253,472, and the latter, on the remainder of the property, is for \$214,028.

According to the audit, the administrative expenses include such items as \$19,100 for the general builder, \$21,456 for the civil engineer, \$10,488 for legal fees, \$2,773 for miscellaneous administrative expenses, \$2936 for book-keeping salary and expense, \$4,034 for real estate taxes, \$7,937 for insurance, and \$20,274 for interest on loans and mortgages.

Building Costs High

The prefabricated houses, as delivered to the site, cost a total of \$235,558; cellar and chimney construction amounted to \$48,966; erection of the houses cost \$34,004; railroad and trucking charges totaled \$17,507.

Outside work such as plumbing, painting, sewers, electrical work, etc., done by sub-contractors, cost \$211,982. The sewers alone totaled \$108,516.

Building equipment, including bulldozers, trucks, and steam shovels, amounted to \$21,882.54, but most of the equipment was resold several months later at a loss of \$5,195. Largest item in the loss was a steam shovel which originally cost the cooperative \$10,230.71 on June 17, 1945, and was sold six months later for \$5,200, a loss of \$5,030.71.

After the figures had been read, Kasen again contended that the vets had little hope of regaining their money, but said they had every right to go to Trenton in order to oppose the sale. He told the stockholders that his work, as receiver, will continue even after the project has been sold.

The receiver, he said, is bound by law to complete a full investigation and recover any of the project's assets that he can. His investigation, if the facts so warrant, may be used as the basis for either civil or criminal suite and, if fraud is detected, the facts will be turned over to the county prosecutor to be presented to the grand jury, he added.

Manager "On Carpet"

The highlight of the meeting came when Jack Gushin, former manager of the project who now lives in one of the completed homes, was called to the floor by Jack Deutsche, spokesman for the veterans, to explain why the project has turned out to be a financial fiasco.

Gushin complied with the request, but said that he would accept no questions from the floor at the conclusion of his talk. Breaking into a lengthy spiel in defense

of the project officials, Gushin blamed the project's failure on the veteran-stockholders themselves. "All of you could have had your houses if you had adopted a different attitude," he claimed. "I went to Washington for a R.F.C. loan and I could have perhaps gotten it. But your attitude was a selfish one. Everybody was interested in only one thing and that was to get his own house."

Gushin claimed that he and the directors of the cooperative worked "24 hours a day" for a two-year period to make the project a success, but received no support either from the vets themselves or from civic and industrial leaders in this area. He said that the directors had to "fight" to obtain sewers and other facilities for the site.

Gushin admitted that some of the figures given in the audit might be questionable, but asserted that "it is impossible, in a project this size, not to make mistakes."

Distrusted Sub-Contractors
Another wrong attitude harbored by the vets, he said, was a feeling of distrust and hostility towards the various sub-contractors. "They were four friends and not your enemies as many of you seem to think," he said.

As he closed, Gushin said that he will willingly answer any questions put forth by either Kasen or Attorney Stamler at subsequent hearings, but repeated that he would reply to no questions from the floor.

Also attending was Joseph R. Stamler of Newark, who was formerly counsel for the stockholders, but who is now attorney for the receiver. Stamler reminded the veterans that he had brought court action resulting in a receiver-

ship only at their request. He presented a letter which he had sent to Representative James C. Auchincloss last February requesting the congressman's help. He also read a report, made by a federal engineer, which had been forwarded to Auchincloss. The report maintained that there was little hope of salvaging the project since to finish the buildings at that time would bring the total cost per house to around \$16,000.

Claim Disputed
It was announced that the auditors hold that \$4,200 of that amount is "in excess of contractual agreement."

A transcript of Badolator's sworn testimony revealed that he believes the cooperative's board of directors to be responsible for everything; himself for nothing. Asked whether he thought the board of directors had shown good judgment in their transactions, Badolator answered:

"They were the bosses. I was only an employee. They were responsible for what took place."

As the meeting drew to a close, Kasen advised the vets to take advantage of his offer to them as the easiest way out of their dilemma. The offer stated that the veterans now living in the 32 completed houses may buy their homes if they bid \$1,250 above the existing F.H.A. mortgage on a three-bedroom house, a total of \$9,350, or \$750 above the existing F.H.A. mortgage on a two-bedroom house, a total of \$8,550.

"It is easy," he said, "for anyone of us to stay that there was fraud, but only a judge can decide whether this is so. The records seem to indicate that every move taken was first approved by the board of directors. If that were not so, we would be faced with a different situation."

Middlebush Wins Over Crosley A. C.

The Crosley A. C. tossers, who have yet to register a victory this season, suffered their fourth straight setback last evening at Buccleuch Park, the Middlebush A. C. pushing over single runs in each of the last three innings to triumph, 3-0.

FARM NOTES

The first pruning of evergreens to restrain growth and to make the plants more compact is usually done in late May or early June.

With pines, the operation is to cut back the "candles" or new growths as soon as they reach a length of 2 to 4 inches, before the individual leaves start to expand. Cut the candles back about halfway. This will induce the growth of dormant buds at the base of the candles.

Other evergreens, such as yews, hemlocks, arborvitae, false cypress (Retinospora or Chamaecyparis), junipers (such as Redcedar) are cut back when the new growths are two or three inches long. This can be done with pruning shears. We often use a heavy pruning knife handled as you would a sickle, or even a sharp sickle. The object of this is to try to retain the natural contours of the plants. If hedge shears are used, the tendency is to develop a stiff formal plant that is out of place on most properties.

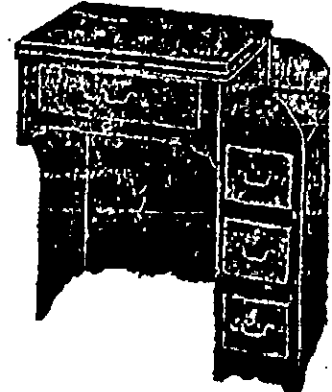

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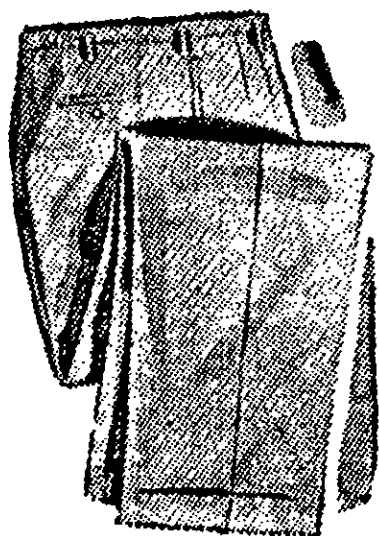
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
