

## Committee Plans Conference With Co-op's Owner

The Franklin Township Committee last night told a group of veteran-stockholders in the Veterans Building Cooperative flasco that it will consult with the project's new owner, Joseph Schur, Linden plumbing contractor, about the condition of the completed houses in the very near future.

After Jack Deutsche, spokesman for the veterans, had informed the committee that the project had been sold to Schur and the sale approved by Vice Chancellor Wilfred H. Jayne in Trenton Tuesday, Russell E. Watson Jr., committee chairman, assured the visiting group that the governing body will intercede immediately if eviction notices are served. In doing so, he reaffirmed a promise made two weeks ago when the veterans called upon the committee for aid, but were told that the committee could legally do nothing to stop the sale.

Bringing the committee up to date on the latest activities concerning the fate of the project, Deutsche said that an investigation seeking the cause for the cooperative's failure is being carried on by the receiver, Daniel C. Kasen of Newark.

Deutsche charged that "contracts awarded in some mystic fashion" and several of the contractors were "overpaid." He said that Kasen's investigation will try to uncover the reason for these and other irregularities in the project's financial activities prior to its failure, and may serve as a basis for either criminal or civil suits if the facts so warrant.

The veterans, through Deutsche, told the committee that Schur has offered to sell them the homes in which they are now living, but said that they are reluctant to buy because of the ridiculous price being asked. It was disclosed that a committee of vets has been formed to negotiate further with the new owner.

At the time of their earlier visit, the veterans helped the committee draft telegrams to representatives in Washington asking possible federal help in the matter.

### Contract Awarded

After the visit, the committee awarded Earl B. Cox of East Millstone a contract to collect garbage in the recently-formed garbage district encompassing the West New Brunswick end of the township. Under the plan, only the taxpayers directly affected will be assessed for the service. Cox submitted a low bid of \$4,200 per year. Other bids were: Pinky Refuse Service, \$5,400; William Chamberlain, \$5,880; Mercer E. Smith, \$8,040; Stephen Swaycheck, \$1 per month per house.

William Easton, president of the West New Brunswick Taxpayers' Association, presented a letter to the committee from the organization asking information on a number of proposed improvements.

In answer to the letter, Watson said that a water and sewer project is being considered by the committee and may become a reality next year when a possible appropriation will be made. A detailed report on the project will be presented the committee by the township engineer at the June 24 meeting.

# Vet Project Sold After Plea Fails

## May Quiet From Police Viewpoint

If few arrests indicate a law-abiding community with good police protection, then Franklin Township must surely rank high among the safest areas in the country and its police force must also deserve wide-spread praise.

Any how, Police Chief Edwin F. Voorhees reported to the Township Committee this week that May was another extremely quiet month for the local forces of law and order.

During the month, only ten arrests were made and those were mainly for minor offenses. Broken down, the total shows that six persons were arrested for motor vehicle violations, three for disorderly conduct, and one for a felony.

While spending 370 hours on duty, 107 on patrol and 263 on activities other than patrol, the policemen traveled 1582 miles, 1486 in the police car and 96 in private cars. Five accidents were investigated and five warnings were issued. In addition, one dog bite case was reported.

The bridegroom attended St. Peter's High School and served more than three years with the navy. He is employed by the New Brunswick Board of Education. The bride was graduated from New Brunswick High School.

After a reception for 175 guests at the Roger Smith Hotel, the couple left on a wedding trip to Canada and the New England states.

New Jersey, one of the strongest "free states" during the Revolution, earlier had a barracks at Perth Amboy where Negroes who had been brought in slave ships were confined until they were sold.

Although a large group of veteran-stockholders traveled to Trenton on Tuesday to violently object, Vice-Chancellor Wilfred H. Jayne approved the sale of the Veterans Building Cooperative properties to Joseph Schur, Linden plumbing contractor, for approximately \$51,000.

After the sale, Schur's attorney, Irving Schwartz, announced that the veterans now living in the cooperative's 32 completed dwellings will have an opportunity to retain their homes. He said that an arrangement will be made whereby the vets may immediately purchase their homes and that those who have no homes will be allowed to apply their "credit" toward the purchase of a building site.

The only bidder on the project, Schur offered \$23,000 for the unfinished homes and other property and approximately \$900 for each of the completed houses. In addition, he assumed two large mortgage obligations, \$214,028 on the vacant land and unfinished houses and \$253,472 on the finished homes, the latter insured by the F. H. A. Both mortgages are held by the Mortgage Corporation of New Jersey, a Newark firm.

Before Schwartz's announcement, Jack Deutsche, spokesman for the veterans, told the court that he feared immediate eviction if the sale was approved. He requested that the court withhold its opinion until a complete investigation of the project's financial activities had been made.

Recounting the veteran's grievances, Deutsche traced the project's turbulent history and described the completed homes as "deplorable". The houses, he said, are in terrible shape with leaky roofs and walls, cracked foundations and warped floors.

Deutsche expressed the belief that mismanagement in the part of the cooperative's board of directors had caused its downfall. He said that no statement had been given the 200 original stockholders, who sank \$150,000 into the project, telling them how their money was spent.

Asking that a thorough investigation be made, Deutsche informed the court that the receiver, Daniel G. Kasen of Newark, and his attorney, Joseph H. Stamler, also of Newark, have questioned James Badolato of Stelton, erstwhile contractor-supervisor of the project, but have not yet informed the vets of their full findings.

Deutsche also requested that Jack Gushin, former \$125 per week manager of the cooperative, be examined by the receiver.

Called upon to answer Deutsche, Kasen told the court that his investigation is far from complete as yet, but said that Gushin is slated for examination in the near future. He reported to the court on a meeting held at the New Brunswick Veterans Center last week during which he read an auditor's report to the stockholders and answered their questions.

Asked who was responsible for the situation, Kasen replied that, his investigation not complete, he was not prepared to say. However, he said he believed the project's major fault was that it had

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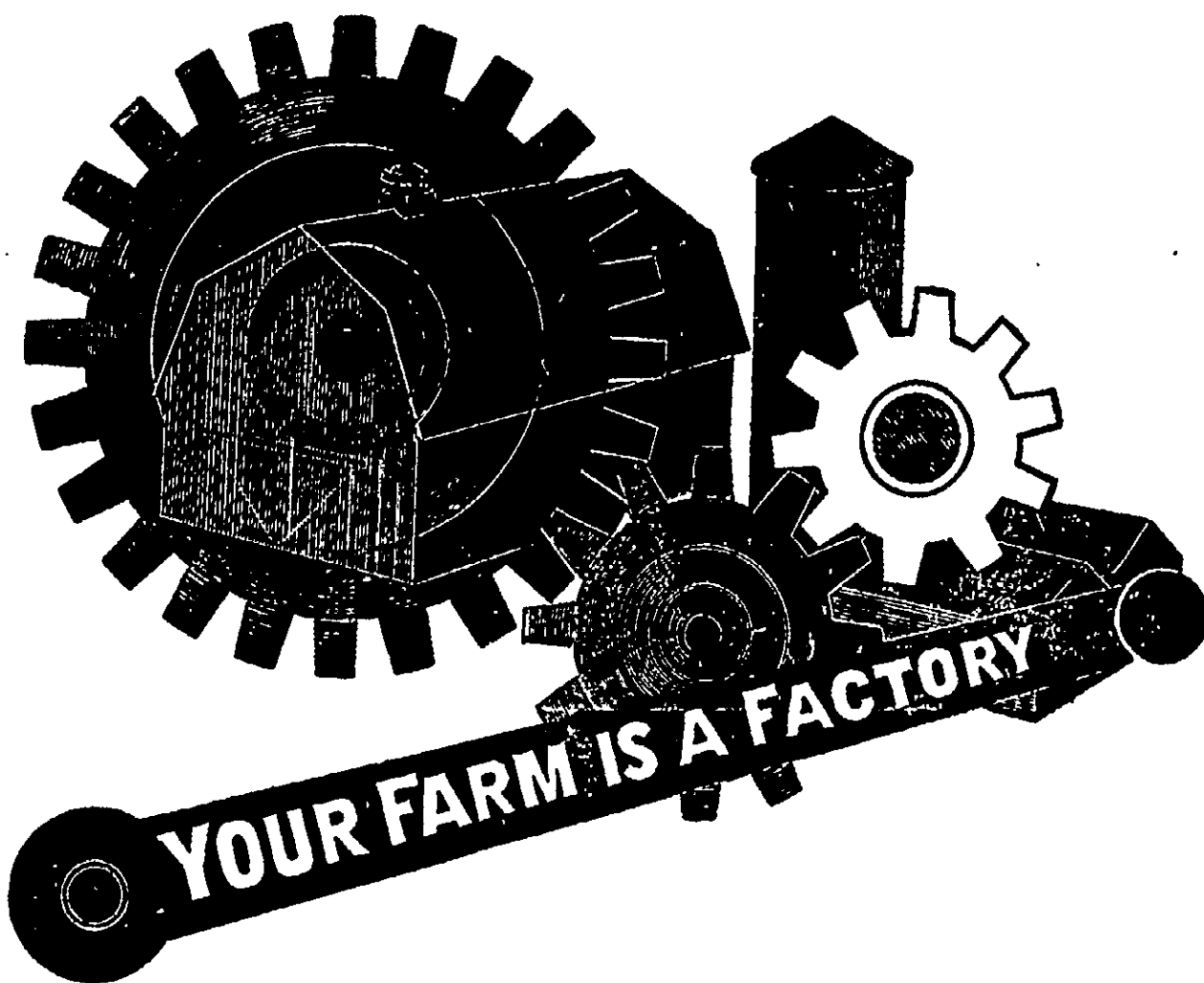

too many bosses. "No one competent person was placed in overall charge of the project," he said.

Speaking of the testimony obtained from Badolato, the receiver said that the contractor has placed full responsibility for his actions on the board of directors, claiming that he merely carried out their orders as a hired employee.

In appointing Badolato supervisor of the project, "the directors placed full responsibility in the hands of a man who had never before made more than \$125 a week in his life", Kasen added. The supervisor's contract called for a salary of \$30,000 for eight to twelve months work.

Joining Deutsche in his objections to the sale were Herman Cohen of 20 Whittier Ave., one of the project occupants, and Alfred A. Katz, a New Brunswick attorney. Katz, one of the lawyers originally connected with the project, has put in a claim for \$3,671 for legal expenses. He opposed the sale on the grounds that the receiver had not given sufficient notice and had failed to provide prospective purchasers or bidders with an inventory of the project's assets.

Kasen revealed that Dean Kelsey, one of the occupants of the completed homes, who had agreed to accept the receiver's offer and purchase his home by buying above the F. H. A. ceiling, has withdrawn his bid.

At the conclusion of the hearing, the court directed Kasen to continue his investigation and report upon its results regularly so that it may serve as a basis for possible criminal or civil suits if the facts so warrant.
