

BETTER WATCH OF TWP. DUMP IS PROMISED

Questions concerning the condition of the township dump were answered at the Township Committee meeting Thursday night. The fire, which has proved offensive to some residents has been put out and the remaining debris covered with dirt. A gate has been erected and will remain closed excepting during the interval when there is supervision of dumping. In the future the dump will be open only forty hours per week in order that the attendant may prevent dumping from New Brunswick stores and factories and direct proper disposal.

JULY C. T. A. REPORT

Dunwalke Farm, Far Hills, had high herd for butterfat production in the Somerset County Herd Improvement Association for July, according to the report of the testers, Robert E. Wiese and Robert Niedrach. This herd of 37 pure bred Guernseys averaged 42.6 lbs. of fat for the month. They were milked three times a day.

Second for fat and first for milk went to the herd of Walter Hoffman, Neshanic, with an average of 1133 lbs. of milk and 39 lbs. of fat.

Fred Meyer, Milltown, had third herd for fat and second for milk with 998 lbs. of milk and 38 lbs. of fat per cow for the month.

Third herd for milk was that of J. V. D. Bergen, Belle Mead, with 972 lbs. per cow.

Fred Meyer also had high cow for fat production. This Holstein produced 108.8 lbs. of butterfat in July.

High cow for milk was a Holstein in the H. McCall herd, Neshanic. She produced 2325 lbs. in the month. McCall is president of the Somerset County Holstein Association.

Ixodidae Pester, Are Exterminated

A swarm of ixodidae, better known as the hard shell tick, invaded an area adjacent to the Somerset County Veteran's Housing Project at Belle Mead last week, but the Somerset County Mosquito Commission came to the rescue of its fellow county agency.

All the weeds were cut down in the infested area and piled up. A five per cent DDT solution was then sprayed all around that section of the project where the ticks had been discovered and all the adjacent ground. Robert MacChesney, superintendent of the Mosquito Commission averred that all danger from ticks had been eliminated.

Ticks, if infected, can become carriers of various diseases such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, though no claim that the late Hillsborough ticks were infected had been made.

The call for help was issued to MacChesney by Quintin Van der Veer, superintendent of the housing project. At that time he received complaints that ticks were so plentiful in the area that sheets hung out to dry would sometimes collect as many as 20 ticks.

Calco To Add 150

Calco Chemical Division announced this week that those units of the company not already operating on a 40-hourworkweek will return to 40 hours commencing Aug. 29. It was estimated that the move will necessitate the hiring of approximately 150 new employes.

The plant, one of the last in this area to revert to a normal work week following World War II, plans to complete the change-over by October.

FARM NOTES

The chief insect pests of cabbage crops are the three cabbage worms, which are the larval stages of worms and butterflies. Late cabbage and related crops may still be protected from these pests of a one-half to three-quarter rotenone dust is applied at intervals of about ten days.

Many gardeners are wondering why their squash vines are wilting and dying. One of the chief causes of this symptom is the squash borer, the larval stage of a small moth. Satisfactory control may only be obtained early in the season by repeated applications of the above rotenone dust to repel the moth from laying eggs. Once the borer has gained access to the vine the only control is to locate the entrance holes and dig out the larvae. This is a small white worm with a black head and black spots. This is a tedious procedure, but is of value to the home gardener, who will otherwise lose his entire crop. Care must be taken to cover any wounds made with earth so that new roots may be formed at that point.

Voorhees Warns 'Speed Lunatics'

Police Chief Edwin Voorhees' departmental report for July, submitted to the Township Committee last night, revealed that a "crack down" campaign against local speed lunatics in progress. Special attention will be given Hamilton St., Voorhees indicated.

The busiest period encountered by the force since last winter's unprecedented accident wave, July saw 23 arrests made and an equal number of warnings issued.

"This was an extremely busy month", reported Voorhees. "Although we were fortunate in not having any serious accidents, our safety record was marred by a sharp increase in the number of motor vehicle violations. More than half of these violations were made by township residents. Specifically, there have been entirely too many violations on lower Hamilton St. We cannot afford to be lenient in this matter. In the future, there will be fewer warnings issued and, instead, more arrests made."

The record for July shows that, of the 23 arrests made, ten were for motor vehicle violations. Nine persons were summoned for disorderly conduct, two for common theft, one for a building code violation, and one for another department.

In addition, the officers investigated two minor accidents and destroyed two dogs while spending 181 hours on duty. A total of 1151 miles were covered on patrol, 1012 in the police car and 139 in private cars. Three dog bite cases were reported.

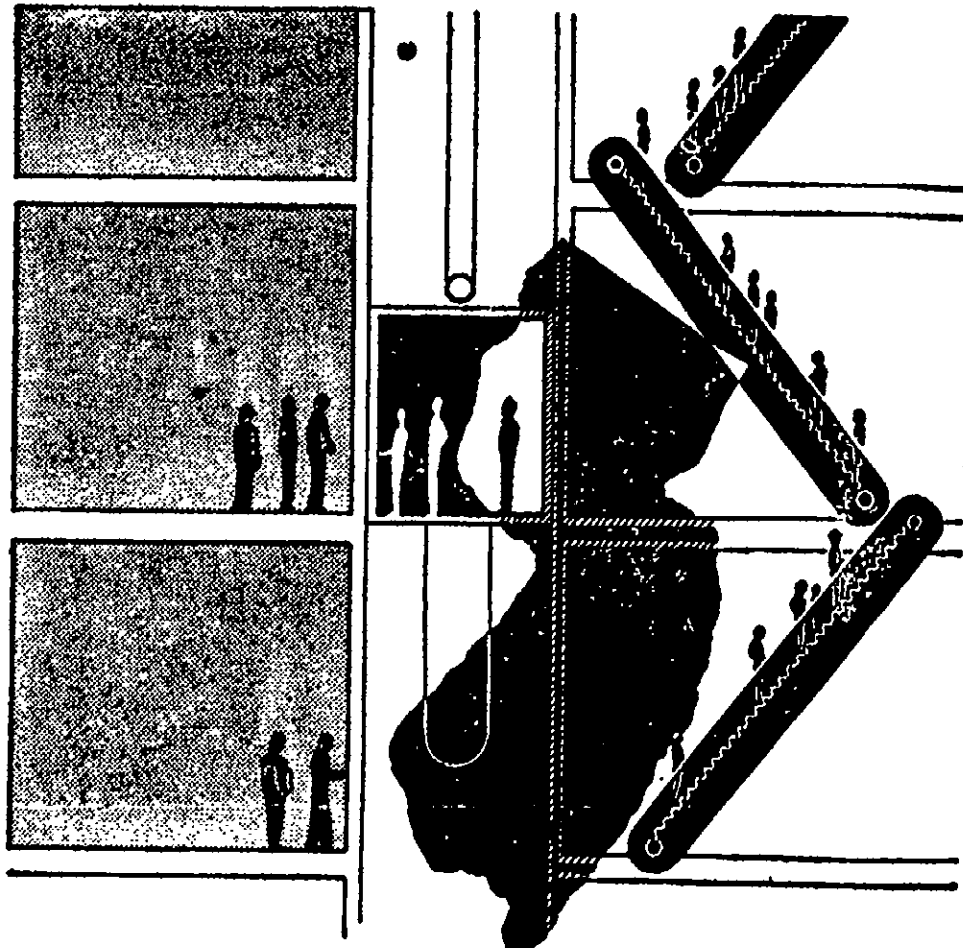
