Nursery School To Open Sept. 15

Parents of pre-school children enrolled in the Middlebush Nursery School met in the Murad home on Hamilton Road Monday evening to paint and repair equipment for the nursery school. It is anticipated that the school will open in the Middlebush Reformed Church Sept. 16 if a sufficient number of children is enrolled.

The school, which will operate on a non-profit basis, is designed to accommodate pre-school children who are ready for group activity, and will be maintained according to the state specifications for certified nursery schools. Tuition is charged to cover operating expenses of the school. The Middlebush Nursery School will be administered by a board of trustees and a teacher, Mrs. Elaine Weinstock. The board consists of Mrs. Lyle E. Hagmann, president; George Cuddy, treasurer; Mrs. A. O. Malfatt, secretary; Dr. Irving Silber, Mrs. Norman Klingling, and Dr. James Lynch. One member of the board remains to be elected and will be a representative of the companion organization, the Middlebush Nursery School Association. The school will be run on a cooperative basis, with the mothers of enrolled children as an assisting faculty. All enrolled parents will be members of the corporation and will share in the administering of finances, serve on committees and attend bi-monthly study group meetings on problems of pre-school children. Participating mothers will donate a morning at regular intervals. Non-participating mothers will be charged a small fee to cover the expense of obtaining a substitute for the mornings which they will not be able to donate.

Membership to the Middlebush Nursery School Association is open to those members of the community who are interested in promoting supervised recreation and character training for our pre-school children by supporting community interest in the Middlebush Nursery School and maintaining high standards of operation in the school. Persons interested in the success of this venture are requested to contact Mrs. George Cuddy. Further donations of unused equipment suitable for renovation for the school are still required.

4-H Congress Opens September 9th

New Jersey Near Top In Processing Limas

Those "frozen" lima beans you may have had for dinner were probably produced right here in New Jersey, according to John W. Carncross, associate agricultural economist at Rutgers University. New Jersey's planted acreage of lima beans for processing this year is 17,200 acres, second only to California. Carncross lives on Alcott Ave., Middlebush.

Harvesting of this million dollar farm crop is now underway. Lima bean production is centered in Cumberland, Salem and Cape May counties. Most of the New Jersey crop is processed by quick freezing at the Deerfield Packing Corporation, Bridgeton.

Carncross points out that the successful processing of this vegetable by the quick freezing method has caused a sharp expansion in acreage. Fifteen years ago only 1600 acres were grown in this State. Development of new small-seeded varieties has added to the success of the industry. The greener color and higher quality of these new varieties have brought increased acceptance by consumers. Furthermore, tests have shown that they produce more weight and value per acre for the farmer, Carncross reports.

Blue ribbon awards in the foods exhibit, which included cakes, biscuits and muffins went to Barbara White and Margaret Scott of Mount Bethel and Martha Conway of Bound Brook.

Poultry awards were given to Welsey Gerick of Millstone, Roger Harlengen, Louis Schunk, Jr., and Pasquale Marratto, all of the second district, Franklin Township.

YOUTHS MUST REGISTER NOW FOR NEW DRAFT

Registration for the draft will begin Monday at Township Hall, Middlebush. All men between the ages of 18 and 26 are required to register at the nearest draft board. Fred Bascom has been appointed to conduct the registration for the Franklin township area. Individuals whose permanent residence is out of state or out of this territory may register here and their cards will be forwarded to local draft boards which will be determined by the home addresses given. The district board for Somerset County is located in the Armory at Somerville.

Registration for the different age groups are as follows:

Persons born in 1923 will be registered on Tuesday, August 31, or Wednesday, Sept. 1.

Those born in 1924: Thursday, Sept. 2, and Friday, Sept. 3.

Those born in 1925: Saturday, Sept. 3, or Tuesday, Sept. 7.

Those born in 1926: Wednesday, Sept. 8, and Thursday, Sept. 9.

Those born in 1927: Friday, Sept. 10, and Saturday, Sept. 11.

Those born in 1928: Monday, Sept. 13, and Tuesday, Sept. 14.

Those born in 1929: Wednesday, Sept. 15, and Thursday, Sept. 16.

Those born in 1930: Friday, Sept. 17, or Saturday, Sept. 18.

Those born on or after September 19th must register on the date of their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

Properly qualified secretarial and clerical volunteer assistants are required to facilitate the registration.

REV. G. W. GARRETSON DIES

Funeral services for Rev. George W. Garretson, songleader for Alma Temple of the Pillar of Fire Church, Denver, Colorado, who died Friday, Aug. 20, were held in the temple in that city.

Rev. Mr. Garretson was born September 4, 1867, on the Peter Garretson farm near Weston, which is now known as Zarephath, national headquarters of the Pillar of Fire organization. Being called to the ministry while a young man he entered the church and Bible school in Denver with his mother and two sisters in 1905. After spending two years in Christian service at the Los Angeles branch of the society, Mr. Garretson was transferred to London where he labored for 13 years directing the work of the church in the British Isles. With his stirring gospel songs and messages he preached to the multitudes in the famous Hyde Park and other leading open-air centers of the English metropolis, in connection with his missionary and evangelistic labors.

In Dec., 1917, Mr. Garretson was married to Miss Inez Hubbard of Kansas, a missionary in London. Since returning to the homeland they have resided at the temple in Denver.

Surviving, in addition to his wife, are two sons by a former wife, David, of Bound Brook, and Daniel, of Boone, Iowa; and a sister, Miss Jennie A. Garretson, deaconess of the church at San Francisco.

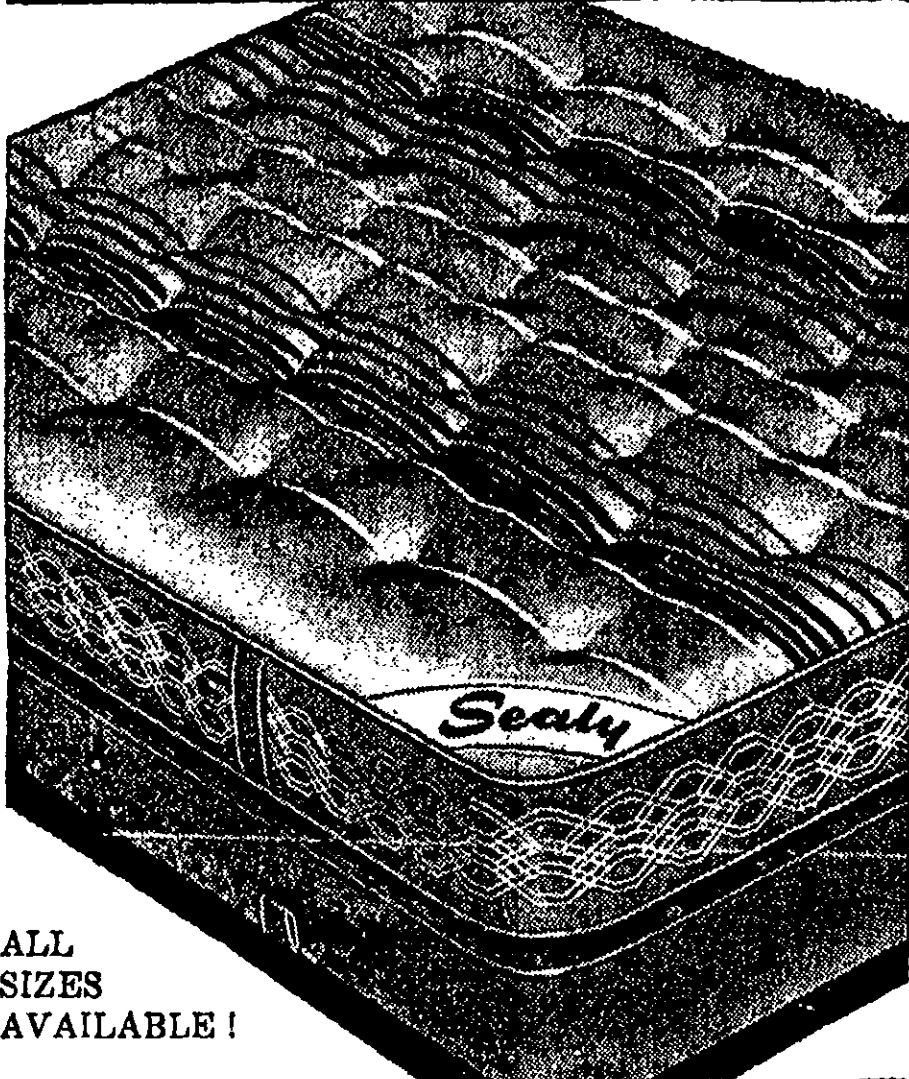

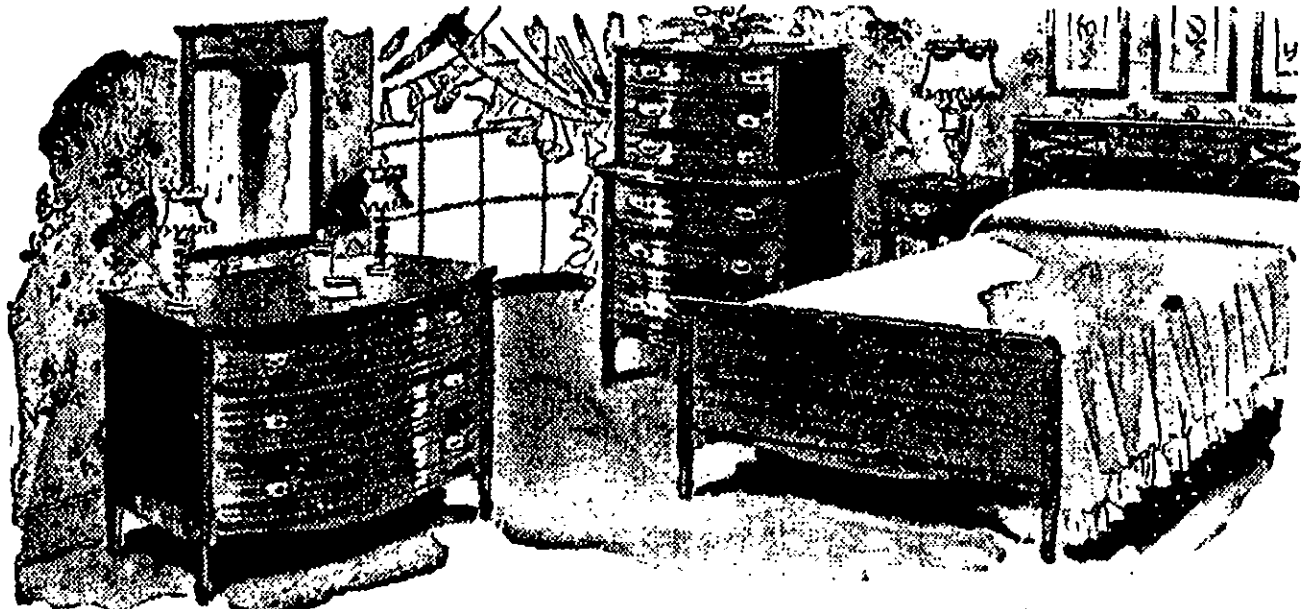
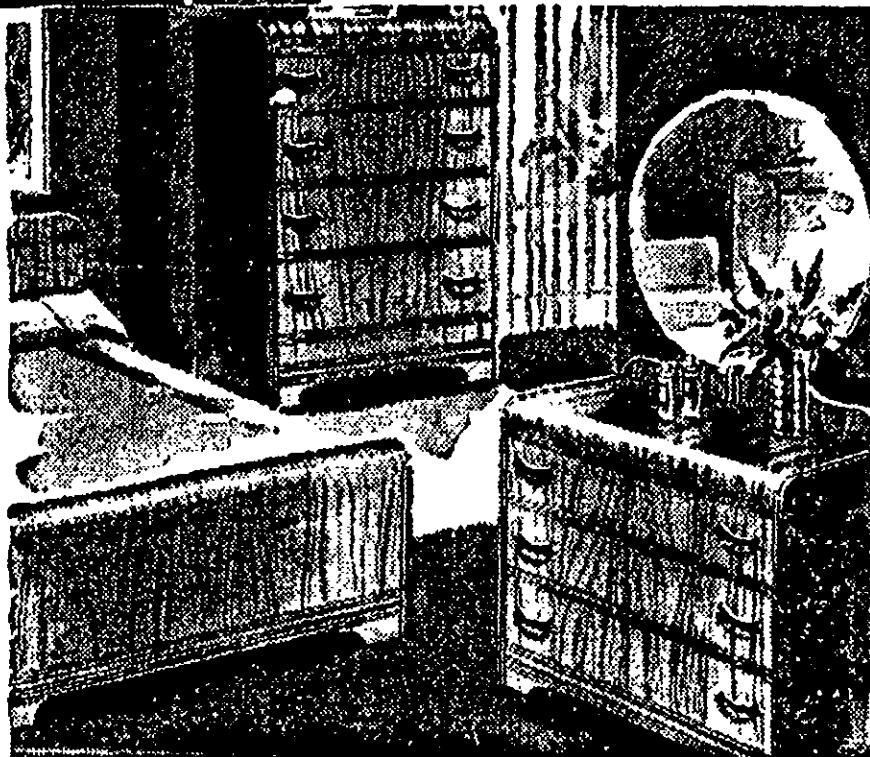
