

1,000 To Re-enter School This Week

Vacation ends promptly at 9:00 a. m. September 8, for more than 1,000 Franklin Township elementary school children who return to Franklin Park, Hamilton, Middlebush, Kingston and Pine Grove Manor Schools Wednesday morning. The first day's session will close at 1:00 p. m. In addition to regular bus routes, a shuttle bus will run between Hamilton and Pine Grove to carry beginners from the Hamilton area to Pine Grove, and first graders from the Pine Grove area to Hamilton school. This bus will make no stops.

Two additional holidays are scheduled in this year's school calendar as Columbus Day falls on Tuesday and all schools will be closed Nov. 2 for elections.

A general meeting of all teachers in the Franklin Township school system will be held at the Middlebush School at 11 a. m. Tuesday. Following the general meeting teachers will go to their respective school buildings to confer with the building principals of the various schools.

School Needs Told By Dr. Lynch

Dr. J. M. Lynch, in his annual report to the Board of Education, submitted at a special meeting on Wednesday, gave a summary of the educational services rendered during the school year which ended June 30. Operation, achievements and needs of the Franklin Township school system were presented.

During the war, he said, and the period immediately following neither school building nor construction of additions to existing buildings was done. Improvement of facilities also came to a standstill. Needs thus brought about became even more pressing with the sudden increases in enrollment in the lower grades.

After the opening of school last September, a sharp increase in enrollment in the beginning grades in Franklin Park necessitated the immediate provision of an additional room in that school. Approval for the use of a basement room was secured from the State Board of Education. Two sets of double doors, bulletin board, shelves and a heating unit had to be installed. Furniture for the room is now on order, and the advertising of bids for installation of flooring has been authorized, he continued.

An architect was employed.

plans and specifications prepared and approved, bids received and contract awarded for the construction of a cafeteria in the Pine Grove Manor School; a nurse's room, library room and play room in the Middlebush School, special combination classroom-workroom for the Middlebush special class, and for the renovation of the Middlebush cafeteria. Work on the project began the third week in June. The project also calls for the installation of fluorescent fixtures. Further replacement of the present lighting is recommended in the report. Dr. Lynch also recommends that windows of auditoriums and classrooms be equipped with opaque curtains or shades so that the projector may be used more efficiently in the visual-aids film program.

Movable desks and seats were purchased for the upper grade classrooms in the Middlebush and Pine Grove schools. It is recommended that the practice of making additions to or the replacement of present seating equipment, by individual desks and seats of the movable type be continued.

Because of current growing enrollment noted throughout the report, and further increases forecast for the years ahead, a school building program is imperative, Dr. Lynch states.

"It has been estimated that New Jersey schools must plan ahead for nearly twice as many pupils as were enrolled in the early 1940's. The Franklin Township census, undertaken last November to determine the number of young children expected to enter school in the next five years, presents a clear picture of the situation. . . . Moreover there is a steady increase in the number of families moving into the district. It was found for every 10 dwellings occupied in Nov., 1947, one new dwelling was ready for occupancy or in the process of construction. How grade school enrollment expected in 1952 compares with 1947 enrollment is shown by the following data:

The figures give some indication of the need for additional plant facilities. The problems encountered by the schools in endeavoring to contribute to the fullest development of our children, class size, curriculum offerings, attention to individual differences and requirements, are intimately tied up with the problem of providing adequate school building space and equipment," the report concludes.

Bids were opened for the transportation of pupils on a non-stop shuttle bus between the Pine Grove Manor and Hamilton School buildings, and to Bound Brook High School. Only one bid was awarded to C. I. Van Cleef at the rate of \$500 per annum. Percy Smith entered a bid of \$3400 for the high school route. The bid was awarded to James Dunn on low bid of \$2640.

Heavy screening for the ground level windows in the Pine Grove Manor School was reported to cost \$42 per window.

Mrs. Emily Slade requested permission for the use of the Middlebush auditorium for a public meeting, Sept. 29.

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance providing for the making of a general improvement in Franklin Township consisting of the resurfacing of certain streets in the township by the application of a bituminous seal coat and stone cover.

Be it ordained that the Township Committee of Franklin Township:

1. That the following general improvement in this Township shall be made, to wit:

The resurfacing of all or parts of the following streets to wit: Lake Avenue, West Point Street, Wheeler Place, Churchill Avenue, Girard Avenue, Hillcrest Avenue, Irvington Avenue, Radio Court, Reeve Street, Ford Avenue, Blake Avenue, Runyan Avenue, Dayton Avenue, Rodney Avenue, Waldorf Street, Berry Street, Millstone Road, Lewis Street, Victor Street, Franklin Street, Wilson Street, Elm Street, Kee Avenue, Miller Avenue, Green Street, Jefferson Street, Home Street, Kosuth Street, Main Street, Henry Street, Prospect Street, Lawrence Street, Dover Avenue, Carroll Place, Old Georgetown Road, Canal Rd., Butler Rd., Suydam Rd., Elm Place, Franklin Parkway, Jacques Lane, Vliet Rd., Cortelyou Lane, Blackwells Mills Rd., Skillmans Lane, Bennetts Lane, Clyde Road, Dahmer Road, Cedar Grove Lane, Wilson Road, DeMott Lane, Van Cleef Road, Grouser Road, Willow Avenue, Lafayette Street, Brown Place, Equator Avenue, Garfield Avenue and Howard Avenue, by the application of a bituminous seal coat and stone cover.

All of said work shall be in accordance with a schedule heretofore prepared and approved by the Road Department and on file in the office of the Township Clerk.

2. Said general improvement shall be made and completed at a cost not to exceed the sum of \$15,000.00 and said sum or so much thereof as may be sufficient to meet the costs of carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance is hereby appropriated for said purpose and shall be paid from an appropriation made in the 1948 Budget entitled "Capital Improvement Fund."

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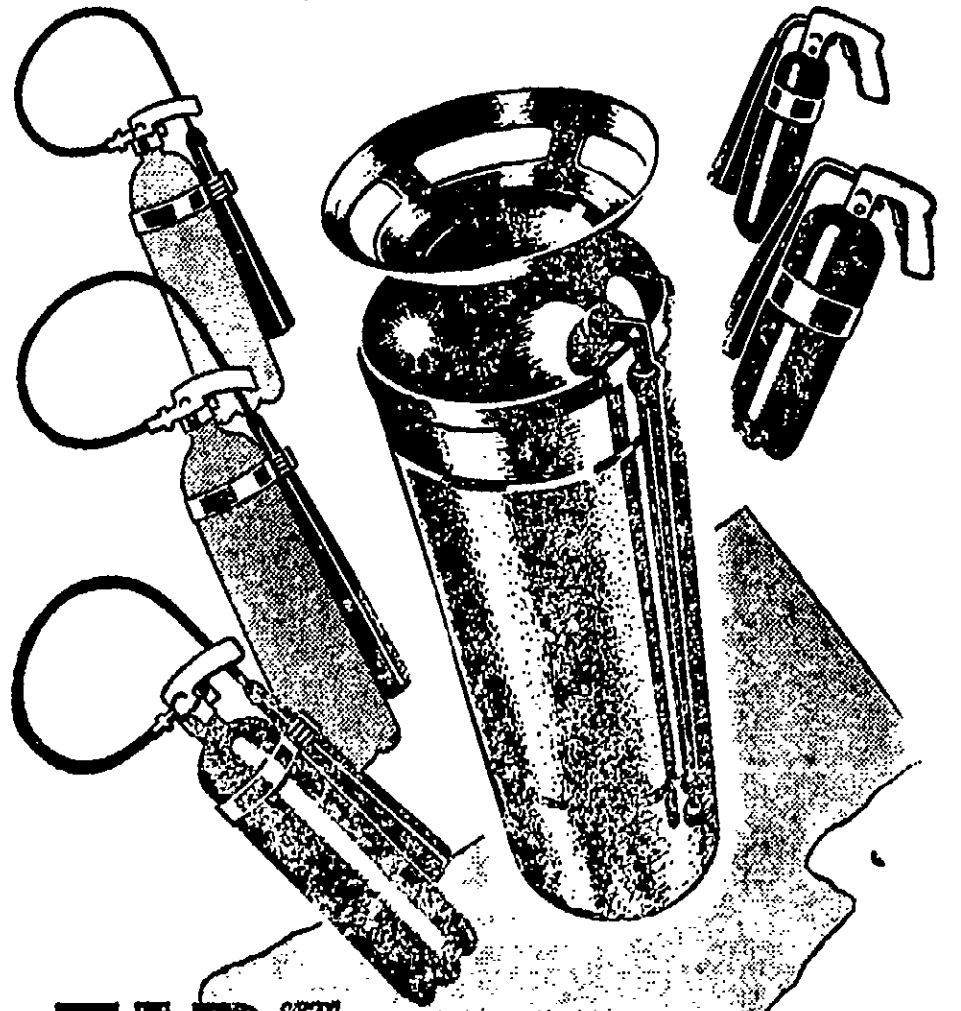

For Bigger and Better Breakfasts

Breakfast can be such an interesting meal, though it may mean getting up earlier to allow time for eating breakfast. If you rush through that morning meal, or omit it entirely, the entire day may be colored by this feeling of haste. We count on breakfast to furnish from a third to a fourth of the day's nutritional needs. It is hard to complete this quota if breakfast is neglected.

The breakfast pattern should be built around fruit, cereal, milk, bread, and butter, but many additions may be made. Eggs in any style, or some meats, may be added for the hearty breakfast. Fruits, berries and melons in season may be substituted for the fruit juices. The quick breads, hot rolls or muffins and coffee cakes give zest to the simple breakfast and jams and jellies will vary the daily toast. The food eaten at breakfast is the most efficiently used by the body during the day.

Spiced Applesauce

8 large, firm apples
1/2 cup water
2 tsp. lemon juice
Dash cinnamon
8 whole cloves
or strip of lemon peel
1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar

Wash, core and quarter apples. Combine with water, lemon juice and spices in covered saucepan. Simmer 15-20 minutes or until apples are tender. Press through a sieve or colander, add sugar as desired. Remove whole cloves or lemon peel before serving. Serves 8.

Ham Waffles

1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup milk
4 tsp. melted shortening
6 tsp. chopped ham

Sift dry ingredients. Add eggs,

milk, shortening and ham. Bake to 4 minutes or until brown in preheated waffle iron. Makes 4 waffles.

Fried Corn Meal Mush

3/4 cup corn meal
1 tsp salt
3 1/2 cups boiling water

Sprinkle corn meal gradually into boiling salted water, stirring constantly until mixture boils; reduce heat and cook for 5 minutes, stirring once or twice.

Place over boiling water and cook tightly covered for about 3/4 hour or until all of the water has been absorbed.

Pour cooked corn meal into loaf pan which has been rinsed with cold water. Cool, cover and chill until thoroughly cold and firm. Unmold, cut into slices 1/2 inch thick.

Dip each slice in flour and saute in small amount of butter, margarine or bacon fat on both sides until golden brown. Serve with syrup or honey. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Note: Leftover oatmeal or finely ground cooked wheat cereals may be packed in a loaf pan and used in place of corn meal. Three cups of cooked cereal will make 4 to 6 portions.

Quick Coffee Cake

2 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 tsp. salt
4 tsp. baking powder
2 tbsp. sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
1/4 cup shortening, melted

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Combine egg with milk and mix with dry ingredients. Add melted shortening. Mix. Spread in 8-inch square greased pan. Sprinkle with topping. Bake at 375°F. 30 minutes.

Topping

2 tbsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. enriched flour

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
