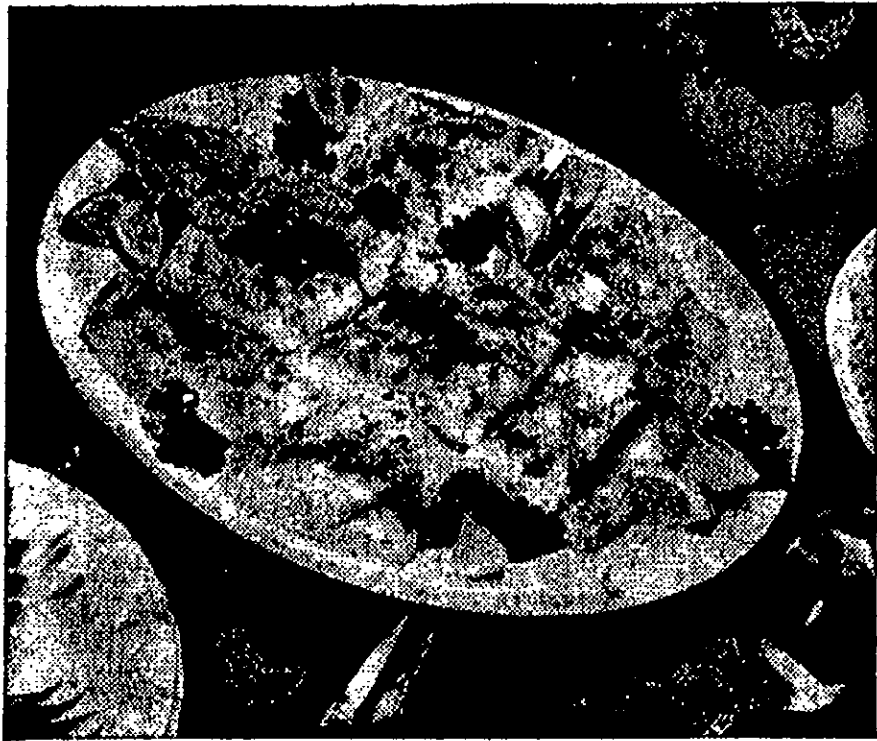
New Bus Contract Let

Succulent Broiled Fillets



A FISH TREAT COOKED IN TEN MINUTES

Everyone likes fish fillets—those meaty slices of fish cut lengthwise from the backbone—because fillets are always boneless and require no preparation. There's not a single bit of waste in an economical fish fillet . . . it's all edible and it takes only a few minutes to cook.

Many fish are marketed in the fillet form, but the most popular are haddock, cod and flounder. Fillets are usually cut from fish weighing from two to four pounds. That's why they are so tender. They shouldn't be turned while broiling because the fish is likely to break into small pieces.

When cutting the fillet into serving-sized portions, be sure to use a very sharp knife. Moderate heat—about 350°—is necessary to bring out the full, rich flavor of the fish. Avoid the common tendency to overcook

fish and everyone will say you are a great cook!

BROILED FILLETS

- 2 lbs. fillets
- 1 tbs. minced onion
- 1 tbs. pepper
- 1 tbs. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tbs. melted butter
- 1 tbs. minced parsley
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs

Wipe fillets with damp cloth, cut into serving-sized portions and brush with melted butter. Combine onion, pepper, salt, lemon juice, parsley, and the rest of the melted butter. Pour over fish, sprinkle with bread crumbs, and broil on broiler grid 8 to 10 minutes, basting twice with juice in bottom of pan. Arrange fillets on hot platter and pour remaining sauce over them. Garnish with watercress or parsley, and lemon curls. Serves six.

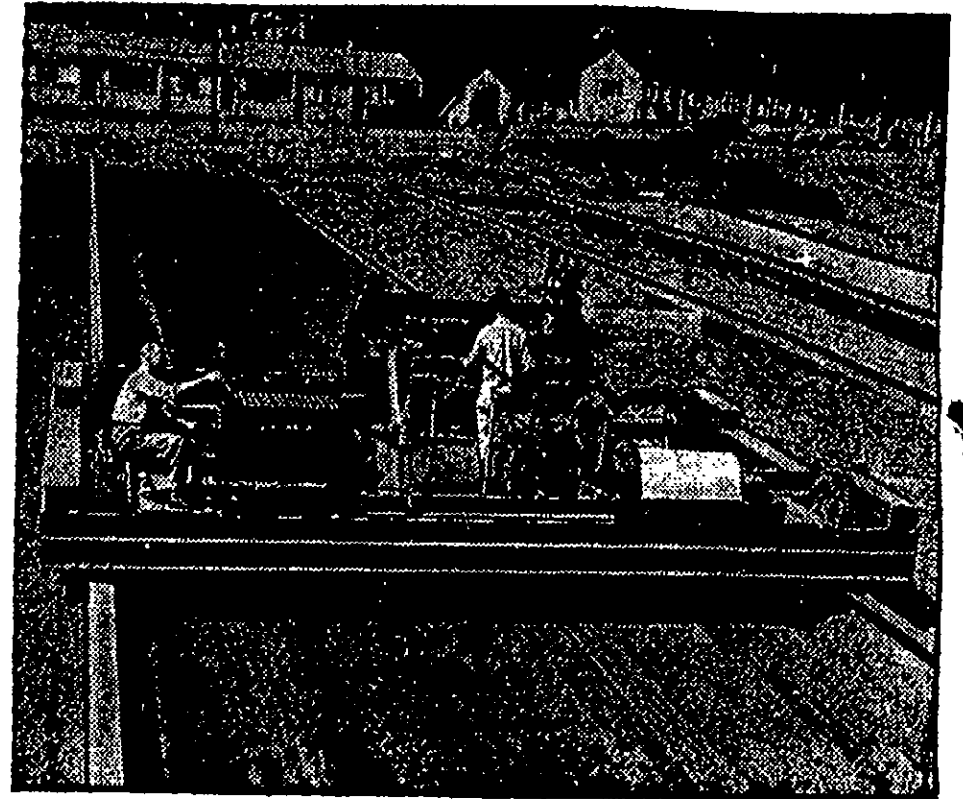

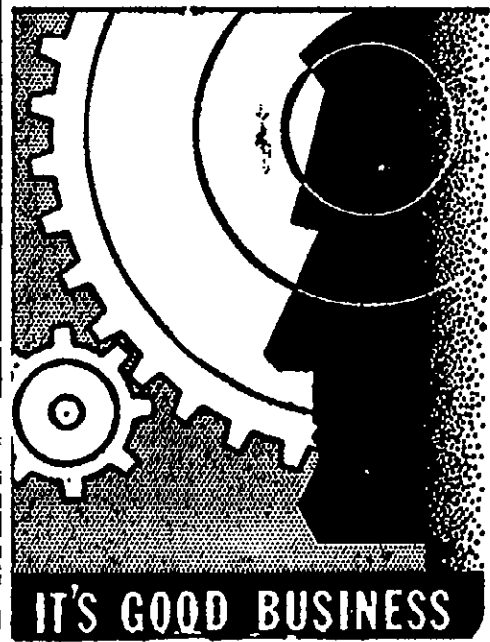

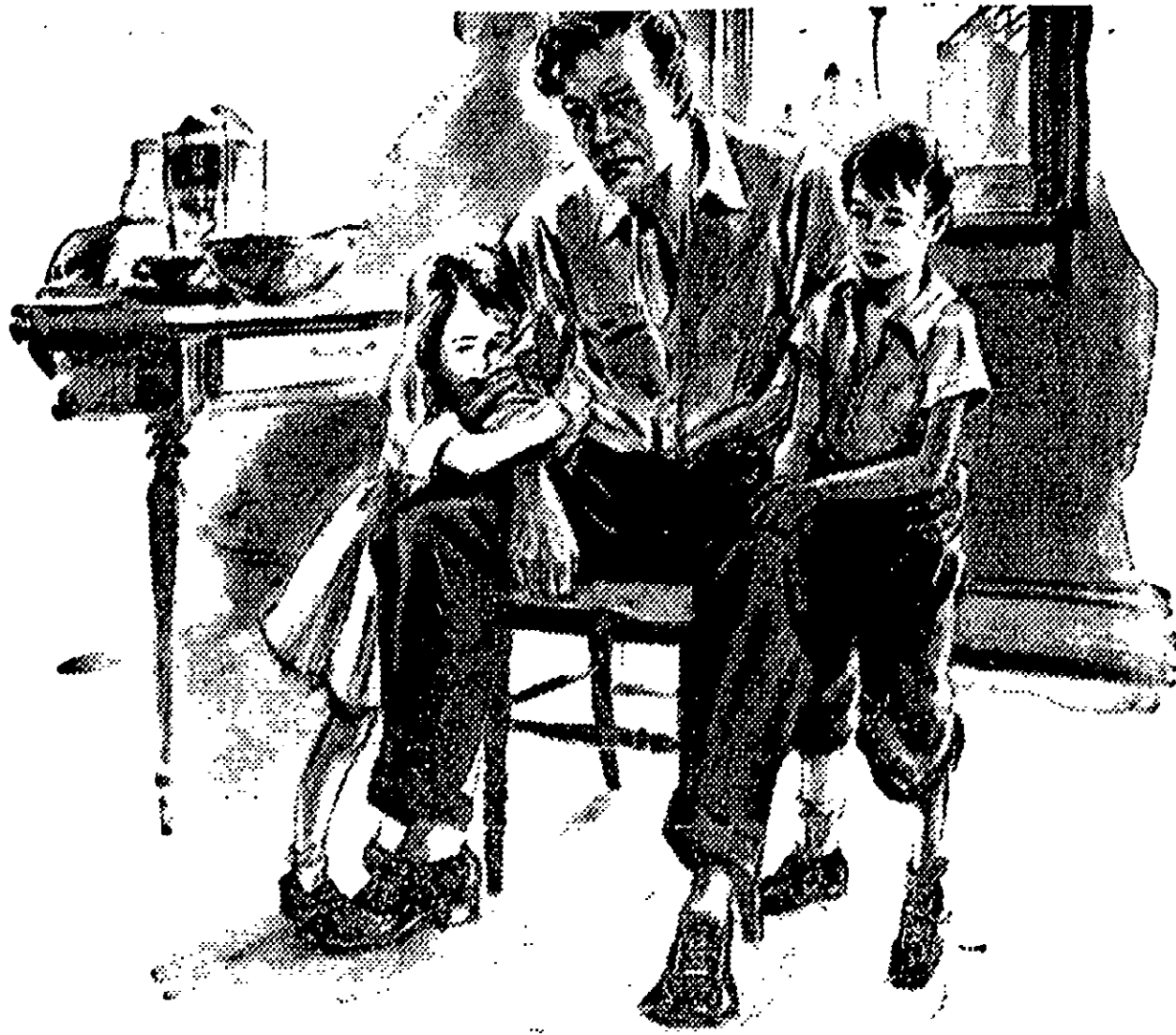
