

## Watson Reports On Water Problem

Russell Watson, Jr., chairman of the Franklin Township Committee has called attention to recent newspaper articles concerning the water problem. He urged that all residents inform themselves on the problem for when the time comes for local action, the committee will need the full cooperation and support of the residents.

Watson said he foresaw a water authority which will embrace all the communities in this section of New Jersey and will require the cooperation of all the municipalities in the Raritan Valley region.

He explained that the committee's previous refusal to buy water from New Brunswick was based on the prohibitive cost. He also said that New Brunswick had imposed restrictions on the contract limiting supply and gave no guarantee of pressure or constant flow, agreeing only to supply water in excess of their own demands.

In the light of recent statements, Watson said, it seemed the committee had been doubly wise in refusing the contract, as it appears that New Brunswick does not have sufficient water to meet its own demand.

Watson takes the optimistic view of the situation. He said that the years of preliminary work which resulted in the October decision to put the problem into the hands of legal advisers and professional engineers is taking its part in a general plan.

The overall scheme will dovetail with work being done in other municipalities to bring a satisfactory conclusion to the problem of supplying adequate water to the entire region for both industrial and potable purposes.

The December issue of the magazine contains a picture and story of the vehicle in the "Along the Farm Front" section.

The roughage wagon has sides and ends of corrugated aluminum nailed on 2 by 4's. In a few minutes it can be changed into a flat wagon.

Each side is in two sections braced with a 2 by 4 scantling, and the corners are held together with turnbuckles and eyebolts. The front end is five and a half feet high for clearance of the delivery spout when the field choppers turns corners, the rear is seven and a half feet high.



Continued from Page One) license transfer and other fees. The transfer of a retail plenary license to Anthony Zacheru was approved.

**Complains Of Bill**

Joseph Sanfratello raised the question concerning tax payment for garbage disposal from the dog pound. Sanfratello said that refuse from the pound was cleared away at his expense and that he could not understand why he was also billed by the township for removal when no service was given. Watson explained that in setting up districts there could be no discrimination concerning improved or unimproved land or between improvements of various types. In order to render collection service and to distribute charges fairly all ratables must be taxed regardless of the purpose to which the land is put, Watson said, and this ruling must stand. Wilson pointed out the parallel in school taxation.

An ordinance was adopted providing that a municipal court be established in the township to replace the recorder's court which is automatically terminated Dec. 31. The magistrate will be appointed by the committee for a term of three years and will exercise all powers conferred on him by the state as well as having jurisdiction over all matters governed by township ordinance. The salary will be \$500 per year. Watson pointed out that if such a court were not established locally all township cases would revert to county court with a subsequent loss of fine revenue as well as the added inconvenience to persons involved. Vendel Horvath submitted a question regarding the policy of committee appointment. Watson answered that the office was always filled by appointment although previously the appointment had been for a term of only one year. Attorney Pope pointed out that this was a statutory proceeding laid out in accordance with the state plan for reorganization of courts.

**Approve Lights**

A member of the committee, Russell Laird, reported that a meeting with members of the Public Service Corporation had been held and that the company had approved the installation of 26 lights throughout the township. This would be done shortly after the first of the year A

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letter was received from a resident concerning the lack of lighting on her street, but she gave no address. Committeeman Joseph Staudt was delegated to investigate, obtain the address and discover if this street was already covered in the present lighting additions planned.

The State Highway Department sent its approval for the partial estimate of improvements to Sec-

tion 6 of Cedar Grove Road in the amount of \$7,656.35.

Ralph Tompson inquired of the committee concerning work being done resulting in the tearing up of a portion of Easton Ave. Watson explained that the work was a part of an expansion project being undertaken by Public Service to increase pressure and give auxiliary gas service.

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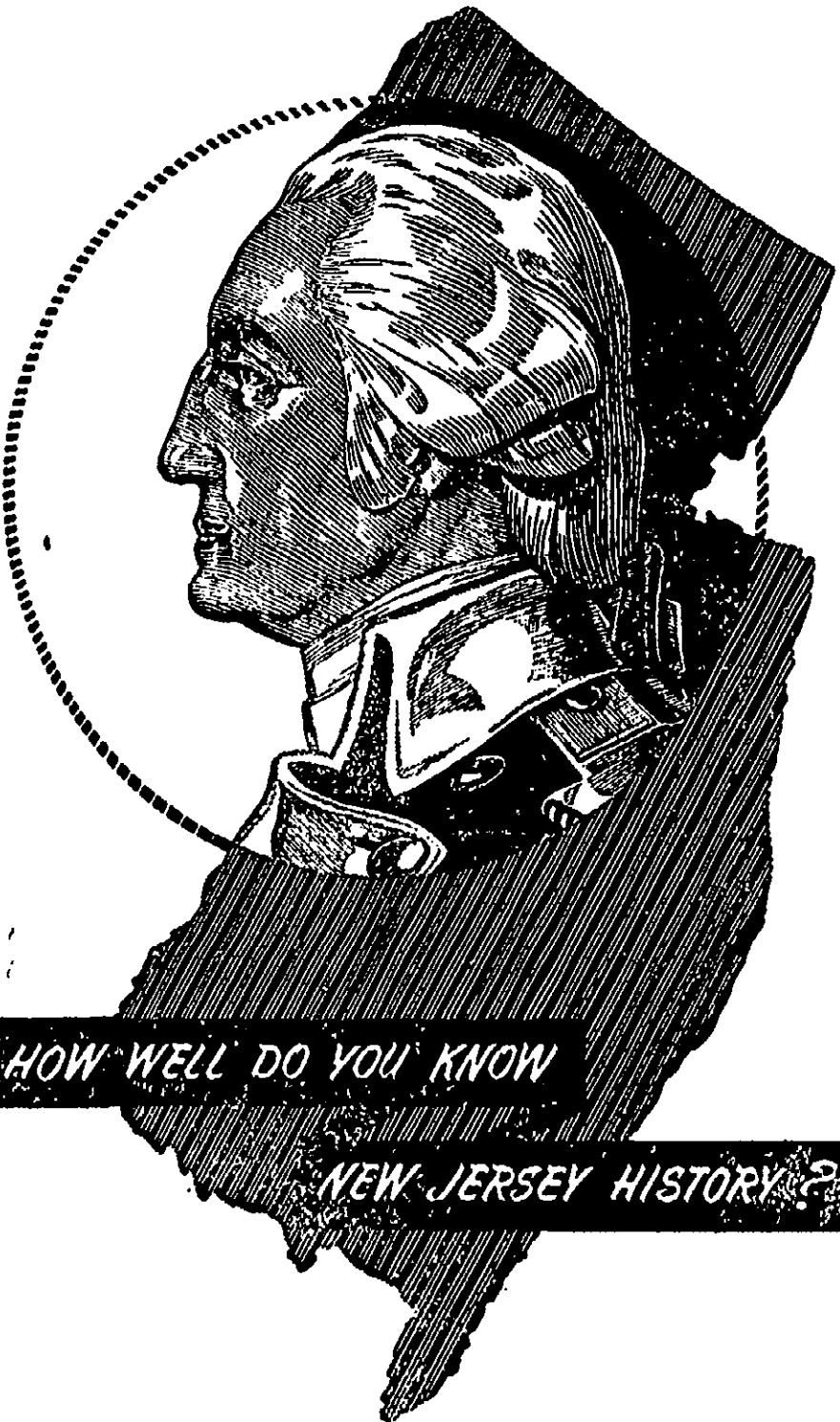
