Elections will be held in the polling places in the township from 4 p. m. to 9 p. m.

Candidates meetings will be held at the Franklin Park school January 24, at the Middlebush school February 1 and at the Pine Grove Manor school Feb. 7. All of the five candidates in the coming school election will speak. The public is invited to attend the meetings, which are being sponsored on a non-partisan basis by the five township Parent-Teacher associations.

Peoples Ntl. Bank Low Bidder On New School Bonds

The Peoples National Bank of New Brunswick submitted the low bid at the sale of \$170,000 bonds offered by the Franklin Township Board of Education to finance the cost of additions to the Hamilton St. and Kingston schools. The bonds will be issued at a rate of 2.30 percent, and will mature at \$170,233.96.

The five sealed bids opened at the meeting Monday evening included the following: B. J. Van Inden and Company, New York City, 2.375 percent, to mature at \$170,287.31; Julius A. Rippel, Inc., of Newark, 2.40 percent, \$170,678.78; J. S. Rippel and Company of Newark, 2.45 percent, \$170,319.60; J. B. Hanauer and Company of Newark, 2.45 per cent, \$170,467.67.

Two rooms completely equipped and certain alterations are planned at the Hamilton St. school. At Kingston four classrooms plus a teacher's room, nurse's room, janitor's room and boiler room are contemplated. These will form the first unit of a complete modern elementary school. Complete plans have been drawn up for the new school by Arthur N. Starin of Basking Ridge although funds are available for only the first unit. It is expected that this unit and Hamilton additions, will be ready for the September term.

from \$35,000 which the voters placed in interest paying bonds last spring and was earmarked for land purchase and building construction.

The Board failed to materially lower proposed expenditures for the coming year at a public budget hearing Jan. 17. A total reduction of \$4,000 was made leaving proposed expenditures at \$329,445 rather than the initial figure of \$333,445. The reductions were made partially in the current expense account and in part in the repair and replacement account. Of the reduction, \$1,000 appears in the current expense account through a cut of \$500 in Cafeteria allowance and an additional reduction of \$500 in general repair allowance. Current expenses stand at \$309,445 as compared to the original \$310,445 and repair and replacement estimate is \$20,000 as compared to the initial sum of \$23,000. It is proposed that this sum be absorbed by the transfer from the capital account. For this reason the repair and replacement account appears on the budget as \$5,000 rather than the actual proposed expenditure of \$20,000, although the board will be able to make \$20,000 worth of repairs.

Expect More State Aid
If both transfer and budget are approved the township must raise \$211,638 by direct taxation. If the transfer is not approved the township must raise \$226,638 by direct taxation.

The difference between this and the total is made up from state appropriations. If the budget is not approved the newly elected must draw up a new budget for approval of the voters within 15 days.

Vendel Horvath, board member, led the way in the attempt to reduce operating costs and made the original suggestion of transfer from the capital account in the amount of \$20,000. William Nulton questioned the action of placing the \$35,000 in capital account originally and stated that the board should have applied this money to the building account this year and reduced the amount required for the bond issue. Holmes Van Mater Dennis pointed out that no matter how the board temporized the action it was still designed to reduce apparent expenditure and lower the immediate tax rise. It was reasonable, he said, to use a small portion of this money to keep the tax rate from jumping too high this year but a cushion should be left against further tax rise and building program expansion in the future. Louis Hasbrouk, president of the board, stated that he felt the board morally obligated to use a portion of the \$35,000 but that the board must keep in mind that they would be faced with increased building which would probably reach a peak in 1953 when funds might be much more difficult to obtain. C. Rexford Davis then suggested the \$15,000 transfer leaving \$5,000 to be raised by direct taxation in the repair and replacement account. This was finally adopted after much discussion. It became apparent, however, that had the \$35,000 been applied to the \$170,000

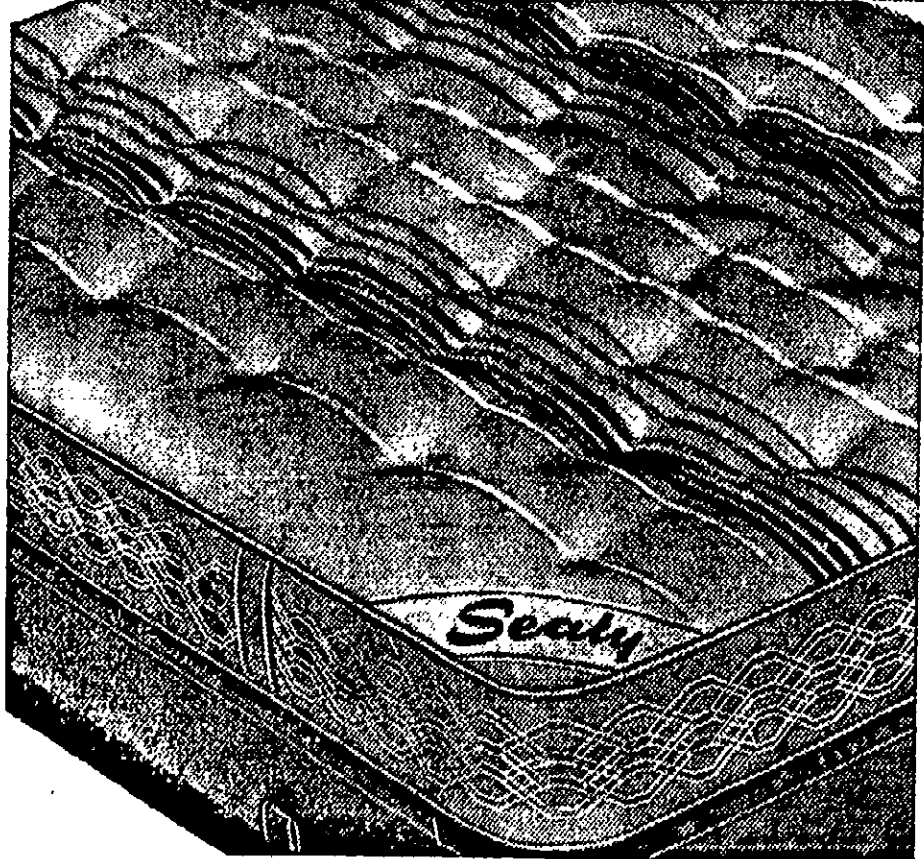

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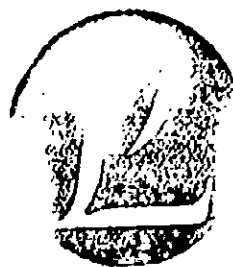

000 bond issue rather than having been held as a buffer it would have made a slight difference in the tax rate for the issue, reducing the 14.5 points to about 10 points, but would have left the tax rate for next year at about 440 points rather than effecting the present reduction of approximately 20 points. This will limit the rise to around about 85 points over last year, rather than the published 115.

Fred L. Bascom, board member, pointed out that if money was taken from surplus at this time the board could be criticised for using surplus to hold the budget down. Mr. Davis suggested that expenditure of the money would be along lines similar to capital expense and could be justified. Stephen Reid, tax assessor, made a report on township ratables showing that valuations had increased according to a trend explained by Hasbrouck. Ratables have risen from \$5,340,455 in 1946 to \$5,784,891 in 1949, an increase of about \$444,000 in four years. Hasbrouck pointed out that anticipated revenues will increase as more people move into the township.

A sharp discussion over the board's failure to meet the teacher's salary guide resulted in no increase on the budget allowed for this item. Davis reported that in all probability the teachers would receive the increases even though they did not appear in the budget because of an anticipated increase in state aid.

A report from the finance committee, which had been requested to investigate an apparent deficit in the cafeteria accounts brought to the attention of the board at the last meeting by Ralph Thomson, made clear that cafeteria accounts are in good order. The apparent deficit was in salaries of cafeteria workers and this will be covered by the end of the year with an expected \$200 profit. Mr. Horvath stated that the Pine Grove Manor cafeteria was a little behind at present but this was to be expected as they had just started and initial equipment expenses were high. On the basis of being self sustaining the cafeteria allowance was cut for the (coming) year.

Increases of allowance for nurses and athletic equipment were received with expression of appreciation from taxpayers present.

Questions, by Anatol Murad on the sharp increase in insurance rates were answered by Mr. Hasbrouck, who explained that the last survey had been made 10 years ago and that the bond issue had required a re-estimate of insurance. He pointed out again that children are not insured although a real trust and guardianship toward their safety is maintained by the board. George Cuddy, of the transportation committee, asserted that bus contractors carry liability insurance.

Judge Arthur Smith of Somerville appeared before the board to file with a complete copy of the executed bonding proceedings. He submitted letters of approval concerning the proposed additions to the township school's and suggested that the attorney of the board be authorized to issue contracts.

Mr. Bascom suggested the approval of alternate bids on the Kingston school boiler pending decision as to the length of time before the other three proposed units could be completed. Mr. Thompson suggested that insulation in the Hamilton school could be installed by school employees rather than being incorporated in the contracts for school additions as originally planned at less expense.

A letter or resignation from Goldie Klinger, manager of the Pine Grove cafeteria, was accepted with regret. The resignation of Mrs. Kay Woitcheck, school secretary was also accepted with regret.
