To the Editor:

At your suggestion made to our president, Mrs. Frances Smith Johnson, at the candidates' meeting held at the Middlebush school on the evening of Feb. 1st, I am writing to clarify some matters about which there seems to be some confusion.

Other people on hearing of our organization and expressing an interest in our program were asked to meet with us. At no time has our membership been closed.

A statement prepared by the Steering Committee during the early days of our organization expresses our purpose. "Dedicated to the task of bringing our schools up to date so that the children of our community may have the best education it is possible for us to provide."

Our interest in things educational is sustained throughout the year. We attend meetings of the Board of Education to find out what is being planned for our schools and to evaluate the members of the Board.

During the current school year we have sponsored two public meetings, one in the Middlebush school, and the other in the Franklin Park school. The Parent Teacher Association in both schools worked in cooperation with us to make both meetings a success. At these meetings, speakers of prominence in the educational world addressed the group. A third meeting to be held in the spring is now being planned.

In the Board of Education election of 1948 our group endorsed a member of the Board whom we felt should be returned to office and two other candidates whom we felt would add to the strength, efficiency and integrity of the Board and would represent various sections of the township. This year we have followed the same procedure. At no time either before or after election have we exacted promises or brought pressure to bear on any member

The B.E.A.A. is a non-profit organization made up of all employees of the Bound Brook plant with the purpose of fostering good fellowship, the enjoyment of amateur athletic activities, and recreation among members to promote the general welfare of employees. There are two industrial basketball teams, a men's and a women's Industrial Bowling team, and more than 30 inter-departmental teams active under B.E.A. A sponsorship this winter.

Because of an increased school budget and high costs for road materials, the Franklin Township tax rate for 1949 will jump an estimated 135 points - - from \$5.56 to \$6.91. The budget was introduced last night and will come up for a public hearing Feb. 24, at the Municipal Hall.

The new budget provides no increases under Salaries and Wages to officials or employees, according to the budget's explanatory statement. However, the amount to be raised for local purposes is \$104,000, as compared with \$79,000 last year.

The comparison with 1948 shows that school taxes are increased 91 points, while local purpose taxes rise 42 points. The county tax is increased two points, while the County Library Tax remains the same, three cents on every \$100 assessed valuation.

The Township Committee explains that the costs of materials and supplies, particularly on road maintenance, is increased sharply. The road program "will be vigorously pursued during the coming year", it was explained. The budget also includes \$3,500 for furtherance of the Water Project, a new appropriation.

Last year's budget totaled \$418,219.57, while for 1949 it is \$479,534.67. The amount to be raised by taxation has risen from \$311,622 in 1948 to \$395,891.

The estimated school budget for this year is \$245,483.30, while in 1948 it totaled \$186,213.90.

The appropriations for 1949 operations is \$146,700, as against an expenditure of \$103,361.74 last year.

Veterans' News

Privately owned pharmacies and those operated by Veterans Administration filled a total of some 4,000,000 prescriptions for veteran-patients during 1948.

About half a million of the prescriptions were filled by 25,000 privately operated pharmacies throughout the country, taking part in the VA hometown pharmacy program.

The remaining 3,500,000 prescriptions were filled by 333 pharmacies in VA hospitals, home and regional offices. VA pharmacies, in addition, supplied large amounts of routine medications to surgical and medical services in the hospitals.

The first specially designed home for a paralyzed veteran -

built with the help of a grant provided under Public Law 702 by Veterans Administration - is under construction and should be ready for occupancy sometime in the spring.

Its owner is Bernard Shufelt, 27-year-old veteran of Richmond, Virginia, who lost the use of his

legs in combat during World War II. He is president of the National Association of Paralyzed Veterans of America.

Selznick Releasing Organization, New York City, completed arrangements to give 16 and 35 millimeter first-run motion pictures, free of charge, to Veterans Administration hospitals and

homes in all parts of the country. F. R. Kerr, VA's assistant administrator for Special Services, announced.

The Selznick agreement - - first of its kind - - will save VA thousands of dollars. Other distributing companies charge VA specified amounts for films to be shown in its hospitals and homes.

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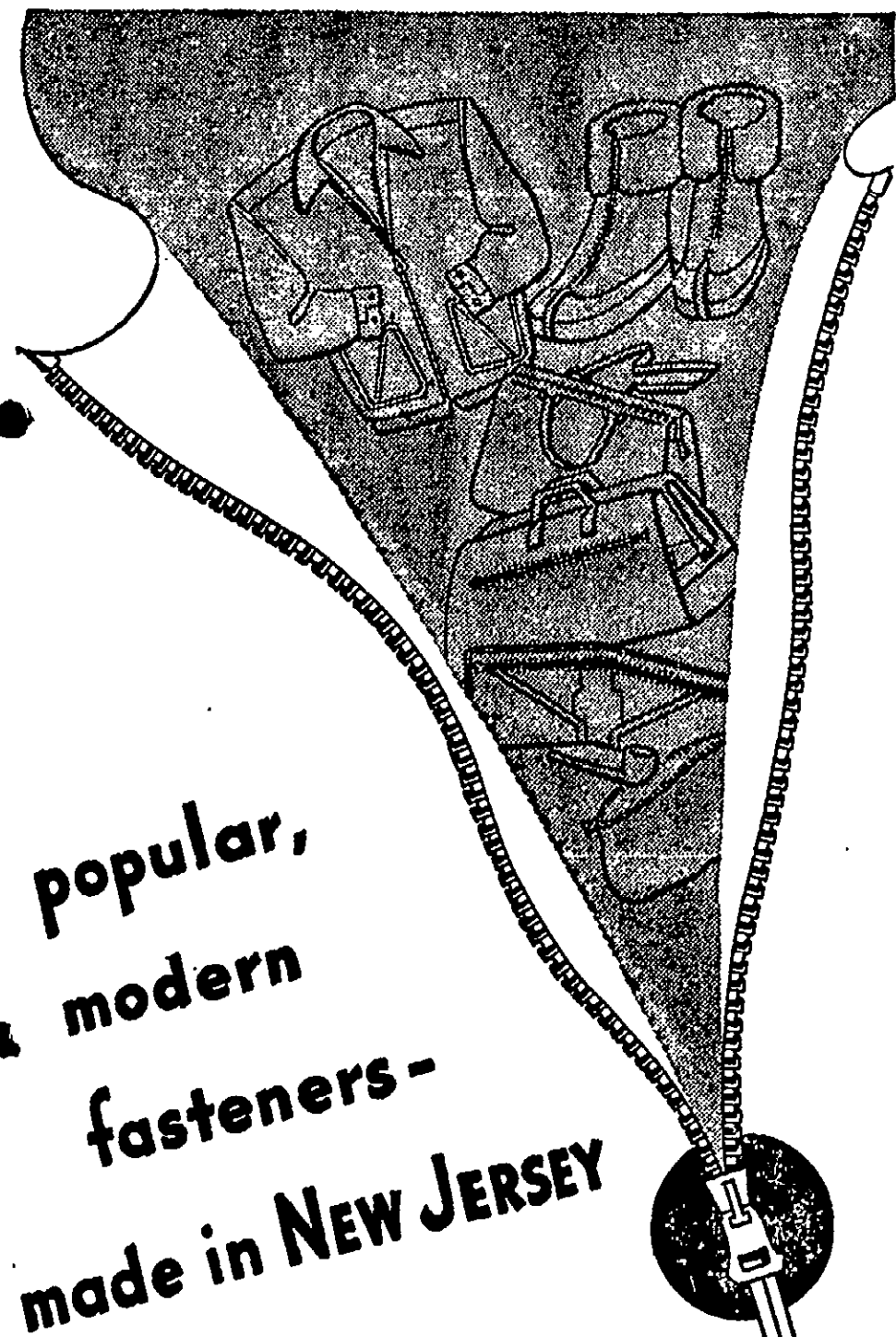
