

STULTS, CARR, KLINGER WIN

Tuesday's school board vote resulted in the election of Charles Stults, an incumbent, Walter Klinger and George Carr. Stults led all candidates by 370 votes. The election saw 1,214 ballots cast, a record number for the Franklin Township Board of Education. Stults received 1,027 votes.

Klinger was second with 657 ballots and Carr had 628. Close behind was Mrs. Doris Layton, who missed out by only 11 votes. She carried every district but her own by a substantial majority. Dr. Allan Boyden trailed Mrs. Layton by 65 votes, netting 552 out of 1,214 ballots.

The five candidates sought to fill three posts left vacant by the expiring terms of Louis Hasbrouk of Franklin Park, George Cuddy of Middlebush and Stults. Hasbrouk, who was president of the board, and Cuddy were not candidates for re-election.

Stults, a Kingston resident, has already served eight years on the board and has a commendable record for service and achievement. He sought re-election in "order to help finish construction projects already planned." He is active in his church, having served as trustee and secretary and

is presently treasurer.

Carr is a resident of the Pine Grove area. A machinist, he has been active in church organizations and Boy Scout work. He has asserted that his interest in the board is to have it give a reflection of public opinion rather than the views of any one minority group.

Klinger sought a place on the board "in order to assist in the constant improvement of the Franklin Township school system". He has been active as a volunteer fireman and has served his department two years as chief. The Rose St. resident emphasized at a candidates meeting held Monday evening at the Pine Grove Manor school that any persons or groups seeking to influence him after election should not vote for him, "I'll do what I think best," he said. Klinger is operations manager in a trucking company.

Voters approved the school budget in the amounts of \$206,638.30 for current expenses and \$5,000 for replacement and repairs to be raised by direct taxation. A transfer of \$15,000 from the capital account to the replacement and repair account was also approved.

Stephen Santo, 60, of Franklin Blvd., was located in a locked shack some three hours after he had been reported missing by his family last Tuesday afternoon. Land Zoning Change Agreed By Committee

The Township Committee acted last night to amend the ordinance proposed at the Jan. 13 meeting transferring 315 acres of farmland lying east of the Pennsylvania railroad tracks to a Class A residential district. The amendment will include a provision that about 20 acres of land immediately adjacent to the tracks be left in the agricultural district.

The ordinance was introduced at the request of the Planning Board as the final step in a long range plan to convert all frontage on Amwell Road to Class A. This last block will connect residential districts already established in the Middlebush area and the Lake Ave. area, and will permit the transfer of all frontage between Dahmer Rd., and Lake Ave., to a depth of about 300 feet to the Class A residential classification.

Minutes of the Jan. 27 meeting included a resolution that the township accept some of the responsibility of the improvement in the Franklin-Hamilton Homes development, specifically as regards sewers. A notation was made of the appointment of Helen Faxton as clerk to the Magistrate's Court.

The municipal budget, introduced at the Feb. 3 meeting is scheduled for a public hearing on Feb. 24.

The advisability of carrying workmen's compensation for volunteer firemen is under investigation. No report as yet has been made.

An inquiry was made concerning the possibility of developing township owned lands in the Franklin Park area for a recreational field, primarily for baseball. Committee chairman Joseph Staudt said that the committee would be in favor of such action, but that at present the township held no suitable land in that district. He described some land which had been considered for this purpose but added that it was under contract at present.

It was suggested that individuals be requested to loan unused land for this purpose. Committee-man Charles Gobac pointed out that such an arrangement could be made on a temporary basis, with uncertainty from year to year as to its availability. Staudt suggested that the Youth Guidance Council be approached for suggestions and help on this matter.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO LIMIT AND RESTRICT TO SPECIFIED DISTRICTS OR ZONES AND TO REGULATE THEREIN, BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES ACCORDING TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION AND THE NATURE AND EXTENT OF THEIR USE IN FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP, SOMERSET COUNTY, NEW JERSEY."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP AS FOLLOWS:

1. That Section II of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to limit and restrict to specified districts or zones and to regulate therein buildings and structures, according to their construction and the nature and extent of their use in Franklin Township Somerset County, New Jersey", adopted by the Franklin Township Committee on August 8, 1940, and the several amendments made thereto, be further amended as follows.

(a) By the removal of the following described tract of land from the Agricultural District and placing the same in Residence "A" District:

BEGINNING at the intersection of the Northwesterly line of Dahmer Road with the North-easterly line of the Millstone Branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad; thence running (1) North-easterly along said Northwesterly line of Dahmer Road, crossing Hamilton Street and continuing in a prolongation of said Northwesterly line of Dahmer Road to a point Twenty-five Hundred (2500') feet Northeastly from the Northeastly line of Hamilton Street; thence (2) Southeastly in a straight line, Forty-nine Hundred (4900') feet, more or less to the present line of division between the Agricultural District and Residence "A" District at the Northwesterly end of Kuhn Street; thence (3) Southwesterly along said division line between the Agricultural District and Residence "A" District, Fifteen Hundred (1500') feet, more or less, to the Amwell Road; thence (4) still Southerly crossing the Amwell Road along the present division between the Agricultural District and Residence "A" District and the line between the Agricultural District and the Industrial District to a corner thereof; thence (5) Westerly along said division line between the agricultural District and the Industrial District to Clyde Road; thence (6) Northeastly along Clyde Road, Two Hundred Sixty (260') feet, more or less, to a point distant Three Hundred (300') feet Southwesterly from the Southwesterly line of Hamilton Street measured at right angles therefrom; thence (7) Northwesterly parallel with the said Southwesterly line of Hamilton Street, Fourteen Hundred (1400') feet, more or less, to the Northwesterly line of the property of Arthur H. Stelts, being known as Lot 4-C in Section 34 as indicated on the Franklin Township Tax Map; thence (8) Southwesterly along the Northwesterly line of lands of said Arthur H. Stelts and through lands of the Estate of Morris Stotchik, deceased, to the Millstone Branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad; thence (9) Northwesterly along said Railroad to the Dahmer Road and place of Beginning.

2. That the map entitled "Zoning Map of Franklin Township, Somerset Co., New Jersey, 1947. Raymond P. Wilson, Township Engineer, 46 Paterson St., New Brunswick, N. J.," which map is a part of the above titled Ordinance as amended, be and the same is hereby revised and amended accordingly.

3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and publication according to law.
