

## E. Millstone Must Become Borough Or Consolidate With Franklin Twp.

Residents of East Millstone must decide whether they wish to incorporate as a separate municipality or return to the full jurisdiction of Franklin Township. The commissioners have called a public meeting for Monday evening in the Grange Hall, after being notified by the State Director of Local Government that East Millstone cannot continue its semi-dependent relationship with Franklin Township.

At present East Millstone is a town—the last remaining in the state—and the local commission handle street improvements and other local problems. Taxes, however, are collected by Franklin and returned on the basis of ratables.

The recent change in the Rar-

itan-Bridgewater situation—similar to East Millstone and Franklin—focused attention on the local problem and caused Walter R. Darby, director of local government, to issue word that the status must be cleared up.

Clarkson A. Cranmer, attorney for East Millstone, will be present at Monday's meeting to explain the present setup and the need for a change, as made necessary by recent decisions in the case of Raritan and Bridgewater. Joseph Weber, town auditor, will explain the financial structure. It is anticipated that a special election will be held soon to allow the taxpayers to decide whether to become a borough or to rejoin Franklin Township.

C. Rexford Davis was unanimously elected president of the Franklin Township Board of Education at the organization meeting Monday evening at the Franklin Park school. Dr. Davis, a Rutgers English professor, has served on the board one year.

The meeting was opened with Louis Hasbrouck, retiring president, in the chair. Mr. Hasbrouck extended his thanks for the splendid cooperation given him by the board and welcomed the newly sworn in members, George Carr and Walter Klingler. The regular order of business was postponed until Feb. 21.

Fred L. Bascom expressed appreciation of the retiring members. George Cuddy would be missed, he said, "for his patience and attention to detail." He stated that he had tried to persuade Mr. Hasbrouck to be a candidate for reelection in spite of the fact that he felt the system of rotation to be a good thing. He suggested that six years on the board might be the ideal period of service, combining the benefits of experience with the policy of distributing interest in school affairs among a wider group of people.

Mr. Bascom stated that he would not discuss his position on the board at this time although he would be glad to elaborate upon the subject if called upon to do so. He said he felt "we have a good school system in this township and that the schools were better each year." "I come with an olive branch and a proposal," he said, "to heal some of the differences we have had in the past few years."

"First of all I would like to make a series of statements. I want to withdraw from the board this year, the press of personal work is heavy and having passed my three score years I look forward to travel. I would like to nominate Dr. Davis for president of the board. I would like to resign before Feb., 1950, and we might also think ahead to the possibility of Sigurd Bervin not being able to fill his term because of illness. I should like to see elected to the board a farmer, a woman, and an executive in the near future to round out the personnel of our school board. By a farmer, I mean a man who earns his wages from the soil; and by an executive, a man who also has contacts with the general economic conditions of our country. Well respected and large people who have a past history of integrity and service to the community. Candidates for the vacancies shall not be as-

sociated with the Association for Better Government nor affiliated with officers at present in township elective offices. Perhaps an agreement could be reached, working through Mrs. J. J. Slade, Dr. Davis, and Mr. Hasbrouck. I have confidence in these people." He indicated that in this manner we could have a school board entirely free of political alliances.

"Perhaps you may feel that I have left myself wide open by taking this stand or gone entirely soft by bringing the issue into the open," Mr. Bascom continued. "However, I would like to bury the hatchet. We have plenty of work to do. We must consider the problems of a regional high school, our building program, and our tax base, constantly handicapped by a lack of ratables."

He made only one reservation. "If this is not played fair," he said, "I sometimes like a scrap, but for the sake of our schools and children I would like to see the hatchet buried." Bascom's suggestion would allow the selection of completely impartial candidates for vacancies on the board some time during the coming year, to complete his term and that of Bervin.

"I would like to nominate Dr. Davis as president of this board," he repeated. "He is a broad-minded man and an excellent influence. A year ago I started working with him with a chip on my shoulder. Davis was just too big to see it." The motion was seconded by several members of the board at once and Ralph Thomson moved that nominations be closed.

### Davis Takes Chair

Upon taking the chair, Dr. Davis thanked the men for their confidence in placing such a heavy load upon him when he had had only one year's experience on the board. Bascom was elected vice (Continued on Page 2)

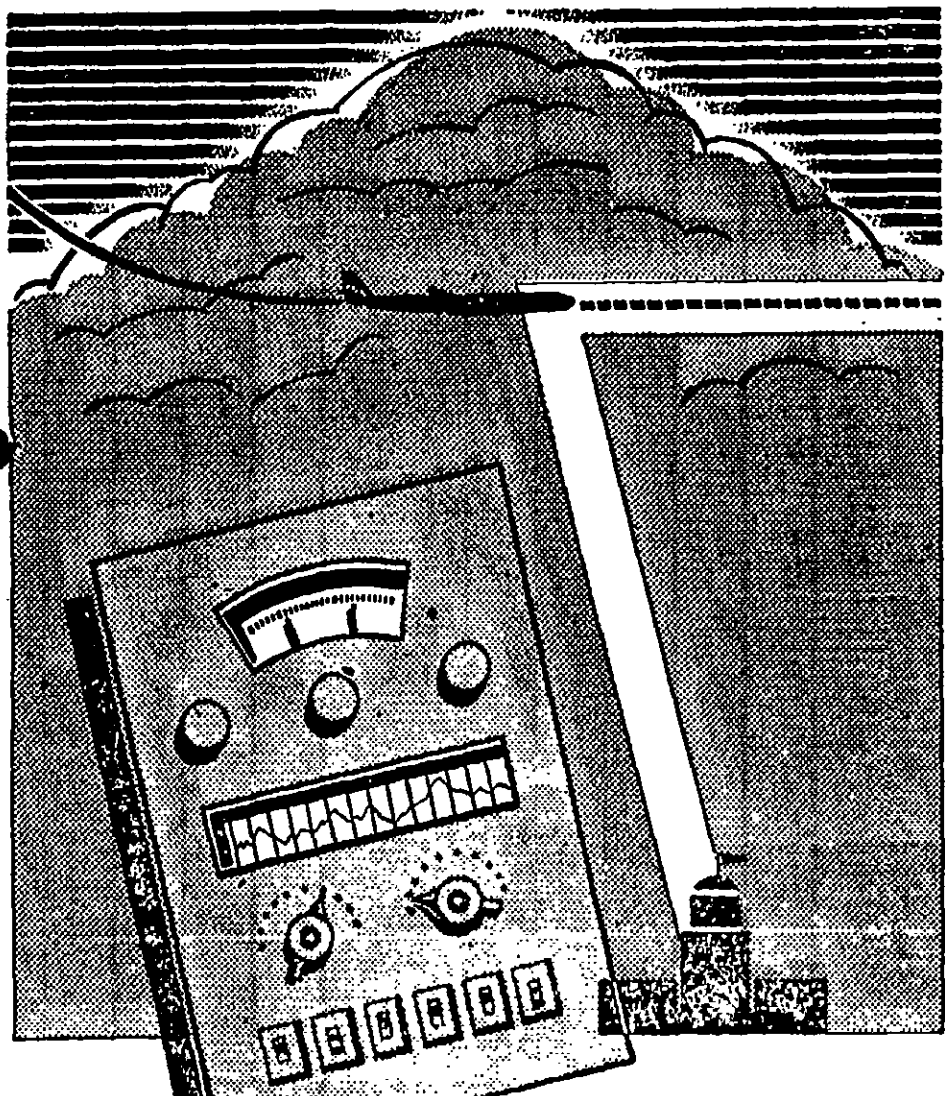

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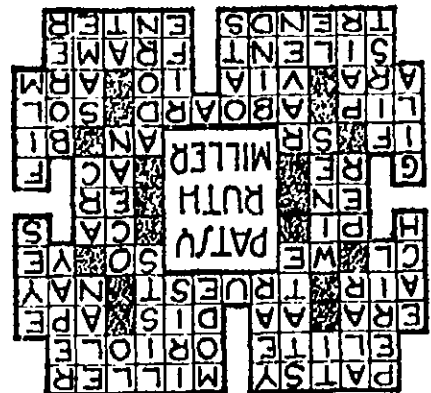

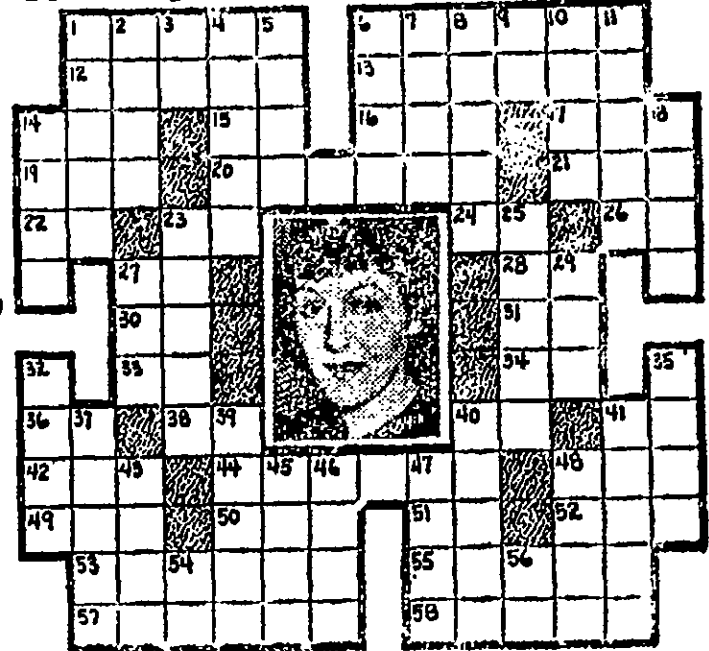
