All this is especially important . . . Please don't be responsible for the death of your own child.

PTA Group Says Carnival Is Too Close To School

The Middlebush P.T.A. joined Police Chief Edwin F. Voorhees in voicing objections to traveling carnivals locating here at a special meeting in the school Tuesday night, but for a very special reason.

The carnival, located this year in Franklin Boulevard for the first time, interferes with sessions at Pine Grove School which it adjoins, members charged, and for that reason should be protested.

Primary reason for the special meeting, however, was the installation of new officers and committee chairman.

New committee chairmen are: Health and summer round-up, Mrs. Yolanda Mangot; hospitality, Mrs. Stanley Crabtree, and Mrs. Robert Williams; membership, Mrs. Henry Bramman; international relations, Dorothy Hare; and parliamentary procedure and by-laws, Mrs. Lyle E. Hagmann.

Also, publications, Ms. Norman Christiansen; publicity, Mrs. Joseph Donahue; school education, Mrs. William Crownfield; ways and means, Mrs. John Kelley and Mrs. Clyde Tuckey; and playground equipment, Mrs. Louis Ciancia.

Mrs. Hubert Schmidt entered a motion proposing that Mrs. Robert Stiger, who has served for many years as teacher-principal of Middlebush School, be elevated to a position of full-time principal.

The motion was passed by the group and a committee was set up to place the recommendation before the board of Education after both Dr. James Lynch, supervising principal, and Mrs. Stiger have been consulted.

The plan was declared impractical, however, by Ralph Thompson, chairman of the school board's teachers' committee. He said that the board had already considered the action, but decided that it would not work well.

Mrs. Hagmann proposed that scheduled parent-teacher conferences replace report cards during a specified period each year. His motion was adopted as a means of securing closer relationships between parents and teachers.

Cars Collide Head-On

Fire Companies Defend Carnival

10-Year-Old Boy Drowns In Canal

The Delaware and Raritan Canal claimed its first drowning victim of the year late Monday afternoon when 10-year-old Joseph Scibilia, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Scibilia of 189 Hamilton St., entered the water against the wishes of his older playmates and sank out of sight. Efforts to revive the boy after grapplers had brought his body to the surface were declared futile when Dr. Benjamin W. Marino, of New Brunswick, pronounced him dead at 7:20 p. m.

Young Scibilia left his home at about 5:30 p. m. to go swimming in the canal. He was accompanied by three playmates, William Manning, 13, his brother, Roy, 9, and Robert Salasko, 10, all neighbors of the Scibilia's.

When the quartet arrived at the canal, the two older boys entered the water, but both admonished Joseph and Roy to stay on shore, according to township police.

Joseph, however, insisted he could swim and jumped into the canal before the others could stop him. He immediately began to sink. The elder Manning boy and Salasko saw his plight and tried to keep him above water as Roy ran for help but Joseph struggled so much that both had to release their holds for fear of being pulled down themselves.

Timothy Kane of 526 Easton Ave., rushed to the spot, near the New Brunswick city line, when alarmed by young Roy, but his many attempts to reach the boy were all futile.

Emergency Squad

Meanwhile his wife had telephoned the New Brunswick fire department and a four-man emergency squad was dispatched to the scene at 6:23 p. m. accompanied by the city ambulance. Firemen Matthew F. Fox and Edward Oakley grappled over twenty minutes from the squad's boat before the body was located.

After the lad had been brought to the surface, squad members, assisted by an unidentified nurse, worked 35 minutes with a resuscitator before Dr. Marino pronounced death.

The Community First Aid Squad and police officers Thomas Lee, Russell Pfeiffer, and Naman Williams stood by during rescue operations.

Dr. Edgar Flint, Middlesex County physician ordered the body removed to the Maher Funeral Home in New Brunswick.

The victim was a fourth grade student in the Lincoln school. Besides his parents, he is survived by a brother, John, and his grandmother, Mrs. Antonia Scibilia.

The funeral was held from the Scibilia home on Thursday morning with services at St. Peter's R. C. Church. Interment was in St. Peter's Cemetery under the direction of the Maher Funeral Home.

BOY HURT IN FALL

Theodore Dilley, Jr., 12, of East Millstone, was treated at Somerset Hospital for a deep laceration of his right forearm and released Monday.

The boy tripped while running and fell on a piece of sharp glass. He was taken to the hospital by the East Millstone First Aid Squad.

BAZAAR TONIGHT

A strawberry festival and bazaar, sponsored by the Ladies Auxilliary of the Millstone Valley Fire Department, will be held tonight from 7 to 10 p. m. at the firehouse on Market street.

Representatives of two township P. T. A. organizations and representatives of two township fire companies turned the Township Committee meeting Thursday into an open discussion concerning the ways in which the latter groups may raise funds.

"What's the idea of sponsoring a traveling carnival in this township? 'Why select a site which is right next to a school?' That was the substance of the P. T. A. protests.

"But can you tell us a better way to make money?" was the substance of the answer given by the fire companies.

First criticisms of the fire company policy which brings a traveling carnival here once each June came from Police Chief Edwin Voorhees, who went on record as being opposed to the shows on both personal and police grounds two weeks ago.

This week, the Middlebush and Pine Grove Manor P. T. A.'s made a public protest against the carnival, which is located on Franklin Boulevard on the grounds that it was too near the Pine Grove Manor school and served to disrupt classroom sessions there.

The P. T. A.'s sent delegations to the Committee meeting last night to further voice their objections, but when they arrived there, they were faced by representatives of both the East Franklin Township and Community Fire Companies, which are jointly sponsoring the World of Mirth show.

Open Discussion

President Alex Milchanowski of the East Franklin company said that the site selected was the only one available this year and turned the session into an open discussion when he declared, "Without the money realized each year from sponsorship of this carnival, our company would have to close down."

John H. Thompson of the Community company upheld Milchanowski's defense of the show, saying that other sources of revenue which the fire company can exploit are extremely limited.

Paper collections are no longer profitable, he said, and the possibilities of card parties and dances raising enough money to continue (Continued on Page 4)

Youth Succumbs To War Illness

Herman LeBavin Jr., only son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman LeBavin Sr., of Willow avenue, died Saturday morning after a long hospitalization for service-incurred illnesses contracted in 38 months overseas duty.

He was born January 1, 1924, in Englewood and joined the Army when little more than 18 years old, on March 1, 1942. He served with the combat engineers, receiving training in England, prior to duty in France and Germany, where he saw action in the Third Army under General George S. Patton Jr.

Following German capitulation, young LeBavin was transferred to Phillipine duty where injuries and the rigors of duty resulted in a nervous collapse from which he never fully recovered.

Immediately upon his discharge from the Army he enlisted in the Reserve Corps, but was prevented from taking an active part by his illness.

Services of the American Legion were held for the deceased veteran at 8 p. m. Monday at the funeral home of William A. Bradley, 345 Main street, Chatham. Burial Tuesday followed funeral services at the funeral home.

 After a reception at the Somerville Inn for 60 guests the couple left in a wedding trip to Canada

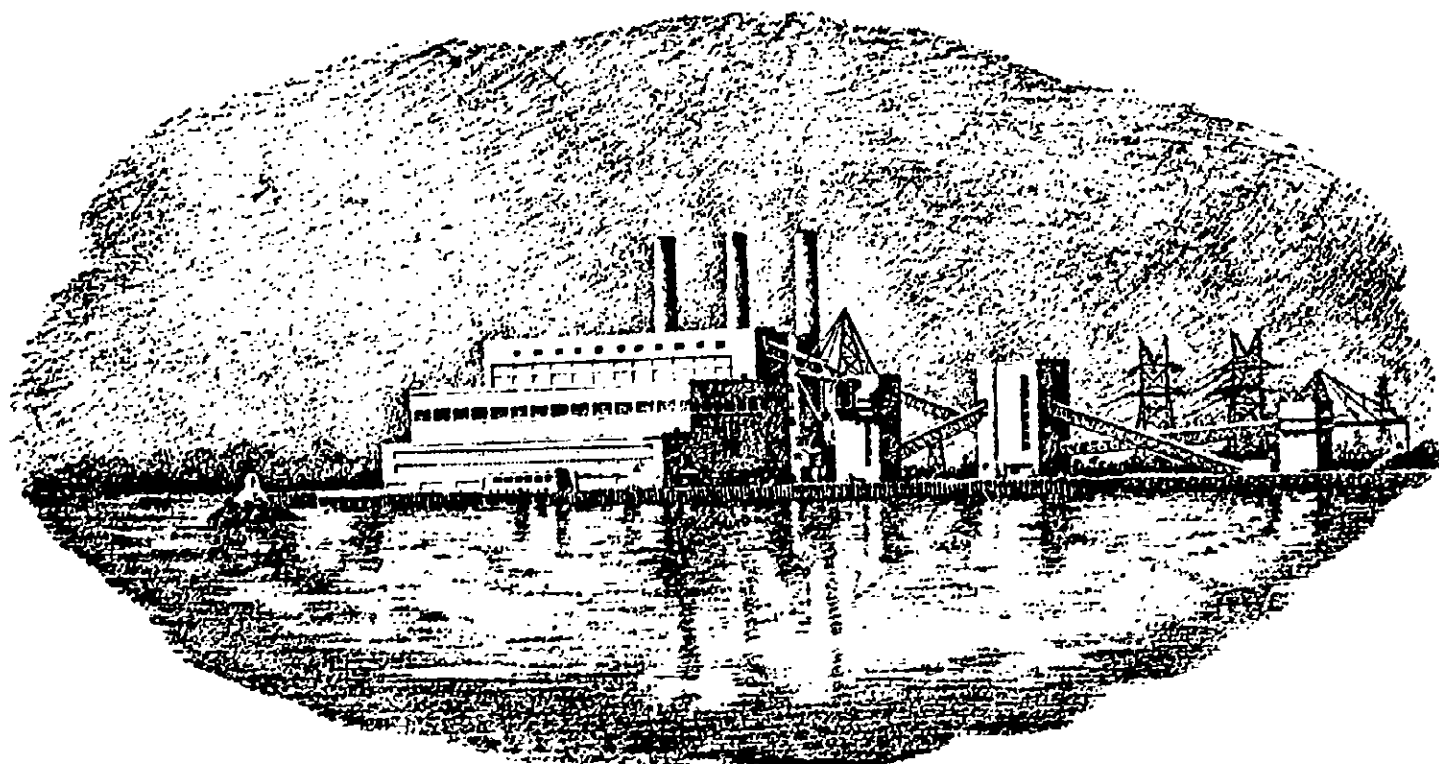
and on their return will reside in Franklin Park.

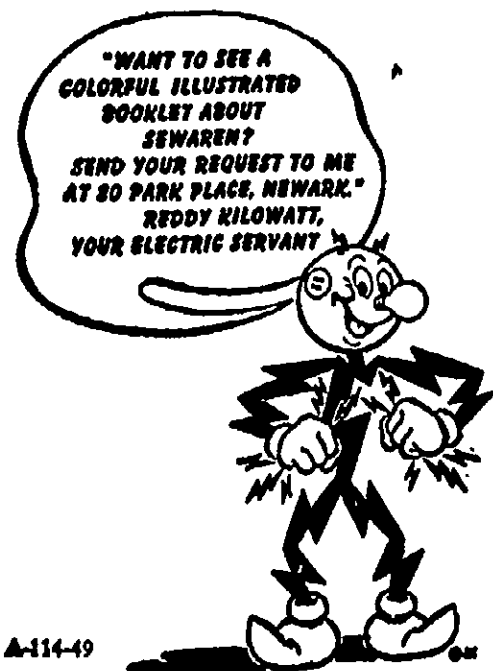

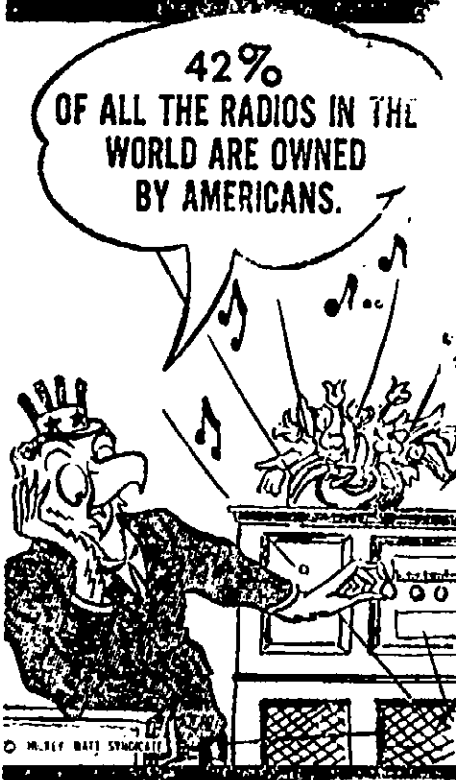

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE SUPPLYING OF WATER FOR PUBLIC AND PRIVATE USE"

Be it ordained by the Township Committee of the Township of Franklin, Somerset County, New Jersey:

1. That Paragraph 14 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Concerning the Supplying of Water for Public and Private Use" is amended to read as follows:

14 - The water rents for water supplied under this ordinance shall be in such amounts as shall from

time to time be fixed by Resolution of the governing body.

Said rental shall be paid to the Collector of Taxes of the Township and shall become due and payable on the first day of February, May, August and November of each year and shall draw the same interest as taxes upon real estate from the time they become due and shall be a lien upon the premises until paid and the Township shall have the same remedies for the collection of interest, costs and penalties as it now or may hereafter by law have for the collection of taxes upon real estate; provided, however, that the maximum amount of any such lien enforceable against any lot or parcel of said premises on which there is situate a single building connected directly or indirectly with a public water main shall not exceed the sum of thirty (\$30.00) dollars, exclusive of interest, costs and penalties for any one year.

2. This ordinance shall take effect upon publication after final reading according to law.

"These shows finance our safety," explained Milchanowski. "If we counted on contributions by township residents to our funds drive, there'd be no fire companies and

no fire protection for the West New Brunswick area".

The two fire companies both have headquarters in the Hamilton St. district, most heavily populated in

the township, and constitute the sole protection for that area. Both are volunteers organizations. They share in a flat guarantee paid by the carnival.

Township Committee Chairman Joseph E. Staudt said that the township can do no more than it is doing at present to aid the companies financially. "We are forbidden by law to tax for support of a volunteer organization, and the amount we can contribute is fixed by the state," he said.

The committee accepted resignation of Fred L. Bascom, a member of the traffic coordinating committee, organized last year. Walter Klinger was appointed to fill the post. He is at present chairman of the school board's transportation committee.

An ordinance was adopted limiting the size of a lien the township may enforce against an individual property in the veteran's cooperative development of Hamilton St. to \$30 for non-payment of water bills.
