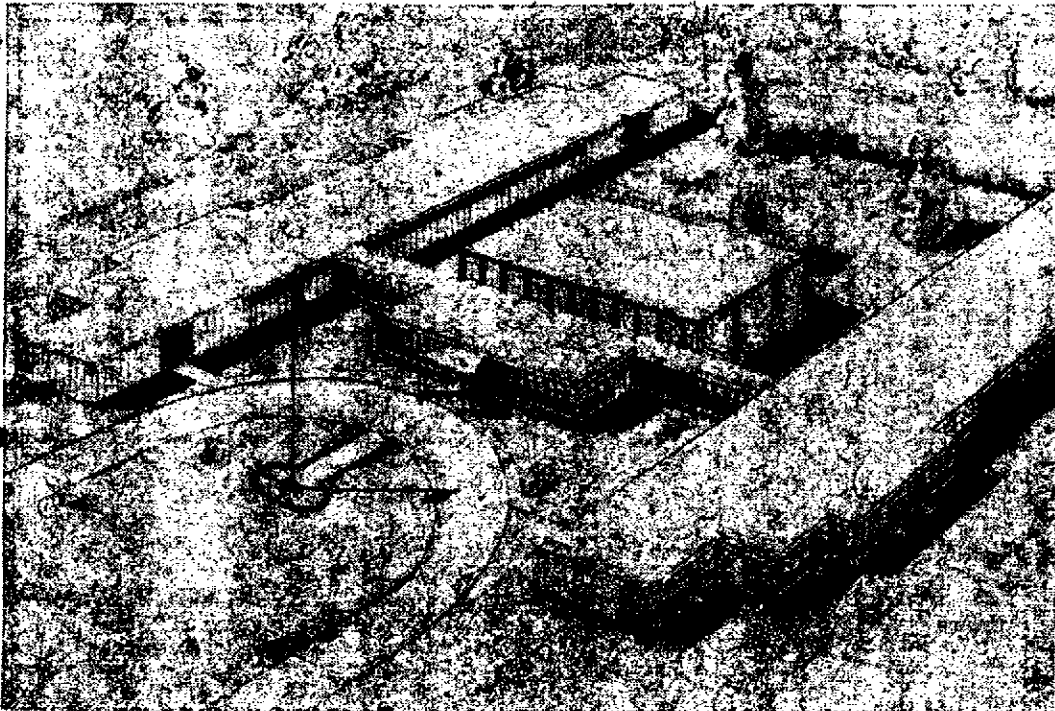


Long-Awaited View of Structo School



HERE IT IS—This architect's sketch of the much-discussed 21-classroom Structo school proposed for the township was presented to the Board of Education at its meeting Monday night by Micklewright and Mountford, architects. The new school, which would be ready for occupancy by Oct. 15, will be located on Elizabeth Ave. Board Presi-

dent Dr. C. Rexford Davis has reported that state approval of the Structo unit, first school to be built by that corporation, seems certain. However, voters must yet approve expenditures for the construction at a special election about March 1.

Name Board To Inspect Plumbing

A Board of Examining Plumbers, as provided in the new plumbing code adopted last December, was appointed by the Township Committee at a special meeting last night. The code goes into effect today.

George C. Hubner Jr., Answell Rd., Middlebush, is the new plumbing inspector, at a salary of \$1,200 a year. Hubner, a local plumbing contractor, took a course at Rutgers University last year which qualifies him to meet the state's requirements for filling the job. The ordinance which established the code provided for the following members of the board, who were appointed last night: the township health officer, Stephen C. Reid; one master plumber, Herbert Bakobrand; one journeyman plumber, William Buckelew; and two laymen, Edmund Jenkins and George Lettinger.

THE CODE specifies that all plumbing work except that done by a householder on his own property must be done by a master plumber, and all work must pass inspection.

Plumbing licenses are issued to master and journeyman plumbers on passage of oral and manual examinations, given by the examining board. Licenses must be renewed annually.

The code also sets up standards for plumbing installations and equipment in all construction done in the township.

Beate Feller Heads Dems

Sewerage Now Big Problem In Cutting New School Costs

Six To Seek 3 Bd. Seats

Miss Beate Feller, Lincoln Highway, was elected Democratic Municipal Chairman at a meeting of the committee held at Fairlawn Friday evening. She succeeds former Township Committeeman Charles Gobac, chairman since 1948.

Gobac sent his resignation to the meeting, but did not attend, as his position as alcoholic beverage inspector requires him to sever all connection with political activities. Miss Feller, who served as acting chairman during last fall's campaign and election, took over when Gobac was appointed to his new position last September. The action of the committee made it official and she will serve until the annual meeting of the municipal party committee, April 23.

Miss Feller is Democratic committeewoman for the first election district and served on the county registration committee last fall. She is a member of the Somerset County Young Democrats.

Miss Feller is an alumna of Douglass College and is employed as a research chemist at the Merck plant, Rahway.

"The only way to get the estimate for the new schools down below the million dollar mark safely," Dr. C. Rexford Davis, president of the Board of Education, told the RECORD yesterday, "is to be assured that there will be a sewerage system for the school to tie into at the Elizabeth Ave. location."

The Board of Education, at a special meeting this morning, set a total of \$988,000 for the bond issue to finance the new school building program.

A break-down of the sum follows:

1. Site cost on Elizabeth Ave. (property now owned by township), \$2,500.
2. Construction cost of Elizabeth Ave. School, \$575,315.
3. Site cost of Franklin Park School, \$12,500.
4. Construction cost of Franklin Park School, \$384,315.
5. Addition to Laurel Ave. School, Kingston, \$50,000.

The Board announced that the addition to the Phillips School cannot go on the bond issue for legal reasons, and will be paid for out of current capital.

build a housing project in the area does not get the sewer system in by Oct. 15, the date on which the Structo Corporation, probable builder of the new school, guarantees it would be ready for occupancy.

MAYOR JAMES C. MAHER, who has been quoted at different times as saying that the sewer system would be ready and that it would not, explained yesterday that the completion of the sewer lines depended entirely on the housing development builder. There is no assurance, he said, that the school will have a ready-made system to tie into.

At Wednesday night's meeting of the Board held in Pine Grove School, spectators waited over an hour while the board members and architect Alfred Micklewright thrashed out the question of being thrashed down the estimated cost of the school building program to less than one million dollars.

Sicora To Run for 2nd Term

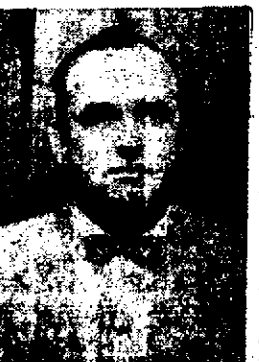
First hat to land in the local political ring is that of Township Committeeman Charles Sicora, who will seek a second term, he told the RECORD yesterday.

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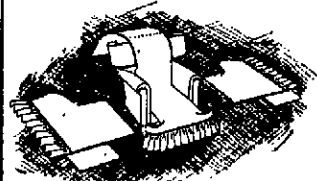

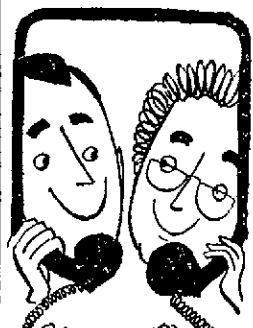

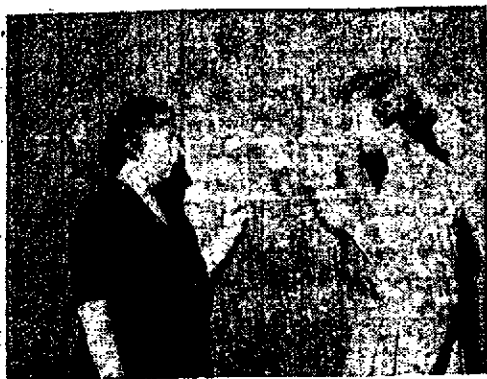

Members of the Lay Advisory Committee indicated they did not think the voters would support a building program which exceeded that figure, while board members were inclined to take the attitude that to cut out needed features of the schools just to knock off a few thousand dollars for the psychological value of getting below the million mark would be a false economy, and would not fool anybody.

BOARD MEMBER John Kelly refused to attend the closed meeting, and sat with the spectators in the meeting room while the Board, Advisory Committee, and the architect and his educational adviser conferred in the secretary's office.

"We should thrash this thing out in the open," Kelly told reporters. "What I have to say, I'll say to the entire gathering."

The Board came into the open meeting about 9 p.m. and discussed with advisory members the question of cutting down the contingency allowance from five to two per cent. Mickleweil insisted that below five per cent was unsafe with a construction job like that of Structo, which has not yet built a school.

The board could not legally vote on the figures which must be officially submitted to the State Department of Education in Trenton by Friday, because written notices had not gone out to all members. They scheduled a special meeting for 8 a.m. today to get the necessary legal vote taken.

ONE NEW FACT came out at Wednesday's meeting. Previously, the Structo Corporation had stated that if they had a contract by June 1, the new schools could be ready for use Sept. 1.

However, at the meeting, the date of Oct. 15 was given. This would mean that a changeover would have to be made during the school term.

Members of the Lay Advisory Committee had based their case for the use of the Structo construction on the arguments that schools would be ready for the beginning of the 1956-57 school year, and that the cost would definitely be below one million dollars.

DR. DAVIS told the meeting that with the additional school building aid which is slated to be passed by the State Legislature in February, the annual cost to the township for carrying the amortization costs of the building program will be only about \$22,000 per year.

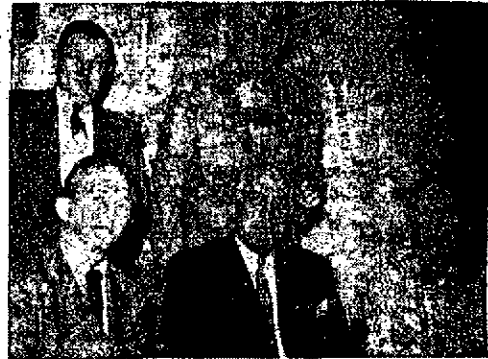
SPLIT SESSIONS in the schools have been necessary this year for the first time in the history of the township, and the Advisory Committee's building sub-committee, in the belief that speed in getting more school rooms was essential, recommended to the board last October that the Structo plan for a prefabricated steel school be investigated. Delays have been caused by the necessity to comply with state laws which require the employment of a state approved architect, and the taking of bids for construction.

Although members of the committee have strongly urged the use of the Structo system, several of the design sub-committee's members appeared disappointed when at Monday's meeting they asked if they might assist in determining the set-up for the interior of the building, and found that with the prefabricated school, the dimensions of the rooms were predetermined.

ONE MEMBER attempted to charge that the committee had never recommended Structo to the board, but Harry Golden, chairman of the building sub-committee, asserted that the committee had most definitely recommended Structo on several occasions.

Following Monday's meeting, the board and members of the Advisory Committee attended a hearing before the State Department of Education, setting forth in general terms the nature of the plans, which call for a 21-room elementary school on Elizabeth Ave., a 10-room elementary school at Franklin Park, and the addition of rooms at the Kingston and Phillips schools.

Dr. Davis said, following the state meeting, that there was little doubt that the State Department would approve the project and give permission for a bond vote which can be placed before the voters in a special election on Mar. 1.
