## Voters Will Face Big Choice Of Candidates, Bigger Budget

Township residents will have to choose three Board of Education members from a field of seven candidates at the School Election Feb. 14. They will also be asked to vote on the largest school budget in township history—\$343,331. The budget was adopted unanimously by the board Monday night at a public hearing in Middlebusch School.

Brief sketches on the seven candidates follow:

Walter F. Campbell, Easton Ave. resident of township five and a half years. Married, five children, one a Pine Grove graduate, two in township schools, two preschool. Chairman of the Lay Advisory Committee, former member of Pine

Grove PTA, and a committeeman for Boy Scout Troop 9 in New Brunswick. Member of New Brunswick Rotary Club. A graduate of Metuchen High School, he has a BS from Rutgers, and has taken post-graduate courses in business administration and economics. He is now a business administration officer at Rutgers and manager of the bookstore. He was formerly employed by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., and as district sales manager for the Kelly Springfield Tire Co. He served in the Army five years during the war, as a company commander, 1st Infantry, in North Africa, and later on the commanding general's staff at Camp Gordon, Ga. He was decorated with the silver star medal and was discharged as a major.

Lyle Hagmann, Amwell Road, Middlebusch resident of township since childhood. Married, his wife teaches at Pine Grove. Three chil-

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## Campbell Only Candidate Still On Lay Group

Three members of the Lay Advisory Committee, who are candidates for the Board of Education, have resigned from the committee, while a fourth feels that he should retain his position on the Lay Advisory group until elected to the board. The school board election is scheduled for Feb. 14.

Mrs. Muriel Vomacka, Lyle Hagmann and Joseph Takacs told the RECORD Wednesday evening that they felt they could run for the board with no strings attached if they severed connection with the Lay Advisory Committee. They all agreed that they would rejoin the committee if not elected to the board.

Walter Campbell, the fourth Lay Advisory member and chairman of the committee, told the RECORD that he takes the opposite view.

"There is no reason why one should not be both a candidate for the board and a member of the Lay Advisory Committee. Of course, if I'm elected to the board, I'll resign from the committee. In fact, I feel that when the new members of the board take office, the entire Lay Advisory Committee should resign and let the new board appoint its own advisory committee, just as the present board appointed the present committee.

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## School Bond Issue Given Final OK

Dr. C. Rexford Davis, president of the Board of Education, reported that the State Division of Local Government said that the township would receive approval to put to public vote a referendum calling for the expenditure of \$398,000 for 120 new elementary schools.

In a brief formal hearing in Trenton yesterday, the board president, who was accompanied by Township Attorney Robert E. Gannon, received the assurance of the state body that the referendum could be held March 1.

Approval for the referendum comes hard on the heels of the adoption by the township board of the highest school budget in local history—\$343,331. The budget was adopted by the board at a public hearing Monday. It will be voted upon by residents at the school election Feb. 14.

The amount of money to be raised by taxation for the school budget this year will be \$815,210.29, as compared with \$483,707.38 last year. If no additional state aid is provided for schools, the budget will mean a tax rise of between 133 and 140 points.

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## 7 School Candidates Raise No Issues At PTA Forum

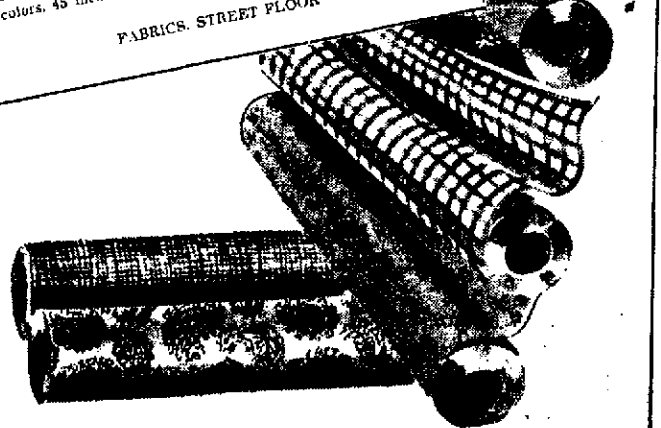

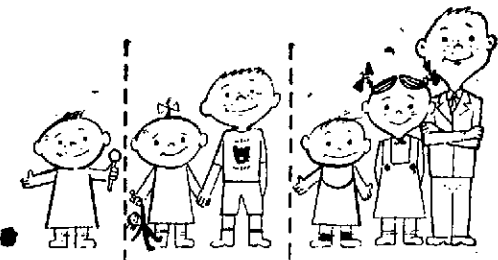

end of it. Township Attorney Robert Gaynor doesn't think Franklin would be applying for any of those 35,000 dwelling units under the new law, but would apply under the old law which expires June 30.

The low cost housing could be built either with federal funds or with a federal mortgage guarantee. Slum clearance and low cost housing go together, and one of the jobs of the authority would be to determine what areas should be cleared out, then move to purchase or condemn the sub-standard areas. Frequently such land should not be used again for residential purposes, but is better adapted for industrial or business development.

It would be the job of the authority to set eligibility requirements for living in the housing developments, as to income, length of residence in the township, etc. There would have to be regulations stringent enough to make sure that bona fide township residents were provided with homes instead of letting outsiders move in and take them over.

That straw hat which has been parked on the hat rack just inside the door of the meeting room in township hall for the last five months belongs to Bob Gaynor. Good place to keep it through the winter months.

Wednesday evening was a two-ring circus in Middlebush, what with the PTA candidates' meeting going on at the school and the Planning Board holding forth across the street. Not being twirled we had to get a friend to take notes at the school, while we were sitting in at township hall.

be large enough, so that many of the homes in the area could tie into it, but they would have to do so at the owner's expense. He said that the Board would bring to the attention of the Township Committee the sewage situation involved, but has not the authority to construct sewers.

ABE SIMON, Plainfield developer planning a housing project Somerset Mills, in South Bound Brook, presented to the Board a map for the first section of his development.

Approval of his plans was made conditional on his complying with four regulations:

1. He must post a bond covering cost of streets, curbs and gutters, storm sewer and monuments, total to be \$87,302.30.

2. He must pay inspection fees on the ground preparation.

3. He must fulfill his original agreement to deed to the school board eight acres of land for a park.

4. He must present an enforceable guarantee by the Bound Brook Water Company to lay water mains to supply the development.

It was announced that the March and April meetings of the Planning Board would be held on Tuesday instead of the usual Wednesday because members of the Board are taking courses in planning at Rutgers on the regular meeting nights.
