## Township Boy, 9, Struck by Car

### Indict Twp. Man, 22, On Rape Charge

Somerset County Grand Jury returned an indictment on a charge of statutory rape against William G. Tamm, 22, of Willow Ave., Franklin, Friday.

Tamm was arrested only the day before in Bound Brook and charged with raping a 15-year-old girl. The offense allegedly took place April 26 in Somerville.

The township man was arraigned before Magistrate John H. Bookman in Somerville and is presently confined to the county jail.

Tamm's older brother, Donald, is serving a sentence in Bartentown Reformatory on a charge of statutory rape. He was convicted in January, 1955, by a jury in Somerset County Court.

Your Townner journeyed to Princeton yesterday with Emily Slade to attend a luncheon of the alumni of Tulane University, in honor of the founder, Paul Tulane. Seems Paul Tulane was quite a character. He gave his money to found a university in New Orleans, where he made the money, because he thought his home town of Princeton hadn't done right by him!

But he came back to Princeton to live in his later years, mostly for the fun of feuding with the Presbyterian Church, to which he contributed liberally. Once when the church needed money to pay off the mortgage, he gave them a check for the whole amount, written "To the old old Presbyterian Church." P.S.—They cashed the check, but the records don't say how it was endorsed.

Tulane, who was a bachelor, died in 1887, aged 86, and is buried in the Princeton Cemetery. The old grounds, after lunching at the Nassau Tavern, walked down to his grave and placed a wreath on it. He was buried, by his own request, with his back turned on Princeton, and his statue faces away from the town, the church and the university. ## Township Warned On Future Zoning

The Township Committee disposed of its business and heard a number of inquiries and complaints from citizens in 45 minutes flat last night. Financial reports for April were given by the treasurer, Mrs. Alice Hacaman; the clerk, Fred Bascom; and Committeeman Charles Sleara.

A LETTER was read to the committee from Alex Katchen, president of Irvington Steel Co. and a member of the Board of Adjustment. Katchen recommended that the Township Committee take a number of steps to insure orderly development of the township. His recommendations were:

1. That the township carefully scrutinize future applications for housing developments to be sure that they meet the highest standards for safety and public health.
2. That the township reserve a strip 1,000 feet wide along the entire length of the Lincoln Highway for a research park and pilot industries.
3. That the Planning Board meet with the boards of North Brunswick and South Brunswick Townships to coordinate zoning regulations along the Lincoln Highway.
4. That the land along the Raritan Canal be held for a research park area.
5. That steps be taken to assure the township adequate entering and exit roads connecting with the proposed East-West Parkway.

PLUMBING Inspector George Hubner reported receipts of \$348 for inspections during April, and \$548 for 44 permits. He received eight applications for master plumbers' licenses, and said that examinations for plumbers' licenses will be held each Monday evening. Committeeman Charles Jackson reported that he had met with the freeholders in an effort to work out means for improving the township garbage dump. He suggested the running of a storm sewer on Highland Ave. and covering over the stream which runs through the dump.

James Perri asked the committee to take some action about the speeding on Hillcrest Ave. and said that a child had narrowly missed being hit. There was some discussion about the establishment of speed limits on township streets which are not maintained by the county or state.

Mayor James Maher told Perri the committee was ordering play street signs. Perri suggested that idle land in the area be mowed and put in shape as play space to keep the children off the streets.

SEVERAL MOTHERS, accompanied by their young children, were at the meeting to complain about speeding on DeMott Road. They were promised that the police would keep watch for speeders.

Perri and Edward Gillum questioned the work of the new assistant. (Continued on Page 8)

The FRA announced that the competition will include wives of Navy enlisted men stationed all over the world.

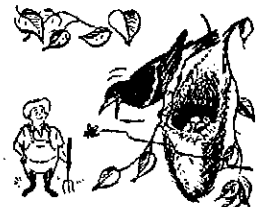

**BIRDWATCHERS**, naturalists and farmers are quick to praise the oriole. Naturalists and birdwatchers are interested in the bird and in its nest, which is considered a masterpiece of building. It is a hanging nest, deeply pouched, securely woven from string, milkweed fibers, bark, and



neatly lined with cotton, fur, hair and fine grasses. Farmers and gardeners like orioles because they feed almost exclusively on insects, especially caterpillars, and devour a great variety of destructive insects.

The umbrellas — and parasol — date back approximately three thousand years. They were used in Egypt in 1100 B.C. Umbrellas originally were used as a protection against the sun. First use of them to keep off the rain, is said to have been in 800 by the bishop of Salisbury, England. They were not generally employed for this purpose until many centuries later.

## Correct Addresses Vital, State MV Division Warns

The importance of correct addresses for driver licenses and vehicle registrations under the new motor vehicle licensing system was stressed today by Motor Vehicle Director Frederick J. Gassert, Jr.

**ANXIOUS TO AVOID** some of the problems that hampered the smooth operation of the recent conversion program, many of which were the result of failure of motorists to report address changes, Director Gassert reminded motorists that a state law requires such changes to be reported within a week.

"Non-compliance with this statute may result again in the delayed delivery of pre-prepared renewal applications for both driver licenses and car registrations. These applications will be mailed each month to motorists in plenty of time for them to either dispose of the matter by mail, or at a motor

vehicle agency," said Director Gassert. A change of address can be reported by mail to the Division of Motor Vehicles in Trenton, or at any motor vehicle agency. In notifying the division of a change, the individual should give his full name, new and old address, driver license number, and license plate number.

**PERSONS LIVING** in townships and on rural mail routes are advised to check their licenses and note that they contain a proper mailing address. During the re-

cent conversion months, many applications and licenses were returned by the postal authorities because of incomplete rural mail route delivery information, and also because they contained only a township address.

There are several townships in New Jersey bearing the same names, and this situation makes it difficult for the postal authorities to pin point the exact location of a township given on a license or application form. Motorists residing in townships should give the name of the post office where their mail is to be delivered.

## Your Garden

Spring is the season to plant holly, but don't be satisfied with just any old holly. Seedlings from the wild are a gamble in more ways than one. It's best to go to some nursery that more or less specializes in holly, and buy a small plant that has been propagated by a cutting from a parent plant that has superior growth habits, leaves and fruit.

A small plant from a cutting should begin to bear when it is three or four years old, while a seedling will often be five or more years old before you will even

know whether it is a female plant that can bear fruit or a male plant that only supplies pollen. The only sure way to tell male from female is by the flowers.

For your plant to have fruit, it must be a female and there must be a source of pollen on a male tree somewhere around. You might want to plant a male tree on your own place, but there may be one near you that will serve. Bees will carry pollen for several blocks in a city. In an emergency you can cut twigs from a male tree at blooming time and place them in water near the fruit-bearing tree.

The worst pest of holly is the leaf miner. The native miner makes thread-like burrows and the European, a broader tunnel. These tunnels become yellowish and disfigure the leaves. The surest way to control this pest is by preventing egg laying.

Usually in late April or early May, the adult flies emerge from the pupae in the leaves, about the time two or three leaves have formed.

At this stage of growth, the best control seems to be to spray with DDT, either as the 50 percent wettable powder or the 25 percent emulsion prepared for use on plants. (Some prefer lindane or malathion.) Dilute according to the manufacturer's directions, and spray thoroughly, especially the underside of the leaves, where the

is the need for shopping around to compare styles and values to suit your requirements best.

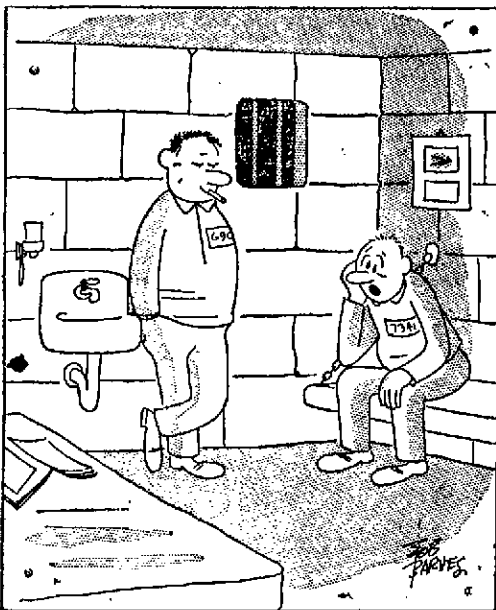
"Remember, that an extensive wardrobe is not needed at this time, but wise choices should be made so that it is well coordinated and wearable.

The Chief of each of the Volunteer Fire Companies located within the boundaries of the Township of Franklin, or any member of said Fire Companies duly authorized by said companies to act in place and stead of the Chief, and other companies are known as Community Volunteer Fire Co., East Franklin Volunteer Fire Co., Franklin Park Volunteer Fire Co., Griggstown Volunteer Fire Co., Kingston Volunteer Fire Co., Little Rocky Hill Fire Co., Middleburgh Volunteer Fire Co., Millstone Valley Volunteer Fire Co., and the 11th District Volunteer Fire Co., and each of them are hereby authorized to inspect and to cause regular inspections to be

made of all business, premises and properties, excepting only the interiors of multiple dwellings, placed, located within the Township of Franklin, for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be executed any conditions liable to cause fire.

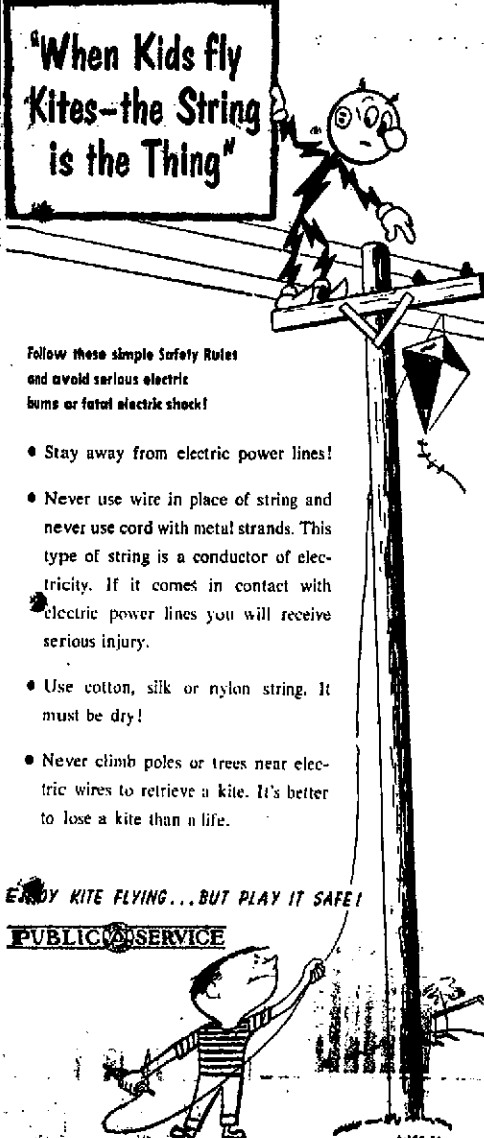
