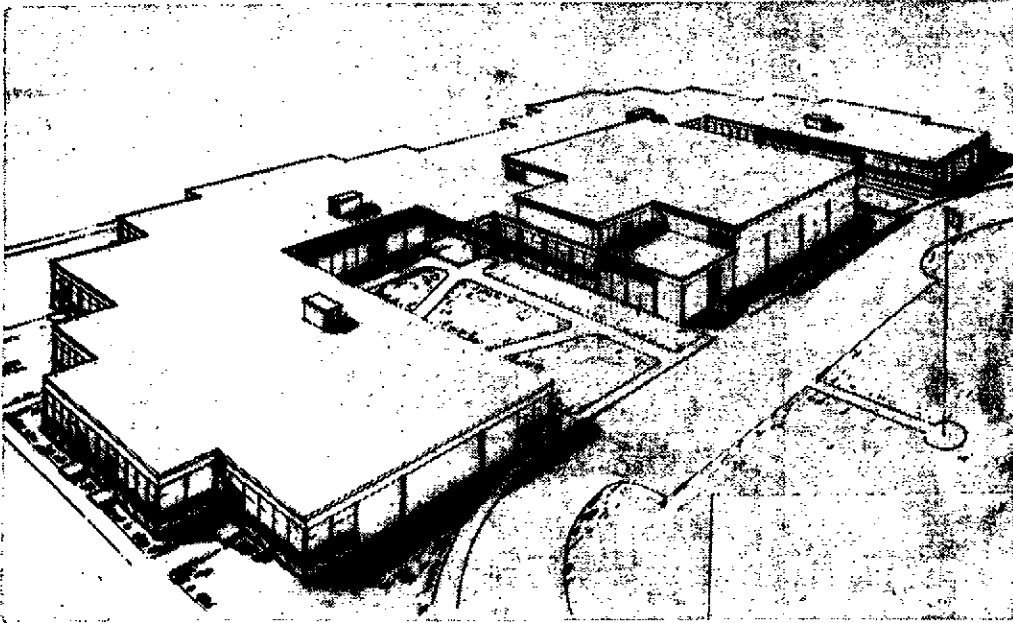


Structo's Newest School Proposal



REVISED PLANS of proposed new 20 classroom school for Franklin Township. The new design was submitted by Structo Schools Corp. of Boston, Mass. at the invitation of the Franklin Board of Education Tuesday as an alternative to original plans on which satisfactory bids could not be gotten. Township Talk

It wasn't made quite clear why the Board of Education had their Structo conference in an open meeting and their conference with the architect on conventional construction in a closed one.

Members of the Lay Advisory Committee conferred with the Structo officials for about 45 minutes in the hall after they left the Board meeting Tuesday evening.

Structo Can Handle Job For \$850,000 by Slicing Five Rooms from Project

It would be possible for Structo Schools Corp. of Boston to build the two proposed Franklin Township schools for \$850,000, but some changes in the original plans would have to be made. Leonard Bardsley, president of the township Board of Education, announced at a special meeting Tuesday in Pine Grove School.

Those changes would include the 10-room Franklin Park school being shaved off to eight rooms, the 21-room Elizabeth Ave. school cut to 19 rooms, one multi-purpose room left out and structural changes to be made to keep the cost within the bond issue.

Other items involved must also be considered, Bardsley said.

2 Fish Cost City Man \$45

J. D. Crawford of 14 Welton St., New Brunswick, paid \$40 and \$5 costs in Franklin Township court Monday night for two "expensive" fish and didn't even get to keep them.

He was charged by fish and game warden Robert T. Troits with having in his possession two largemouth bass, both fish measuring less than 12 inches in length. Crawford exclaimed, "I didn't know what they were, but I had two fish."

Her case was referred to the probationary department for the charge of driving without a license.

Richard Lane, 25, of 75 Remsen Ave., who allowed the 16-year girl to drive his car because she had shown him a drivers permit, which he believed was hers, was found innocent and the charge against him of allowing an unlicensed driver to operate his car was dismissed.

Residents Register Complaints

Following a brief business session, the township committee took a two-hour pounding last night from dissatisfied citizens, most of them from the east end of the township.

The question of alleged zoning violations by J. T. Thompson in his building supply business on Hamilton Road was debated with the committee by Mr. and Mrs. Michael Molchan, whose home is next door to a building recently erected by Thompson, and by Michael Lisi. Thompson was recently fined in municipal court for building without a permit.

THE MOLCHANS claimed that it had taken them six months to get Thompson served with a summons, and that he was given a building permit while waiting for his violation trial to come up. They also claimed that they were put under pressure by members of the committee to prevent their getting a lawyer, and that Mayor James G. Maher, who was absent from last night's meeting, had told them that the wall Thompson had erected on their property line would beautify their property.

This wall, which was started as a fence, they said, was converted into the side of a building, and that while Thompson was fined for putting it up, he was still allowed to leave it there. The committee took the complaint under advisement.

Structo-proposed buildings would be discussed.

MEETING IN CLOSED session last night, the board was slated to listen to its architect, Albert Micklewright of Micklewright and Mountford of Tronton, give estimates on classroom needs in terms of conventional construction.

With facts on the two types of construction, the board will consider with which to proceed.

Tuesday's meeting in Pine Grove Manor School was held so Structo could submit a proposal on the two schools that would fall with-

in the limits of the \$998,000 bond issue by voters earlier this year. Bardley explained that when various items, other than the actual buildings, are taken into consideration, the board would have only \$739,635 for the two structures. Other expenses which must be covered by the bond issue include \$50,000 for alteration work at Kingston School, \$66,026 for furnishings and fixtures, \$49,401 for architect fees.

If Structo's proposal is accepted, the reduction of the rooms in the two schools would have to be made. Since one of the two multipurpose rooms at Elizabeth Avenue school would have to be dropped, lunches would have to be

served in three sittings for the anticipated enrollment of 450.

AS FOR THE structural changes, inner curtain walls would have to be constructed of cinder block instead of steel, Bardley said.

He also said that savings resulting from the changes would be roughly as follows: elimination of the multipurpose room, \$50,000; elimination of the interior curtain walls, \$26,000; elimination of two classrooms at Franklin Park, \$40,000, and elimination of one room at the Elizabeth Avenue school, \$20,000.

The board president said the third classroom could be bid on as an alternate. If, as Structo officials believe, the estimates are too high, the alternate might be accepted, all within the total of the bond issue.

Officials of Anderson-Nichols, parent company of Structo, believe that \$24,000 can be knocked off the total with the submission of "more realistic" bids, said Bardley.

"They felt it is a 2-1 gamble, the board president said. "But the board is not in a mood to gamble," he added.

The possible deletion of the third classroom was chosen instead as the means to bring down the total.

SHOULD THE BOARD accept Structo's proposal, it would have to settle for such items as non-fluorescent lighting, non-automatic bell systems and steel, instead, of

aluminum windows.

E. Ross Anderson, a member of the Structo engineering firm, did offer to draw up the new plans and specifications at no added expense to the board.

However, this might lead to difficulty, said Bardley, since the architect, a member of the engineering firm, would have a connection with the contractor, Structo.

Replying to a question from Mrs. Veronica Broszka, a Lay Advisory Committee member, Bardley agreed that if new plans are drawn by Micklewright it will cost the board approximately \$40,000 extra.

IN OTHER ACTIONS the board, upon the recommendation of Dr. James M. Lynch, superintendent of schools, agreed to continue the "same general pattern" on school boundaries and bus routes currently in effect.

Plans are being set up, said Lynch, so that when new classrooms are available, the changes will be made with a minimum of difficulty.

The board approved contracts for three new teachers:

Miss Shirley Henderson of Newark, \$3,500. She holds a bachelor's degree from Rutgers University and a limited certificate after completion of courses at Newark State Teachers College.

Thomas Del Casale Jr. of Benneil's Lane, \$3,675, holder of a bachelor's degree from Rider College and now studying at the summer session of the Rutgers University School of Education.

Earl W. Golden of Piscataway Township, \$3,600, who holds a bachelor's degree in education from Rutgers University.

Both men have been credited with two years' military experience.

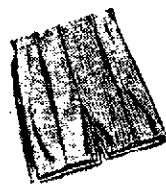


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H A Needs Zoning Permit for Project

The Franklin Township Housing Authority learned last night that the low-rent housing project can not be erected until municipal permission is granted for the rezoning of the site between Hamilton and Somerset Streets or a variance given to erect the multi-family dwellings.

Under current zoning regulations, it is not possible to build the project. However, members of

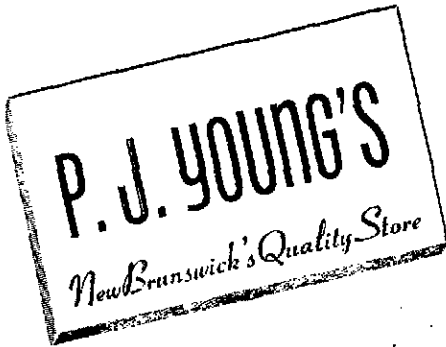
the zoning board have been aware of the restriction and have given assurance that necessary action will be taken to correct the situation.

Until this permission is granted the Public Housing Administration will withhold funds for the project.

He said that he had had 500 forms mimeographed, and that next week, 300 homeowners were going to meet to plan a mass tax appeal drive.

Katko, who has been under a doctor's care for six years because used abusive language or having threatened Katko's life. He testified that he cut the grass on Katko's property with a grass sickle because it was growing over the fence onto his own land.

A tenant on Tugya's land backed up the defendant's testimony by stating that she was standing near the fence talking to Mrs. Tugya, the mother of the defendant, at the time and that no threat was made and no abusive language used.

It was brought out during the trial that the two families had been feuding for years.

Magistrate George Shamy dismissed the charge of assault for lack of evidence, but fined Tugya \$25 for trespassing and damaging the land.
