

Water Line May Be Run Through Tip of Township

The Elizabethtown Water Co. is considering the installation of a 60-inch water transmission line which may run through the northwestern tip of the township, according to Mayor Michael Peacos.

Installation of the line would result in provision of water service for the industrial zone along the proposed East-West Freeway, surrounding residential areas and eventually a link with the water system at the eastern edge of the township.

THE LINE, carrying 75 million gallons of water daily, may be completed as early as June 1, stated Peacos.

A spokesman for the water company has said that chances for the line installation are "excellent."

The water main will be constructed to link Elizabethtown's in Bridgewater Township with other transmission lines stemming from Middlesex Borough.

THE ISSUE now is whether the

main should be installed on the Bridgewater Township side of the Raritan River or brought under the river and Delaware and Raritan Canal and along Weston Canal Road to the South Bound Brook borough line.

Committeeman Mayo S. Sisler said that the 275 acres of property owned by the township along both sides of the freeway route would be made available to industrial concerns at reasonable prices and would be unaffected by any resulting land boom caused by servicing of the area with water.

Peacos also has disclosed that a railroad, which he has declined to name, has agreed to run a spur line into the area if the customers are available.

THE MAYOR said that added ratables would not be the only benefit gained by taxpayers from the establishment of industry here. He stated that taxes paid by the township to Somerset County on land it owns would be reduced if the land were sold to manufacturing concerns.

Sisler Seeks Freeholder County Post

Franklin Township Committeeman Mayo S. Sisler has announced that he will be a candidate for Somerset County Freeholder on the Democratic ticket and that he has received the endorsement of the Democratic County Advisory Committee.

Commenting on the announcement, Democratic County Chairman Arthur S. Meredith declared, "Knowing Mayo Sisler as an aggressive and sound businessman who is not accustomed to defeat in either business or politics, I am sure the voters of Somerset County can look forward to a wholesomely challenging and enlightening campaign."

"I would like to say that, although the two-party system is not in evidence in county government at the moment," Meredith added, "with all humility and faith I can forecast that Somerset Democrats will not remain without representation after next November."

Pointing out that the deadline for filing nominating petitions has not passed, Meredith emphasized, "the field is not closed."

Sisler and his brother, Donald Sisler, operate a construction company that erects schools and industrial projects throughout Central Jersey, a swimming pool company, and a real estate holding firm concentrating on business properties in the area. The candidate is president of all three companies.

Sisler is a graduate of Pittsburg Commercial Institute. He and his wife have three children, Gary, 11, Michael, 10 and Shirley, 8. They reside at 11 Cooper Ave.

Budget Hike Seen For Operations

Reckless Driver Loses License, Pays \$20 Fine

Twenty-two-year-old George T. Hawkins of Nixon was fined \$20 and \$5 costs and had his license revoked for 30 days in Municipal Court Monday night on a charge of reckless driving.

Officer Lawrence Collier charged Hawkins eluded police at 65 miles an hour in a 40 mile zone and ignored warnings to stop.

MAGISTRATE George Shamy ordered Ellah Anderson, 58, of New Brunswick to take within 10 days a driving test and physical test given to applicants for driver's licenses after finding him guilty of careless driving.

A complaint of reckless driving against Anderson was preferred by Clarence Powlich, driver of a car involved in an accident with Anderson's car on Route 27. The charge was reduced to careless driving and Anderson was fined \$20 and \$5 costs, in addition to being ordered to take the driving and physical tests.

Anderson was represented by Carl Frann, New Brunswick lawyer.

IN OTHER matters, Clifford Rey of Manville was found guilty of dumping refuse along Canal Road after he admitted items found inside bags of garbage left along the roadside were his. He was fined \$5 and \$5 costs.

Judge Shamy ordered three parents to see that their children attend school more regularly after charges were brought against them by the attendance officer, Mrs. Harriet Davies.

A new budget for 1958, totaling \$832,412, was introduced by the Township Committee Tuesday night at an adjourned meeting in Middlebush School. The budget shows an increase in township operations of \$142,797.

The budget for 1957 was \$689,615. However, last year's tax rate of \$13.24 per \$100 assessed valuation was figured on an average percentage of 14.9 of the true value of an individual property. The new percentage is 25 per cent to true value. It is not possible to indicate an average increase for the average taxpayer because of the new ratio of assessment to true value.

COMMITTEEMAN Mayo S. Sisler, chairman of the finance committee, said that approximately one-third of the taxpayers will face increases, one-third, decreases, and the remainder, no change.

The new rates based on the 1953 assessed valuation of \$16,785,000, almost double the \$8,568,553 total for 1957, are as follows:

County taxes, 90 cents; county library taxes, 7 cents; school taxes, \$6.54, and local taxes, \$2.16.

AMONG THE larger increases in appropriations were:

Capital improvement fund, \$48,000, up \$28,000; police department, \$74,000, up \$21,100; road department, \$198,000, up \$26,750; office equipment, \$8,000, up \$8,500, and Charter Study Commission, \$4,000, a new item.

To ease the burden on the taxpayers, the committee applied \$150,000 in surplus revenues to the credit side of the ledger. Last year the committee applied a surplus of \$220,000.

The amount of the budget to be raised by taxation is \$361,923, an increase of \$100,923.

OF EACH taxpayer's dollar, 68 cents will go toward the support of the schools and 10 cents will

Township Talk

Mrs. Eleanor Weiserborn, candidate for the Board of Education, has had much to say this week about intellectual achievement education for Franklin; and there was a lot of wisdom in what she has said.

Board incumbent Frederick Seyfarth Jr. has said that social development is an integral part of education and that without proper social adjustment intellectual training is hampered. This, too, is true—but let us not stress importance of social education over intellectual education.

New School Superintendent Dr. Sampson G. Smith is expected to present his plans and suggestions to expedite secondary education in the township. We hope he doesn't intend to promote and press for progressive education.

Progressive education is defined to be a teaching process identical with life. It stresses the child's physical well-being, social development, beauty of environment and using interest as a motive of work.

In progressive education, social development and discipline is a matter of self-mastery rather than compulsion. Cooperation between the school and home is called for. Development is through direct and indirect contact with work. This sounds all well and good, and actually there are good points to it. But let us not go hog-wild for progressive education.

This educational theory puts too much emphasis on the environment and beauty of a school building. Teachers who have learned under progressive education would have a teaching technique, but little substance to communicate to the pupils.

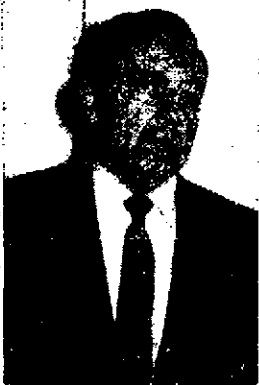
It is doubtful whether serious scholars could be developed from progressive teaching. And it is clearly seen in today's world just how much the scholar is needed.

For some odd reason many Americans seem to look with distaste upon learning "foreign peoples' languages.

The purpose of liberal arts education is to meet life's situations, and it achieves its goal. An understanding of civil affairs are taught and intellectual growth is not hampered. Progressive education, in which the curriculum is based on the needs of the child, restricts the role of the teacher.

It is ridiculous to stress a teaching technique, like progressive education, in which there is no real substance to be taught.
