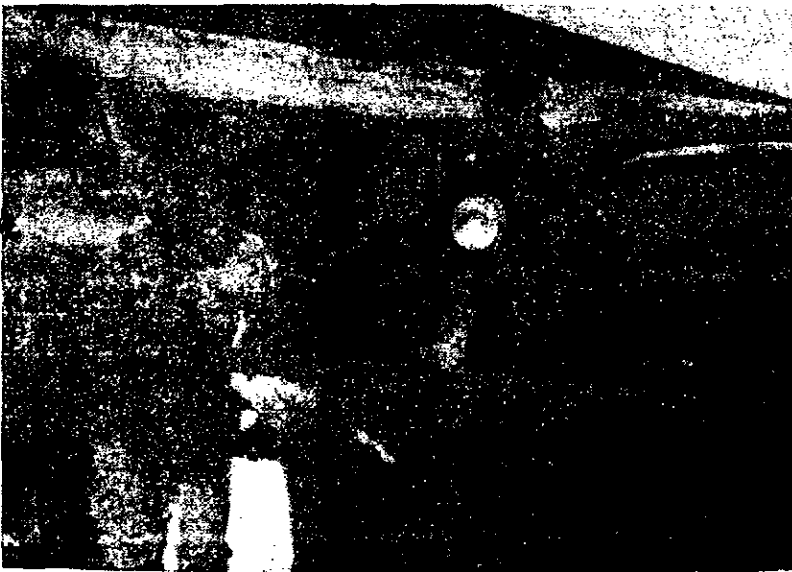

## Brady Resigns From Plan Board After First Meet

### Board Counsel Replacement Hotly Debated

Planning Board Chairman Lyle E. Hagmann was authorized by the board's 5-3 vote Wednesday night to appoint a committee to study the replacement of board counsel Arthur S. Meredith.

Democratic board members, Mayor Michael Peacos, Mayo Sisler and Henry Ness, opposed the suggestion that a new attorney be retained who would act as counsel for the board and no other municipal body.

ALBERT Milchenoski said he felt that Meredith devoted most of his time to the Township Committee and not enough to the Planning Board. The attorney was not present at the meeting.

Peacos declared the entire discussion out of order since the Township Committee, not the Planning Board, appointed the attorney for the board.

Members split along party lines again when a plan to incorporate written parliamentary rules as part of the board's by-laws was defeated for lack of a two-thirds majority vote.

A NEED for parliamentary rules was cited by Hagmann, who said that some confusion has developed at times on proper procedures for handling business.

Peacos questioned whether such rules would be used "to confuse the issue or to conduct orderly meetings."

Opposing the issue were Ness and Peacos, while Charles Sicora, Frank Lynea, Milchenoski and Hagmann voted in favor of the measure. Sisler abstained from voting.

THE BOARD decided to act on a preliminary approval of a map of Fieldville Park development within two weeks if by that time the Somerset County Planning Board has not made a recommendation.

Board members agreed to set aside for further study the issue of a proposed ordinance amendment which would permit the construction and operation of swimming pools and other non-profit recreational facilities in residence A and B zones.

A very short term on the Board of Adjustment was ended last night for newly appointed member Thomas R. Brady who submitted his letter of resignation at the board's first meeting of the year.

Brady, who will shortly be moving out of the township, said that when named a board member he had no idea his appointment "would run such a short course."

"I HAVE been attending the Board of Adjustment's meetings regularly for two years," declared Brady, "and was quite gratified when I found I was finally going to be able to put into practice some of the principles I have been holding forth from the floor."

The resigning board member added that he felt "a good Board of Adjustment can be the safeguard of good zoning and a poor Board of Adjustment the death of well planned community growth."

Brady wished success for his replacement and to all the board members.

A VARIANCE was granted by the board to James Revak of 101 Franklin Ave. to permit erection of a house on a lot of insufficient size on the east side of Newport Ave. The board decided that hardship was shown since the property is surrounded by occupied land.

Revak's property is 100 feet by 100 feet and a lot 100 feet by 200 feet is required.

The board denied variances to Joseph Pastore of Easton Ave. to permit erection of a drive-in-lypo restaurant in a residential A zone off Easton Avenue and to Nick Zaccarowski of Bristol, Pa., to permit erection of a house on a lot of insufficient size on property situated on the north side of Lillian

## Go, or They'll Tow

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority has proved that it has a heart—and not a moment too soon. At a meeting of the authority last Thursday, the authority commissioners decided to provide free towing service to motorists who become stranded on the turnpike during snow storms.

The authority will pay the towing costs for the removal of cars that become bogged down during "snow emergency" periods. The cost to the authority will be \$8 a year per truck. The cost to the motorist, nothing. The trucks will be ferried from Crown Pointe Stations and will be stationed at the interchange during snow emergencies.

The announcement came as welcome news to motorists who must drive, snow or no snow, particularly those who, in the past, have paid to use the turnpike during snow storms—in the hope that the turnpike would be passable only to be forced to pay again to get towed off. And with service stations few and far between on the turnpike, this had often meant the added inconvenience of a long wait.

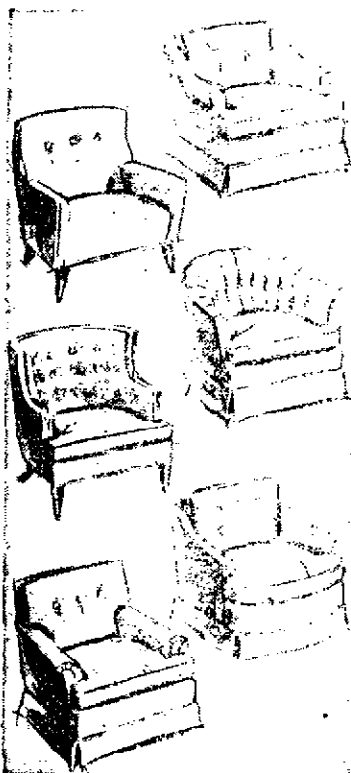

### The WORLD OUTDOORS



THE world-famous Kinz National Moose Range in Adams is caught in the center being threatened of an oil bonanza which recalls the frenzied days of the territory's gold rush.

Established by an Executive Order in 1911, the wildlife refuge is famous for its moose, the largest and most magnificent of all species of North American moose, and for its big brown bears, Bull Terrier, mountain goats, and other large and small animals.

As yet, little is one part of the plan this past summer has brought visions of quick dollars to citizens and communities alike. Business men and politicians with an eye to prospective expansion, are denouncing Federal regulations and calling for the speedy removal of all restrictions on even those parts of the Kinz that are ruled out geologically.

Under fire are the Department of the Interior's proposed regulations for the control of oil and gas leasing on Federal wildlife lands. The new regulations would permit oil and gas leasing on best wildlife lands, and drilling would be allowed on a limited basis in other sections when it is shown that oil resources belonged to the United States, and being leased through private landowners, oil and gas would be produced as rapidly as possible.

Although the proposed regulations would permit the orderly use of wildlife lands where oil or gas is present in commercial quantities, the most important effect of the new order would be to protect from unwise use those lands that have been set aside and are being managed for wildlife.

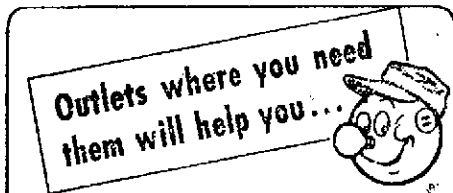

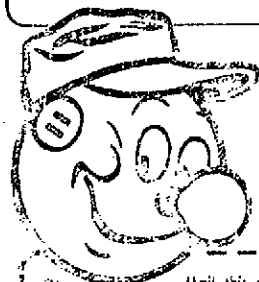
