Building a 'command structure'

SPRINGFIELD — The Union County Prosecutors Office stepped in to oversee the township police department last week after the municipality asked for help with restructuring efforts.

Union County Prosecutor Theodore J. Romankow appointed Captain Carl Riley as acting officer in charge of the Springfield Police Department, but it was not a takeover of the department.

"This will ensure the cohesiveness and sta-

bility in the Police Department to ensure public safety," the prosecutor said, stressing their goal is to begin a search for new leadership in the department.

According to Township Administrator Anthony Cancro, he made the call June 23 after the governing body decided not to appoint Capt. Peter Davis, the officer in charge since April 1, as acting chief.

"This was not a takeover, but an assumption of authority," Cancro said, explaining that without a leadership structure in place, the Prosecutor's Office can provide the most independent

evaluation of the department.

Cancro believes the evaluation process will take months rather than weeks, but in the end the township will have a solid leadership base in place.

Mayor Ziad Shehady said late last week that he had been in touch with the Prosecutor's Office for months about the lack of leadership in the department and how it could best be resolved.

The mayor and majority of the Township Committee still believe the answer to all of the

Mayor, council clash

HILLSIDE — Changes to the township's budget calendar have sparked disagreement among local officials. Preparations are underway to shift operations from a fiscal year to a calendar year, a move opposed by Mayor Joseph Menza and a portion of the Township Council.

The change is intended to stabilize collection of taxes and the distribution of tax bills, which have been late consistently in Hillside for several years.

Councilman John Kulish said a calendar year budget allows residents and officials to better anticipate budget needs and help eliminate the need to send out estimated and late bills.

"It gives us a smoother quarterly send out," said Kulish. "It's fiscally more responsible."

Councilwoman Shelley Bates does not support the change to the schedule, which she said was not adequately discussed.

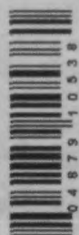

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A RASH OF CONCERN

The painful skin rash known as "shingles" is caused by the varicella zoster virus (VZV), the same virus that causes chickenpox. After recovery from chickenpox, the VZV remains in the body and may return years later to cause shingles. When it does return, there may be pain, itching, or tingling where the rash will develop, followed by the rash on one side of the face or body. The rash, which begins as blisters that scab after three to five days, will clear within two to four weeks. One in five people experiences severe pain that can continue even after the rash clears.

The medications acyclovir, valacyclovir, and famciclovir can be used to treat shingles

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P.S. Usually a person will only get shingles once in his or her lifetime, if at all. Or rare occasions, however, a second or third round of shingles can occur.

COAH may soon be a thing of the past

The following is the first in a series of articles examining COAH.

Just the mention of the Council on Affordable Housing may cause residents of some towns to cringe. However, if Gov. Chris Christie has his way, that type of reaction could eventually be just a memory.

When Christie recommended eliminating COAH and repealing the Fair Housing Act in early May, there was a collective sigh of relief in many Union County towns from both taxpayers and elected officials.

"This is about getting Trenton...out of the business of telling people how many units they're supposed to have — some arbitrary, ridiculous formula that nobody could ever explain," Christie said in early May.

The proposed legislation immediately was hailed by municipal officials but ridiculed by affordable housing advocates. The advocates feared the state would return

to practices occurring before the Supreme Court's Mount Laurel decision, which determined that poor residents in a town should be given an opportunity to live in an affordable home. Earlier in the year Christie signed an executive order freezing enforcement of COAH's affordable housing regulations for 90 days.

"The message to municipalities is that their COAH nightmare is over and we're going to move towards making sure that development gets in the hands of local municipalities to make these kinds of decisions," Christie said when he announced the order Feb. 9.

The full New Jersey Senate passed a bill 28-3 last week that will completely change how the state provides affordable housing. Now, the measure goes on to the assembly for its approval. Bill sponsor Sen. Raymond Lesniak, D-Union, said if the bill passes the full assembly, it moves to Christie, who has said publicly he will sign it.

The bill will affect towns like Cranford, which not only has struggled with trying to fulfill their obligation in a town with little or no vacant land but faced the scourge of developers and COAH because they were not meeting their obligation under the law.

Under COAH, each municipality must offer a specific amount of housing for low and moderate income people. That formula is based on the land available, the land that is able to be developed and the number of housing units already in the community.

Cranford, in the past, did not agree with COAH requirements because it included property along the Garden State Parkway, railroad and athletic fields. This ultimately led to lawsuits by developers who felt affordable housing was lacking or missing entirely.

Currently, the township is facing two "builder's remedy" lawsuits by developers, S. Hekemian Group and Lehigh Acquisitions. Both maintain the township failed to meet the affordable housing requirements

and are challenging the township in court.

Should either developer be successful in their lawsuits, the township planning and zoning restrictions already in place would be suspended and they would be able to move forward with their development projects.

As the lead agency that has guided housing development across the state for the past 25 years, COAH has been the dominant force statewide in mandating exactly what a town's affordable housing obligation should be, regardless of whether they have the land to build affordable housing units or not.

One provision in Lesniak's bill uses architecture as a means of determining a town's affordable housing obligation. This would allow a town like Cranford or Summit to use their town's percentage of single-family, attached homes as a factor in determining the town's affordable housing obligation.

The bill also would give municipalities more control over meeting their affordable housing obligations, and end COAH.

Four schools among 'most challenging' Newsweek rates schools based on different criteria

Cranford, Clark, Springfield and Summit high schools have been named in Newsweek Magazine's "Most Challenging High Schools in the United States."

Only 67 schools in New Jersey out of a total of 1,623, or 6 percent of the nation's schools, actually met Newsweek's unusual criteria that is not based on the usual test scores but how hard school staff work to challenge students with Advanced Placement college level courses and tests.

However, while test scores do not enter into the picture, the number of students taking advanced placement tests does figure significantly. Newsweek decided not to include passing rates because they found most American high schools "kept those rates artificially high by allowing only top students to take the courses," or in some instances, opened the courses to all but encouraged only the best students to take the tests.

Summit ranked 500 on the list and first in the county, which came as a surprise to Superintendent of Schools Nathan Parker who was not even aware that Summit high school had received the ranking by Newsweek. However, he did feel that the staff's efforts to go beyond the call of duty to help students was an important factor.

"They go way beyond before and after school," he said, adding that the high school staff is also diligent and engaged with students and present a rigorous curriculum that is challenging to students.

Cranford came in second in the county, ranking 534 on the national list, which is higher than last year when they were 568th on the list. Superintendent of schools Gayle Carrick was honored that Cranford High School was on the list again this year, pointing out some of the challenging programs that set this school apart from others.

"We make great efforts to personalize the education of individual students," she said, citing particularly the University program, which is a school within a school.

The four-year program allows students to pursue their own academic interests, including music, dancing, medical and environmental programs. Last year, students involved in the University program actually observed a kidney transplant, were involved in an aquatic workshop in South Jersey and met with United Kingdom's Prime Minister Tony Blair.

Newsweek mentions that studies by the United States Department of Education in 1999 and 2005 showed that the best predictors of college graduation were not good high school grades or test scores but whether or not a student had an intense academic experience in high school.

In fact, in the latest study, even low-performing, low-income students who received a score of two on an AP test, did significantly better in college than similar students who did not take AP in high school.

Springfield placed 934th on the list nationwide or fourth in Union

Mountainside school officials in search of new board member

MOUNTAINSIDE — School officials are on the hunt for a new board member following the unexpected resignation of Jorge Batista in the middle of his first term.

District Superintendent Jeanette Baubles said she understands Batista's June 9 resignation was a result of his impending move out of the borough.

Vice President Cathy Jakositz said Batista will be missed by his

colleagues on the board.

Jakositz said she hopes a new member can be secured in a timely manner, as an empty seat on the board could prove a hindrance to making decisions.

"It was recent so at this point it hasn't created any negative impact on the board and the decisions we had to make," Jakositz said.

Persons interested in the position must mail a letter of interest to the board offices by July 15. Letters will be reviewed and 30-minute

public interviews will be scheduled for July 20. Baubles said she was not aware of any interest in the position yet, but noted the opening was only announced recently.

"I haven't seen anything come in yet in the way of letters of interest, but since it was the last week of school people have probably been tied up with other things," Baubles said.

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UCPO to oversee Springfield PD

Springfield Police Department's woes is the hiring of a public safety director who would oversee police, fire and emergency management.

Earlier this year, the governing body passed a resolution to hire such a director, and had five candidates vying for the position. However, in the end they decided not to move forward with the change because of mounting problems with the police department's leadership.

Deputy Mayor Bart Fraenkel, in favor of appointing Davis acting chief, was not happy with the outcome of the meeting during which Davis' appointment was rejected.

"I don't understand why he was not appointed, he was doing everything a chief does for the last several months," the deputy mayor said.

The mayor, though, felt that Davis had only been the officer in charge since April 1 and that was just not enough time to ensure stability in the department.

The following morning, Davis resigned from the force, confused that he did not receive the support of the committee.

This left the department on very shaky ground since there was not one officer on the 38-man force above the rank of sergeant to assume the role of officer in charge.

The lack of senior officers

seems to have occurred for several reasons, including the fact Chisholm did not make any promotions during the last months of his tenure and the township opted to eliminate the rank of police lieutenant in 2006 to cut costs.

Shehady said the decision reached by the governing body was based on doing what is best for the entire department.

"I did not want us to rush to judgement on this," the mayor said, pointing out that there were several officers who expressed interest in the acting chief position.

"If we don't do things fairly and go through the right channels, then we are wrong," Shehady said.

The mayor also noted that Davis received a rice notice, which is legally required if the governing body is going to discuss an employee's position.

"He had an opportunity to come to that meeting and he chose not to do that," the mayor said.

Davis said he felt the committee was retaliating against him because he gave deposition for former police officer, Walter Brooks, who brought a discrimination lawsuit against the township.

Shehady flatly denied the allegation.

"Nothing could be further from the truth," the mayor said. "The truth is we just were not ready to make the decision."

"This is not a bad thing, it's what we need right now," he said.

The problems go back several years to when the department no longer had confidence in former longtime chief William Chisholm, who retired the end of March. The former chief, who served as the department leader since 1986, lost the support of the ranks due to lack of leadership, communication and support.

The Police Benevolent Association eventually passed an official vote of no confidence in Chisholm last fall, citing in a press release that "the chief has been unresponsive or flat-out dismissive of our concerns."

By April 1, Chisholm had retired along with his deputy. Davis stepped into the officer in charge position with the hope that he would be named acting chief in the near future. Although Davis put his resignation in last week, he later decided to stay until the department is on sure footing.

"I'm not going to abandon the town like the former chief and deputy chief did," Davis said, adding that he took over the position of officer in charge without any help or instruction.

Meanwhile, Romankow assures that the township police force is adequate.

"We did not take over the police department because of the lack of ability with its police officers," the prosecutor said, pointing out that the problem remains a lack of "command structure."

Debate continues over decision to change budget calendar

"It seems to me there was a rush to go from a fiscal to calendar year without the necessary due diligence to determine the pros and cons of doing so," Bates said.

Menza initially vetoed the plan, which he said was actually intended to hide a \$926,000 emergency appropriation passed on June 22 to make up for budget shortfalls.

"The game was to hide those costs with the surplus they would generate in the next six months from state aid," Menza said. "All it does is put a Band-Aid on a hemorrhage."

A vote taken by the council at a special meeting last week passed by a 4-2 vote in favor of overturning the veto, with Councilman Gerald Freedman absent. Bates has doubts about the legitimacy of this vote. According to Bates, communications from the state Department of Community Affairs indicates five votes are required to override the veto.

Lisa Ryan, a spokeswoman for the DCA, said a two-thirds majority of the full governing body is required to override a mayor's veto.

Bates said the outcome of the vote remains in question pending a legal opinion from Township Attorney Christine Burgess.

Burgess did not return repeated calls for comment. Kulish was confident they don't need the full council's vote on the subject, an opinion he said the state seems to support, having accepted a transitional budget prepared by CFO Marie Pardo and the Finance Committee.

"So far the state has accepted it," Kulish said.

This budget will see the township through its final six months as a fiscal-year town until the change takes effect. However, there is also disagreement about this issue.

Menza said the preparation of the budget is the duty of the mayor, not the CFO or council. Kulish said Menza had the opportunity to review the budget, but Menza denies involvement in the process.

"I had no part in it, I had no knowledge of it and my name had better not be on it," said Menza of the transitional budget.

He is in the process of producing a fiscal year budget for the township.

Bates said the change in fiscal schedule may have repercussions the public is not adequately aware of. She said she was informed a change in the calendar year will have an impact on the taxes of property owners, but the CFO and Finance Committee would not disclose the specifics.

"It was just put on the agenda and it was voted on," she said.

The budget is expected to be discussed at the township reorganization meeting tonight at 6 p.m.

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Town votes down helipad proposal

SUMMIT — After almost a year of contentious meetings, a proposal to construct a helicopter landing pad atop Overlook Hospital has been voted down by the city's Zoning Board.

The June 21 vote was 6-1 against the project. Board Chairman George MacLean declined to comment on the subject.

The addition of a helipad at the facility was primarily intended to aid in the timely treatment of stroke victims by reducing transport time as well as the need for ground ambulance services.

Medical Director of Neuroscience at Overlook John Halperin, who stressed that time is of the essence when treating strokes, said he was disappointed with the outcome though he appreciates all the time, energy and effort the board put into the process over the past year and understands the concerns of the residents.

"We think it's disappointing with respect to the patients for whom we're trying to get the best treatment possible," Halperin said.

Resistance to the proposal came from citizens concerned about the impact of the helipad on their lives, particularly their property values and the noise disturbances associated with the aircraft.

Area resident Andy Gottesman said the board took note of "overwhelming evidence" that the helipad would negatively affect the safety and quality of life of the old, sensitive neighborhood that is densely packed around the hospital.

"We are happy the Zoning Board saw this was a detriment to the community and decided our community was important enough to protect," Gottesman said.

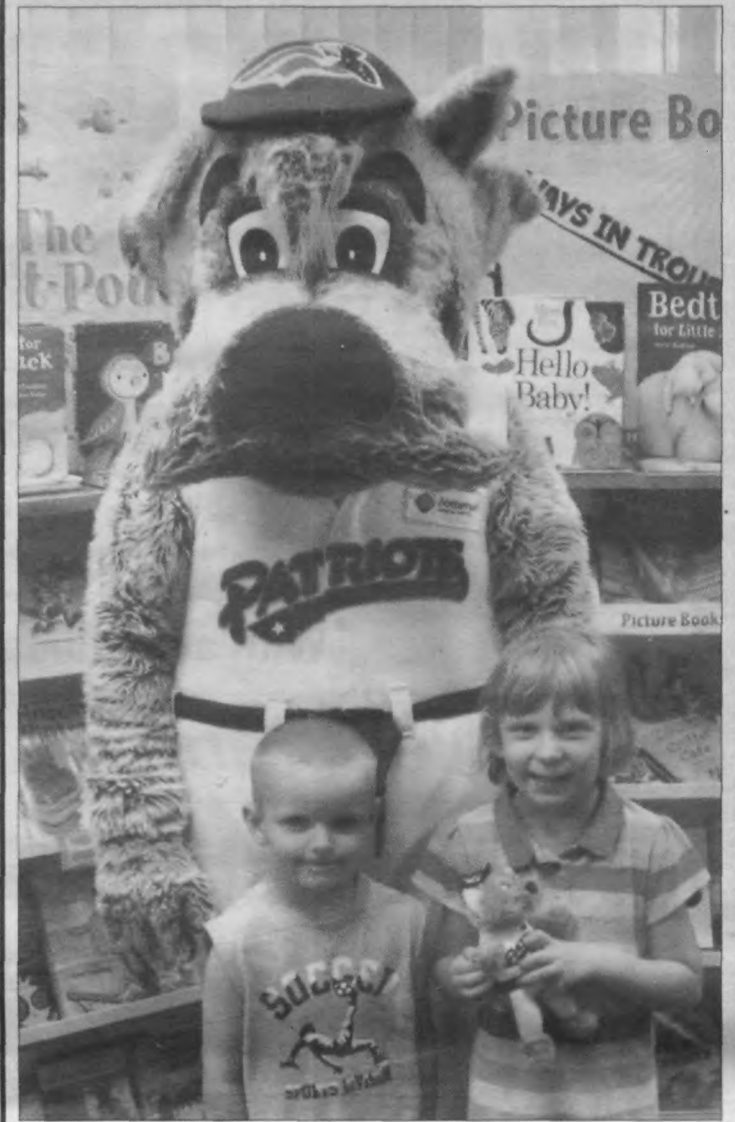
At present, helicopters bearing patients bound for the hospital are forced to use such improvised landing sites as Memorial Field or the parking lot of the municipal pool, where local police and fire personnel must work to safely clear the area. A report from City Planner Eileen Banyra indicated a minimum of two variances would be required if the application was approved — one for the proposed structure's height and a second for a conditional use as the application did not meet all of the conditional use requirements reflected in city ordinance.

Attorney John DeLaney, who represented several objecting residents during the application, was pleased with the outcome of the long-running application.

"It was an exciting night," DeLaney said. "It was a long road. The board is to be commended for the tremendous patience they exercised."

DeLaney praised the board for keeping the proceedings organized, and weighing both sides equally. "It really shows the beauty of democracy," he said.

Hillside business pleads guilty to theft

A Hillside business pleaded guilty June 16 to a theft charge after it overbilled Union County by nearly \$60,000, First Assistant Prosecutor Al Cernadas said.

Michael Serillo, president of New Jersey Door Works entered the plea on behalf of the company Cernadas said. New Jersey Door Works admitted that between April 2005 and December 2007 it overbilled the county for work and materials in the amount of \$59,695.41.

The company pled guilty to a 3rd degree theft by deception charge and under the agreement will be prohibited from conducting business with the county in the future, said Cernadas.

The Prosecutor's Office launched an investigation after a former employee of New Jersey Door Works who alleged improprieties on the billing practices of the company.

The plea and sentencing were held simulta-

neously before Union County Superior Court Judge Stuart Peim.

During sentencing, New Jersey Door Works paid full restitution to the county, Cernadas added.

Assistant Prosecutor William Kolano handled the case. Cernadas thanked Prosecutor's Office Detective Cassie Kim for her diligent and hard work on this case over the last several months.

County and 27th in the state.

None of this is a surprise to Springfield Superintendent of Schools Michael A. Davino, who knows firsthand that challenging a student beyond what they believe they can achieve is critical.

"Parents and students need to understand that going to our high school is not going to be a walkover but rather that they will be challenged to reach for the highest goals and beyond," he said.

Davino also knows that teenagers do not always push

themselves beyond what they believe they can achieve and that is where this superintendent believes staff can, and do, make a difference.

"When former students return and tell me they are succeeding in college because of the education they received here in Springfield, that is what it's all about," Davino said.

This is not the first time a school Davino has been associated with has been on the list. When he was principal of a Port Richmond, Staten Island high school it was

ranked 75th in the entire country by Newsweek.

Springfield Board of Education President Irwin Sablosky was very proud of the honor, especially when much of the news about education has been limited to dollars and cents in recent months.

"It is refreshing to be able to take a step back and recognize the commitment of our students in taking these difficult courses and the dedication of our teachers in continuing to provide a challenging learning environment for our kids," he said.

Davino also believes that the opening of the Dayton Collegiate Academy for the 2010-11 school year, builds on the solid educational foundation that has been established in the Springfield school district.

"Our students are challenged in every way by their teachers and the result is they achieve beyond their expectations," the superintendent said. Clark's Arthur L. Johnson High School came in at 1,507 on Newsweek's list, but the superintendent did not return calls by presstime.

This holiday recognizes the day our nation officially declared its independence from Great Britain. Although it is generally believed the delegates of the Second Continental Congress signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, the majority didn't do so until Aug. 2, 1776.

In fact, one delegate, Thomas McKean of Delaware, didn't sign the document until 1781. After it had been signed, the Declaration of Independence was officially read in Philadelphia's Independence Hall on July 8, 1776, as well as in Trenton and Easton, Pa.

On Independence Day each year, we celebrate the freedoms for which our ancestors fought and died. In the words of that famous document, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Census numbers — not too good

Quietly last week, with little fanfare, the U.S. Census Bureau

released its 2009 "estimates." Their figures represent the final population counts before the 2010 Census are released which is used to allocate seats in Congress and distribute an array of government funding.

To their credit, the county has been closely following the numbers. Secondly, our local communities are not doing enough to get the accurate count.

The population estimates reveal an interesting profile on the County. Our county growth pegged at 0.74 percent is significantly less than the state's increase number of 3.5 percent. Yet the percentage of county people younger than 5 years old and female residents are actually higher than state averages. Our growth in Hispanic population at 26 percent far outpaces the state average of 16.3 percent. The black and Hispanic population together makes up a projected 49 percent of Union County's population.

The numbers can be fun. In the last year, the Clark population has increased by 117 people. Hillside is up 136. Rahway has seen a lot of action, jumping 417. Union, despite its size, is up a dinky 335.

What isn't fun is the belief of most experts of gross undercounts in our urban areas. There is still time left, but the fear is that for yet another decade we will be grossly undercounted. That's a route we should avoid taking.

Celebrate Fourth of July in safety

Fireworks are a spectacularly beautiful way to celebrate America's Independence. They can be exciting, festive and fun but it is important to remember that fireworks are also dangerous.

Despite the fact that fireworks are illegal in New Jersey and many other states, some people still put themselves and others at risk of using them during private celebrations. These dangerous items involve fire and explosions that can do great damage to people and property.

The most recent statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention show that nearly 10,000 people a year are treated in U.S. emergency rooms for fireworks-related injuries. Between 2000 and 2008 fireworks killed 67 people according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Most importantly, we need to keep our children safe as we mark our nation's birthday. Almost half of all fireworks-related injuries happened to young people. While firecrackers are associated with the greatest number of injuries even the seemingly harmless sparkler is incredibly dangerous. Sparklers, which burn at more than 1,000

degrees, account for one-third of the injuries to children younger than 5 years old.

These community events are the perfect opportunity for you and your family to safely enjoy a spectacular fireworks show celebrating Independence Day. Leave the fireworks to the professionals and enjoy the holiday.

With the arrival of the Fourth of July, summer is in full swing and it is a good time to think about other ways to enjoy the warm months safely.

There is plenty of fun to be had in the sun but remember you have to protect yourself and the kids from harmful rays. The best line of defense against the sun is covering up. Wear a hat, sunglasses and light

clothing. And don't forget the sunscreen.

We also need to take it easier on those very hot and humid days. Don't over do it outdoors and drink plenty of water.

And if you are trying to keep cool by the pool remember the possible dangers. Never leave children alone in or near the pool, even for a moment. Also make sure pool gates open out from the pool and self-close and self-latch at a height children can't reach.

"We'll be working very hard to maintain professionalism in departments throughout the state," Mason said.

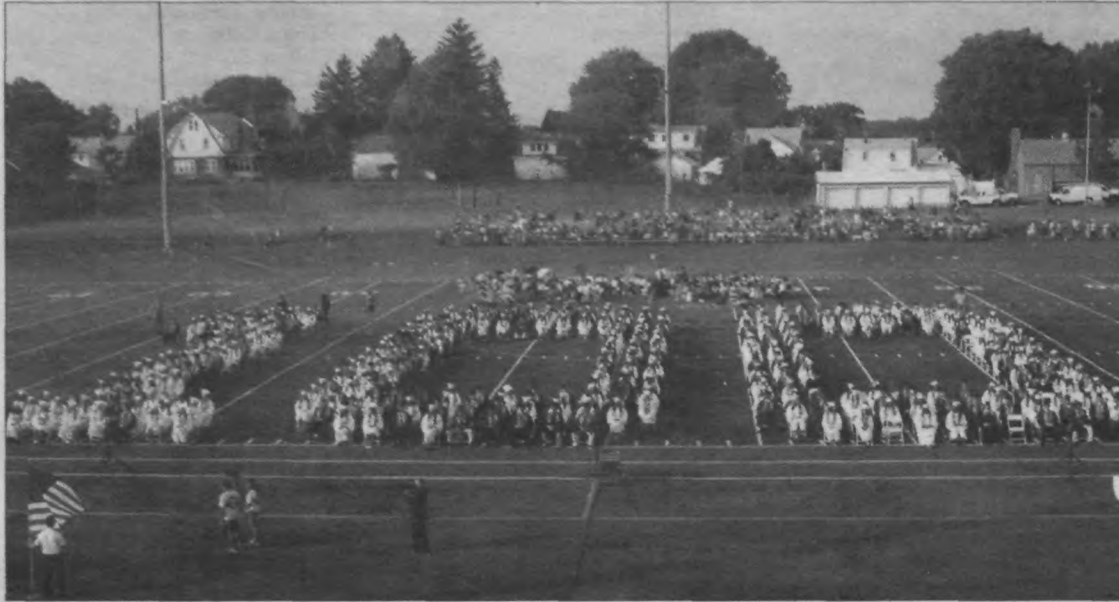

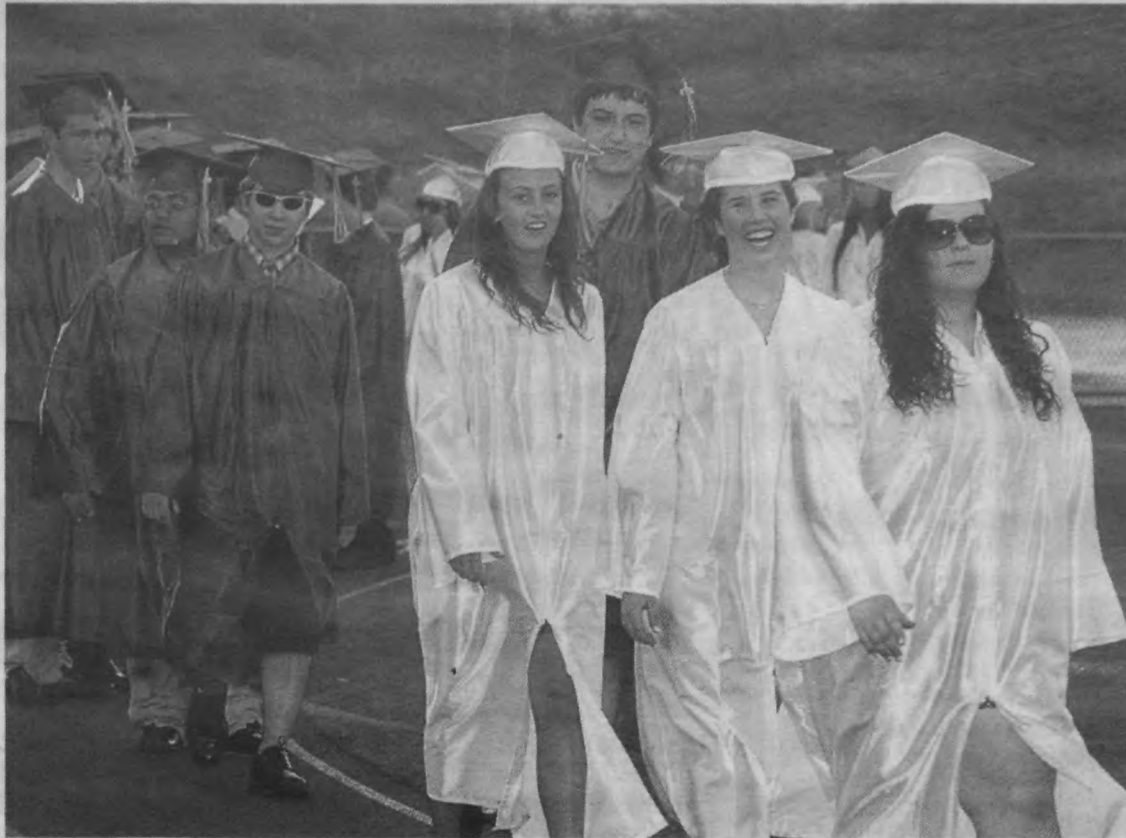

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'Centre of the Labyrinth' is a summer must-read

It is not an easy task for a writer to create a large, lengthy novel and entice a reader to sit back and take the time to tirelessly enjoy every chapter, every incident, every character, every word.

That is exactly what Rosetta J. Jamieson of Roselle has accomplished with "Centre of the Labyrinth." Nevermind that it was published in 1985 and again in 2003 by Writers Club Press, an imprint of iUniverse Inc. of Lincoln, Neb. It is Jamieson's first major novel — she has since written several fine books — and it still makes for a lazy summer relaxation reading.

The Caribbean writer and educator, born on the island of Jamaica, has taught English language and literature in the island's secondary school from 1971 to 1977 and was a professor of English language, literature and linguistic studies at Shortwood Teachers' College from 1978 to 1985. In the book, she focuses on

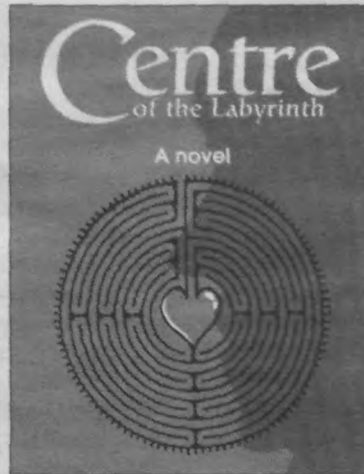

her background and draws from her experiences and knowledge. And as a result, she brings forth a riveting story — or stories, if you will — of what life can be like in a poor, nearly poverty-stricken village surrounded by a multi-million pound estate called Paradise Acres.

The consistent struggle of race, class, slavery, love and hope for a better future in Laetonville is coherently dramatized on every page. The interesting language of the villagers, Jamaican-Creole, is charmingly utilized throughout the book, and it is not necessary to turn to the final pages to learn its meaning.



Throughout the book, there is a deep, disturbing mystery hovering above everything that is happening to the romance of two people: Robert Laeton, an "almost white" heir to the estate and Deita Folkes, a fatherless, dark-skinned daughter of an unstable woman, known to the townsfolk as Miss Gatha.

Deita's beauty also entrances an educated teacher, Lloyd Ben-

jamin, an unrecognized relative of the Laetons. Therefore, there is much conflict throughout the book about who is more deserving of the love of Deita. She strives toward a better education and, fortunately, there is a school which Deita attends and a better life for herself and for her disturbed mother.

Jamieson's many characters are strongly, realistically created and a reader finds a motive to sympathize with and befriend them. For example, in addition to the personable Deita, her mother, Agatha, is so mysteriously formidable, particularly when it comes to her daughter's plans to marry Robert, Fred Laeton's son.

Fred Laeton appears to have a deep secret of his own, and even near death, hesitates to unfold it. Then there is Tata Zekel, Agatha's father, a kind, gentle soul, who cannot make peace in the household whenever Robert's name is mentioned.

There is Deita's school teacher,

Mrs. Watson, who attempts to help Deita and her mother; there is Gertrude Laeton, Robert's half-sister, who is hatefully rude to Deita; Miss Fan, Tata Zekel's longtime fiancée, the mother of Zekel's children, who is always there for everyone; Jo-Jo and Amos are the friendly, boisterous cousins; and Dr. Neil Cornelius is a very close friend of the Laeton family.

All of Jamieson's characters appear to have a stronghold on their readers and, apparently, on the author herself.

Even if the summer isn't as lengthy as "Centre of the Labyrinth," the novel comes highly recommended. The better books on the shelf of this reviewer's library happily have moved over to make a generous space for their newest, rather large, friend.

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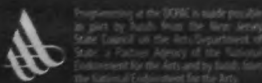

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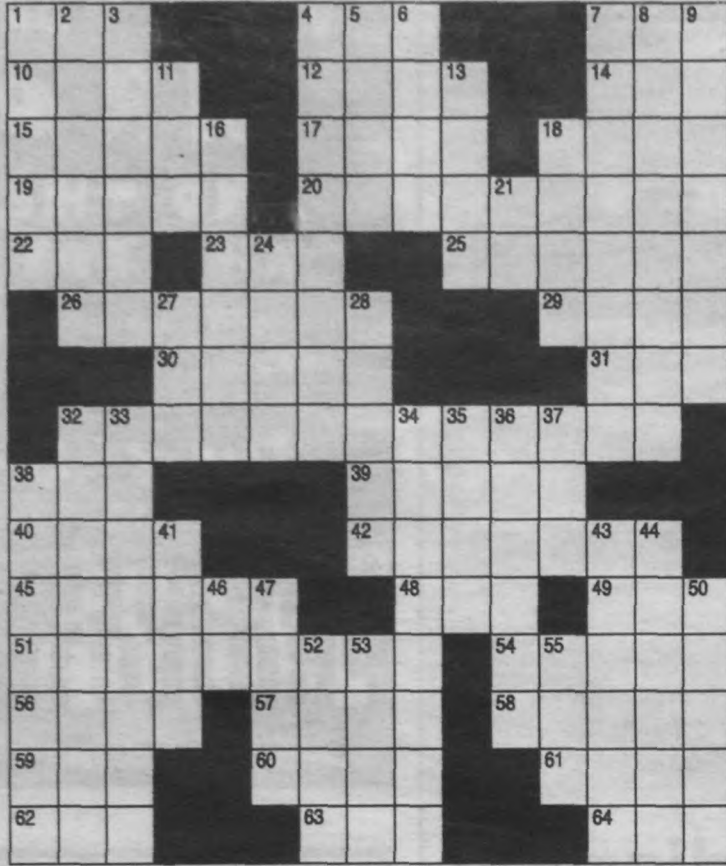

Union County performers lead North to football win

UNION — The stars were out Monday night. Many of them were players from Union County who made their presence felt in a big way.

A number of North defensive players from Union County sparked a solid effort that was guided by two Union County head coaches.

The North took it to the South for the second time in three years, with players from Morris and Essex counties also producing.

The North was more-than-convincing in downing the South 17-3 in the 32nd annual New Jersey North-South All-Star Football Classic at Kean University Alumni Stadium.

The North now trails the series 15-14-2 and can tie it once again next year. The North has never led.

There was no game in 2002 because of extended inclement weather right before kickoff.

This was the second straight year the game was held at Kean, with a crowd of 3,000 in attendance. With so many officials in favor of the game now being played at Kean — especially with the close to full house appearance you get there — it appears that the game will remain at Kean and will not return to being played at Rutgers like it was in the past.

North tackle Willie Johnson (6-1, 250) represented Westfield football well, with the North's defensive performance similar to many posted by the Blue Devils during last season's successful 8-3 campaign.

"This was awesome and just a great feeling that we won," Johnson said.

Johnson was one of five First Team All-County players from Union County that started on defense for the North, with the North defensive coordinator being Union head coach Brian Sheridan.

In the 1993 game at Giants Stadium, Sheridan started at linebacker for the North after earning First Team All-State honors at Union.

New Providence head coach Frank Bottone coached the North defensive linemen. He is very much looking forward to his 46th season as the one and only head coach of the Pioneers.

"I enjoyed it," said Bottone, 79, who shows no signs of slowing down. "We did a little adjustment of moving the ends out a little wider. Our tackles — we rotated four guys inside — were very tough."

The other four all-county players from Union County on the North defense included end Akmad Abdul-Razzaq (6-3, 230) of Roselle, end Olsen Pierre (6-5, 270) of Rahway, tackle Mike Watts (6-2, 245) of Summit and tackle Terence Gavin (6-0, 250) of Union.

Thanks to a swarming-of-the-ball effort by those linemen, in addition to end Billy Dobbs (6-5, 250) of East Orange Campus — who was selected the North's Defensive Player of the Game — the North prevented the South from reaching the end zone for the first time in seven years.

It was the first time since the South won 3-0 in 2003 that the South was held to zero touchdowns.

The only points the South scored came on a field goal with 8:38 left in the second quarter as the South went up 3-0.

Dobbs and Olsen were menacing tacklers from their end positions, with Dobbs recording a quarter-back sack. Olsen had a tackle for a four-yard loss and did well to block a punt early in the second quarter.

"The South was talking so much stuff when we were practicing, so it was real good to get this win," Pierre said.

"They were talking all the time."

Pierre will continue at Fork Union Military Academy in Fork Union, Va.

"I'm going to go there for six months, do the best I can and hope I get a D-1 scholarship," said Pierre, who anchored one of the top defensive units in all of North Jersey last fall.

ORDINANCE NO. 2010-23

AN ORDINANCE SUPPLEMENTING AND AMENDING CHAPTER XX ENTITLED "SEWERS" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD AND ESTABLISHING THE SEWERAGE UTILITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Springfield, County of Union, State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION I. Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield is hereby further supplemented and amended by creating new Section 20-5 (currently identified as "Reserved") entitled "Sewerage Utility of the Township of Springfield" to read as follows:

20-5 SEWERAGE UTILITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD.

20-5.1 Established.

Pursuant to the "Local Budget Law," N.J.S.A. 40A:4-1, et seq., a sewerage utility is established in the Township of Springfield, to be known and cited as "The Sewerage Utility of the Township of Springfield" or "Sewerage Utility."

20-5.2 Effective Date.

The Sewerage Utility shall commence as of January 1, 2010 and is retroactive to that date. All sewer bills billed and/or payable commencing January 1, 2010 shall be a credit of the Sewerage Utility.

20-5.3 Budget Revenues.

The Sewerage Utility shall set forth the anticipated revenues from the operation which is set forth in a separate section of the Township budget form as promulgated by the Division of Local Government Service within the State of New Jersey Department of Community Affairs. The annual service charges established by this Section 20-5 are intended to be a direct pass-through for each sewer connection within the Township of Springfield pursuant to and in accordance with the Township of Springfield's agreement with the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority ("RVSA"). Prior to January 1, 2010, the appropriation and comparable costs and charges relating to the RVSA and all related sewer maintenance costs were included in the current budget of the Township of Springfield. Through the implementation of this Ordinance, the appropriation and costs relating to sewer maintenance and sewerage disposal have been removed from the current operating budget commencing with an effective date of January 1, 2010. Revenues collected by the Sewerage Utility will be used to pay those annual service charges imposed upon the Township of Springfield, by the RVSA for the use of their sewerage system and the treatment of sewage flow into the RVSA sewerage system.

20-5.4 Budget - Appropriations.

The Sewerage Utility budget shall set forth the appropriations in the form and detail prescribed by the regulations of the Division of Local Government Services and shall include, at least:

- Operations;
- Interest and debt requirement; and
- Deferred charges and statutory expenditures.

20-5.5 Accounting Procedures.

The Chief Financial Officer shall be directed and empowered to adopt accounting procedures consistent with this Chapter and the aforesaid statutes relative to the creation of the Sewerage Utility.

20-5.6 Existing Ordinances, regulations and rules.

All currently existing ordinances, regulations and rules relating to sewerage fees, bills and/or other sewerage matters remain in effect until modified by appropriate action of the Township Committee.

20-5.7 Governed by Township Committee.

The Sewerage Utility shall be governed by the Township Committee of the Township of Springfield.

20-5.8 Operation and Conduct of Sewerage Utility.

All matters with respect to the operation and conduct of the Sewerage Utility not determined by this Chapter shall be determined by resolutions or by amendments to this Chapter to be hereafter adopted.

SECTION II: Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield is hereby further supplemented and amended by creating a new Section 20-6 (currently identified as "Reserved") entitled "Service Charges" to read as follows:

20-6 SERVICE CHARGES

20-6.1 Annual Service Charge. Except as otherwise exempted as set forth in this Section 20-6, there shall be an annual service charge for each sewer connec-

tion based on the uses of the property in accordance with the following schedule:

a. Residential uses - Class "R." Residential units shall consist of single family and multi-family residential units, including condominiums and townhouses; all class 4C apartment complexes, and all Class 15D Parsonages.

b. Residential Rate - the annual service charge for Class "R" residential units (except for residential properties on septic) shall be calculated as follows:

- two hundred fifty (\$250) dollars per annum for 48,000 gallons or less of water consumed per annum; and
- the per gallon rate adopted annually by Resolution of the Township Committee for each gallon of water consumed in excess of 48,000 gallons per annum.

c. All Class 4C apartment complexes shall be billed at the Residential Rate structure set forth in Section 20-6.1b. above, as follows:

(i) the annualized average flow for each apartment unit will be calculated by dividing the annualized total flow for the entire apartment complex situated on the same lot by the total number of apartment units within that apartment complex; then

(ii) the Residential Rate structure set forth in Section 20-6.1b. shall be applied to determine the "per apartment unit cost"; then

(iii) the sewer bill for said apartment complex shall equal the sum of the "per apartment unit cost" multiplied by the number of units within said apartment complex situated on the same lot.

d. The Class 4C apartment complexes in existence within the Township as of the adoption of this Ordinance are identified on Schedule A hereto. Any future Class 4C apartment complexes may be added to said list by Resolution of the Township Committee.

e. All Class 15D "Parsonages" shall be billed at the Residential Rate set forth in Section 20-6.1b. above. The Parsonages in existence as of the adoption of this Ordinance are identified on Schedule "B" hereto. Any future Parsonages may be added to said list by Resolution of the Township Committee.

f. Exempt properties. Specifically exempt from annual sewer service charges are all township-owned properties - Class "15C", including the following:

- Town Hall and other Township-owned premises of similar use;
- Rescue squad, fire department, and police department facilities;
- Department of Public Works facilities;
- Library; and
- Parks, public recreational facilities.

g. Business, non-profit, commercial, miscellaneous and industrial uses - Classes 3A/3B, 4A, 4B, 15C (except for Township owned properties), 15D (except Parsonages), 15E and 15F shall be billed at the Non-Residential Rate set forth in subsection 20-6.1j. below.

h. Private educational uses - Class "15B". The annual sewer service charge for property used for private educational purposes shall be the same as Class 3A/3B, 4A, 4B, 15D, 15E and 15F uses and shall be billed at the Non-Residential Rate set forth in subsection 20-6.1j. below.

i. Public educational uses - Class "15A". The annual sewer services charge for property used for public educational purposes shall be the same as Class 3A/3B, 4A, 4B, 15D, 15E and 15F uses and shall be billed at the Non-Residential Rate set forth in subsection 20-6.1j. below.

j. Non-Residential Rate - the annual sewer service charge for all non-residential uses described and detailed in Section 20-6.1f. (except for non-residential properties on septic) shall be calculated as follows:

(i) two hundred fifty (\$250) dollars per annum for 48,000 gallons or less of water consumed per annum; and

(ii) rate adopted annually by Resolution of the Township Committee for each gallon of water consumed in excess of 48,000 gallons per annum.

k. Where a property is occupied by a combination of types of occupancy, the total sewer service charge shall be determined by applying the usage classification assigned to the property by the Tax Assessor.

l. The Township reserves the right where a private well of water supply is involved, if in its opinion it is deemed desirable, to require the owner to install facilities, at the owners expense, for measuring or determining the volume of sewage discharges into the sanitary sewerage system. The volume thus metered or measured shall be the basis for sewer service charges in accordance with provisions stated elsewhere herein.

m. If there exists no known data available to the Township to ascertain the amount of water consumed by the property owner, there shall be imposed a maximum annual service charge to said property of \$25,000, which sum shall take priority over the other charges set forth in this subsection 20-6.1.

n. If a property owner has installed a separate water meter for a pool not flowing into the sewer system and/or a sprinkler system, the water flow from such separate water meter(s) shall not be included in the calculation of the annual sewer service charge; provided, however, that the property owner affords the appropriate Township officials reasonable access to the property to confirm the existence of such separate water

meter(s).

o. The Plumbing Sub-Code Official, Assistant Township Engineer, Health Officer, Building Sub-Code Official and other duly authorized employees of the Township bearing proper credentials and identification shall be permitted to enter upon all properties within the Township for the purpose of inspection, observation, measurement, sampling and testing, in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter and in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:26A-19.

p. If the Sewerage Utility of the Township of Springfield is charged additional fees by the RVSA, pursuant to its existing agreement, based upon the quality and/or quantity of flow, the Sewerage Utility reserves the right to pass those charges on to those industrial users of the sewerage system to whom such additional fees are attributable. It is the intent of this subsection that these additional fees shall be in addition to the annual sewer charge computed in accordance with subsection 20-6.1j. above.

q. In addition to those annual sewer charges established by this Section 20-5, the Sewerage Utility shall have the right to include in the rate structure established hereby all direct and indirect costs and expenses associated with the administration and maintenance of the Sewerage Utility.

r. The Township shall also charge the Town of Westfield and the Borough of Mountainside for their use of the sewerage system within the Township of Springfield at the "Intra-municipality" rate adopted annually by Resolution of the Township Committee.

s. In the event that the common elements of any apartment complex, condominium association, homeowners association or co-operative corporation located within the Township include washing machines, cold water outlets or pools which flow into the sewerage system, the Sewerage Utility shall invoice such apartment complex, condominium association, homeowners association or co-operative housing corporation at the Residential Rate for such flow as set forth in subsection 20-6.1b. above.

t. In the event that the RVSA imposes any penalties or charges upon the Sewerage Utility or the Township of Springfield for violating its flow limitation as set forth in the agreement with the RVSA, the Sewerage Utility reserves the right to invoice those users of the sewerage system directly or indirectly responsible for such excessive flow. It is the intent of this subsection that these additional penalties or charges imposed upon the Sewerage Utility or the Township of Springfield by the RVSA be added to the sewer service charges which have been computed in accordance with Sections 20-6.1b. and 20-6.1j. hereunder.

u. Discounted Rates. The following property owners shall be entitled to a discount of ten (10%) percent off the annual service charge for Class "R" residential units (except for residential properties on septic) set forth in subsection 20-6.1b. above:

(i) Qualified New Jersey resident senior citizens, disabled persons, or the surviving spouse meeting the criteria set forth in N.J.S.A. 54:4-8.40 et seq., and

(ii) 100% disabled Veterans or surviving spouse/surviving civil union partner/ surviving domestic partner of 100% disabled veterans or service persons meeting the criteria set forth in N.J.S.A. 54:4-8.10 et seq. and the rules and regulations set forth in N.J.A.C. 18:27-1 et seq.

The burden of proof to receive such discount shall be the responsibility of the individual or individuals seeking such discount through documentation acceptable to the appropriate representative(s) of the Sewerage Utility. Any property owner who becomes eligible for any of the discounts set forth above either (i) after the adoption of this ordinance, or (ii) after the annual sewer service charge has been billed in any subsequent year after the adoption of this ordinance, shall receive such discount beginning as of January 1 of the year after such eligibility has been established.

v. The Residential and Non-Residential rates established by Resolution as provided in this subsection 20-6.1 shall remain in effect until changed or modified by subsequent Resolution of the Township Committee.

20-6.2 Collection of Sewer Service Charges. The sewer service charges referenced in Section 20-6.1 shall be issued as one bill with two (2) payment stubs as detailed below. Such sewer service charges shall remain a lien upon the subject property until paid and satisfied.

20-6.3 Billing. The bill for the sewer service charge shall be based upon water consumption for the period beginning January 1 through December 31 of the immediately preceding year. The bill will be forwarded by the Tax Collector to the property owner and shall be issued as one (1) bill with two (2) payment stubs. The first payment (which shall be not less than fifty (50%) percent of the total annual sewer service charge) shall be due on April 1 of each year and the second payment shall be due on October 1 of each year. There shall be a ten (10) day grace period from each due date, after which interest on the overdue amount shall begin to accrue. Delinquent payments shall be charged interest at the same rate as is charged for delinquent taxes.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, for calendar year 2010, the first payment (which shall not be less than fifty (50%) percent of the total annual sewer service charge) will be due September 1, 2010 and the

second payment will be due on December 1, 2010.

20-6.4 Change of Use. In the event that the use of a property changes to such an extent that it affects the volume of sewage or water consumption, the Tax Assessor will revise the service charges levied in accordance with the new use.

20-6.5 Appeal Of Annual Sanitary Sewer Charges. All appeals on interpretation of this Chapter, including, but not limited to flow, classification or rates, shall be made in the following manner:

b. a. The property owner shall first submit a copy of his, her or its water bill from the previous year to the representative of the Engineering Department designated by the Township Administrator for review. If the designated representative determines that there has been an error in the calculation of water flow or that the rate was calculated incorrectly, a revised bill will be promptly issued by the Township. If the designated representative finds that the bill is accurate, he or she shall so notify the property owner in writing within fifteen (15) days from receipt of the bill from the property owner.

c. b. If the property owner is not satisfied with the response from the designated representative, he, she or it may make a further written appeal to the Sewerage Utility Advisory Board ("SUAB") comprised of the following Township officials:

- The Tax Collector;
- The CFO;
- A representative of the Engineering Department;
- The Tax Assessor; and
- The Township Administrator.

Such appeal to the SUAB shall be filed within ten (10) days from the property owner's receipt of the response from the representative of the Engineering Department. The SUAB shall conduct an informal investigation of the property owner's concerns and may take such testimony from the property owner, and his, her or its experts as it deems necessary. A formal decision shall be issued by the SUAB within thirty (30) days of the property owner's appeal to the SUAB, unless the SUAB obtains an extension from the property owner.

d. c. The decision of the SUAB shall be final and binding upon the Township and the property owner.

e. Notwithstanding the foregoing, under all circumstances, in order to take advantage of any of the appeal/procedures set forth above (a. or b.), all sewer bills must first be paid in full. If the appeal process results in a refund to the property owner, such refund shall promptly be made by Resolution of the Township Committee.

SECTION III. Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinance of the Township of Springfield is hereby further supplemented and amended by creating a new Section 20-7 (currently identified as "Reserved") entitled "Penalties" to read as follows:

20-7 PENALTIES.

20-7.1 Violation and Penalty.

For each violation of any provision of this Chapter, the owner, contractor or other persons interested as general agent, architect, building contractor, owner, tenant or any other persons who commit, take part or assist in any violation of this Chapter, or who maintain any building or premises in which any violation of this Chapter shall exist, shall for each and every violation be liable to the greater of (i) the penalty as stated in Chapter I, Section 1-5.1 (Maximum Penalty) or (ii) the actual damages sustained by the Sewerage Utility caused by such violations. Each and every day that such violation continues shall be considered a separate specific violation of this Chapter.

SECTION IV. Subsection 20-4.2 entitled "Permit Required" of Section 20-4 entitled "Sewer Connections" of Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield is hereby amended by increasing the twenty (\$20.00) dollar permit fee set forth in clause b. to fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

SECTION V. Subsection 20-4.3 entitled "Fees" of Section 20-4 entitled "Sewer Connections" of Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinance of the Township of Springfield is amended to read as follows:

20-4.3 Fees.

There shall be obtained with each application a fee established by [ordinance] resolution of the Township Committee for each separate connection with the sewerage system, and the [Construction] Engineering Department shall turn over the fees to the [Treasurer] CFO at the first regular meeting each month of the Township Committee. The fees established by Resolution for each separate connection shall remain in effect until changed or modified by subsequent Resolution of the Township Committee. It is the intent of this subsection that there be established two separate and distinct rates for connection fees, one for residential properties and one for non-residential properties.

SECTION VI. Subsection 20-4.7 entitled "Discharge of Certain Wastes Forbidden" of Section 20-4 entitled "Sewer Connections" of Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield, is hereby deleted in its entirety and substituted with the

following new Subsection 20-4.7 entitled "Prohibited Discharges into Sanitary Sewers", to read as follows:

20-4.7 Prohibited Discharges into Sanitary Sewers. Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any of the following described waters or wastes to any public sewer:

a. Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than 150 degrees Fahrenheit.

b. Any water or waste which may contain more than 100 milligrams per liter by weight of fat, oil, wax, grease, or other substances which may solidify or become viscous at temperatures between 32 and 150 degrees Fahrenheit.

c. Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, alcohol, tar, fuel oil or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid, gas or vapor.

d. Any garbage except properly shredded garbage. The installation and operation of any garbage grinder equipped with a motor of three-fourths horsepower or greater are subject to the review and approval of the Township.

e. Having a flash point lower than 187 degrees Fahrenheit are determined by the Tagliabue (Tag) close cup method.

f. Any ashes, cinders, stones, sand, mud, straw, shavings, or sawdust, metal sticks, coarse rubbish, glass, rags, tar, feathers, plastics, water, rubber, animal guts or tissues, entrails, blood, hair, hides, wood, paunch manure or any other substance likely to damage, destroy or cause an obstruction to the flow of any sewer or which may interfere with the proper operation of the sewerage works.

g. Any waters, sewerages, or wastes having a pH lower than 5.0 or higher than 9.5, or having other corrosive or detrimental property capable of causing damage or hazard to the sewerage works or personnel.

h. Any waters or wastes containing a toxic, poisonous or radioactive substances in sufficient quantity to injure or interfere with any sewage treatment process or to constitute a hazard to humans, animals or marine life, or create any hazard in the receiving waters.

i. Any noxious, malodorous or taste-producing gas, vapor or substance, such as phenols, capable of creating a public or private nuisance, or which may prove toxic to the sewage treatment processes, or which may exceed acceptable limits for discharge to receiving waters.

j. Materials which exert or cause:

- Unusual concentrations or inert suspended solids, such as but not limited to Fuller's earth, lime slurries and lime residues, or of dissolved solids, such as but not limited to sodium chloride and sodium sulfate;

2. Excessive discoloration, such as but not limited to dye wastes and vegetable tanning solutions;

3. Unusual BOD, suspended solids, chemical oxygen demand or chlorine requirements in such quantities as to constitute a significant load on the sewage treatment works.

4. Unusual volume of flow or concentration of wastes constituting "slugs", as defined herein.

k. Waters or wastes containing substances which are not amenable to treatment or reduction by the sewage treatment process employed, or are amenable to treatment only to such degree that the sewage treatment plant effluent cannot meet the requirements of other agencies having jurisdiction over discharge to the receiving waters.

l. Any substance prohibited by any federal, state, county or municipal regulatory or government body including but not limited to the Federal Environmental Protection Agency, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority or the Sewerage Utility of the Township of Springfield as set forth or determined by the rules, regulations of requirements or such regulatory agencies or bodies.

SECTION VII. Subsection 20-9.4 entitled "Annual Charge Payable to Township" of Section 20-9 entitled "Residential Waste" of Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield is hereby deleted in its entirety and all remaining subsections in said Section 20-9 are to be renumbered accordingly.

SECTION VIII. Subsection 20-9.11 entitled "Domestic Sewage" of Subsection 20-9 entitled "Residential Waste" of Chapter XX entitled "Sewers" of the General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield is hereby deleted in its entirety. Existing subsection 20-9.12 entitled "Payments" is renumbered 20-9.11.

SECTION IX. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed as to such inconsistencies.

SECTION X. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION XI. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after the adoption and after final publication according to law.

SECTION XII. Upon adoption, the Township Clerk is directed to forward a certified copy of this Ordinance to the Executive Director of the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority. (Continued)
