## Linden school to join national program

LINDEN — Linden's School No. 5 elementary school has been selected to join the prestigious National Blue Ribbon Schools Program, a coveted designation from the U.S. Department of Education that celebrates excellent schools and effective educators.

District administrators, Board of Education President Gregory R. Martucci, Principal Laura Scamardella and faculty were at the school's gymnasium on Thursday, Sept. 24, to celebrate the school's achievement.

The other eight New Jersey public schools receiving the 2020 National Blue Ribbon Schools designation are Lillian M. Steen Elementary School in Bogota; Henry B. Milnes Elementary School in Fair Lawn; Gould School in North Caldwell; County Prep High School, Hudson County Schools of Technology, in Jersey City; Old Turnpike Middle School in Tewksbury Township; Clark Mills School, Manalapan-Englishtown Regional School District; Riverview Elementary School in Denville; and Island Heights Elementary School in Island Heights.

According to a media release from Linden's public schools discussing this

academic feat, School No. 5 is an elementary school for kindergarten through grade five chosen as an "Exemplary High

Performing School," based on state assessment data, student growth scores, See **SCHOOL**, Page 8

## Union County to get \$250,000 in funding

UNION COUNTY — The Union County freeholder board announced on Friday, Sept. 25, that it will be receiving \$250,000 in state funds that will be used to dredge the Clark Reservoir, which sits off Lake Avenue in the township. The announcement comes as the county is currently studying recreational usage, environmental impacts and dredging the 150-acre reservoir, in a master plan.

"The Clark Reservoir is an important natural resource and part of a watershed that provides a recreational oasis and picturesque backdrop for many in Union County," Sen. Nicholas Scutari said. "I also thank the governor for including my funding request for this project in his budget."

Freeholder Christopher Hudak thanked Scutari for providing

the funding. "Through the master plan we have embarked on," he added, "we seek to maximize the benefit of this beautiful natural resource, which was once destined to be developed, and offer our residents increased recreational opportunities in a bucolic setting."

"We are looking forward to making improvements at the reservoir that will enhance its use by the public, and we welcome the funding, which is perfectly timed," said Freeholder Chairperson Alexander Mirabella. "I would like to thank Sen. Scutari for his efforts in lobbying for the funding and Gov. Murphy for including it in his budget."

The Clark Reservoir was built in 1907 along the Robinson's See **FUNDING**, Page 2

“Here in Union County, we stand firm in our resolve to support the LGBTQ+ community through advocacy, awareness and action,” said Freeholder Chairperson Alexander Mirabella. “The Freeholder board is proud to host events that seek to normalize acceptance of all identities in one of the most diverse counties in New Jersey, and the new webinar series will help inform and enlighten the concerns and experiences of the LGBTQ+ community.”

“OUT in Union County: Queer Power Hour” will explore LGBTQ-specific topics and offer stories and discussions involving queer folks from different backgrounds and experiences, including some of New Jersey’s most dedicated LGBTQ advocates, community leaders and allies.

“This effort is especially important to the LGBTQ+ community, where many people may be vulnerable to feelings of isolation during this period of separation and social distance,” said Freeholder Rebecca Williams, who is liaison to the Freeholder Board’s LGBTQ+ Ad Hoc Committee. “Through innovative virtual programming like this new series, we continue to encourage people to connect, learn and share with one another.”

## Blood drive to be hosted

Donors should eat and drink at their regular meal times, bring a NYBC donor card or signature/photo ID, and enter at the rear of the school building.

## Man charged in connection with Linden police standoff

LINDEN — Linden resident John P. Mooney has been arrested and charged with criminal offenses in connection with a police standoff that took place at his home on Sunday, Sept. 20, acting Union County Prosecutor Lyndsay V. Ruotolo and Linden Police Chief David Hart jointly announced on Tuesday, Sept. 22.

Mooney, 36, is charged with third-degree arson, third- and fourth-degree aggravated assault against a police officer, third- and fourth-degree weapons offenses, fourth-degree criminal mischief, and simple assault and unlawful criminal restraint, both disorderly persons offenses.

Linden Police Department officers responded to Mooney’s Furber Avenue home on Sept. 20 at

approximately 4:30 p.m. and found an adult female who had sustained minor injuries as a result of an alleged assault. Officers also found Mooney, who refused to surrender, initiating a standoff with police.

During the course of the standoff, the defendant allegedly punched out a front window of his home, set several household items on fire, threw objects such as bricks and knives at officers, and fired a nail gun at police. As a result, two police officers sustained minor injuries and an SUV parked in the home’s driveway was heavily damaged.

Ultimately, members of the Union County Arson Investigation Unit, the Union County Sheriff’s Office Crime Scene Unit, and the Union County Emergency Response Team SWAT Unit — including

Branch of the Rahway River. It fell into disuse by the early 1990s. To prevent the property from being drained and sold, Clark took ownership of the reservoir. A conservation easement was established to protect the surrounding shoreline from development forever.

In 2008, the county acquired the reservoir from Clark for \$1. Combined with its acquisition of the former St. Agnes property on Madison Hill Road in Clark and the former Schwarz Farm on Old Raritan Road straddling Clark and Westfield, the

county assembled a continuous greenway that links the Clark Reservoir with nearby parks and public lands.

Greenways were a fundamental part of the original design of the Union County parks system, dating back to the 1920s. The Olmsted Brothers, the same firm that designed New York’s Central Park, envisioned continuous natural pathways along the county’s streams and rivers.

In addition to their public recreation and conservation roles, greenways also serve as natural, low-cost storm drainage systems.

UCERT/SWAT Commander and Union County Undersheriff Dennis Burke, UCERT/SWAT Chiefs’ Liaison and Berkeley Heights Police Chief John DiPasquale and Ruotolo — all responded to the scene.

Through a collaborative joint effort involving those agencies, the defendant was taken into custody without further incident at approximately 8:15 p.m. and was transported to a local medical facility for treatment and evaluation.

Mooney will remain in custody, pending a first appearance and detention hearing, to take place in Superior Court.

These criminal charges are mere accusations. Every defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proved guilty in a court of law.

# Kean professor patents new computer password system

UNION — A new authentication system that could solve a common problem of the digital age — the need to remember multiple passwords — has been patented by an associate professor in Kean University's School of Computer Science and Technology.

The "single-factor dynamic authentication system," officially known as U.S. Patent No. 10,749,860, was developed at Kean by associate professor Jing-Chiou Liou. It was patented in August.

"Secure passwords are often difficult to remember, and people have multiple passwords and usernames," said Liou, who does research in cybersecurity and software engineering. "This system lets a user choose a virtual one-time password and have the security level of different random passwords."

Authentication is the process of certifying credentials each time a user logs in to a secure computer system or service.

Liou's invention allows people to keep track of fewer passwords. It generates different random passwords by scrambling the characters each time a password is typed into a device.

"If you type '1234' following the keypad layout, your phone may actually send '7258' to the remote site," he said. "Through my system, even if a password is

stolen, the attacker cannot reproduce the same keypad layout and cannot generate the same password as the legitimate device."

It would improve security for both companies and users, Liou added. If there were a data breach at a company, a hacker would be unable to repro-

duce all the scrambled passwords.

Patricia Morreale, executive director of the School of Computer Science and Technology, said the school is "delighted" by news of the patent.

"Dr. Liou is an outstanding researcher and mentor for our students," she said. "This patent illustrates our active research community in computer science and information technology."

She said Liou has always included students in his research.

"Many of our students have ideas that could lead to a patent of their own someday," she said. "Having Dr. Liou teaching at Kean means that our students will have direct access to an innovator."

The patented system could be licensed by companies that provide secure services, Liou said, and would be automatically installed on the device of a user who signs up for a particular service.

Liou said he has spent about 10 years working on authentication techniques and one year on the latest invention. He is continuing to research authentication techniques.

He also works with Kean students on research for Kean's annual Research Days, teaches graduate capstone courses and was the recipient of the 2017 Kean Graduate Faculty Award.

# Fugitive wanted for 2018 child sex assault in Plainfield

PLAINFIELD — Investigators are requesting assistance from the public in locating a fugitive wanted for allegedly sexually assaulting a child in Plainfield the summer before last, acting Union County Prosecutor Lyndsay V. Ruotolo and Plainfield Police Director Lisa Burgess jointly announced on Wednesday, Sept. 23.

Jose A. Donis, with a last known address on the 900 block of West Third Street in Plainfield, has been charged with second-degree sexual assault of a child younger than the age of 13 and

third-degree endangering the welfare of a child.


A joint investigation by the Plainfield Police Division and the Prosecutor's Office's Special Victims Unit revealed that the alleged sexual abuse took place from early June to late September 2018, when the victim was on summer vacation and the defendant rented a room in the building in which she lived, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutor Kathleen Dillon, who is prosecuting the case. Donis was criminally charged in June 2020 and has remained at large since.

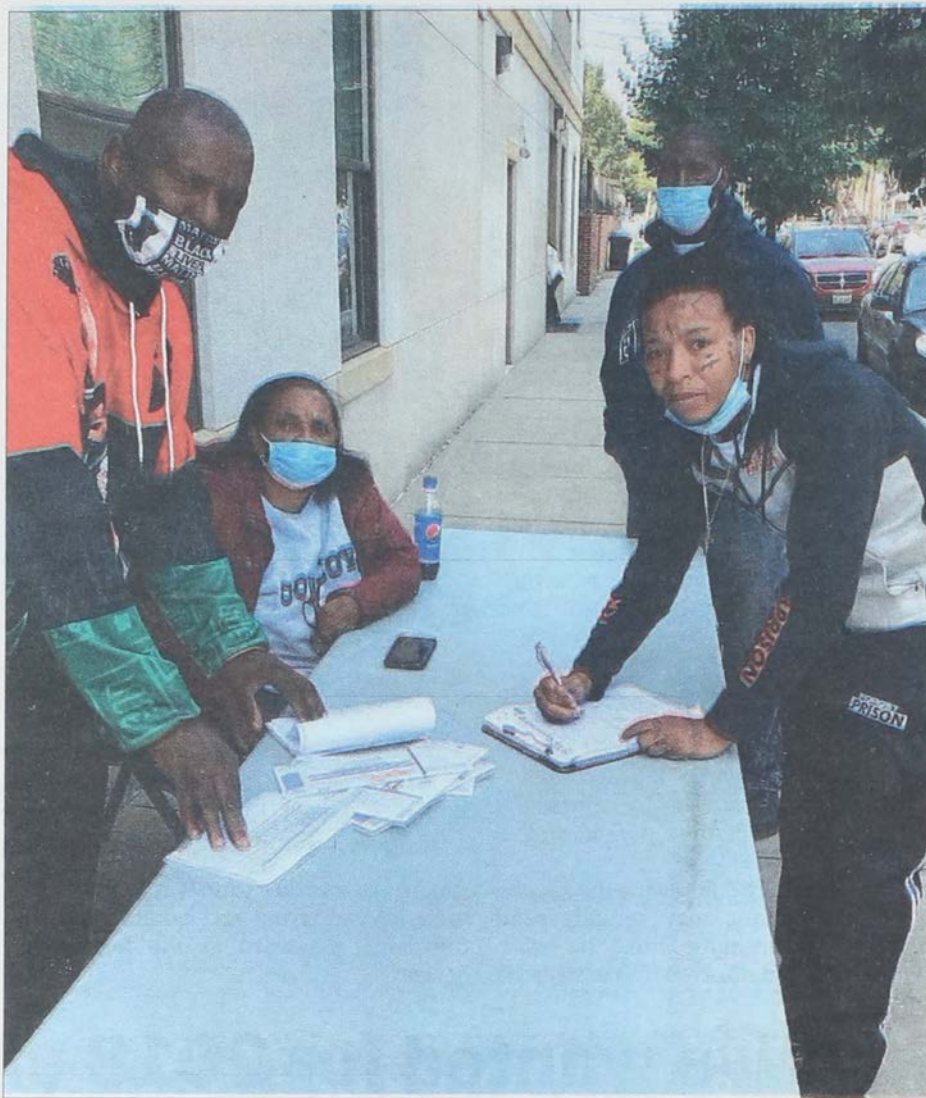

# Local activist makes a difference in community

ELIZABETH — James Carey had known since last fall of a new law that allows people on parole and probation to vote.

But it was not until last week that this community organizer in Elizabeth realized how critical it is to spread the word.

Carey, who serves as the director of social services for the Elizabethport Presbyterian Center on First Street, was grabbing a sandwich with a friend who had recently been released from prison.

"He said to me how much he wanted the president to get voted out of the White House but was really upset that he wasn't allowed to vote," Carey said. "I asked why he thought he couldn't vote, and he said it was because he was on parole. I realized then and there that there are so many people in this community who think they still don't have the right to vote."

Carey, who helps run the 365 Voter Registration Initiative in the port to encourage voter participation, has quickly

shifted his focus. Since last week, he has been reaching out to residents who are on parole and probation to let them know their votes will be counted in November. To date, he has registered 30 individuals.

Carey, 55, is focused on voter registration, but he also wants to make sure that new voters know how to fill out the form so it is counted.

A lifetime resident of the port, Carey said he uses social media to spread his important message, showing photos of individuals who are now registering to vote.

The legislation, A-5823, was sponsored by Jamel Holley and other state lawmakers; it took effect on March 17 and eliminates the voting disqualification for an estimated 79,000 people on either probation or parole in New Jersey.

"This is a great law," Carey said. "We just need to make sure as many people as possible know about it before Election Day. I'm a man on a mission."

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# Ribbon cut on the new turf fields in Rahway

absenteeism rates and its graduation rate. School No. 5 is one of just nine schools in New Jersey and 367 schools in the nation selected for this honor in 2020.

"School No. 5 is being inducted into the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program. They've become a National Blue Ribbon School, and that's a huge accomplishment," Linden Mayor Derek Armstead said on Sept. 24.

"It just speaks to all of the good things that they're doing here in the school. This is the first time that this has been done in the history of this town, so it's huge. It happened right here at School No. 5 and right in the heart of my community. This achievement says one thing about our town ... that we have some very good teachers, and we also have very good students, as well.

"I'm excited," said Armstead, who attended the event. "I'm excited because, if it happened once, it could happen again. Good things should be contagious, and we want to make sure that some of the other schools take a good look at this and say to themselves, We can do it, too. For this event, my expectations are to be here, show the school system and the people here at School No. 5, the teachers and the staff, that I'm here and the Mayor's Office is in full support of all their accomplishments and all of their endeavors."

Scamardella was honored with a bouquet of flowers after the school's selection. Teachers Julie Siegal, Kayla Miller and Jayme Perezluha, who are members of the Blue Ribbon School application committee, were also in attendance to show their support of the principal for this accomplishment.

"Today, School No. 5 was recognized as a Blue Ribbon School of excellence," said Scamardella during the event on Sept. 24. "We were recognized through our academic achievement and excellence of our students. I am in amazement. I am so proud and humbled to receive this recognition, along with my staff."

riculum and instruction, attendance, staff size and demographics.

"School No. 5 being recognized as a 2020 Blue Ribbon School of Excellence gives us a true feeling of pride," Miller, Perezluha and Siegal, who worked with Scamardella on the application, said in a statement on Sunday, Sept. 27.

"Every staff member at School No. 5 works tirelessly every day, and this award is a culmination of all of our collective efforts to be the teachers that our students and families deserve. We will relish this for years to come."

"Today's event is very good, because, last year, when the actual state scores came in, I almost had to double-take for

this school because they literally doubled some of the elementary schools that were going on," Martucci said during the event on Sept. 24. "As an educator myself for 47 years, whatever they were doing here, they were doing correctly."

"They were taking the instruction that they've had. They were taking the teachers that they had and how they were presenting the instruction to the students, and the students were grasping it, moving with it and moving forward to the next step educationally."

"It was absolutely amazing, because you do not see these numbers every day," Martucci said of the school's state scores, which had doubled. "These numbers

were not gradually 10 percent; these were going up almost 40, 45 percent, which educationally is unheard of in today's world.

"So I congratulate the principal, her staff and the students on everything at which they're doing here, because what they're doing is the right thing and that's what education is all about."

"This is about progressing up the ladder to a point in which you become competitive when you're 17-years-old, go out into the workforce and be competitive with the next person that you'll be competing against. I'm extremely proud of the whole staff, school, principal and especially, the kids."

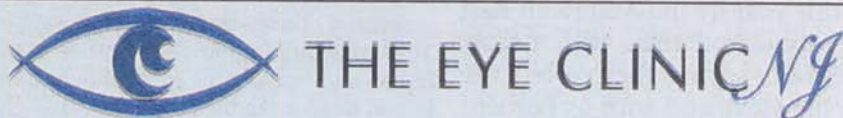

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# Think pink and prevent breast cancer

If the sudden appearance of the color pink everywhere wasn't a hint, October is National Breast Cancer

Awareness Month. This month was chosen to highlight breast cancer awareness in 1985 by a partnership between the American Cancer Society and the pharmaceutical division of Imperial Chemical Industries, now part of AstraZeneca, the producer of several anti-breast cancer drugs. The aim was to promote mammography as the most effective weapon in fighting breast cancer. As for the color pink, a 68-year old California woman named Charlotte Haley, whose sister, daughter and granddaughter had breast cancer, had distributed peace ribbons to call attention to what she perceived as inadequate funding for research. In fall 1991, the Susan G. Komen Foundation handed out pink ribbons to participants in its New York City race for breast cancer survivors. And in 1993, Evelyn Lauder, senior corporate vice president of Estee Lauder Co., founded the Breast Cancer Research Foundation and established the pink ribbon as its symbol.

Breast cancer is a very serious problem. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, except for skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common form of cancer for women in the United States. Each year in

our country, an estimated 250,000 women and 2,300 men are diagnosed with breast cancer. Approximately 42,000 women and 510 men in the United States die each year from this disease.

There are numerous ways to reduce the likelihood of breast cancer. Keep a healthy weight. Exercise regularly. Don't drink alcohol or limit alcoholic drinks. If you take or have been told to take hormone replacement therapy or oral contraceptives, ask your doctor about the risks and find out if it is right for you. Breastfeed your children, if possible. If you have a family history of breast cancer or inherited genes in your BRCA1 or BRCA2 genes, talk to your doctor about other ways to lower your risk. And don't forget about mammograms. The United States Preventive Services Task Force recommends women 50 to 74 years old or who are at above-average risk get a mammogram every two years. Women who are 40 to 49 years old should talk to their doctor or health care professional about when to start or how often to get a mammogram.

Remember, staying healthy throughout your life will lower your risk of developing cancer and improve your chance of surviving cancer if it occurs. This is your body and it's up to you to keep it healthy. Think pink!

# Serve up fire safety in the kitchen

National Fire Prevention Week is observed every year during the week containing Oct. 9, the anniversary of

the Great Chicago Fire, and this year, that week is Oct. 4 to Oct. 10. The Great Chicago Fire took place in 1871, killed more than 300 people, left more than 10,000 homeless and, 40 years later, served as the inspiration for National Fire Prevention Day. President Calvin Coolidge expanded this observation to a week in 1925 and, two years later, themes began to be observed for this week. This year's theme is "Serve up fire safety in the kitchen."

Fire can happen in numerous ways and places in homes, but the No. 1 cause is unattended cooking and cooking equipment. According to the National Fire Protection Association, this is the cause of almost half of all home fires. A report by the NFPA's Outreach and Advocacy division found that approximately 173,000 cooking fires occur in homes each year, resulting in 550 deaths, 4,820 reported fire injuries and more than \$1

billion in direct property damage. A survey this year by the American Red Cross emphasized this, with nearly 70 percent of the respondents saying they've left the kitchen while cooking on the stove and with 55 percent of U.S. adults saying they have walked away from their grill while cooking.

There are key messages around this year's campaign, including:

- Never leave cooking unattended; keep a close eye on what you're cooking.
- Move anything that can catch fire, such as oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging and dish towels, well away from the stovetop and other cooking equipment.
- Be alert while cooking; if you are sleepy, taking medication that makes you drowsy, or being influenced by alcohol or other substances, avoid cooking.

Family life has always centered around the kitchen.

# Breaking the stigma together

Each month we observe different national awareness months, designated to recognize various mental health and substance-use disorders. In doing so, we engage in ongoing discussions with our communities to find new ways to break the negative stigmas attached to seeking treatment.

Last month, like many of our partners and provider networks, we at Summit Oaks Hospital recognized Suicide Awareness and Prevention Month, with hopes that we can provide an opportunity for comfort and healing to those who may need it now and for those who may need our support in the future. Even though September is over, the work continues.

The process of change can be intimidating, and the arrival of fall brings a time for remarkable transitions. A new school year begins, sweaters are again needed and holiday decorations start flooding the stores. These alterations to our daily activities can be anxiety provoking and may lead to negative thinking patterns. Left untreated, these thoughts may worsen. They may build upon one another, stacking up and burying the first thought deeper and deeper. As these negative thoughts continue to build, worsening symptoms may arise. This negative thinking can interfere with our daily activities, and we may not be able to function as we once could. Such thought patterns may lead to concerns for our safety.

Making a decision to seek mental health treatment is intimidating. The hardest part can be picking up the phone and making the first call. Sure, you can scour the internet and research therapists, treatment centers and doctors in your area. After spending an hour scrolling through your options, you may have composed a list of questions, such as, "What is the difference between an LCSW and an LPC?" "What is a 'level of care'?" "Which type of doctor prescribes medications?" "What's it really like as a patient there?" "Is the food good?"

As mental health professionals, we want to help you. It is our passion and commitment to lead you toward a path that is full of hope, happiness and fulfillment. We appreciate that the journey to recovery is not easy, but we have the tools for you to succeed. You, your family members and your support networks are not alone in navigating the maze of the mental health treatment world. We are with you every step of the way, and we strive to

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# Getting ready for summer's end

My garden is a riot of activity at the moment, with honeybees, bumblebees, skippers and pollinators of all kinds swarming over the exuberant asters and rampant perilla mint. All that frantic action almost obscures what is missing — the big butterflies, such as monarchs and swallowtails, which floated through the garden every day in the summer. They are gone for the season. Only the white cabbage butterflies remain.

Also missing in action are the scores of roses that have appeared in fits and starts since May. The bushes haven't stopped producing; they are just slowing down, their energy spent by a growing season's worth of effort. If nature cooperates and keeps hard frosts at bay, the bushes will continue on in this way for quite a while — sometimes through Thanksgiving. I hope for that but also know the USDA says the first frost date for this area is Oct. 15. The tightly furled buds on some of the bushes may well be the last roses of the year.

The flip side of all this finality is that the Japanese beetles that generally plague the beds in July are also gone. Aphids are less common, too. They will

be back in droves next year, but for now, I don't have to pick them off the flowers or blast them off the stems with stiff sprays from the hose. The elimination of those chores might give me more time to enjoy the late blooms, though I am frequently too busy cutting back all the rampant end-of-summer growth to appreciate that freedom.

The roses are more jewellike now. This may be due to the fact that they are less numerous or, possibly, because of the unique qualities of autumn light. Whatever the reason, they glow. Sometimes, the petal colors change, too, either because of the shorter days or cooler temperatures. The flowers on the pink Gruss an Aachen shrub rose, which have peach overtones in spring and summer, now appear silvery pink. Sentimental, red and white-striped at all times, is now more red than white. Some of the deep yellow blooms seem closer to rich cream.

It is as if all the gaudiness of summer

has been thrown off in favor of a more restrained, elegant attitude. Maybe the effort of competing with a bubblegum pink aster is just too much to bear. Certain varieties seem to flourish better than others in the late-season bloom sweepstakes.

The champion in my garden is an old shrub rose that is probably Marie Pavie. It is about 4 feet tall and also supports the white-flowered clematis, Duchess of Edinburgh, which is growing up through the rose canes. The flowers are relatively small — about 2 inches across — with a pink flush in bud. When fully opened, the blooms exude a lovely fragrance. Marie Pavie is slow to start in the spring, but once it gets going, it does not quit until real cold sets in. Right now, it boasts scores of blossoms, with new buds forming every day. I keep a small bouquet of them on my desk as a reminder to stay upbeat whatever the challenges of the day.

Sally Holmes is almost the opposite of Marie Pavie, but it shares the seasonal longevity trait. The big single blooms have only five white petals apiece, but they open the same as happy faces and

keep smiling until at least October. Sally has the added distinction of lasting longer in a vase than any other rose in the garden. This is important if you like indoor arrangements and have only a few roses to choose from.

Right now, The Fairy has only a few pink flowers, but I see a barrage of buds that are harbingers of blooms to come. The Fairy's pink is not the bright pink of some of the asters, but it stands out anyway. I have deliberately excised the perilla mint that has threatened to engulf the little shrub. If the rose is making the effort to bloom vigorously as the days grow shorter, I will make the effort to give it some elbow room.

The ultimate act of hope in fall is the planting of spring-flowering bulbs. The ability to pick a few late roses as you finish all that digging is a great way to celebrate the here and now.

Don't let kitchen fires ruin that room and possibly your whole house. The vast majority of kitchen fires are easily preventable — if you observe the rules of safety and always stay alert.

Finally, we urge everyone to check the batteries in their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms this week. The NFPA recommends changing them every six months. When it makes a high-pitched chirping noise, that's a sure sign your smoke alarm's batteries need to be replaced.

"Take a moment, take a deep breath and know that you are not going through this alone. Never stop loving yourself; you are worth the fight."

"Read my words. There is hope. Hang in there. Stay and get the best of what is offered to you. Listen and learn. I have faith in you."

Suicide Prevention and Awareness Month provided us with a strong reminder of the importance of education, communication and support networks. Family members and supporters of those who are suffering should never be left

behind. We hear you and we are here for you. Hearing the experiences of others provide a reminder that your treatment journey does not have to be traveled alone.

There is no shame in pursuing professional help. Overcoming the negative stigma attached to seeking mental health treatment is a battle worth fighting. We must start with conversations with one another, sharing words of inspiration and hope, and supporting those we care for during their times of need.

Section 2. The sum of \$95,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the improvement described in Section 1 of this ordinance. Said sum so appropriated shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance.

Section 3.
