IT'S THE PERCENTAGE THAT COUNTS

What has happened to food prices in the last 12 years? The common answer would be that they've zoomed. And, of course, measured by the dollars and cents barometer alone that is true. But it's a faulty barometer, for it takes no account of increases in our income.

According to the National Association of Food Chains, retail food prices have increased less than 17 per cent since the 1947-49 period--while wage rates have gone up 72 per cent. This means that food prices have declined 32 per cent relative to wages.

The point is that food is cheaper today than ever before--and, additionally, its prices have risen less than the price of most other consumer items. That speaks mighty well for the efficiency of those who produce and process our food, and those who sell it to us across the retail counters.

The City of Hoboken was shocked this week when news was released of the death of Father Francis Fallon, pastor of O.L.G. Church. His death saddened the hearts of everyone from the youngest child to the oldest parishioner of his church and everyone else who knew him. In Father Fallon's eyes everyone was a child of God and he showered his endless love and kindness upon all of them.

The newly renovated school and convent are vivid memorials to this great man; the many church activities he started, the tremendous parish spirit he created are also results of his untiring energy; however, his greatest efforts can never be measured or known - except to the hundreds of people he helped privately and without notoriety. To Father Fallon all were his children and in his personal care, and he spared no effort to help any way he could both spiritually and materially.

Hudson vehicles "should be in operation by early summer," Acting Director Ned J. Parsekian predicted recently.

Parsekian said "that is the promise I have from the state bureau of construction," which is in charge of the letting of the bids for the new station.

With land at County Ave. and Secaucus Rd. cleared for the project, letting of the bids for the three-lane station is apparently the next order of business. Parsekian said the construction bureau is apparently delaying the bids until early next month "because of the win month" "because of the winter front and difficulty during these months."

Construction of the station "has a first priority" with all state agencies on direct orders of Gov. Robert B. Meyner, Parsekian said. The Secaucus station will replace the outmoded Union City facility, which in the past has handled thousands of North Hudson vehicles with only a single lane operation.

Allied Lines Sponsors Class Room On Wheels

Through the efforts of the Allied Van Lines in this area a highway safety training "classroom on wheels" was set up Monday at 535 Secaucus Rd.

The mobile van is equipped with vision tester, brake reaction timer, glare reactor, and other devices for testing and training truck and auto drivers.

The unit is a 35-foot, \$20,000 moving van which will seat 25 pupils. It will be open to the public when not used for classes.

Driver-trainer Robert Watson will lecture and give demonstrations for high school seniors and members of local civic organizations.

The training unit is one of two which Allied Van Lines has for use through all 50 states and Canada. In 1960 with one van on the road, the

Allied Road Safety program was presented to 15,000 persons in all sections of the country. A second training unit was placed in commission in September. Allied Van Lines will add two more such units during 1962, giving sectional coverage through the country.

National manufacturers cooperate with Allied in the program by furnishing equipment. The \$4,000 worth of equipment includes movie and slide projectors and a highway safety library.

MOBILE VAN TEACHES SAFETY

A highway safety training "classroom on wheels" equipped with vision tester, brake reaction timer, glare reactor, and other devices for testing and training truck and auto drivers visited Secaucus recently.

The unit is a 35-foot, \$20,000 moving van which seats 25 pupils.

Its \$4,000 worth of training equipment also includes movie and slide projectors and a highway safety library. The mobile safety van came to Secaucus through the efforts of Allied Van Lines agent in this area.

Driver-trainer Robert Watson lectured and gave demonstrations for high school seniors and members of local civic organizations.

The training unit is one of two which Allied Van Lines has for use through all 50 states and Canada. 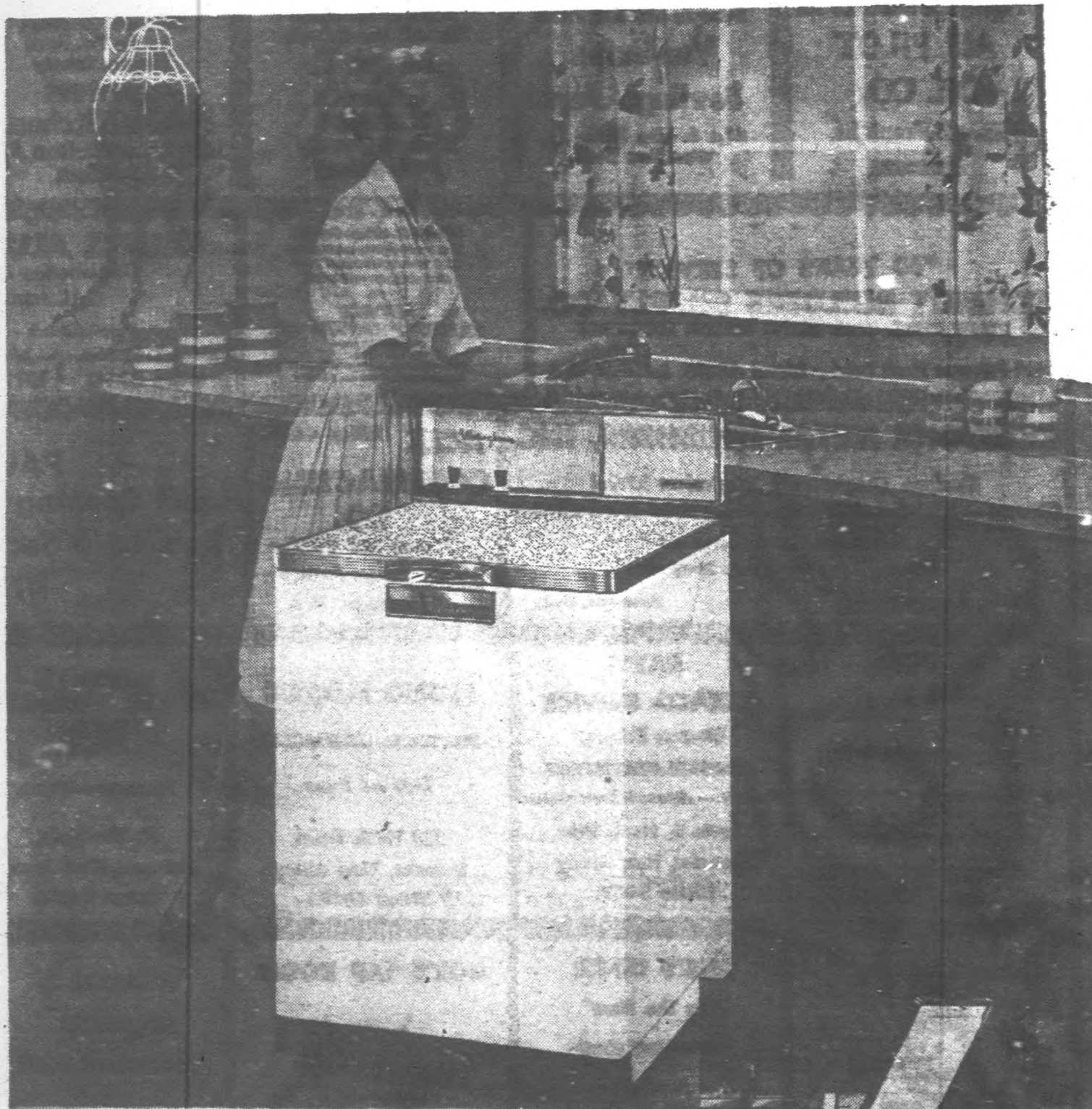

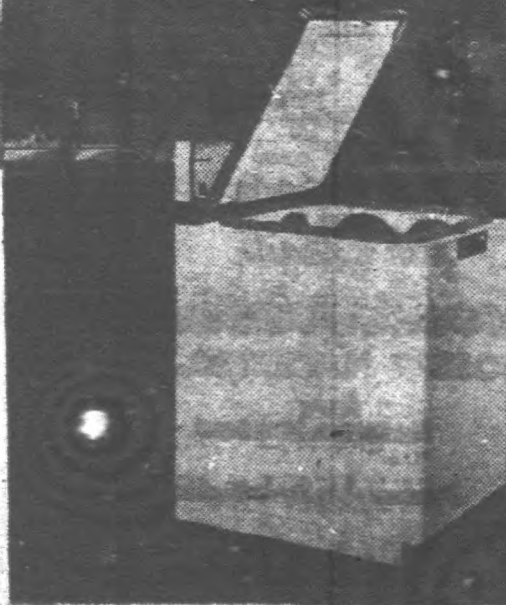

Mothers-to-be Must Diet Properly, March of Dimes Research Shows

No doubt many a healthy young mother-to-be has wondered why her doctor puts so much emphasis on proper diet during pregnancy—especially if she's never been ill a day in her life, and she has a yen for wholesome foods.

But there's good reason for it. More and more it's becoming evident that for the sake of her child a pregnant woman must have a diet adequate in vitamins and minerals, particularly in the early stages of the baby's development.

The reason lies in the dread words: **birth defects.**

Until about 20 years ago, scientists generally went along with the idea that birth defects in higher animals—and that included man—were due for the most part to heredity. So if a baby had picked out the right ancestors, he had a better than good chance of coming into the world perfectly normal, and sound of mind and limb.

Complex Factors Involved

Today, however, doctors know the story is not that simple. An increasing number of studies have shown that a wide variety of factors play a part in the birth picture. If a mother gets either too much or too little of such vital substances as hormones, oxygen, minerals or vitamins during certain stages of her pregnancy, the baby may fail to survive, or may be born malformed.

Under a research grant from The National Foundation-March of Dimes, Dr. Marjorie Nelson at the University of California has been trying to determine just how the absence of a vitamin or mineral may interfere with normal prenatal development.

She has found that in rats the absence of even a single one of certain important minerals or vitamins during early pregnancy can produce drastic effects.

Apparently nature has set up a delicate balance which a mother's body must maintain. If this balance is upset even for a relatively short time, permanent damage may result to the offspring.

mother animal's diet was deficient in the mineral manganese. She is extending these studies with support from The National Foundation-March of Dimes using radioactive material in the diet to trace what goes wrong inside embryonic cells to hinder their normal development.

It is definitely known, for example, that severe folic acid deficiency in a woman can lead to loss of a baby during early pregnancy." And as Dr. Nelson has pointed

Because of the increasing problem of birth defects—it is now estimated that significant malformations occur in one in every 16 babies born in this country—each year—The National Foundation-March of Dimes has recently established a number of Special Treatment and Clinical Study Centers for coping with this crucial medical question. The Birth Defects Treatment Centers are in Jackson, Miss.; Atlanta, Ga.; Seattle; Portland, Ore.; San Francisco; Little Rock, Ark.; Indianapolis; Morgantown, W. Va.; New York City; Baltimore; and Washington, D. C. These are supported on the local level by The National Foundation's chapters.

In addition, Birth Defects Clinical Study Centers are located in Oklahoma City; Nashville, Tenn.; and Columbus,

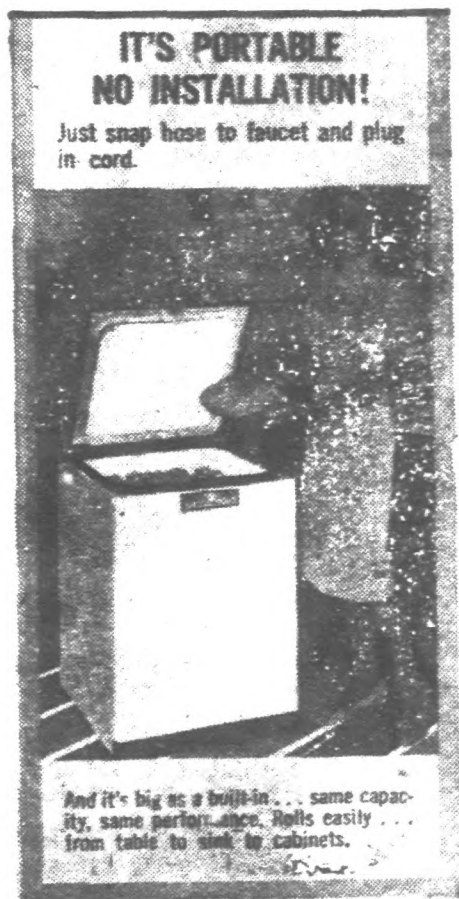
Ohio. These Centers are maintained on a national level with March of Dimes funds which are being applied by The National Foundation to continue support and expansion of such Centers for the development of total medical care for youngsters afflicted with congenital defects.

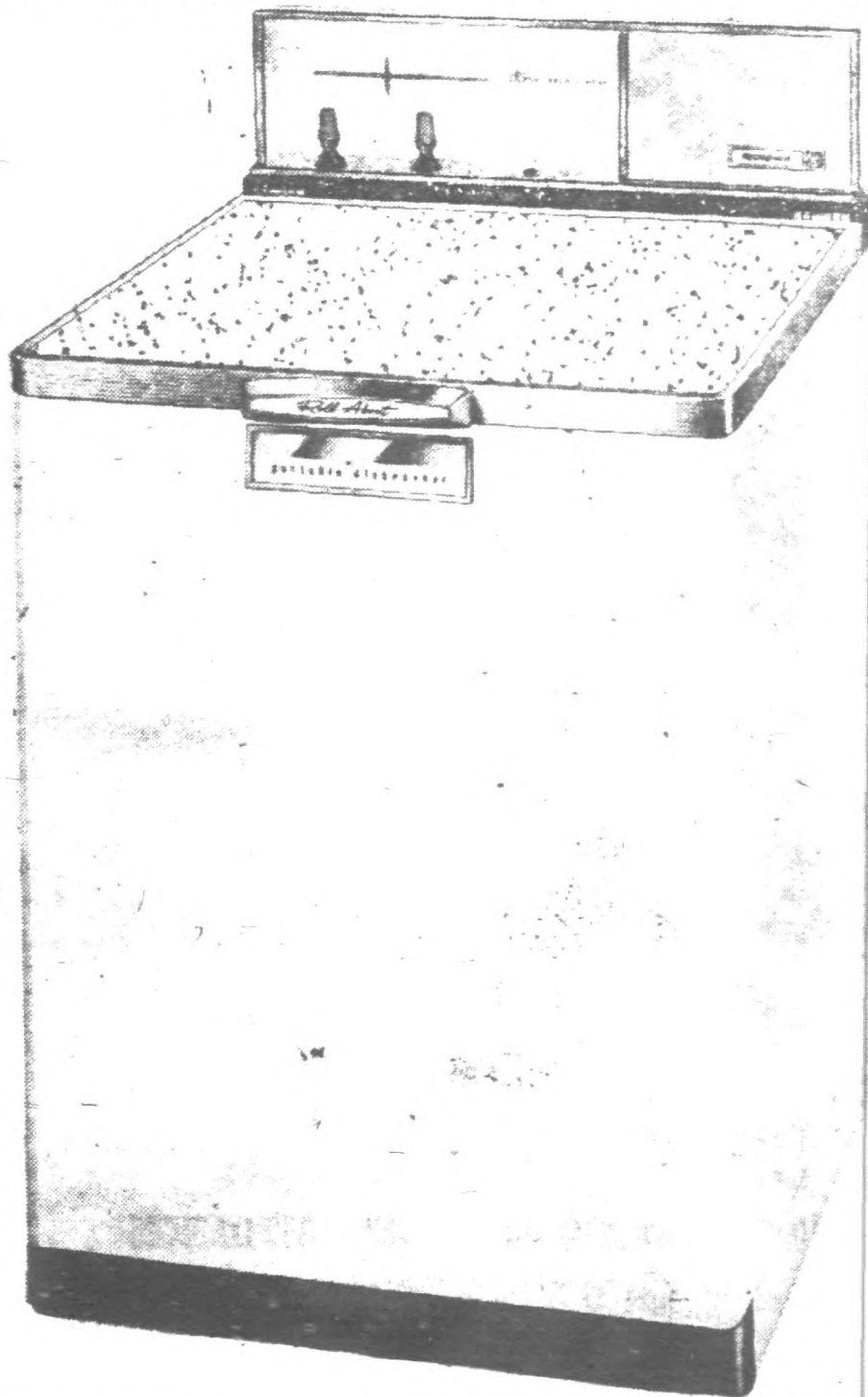

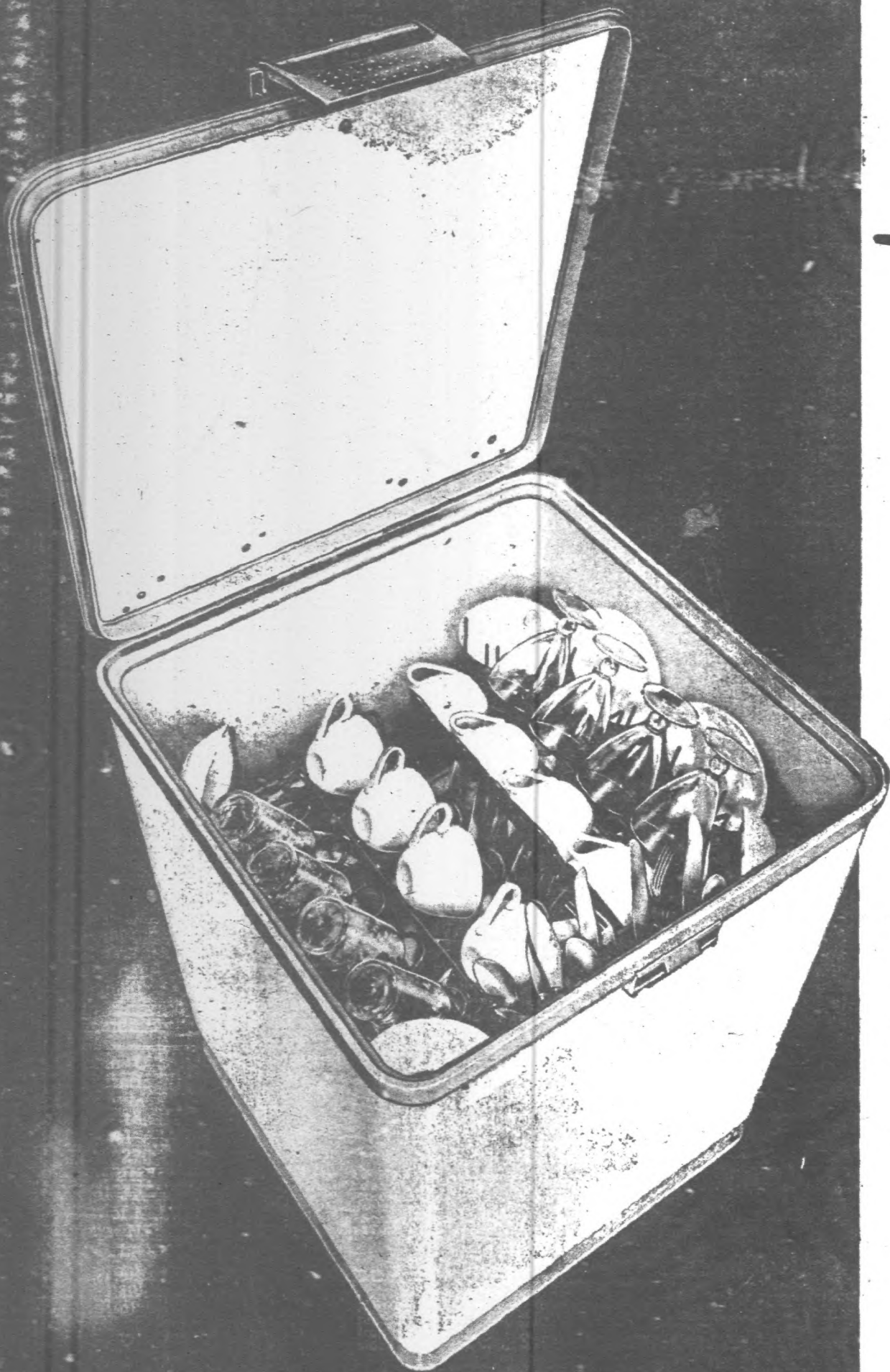

In her San Francisco laboratory Dr. Nelson has demonstrated that even a temporary deficiency of a vitamin such as folic acid during early pregnancy can cause birth abnormalities in these young laboratory animals. The defects may range from the relatively minor to the very severe which include brain damage, displacement of intestinal organs, cleft palate or serious malformations of the heart and eyes.

Timing Is Critical

When Dr. Nelson puts the normal pregnant animals on such a folic acid-deficient diet during the second week of their pregnancy, at least 80 per cent of the embryos die or are mal-

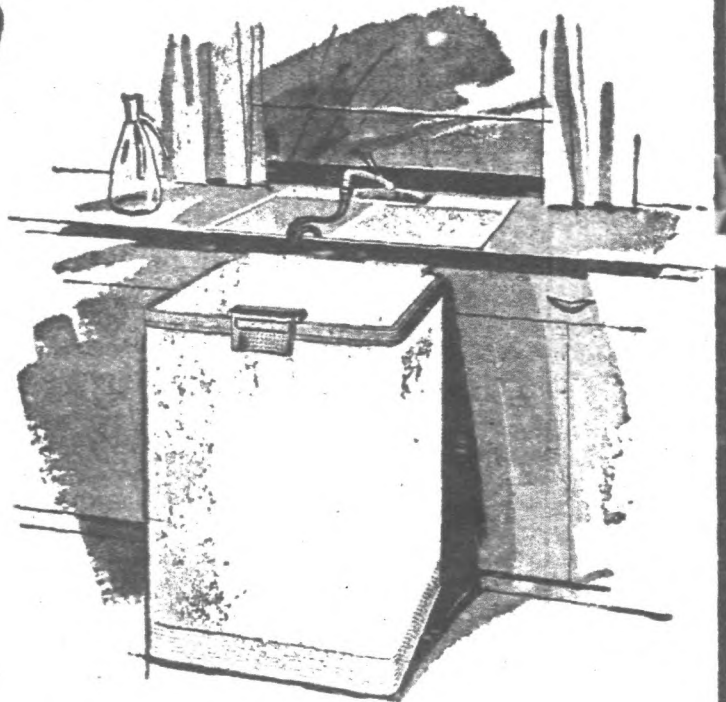

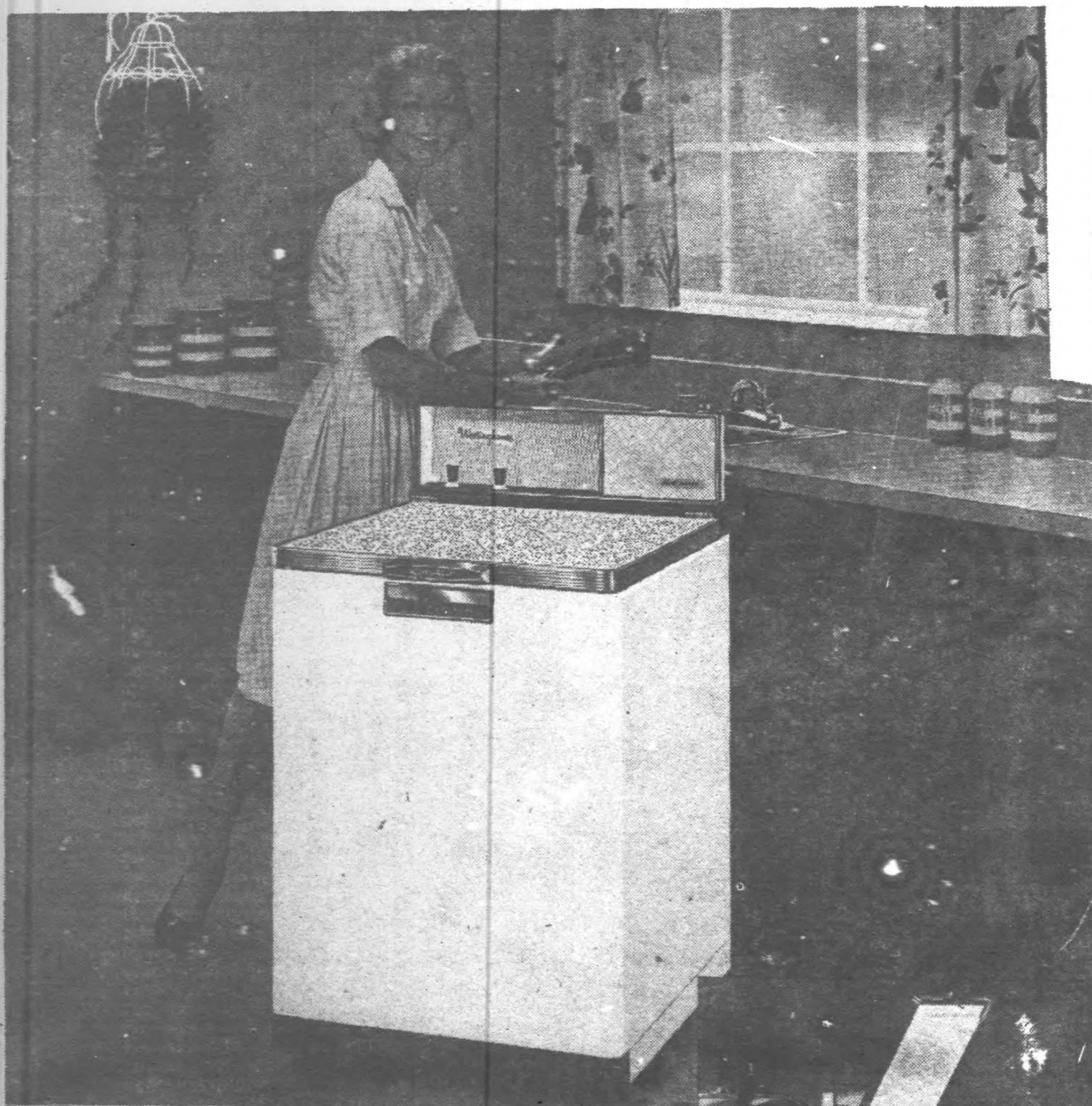

Parking Ban On Boulevard May Get Light

Ridgefield: It was announced at a meeting of the PTA recently that New Jersey State Highway Department had notified Superintendent of Schools W. Arthur Skewes that it will erect a traffic light in front of the school on Bergen Boulevard, if the borough goes along with a parking ban on the east side of Bergen Blvd., in the vicinity of the school.

Mayor Howard Mayer said that a representative of the highway department was in Ridgefield recently and stated he would recommend to his department that a traffic light be installed in front of the school if Ridgefield Council prohibits parking for two blocks on the east side of the street in the vicinity of the school.

Mayor Mayer said he understood the matter had not yet been approved. He will contact Supervising Engineering Harry Hartman of the highway department to clarify the situation.

The mayor said borough officials are agreeable to such a ban if a traffic light can be obtained there.

The location is considered dangerous by Ridgefield authorities because of the number of children crossing the street and the heavy traffic.

Ridgefield's requests for a light at the location have been turned down by the highway department on two or three occasions during the past several years.

The state favors a parking ban on the east side of Bergen Blvd. for the entire length of highway in Ridgefield, but merchants and businessmen along the stretch of highway are opposed to it.

They favor a parking ban only between 7 a. m. and 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. to 6 p. m.

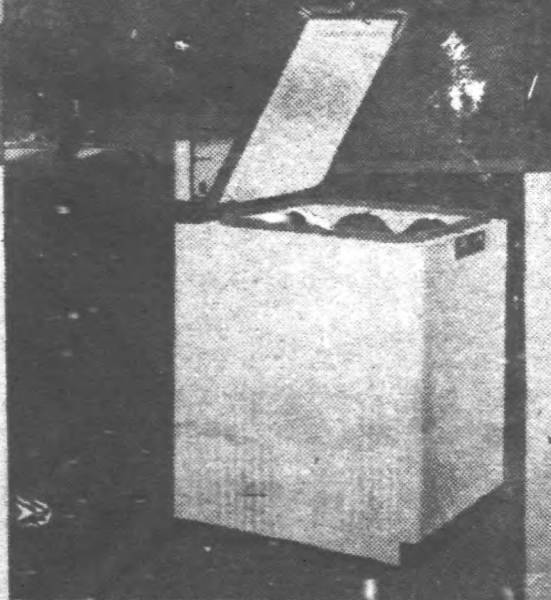

JOURNEY TO THE STARS

Everyone interested in the planet Jupiter has no doubt heard of the great Red Spot. It was first seen in the year 1831 but became famous in 1878 when it developed into a red-colored ellipse and from then on has been under constant observation.

The Red Spot is the only feature on Jupiter that is regarded as semi-permanent. The famous belt zones

vary more than the great red spot changing from great prominence to near obscurity and are not as dependable for observation purposes, although the Red Spot threatens to make liars out of us by fading in recent years. It is no longer as prominent as it once was and is no longer of a brick-red color. The word spot can be misleading in this case as this

huge elliptical area is 25,000 miles long and about 8,000 miles wide, an area comparable to our entire world. Of course, its size varies and like the surface of Jupiter it apparently is not a solid body.

In fact, exactly what it is no one can be sure. There are some who say that it is some kind of a volcanic eruption and the color would indicate it might throw off some heat. The one thing that can be said with any amount of certainty is that it is a semi-solid or group of semi-solid bodies lying in the upper regions of Jupiter's atmosphere. This can be deduced by viewing the rotation of Jupiter which is 9 hours, 50 minutes and 30 seconds at the equatorial zone. However the period of rotation is not constant for all parts of the planet. Some give two figures of rotation, the one listed above and one for the rest of the planet, 9 hours, 55 minutes and 41 seconds.

The Red Spot, however, has its own rotation period as do other features of the planet. In fact, from 1901 to 1940, called the period of the South Tropical Disturbance, a feature of Jupiter, the Disturbance often overtook and passed the Red Spot as it rotated which showed that these features of the planet were not part of the Jupiter's surface or if they are, the planet's surface is not solid.

In recent years the Red Spot has faded somewhat. Early pictures of the spot were a deep red then at about 1886 it became sort of pinkish yet was described by astronomer E. M. Antoniadi in 1901 as intensely pink. Now it seems to be making a comeback with its color being described by astronomer Clyde W. Tombaugh as vividly pink.

Mr. Tombaugh and his assistants working at the Planetary Astrophysics Office of the New Mexico State University have been observing the Red Spot since last June. Mr. Tombaugh has reported that the Red Spot seems to be in the form of a ring with the central part being a fairly uniform deep pink color, but along the southern edge there appears to be a rather dark shell. Toward the northern edge the pink color seems to fade out. The Red Spot, like the rest of the features of Jupiter is still undergoing variations.

Of the pictures taken of the spot by Mr. Tombaugh and his group it has been visible only in those exposed in blue and violet light on Eastman LV-O plates without filters. I wonder what a probe of Jupiter would reveal? Undoubtedly the Red Spot will be one feature of Jupiter sure to make a great story.

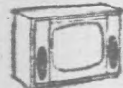
