At Hoboken City Council's next meeting on Nov. 20, it is expected that action will be taken on the purchase of three dump trucks needed for the city's snow removal.

A proposed high-rise luxury apartment house to be erected in Union City on the old Abbey Inn site, may be afforded use of Hoboken's \$12,000,000 sewage treatment plant as an independent customer.

Troy Towers apartment contractors requested a special sewer

line, which councilman Edward J. Borroné, Hoboken city chairman, referred to the city engineer and law department for study.

If approved, Liberty Construction & Engineering Co. of Short Hills will pay all costs of connecting the sewer line from the hilltop to Hoboken. The sewer tie-in would pour \$8,000 annually into the Hoboken treasury on a meter basis.

The project is will house 315 families.

EDITORIALS

GOVERNMENT

AS A CENSOR

Few people probably know it, but, to quote Editor & Publisher, "The U. S. Government has entered the business of collecting and disseminating news in competition with private news agencies."

The arm of the government involved in this disturbing and unprecedented enterprise is the Department of Agriculture. On the first of August, it inaugurated a marketing news service over a national leased wire teletype network. The significance of that is found in a protest filed by the American Newspaper Publisher's Association with the Federal Communications Commission: "An expansion of this concept would result in a government-controlled news service such as presently exists in some other countries including the Soviet Union, where the so-called news service Tass is government-owned and operated." The FCC answered that it was without jurisdiction, and the matter has been passed on to the Secretary of Agriculture.

Whatever the final result, the very real dangers inherent in this step should be universally understood. To quote Editor & Publisher once more: "A government, or official, news agency is the last thing we want in this country. It could lead to attempts by other government agencies to enter the same area and this particular endeavor would put the government in the censorship business in an odious form."

If you think these words are too strong, a statement by the Department of Agriculture itself should resolve your doubts. It "reserves the right to cancel at any time the connection of any and all subscribers who abuse the service by misrepresentation of reports, or for any other reason when, in its sole judgment, such cancellation is desirable." That can mean only one thing -- a user of the service is warned to go along with the Department of Agriculture line, whatever it may be, or be prepared for punishment.

This is no small matter -- after all, great oaks from little acorns grow. And if government is to disseminate news, what power would be left to prevent government from doctoring and warping news as it sees fit?

A NEED--AND A DANGER

Oil and gas should furnish two thirds of the free world's energy needs by 1985 -- which will mean a daily flow roughly two and one half times as big as that of today. And the free world, between now and then, will consume about 300 billion barrels of oil and 650 trillion cubic feet of gas -- more than twice the total production of man up to this time.

That dramatic forecast has been made by the head of a major American oil company* which operates in the international sphere. Despite this gigantic demand, he sees no reason for alarm about the world's resources of petroleum between now and 1985 or beyond.

Yet, there is a danger. For, he went on to say, if an oil and gas shortage should occur in the foreseeable future it would be to a great extent the result of excessive taxes and regulation -- elements which are totally beyond the industry's control.

In this company's case taxes have steadily risen in late years to the point where, last year, they took 31 cents of every dollar of gross revenue. The tax collectors now get more than twice as much as the employees and shareholders combined.

Regulation can be an equally onerous burden, when carried to needless extremes. The domestic gas industry is an excellent case in point. In this spokesman's words, "We have seen contracts between sellers and purchasers, arrived at by keen negotiation in a competitive market, voided by a government body which assumes that it knows best what is good for the purchaser and must, in fact, protect the purchaser from himself."

The oil industry has ample ability to meet a demand of almost unbelievable size. It would be a tragic folly if shortsighted political policies -- here or in the other free nations -- stood in the way. There's nothing the communist world would like better.

One source of ammunition that opponents of our space program have is the fact that there is some waste in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's method of handling the billions of dollars allotted to it by Congress. Yet, consider the situation: five billion dollars is an awful lot of money and there is bound to be some money used in duplications; with so much money available there is bound to be some pressure put on by politicians and space industry companies for contracts; and lastly, the fact that the Soviet Union got such a big jump on us caused some haste on our part in organizing our own space program.

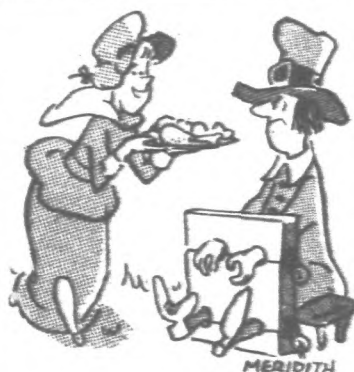
A lot of prominent people, though deploring the way the money is spent by NASA feel that we must go ahead with a good space effort. Senator William Proxmire, in a recent article in Nation's Business said: "The real issue is not whether we should explore space-of course we should. We should do so rapidly and competently, in the great tradition of American scientific leadership. But this does not mean that the space agency should be handed a license to spend billions of dollars unnecessarily on projects that duplicate others, are wasteful or are nonproductive."

What Senator Proxmire says makes sense. We should have a space program second to none; we should go to the moon as soon as possible; we should take advantage of the great victory, democracy has won over communism--that a country like the United States, can feed, clothe, provide more comforts and have a higher standard of living than any country in the world; have a stronger military force than any country in the world; and still carry on a space program that will lead the world in the exploration of space. Only the United States can do this and let's not let the rest of the world forget it.

Nobody likes to see money wasted for money that is wasted can be put to better use. There are many ways to effect a more efficient program. As Senator Proxmire suggests; all duplication must be eliminated. A congressional committee recently suggested that there be appointed an inspector general for NASA, plus a number

of congressional field inspectors to examine and report on the space program. Qualified independent supervision of a program that is growing at such a tremendous rate is absolutely necessary.

Maybe what the space program needs is another Robert McNamara who will save billions of dollars in our defense spending without weakening our forces in any way. The way our space program is growing it will undoubtedly become a department of government and eventually the President of the United States will need a "Secretary of Space" with cabinet status. Whatever must be done, I am sure, will be done. But under no circumstances must the space effort be slowed down. If the United States must lead the way in the exploration of space, it should do so. Let the other groups, the Soviet Union or the Common Market, build up to our level instead of us going down to theirs.

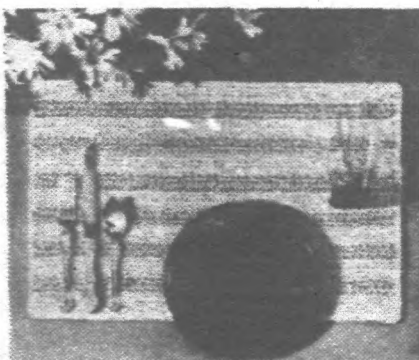

LABOR LOG

When Michael Quill, president of the Transport Workers Union, AFL-CIO, said the subway rides in New York City should be given the people free, he was not trying to be facetious. He meant it.

Quill, with the brogue that many say is phony, is a fighter for the rights of the union members. However, there is no need of alarming the public by implied threats of a walkout on New Year's Day. At least, in collective bargaining, the sham and the acting should be eliminated.

There are too many histrionics in labor-management negotiations with the public, if not the rank and file union members, the captive audience who has to pay the price for such bad acting.

Not only Quill but other labor leaders as well should look into some real acting by the parasites in government who pay laws supposedly to protect the public and, in the case of the Landrum-Griffin Act, the union members. The unions should investigate those who are supposed to enforce these laws and they'll find indictment based on the amount of publicity to be gained not by the merits or justice in the case.

As has been advocated in these paragraphs since the inception of the Labor Log, the unions should begin to investigate the alleged investigators and find out: Who they are. From Whence They Came. Who appointed them? You will find some interesting backgrounds in those investigators.

At this time Mike Quill and his problems are more important than the parasites on the public pads as investigators. The subway is important to the public because it is a means for the workers to get to their places of employment so that they can earn enough money to pay taxes to keep the parasites in the manner--high and mighty--to which they have become used to.

Undoubtedly, Quill is sincere in his demands. Too, if he is asked he will have a ways and means for a free subway ride. He probably has in mind that the off-track betting would take care of such things as a free ride in the subway.

Actually, the loud talk about the new contract coming up for the transport workers is the sounding board to garner public reaction or, to be more exact, to stune the people for things to come. If the transport workers gain an increase, instead of Quill's free ride, the subway riders are going to get an increase in fares.

Thus, it might be better for all concerned that in this case the contract negotiations start and end without the embellishment of acting--unless Quill gets a permit card from Actors' Equity.

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RED CROSS SPONSORS TWO HOME NURSING COURSES IN THOMAS EDISON SCHOOL

Mrs. Florence Dwyer, chairman of volunteers and Mrs. Carmela C. Castellucci, R.N., chairman of nursing services of North Hudson Chapter, American Red Cross, announced that two home nursing courses on Care of the Sick and Injured, will be given in Thomas A. Edison School, 507 West Street, Union City, starting on Wednesday, November 13.

The course consists of six 2-hour lessons. There will be a morning course from 10 a. m. to Noon, and an afternoon course from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. They will be given for six consecutive Wednesdays and sessions will end on December 18. The new 1963 home nursing textbook just issued by Red Cross will be used. Classes will be limited to 12 students each. Mrs. Castellucci and Mrs. Marilyn T. Violone, R.N., Red Cross nurses will be the instructors. Certificates of proficiency will be issued to those who successfully pass the course.

Mrs. Dwyer pointed out that the objective is the demonstration and practice of skills for caring for the sick in their own homes or in shelters during a national emergency. The procedures on rehabilitation of patients with long term illnesses and the teaching of self-help are an important part of the course. The adaptations of the skills necessary for emergency situations have been incorporated throughout the courses. The lessons give students the opportunity to learn about maintaining health, recognizing illness, positioning and body mechanics, personal services for the bed patient, getting the patient out of bed and giving medicines and simple treatments.

Mrs. Grace Berg, R.N., home nursing committee chairman, is in charge of recruitment. Classes are open to the public. Because of limited enrollment, applications will be received on a first come, first served basis. Those interested in enrolling can apply in person, by telephone or by writing to Red Cross Chapter House, 212 37th st., Union City during office hours. There is no charge for the course. Textbooks are available for purchase by those who enroll in the course.

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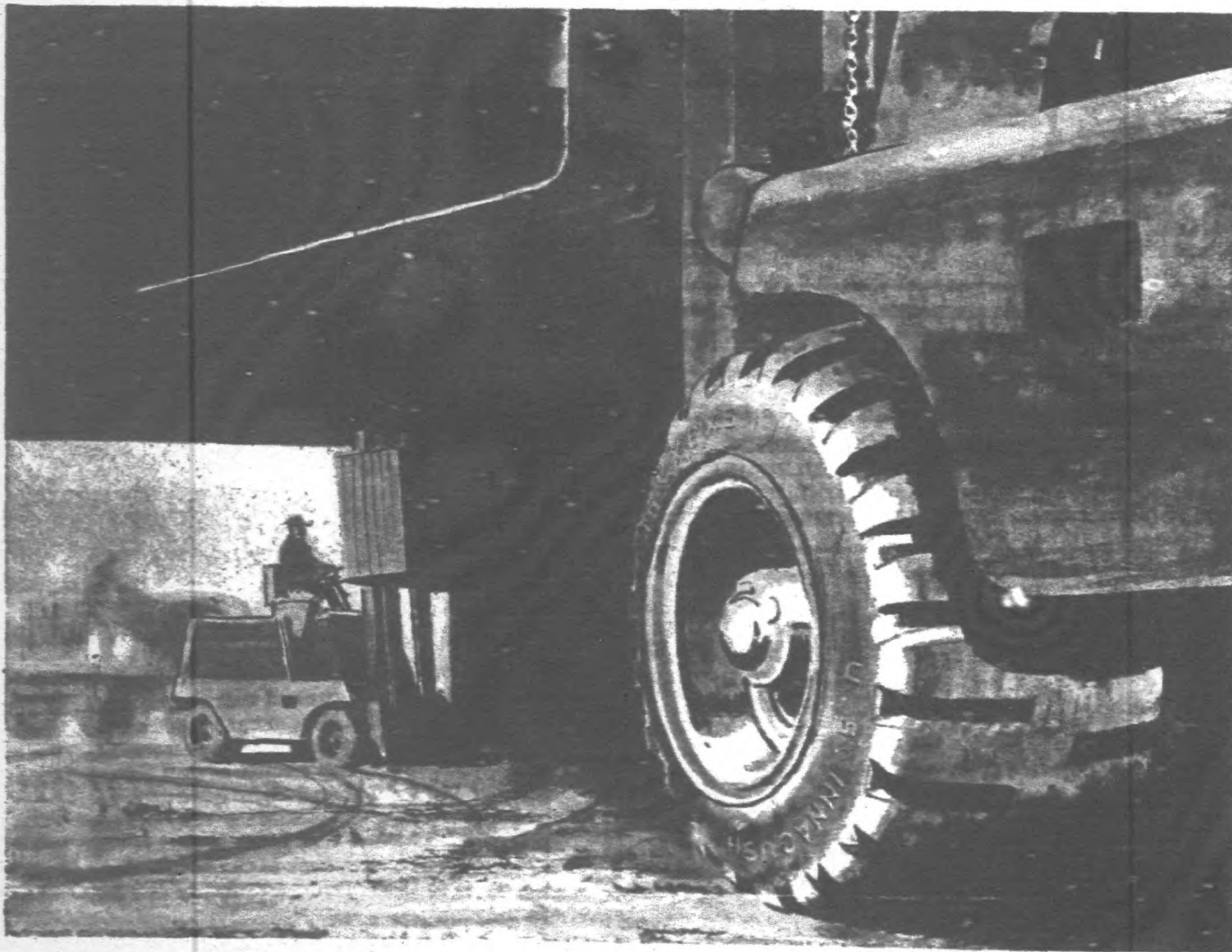

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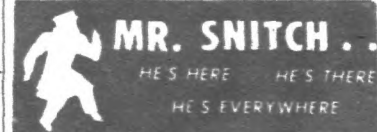

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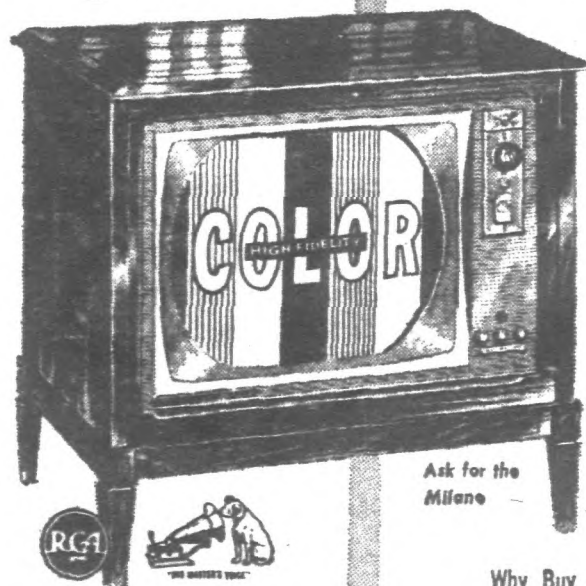

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MATTHEWS ACTS TO ELIMINATE 11th ST ODORS

In an effort to prevent Second Ward from becoming a ghost town Councilman William J. Matthews is urging that immediate action be taken to eliminate the foul odors emanating from the sewage treatment pumping station located on the 11th Street Island between Washington and Hudson Streets. Matthews, who with his brother, David, owns a confectionary and package liquor store a block from the station said: "Foul odors have actually penetrated into the rooms of apartments in this vicinity and have been a reason for many families moving out."

Councilman Matthews has requested Hoboken Public Works Director Hugh McGuire to investigate the condition thoroughly at the earliest possible date. His action to eliminate the odor was supported by other council members during a caucus held Monday night.

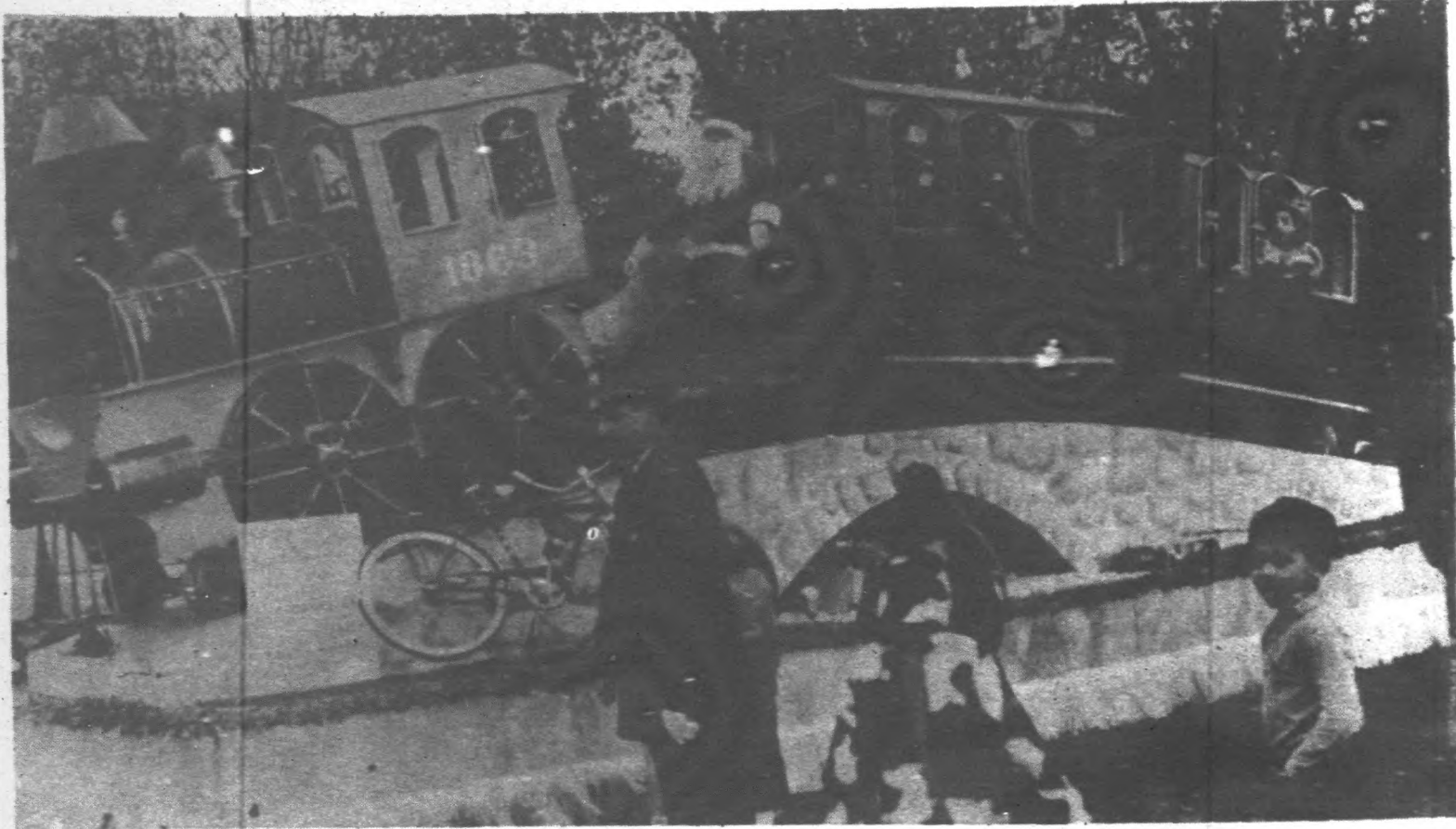
A spokesman familiar with the sewage treatment plant offered the suggestion that chlorinator tanks be installed adjacent to the pumping station in a concrete structure in an effort to check the unpleasant odor.

Matthews indicated he would suggest that Director McGuire contact the Lowe-Albertson engineers and ascertain the cost of such a project in order that the council can vote funds for it.
