

















# **Junior Class Officers**







The L.H.S. Track Team is young. However, as pioneers, they can certainly be proud of themselves.


## Tennis




Under the direction of Miss Slack, the girls took part in many play-days and even participated in a Gym Night in which the different classes demonstrated the various games mastered in gym.
